American Police Hall of Fame honors fallen heroes

On Sunday, Sept. 11 of this year, the nation took the time to remember those who had fallen in the 9/11 attacks. At the American Police Hall of Fame and Museum in Titusville, their every day is to honor those who have fallen all over the country.

The APHF, 6350 Horizon Drive in Titusville, is the nation's first national police museum and memorial dedicated to American law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty.

"It is a profound message sender that we have not forgotten and shall not forget the ultimate price that people have paid for the freedom that we have," said Officer John Pasco, vice president of the Police Hall of Fame.

The interactive displays and simulators and artifacts from all over the country helps to educate the public about the history of law enforcement and the current impact that law enforcement has on the nation.

To immortalize those who have fallen, more than 8,000 names have been etched into the memorial's marble walls, which are added each year

on May 15, Police Memorial Day. To Officer Pasco, it is because of these individuals that we are a free country.

"Some people like to say 'land of the free and home of the brave.'" Officer Pasco said. "But I like to think of it as 'land of the free because of the brave.'" According to the APHF website, every 57 hours a police officer is killed in the line of duty in America.

The museum has several exhibits,

including a crime lab, the wild west, an auto alley, a kid's discovery zone and a K9 exhibit.

Brevard schools meeting economic challenge, superintendent says

Turning down the heat in offices means a balanced budget

VIERA – Dr. Brian T. Binggeli, superintendent of Brevard Public Schools, said he felt like Ebenezer Scrooge when he ordered all thermostats turned down when students were out of school during winter break, but employees were at work.

"At least Bob Cratchit got one piece of coal," Dr. Binggeli said. "We shut the power off completely."

But employees didn't complain, he recalled. They knew the belt-tightening challenges all schools face.

Like everyone else, Brevard Public Schools is battling the economic recession, Dr. Binggeli told a meeting of the Melbourne Regional Chamber of East Central Florida.

Dr. Binggeli spoke at the

chamber's "September Education Breakfast" at the Holiday Inn Melbourne-Viera Conference Center Hotel.

The district's belt-tightening is no small challenge, Dr. Binggeli said.

The district trimmed \$18 million in order to meet its current budget.

"That wasn't a bunch of vacant positions and stagnant programs, those were real programs and real people," Dr. Binggeli said.

Dr. Binggeli said the district has done a good job of facing its economic challenges.

He said one milestone was meeting the state-imposed class-size mandates, which he said were an "enormous logistical challenge."

"We actually have \$400,000 in our budget this

Students grow messages of hope

St. Joseph School plants 'Pinwheels for Peace'

Peace was the premise last week at St. Joseph's Catholic School in Palm Bay.

After gathering in the shape of an oversized peace sign, the entire student body met on the front lawn of the school Sept. 21 to "plant" 210 handmade pin-

wheels.

The morning event was in celebration of "International Day of Peace," a tradition established in 1981 by the United Nations that was designed to mark the world's personal and planetary progress toward peace.

Now in its sixth year, "Pinwheels for Peace" is one way of honoring this special day.

"This project is the perfect blending of installation art

and the idea that art has meaning," said Delia Lancaster, art teacher at St. Joseph's, who first heard of the project during an art conference. "Art is beyond just an individual – it should be shared with the world. This concept really teaches kids that art can and should be a movement."

This is the second year St.

Meals on Wheels faces an everyday challenge

High gas prices an obstacle in daily drive to deliver meals in Brevard

Volunteers who deliver a daily hot meal to shut-ins are more welcomed than the typical delivery person.

They get hugs, big smiles and lots of words of thanks.

But Brevard County's Meals on Wheels program faces a major challenge: High gas prices.

In Brevard County, Meals on Wheels is meeting the challenge of providing a daily hot lunch for more

than 1,000 recipients – but the challenge is continuous, said Linda Wells, senior nutrition program director for Meals on Wheels.

The mobile food program is coping with ever-increasing gas prices, along with the void created by volunteers who are returning to the workforce to meet their own economic challenges.

Meals on Wheels delivers a hot meal to more than 1,000 people in Brevard County each day, relying on a force of about 650 volun-

teers, who donate time and drive their own vehicles.

Of those 650 volunteers, Meals on Wheels depends on about 495 drivers weekly to deliver the meals, Ms. Wells said.

"Our volunteers go from Mims to Micco," Ms. Wells said.

