Holly Hill helps pay for motel to spur redevelopment

HOLLY HILL—The city commission, acting as the Community Redevelopment Agency, approved a \$126,000 grant to Sunoco. In turn, the company will buy Rollee's Court Motel, 118 Ridgewood Ave., and tear it down.

"We're removing our blighted properties," John Penny, commissioner, said at the meeting. "There are several blighted motels, and this is one of them."

In an interview after the meeting, Jim McCroskey, city manager, said that about eight months ago the city's CRA elected to create a \$500,000 fund to help buy dilapidated proper-

ties along Ridgewood Avenue.

"One of the recommended changes was to partner with anyone who wanted to replace one of the smaller motels with a business that meets our targeted business," he said.

After the meeting, Commissioner Donnie Moore said the investment was worthwhile, because he knows from experience that the older motels along Ridgewood attract criminal activity, such as drug sales and prostitution. He worked as an EMT for the city between 1995 and 2002.

"When I worked at the Holly Hill Fire Department, I was going to that hotel at least twice a shift," he said. "It's been a problem property for some time. What better place to start [removing

According to city records, the property was listed for sale at \$475,000. The seller agreed to

Q. What do you see as the biggest issue for the office you are seeking?

partner in a civil law practice, and currently manage more than 20 prosecutors.


Q. If you win, what's the first issue you will tackle?



visit the memorials that a grateful nation created to honor this "greatest generation."

In 2008 three Deland Rotary Clubs learned of the Honor Air Program conceived by retired Air Force Captain Earl Morse, working for the Department of Veterans Affairs in Ohio. The goal of the clubs was to organize and fund 10 expense-free trips from Daytona Beach to Washington DC, honoring about 100 local W.W.II vets per trip to the military war memorials.

On Sept. 29, the Honor Air program flew its 10th and last flight, having honored about 1,000 veterans during the program. More than \$800,000 has been raised by donations from sponsors to realize this goal.

There were smiles all around as the vets gathered for their departure. During their D.C. trip plans were to attend the WWII Memorial, the Korean and Vietnam War

Memorials, attend a hosted lunch, and visit the Marine Corps Memorial (also called the Iwo Jima Memorial).

After a group photograph, the vets visited Arlington and attended a special Wreath Ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknowns. The Air Force Memorial was their last stop before heading for home.

John W. Kelle, 85, of New Smyrna Beach, joined the Navy on his 17th birthday and served 2 years as a Seaman First Class. He said he first shipped out to "Pearl Harbor, over to Okinawa, then Guam and then the Philippines. I was in the Philippines when the war ended." He said he "was on board ship when they announced that the United States had just dropped an atomic bomb on Hiroshima. And the next day or so they bombed Nagasaki. We were close to there and could look over and see the rubble but they said we can't get near because it might be contaminated."

Each of the veterans travel with a volunteer "guardian" to help with any special needs

they might have. Rowell's guardian was his next-door neighbor, Petronella Uytenuaal, who was born in Holland and now works at AmVets. Her "parents and grandparents were in the underground during the war."

Raymond Allen, one of the many supporters as well as a guardian going on the trip, is a 24-year veteran himself who served in Afghanistan, Iraq and South Korea during his tours. He now works for the Volusia Veterans' Services Agency that assists former service personnel. This was his first trip. Asked why he was doing this he said, "To show respect to the men and women who served before us."

All the guardians and supporters that went on the trip paid for their own expenses.

Charles Hargrove Sr., of DeLand, a career Army First Sergeant, brought his own guardian in the person of his son Charles Hargrove Jr. His son graduated from the Naval Academy. Hargrove Jr. decided to "go along to be with him (his father) and keep him out of trouble."

Hargrove Sr. served in Japan in 1945 and his most memorable event was surviving an 8.5 scale earthquake during his tour.

A reported 1,200 people showed up at the Daytona International Airport to welcome them home. The vets arrived to a fanfare and many cheers. There were a lot of handshakes, applause, signs, flags and more than a few kisses.

Charles Kitching, of New Smyrna Beach, a Bronze Star recipient who joined the infantry when he was 18, said about the welcome home, "I'm overwhelmed — I can't believe this. It's more than I expected. We ran out of time and didn't get to see the Vietnam Wall". He also reported that his favorite memorial was the Korean Memorial.

