City to create foreclosure registry

PORT ORANGE — Hoping to protect property values, city leaders want to keep a list of properties that have been abandoned or are in foreclosure.

Staff is in the process of establishing a registry for abandoned real property, aimed at tracking the status of these properties to protect the residential and business districts in which they are located from "becom-

ing blighted through the lack of maintenance and security" of abandoned properties.

The registry's aim is to identify properties in foreclosure and hold the mortgage holders of foreclosed properties more accountable.

According to a staff report from building official Kerry Leuzinger, the presence of vacant and abandoned properties can lower property values and negatively influence neighborhood and community aesthetics.

Many of these properties, staff said,

"are the responsibility of out-of-state lenders and trustees who fail to adequately secure and maintain such properties."

Port Orange has about 54 properties in foreclosure, with another 216 in pre-foreclosure, according to the report. Pre-foreclosure is when a notice of default is recorded with

2011: It was a bumpy ride in many area cities

The year that was included a number of ups and downs for Port Orange, South Daytona, Ponce Inlet and Daytona Beach Shores.

Among scandals revealing violations of the public trust and divisiveness over controversial local issues, there were some bright spots with some new additions to the community, such as a weekend farmers market and a

veterans memorial.

Here is a sampling of some of these four cities' top stories in 2011.

Issues, resignations dominate Ponce Inlet politics

Hot button issues in the Town of Ponce Inlet proved too hot for some council members.

2010 ended with Mayor Tony Goudie stepping down, soon followed by the resigna-

tions of Councilwoman Barbara Davis in January and Mr. Goudie's successor, Kris Derr, in May.

The resignations coincided with strong division among city leaders, residents and business owners over changes to the town's noise ordinance, mainly involving a section allowing police to determine at their discretion if a noise violation has occurred.

Owners of local restaura-

2011 all about the money in Volusia

VOLUSIA COUNTY — Most of the stories out of Volusia County government in 2011 revolved around money, more specifically, the lack thereof.

Raised up

The last time Volusia County employees got a pay raise was 2008. In November, the Volusia County Council voted to give most a 3.5 percent pay hike. Council member Joie Alexander, New Smyrna Beach, was alone in voting against the raise.

"The main reason is

simply because many I know in the private sector have had to cut employees or cut hours," she said. "That thought of a raise was laughable to many in the private sector. We'd be tone deaf if we weren't hearing that from the private sector."

In December, the county adopted a local-hiring preference ordinance for vendors and contractors that are local or use local labor. In this case, local was defined as Volusia, Brevard, Lake, Orange, Osceola, Flagler and Seminole counties. Businesses located in those areas get up to a 5-percent preference on bids for county against the raise.

Officials: 2012 should be 'somewhat' better

VOLUSIA COUNTY — Four years after the economy took a nose dive, terms such as "economic downturn," "long recession" and "jobless recovery" have become cliché. Whatever it's called, it started with the bursting of the U.S. housing bubble, which many economists say peaked in December 2007. The effects have dogged the local, national and world economies ever since.

But good news seems to be emerging. According to the U.S. Labor Department, initial claims for unemployment insurance dropped to about 364,000 the week ending Dec. 17. That's the lowest number for initial claims since April

2008. Florida has, or is poised to, break and stay below 10 percent unemployment, the lowest levels in about two and a half years. That's a two point drop in unemployment from the previous year.

All good news for Volusia? Are jobs coming to town?

Rick Fraser, president of the local Center for Business Excellence, said the local economy is likely to keep improving throughout 2012 — maybe.

"I'm getting increasingly optimistic that 2012 will show us continued improvement in not only employment but the economy in general," he said. "I continue to see good trends. (Unemployment) remained stable or

IS IT GAMBLING?

Supporters of Internet cafés say they are nothing more than fun places to spend an evening playing games, while opponents call them gambling houses and are intent on banning them from the state

DAYTONA BEACH — On a recent quiet Saturday evening, Charlotte Odegaard is manning the register at her U Lucky Dog Internet café on North Atlantic Avenue and playing a game of Angry Birds on her iPad.

