Melbourne women's group hosts anti-crime concert

New organization hopes to qualify for federal funding

An outdoor community concert at Lipscomb Park will be held to try to teach people -- young and old alike -- about the dangers of crime, drugs and other temptations.

Elect Women of God (EWOG) is

an organization of 20 women along the Melbourne-Palm Bay border who are concerned about youth violence and the lack of direction among residents, said Rachel Owens, event coordinator for EWOG.

The "United We Stand" concert will be held Sept. 3 at the park at 3316 Monroe St., starting at 9 a.m. About 200 people are expected, Ms. Owens said.

Delores Pryce, co-founder of EWOG along with Ms. Owens, said a major goal of the organization is

to quell violence.

"Our concern for our neighborhood and the youth of the community is escalating with each gun shot or violent act," Ms. Pryce said.

"Over the past months, we have lost several youth to senseless violence. We have united to take a stand against these cowardly, destructive acts," Ms. Pryce said.

The concert is designed to help

Oldest continuous Melbourne church turns 125

Holy Trinity Episcopal Church observes anniversary with various events

Imagine a time when Melbourne had barely 50 residents.

Imagine seeing a small church being moved from one location to another by means of a raft floating along Crane Creek.

Imagine the town's name being selected through a "straw poll" -- using actual straw from a broom.

All of that is part of the history of the oldest continuous-use churches in Melbourne -- Holy Trinity Episcopal Church -- which is celebrating its 125th anniversary this year.

Members of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church are marking the milestone with a year-long schedule of events commemorating its historic founding.

According to historical accounts, about 50 people lived in Melbourne in 1878 when a transplanted farmer, Richard Goode, and his wife, Jessie -- whose Illinois farm was destroyed by hail -- began leading a worship service in their Melbourne home.

Mrs. Goode prepared an altar by using a linen tablecloth to cover a large board she rested on a sewing machine.

Holy Trinity Episcopal Church was erected seven years later, in 1886.

Recently, Mayor Harry C. Goode, a direct descendant of the original Melbourne family, read a proclamation honoring Holy Trinity on its 125th anniversary.

Today, about 500 families belong to Holy Trinity, said Patricia Franck, the church's evangelism and healing chairman.

Father Steven Easterday and the Rev. Pamela Easterday are co-rectors of Holy Trinity, located at 50 West Strawbridge Ave. and Babcock Street.

The Rev. Easterday said the original church was built on the south side of Crane Creek. Because a creaky foot bridge tended to flood – soaking the hems of churchwomen's long dresses – the church relocated to U.S. 1 and Fee Avenue in 1896.

"The ladies in their hoop dresses didn't like crossing that bridge, so they took the church apart and floated it down the river," the Rev. Easterday said.

In 1955, because Melbourne was growing rapidly along U.S. 1, a new church pastor insisted that as a condition of his hiring, the church had to relocate again.

So it moved to its current site. Today, Holy Trinity is a thriving church, with an enrollment of more than 800 students in Holy Trinity Episcopal Academy, which includes preschoolers through high school seniors on two campuses. The church also owns Trinity Towers, an apartment complex for more than 550 low-income seniors.

Holy Trinity's centerpiece is its historic chapel, which is still used for midweek worship services. The charming chapel, a throwback to an earlier time, features pews that are small and narrow, like the chapel itself.

One of the chapel's original nails, used as a hook to hold gas lanterns, can still be seen. About 100 worshipers can fill its pews.

"It's the best-kept secret in town," the Rev. Easterday said, adding that the ancient chapel is still used for weddings and funerals.

A larger chapel nearby is used for most services.

At the old chapel, some of its stained glass windows memorialize many of the original members.

Holy Trinity is part of the history of Melbourne's christening itself, the Rev. Easterday said.

When the city of Melbourne needed a name, in order to receive mail, Jessie Goode took three straws from her broom, and offered three names: including Melbourne, in honor of Cornthwaite John Hector, an

Australian adventurer who spent time in the Goode home.

The other names were Fountain Heights and Villa Ridge, the name of the Goodes' destroyed home in Illinois.

The Goode's oldest child, Grace, picked the Melbourne straw.