Like most of these veterans, the humility and devotion and thanks were evident on every face that returned through the rows of admirers and grateful citizens.

The National Honor Flight network is turning its focus to veterans of the Korean and Vietnam Wars.

drop that \$260,000. Sunoco will remove the motel and expand its gas station and convenience store at 102 N. Ridgewood Ave. Mr. McCroskey said the company has been in talks with the city about the proposed deal for about eight months. The city will also pay for some of Sunoco's demolition and redevelopment costs.

The money is not part of Holly Hill's general fund. A large portion of taxes paid in a community redevelopment area must be spent on economic-opportunity and infrastructure improve-

ments to remove blight and encourage business development. Holly Hill has a CRA stretching along Ridge-wood from its northern to southern borders.

Mr. McCroskey said the city is negotiating with two other businesses about grants to purchase decaying motels and turn them to other uses. He said those negotiations, since they involve early stages of real estate transactions, aren't subject to Florida's open records laws and declined to name the companies.

"We're trying to attract some call centers," he said. "Medical is another highly attractive business we're looking after."

In other business, the commission gave its second and final nod to the 2012-2013 fiscal budget and property-tax rate. In a 4-1 vote, the commission adopted a property-tax rate of \$7.35 per \$1,000 of non-exempt, accessed value, slightly less than the rollback rate of \$7.38. Rollback is the tax rate that would generate the same amount of ad valorem taxes as the previous year, minus new construction and annexation. The adopted rate is slightly higher than this fiscal year's rate of \$6.95 per \$1,000 of non-exempt, accessed value.

Mr. Moore dissented. After the meeting, he said the adopted rate wasn't low

enough to make up for declining property values. He said if property owners aren't paying a lower tax rate that proportionately equals reduced value, they've gotten a tax increase.

"I'm just not going to vote for a property-tax increase," he said. "Bottom line is people have lost accessed values and they're still paying the same tax."

According to the Volusia County Property Appraiser's Office, Holly Hill's taxable value declined from about \$476 million last year to nearly \$453 million this year. With that drop in value, a higher property-tax rate can mean the same, or a lower, tax bill on a property.

being sold from sporting equipment to clothing, and from electronics and tools to refinished furniture and books.

Most sales start at 8 a.m. and being an "early bird" is strongly discouraged. There is also a wide variety of yard-sale experience among sellers. Bonnie Sosebee of Ormond Beach said it was her fourth or fifth sale, but she hasn't had one for about three years.

"There comes a time in your life when you need to start getting rid of things," Ms. Sosebee said.

For the items that do not sell, she said she "will probably donate them to hospice."

Her most interesting item was an Indiana Jones "kit" she won as a second chance drawing in the Florida Lottery. It consisted of a leather jacket and satchel, Jones's signature fedora hat and other items.

As the sales are open over a three-day period, each day has their own type of buyer. On Friday the buyer is looking to buy items for themselves from the greatest choice of items. Saturday's

buyers tend to negotiate more and some are looking for items to re-sell on eBay or at their own yard sale. And Sunday's buyers, knowing this is the last day, are aware any items left over tend to be heavily discounted.

When asked why they were holding a yard sale, most answered that it was a good way to raise some money as well as help get rid of things they didn't need anymore. Debbie Ryan of Ormond Beach, a real pro of yard sales, said she "will probably do one or two a

year." She also re-purposes and refinishes furniture that she has bought at other yard sales. She added that she "had a huge armoire that I sold," and some of her items were \$100 and up and were selling.

The most unusual item Ms. Ryan had sold was a "two-headed putter," which could be used by a right-handed golfer as well as a lefty. For the items that don't sell, she said they "will go to either Goodwill or Salvation Army; those are my two favorite charities I go to."

For Ormond Beach resident Paul Cunningham, this is his first yard sale. He specializes in tools, sporting goods and china. For his best sellers of the day, he said, "Actually what has sold the best today were my silver coins."

He began his sale at 9 a.m. And what doesn't sell, "A lot of it we'll donate to Goodwill and Salvation Army."

The primary principle of the yard sale is confirmed in the old axiom that one person's trash is another person's treasure. I witnessed a lot of "trash" become "treasure" today.