Ms. Wells said the majority of Meals on Wheels clients are elderly shut-ins. She said the delivery of a meal doesn't just meet their nutritional needs, it also enables volunteers to check on the health

and safety of clients who are typically alone.

The task is getting more challenging because of the economy, Ms. Wells said.

"The economy is affecting our volunteer corps because we have quite a few volunteers that are retirees, and some of them are having to return to at least part-time work to supplement their incomes," Ms. Wells said.

"And some folks are delaying their retirement and are remaining in the workforce, and they would have been

potential volunteers," she said.

Ms. Wells said she dreads the possibility that the Meals on Wheels program, which is part of the Community Services Council, might have to resort to putting needy clients on a waiting list if it falls short of volunteers.

"We're not at that stage yet, and it's something we have really tried to avoid," she said. "With the shortage

of volunteers that we are beginning to experience, it may lead to us having to activate a waiting list.

"But we're not at that stage yet."

The economy has led some Meals on Wheels chapters to deliver a week's worth of frozen meals in one stop — but that is not the case in Brevard County, Ms. Wells said.

"We deliver hot meals that are prepared in our community kitchen in Cocoa," Ms. Wells said. "Our concern with delivering frozen dinners is that some of our recipients are unable to manage the task of preparing the frozen meal, and it is not safe for them."

A major benefit of making a daily visit is checking on the shut-in's welfare.

"We want to hold on to the true intent of Meals on Wheels, which is to have a daily visit with our clients," Ms. Wells said. "Many of our clients live alone, so our volunteers are the only persons they'll see during the course of the day."

Pat Welch, who volunteers to deliver meals, says the

price of gas may be high, but it is worth it for her to help the less fortunate.

"The price of gas is part of our contribution," Ms. Welch said as she loaded some hot meals in her car at Peace Lutheran Church, where volunteers gather.

Ms. Welch said she sees people on her route who might go without a meal if Meals on Wheels did not deliver.

"A lot of people are waiting at the door for their food," Ms. Welch said.

Candy DiBerardino,

another volunteer, said some clients "are pacing up and down before we get there."

"A lot of them are alone and they are so appreciative when we get there," Ms. DiBerardino said. "A lot of them just want to chat with us. It's a good thing."

Meals on Wheels is a valuable way to check on the well-being of the participants.

"If they don't answer the door, we call them," Ms. Welch said. "We make sure they are OK. We have a hotline number we can call for help if we've knocked on their doors and don't get an answer."

Cindy Flachmeier, president of the Community Services Council, said Meals on Wheels provides another 800 meals to seniors who are mobile and can go to one of 15 locations where meals are provided.

But the bulk of the recipients are shut-ins.

"If some of our clients did not receive a meal from Meals on Wheels, they may not get a meal that day," Ms. Flachmeier said.

From seattlepi.com: Runaway steer creates chaos on Arizona interstate. A runaway steer stopped traffic on a major highway, hurtled over a brick wall and damaged two police vehicles during a chase that had four Arizona law enforcement agencies scrambling.

The male bovine escaped from a livestock trailer on Interstate 8 just east of Yuma, Yuma County Sheriff's Capt. Eben Bratcher told The Associated Press.

The driver of the trailer was getting on the freeway when he noticed that a side door was ajar. He pulled over, but one of his charges got away before he could shut the door.

"It was chaotic," Bratcher said. "It was running around in traffic on the interstate, which is why law enforce-

ment got involved as quickly as it did. There was a lot of us out there chasing this thing around."

A sheriff's deputy roped the steer about a half-hour after the escape.

Bratcher said the steer was uninjured and returned to its owner.

A dog-sitter's shortcut led to criminal charges for a Colorado woman who had a Chihuahua running alongside her car at 10 to 15 mph.

The *Daily Camera* reported that 29-year-old Joan Renee Zalk, of Boulder, faces animal cruelty and felony menacing charges.

Zalk told officers the dog, Cooper, "goes ballistic" if it doesn't walk 3 miles a day. Witnesses called police after seeing the leashed dog struggling to keep up with the car.

Zalk is free on bond. Cooper was uninjured and was taken to a local shelter. The dog was expected to be released to its owner, who was out of town at the time of the incident.

An Oregon man pressed his luck one too many times and spent the night in a Nebraska detox cell after twice mistaking a police station for a casino and asking authorities for

blackjack chips.