A variety of celebratory events will include a commemorative paddling up Crane Creek, a church concert, a celebratory picnic, a love offering to fund ongoing restoration of the chapel and a Christmas Eve worship service in the chapel.

Father Easterday said the church intends to keep making history.

"There's an old saying: 'A cathedral is never finished.' That's true even of a humble chapel," Father Easterday said.

Cheri Schumann would like Kennewick High School's class of 1971 to know she is very much alive.

A story in the Tri-City Herald about Kennewick High's reunion focused on seven classmates who were slain out of 80 who had died. Schumann — now Cheri Taylor — was included.

But Taylor lives in Mill Creek with her husband and four children. She says she's happy, healthy and not ready to be buried.

Reunion co-chairwoman Debra Blum told the newspaper the report of Taylor's premature demise came by e-mail, apparently from another classmate. Blum says she used other sources to verify it.

Thermal imaging cameras recorded a parolee sneaking back in to New Folsom State Prison at 1:30 a.m., prison officials said.

"We quickly determined we did not have an escape. We found the suspect hiding in bushes near the Prison Industry Authority area," prison spokesman Tony Quinn said.

Marvin Lane Ussery, 48, was arrested on suspicion of being a felon on prison grounds.

Ussery served time at the prison for robbery before he was granted parole in June 2009. Ussery's bicycle was parked near where he hopped the prison fence, prison officials said.

Thirty corrections officers combed the prison yard for hidden contraband the ex-inmate may have been trying to sneak in.

Historical Commission seeks help

Capsules, cornerstones, documents and photos wanted

For almost 50 years, the Brevard County Historical Commission has been instrumental in collecting, preserving and arranging historical materials.

Joe Morgan, former mayor of the city of Cocoa Beach and chairman of the commission, is now on a mission, along with the other 15 members who seek residents who may have knowledge to help locate cornerstones in buildings in Brevard, as well as time capsules and other historical documents in an effort to preserve the heritage of the community.

A telling aspect of our culture, particularly in the Judeo-Christian tradition, the cornerstone is the first stone set in the foundation of a structure. Among the first literary mentions of the cornerstone, referred to in modern-day terms as the foundation stone, came in Psalm 118:22.

The laying of cornerstones became ceremonial, with the masonry inscribed with dates, names of buildings and architects, as well as other important information. In ages and civilizations past, sacrifices were performed near cor-

nerstones to ensure the success of the buildings.

In more recent times, time capsules have been included in or near cornerstones. Many time capsules are filled and buried or stored independently, for various reasons. The late former postmaster, Jack Seage, buried a time capsule several years ago at the Rockledge Post Office. It was recently retrieved and opened at a memorial event honoring him this May at the post office on Murrell Road.

In 2003, Project Mercury employees wrote accounts of their work on the project. Former Mercury astronaut Gordon Cooper donated a memento for a cone-shaped capsule that is now kept at the University of Central Florida library. The capsule is scheduled to be opened in 2038.

"We feel that the historical preservation and heritage of these artifacts, as well as photos, documents, maps, and other memorabilia have a strong impact on the economy of Brevard, and our mission at the Historical Commission is to honor the past, explore the present and shape the future," said Mr. Morgan.

The Historical Commission is funded by the Tourist Development Council and receives approximately \$14,000 per year to complete projects, though all of the members are volunteers in the organization. The nonprofit entity was established by the

Brevard County Commission in 1963, and founded by a former schoolteacher, Ada Edmiston Parrish. A member of the Historical Commission for more than 45 years, Mrs. Parrish, who died this summer, was named Historical Commissioner Emeritus by the Brevard County Commissioners in 2008.

Now located in the Central Brevard Library and Reference Center at 308 Forrest Ave., Cocoa, on the second floor, next to the Genealogy Department, the Historical Commission has more than 35 file cabinets on the premises filled with photographs, newspaper clippings and documents of history that can be accessed by the public as reference information.

"We encourage organizations to continue to provide us with copies of special events, DVDs, photos, and any other items we can preserve in our archives," said Mr. Morgan.

are opening the class up to the whole community, rather than just children enrolled in programs at the Scott Center," said Colleen Middlebrooks, outreach coordinator for the Scott Center for Autism Treatment.

