

Children's Hunger Project aims high

Upcoming food packing event being documented for Guinness Book of World Records

MELBOURNE — The Children's Hunger Project is off to set a new goal in its efforts to feed kids.

On Saturday, Feb. 8, Health First and United Way are joining the non-profit organization to

assemble more than 25,000 packages — \$100,000 worth of food — to feed hungry elementary school children throughout the county.

Deemed by the organization's founder, Bob Barnes, as the "World's Largest Food Packing Event," he admits he needs the community's help to make this vision a reality.

"I checked with Guinness, and they don't have a category yet for food-packing events, so we are documenting everything, according to their rules, and hope to get that cate-

gory established," Mr. Barnes said.

He encourages individuals and teams to volunteer just one hour of their time to make the event a success.

And, while Mr. Barnes would love to claim the Guinness title if a category is established, he said he would also gladly give it up to know that the idea of feeding children in need is taking hold in other countries.

"This idea is not copy-

College breaks ground on new building

MELBOURNE — When Dr. Jim Richey became president at Brevard Community College several years ago, he had big dreams for the college's future.

Now known as Eastern Florida State College, the college has extended its reach within the community, offering four-year bachelor's degrees to its students, in addition to its two-year and certificate programs.

In an effort to further EFSC's journey, Dr. Richey was joined by education and community leaders on Wednesday, Jan. 22 for the groundbreaking of a new Public Safety Institute on the college's Melbourne campus.

'Color the Causeway' to help cancer victims

MELBOURNE — Cancer has touched many residents along the Space Coast, igniting within each person a burning desire to help fight the widespread disease.

On Saturday, Feb. 1, ITG Realty will host its third annual "Coloring the Causeway for a Cure" Walk, in conjunction with the Melbourne Music Marathon weekend, at Front Street Park.

The cost to participate is \$10 for ages 12 and younger and \$25 for ages 13 and older.

Proceeds from the three-mile walk, which begins at 9:45 a.m., will benefit SCREW Cancer and the Cancer Care Centers Foundation.

"My wife Kelly and I started 'Coloring the Causeway for a Cure' three years ago," said Rusty Melle of ITG Realty. "Like many others, we have been touched by cancer."

Mr. Melle's mother was diagnosed with colon cancer; she lost her fight nearly five and a half years ago.

"We thought this would be a good way to honor her and her fight, while helping the local community in its fight," Mr. Melle said.

There will be an opportunity to register for the walk the day of the event, which Mr. Melle recommends arriving at about 9 a.m. to do. Following registration, participants will gather around Front Street Park before making the walk over the Melbourne Causeway and back.

rely on for our quality of life," said Leesa Souto, executive director for Marine Resources Council. "We lost more dolphins, manatees, sea birds and sports fish habitats in the Lagoon last year than we have in recorded history. The Lagoon is in crisis, and we all have a role to play in saving it."

Since July 2012, more than 100 manatees that live in the Indian River Lagoon have died, leading to multiple community efforts, including the opening of a research lab

Humane Society in need of volunteers for everyday tasks

BREVARD — If your New Year's Resolution was to volunteer your time and give back to those in need, the Central Brevard Humane Society has the perfect opportunity for you.

On Saturday, Feb. 1, the Central Brevard Humane Society will host a Shelter Volunteer Orientation from 9 to 10:30 a.m. for individuals, who care about the welfare of animals looking for their forever homes.

Pre-registration is required, and all volunteer applications must be complete prior to the start

of the Volunteer Orientation Program.

Those interested must be 16 or older to volunteer their time at the Central Brevard Humane Society.

"There are many opportunities available for volunteers at the shelter, our four Molly Mutt Thrift Shops in Melbourne, Merritt Island, Palm Bay and Rockledge, the 'low cost' spay and neuter and wellness clinic, the 'recently opened' Merritt Island Adoption Center or as a 'Society Ambassador' during community outreach and off-site events," said Eileen Cole, media relations manager.

All volunteer hours are

done on a schedule that best fits the individual.

"Volunteers donate their time to our organization when their schedules allow and are extremely flexible in the areas that we need assistance in," Ms. Cole added. "It may be with our special events, coming to the adoption centers to walk dogs, brushing or playing with the cats in our free-roaming cat rooms, washing food and water bowls, doing laundry or helping the thrift shops price and sort donated items for sale."

