Credit card law aims to restrict unfair practices

Will take effect next year; meantime, companies raising rates

VOLUSIA COUNTY — When Johnnie George's daughter Shanya was born three years ago, the Daytona Beach resident wanted desperately to buy a house for his new family.

So he contacted the Central Florida Community Development Corporation, a non-profit organization that offers home buying assistance and credit counseling, because Mr. George, 34, knew he was going to have a problem purchasing a house.

Why? The same reason millions of American get into financial difficulties — credit card debt.

Mr. George said he had

made some credit card purchases that quickly escalated in cost because of high interest rates and exorbitant fees. He had trouble repaying the debt, which only added more fees and interest. It was a vicious cycle he could not get out of until he made that call to get help.

"For me, I wanted to invest in something; in a home," he said. "That's what motivated me. When I saw my (credit improve) it really was an accomplishment for me."

Now, Mr. George has nearly nonexistent debt thanks to hard work and extensive cutbacks in his life and spending.

But he is in a small minority of people who have been able to climb out from under the heap of variable interest rates and exorbitant fees of credit cards.

By the end of 2008, Americans had racked up

'Unspoiled gem' closed due to tight budgets, bickering

Museum, city having trouble coming to terms for Gamble Place's care

Editor's Note: This is the first of a two-part series on Gamble Place and the challenges faced in keeping it open.

PORT ORANGE — For Bob and Jill Williams, the old Gamble Place off Taylor Road has never felt more aptly named.

The couple is talking over their shoulders from the front of a golf cart one recent afternoon, as they often do to the dwindling number of visitors to their home-based Cracker Creek Canoeing. But as will happen these days, talk of history soon turns to worries about the present.

From 1999 up until 2007, the city of Port Orange and the Daytona Beach Museum of Arts and Sciences teamed up to preserve and protect this 175-acre slice of Old Florida along Spruce Creek. The Williams, who live a stone's throw from the site's historic buildings, came aboard in June 2006 to offer recreational services, eco-tours and a 24-hour-a-day presence for the city.

Now, with the museum and city bickering over money, that team has fallen apart, and the Williams are pretty much left on their own to care for Gamble Place. It is a task they cannot handle alone, and

the once bucolic park is currently closed.

What happened?

Heavy damage after a 2004 storm caused the museum, which owns Gamble Place, to focus its resources on its core facilities. The city pulled its support in early 2007 after a round of budget crunching. It stopped paying its \$50,000 annual rent to the museum. Two full-time caretakers were sent elsewhere. Eight miles of trail went largely unattended. The Williams hopped on the rider mower and kept it running as long as they could.

"Just as we started to get some momentum, things started falling apart," says Bob, as Jill steers around a flock of peacocks milling around the stage, pavilion and concession stand that the couple built for an Oktoberfest they can't afford to put on this year.

"We feel like we're out in the middle of nowhere with all this now." Ms. Williams said.

Mr. Williams points out all the other ways in which they've sunk "every last dollar" of his salary as Daytona State College's vice president of economic development: the year-old bathroom facility, the two tour boats resting unemployed

Chronic Pain and Depression

Most of us have experienced pain in our lifetimes, from a sore throat to a headache; from childbirth to aching joints. But when does pain become chronic?

According to Ataur Rahman, M.D. at Port Orange Family Medicine and Pain Management Center, chronic pain is that which a specific pain lasts more than three to six months.

"Pain is subjective. What might be just an annoying ache to some can be agonizing to others," the physician of 26 years explains. "When pain becomes chronic, your body may react to it in several ways, such as insomnia, mood disorders, and impaired mental and physical performance. Neurochemical changes in your body may increase your sensitivity to pain, and you may begin feel pain in areas that don't normally hurt. Dealing with these conditions for months can naturally need for

depression."

In a study done by the American Pain Foundation, about 32 million people in the U.S. report having pain lasting more than a year.