In the small strip mall space that could house a diner or consignment shop, two long rows of computer terminals flash silently, each displaying the colorful graphics of different games of chance. One elderly customer is silently playing keno, known to aficionados as "the other poker." A sunset view of the beach glows dimly through the open front door.

"This is a relaxing place to meet friends," Ms. Odegaard said. "I don't have any problems with the city and they haven't had any problems with me."

But not everyone likes the plethora of Internet cafés springing up lately. What Ms. Odegaard refers to as a "relaxing place to meet friends," many others refer to as thinly veiled gam-

bling houses intent on skirting the state's anti-gambling laws and bringing in lucrative returns for café owners from the pockets of their usually working class or retired customers.

The state and many area cities seem intent on getting rid of them.

Dueling bills in the Florida legislature would either ban or require strict state regulation of businesses like Ms. Odegaard's. Daytona Beach, Port Orange, South Daytona and many other cities have passed moratoriums on new permits for the cafés. Other cities, like Ponce Inlet and Daytona Beach Shores, wasted no time in banning the storefronts outright.

Ms. Odegaard's not going to fret just yet, though.

"They change their minds more than I change my underwear," she said of lawmakers. "Until I see something passed, I'm not getting worried."

Gambling or 'relaxation'?



jobs. Fighting Against Injustice Towards Harmony, an organization of local churches and other faith organizations, proposed and backed the local-hiring ordinance. While the organization was happy the ordinance passed, some were exasperated that it'd taken years.

"Old ideas are new again," said Joyce Pearce-Riddel co-chair of the organization's jobs committee, before the council passed the ordinance. "This is what we proposed to the council three years ago: regional preference through the (Center for Business Excellence). We were told, 'Can't do that—can't require people to register with the CBE.'"

Dial 911 to get Volusia County

This year the county consolidated emergency dispatch services into its care. Since the 1990s, Volusia County has rolled around the idea of handling all emergency calls,

but some cities had resisted. As cities faced increasing budget pressures, those that hadn't already let the county handle their 911 calls seemed happy to make the shift. The move added about \$8 million to the county budget, but was estimated to save cities about \$7 million, according to local media estimates.

In recent years, the non-profit Emergency Medical Foundation, better known as EVAC, had been in triage. In October, the county took over the ambulance service. In the 2010-2011 fiscal year, EVAC received about \$1.5 million from the county. Its budget was just over \$17 million. The projected budget for this fiscal year was about the same. However, EVAC needed a \$4 million subsidy from the county. County manager Jim Dinneen projected that the county could run ambulances for less, because it has social-services options the service didn't. "I'm going to try to reduce the services of EVAC where other services better fit what (callers) need," Mr. Dinneen told the council. "We need to cut down on people calling us frivolously, as a taxi service. We're talking about having a social services part of this."

Divvy it up

Reapportionment didn't go smooth this decade. In a break with tradition, the Volusia County School Board and The county council split ways over redistricting. Normally the two adopt the same political maps. Then, the county went past its Sept. 15 deadline for approving a decennial reapportionment plan. DeBary residents, upset over their town being divided between county council districts, filed suit. The suit was later dismissed and the new maps have been approved.

Schools still struggle



The Volusia County Schools look a little different this year. Student enrollment had been decreasing since the 2007-2008 school year. That decline likely stabilized this school year, and the remaining students are dressed a little more conservatively.

According to the district's annual 20-day count, Volusia has just more than 61,630 students among its 69 schools, about 50 fewer than last year. However, the district anticipated having about 500 fewer students than last school year. In May 2007, just over 64,000 students attended Volusia's public schools.

Under a new dress code, those 61,630 students can wear nothing on the head while on campus, except with administrator permission for medical, religious, or school-activity reasons. That includes hats, visors, hoods, bandanas, and sunglasses.

Shirts must overlap belt lines, and those that hang to mid-thigh must be tucked in. Tops must cover the chest shoulder to shoulder. Shorts, skirts and dresses must cover to at least mid-thigh. Pants and shorts must completely cover undergarments and the buttocks. Cleats, slippers and shoes with wheels are banned.