The *Lincoln Journal Star* reported the 21-year-old man approached the University of Nebraska-Lincoln police station front desk after a college football game.

He left after a staffer told him it was a police station but returned a few minutes later. That's when an officer administered a blood alcohol test, which registered at .273 percent, more than triple the state's legal driving limit.

Police took him into protective custody while he sobered up. A police sergeant said the man had not committed a crime and was not arrested.

One hundred and twenty donkeys arrived at a sanctuary in California on a plane from Hawaii chartered by the Humane Society of the United States.

Tracy Miller, manager of Peaceful Valley Donkey Rescue in Tehachapi, said the donkeys are "none the worse for wear" after the long flight and two-hour drive that followed it.

They are descendants of donkeys brought to Hawaii to work coffee plantations, who were then cast aside when they became obsolete.

Recent drought conditions have brought hundreds of

donkeys down from the mountains into developed Hawaii, where they have disrupted traffic and made other trouble for humans, inspiring a search for new homes.

From wkr.com: Offenders in Alabama town can choose jail or church

Authorities say non-violent offenders in southern Alabama will have a new choice: go to jail or go to church every Sunday for a year.

WKR-TV reported that Operation Restore Our Community begins soon. The city judge in Bay Minette will let misdemeanor offenders choose to work off their sentences in jail and pay a fine or go to church every Sunday for a year.

If offenders select church, they'll be allowed to pick the place of worship but must check in weekly with the pastor and police.

If the one-year church attendance program is completed, the offender's case will be dismissed.

Bay Minette Police Chief Mike Rowland said the program could change the lives of people heading down the wrong path. So far, 56 churches are participating.

year that came to us from the taxpaying citizens of other counties who last year couldn't meet that challenge," Dr. Binggeli said. "They paid a penalty for that, and we got some of that money."

Dr. Binggeli said Brevard Public Schools faced major economic hurdles because it is one of the largest school districts in the state.

The Brevard school dis-

trict serves approximately 73,000 students, making it the 10th-largest of 67 school districts in Florida.

The district is the largest employer in Brevard County, employing more than 9,000 people, including more than 5,000 teachers and staff.

The school district operates 86 schools in 17 municipalities in Brevard County.

The school district refrained from spending Education Jobs Bill funding that was made available to schools. Such spending would have

counted against the district's budget, Dr. Binggeli said.

"We didn't spend any of those dollars," he said. "By comparison, Broward County spent every penny, and they have laid off well over 2,000 employees and cut a lot of programs."

"We are committed to prioritizing the dollars to where they count the most. We did cut a grade school opening, and we continue to be guided by our strategic plan."

Dr. Binggeli said managing the school's budget is no different from having an effective household budget strategy.

Dr. Binggeli said, for example, that the district has strived to reduce its energy consumption, saving hundreds of thousands of dollars as a result.

"In 2009-10, we dropped our kilowatt consumption by 4.4 percent, by doing such things as window tinting," he said. "Last year, we cut our kilowatt

hour consumption another 7.9 percent.

"To put that in perspective, we have cut \$1.5 million in the last two years," he said.

Dr. Binggeli said saving through energy conservation has required some personal sacrifice.

"Over two weeks in winter, we shut off the heat in every building," he recalled. "One day, I came into my office, and it was 67 degrees."

"Our administrators did not complain. They understand it is a means to an end."

He said the ongoing effort to conserve energy consumption has been "through behavior modification."

Dr. Binggeli said he wishes he could be just as successful in economizing at home.

"I have a 14-year-old daughter, and I can't get her out of the shower because the hot water just keeps running," he said.

Joseph's has participated in the Sept. 21 event, alongside thousands of other schools throughout the world.

An estimated 3.5 million pinwheels were spinning in more than 100 different countries on the same date in 2010, according to the Pinwheels for Peace website, www.pinwheelsforpeace.com.

Whether it's peace in the home environment, freedom from bullying, peace of mind or the conflict of war, Ms. Lancaster said her hope is for students to learn that peace can take on a multitude of meanings.

"Peace can be very personal," she said.

Since the last week of August, St. Joseph students in pre-kindergarten through eighth grade have been working on their pinwheels in art class, as well as in their individual classrooms.

On one side of their pinwheels, students wrote messages that captured their thoughts about war, peace, tolerance and harmony, whether it was a phrase, prayer, poem or even a song lyric.

