Helping your pets 'adjust'

Yes, even pets can benefit from a chiropractor.

Just ask Dr. Nicolle Schultze, human and animal chiropractor.

The 45-year-old Palmer College of Chiropractic graduate holds licenses in both Florida and the British Virgin Islands. For animal patients, she gets referrals from veterinarians, such as Halifax Veterinary Center in Port Orange where she sees furry patients one day a week.

She was already providing chiropractic services for humans and then six and a half years ago Stetson, her horse, trotted into her life. The thoroughbred, with a heart on his forehead, was left for dead on a road in Tortola where she had been living fulltime.

He had no mane or tail, was covered with ticks and maggots and he had no skin on his neck. She saw a spark of life in the dying horse and made it her mission to save him. She told him "If you want to fight, I will stay with you the rest of your life and protect you. The biggest, proudest moment of mine is him. There is nothing more rewarding than saving a life."

At a huge expense, she got rehabilitated him shipped to Puerto Rico and then Florida, right before Hurricane Irma wiped out her home and practice in Tortola, B.V.I. He gave her hope and thus her logo "What Love Does."

"Hurricane Irma blew us (back) here," Dr. Schultze

She rode out the storm despite her home being a loss

Naturalist wants you to take a hike

Spring is almost here, the perfect time for a reminder of the hidden treasures found throughout Volusia County, many that can be found along biking and walking trails.

Orange resident Port Roger Fulton, 71, a Master Naturalist, shared some insights about himself and all Volusia County has to offer.

"People don't know what is in their own backyard," he said. He wants to be known for "getting people outdoors and sharing my resources for lifelong learning for everybody."

Mr. Fulton is a noted author of many outdoor guide books for hiking, biking, canoeing/kayaking and other outdoor topics

The former New York state trooper retired after 35 years in law enforcement and dis-

covered a love of nature, which he now shares with residents in both Florida and New York. The self-employed free-lance writer has written 40 books, starting with his first in 1988 called Common Sense Supervision. That book is still in print in five languages.

Many of his books are about hiking trails or kayak trips in Central Florida. He has a whole series for hiking and biking Northeast Florida all the way up to the Georgia line. He stated his information covers from State Road 40 in Volusia to State Road 70 in St. Lucie County and all the way across the state.

Making the transition from police work to nature talks wasn't a big stretch, he

"It's all the same skill set. You go to the scene, you look around, you take some photographs, you talk to people who know more about it than you do, and then you go back to the office and compile everything," Mr. Fulton said. Marine veteran creates memorial

Stressing it's not about him, Nicholas "Nick" Mottola, a U.S. Marine Corps veteran and New Smyrna Beach resident, has been planting trees since 1985 for U.S. military casualties that occurred from 1982 to 1984 in Beirut, Lebanon.

In 2015, his memorial took on a new twist by adding an airbrushed stone, donated by Rick Heald and painted by Pete Lagi.

The trees he has planted are spread throughout 10 states and in the yards of different houses in which he has lived.

The memorials will spread further soon as Mr. Mottola is moving to North Carolina to assist his elderly father.

This year's memorial, which consists of U.S. and Marine Corps flags, three robellini palm trees and the stone, has See MARINE, page A9

with rescued cats "strapped to her side." She reunited with Stetson and moved back to Port Orange in 2017 after living in Tortola nine years.

Dr. Schultze just opened an office in Port Orange. She works on human patients two days a week and much of the rest of the time works on both horses and riders as she has a mobile set-up. She encourages

referrals from veterinarians for all animals in need. She can go anywhere in Florida and still practices in Tortola one week per month. She uses a cold laser that helps with hip dysplasia in larger animals. She emphasized her services help both animals and people with a better quality of life.

"Chiropractic in general is meant to help with movement," Dr. Schultze said. "If something is not moving, I want to help it move. There are several symptoms that lead

you to show recurring issues. The goal is to put it back where it belongs so we can restore that motion and the body can heal itself. If it's got a spine, let me check it. If I can use a very gentle technique to move that bone to where it belongs, it gives the nervous system the ability to talk to the body again.

"I have always loved the power of what chiropractic can provide for people. My other passion is horses and now I am doing both," she

said. "I just firmly believe there is a lot of things that love can do. You just inspire somebody, and you love on them, get them moving again and the body will do the rest. I am just a tool. I inspire your body to optimally communicate to itself. I am fortunate that God gave me a gift to be able to use it with both (human and animals). I feel very fortunate that my two loves are what I get to wake up and do."

She added with animals, "The signs they give you as you are adjusting them, they will lean around and wrap their head around you, or sigh."

She stated animals clearly know they are being helped.

Dr. Schultze also was a combat medical specialist in the U.S. Army and athletic trainer for football, wrestling and basketball at the University of Minnesota. She has rescued 60 cats in Tortola to date, currently owning four (Bebe, Palmer, Petula and Clark).