On average, 65% of depressed people complain of pain. People whose pain limits their independence are especially likely to get depressed.

Dr. Rahman's approach to Pain Management is different than many Pain Management Clinics: He treats the whole patient, not just the symptom. "Many of my patients come to me frustrated. They're being prescribed tremendous amounts of medication, but don't feel any better than they did when they were first diagnosed." He says that he studies and reviews a patient's records with them and then puts the chart aside and asks the patient, "What's going on in your life right now?"

"It never occurred to me that I was depressed," says

one patient (who asked to remain anonymous), "I just know that my back hurt so much that getting up in the morning was becoming impossible. The medications helped for a while, but after 5 years, even they didn't seem to work. I can't tell you how many doctors I've been to who have just told me I'd have to live with it. I've got kids--I have to be able to function." The patient smiles, "Dr. Rahman not only diagnosed my depression, but I don't have to take as much pain medicine as I was before. I can spend the time I want with my kids...and that's priceless."

\$927 billion in credit card debt, according to a study by the Nilson Report, a financial journal. Nearly \$20.5 billion of that debt will be made up of penalty fees, according to a *New York Times* article.

Those statistics and the longtime war cry from consumer protection groups for credit card regulation overhaul prompted the U.S. Congress to pass the Credit Card Accountability Responsibility and Disclosure Act of 2009, which was signed by President Barack Obama in May. While some provisions of the law went into effect in August, the majority will take effect in February, 2010.

The act, known as CARD, will regulate many aspects of how credit card companies treat the more than 170 million credit cardholders in the United States.

From the various junk mail solicitations guaranteeing "a low APR!" to when your payment is due, just about everything within the credit card industry will be affected.

"It's a fundamental rewrite of the model," said Peter Garuccio, spokesman with the American Bankers Association, which worked closely with legislators on the law.

Experts agree that the credit card industry will never be the same again.

Rates and fees

CARD makes changes to the way credit card companies operate, prohibiting them from raising rates without notice: they will have to give 45 days notice of any rate changes and promotional rates have to last at least six months.

The law also reduces or prohibits many of the overdraft or late fees the companies charge.

"It's a watershed bill," said Dave Jones, president of the Association of Independent

Consumer Credit Counseling Agencies, a national association that represents non-profit credit counseling companies. "This is the first time we were able to get legislation passed to protect consumers (from the practices) credit companies have used for years."

But, opponents of CARD argue that those practices are what keep the system going and changes will adversely affect millions of Americans.

"We will see a reduction in the access to credit," Mr. Garuccio of the American Bankers Association said. "The recession is the worst time to constrict credit. Credit cards serve as a lifeline to a degree (for many people)."

Mr. Garuccio said the credit card industry works based on risk, much like the insurance industry: those with a high risk pay more than those who are safer.

But, because credit companies won't be able to adjust rates to "high risk" users like they can currently, that means trouble for everyone, Mr. Garuccio said.


"We're changing customer risk (with this new law)," he said. "The net effect is that all of us pay a little more."

Josh Frank, a senior researcher at the North Carolina-based Center for Responsible Lending, disagreed.

"(The constriction of credit) was already taking place before the law," he said. "The law still lets them set (rates) where they want to. It just requires (them to be) more transparent and up front."

Marketing to young people

Another restriction included in the law is the solicitation by credit card companies to those under the age of 21. That means the days of credit card companies camped out on college campuses handing out free T-shirts may be gone.

According to a report by Sallie Mae, 18- to 24-year-olds carry more debt than ever before and as a group, are most likely to be the focus of manipulative and even predatory practices by credit card companies. They are also the most likely to not make payments.

Mr. Garuccio said anyone over 18 should have the right to have a credit card.

"People under 21 are adults," he said. "People over 18 can enter into contracts, get married, etc. but they can't get a credit card? The impetus (for this provision in the law) was the college student market. But, not everyone is a college student. You are cutting off credit for some people."

Mr. Frank said the new restrictions will help.