Ms. Cole said those interested in volunteering for the Central Brevard Humane Society can call or

email the volunteer coordinator to register for orientation.

The application for becoming a volunteer can be downloaded from www.CritterSavers.com or an individual can stop by the shelter in Cocoa, the Merritt Island Adoption Center or any of the four Molly Mutt Thrift Shops to pick up a copy. Volunteers must bring the application with them to the orientation session.

"The orientation session enables someone to have a stronger understanding about the Humane Society through the history of the organization, as well as learning that it is a 'no kill

for space' facility, that receives no support from tax dollars," Ms. Cole said. "It also gives them the opportunity to tour the whole facility and see how the animals are cared for."

One of the most difficult aspects about volunteering at the Central Brevard Humane Society is seeing all of the animals at the shelter and adoption center that are looking for new, forever homes, which can be quite overwhelming to volunteers at times.

"The most rewarding is when animals find caring and loving individuals or families to call their own or their friend for life," Ms. Cole said.

The Central Brevard Humane Society will host a Shelter Volunteer Orientation on Saturday, Feb. 1 from 9 to 10:30 a.m.

Pre-registration is required, and all volunteer applications must be completed prior to the start of the Volunteer Orientation Program.

Those interested in attending must wear pants and closed-toed shoes.

'Sneak Peek' allows audience to select favorite films of the year

BREVARD — Movie lovers are encouraged to choose their favorite film at a series of "sneak-peak" screenings this year.

On Saturday, Feb. 15, Brevard County filmmakers Ray and Migdalia Etheridge are presenting a one-hour-long screening of several short films, all submitted by Indie filmmakers from all over the world.

The audience will vote for their favorite films to help judges make programming decisions for the "15-Minutes of Fame" film festival in August.

"We are looking for people, who like to watch Indie films," Mr. Etheridge said. "If you like movies, you (will) like to be able to participate and vote for your favorite movie."

The screening will be the first of a series of "sneak-peak" screenings, scheduled until July.

The filmmakers said that

more than 40 films will be shown during the screenings, some short and some full-length, and will include dramas, documentaries, comedies, animations, music videos and foreign films.

Mrs. Etheridge said that, so far, the filmmakers have not received any films from Brevard County residents to screen.

"Some films are from Florida filmmakers, as well from all over the U.S. and around the world," she said. "We hope to show some films from Brevard filmmakers, but we haven't received any yet."

Since 2009, the "15 Minutes of Fame" film festival has had 10 film festivals.

This year's festival will take place at the International Palms Resort in Cocoa Beach on Aug. 30-31.

The husband-and-wife filmmakers began producing movies together as a hobby in 2005, with most of their films shot in and around their home.



Exhibit helps remember tragedy, find sense of hope

BREVARD — Brevard County residents are being asked to find the "Courage to Remember," as a national Holocaust exhibit comes to Cocoa Beach this February.

The Simon Wiesenthal Center's world-renowned "The Courage to Remember: The Holocaust 1933-1945" traveling exhibit will address the issue of anti-

Semitism, violence and discrimination by using education, said Ted Gover, executive director of Foundation for California.

"Today, Holocaust education is more important than it has been in many years," he said. "With the rise of hate crimes in our country and worldwide, it takes on new urgency. We must be forward-thinking, adapting the best techniques and means to educate all people about the lessons of the Holocaust. This exhibit helps to do just that."

"The Holocaust is not just a chapter in a history book about the past," he said. "Rather, these lessons are universal and relevant to

our own time, and they remind us of the imperative to speak out when groups are targeted because of their identity. This exhibit is instructive in how we must be vigilant and responsive to present-day dangers against people of all backgrounds in our society."

A ribbon cutting ceremony will commence on Monday, Feb. 10 at 5:30 p.m. at the Cocoa Beach Country Club.

In attendance at the ribbon cutting ceremony will be leaders from the Jewish community, as well as civic, educational, business, government and community figures.

A Holocaust survivor will

provide remarks, presenting an opportunity for those in attendance to learn more about the tragic moment in history.

The exhibit will be on display at the Cocoa Beach Country Club from Feb. 11-27, Monday through Friday, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"The Courage to Remember" is a historical exhibit of the Holocaust, created by the Simon Wiesenthal Center.