On the other side of the pinwheels, students added drawings, paintings and collages to express their

feelings on these topics in more of a visual format.

Eighth-grader Autumn Keany, 13, wrote a poem specifically for her brightly colored pinwheel, which opened with the line: "Someday, I hope there will be peace, and that war will someday cease."

After participating in the school's inaugural "Pinwheels for Peace" project in 2009, Autumn said the event was one she's been looking forward to for a while.

"I think it's something that all of the students, from the little ones in pre-K to the eighth-graders, can take part in," she said, standing in the center of a large, pinwheel-filled peace sign. "Everybody came together to create something that's really beautiful."

Third-graders Emma Turba and Joseph Stokes also used bright colors to decorate their pinwheels, while adding similes for peace, such as loving, caring and harmony, throughout.

"Bright colors stand for peace so I wanted to use lots of them," said Emma.

"I added stars and stripes and squares and used green, red and blue for my colors," added Joseph. "I think our designs let others know (how) we feel about peace."

In addition to the actual planting of the pinwheels, the seventh-grade students unveiled banners they made that read, "Peace be with you" during the ceremony, while other students sang a song, called "Peace Like a River."

"This message is hopefully one that sticks with our students for a long time," Ms. Lancaster said. "If everyone finds peace in their own hearts, we'll all be in a better place."

Fiscal responsibility automatic cuts



Church groups fill, ship care packages for soldiers

Boxes expected to reach troops in remote areas of Afghanistan in time for the holidays

Each day, most Americans have the luxury of waking up in a comfy bed, drinking a cup of hot coffee and enjoying a cool shower.

Before starting their day, they apply various beauty and hygiene products, have time to read the morning newspaper and savor a healthy, filling breakfast.

But on the other side of the world, many U.S. military troops are lucky to catch an hour of sleep in their makeshift tents, while stationed in remote and isolated areas of Afghanistan.

These soldiers go weeks without access to running water and must survive on the few items they carry in their backpacks, while constantly changing locations.

"It's these troops who can benefit from this project the most," said Melbourne resident Gloria Grant. "These men and women are fighting every day to protect us. They can use any and all the help we can give them."

A native of Waveland, Miss., Ms. Grant moved to the Space Coast after her 120-year old, antebellum-style home was completely destroyed in Hurricane Katrina.

Since 2005, she has been extremely active in the community outreach programs at St. Mark's United Methodist Church in Indiantonic, primarily with the Lydia Circle women's group.

With support and assistance from the group, Ms. Grant initiated a military effort through www.anysoldier.com that provided 168

large flat-rate boxes full of hygiene products, snacks, magazines, DVDs and a variety of other items to troops in Afghanistan last year, just in time for the Christmas holiday.

And this year, she's at it again.

"The effort has actually been continuous since our first shipment," Ms. Grant said. "After our first Christmas mailing, we received enough donations to do a January mailing and followed up with an Easter mailing and a summer mailing. Now, we're preparing for our second Christmas shipment."

The number of care packages the church has mailed out has far exceeded Ms. Grant's original goal of 100 boxes, as its members are expecting to fill and send

their 400th box this fall.

"This is my Christmas," Ms. Grant said. "In my family, we put up a Christmas tree, but there are never any presents under it. Instead, we use the money for whatever we would have bought for one another to fill as many boxes as we can. It's tough to be away from home at any time, but the holidays are especially difficult for these kids."

Throughout the year, Ms. Grant receives numerous letters and emails from various troops, thanking the church for its generous efforts. Earlier this year, four members of the U.S. National Guard even visited St. Marks as a way to personally show their gratitude.

Staff Sgt. Morton of West Melbourne, 33, served two tours in Afghanistan, most recently as a logistics supply sergeant in the city of Bagram.

"Being away from family is always the hardest part," he said back in February, addressing a group of the church's members. "So when we receive these care packages, it provides us with a little bit of home and makes us seem that much closer."

Those words of gratitude are what, Ms. Grant said, inspire she and her fellow volunteers to continue their efforts.

"My goal is for even more

indoor public gun range, including free personal instruction. Several classes are offered at the gun range, including Concealed Weapons, Young Shooter Safety and Gun Safety.

The APHF also has several programs for those families who have lost someone in the line of duty.