Additionally, under the policy, banned are clothing, jewelry and accessories that convey "messages that are: crude, vulgar/profane, violent/death-oriented, gang related, sexually suggestive, promote alcohol, drugs or tobacco, or pro-



If fireworks are part of your New Year's celebration plans, here are some tips for staying safe:

- Take precautions: Always keep a hose and a bucket of water nearby in case of emergencies
- Light one at a time: Never light two or more fireworks or sparklers at the same time
- Keep it outside: Only use

fireworks and sparklers outdoors on flat, hard surfaces in clear areas and away from houses, buildings and dry grass

- Have adult supervision: Never allow young children to light or handle fireworks or sparklers. Be aware of the minimum permitted age in your state. Adults should always be present when lighting or handling fireworks or sparklers

- Stay alert: Never mix alcohol or other substances with fireworks or sparklers

- Stay clear: Never hold a lit firework in your hand. Keep as far from them as possible when lighting

- Let sleeping fireworks lie: Never try to relight fireworks or sparklers that do not ignite. Wait 15 to 20 minutes before approaching them, then soak them with water and throw them away

- Protect your pets: Animals are often frightened by the sounds of fireworks. Protect your "best friends" by keeping them indoors,

secure and away from the loud, sudden noises

Most importantly, check local and state legislation to identify which products are legal and only purchase those permitted by law. Also, always check the label and instructions on fireworks and sparklers to ensure they come from a reliable, legal and licensed source.

mote illegal activities or products."

In January, the Volusia County School Board will evaluate compliance and results of the new policy.

"It's pretty much been stated in open meetings that if we don't see compliance, we can change it, up

to and including uniforms," said school board member Stan Schmidt. "That's sort of the ultimate. It's now up to the students where we go with this. You can express your individuality. You're just not going to show your butt, or whatever."

Additionally, students at Volusia's schools are now under a new policy aimed at preventing dating violence on campuses. The school board adopted the state-mandated policy despite misgivings among its members. Before the policy's adoption, new school board co-chair Judy Conte said that the district already had policies against bullying, intimidation and violence. Now, she said, school administrators will have to do something

many teenagers struggle with, figuring out what their romantic status is.

"Define dating," Ms. Conte said in an interview.

"It puts principals in a position of having to define if Suzy and Tommy are dating or just hang out."

Volusia County, which says the lender intends to pursue foreclosure if the mortgage is not brought up to date.

Mortgage holders must file a registration of abandoned property form with the City, with the information going into the registry. They must also pay an annual registration fee of \$150.

When a foreclosed property is on the city's registry, Mr. Leuzinger said, the mortgage holder must maintain the property to comply with city codes. Failing to do so will result in code enforcement action, he added.

"... Our code enforcement officers will be able to monitor those properties for any code violations," he said. "(The registry) will also inform the police department of those properties so that they can be aware of any vandalism or occupation by transients or other unauthorized individuals."

Information about each property in foreclosure that must be disclosed on the form includes the property's address and parcel identification number, whether the property is occupied or abandoned, and contact information for mortgage holders and their property maintenance contractors.

Having the contact information in the registry enables staff to quickly respond to any property maintenance

issues that arise in order to effectively answer citizens' concerns and protect property values, Mr. Leuzinger said.

He also said most of the information in the registry would be public record and accessed through standard public records requests with the City Clerk's office.

Port Orange is not the first city to use a foreclosure registry program to track foreclosures and abandoned properties. Similar programs exist in Daytona Beach, Ormond Beach and New Smyrna Beach, according to city staff.

Councilman Don Burnette said the foreclosure registry was "something he pushed for" as a way to protect the quality of the neighborhoods in which the blighted properties are located.

"Some of them (the buildings) create real eyesores in neighborhoods where we don't need them," he said.

Vice-Mayor Dennis Kennedy said the foreclosure registry is "a work in progress" and several items still need to be worked out among councilors, who will review the registry next month.

He believes it would keep city staff more up to speed on the status of properties going through the foreclosure process.

"The hope is, of course, to keep our code enforcement folks a little more aware of where (properties in foreclosure) are so they don't fall too far into disrepair," he said.

cafés, got their start in the early 1990s, with the advent of the Internet. Back then, most people did not have a home computer and the cafés offered a way for people to browse the Internet and check e-mail and also have a cup of coffee or a meal (hence "café" in the name). Now, because most people have home computers, simply browsing the Internet is no longer the lure, according to opponents.