It is of no comfort that this seized property can then be given to some other entity or even sold as scrap metal and just how many joggers have recorded running into these tents and don't turtle nest pole markers have just about the same size supports as a tent? What we are witnessing is a kind of environmental nepotism vs. the purpose of our Constitution.

Stay balanced to improve your life

Balance. It is something we take for granted when we are younger and even challenge it by running, jumping and participating in sporting activities. However, as we progress through our lifespan our balance may start to become impaired for various reasons, leading us to become less active, more dependent on others, fearful of falling and, worst of all, suffering serious injury due to a fall.

It is estimated one out of three individuals over the age of 65 will sustain a fall in the United States each year. A fall is defined as an event that results in a person coming to rest inadvertently on the ground or floor or other lower level. Unfortunately many falls go unreported due to no one else witnessing the fall and the individual being embarrassed or unwilling to mention the occurrence to others, especially if there was not a significant injury.

Twenty to 30 percent of older individuals who fall will suffer moderate to severe injuries, which may lead to hospitalization, early entry into a nursing home or premature death.

There are multiple factors that may affect one's balance and ultimately lead to a fall. These include side

effects of medications; inner ear disturbances, such as vertigo; poor vision; diabetic neuropathy; general deconditioning; poor posture; limited mobility; and muscle weakness. As one can see, finding the appropriate reason for one's impairment is critical in order to attempt to correct the problem.

The good news is the majority of the reasons for balance deficits listed above can be treated with physical therapy. Physical therapy can assist an individual with increasing their mobility, strength, posture and overall conditioning through safe and effective methods. Recently updated guidelines by the American Geriatric Society recommend physical therapy as part of a treatment plan in preventing falls by the elderly. Physical therapy also can be beneficial with inner ear disturbances, such as vertigo, with performance of the Epley Maneuver or other techniques.

Just like performing exercises to strengthen your muscles, exercises can be performed to "strengthen your balance."

It is also a good idea to "fall-proof" your home since that is where the majority of falls occur. Information on how to do this also can be obtained from a physical therapist.

In summary, if you feel you have balance deficits or have fallen within the past year, make sure you let someone know, especially one of your medical providers. There are various forms of treatment, which can lead to improved balance, greater independence and a more active lifestyle without fear of falling.

Jobs, schools help drive home building

It's interesting that the two cities leading the improvement in new home construction are Daytona Beach and Port Orange.

In August, there were 73 new single-family homes permitted in Volusia County, according to the latest Census Bureau report. That's up from 50 in August 2011. Daytona Beach had 19 of those homes and Port Orange had 18. The next closest was DeLand with 10, but that was down from 12 in 2011.

With Daytona Beach, you have name recognition and jobs. The builders leading the rise are mostly national builders, such as D.R. Horton and KB Home, that market nationwide. Daytona Beach has name recognition for retirees. For people seeking jobs, the city has been gaining in manufacturing, healthcare and business services jobs. Port Orange doesn't have that many new jobs, but it has the perception of having the best schools.

One other city that should start growing more over the next few months is DeLand as it has been adding jobs in manufacturing and healthcare. New Smyrna Beach, another place popular with retirees, also is poised to grow. But other cities don't seem to be gaining much traction. The collapse in home prices in Orlando has taken away the main incentive for people to live in Deltona, which only had three new homes in

August, and Ormond Beach, with just five new homes, just doesn't seem to have enough to offer for new home buyers.

Volusia home building seems to be continuing on an upward trend, though. That should help reverberate throughout the county's economy and pick up all of Volusia.

Boy was I way off. Last week I mentioned a plan by CBL & Associates to tear down the Ramada Inn Speedway and build two restaurants, guessing Bonefish Grill and Texas Roadhouse, two chains that have been expanding. Well, as it turns out, it will be a Bahama Breeze and Olive Garden. I've never been to a Bahama Breeze, but people who have mentioned to me they have, seem to like it. Olive Garden will be a relocation from across the road. It's kind of funny that Outback Steakhouse is moving from one side of West International Speedway to the other while Olive Garden will be going the other way if the plan goes through.

Parents I warned you before that Chuck E. Cheese is coming to Port Orange.