Scholarships are awarded every year and in the last 10 years, \$2.2 million has been awarded. Emergency funds are provided for those spouses who have lost a husband or wife in the line of duty, including a check for grief counseling.

Other programs include money for summer camps and gift programs for those children who have lost a parent in the line of duty.

According to Barry Shepherd, the executive director of the APHF, there are more than 8,000 family survivors in the APHF programs. To Shepherd, the ability to do something so rewarding is what keeps him doing what he does.

"Most people's first experience with law enforcement is when they get pulled over," Mr. Shepherd said. "Most people don't have a good opinion of law enforcement, and it's nice to be able to teach them what they really do - protect and serve."

This year, four additional churches - Holy Apostles Episcopal Church in Satellite Beach, Lutheran Church of The Redeemer in Melbourne, St. Paul Lutheran Church in Melbourne and Satellite Beach United Methodist Church - have jumped on board with the

project and have already mailed out several shipments of boxes to various troops in Afghanistan.

"Gloria showed up at our church one day and presented us with an opportunity we could not refuse," said Janet Jodoin, a 20-year member of St. Paul Lutheran Church. "We've sent 14 boxes so far and are still filling more."

Gloria Mitchell, a long-time member of Satellite Beach United Methodist, has participated in a similar military project at her church, alongside her husband, Jewell, since 2007. But this year, they chose to reach out to even more military members through the Any Soldier website.

"We're right here so close to Patrick Air Force Base, and we realized we need to be doing as much as we can to help our troops," Mrs. Mitchell said.

Hazel Morrison, a member of Lutheran Church of

the Redeemer, said that in addition to community donations, her congregation uses the money raised during its holiday bazaar to help fund the project.

She is also one of several parishioners at her church who have sewn a total of 100 Christmas stockings filled with sweets, lip balm and other goodies, to add to their holiday shipment of boxes.

Representatives from each of the five churches gathered at Holy Apostles in Satellite Beach last week to sort through items and prepare many of the care packages for shipping.

"This effort is something our entire congregation has embraced," said Holy Apostles and Sarah's Circle member, Karen Coleman.

"I put out some generic lists of items in the spring, and the donations have just been pouring in. It's allowed us to actually adopt two units for the hol-

idays."

While the military project at St. Mark's keeps Ms. Grant busy year round, she is always more than willing to speak with other churches about the cause and help them get started.

"This isn't just a Christmas project; this is something we do year round," she said. "So, I'm always eager to help, regardless of the time of year. Whether it's a church, school or even a family, there are different size units, (ranging) from three members to 175, so anyone can take part."

St. Mark's plans to send its Christmas shipment by the first week of November. The average cost to fill one box is \$30 at a local dollar store, including shipping, which is currently \$12.95 per box, Ms. Grant said.

"I wish we didn't have to do this project," she said. "I'd be happy putting an end to it right now and giving the rest of the items to

charity. But until all of our troops come home, we're going to do what we can to make their time there that much easier."

Items, as well as monetary donations, with checks marked for the military fund, can be dropped off at the front office of any of the participating churches.



They have to have five years service to have tenure in the retirement system. A person can serve two terms as a representative and not be eligible for any retirement.

This information can be checked easily by going on line and calling up "Congressional Research Service."

The average government retiree receives less than \$20,000 a year.

New take on a classic musical

There may not be 76 trombones, but the Space Coast Symphony, under the direction of Aaron Collins, is going to present Meredith Wilson's classic, "The Music Man," with a twist.

The show, which will be performed Oct. 1-2 at the Waxlax Center in Vero Beach and at Holy Trinity Episcopal Auditorium in Melbourne, is an unusual production for several reasons.

"We're presenting it in a 1920s- or 1930s-style radio format," Mr. Collins said. "There will be no sets, costumes or choreography. The performance is totally focused on the music. We're enlarging the pit orchestra from 15 to 35-40. There will be a larger, lush orchestral sound."

For the lead roles, Mr. Collins has brought in some heavy hitters.

Taking the role of Marian the Librarian is Eliza Healy Dopira, a Melbourne native with a bachelor's degree in vocal performance from Florida State University and a master's degree from the Peabody Conservatory.

Ms. Dopira serves as an adjunct professor in the music departments of Florida Institute of Technology and Brevard Community College.

For Professor Harold Hill, Mr. Collins has brought in Stephen Mumbert. The singer, a graduate of Stetson University, has a master's degree in opera from the Boston Conservatory. He is a studying for his doctoral degree at the University of Minnesota, where he performs with the university's Opera Theatre.