As opposed to other sports that are more competitive, such as soccer and basketball, tennis can serve as an appropriate social and physical outlet for individuals with autism and similar disorders, Ms. Middlebrooks said.

At the same time as the free children's class, tennis players from throughout the county are invited to participate in a "Skills, Drills and Aces Competition" from 3-5 p.m. on the club's main courts, that offers the chance to make a donation and win prizes for

not getting "aced" by members of the Florida Tech tennis team, which means to successfully return an opponent's serve.

Participants can earn pledges based on their performance, and individuals can choose to sponsor a participant to compete in the event.

Lastly, four of Brevard's top tennis players will play an exhibition game from 5-6 p.m. Music, drinks and snacks will also be provided throughout the afternoon.

Where were you on Sept. 11, 2001?

UNDER ATTACK.

Tuesday, Sept. 11, 2001, I had just gotten my coffee and settled into my desk at The Jupiter Courier, ready to tackle a normal Tuesday deadline day. The small TV in the newsroom was droning on as it usually did — at that moment, the Today Show was on — and I was doing what I usually do, keeping half an ear tuned in for anything interesting.

When the plane crashed into the World Trade Center, Tower 1, I turned around from my computer screen and watched for a scant second. Wow. Someone just flew a plane into the World Trade Center. How does that happen? How can you miss a hundred-something story building?

Strange, but OK. It's New York. Strange things happen

there. Nothing worth deviating from the deadline task in front of me, putting together the pages of the twice-weekly paper that covered the local community, a quiet northern Palm Beach County town many miles away from New York skyscrapers. I went back to work.

The TV droned on. At approximately 9:03 a.m., a second plane hit the second tower. I knew, in that instant, as did the rest of the world, that the first crash was no accident. The words "WE ARE UNDER ATTACK" floated in front of my eyes.

I blinked, and in a split second, I was transported back to my Army basic training days, garbed in camouflage, waiting in line to pick up my weapon and my orders to fight.

I blinked again, and was

back in front of my computer screen. My managing editor was barking orders to scrap the day's lineup of city council meeting stories and school news, while she rushed back to her own computer to write something pertinent and timely related to the days' events, still unfolding amid the hushed tones of the national news anchors, who themselves, were watching the twin towers crumble in front of their eyes in real time, just like we were.

A year later, the shock and awe still hadn't subsided. We had just launched

the first editions of *Hometown News*, and were putting together the edition commemorating the first anniversary of the Sept. 11 attacks. The events that changed the world as we knew it were still fresh in the minds of readers, many of whom were personally touched in some way and shared their stories with us.

There was the crane operator who had just retired to south Stuart, who happened to be in New York the day of the attacks and didn't leave until three weeks later, volunteering his time to help move debris and clear paths for rescue workers. There was a woman who lost her daughter in the attacks but still refused to believe her little girl was gone. There were numerous law enforcement and fire rescue

personnel who traveled to ground zero to help, from cataloging remains to arranging for food delivery.

For the first time in my life, I understood what the words "indelibly etched" in one's mind meant. For the people we talked to, the memories, the pictures, will never go away. The memories of those interviews are indelibly etched in my mind.

On Friday, Sept. 9, 2011, we will publish an edition dedicated to the 10th anniversary of Sept. 11, 2001. *Hometown News* isn't unique; media outlets all over the world will be commemorating this milestone.

What we hope will be unique is your voice, in addition to our reporting. For our Sept. 9 edition, we are opening up our View-

point pages for your stories and thoughts: Where were you on Sept. 11, 2001? How did the attacks affect you personally?

How has the world changed in 10 years? How has your view of the world changed?

We would like to share your thoughts and memories with our readers. Ten years later, we want to hear what you have to say. Thank you, in advance, for keeping the memories alive.

was a bad idea.

That bill was authored by three Republicans: Phil Gramm (TX), Jim Leach (IA) and Thomas Bliley (VA).

If you go to www.govtrack.us, you can see how legislators voted on it, and even read the full text.

It passed, with 51 Republicans and 38 Democratic senators voting for it.