Now I can tell you where you can take your kids in the future or avoid going anywhere near depending on how you feel about the place. The plans are to build it next to the actual pavilion at The Pavilion at Port Orange, on the other side of it from Malibu Grill.

Stephens Capital has sold the News-Journal property at Sixth Street and Nova Road in Daytona Beach to a group of Arkansas investors for \$8.6 million. I have no idea what that means. Stephens Capital and News-Journal owner Halifax Capital have been on a buying spree of newspapers, so maybe they just needed some cash. As a lessee, maybe it will be easier for them to walk away from the property in years to come when Halifax Media shuts the place down. But I'm just guessing.

Commercial real estate has continued its hot run in 2012 recently. An Orlando investor paid \$2.365 million for the retail strip at the front of the Orange City Town Center. Intelligent Capital LLC bought the medical building next to Walgreens at Clyde Morris Boulevard and Dunlawton Avenue in Port Orange for \$1.6 million. A South Florida investor paid \$600,000 for the office/warehouse strip, which houses Prestige Carpet and other business-

es, on Nova Road just south of Big Tree Road in South Daytona. A developer has bought land and an old retail building between Atlantic and Grandview avenues, just south of Seabreeze Boulevard, for \$379,000. Apparently there is a plan to put a chain restaurant there.

The dollar snatchers also have gotten in on the action with the developer of a Dollar General at Stratford Commons in Deltona for \$465,000. Family Dollar Stores has bought land at Derbyshire Road and Mason Avenue in Daytona Beach for \$350,000.

With one cinema already closed in Orange City, Victoria Square in DeLand is converting to a dollar cinema. The new Epic Theatres cinema in Deltona apparently is drawing all the crowds.

One last note for you folks who like to get your coffee at a drive-through – Starbucks has opened in front of Lowe's in Port Orange and the 24-hour McDonald's in front of the Walmart Supercenter in New Smyrna Beach also has opened.

The Jack Giles story — a struggle to survive

Many of us take our body for granted, that it will keep functioning in relatively good health, and if something goes wrong, our doctor will fix it. We may also take for granted that the smallest, most powerful organ in our body will keep doing what it's suppose to do: Circulate six quarts of blood three times a minute through our 60,000 miles of vessels to each of our 75 trillion cells, all to the tune of 100,000 beats a day.

But for 43 year-old Jack Giles of Daytona Beach, every beat of his heart is a miracle.

In 1999, just one day after his 30th birthday, Jack Giles suffered a heart attack. He was suddenly faced with an operation to have stents inserted to keep his arteries open. After the procedure, things appeared to be normal, and Mr. Giles continued with the business that he had set up six months earlier — A Superior Lock and Security. But a second heart attack sent young Mr. Giles back for more stents. The successive attacks were just the beginning of what would become a long and grinding journey.

In 2004, the big one hit. This time it called for open-heart surgery — and a bypass of five major arteries. Though the operation was successful, Mr. Giles' heart function had dropped to 70 percent capacity. But it wasn't over. In the ensuing years, Mr. Giles suffered two more heart attacks, each requiring additional stent insertion. In 2009, he had a sixth heart attack and a second open-heart procedure. By then, his heart function was down to a perilous 30 percent capacity.

Still, the assault on his health continued. After his second open-heart surgery, Mr. Giles found himself battling pneumonia (due to excess fluid build-up) and severe abdominal pain, diagnosed as a hiatal hernia. He was also in need of a gall bladder operation. But such an operation would be too risky without having a pacemaker installed. In 2010, Mr. Giles received both a pacemaker and a defibrillator. The good news is that since then, he has had no further heart attacks. The not-so-good news is that his heart is now functioning at a meager 10 percent capacity.

His greatest challenge, however, is still ahead — a heart transplant.

With only a 10th of his heart functioning, Mr. Giles presented as a prime candidate for a heart transplant. In fact, his candidacy was accelerated due to such low heart function. But "getting there" can be overwhelming. Dr. Glenn Rayos, Mr. Giles' cardiologist, referred his patient to Shands Hospital in Gainesville. The program isn't easy and the criteria is precise. First, the patient must be Medicare-qualified. Second, he must have a min-

imum of \$5000 in a pharmaceutical holding account (to ensure payment of first-year post-op medication expenses). Third, the patient must have family support.