"There really was a problem," he said. "There really has been a trend with them (young people) getting into trouble because of the aggressive marketing."

A nation of debt

According to the Nilson Report study, the average outstanding credit card debt for households was \$10,679 at the end of 2008. That was a slight increase from the previous year when it was \$10,637, the

report found. Mr. Jones, with the national credit counseling association, said that indicates people are having a hard time keeping up because of the practices by credit card companies.

"It's still very difficult for people to make minimum payments," Mr. Jones said.

Changes to the industry combined with the reality check of a recession might be enough to help people get into the black rather than the red, he said.

"People are operating in a much more conservative mood," he said. "This serves to be instructional. People are not spending as much on unnecessary purchases."

Requirements in the new law address the fine print disclosures that come with new credit cards and in monthly statements. Card companies will now be required to outline a schedule illustrating the effects of paying the minimum monthly payment as well as listing the interest and fees paid year-to-date.

Both sides can agree that seeing that will spark some reaction from consumers.

"It makes everything user-friendly and easier to read," Mr. Garuccio said.

"Seeing those will make people reconsider. What could I do with that money?"

Mr. George was one of those people.

After going through credit counseling he got rid of all of his credit cards except

one.

Even though he's armed with the right knowledge now, Mr. George said it is easy to fall back into the trap.

"I pretty much stay away from credit cards now," he said. "It's still a job (to keep up with finances). I feel so much better, which is good right now with this economy."

Credit Card Accountability Responsibility and Disclosure Act of 2009

- Requires card companies to give 45 days notice of all interest rate increases or other changes (up from 15 days)

- In that same notice, company must inform the card holder of their right to cancel the card if they do not like the new terms and

allow the card holder to pay off the balance under the old terms (but company does have the right to raise the minimum payment due)

- Prohibits card companies from raising rates retroactively unless a cardholder is more than 60 days late, a promotional rate has expired or the rate is adjustable

- Promotional rates must last at least six months

- Cannot increase the APR during the first 12 months after a new account is opened

- Requires card companies to apply payments in excess of the minimum

payment first to the balance with the highest rate of interest

- Prohibits over-the-limit fees unless the cardholder consents to the over-the-limit transaction beforehand

- Double-cycle billing, in which card issuers use the previous month's balance to calculate interest charges for the current month, is prohibited

- Card companies cannot charge fees to pay bills by mail, phone or online

- Requires each statement to be mailed no later than 21 days before the due date

- Revises and expands

requirements for minimum payment disclosures the company must furnish

- Requires the payment due date to be the same each month (the next business day if that falls on a weekend or holiday).

- Limits the amount of credit for those under 21 who don't have a co-signor

- Restricts agreements between colleges or universities and credit card companies

- Prohibits expiration dates on gift cards as well as imposing fees for not using them

where they found all the dangerous materials needed for the making of methamphetamine and a lab actively churning it out. Investigators said the four-month investigation also led them to a home in the New Smyrna Beach area on Treadway Road where they found chemicals and equipment, but said the lab wasn't yet operating. By the end of the day, investigators arrested seven people connected to the two homes and charged them with various counts of possession, manufacturing and sale.

Car scam suspect arrested in South Florida

A man who Daytona Beach Shores police said pulled a car sales scam on several people, some of them elderly, was recently arrested in South Florida. Daryl Rivernider, 63, is accused of defrauding victims by selling cars that were previously wrecked or flooded. Police said Mr. Rivernider was living in a luxury condominium in the Shores and advertised like new cars with full bumper-to-bumper warranties in the newspaper. He told victims various versions of why he had to get rid of the cars and had what appeared to be all the proper paperwork for a sale, including Carfax documents. Police said the documents were fraudulent and said because the vehicles were salvaged, victims could not get clear titles in

Florida. The vehicles were also dangerous to drive, according to investigators and at least three people lost between \$10,000 and \$15,000 in the scam. Since WESH 2 first reported the story, others have come forward to say Mr. Rivernider defrauded them too. The suspect was found living in an upscale home in South Florida valued at nearly \$1 million.