In 1999, Senator Byron Dorgan, R-N.D., made a speech against it that predicted it would cause a financial disaster.

However, this bill affected banks. Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac are government-sponsored enterprises and had massive financial problems, but that was only part of the downfall.



'Melt' the veggies for a traditional spaghetti sauce

Hello smart shoppers. Every couple of years I find it necessary to repeat my family's superb spaghetti sauce recipe, so here it is. Why no company can make a great sauce is beyond me but I've yet to find anything comparable.

The recipe is from my mother and my father's mother; together it's the best. I was told to use an Italian brand of tomatoes since they're made with plum tomatoes, which are sweeter.

A basic tomato sauce, one to which you will add meat if you choose, does not contain oregano. Oregano is used in a marinara sauce that does not contain meat. Marinara sauce is served plain or with seafood. Disagree? That's fine, that's what it's all about, but try my sauce and you will be the judge.

The secret to great tomato sauce is one: in the ingredients; and two: in the method of cooking. One thing you really need is a large heavy pot, so if you don't have one now is the time.

Gone are the days when I used lard or bacon drippings. After learning my cholesterol was too high I changed many of my recipes to eliminate, if possible, high-fat and high-cholesterol ingredients. Today, my sauce is virtually fat-free. But amazingly, it's still delicious. Adding grated Romano cheese to the sauce as it cooks adds a little fat but so much flavor. See you next week!

SPAGHETTI SAUCE serves 6 or more

- 1 large (28-ounce) can tomato puree
- 1 large (28-ounce) can crushed tomatoes with added puree
- 2 small (6-ounce) cans tomato paste
- 2 large onions
- 2 medium carrots
- 2 large cloves garlic
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin

- olive oil
- 5 or 6 large fresh basil leaves, whole, or 1 tablespoon dried basil
- Pinch of dried rosemary, crushed between fingers
- Several sprigs fresh Italian parsley (chopped) or 1 tablespoon dried parsley
- 1 handful grated Romano cheese
- 1-1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- Few shakes crushed red pepper (optional)
- Water or chicken broth

Peel onions and garlic; trim and scrub carrots. Carrots contain a natural sugar, which usually eliminates the need for added sugar.

Chop vegetables very fine (a food processor is great for this). Sauté in a large pot in the oil or water if you want a completely fat-free sauce. As Mama used to say, "You must cook the vegetables until they almost melt."

Since you are using a very small amount of oil you must keep adding water, about a cup at a time, as it See **GRAMMY, B7**

cooks down. This is the longest preparation process for the sauce and can take about 30 minutes. When I decide to make sauce I double or triple the recipe and freeze it in suitable size containers for future meals.

Add tomato paste and cook a few minutes, stirring constantly. Add remaining ingredients and liquid until thinned to desired consistency. Stir well; bring to a boil. Lower heat to just a simmer, cover and let cook for 2 hours, stirring occasionally.

Remember, a burnt sauce is bitter and cannot be fixed.

ANY FRUIT COBBLER (NIB) regular and low-cholesterol serves 6

- 1/2 stick butter or 1/4-cup butter substitute such as Smart Balance
- 4 cups peeled and sliced peaches, nectarines or apples
- 1/2-cup sugar or 1/4-cup sugar and 1/4-cup Splenda
- 1 tablespoon plus 2/3-cup biscuit mix, regular or low-fat
- 1/2-teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 tablespoons firmly

packed brown sugar
2 tablespoons milk*

In 1-quart shallow casserole combine fruit, sugar, 1 tablespoon biscuit mix and cinnamon.

In medium bowl mix remaining 2/3-cup biscuit mix with brown sugar. Using an electric mixer cut in butter or substitute until mixture is the size of small peas. Stir in milk until moistened. Drop batter by spoonfuls onto fruit.

Bake at 400-degrees for 30 minutes until toothpick inserted into crust comes out clean. Let stand 5 minutes.

MICROWAVE FUDGE

This quick fudge is high-fat because of the butter, but what fudge isn't?