Since 1988, the exhibit has been viewed in dozens of countries across six continents, and it consists of 42 panels of photographs and text, giving a historical account of the Nazi's murderous campaign, in which

nearly 11 million people lost their lives.

With nearly 200 original photographs, in which, Mr. Gover said, many have never been seen by the general public, the exhibit provides a powerful insight into the Holocaust.

"Holocaust education is vital toward fostering an understanding among different communities," Mr. Gover said. "(This exhibit) is one such tool to this end,

According to the Social Security Administration, of the 142,570 beneficiaries in Brevard County, 98,735 are retired. If you utilize the average monthly benefit amount of \$1,275, that's \$15,300 each a year or \$3,810 above the federal poverty level of \$11,490 for an individual; and there are many retirees whose sole source of retirement income is just that – Social Security – but that is also a yearly economic impact of \$1,510,645,500 just from the 98K plus retirees.

So who is really sucking up the tax dollars, as I believe that most of those in the 60-plus bracket worked for 35-40 years; and they, or they and their employer, contributed to the system.

What is unfortunate is that it is not segregated funds and goes into the general fund and utilized for whatever.

Perhaps you should look at those who have contributed nothing and expect – and in some cases – get numerous benefits, without doing anything or manipulating the system through fraud and abuse.

Still, those in the 65-plus range (20-plus percent of the county population - SOURCE: Florida Legislature Sept. 2013) are contributing as reflected in the following from the census data:

Of a total of 198,371 households in the county, 23,363 are householders 65 years and older, which means they are contributing to the tax base via local tax assessments on their homes.

There are also, all inclusive, 90,955 households with individuals 65 years and older (SOURCE: Census).

Twenty-seven-plus percent of Brevard public sector employment was in hospitality and retail, according to the BLS in 2009. It is not a far leap to surmise that most retirees utilize those two sectors and indirectly contribute to the economy through utilization of those services and, hopefully, job creation.

To put another perspective on this "get rid of the retiree population, which is a drain;" in FY 2008, \$585.73 million was paid to military and civilian retirees.







While some of these we can not control - the ones we use each day we can do something about.







NASA commercial crew partner achieves milestone

Engineers and safety specialists from NASA and

Space Exploration Technologies (SpaceX) met recently to review the safety of the Dragon spacecraft and Falcon 9 rocket being developed to launch humans into low-Earth orbit later this decade.

The detailed overview of safety practices the company is implementing was a major milestone for SpaceX under a funded Space Act Agreement with NASA's Commercial Crew Program.

SpaceX is one of NASA's commercial partners working to develop a new generation of U.S. spacecraft and rockets capable of transporting humans to and from low-Earth orbit from American soil.

NASA intends to use new commercial systems to fly U.S. astronauts to and from the International Space Station within the next four years.

SpaceX already has flown several cargo missions to the space station using its Dragon spacecraft and Falcon 9 rocket, but those spacecraft have not yet transported astronauts. Through NASA's Commercial Crew Integrated Capability initiative, the company is deep into the design process of the integrated crew-capable Falcon 9 and Dragon spacecraft.

This safety review was the ninth milestone for SpaceX under the commercial crew agreement. The company is on track to complete all 15 of its milestones by the third quarter of 2014.

Statewide domestic violence initiative

The Brevard County Sheriff's Office participated in a statewide operation, organized by the Florida Sheriff's Association, targeting domestic violence with a focus of protecting children.

As a result of "Operation Safe Families," a 30-day effort, the Brevard County Sheriff's Office completed 100 arrests for charges relating to domestic violence.

Domestic violence related crimes included:

- Warrants for domestic violence
- Writs for non-support
- Violations of domestic violence injunctions

Statewide, 33 Sheriff's Offices participated in the operation, which resulted in a total of 2,581 arrests.

According to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement's 2012 Uniform Crime Report, 108,046 domestic violence offenses were reported to Florida law enforcement agencies, where 202 victims died as a result of the violence. This represents approximately 20 percent of all homicides in Florida.

The Florida Sheriffs Association Task Force is a combined effort of Florida Sheriffs, focusing on coordination of statewide mutual aid, subject matter experts and providing a point of contact for statewide initiatives.

The Task Force is committed to maintaining the

quality of life that Floridians have come to expect and have therefore committed to performing proactive operations each year to deter criminal activity.