In 2011, Mr. Giles made the first of five visits to Shands. He then underwent a battery of tests, including testing by social workers, to determine his candidacy. But since he wasn't able to meet all three criteria, he was denied. His disability was still under the two-year requirement, so Medicare would not cover the expenses. Further, he didn't have the \$5000 minimum for the holding account.

On Sept. 1, Mr. Giles' disability status hit the two-year mark. On that same day, Medicare kicked in and a second criterion had been met.

But there was still one more hurdle: The \$5000 holding account. As word got around about Jack Giles' fight for survival, people started pitching in to give what they could. Ike Leary of Granada Bait & Tackle gave the first \$100 and many other businesses followed. One man gave \$500, while others gave what little they had — including an elderly man who also had suffered a heart attack and kids who offered pocket change.

Another review of Mr. Giles' case was in the works. But in order for it to pass, the \$5000 had to be in place. It was down to the wire. Fortunately, on the last day before the review, Ike Leary once again stepped up. He gave yet another \$100. His generous donation put the account over the top, thus meeting the final criterion. It also helped propel the process to the next phase: The list.

The "list" is those who need donors. Mr. Giles is still awaiting notification as to whether he made the list. It depends on a suitable donor. The blunt truth is that someone has to die in order for someone else to live. And the donor heart must be the right match. Once a suitable donor is found, Angel Flight will immediately take Mr. Giles to Gainesville. In the meantime, there is more to be done.

In order to meet future (post-op) expenses, additional money will be needed. A number of venues are receiving donations. Wells Fargo has set up a "Jack Giles Fund," and Goliath Radio, WELE, 1380-AM, is having a "radio telethon." Talk show host Roland Via has been getting the word out through his radio show.

Headquarters for the fundraising is County Tire, 1130 S. Nova Road, Ormond Beach. Owner-manager Belinda Heffner is coordinating the effort and accepting donations in any amount. Also, D.B. Pickles, 400 S. Nova Road, Ormond Beach, is offering a special promotion. During October, Pickles will donate 50 percent of their proceeds to the Jack Giles Fund. A special coupon, however, must be presented, and is available at County Tire.

The most critical phase of this long ordeal will, of course, be the transplant operation. It is a delicate procedure that involves a lot of people — doctors, family, friends — but most importantly, the patient himself. It is not an easy process, nor does it come without risk. But Jack Giles is willing to take that risk. After all, his life is depending on it.

DSC grant to expand job training programs

Daytona State College will receive nearly \$850,000 over the next four years as part of a consortium of 12 Florida colleges awarded a \$15 million grant by the U.S. Department of Labor to

develop advanced workforce training programs.

The consortium's grant award is part of the labor department's Training Adjustment Assistance Community College Career Training initiative, which dedicated \$500 million in grants to community colleges and universities across the country to develop and expand innovative.

Daytona State will use its portion of the award to create a multi-step training process focused on the region's workers and industry needs.

Daytona State also will establish an advisory board of local employers to provide internships and jobs for program participants, who also would be recruited into engineering technology-related certificates, associate of science and bachelor's degrees offered by the college.

The program will particularly target veterans returning from overseas and clients of the Volusia/Flagler Center for Business Excellence.

Ooh, La La! — La's Bistro!

Step through the doors of this historic 88-year-old former Sears & Roebuck mail-order house and expect to be impressed. First, what use to be a home is now a restaurant — La's Bistro. Second, it is highly rated. Yet there is nothing pretentious or elaborate about it — just a comfortable, cozy environment in which to escape the outside world and indulge the inner senses.

Whether you enter through the front door into the main dining room or from the garden patio, the most palpable feature of this two-story house (circa 1924) is its inherent charm. There is original wood flooring throughout, a steep staircase that leads to the second floor, a central fireplace, and three separate dining

areas, each with its own ambient decor and view to the outdoors.

Located on West Granada Boulevard in Ormond Beach, La's Bistro is situated along the well-traveled route between Ormond's high-rise bridge and Yonge Street (U.S. 1). Since its founding, La's has been a delightful open secret for those looking for the best combination of food, service and atmosphere.