Police look for robber

Port Orange police are looking for a man who robbed the USA Cash Today business on Ridgewood Avenue. The suspect wore what appeared to be a Halloween type mask and a hoodie when police said he pulled out a gun and robbed the victim. No one was hurt and the suspect got away with an undisclosed amount of cash.

Meth lab discovered near New Smyrna Beach

Sheriff's investigators said they uncovered another active meth lab days before on North Glencoe Road near New Smyrna Beach. They got an anonymous complaint that the home was a front for drug activity and when investigators knocked on the door early one morning, they noticed a strong chemical odor wafting from the house. Two men were arrested on drug charges there and investigators said they also found a car stolen out of Edgewater and arrested a third man who was

lingering near the property in that stolen vehicle.

Inmate found guilty of first-degree murder

It took a jury just two and a half hours to find a prison inmate guilty of pre-meditated first-degree murder in the death of corrections officer Donna Fitzgerald. Officer Fitzgerald was found beaten and repeatedly stabbed in a back room of the vocational training facility at Tomoka State Prison near Daytona Beach in June of 2008. Enoch Hall, 40, already serving two life sentences for kidnapping and rape, was arrested for the murder and confessed to the killing though his defense attorneys claimed the confession was coerced. Prosecutors said Hall, working in a welding area of the rehab center, lingered after other inmates left the building, then armed with a shank, hid in a closet and ambushed Officer Fitzgerald when she came looking for him. The state said Hall planned the murder, aware of the routine at closing time and aware that Officer Fitzgerald was on duty that night. Prosecutors said Hall intended to rape Officer Fitzgerald, who was found with her pants around her ankles, but something interfered and he killed her. Defense attorneys never denied Hall killed Officer Fitzgerald, but said the murder was a spur of the moment decision after Officer Fitzgerald startled Hall as he was trying to steal narcotics from a back

office. The jury did not buy the defense argument and found Hall guilty as charged in the indictment. The jury spent a week hearing grim testimony and looking at gruesome crime scene photographs and is now hearing the penalty portion of the trial. The defense is hoping to offer mitigating circumstances that will spare Hall's life, but the state is asking the jury to return with a death sentence as punishment. Officer Fitzgerald's loved ones sobbed in the courtroom as the guilty verdict was read and her sister told WESH 2 that death is the fitting punishment for a lifer who committed another crime.

Beach patrol officer fired for breaching morals clause

A long time Volusia County Beach Patrol Officer, arrested after investigators with the State Attorney's office said he repeatedly had sex with an underage girl, was fired for breaching the county's morals clause. Bobby Tameris, 44, is accused of having consensual sex with a then 16-year-old girl, dozens of times between September of 2007 and May of 2008. He allegedly videotaped the teenager without her consent at least once and exposed himself in an e-mail picture to the victim, while she was cooperating with the investigation. When Mr. Tameris was arrested, he was held on \$250,000 bond, but at a later hearing, Judge Joe Will dropped the bond to \$10,000, and Mr. Tameris is now out of jail.

Warner's Willis wears leadership well

SOUTH DAYTONA — Warner Christian Academy has been one of the area's steadiest football programs in recent years.

This year, the Eagles are off to a 6-1 start after defeating Calvary 42-6.

In a program where running backs like Breon Allen and Caleb King have ruled, this season it's sophomore quarterback Shelton Willis running the show.

Willis has thrown for 924 yards with 12 touchdowns and two interceptions. Last week he threw his first two interceptions but still finished with 261 passing yards and three touchdowns.

"He has come along," said Warner head coach Andy Price. "We did a lot of passing over the summer. This year we are using more spread. His reads are easy and he has executed well."

Willis said he is definitely more independent this season.

"Right now I know that I am in control," he said. "Every body trusts me and knows that I am the leader. Last year I just did what I

was told. Now I can call my own plays, audible and check off anytime."