"The two leads are extremely talented," Mr. Collins said. "They have great operatic backgrounds. They're tremendous performers and fun to listen to."

In addition to the leads and some featured characters, there will be a 35-piece chorus.

The cast will perform the full script, with several microphones on stage to capture the voices.

Musically, only some incidental music used during set changes has been left out.

Mr. Collins said that the caliber of performers was high because there are only two rehearsals and two performances and no long-term time commitment.

Performers like the compact schedule, made possible because there are no costumes and staging to deal with.

"We're not trying to create musical theater," Mr. Collins said. "There are many great organizations that do that. I wanted to find musicals that have fine, lush

orchestral scores. For next season, I'd like to do 'Les Miserables.' It's the 25th anniversary, and they've released a special concert production."

This is a new endeavor for Mr. Collins, who is always ready to try something unusual. He hopes the community will respond to the new programming.

"I'm optimistic," he said. "People are excited. It's different. You don't get the opportunity to hear it the way it's going to be heard, with professional caliber musicians. I think that's going to really be appreciated and people will love it. I think it will be fun."

Italian-style turkey soup and delicious additions

Hello, smart shoppers. This week I will cover what to do with leftover turkey and the turkey frame and then we'll add some additions to the holiday dinner.

If you have a lot of turkey left over do as I do – place some stuffing in a small zipper freezer bag. Do the same with the gravy. Place sliced turkey in a large bag; insert the other bags and freeze. In no time you'll have dinner in a flash. Then next week, my versions of two other great quick dinners.

When it comes to turkey soup there's none to compare with my Mom's Italian style. It's a kid's favorite and, according to my grandson, Addison, has magical healing powers. He's 22 now, but from the time when he was a little tyke an upset stomach, a cold, a headache, a scraped knee, even a burned finger would surely get better if only I would make him some "tourkey soup."

Enjoy, see you next week!

TURKEY SOUP, ITALIAN STYLE

When I make soup, I always use a pressure cooker. Turkey soup will take about 1/2 hour to make in a pressure cooker and two hours in a pot.

- 1 turkey frame
- 1 large onion, 3-inches in diameter, peeled, sliced
- 3 large stalks celery with leaves, cut up
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2-teaspoon black pepper
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley or 1 tablespoon dried parsley
- Half of an 8-ounce can tomato sauce (adds nice color, very little flavor)
- 6-quart stock pot or pressure cooker

Wash turkey frame, remove all traces of skin and stuffing. If the turkey frame is very large, you might have to do this in two batches. Never worry that you have too much. It freezes great.

Place all ingredients in the pot and fill two-thirds with water. Cook two hours in pot or as instructed with pressure cooker. Pour soup into large colander that has been placed over a large container.

When cool enough to handle, remove meat from bones and add to soup. Too much meat? Freeze it for a casserole. Mash vegetables with fork or hands and add to soup.

Return soup to pot and bring to a boil. Make baby

meat balls, about 3/4-inch in diameter, and drop (raw) into boiling broth. Cook about 10 minutes.

Chill soup. When ready to serve, remove all fat that has congealed on top of soup. Bring soup to a boil, add medium size noodles that have been cooked halfway and cook until tender. Serve with a sprinkling of grated Italian cheese.

NOTE: My family always used Mueller's Kuluski noodles for this soup. Although not easy to find, they're sure worth the search.

I have recently found that linguini pasta, broken up works great. When cooked, they resemble the noodles in canned chicken noodle soup.

BABY MEAT BALLS/COCKTAIL MEAT BALLS

Baby meat balls are wonderful in soups. Make them a little larger and cook them in spaghetti sauce for delicious cocktail meat balls.

- 1 pound "fat-free" fresh ground beef or brand name ground turkey*
- 1/2-teaspoon garlic powder
- 2 eggs or egg whites or equivalent egg substitute
- 1/2-cup bread crumbs
- 1/2-teaspoon salt
- 1/4-teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon parsley flakes
- Handful grated Romano cheese

Mix all ingredients together with your hands, shape and add to boiling broth or simmering spaghetti sauce.

*Beware of store ground turkey – it can contain quite a lot of fat.



cranberry sauce.