In July 2010, however, the property changed hands. The new owners, Casey Jones and Carlos Soldevilla, wanted to retain the familiar name. "Everyone knows the name," Mr. Soldevilla said. "It has an established clientele — it has maintained a clientele base."

The new team also brought a lot of experience to the business.

"I've been working since I was 11 years old," Mr. Soldevilla said. In fact, his first job was at his father's pizze-

ria in Edgewater. He later worked at both the New Smyrna Yacht Club and the former Skyline Restaurant in New Smyrna. As a chef, and now a restaurateur, Mr. Soldevilla wears a lot of different hats, including, as he put it, "being the second person in the kitchen," along with the resident chef, David Lani.

When my guest and I arrived on a recent Friday evening, we were immediately greeted by co-owner, Casey Jones, who cheerfully escorted us to a table next to the fireplace. Not long after, Mr. Soldevilla came to our table and introduced himself. He then described some menu items that he had personally selected for us to try. "Everything is made fresh to order," he assured us. That being said, we were ready to begin.

Our gustatory journey started with

a glass of wine — an Argentine malbec for my guest and a mellow chardonnay for myself. Not long after, our server, Jeannie Martin, brought us not one, but two appetizers: Zesty Grilled Shrimp, with a spicy homemade remoulade sauce; and the newest dish at La's — hot Spinach-Artichoke Fonduta, a thick and creamy dip with fresh spinach and chunks of artichoke, surrounded by toast bites.

Next on tap came a plate of homemade yeast rolls with honey-butter, followed by two different versions of La's Signature Salads: Mixed greens with cranberries, walnuts and feta cheese; and mixed greens with artichoke, pine nuts and tomatoes. Each came with homemade balsamic vinaigrette dressing.

For the grand entree: New York Strip Steak crusted with black peppercorns/au poivre sauce, grilled to perfection; and Wahoo, a deep-sea fish, baked, then topped

with a savory honey-citrus sauce. Each was accompanied by a lightly sauteed mix of summer squash and zucchini, plus garnishes — and of course both presentations were simply delicious.

We wanted to complement that identity."

For diners looking for the best in casual elegance, La's Bistro is a "must-visit." Its taste-tempting menu starts with breakfast, 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., Tuesday-Saturday, and

Course in Yosemite National Park is true gem

There is something very special about playing a golf course for the first time. Couple that with the fact that the course lies within the boundaries of one of America's greatest national parks and you have a round fit for a king.

Recently, I traveled to California and found myself in the middle of Yosemite National Park for some sight-seeing and exploration. Yosemite, complete with its Sequoia forest, towering Ponderosa Pines, Glacier Point, bear, deer and so much more is a place that touches one's soul.

When I discovered a nine-hole golf course inside the park, I knew I had found heaven on earth.

The Wawona Hotel Golf Course is located 4 miles from the park's south entrance and 6 miles from the Mariposa Big Trees, redwoods that are the

oldest living things on earth. The "Grizzly Giant" tree is

nearly 3,000 years old, with a base measuring 30-feet across and limbs 7- feet around.

As mysterious as the Mariposa Big Trees are, Wawona has its own mystery. Alister Mackenzie, one of golf's most revered architects, is listed in several places as designer of the course. Yet there is no definitive evidence that he even laid eyes on the place.

Al Gonzalez, general manager of the Wawona Hotel, has extensively researched the course's history. His findings indicate that Walter G. Favarque of San Francisco was the primary designer of the scenic layout that blends seamlessly into the pines of the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

"We don't know if Mackenzie ever walked the property," says Kevin Sleight, Wawona's head professional. "One story that I have heard from people who have been here a while is that Favarque sent his plans to Mackenzie to look at. It could be he oversaw the project from afar. There seems to be some connection, but we aren't sure just what it was."

One story golfers have been telling for years with regard to Mackenzie's connection to Wawona is clearly not true.

As the story goes, Mackenzie was working on Cypress Point, arguably the most

beautiful course in the world, when torrential rains flooded the Monterey Peninsula and halted work on the project.

According to the tale, Mackenzie took a trip to Yosemite and was told by officials they had a golf course project in mind. Supposedly Mackenzie designed the nine holes, but had to leave to complete work at Cypress Point, promising to return to design the back nine, but never did.