One of Dr. Schultze's future goals is to form a nonprofit to be able to provide resources for rescue facilities.





He added, "It's not so much about me, but about the resources I bring. As of Jan. 1, we just launched a complete database, which has all the information for my Florida books as well as stuff I am adding as we go along."

In one of my favorite episodes, little Opie decides to run in a foot race against other boys his age. He is determined to win and take home the trophy, but finishes

dead last. Opie then exhibits every trait a poor loser can have. He hates the winner and vows to never compete again. He becomes mean and spiteful, nothing like his usual upbeat self.

Dad Andy has to do some masterful work to show him that throughout life he won't be able to win every time. In the end, Opie learns what it means to be a good loser. (a lesson sorely needed today.)

At times when I am watching the Andy Griffith show, I find myself re-casting it with some of the modern celebrities. Adele would be my choice for a new Aunt Bea and Mick Jagger is a dead ringer for Barney Fife. Vince Gill is a pretty good Gomer Pyle lookalike and Phil Collins is the only choice for Earnest T. Bass. Martina McBride could be Helen Crump and Rick Astley could be an older Opie. Toby Keith could be Andy with a lot of hair removal (both head and face.)

To be sure the original cast

was great. Recently, famed actor Billy Bob Thornton said the best character portrayal that had ever been on television was Don Knotts as Barney. I couldn't agree more. Just brilliant, and seemingly so effortless.



s I'm sure you've heard over the years, for a strong local economy, you need higher-paying jobs with good benefits.

That's why the opening of a place like Dave & Buster's in Daytona Beach, while nice to have, isn't that great as employment news, despite its 200 jobs. Retail and restaurants jobs just don't provide the boost you want in an economy. Since many of them are part-time and don't provide benefits like health insurance, they don't really provide a boost to quality of

The jobs you want are in construction, manufacturing, wholesale trade, healthcare and professions, such as accountants and lawyers. That's why it pains me to look at what we have in the Volusia/Flagler area. The first jobs report of the year from the state labor agency shows the two-county area with 14,800 construction jobs, 11,900 manufacturing jobs and 5,300 wholesale trade jobs. The statistics are a little better with 40,400 jobs in education and health services. and 22,700 jobs in professional services.

All of that sounds like a lot of jobs until you do the math and realize it's not even half of the 206,500 total jobs the state estimates non-agricultural employers provide in Volusia and Flagler counties. That's because we have big numbers in retail trade at 31,500 and leisure and hospitality at

We don't even do that well with government jobs at just 24,000 with a measly 1,500 federal government jobs. Even Alachua County, which is half the size of Volusia, has 4,500 federal jobs. Of course, with the University of Florida, Alachua has 29,700 state government jobs.

So, while Dave & Busters, Miami Grill and all the other places opening recently was fun, I was most excited to find out the nearly \$14 million office/warehouse next to Trader Joe's distribution center will be occupied by Amazon Direct. While I've seen reports that working in

Amazon warehouses isn't that great a job, it's a lot better than most retail, restaurant or hotel

Unicorp National Development has begun leasing space for its South Williamson Shops, which wraps around the RaceTrac at Williamson and LPGA boulevards. So far, the developer has signed up ABC Fine Wine & Spirts, AT&T, Extra Space Storage, Goodwill and Great Clips.

"Our practice is actually a wholistic medical office that employs medical staff and chiropractors," he said. "Chiropractic is one of the things we do, but the majority of our focus is on those wholistic medical services that patients can't find anywhere else and there is a great need for them.

"Stem cells are so unique, and it is a growing trend because it works so well," Dr. Steflik said. "Stem cells fall under the category of regenerative medicine. The mothers donate the umbilical cord, it is processed in the lab, and it is shipped to us and stored in a liquid nitrogen freezer. The mothers are tested for any diseases or blood borne possibilities of infections. They test the cells to make sure there are viable live cells in the product."

Dr. Steflik noted no match-

ing is needed. Rejection medications are unnecessary. When the cells are injected, they respond to inflammatory signals the body puts out when there is damage in an area, and

they go to that area and build it and repair it. He added as long as a tear (in a rotator cuff for example) is not too severe or damaged, the response rate is excellent. Arthritis in the knee, shoulder pain and peripheral neuropathy responds especially well to the stem cell treatment, he said. It is a one-time injection and the cells stay in the body and continue to work for months.

All insurance is accepted even though some of the services offered are not covered by insurance, such as the stem cell treatments. However, there is patient financing and Dr. Steflik emphasized the cost is "affordable" by most means.

He said a special feature of his practice is no one waits more than 15 minutes to be seen. You also know how much all your treatments will cost ahead of time.

