### **Shark biologist joins Florida Tech faculty**

BREVARD COUNTY – It's one of the most iconic images of the deep, a Hollywood film star, and the bane of lone surfers everywhere: It's the shark, and for shark biologist Dr. Toby Daly-Engel, it's also her passion.

Florida Institute of Technology recently welcomed Dr. Daly-Engel as a faculty member earlier this autumn. Dr. Daly-Engel will be both teaching courses on biology, as well as conducting research on sharks in the Indian River Lagoon and beyond.

"I was one of those little kids who was obsessed with sharks," Dr. Daly-Engel said. "Ever since I was a little girl, I have pictures that I drew of sharks, even from first grade. I'm [currently] really most interested in shark evolution and ecology.

"I've always been fascinated in the reproductive system, so how animals reproduce, and why and where has always been interesting to me, but many different aspects of their evolution and ecology can impact how they reproduce," Dr. Daly-Engel said. "The fact that so many different

shark populations and species are threatened means that a lot of what I do is concentrated on shark conservation."

With Dr. Daly-Engel working as a part of Florida Tech's faculty, she will now be available to provide presentations regarding a "variety of topics concerning sharks, including shark attacks: misconceptions and myths, why they happen, and how to prevent them; shark biology, [including] reproduction, mating habits, genetics and evolution; diversity of sharks in the wild, from hammerheads, great whites, lemon sharks and rarely observed deep-sea sharks; and shark conservation," according to Florida Tech officials.

real Liberty Bell, made in the original mold that was filled in London, England. We also have a lot of flags, and we used to talk about its origins and how the flag got to be.

"We had uniforms, and we apons, and a lot of local Florida stuff — it was a won"Part of why I study shark conservation is that so many shark populations are in trouble," Dr. Daly-Engel said. "It takes them 15 years to grow up to adulthood, and yet humans kill up to 100 million sharks per year — and those are just the ones we know of. So, unlike other bony fish, such as cod or mackerel, or anything else, if we fish out 100 million sharks, they're not just going to be there next year. Sharks just don't reproduce as quickly, and sharks are a lot more fragile than people realize.

"Sharks stress out incredibly easily," Dr. Daly-Engel explained. "We all know that stress can kill, but in the case of sharks, it's really true. Maybe because they're so well-adapted to their environment, [but] anytime they're disturbed, like if they're caught, they can accumulate stress hormones so quickly that even if you let them go and they swim away, the shark will very likely die anyway."

Dr. Daly-Engel said sharks, especially younger sharks, are naturally curious creatures, and as they grow older, a shark's timidity will overcome its curiosity, and it will be much less likely to bite out of inquisitiveness.



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

### Water department, meter readers not doing jobs well

I am writing about fake and defective water meters.

The area I live in is about 35 years old and the water meters are outdated and they are placed below the ground.

I am a professional engineer and contacted the mayor and utilities director to start replacing the meters and to be attached to the wall for easy scanning.

With greatest difficulty I got my meter replaced paying \$50.

The water department officials are very lethargic and the meter readers are not doing their jobs well.

It takes nearly 20 minutes to read each meter after removing the dirt and slime which gets accumulated.

In this scenario, Jeeter the meter reader can only read about 10 to 12 meters a day and he needs to remove nearly 3 cubic feet of dirt and put the dirt in his truck.

We are in 2017 and the meters are defective and outdated, giving erratic readings which will be not be fair for residents and the utilities department.

My bill is around \$200 a month, which is miserably excessive unless one will be in the shower for four hours. My water consumption last month was 16,000 gallons which physically is not possible as the industry standard stipulates 100 gallons per day per person with factor of safety built in.

It is about time that our elected and appointed personnel discuss the issue for a tangible resolution of not billing properly to the consumers.

Driving home from the awards ceremony, I reflected on the many wonderful organizations we have in Brevard County that serve people in need. Parrish Medical Center and 2-1-1 Brevard did a splendid job with the event - presentations and attendees were all supportive of programs that help people. Arriving home I checked the answering machine. News from our Information Specialist at Helping Seniors quickly brought me back to reality.

Helping Seniors had received a call

\$895 a month and taking care of a 31-year old disabled son. The son worked as a bagger to help out, but they were still living in a van, paying \$500 a month for medical insurance and \$400 a month for two storage units containing all their possessions. They were getting a mere \$15 a month in food stamps because they were making too much money - but living in their van.

The lady did not know where to start to try to solve her immediate problems.

MELBOURNE - Florida Institute of Technology will bestow 990 degrees during 2017 Fall Commencement ceremonies for undergraduate and graduate students on Saturday, Dec. 16, at the Charles and Ruth Clemente Center on the Florida Tech campus, 150 W. University Blvd.

A ceremony for graduates from the College of Engineering and Computing, the College of Science and the College of Aeronautics is at 9:30 a.m. A ceremony for all graduates from the Bisk College of Business and the College of Psychology and Liberal Arts is at 2 p.m.

Florida Institute of Technology President Dwayne McCay will offer opening remarks before two distinguished Florida Tech alumni present keynote addresses at the ceremonies.

The morning ceremony will feature 1985 College of Aeronautics graduate Huntley Lawrence, the director of aviation at the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey.

Elizabeth Lunny, who earned her bachelor's degree in humanities from the College of Psychology and Liberal Arts in 1993, will speak at the afternoon ceremony. She is the vice president of luxury and the publisher of *T Magazine* at *The New York Times.* Both Lawrence and Lunny are past recipients of Florida Tech's Outstanding Alumni awards.

McCay will also confer two honorary degrees at the morning ceremony. One degree will go to Marilyn Link, who has been a visionary presence on Florida Tech's Board of Trustees since 1984. The other is for Lawrence Mertens, Ph.D., formerly the chief scientist at RCA and a close associate of Jerome Keuper, Florida Tech's founder.

Students from 33 states and 52 countries will receive diplomas during the ceremonies. The morning ceremony will feature 344 students, while the afternoon session will have 370.

### Day of Giving raises more than \$143,000

MELBOURNE — More than 1,800 Florida Institute of Technology alumni from around the world donated to their alma mater for Florida Tech's third annual Day of Giving on Nov. 28.

Donors from 53 countries pledged more than \$143,000 during the 24-hour fundraising event, held in conjunction with the international effort known as Giving Tuesday. Introduced in the United States in 2012, Giving Tuesday, which follows Black Friday and Cyber Monday, is a day of international philanthropy benefiting non-profit organizations.

The leading recipient at Florida Tech was the Athletics Department, which had 821 donors and \$78,000 in gifts. Other recipients included the university's five colleges, the Panther Fund, Evans Library, WFIT FM-89.5, the Botanical Garden, University Museums and weVENTURE.

number of brackets from seven to three - 12 percent, 25 percent and 35 percent. This may hurt some of us if we were between 13 percent and 24 percent brackets inclusive as we will now go to the 25 percent bracket. There may be another bracket at 35 percent. However, since the income levels have not been determined, we cannot ascertain how we will be affected.

There will be an increase in standard deductions and child tax credit. Standard deductions will be doubled and child tax credit will be increased and a provision of \$500 tax credit for dependent care will be added.

BREVARD COUNTY – One of the most important aspects of living well is to have a strong foundation in education, so that challenges may be met with knowl-edge properly honed to meet the needs of each situation.

The Schools of Excellence Award is part of a statewide program that provides new opportunities for award-winning schools, such as greater flexibility in class size, school hours, and may also gain "in-service points" for continuing success.

The 25 awarded schools include elementary, middle and high schools, as well as combination schools.