We know it's a tale because Wawona opened in 1918, while Cypress Point wasn't complete until 1928.

One thing that is certain is the course you see today is probably what will be there forever. Long ago there may have been a chance to finish the course with another nine holes, but because of conservationists and government bureaucracy it would be impossible to get that done today.

The course lies alongside the Merced River in a tranquil setting among towering Ponderosa Pines and incense cedar trees across a two-lane road from the rustic Wawona Hotel, itself a National Historic Monument built in 1856.

Wawona was the first course built in the Sierra and the first within the boundary of a national park. While it's a mountain course, it features only small elevation changes.

The nine holes play to only 3,035 yards and a par of 35, but only the two par-fives, holes one and three, can be considered short.

There are three par threes, the 229-yard second hole, the picturesque 185-yard sixth and the deceptive 167-yard

The hookup is the thing!

Our most important contact with a fish is the initial one. Unfortunately, some anglers give little attention to their angle. The hook that connects us to our prize must be trustworthy. Some of us leave the house with a rusty hook on the line that has been dangling there for a long time.

If the hook was out only a couple days ago, it could be all right, but if it hasn't seen the light since Memorial Day, you could be looking for trouble. If your hook is old and rusty, you are best to toss it. Many new hooks out of the box are not sharp enough. Run the point over your thumbnail. If it does not dig in, you must sharpen it.

Keeping a sharp hook is not a difficult thing and should be a high priority for all fishermen. I usually carry a small grinding wheel that comes with one of those high-speed motor tools. It is only about the size of a nickel and works fine.

Don't over sharpen your

hook. If you lose the point, don't try to build another. It's best to discard that hook. It is not easy to get a proper point after you ruin the factory one. Just three or four drags across a stone will be all you need.

Now, I understand that a lot of you don't bother to carry a sharpening stone around with you.

Maybe, I can help. When you're fishing inshore, at some time during the trip you will probably hook a clump of oysters. After you have stopped cussing, you might try running your hook over the shell. An oyster shell is a very good sharpening stone. Once you get the hang of it, you might even welcome an occasional shell into the boat.

These days circle hooks are

hot and as well they should be. They are great fish catchers and are very easy on the fish you wish to release. Using a circle hook eliminates the old saltwater snatch we have all perfected.

Simply allow the fish to begin to swim with the bait and then raise your rod tip gently and begin to reel. If all things are equal, the hook will rotate and hook the fish in the lip on the way out.

Red hooks are great and especially the circle ones. My old pal Capt. Leo of the Mosquito Lagoon uses a 5/0 red circle hook whenever he uses natural bait. If that sounds like a big hook, you are right. Leo's hooks look as though they could serve as an anchor for a small boat, but believe me they work.

A couple years ago, Capt. Leo and I were having fun with some very large trout. His big hooks were out-fishing me and, the very next day, I went to the tackle shop to buy some. I picked them up, but just couldn't do it. I came away with 4/0 hooks—

probably a mistake. Not all applications are great for circle hooks. If I am fishing straight up and down in deep water, I want a "J" hook. I don't like a circle hook when there is no slack in the line. I never use them for sheepshead at any depth. If you have ever seen a sheepshead bite, you know they are so wary they usually only clamp onto a tiny portion of our bait with those impressive choppers and then go into reverse, hard to get a circle into that mouth. Of course, there are always exceptions.

Fall is a great time to be out on the water, so give it a try and always keep a sharp hook.

eight, which has a small green framed by a bunker right and dense woods left.

The sixth hole is known as the nursery hole because all sorts of wildlife, including bear, come out of the woods here with their young seemingly to watch the golfers.

The seventh is a gorgeous 402-yard par four with a blind tee shot over a hill through the trees. The approach shot is downhill to a green beautifully framed by huge Ponderosa Pines. A plaque next to the green commemorates the spot where the first community in Yosemite was established by explorer John Muir, nearly 160 years ago.

It's not often one has the opportunity to play a round of golf in such an incredible setting. It's even less often one plays a round of golf that touches the soul.

Somehow I felt as if John Muir was walking along with me asking me what I thought of Yosemite, a place he fought long and hard to preserve. I'd love to tell him, but somehow

words cannot express the true beauty of Yosemite.