- One (1 pound) box confectioner's sugar
- 1/2-cup cocoa
- 1 stick butter
- 1/4-cup milk
- 1/2-cup chopped nuts
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift sugar and cocoa into ungreased 9-inch square microwave-safe glass pan. Cut butter into five pieces on top. Pour in milk; DO NOT STIR.

Cook on high in microwave two to three minutes until bubbling. Remove from microwave; stir thoroughly; blend in nuts and vanilla; spread evenly.

Refrigerate one hour, cut into squares.



You'll be treated like a president at President Country Club

The best way to get the best service and treatment is to be the president. Because the chance of that happening for nearly every one of us is nil, the best way to get the service you'd enjoy if you were president is to play at the facility that carries the name, The President Country Club.

Just one course wouldn't be enough for a president to enjoy, so here you get 36 beautiful holes tucked into an oasis just off Palm Beach Lakes Boulevard right in the heart of West Palm Beach.

The club recently changed hands, with Ray Finch, owner of Hammock Creek in Palm City, closing on the course just days before I played. What drew him to the course is the downtown location.

The club is just minutes from the airport, the turnpike, Interstate 95 and U.S. 1. Golfers who work in the downtown area can see their first shot land in the fairway just minutes after finishing a long day at work. The 40-year-old club also features a mammoth clubhouse, perfect for weddings, banquets, reunions and more.

I found the conditions to be very good, but Finch plans to ramp them up even more. Feeling that the course has slipped in the past few years, Finch stated, "We are making a significant effort to get playing conditions back by the fall."

A couple of weeks ago, Finch invited some of my colleagues and me out to play his new track. Not only



we were treated with the friendliness we have come to expect from the staff at his courses, but also I was shocked that such a great course was so close to me and I'd yet to discover it.

We teed it up on the Eagle Golf Course. Designed by Robert Trent Jones Jr., this signature course features six sets of tees measuring between 5,000 and 6,900 yards. Framing those yards are beautiful landscaping, perfect sand bunkers and coquina-lined fairways.

With many mature trees guarding the fairways, you cannot just grip and rip your tee shots. The ability to shape shots and play to the proper side of fairways is rewarded here.

The course plays to a par of 71 and features five of the best par-3s you may ever play in one round. Each is different and requires smart club selection. I hit a different club on each of these and both of my colleagues remarked at how much they liked the par-3s.

The short par-4 12th is a hole that can make or break your round. The hole tempts you to hit driver from the tee and knock the ball on or close for a good chance at birdie or better. With water guarding the entire left side of the hole and sneaking in just in front of the green, the risk

may outweigh the reward. For me, it broke my round but not because I tried to be greedy. I hit a duck hook and splashed my tee shot. I'd rather not relive the rest of that hole, thank you.

In addition to the great greens and their rolling contours, you have to pay attention to the wind. Thanks to the surrounding tall condos, the wind tends to swirl or seem to not even be blowing. Check the trees and the flagstick before picking your club.

If you need birdies late, be prepared to hit some solid shots. The closing holes feature the longest pair of par-4s and the longest par-3 and par-5 on the course.

The second course at the club is the Patriot Course. This course is a more traditional Florida course with oak-lined fairways, well-placed bunkers and subtle doglegs.

With five sets of tees, golfers can play the course from nearly 4,900 yards to more than 6,100. All of the par-5s play to less than 500 yards, allowing us mortal golfers to feel like pros with a good chance at reaching most of them in two with a pair of good shots.

Miami blue butterfly

now endangered

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has announced that it is taking emergency action to protect the Miami blue butterfly.

The Miami blue now becomes listed as endangered under the Endangered Species Act.

The emergency listing immediately protects the butterfly for 240 days.

Concurrently, the service is issuing a proposed rule to permanently put into place the protections for the Miami blue beyond the 240-day emergency period.

The Miami blue is a small,

coastal, non-migratory butterfly endemic to south Florida.

The service is also listing the cassinus blue butterfly, ceraneus blue butterfly and nickerbean blue butterfly as threatened throughout their natural ranges due to their similarity of appearance to the Miami blue.

This action also prohibits the import into, and export from, the United States of the three similar butterflies.

An animal or plant is designated as endangered if it is in danger of extinction throughout all or a significant portion of its range.