While obvious injuries, such as broken bones and cuts demand immediate medical attention, less obvious injuries sustained in a car accident, such as sore muscles, reduced range of motion, headaches, neck pain and spinal pain are easier to put on the back burn-





been moved to the home of Jim and Linda Martin in Pierson to permanently honor their son, PFC Jack Martin. He was one of 220 Marines killed Oct. 23, 1983, in the bombing of the Marine Corps barracks in Beirut where 18 sailors and three soldiers lost their lives.

During the event, two truck bombs struck buildings in Beirut, housing American and French service members of the Multinational Force, a peacekeeping operation during the Lebanese Civil War. The first suicide bomber detonated a truck bomb at the building serving as a barracks for the 1st Battalion, 8th Marines.

Mr. Mottola, who was stationed in both Grenada and Beirut, said his company wasn't directly affected.

"When I got out of the Marine Corps in 1984, the following year I wanted to plant this tree," he said. "I decided to plant a tree in October in memory of all the guys I served with. As the years progressed, I started planting a tree every year and then

His cousins went into the Marines and he decided to go in, too. He was a laser range finder, so we didn't worry. He was on the top of the building,

directing the fire, telling them how far to shoot. We really didn't think he was in any danger. He wasn't down on the ground like everybody else."

She said Jack was an excellent surfer and skateboarder.

'We go where the Wall is once in a while, but that's too far to go," Ms. Martin said. "Now we have the memorial right in our yard. Nick is framily (a friend that is like fami-

Mr. Martin said, "We split our time between Tennessee and here. I have been so appreciative of what Nick's done. It would have never happened if it hadn't been for him. We appreciate him so much."

Jill Barton, Jack's sister, is equally appreciative. "I'd like to thank Nick first of all for honoring my brother and all the other guys," Ms. Barton said. "Just to have (the memorial) at our forever house and going to be with us all the time I am over the moon about it. (Jack) had the kind of personality that everybody was drawn to, kind of like a light. Just the coolness about him. Somebody said they remembered him because he would skate up and down the barracks."



Yamaha rider wins 78th Daytona 200

Kyle Wyman, riding the N2Racing Yamaha, emerged

from a late-race, four-lap shootout to win the 78th Daytona 200 on Saturday, March 16, at Daytona International Speedway.

Mr. Wyman edged polesitter Sean Dylan Kelly (M4 Ecstar Suzuki) and Bobby Fong (M4 Ecstar Suzuki), who started second in the 60-bike field. The overall margin between Mr. Wyman and sixth-place finisher Geoff May (Yamaha) was only 1.206 seconds. That statistic illustrated the closeness of the four-lap battle that ensued following a red-flag period.

The red flag was brought out by a Lap 53 incident involving third-place starter Jason Aguilar (Yamaha) that set up a four-lap shootout to the finish. The restart came on Lap 54. After several swaps of the lead among the frontrunners, Mr. Wyman took control for good coming out of the chicane on the 57th and final lap, pulling away from his rivals as the cycles climbed the 31-degree banking in the speedway's Turn 3 and Turn 4.

"To win it like this, Daytona, in a four-lap sprint race, it's just unreal," said Mr. Wyman, who said the red-flag period was fortuitous.

Briar Bauman won the Daytona TT Thursday, March 14, at DIS, in the season-opening race for the American Flat Track season.

Mr. Bauman, riding an Indian FTR750, built an early lead in the 25-lap AFT Twins main event featuring 16 riders. Henry Wiles (Indian) finished

second, 5.149 seconds behind, followed by Jake Johnson (Yamaha).

Switching from natural to artificial bait helps

As I have said before when I first threw out the anchor on these shores, all I had to do to catch a nice fish dinner was cast out a shrimp.

Back then that would work any place and any time. Not much talent was needed and I sure had little. I came here as a mostly fresh-water fisherman and knew next to nothing about fishing the brackish inshore. I used heavy line of at least 20-pound test with an ounce or two of lead and a large number 40 reel on a stiff rod. Not good but it didn't matter.

As the years passed, the fish became more scarce and little by little my methods changed. They had to. Now understand I was raised using artificial baits in Louisiana's bayou country, but that was in the fresh water. Here I began to switch to artificial baits in the

late 1970s. As a winter resident only, I was forced to seek an alternate bait when the tackle shops invariably ran out of shrimp and mullet as they always did in cooler weather. I struggled, but found a little success while wading around the Turtle Mound area and down at Eldora. That was an older man's game and I was usually the youngest wader on hand. (There is an unwritten rule that after age 50 an angler must switch to fake bait.)

Eventually one of the older gents came to my rescue. He told me that I had to lose the

heavy tackle and go light. Some there were using four-pound test.) I couldn't bring myself to do that, but I did go to six-pound.