His leadership is what sets him apart.

"No doubt about it he is a leader," coach Price said. "Some are born with it and others are not. He is the coach on the field."

Willis can run well but he prefers to pass.

"I like to stay in the pocket and throw," he said. I only run when the coverage breaks down."

Willis also excels in the classroom, maintaining a 3.0 GPA. His favorite subject is mathematics. He also stays out of trouble.

"It is tough being a student athlete but in a Christian school there isn't much trouble to get into," he said. "So I just hit the books."

The quarterback's father, Keith Willis, said he is glad his son is not the partying type.

"He is not really outgoing," Mr. Willis said. "He likes to stay at home. We have been blessed that he

stays away from the streets and into sports."

Willis has played football since he was five years old. He has always played quarterback.

"It was fun playing Pop Warner," he said. "I played with all my friends. I enjoyed waking up on Saturday mornings and playing."

Shelton's father was also a student athlete, playing



along a prehistoric-looking natural boat launch cluttered with canoes and kayaks, and their own broad yellow bungalow, which caretaker Rollie Johnson built just a year after his boss, James Gamble, died in 1932.

"If something happens now, that's bad for us," Ms. Williams said. "People who are now shut out of Gamble are coming and complaining to us. We just want everyone to come together in the best spirit of Gamble."

Right now, that spirit is sullied. Weeds become more pronounced, rope trail borders more damaged, as Ms. Williams steers off the couple's immaculately coiffed 50-acre property and onto "Egwanulti" ("by the water"), the tropical playground of hunter/fun-seeker/businessman James Gamble, a direct heir to the Procter & Gamble fortune.

A once-lush rock garden sprouts nothing but grass across from a full-sized replica of Snow White's cottage — built meticulously at the request of a Gamble friend and eventual in-law, Judge Al Nippert. This was a full two decades before another Gamble friend and cottage visitor, Walt Disney, started building his vacation mecca down the St. Johns. Not too long ago, it stayed booked as a cabin for the rich and silly.

From its porch today, you see a felled tree smashed across a boardwalk that leads to a boat dock crushed by the elements. Another boat dock nearby, just built by the city, is being pushed forcefully into the water by a palm tree that rests on one of its railings.

Nearby, Gamble's former home, as grand an example of Cracker architecture as they come, and the citrus-packing house next door, sit locked and un-illuminated.

"We've made notice of all this to the city," Ms. Williams said. "What more can we do? Finally, at the end of October, we made notice that we could no longer continue to do this and that Gamble needed to be closed."

It now is. And the swamp and forest is closing back in.

"(The city) keeps telling us they're working on a solution, but..." Mr. William's voice trails off. "After two-and-a-half years of them saying, 'We're working on it,' we had to let it go."

While the Gamble property is immune from any future development, the Williams own everything along its most pristine border behind the Snow White

cottage and they have the right to sell it. But that's not what they want to do.

"When we first met, we didn't have enough to buy lunch, and now we're working hard and are blessed," Mr. Williams said. "But everything we own is here. We've got 50 acres of waterfront property in Volusia County, and we're dedicated to this effort, as opposed to playing court to developers."


Mr. Williams said they love

what they do at Gamble Place.

"This has been a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for us to let people see what Florida used to be like," he said.

It's been that, he says, as well as a once-in-a-lifetime education on the fickle tide of Florida's future.

Q. List your priorities if elected.

Jack Sturno

A. I intend to be pro-active and avoid litigation whenever possible. Last year I proposed the charter amendment

which allows the rebuilding of buildings over 35 feet tall if they are damaged. This has been in the Town Charter since 1986 and affects two out of three people in Ponce Inlet. This was the "elephant in the room" that could have resulted in numerous lawsuits if we had a catastrophic event to one or more of the tall buildings in town. This amendment passed. I will continue to support our police, fire and

rescue services in order to keep our town and its citizens safe. Our response time is second to none.