- 1 4-serving package cranberry or orange-pineapple gelatin
- 3/4-cup boiling water
- 1 large stalk celery, chopped
- 1 orange, peeled and chopped
- One 16-ounce can cranberry sauce, jellied or whole berry
- 1/2-cup chopped walnuts

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water, add remaining ingredients, place in mold and chill. Un-mold several hours before serving by dipping mold in hot water for a few seconds and inverting onto a plate. Chill until firm. Cut in wedges and serve.

ROASTED MIXED NUTS

All nuts taste better roasted, except for the butternut, (large, angular, hard to crack, dark brown nuts).

Place nuts on a cookie sheet, being sure not to crowd them, and roast in the center of a 350-degree preheated oven for 12 to 15 minutes, shaking pan midway through. Test a nut when cool, and if it's not crunchy and wonderful, place them back in the oven and roast a little longer.

Finally found drivers you love? Now look for great wedges

A few weeks ago, I told you all about some of the newest drivers on the market. If you're hitting your driver well, the next clubs you need in your bag are great wedges. After all, what good is hitting the ball far if you cannot hit it close with your next shot?

Next to your putter, your wedges are the most-used clubs in your golf bag. You use them for shots from the fairway, pitches and chips around the greens and to get out of green-side bunkers or other trouble you may find.

Having a wedge that has the right feel and puts the right amount of spin on the ball, which allows you to control those delicate shots, is a must for any golfer. And now that the USGA has banned manufacturers from making wedges or irons with square or box grooves, we are seeing a lot of different ideas on how to get the ball to still spin and keep you in control.

Nearly every manufacturer has taken to milling the faces of their wedges to give golfers the flattest and most consistent surface possible. They are also using those milling marks to add more spin to shots.

Nike's (www.nike.com) newest wedge is the VR Pro Forged. It features the

company's X3X technology. Nike has added more grooves, made them deeper and put them closer together on the face.

In addition to the new grooves, a precision laser crosshatch pattern is applied to the face between the grooves. This unique pattern adds three times the surface texture of conventional faces. The result is a wedge that spins the ball from any lie, in any condition.

Forged from S20C steel, the VR Pro wedges also provide excellent feel for shots around the green. There are 10 different lofts available, allowing golfers to find the right wedges to fill their set and game. I found the pair I tested to produce great spin and control. I even spun back a few shots from the fairway!

My friends at Tour Edge Exotics (www.exoticsgolf.com) came up with the Xtreme Spin wedge line to comply with the new USGA rules.

Exotics' milled wedges feature a 1025-milled carbon steel face that is a

mere 1.5mm thick and backed by a hollow core that is filled with a thermal plastic elastomer. Coupled with milled grooves and micro-edging on the face, Exotics has created a wedge that spins the ball equally well on full and partial shots.

Not stopping there, designers added to the uniqueness of these wedges by placing a removable weight screw, allowing golfers to adjust the swing weight of the club by changing the screw and dialing in the precise feel and performance they desire. The Xtreme wedge line comes in six lofts from 50 to 60 degrees.

In my testing I really liked being able to adjust the swing weight. I prefer a heavier wedge and was able to bump these up a bit. The insert also provided for a soft feel on touch shots.

All wedges come with what is called "bounce." This is the angle between the leading edge and the bottom of the sole. A wedge with high bounce prevents digging and works well from fluffy lies and sand. Low bounce insures performance from tight lies, such as you find in the fairway or closely mowed areas around the greens. The V-Sole wedge line

from Eidolon Golf (www.eidolongolf.com) is designed to give you the best of both. Depending on how you address the ball with the club, you bring one portion of the sole into play.

Another great feature is that Eidolon's wedge line features lofts from 47 to 61 degrees. Each wedge is cast from soft 8620 carbon steel and then CNC-milled for ultimate feel and precision. I can attest that the V-Sole works well. These wedges were very easy to hit from any lie.

The Niblick from Cleveland Golf (www.Clevelandgolf.com) is a truly unique club. The company calls it a "Short Iron Hybrid," a combination of a wedge sole, putter length, iron shape and hybrid stability.

With this club players are able to hit four different types of shots including chips, pitches, approaches and recoveries. The Niblick comes in three lofts: 42, 49 and 56 degrees.

I found it performed very well on tight lies around the greens and from off pine needles. It allows you to hit many shots with just one club.

If you want to lower your score, you need to hit the ball close to the hole. Today's technology will help you do just that.