Now I was fishing with a number 25 reel and a limber seven-foot rod. I began working my way through my box of lures to see what would work. I tried horsehair jigs and feather tails. I threw spoons and an assortment of plugs. Nothing was doing what I had hoped for.

Finally I began having a bit of success with a white paddle tail jig and a broken back white and black Rapala plug. The jointed Rapala and the paddle tail both provided their own motion. Still, my success rate was low.

Back then I subscribed to several fishing magazines and as I read them I kept noticing most of the big fish pictured were caught with a lure with a red head. That sent me to the red and white floating/diving MirrOlure that I still use today. I stuck with it because right away I began to see my catch improve. That plug worked for me.

I was still trying an assortment of jigs and finally I went to the chartreuse shrimp tail and the fish seemed to love it. As I became better and better with those two baits, my fun quotient soared. I suppose the lesson learned from all of this is that you must experiment until you find your bait. That is, the one that works for you. Sure try mine, but those may not me yours.

I have always believed fishing is 90 percent confidence. The only way to get that is by having success with a lure. These days I am convinced my two lures will out-fish natural bait and many times I have seen that happen.

I still have several large well-stocked tackle boxes, but I am able to carry my baits in my shirt pocket when I go fishing. That is quite a luxury. I don't have to fool around with messy natural baits (or spend a lot of money on them.) I don't have aerators or bait buckets and I can go fishing for an hour or so anytime I want without looking for bait. It is a freedom that I value.

So, I would urge you to go artificial. Try baits until you find yours. You will know when that happens. The answer will be in the fun!





Organic or not organic - that is the question

Tam a chef, so what do I know about organic food?

Probably more than most people would think. As a professional chef, it is important I keep up with the latest food trends, new cooking innovations, USDA initiatives, and healthy nutritional food information. So, let me share what I have researched recently.

The latest organic food definition was revised in 2002 by USDA. It stated organic food is produced by farmers who emphasize the use of renewable resources and the conservation of soil and water to enhance environmental quality for future generations. Organic meat, poultry, eggs and dairy products come from animals that are given no antibiotics or growth hor-

Organic food is produced without the use of most conventional pesticides, petroleum-based fertilizers or

sewage sludge-based fertilizers, bio-engineering or ionizing radiation. Organic food must be grown on land that has been chemical free for three years.

When reading food labels, natural and organic is not interchangeable. Free range, hormone-free and natural may appear on labels; however, organic food may only be listed on labels if it has been certified by USDA as meeting organic standards.

Organic farming has grown by 20 percent annually, but only accounts for about 3 percent of the food market. Farmers are considering organic food because there is generally four times the profit than from conventional food.

Organic foods sounds pretty

good, but let us look at these interesting facts and the rest of the story. A 20/20 investigative report on ABC made the case that organic food is not necessarily safer than conventional food and might actually be more dangerous because the manure used in compost may be more dangerous than the chemical residues. Manure may contain E Coli bacteria, which can be spread to humans. Manure may not kill micro-organisms in the soil that fertilizers kill.

Consumer Reports stated that no one should avoid fruits and vegetables for fear of pesticides. The health benefits overwhelm any possible risk.

Organic foods are not inherently tastier than conventional food. A taste test revealed free-range chicken tasted average, among nine chickens tested.

Mark McClellan, director of the Institute of Food Science & Engineering at Texas A&M University, states that organic food cannot always supply food free from pathogens or pesticides and cannot provide our country with a more nutritional, diverse and safe food supply.

USDA is now considering approving the use of 38 ingredients that are non-organic to be added to organic food and still be labeled organic. A prime example of this is a major beer company will be allowed to use non-organic hops, which is the main ingredient in the production of its product, and still be able to label it organic!

So where does that leave us? If you want to use organic food, expect to pay more. Is it worth it? You will have to decide for yourself. Now here are some recipes that will work no matter what you use.

Baked Stuffed Figs

Ingredients 6 ounces blue cheese 2 tablespoons chopped walnuts

1/4 cup chopped Italian parsley

4 ounces thinly cut ham chopped small 12 figs

Directions

Mix together all ingredients except the figs. Cut an X in the middle of the fig and stuff each fig with the mixture. Bake for 8-10 minutes at 325 degrees or until cheese is melted. Serve warm. Yield: 12 servings.

Mediterranean Fish

Ingredients

4 tilapia filets

8 ounces red onion chopped

1 small red pepper chopped 1 medium tomato chopped

1 clove garlic sliced

2 ounces olive oil

2 ounces butter 2 ounces Kalamata olives.

Directions

Place all ingredients except fish in a sauté pan and cook until onions are soft. Add 6 ounces of feta cheese and pour mixture over the fish filets. Place in 350 degree oven and bake for 10 minutes or until fish is tender. Serve warm. Yield: 4 servings.