Assist with the rewrite of the land use development code. Our Council must respect our council/manager form of government and abide by the town charter. This is not negotiable. Council must pay closer attention to citizens' questions and comments. Our citizens have something

important to say and they should be heard. Although the budget is done annually, I will monitor the budget monthly to further cut taxes and expenses. This will be done in concert with the Town Manager.

Tony Goudie

A. To honor the wishes of the citizens who elected me. To defend our Charter using

all legal means necessary. It isn't negotiable.

To defend our Comprehensive Plan against those who would try to re-word it so that citizens' rights are diminished.

reviews and fire inspections. This will save at least \$50,000 yearly. I also asked if most of the LUDC re-write could be done in house and was told yes. This will save between \$75,000 and \$100,000. I will continue to scrutinize our attorney fees. I recently obtained a \$5,000 credit by challenging some of our legal bills. I have also requested and now get a weekly statement from the attorney. Coincidentally, when this began, the bill went from \$32,000 to \$12,000 the following month.

Q. Where can budget cuts be made and not affect services?

Q. What is good or bad with current council?

Jack Sturno

This Council has worked diligently thru seven budget meetings to reduce the millage rate to \$4.03; this is a substantial reduction of about \$1,000,000. However, credit needs to be given to the acting town manager and the department heads. The initial budget presented to council was already cut by about \$900,000 when we received it, and I thanked them for that. This was a joint effort and no one person can take credit for this budget.

I don't wish to be negative, but I will not avoid the question. Some council members have hidden agendas and appear to misunderstand the Town Charter and Council/Manager form of government. Hence, the loss of our town manager was a great expense, termination of \$102,000 and legal fees of about \$40,000. More recently was the termination of two positions by Council against my advice and then a reversal one week later because the action was illegal. This was an embarrassment and extremely demoralizing to the Town's employees.

Mark O'Keefe of Volusia County EVAC also presented the rescuers with a Good Samaritan certificate of appreciation.







'Clipless' coupon organizing system easier to manage

Knowing the best ways to use coupons and match them to low-priced sales gives shoppers a huge advantage compared to paying full price at the grocery store. Stocking up when items are at very low prices is, of course, another factor in saving big on the items we buy often. So what's the third component to super-couponing success?

For me, it's organizing and using my coupons as efficiently as possible.

The newspaper may contain 40 or more coupons

each week. That's a lot of paper to potentially manage. And truthfully, I do not want to cut all of those coupons out and then keep track of lots of little, loose pieces of paper, sorting them by product type and category and watching expiration dates. That can quickly become a job in itself.

Instead, I've become a big fan of a "clipless" system for handling coupon inserts. It's called clipless because, well, it means you will clip less.

Instead of cutting each coupon out, I save the entire

insert each week. I store the inserts in an accordion file, which can be found in any store that carries office supplies. I place the current month's coupon inserts in the front pocket of the file and the previous month's in the next divider, and so on.

There are many weeks when I don't even flip

through the insert when it arrives. I simply stick it in the file so I know where it is. The important thing is to keep all of the inserts together in one place, so you have all of your coupons on hand when it's time to plan shopping trips.

Another nice thing about this method is that it ensures you keep all of your coupons, not just the ones that you think you'll use. It eliminates the "beginner mistake" of cutting just the coupons you think you'll use and then throwing the rest of the coupon insert away. Super couponers know that discarding "unnecessary" coupons means you'll also throw away coupons for items that will be free later.

Now, if frozen peas go on sale for \$1, you know that the \$1 coupon for the peas offered in last month's paper is still on hand, waiting for you to cut it out and go get some free veggies. Keeping all of the inserts intact and

storing them together is the first step in this process.

Then, when I am ready to plan this week's shopping trips, I turn to the Internet to help me determine which coupons to clip.

There are many coupon Web sites that will actually give a list of every item currently on sale in your area grocery store and match the coupons to the sales for you. Each of these sites operates on the understanding that you have saved all of your coupon inserts. The site tells you exactly which insert the coupon you need for a particular item appears in.

An example: A site may say "spreadable butter is on sale for \$1.69. Use the \$1.25 coupon from 11/16 SS and take it home for 44 cents."

The reference to "11/16 SS" tells an informed shopper exactly which coupon insert the coupon appears in. In this case, the Nov. 16 edition of the SmartSource coupon insert.

If you look at your coupon inserts, you'll notice that each one has a name at the top. These Web sites will tell you exactly which insert your coupon appears in by date and name. You then simply pull that insert from your file, clip just the coupon you need and replace the insert in the file for later use.

On my Web site, www.supercouponing.com, I've got a link on the home page called "getting started." This section of my site illustrates the method in more detail and contains links to many popular coupon Web sites that will help you plan shopping trips with ease.

With artificial bait it's all about quality, not quantity

Let's go back and spend a little more time discussing the proper use of artificial bait, for that is the subject of much of my correspondence.

It seems that a lot of folks have the desire to throw lures, but can never quite get the hang of it.

First off, you must be aware that by using artificials you will eliminate the bites of the less desirable fish. The quantity of your strikes will fall, but the quality will most definitely rise. The choice of baits is a very personal thing, so I will talk about the ones that work for me.

It is a good rule for beginners to stick with the tried and true types and brands. I am old fashioned and seldom use anything not invented by Isaac Walton. Okay, I will admit it. I'm so old I remember Absorbine Senior.

I digress. A good lure to have in any box is the Zara Spook. It has been around since Moses was a boy. The Spook is a surface plug that has a "walk the dog" action. With a little practice, you will be able to retrieve it in the zigzag motion that fish cannot resist.

There is probably no greater thrill in fishing than to pull a top water plug over a glassy surface and then have a big fish suddenly explode on it. This fun goes from huge billfish offshore to reds, trout, tarpon and snook in the inshore and finally to a popping bug on a pond.

There are many fine choices of top water plugs and most of the better companies make a wide variety. Those that have a plastic lip up front are meant to dive and retrieve under the surface.

A good lipped plug for someone just starting out is the broken back type. It is in either two or three pieces and is joined by rings that allow them to wiggle independently.

This closely resembles the action of a wounded minnow.

Rapala or Bomber are a couple of the many brands that make fine broken back lures. My own favorite plug brand is the Mirro Lure and the model I most use is the floating twitch bait.

It is so versatile, it can be fished slowly as a top water or rapidly as an underwater. Back in the '50s the inventor of the Mirro lure was a pioneer in negative buoyancy. The twitch bait dives without the aid of a plastic lip or any other visible apparatus. The lure retrieves on the surface until you give it a sharp tug and then it comes back to you a foot or so beneath the surface. Genius!

Anyone who reads the column regularly knows that I rely on my trusty jig, which happens to be a soft plastic chartreuse shrimp tail.

Once you have your artificials and are on the water it will take some practice before you learn to use them properly. Stick with it. I hope you catch a fish on the first cast, but if you don't here are a few tips that might make it happen. With either plug or jig you will need to make long casts. Stealth is a must when fishing shallow water and long casts will be a big aid since most fish see you long before you see them. When your lure hits the water allow it to sit there for a few seconds. After about a count of four give it a slight twitch and then stop it again. When a plug splashes down a nearby fish may be curious and come over for a look. While it sits there deciding if the thing is alive or not your slight movement may be just enough to entice a strike. Too much movement may scare your prey off, so fish slow. There will be times when speed will work, but slow is a good rule to follow.

Whenever it is possible, throw your lure into the current. Predatory fish always sit and look into the tidal flow for food to be washed down to them. If you throw your lure against the current, it may come up behind the fish and startle them. Sort of like playing catch with someone who throws the ball at your back. Well I can see that this subject is not going to fit into one column, so I will continue this next week...