"It is the simulated gambling that brings people in the door," South Daytona Community Development Director John Dillard said.

The city recently placed a moratorium on new cafés.

The businesses, now also known as Internet sweepstakes cafés or convenience casinos, still sell Internet time, typically through the purchase of phone cards. But that purchase doesn't just get customers Internet time, it earns them credits toward Vegas-like computerized sweepstakes games.

Customers pay for their time, sit down at an assigned terminal and either surf the Internet or seek cash prizes by playing a game — from poker and slots to roulette and blackjack.

What makes it legal, supporters say, is the games are just a fun way to find out what predetermined sweepstakes amount the customers have won — they don't actually win money because of their great poker hand. There is a predetermined number of winning entries paid out over a finite period.

State Rep. Scott Plakon, R-Longwood, sponsored a House bill that would ban the cafés.

"The café owners say it's not really gambling because the outcome is predetermined, but tell that to the person in the seat," Mr.

Plakon said. "They believe they're gambling. Slot machines are known as the most destructive form of gambling. I call it the crack of gambling."

Ms. Odegaard disagrees. She has worked at U Lucky Dog for three years. She and her husband bought the place in September 2010.

"I don't see any negativity with this," she said. "It's a safe, fun place to hang out and make friends. It's no different than people playing scratch-offs or looking under the cap of a 7-Up can to see if you win something. Some people justify a ban by saying we prey on people, but we don't force anybody to come in here."

She replies to the question of whether it's gambling or not with a joke.

"We don't use the 'G' word here," she said.

But her customers do.

At one of a few center terminals, Ina LaPointe of Daytona Beach is catching up on some computerized Keno. Normally, she goes to another storefront closer to her house, but she uses this one on days she has to drop off her granddaughter at work nearby.

"I like to gamble," she said. "I enjoy it. I work. I pay my bills. So this is my fun."

They could do it online at home, says a 61-year-old woman sitting near Ms. LaPointe, who didn't want to share her name. But, "you can't meet anybody sitting at home on the computer," she said. "And it's cheaper than a shrink."

What harm?

When many of the local cities discuss banning Internet cafés, they talk about the "element" they bring with them and how they will be detrimental to the neighborhoods they open in. In a zoning dispute last May, Port Orange Vice-Mayor Dennis Kennedy said he would like to keep them out of the city altogether.

"... Frankly, I think the

better areas for these aren't in Port Orange," he said.

The city is currently being sued by Allied Veterans of the World, a company that owns several Internet cafés throughout the state, for what a spokesperson calls "discrimination." The lawsuit, one of several Allied Veterans is involved in throughout the state, is pending.

Though Police Chief Mike Chitwood has publicly stated his desire to keep Internet cafés on a tighter leash, police investigator Jimmy Flint said last week that "we have not had any problems at those Internet cafés. I even talked to the chief, who would know specifically if these places were a problem, and he said, 'No.'"

That's not to say they haven't been a problem for other law enforcement agencies. South Daytona and Port Orange officials say the Internet cafes in their cities have more than the normal number of police reports filed from their locations.

Many of the state's county sheriff's have asked legislators for a statewide ban, citing the large pots of cash that accumulate in the businesses during an average day. Recently, a three-man armed robbery at one Apopka café ended in one death.

According to a statement from the Seminole County

Sheriff's Department, crime increased 14 percent after nine of the businesses sprouted up in that county.

And while law enforcement dislikes the immediate harm of increased crime, gambling support groups say Internet cafés cause indirect harm to those who patronize them.

Brian Kongsvik, the director of the 1-888-ADMIT-IT helpline for the Florida Council on Compulsive Gambling, said more than 1,000 Internet cafés have sprung up around the state in the last half-dozen years.

Two years ago, when the organization started tracking them, 68 callers to the help line cited Internet cafés as their primary addiction. Last year, it was 122. The number is on pace to be higher this year, he said.

"We know there is a significant population that's affected by these establishments," Mr. Kongsvik said. "And it's our opinion, not the state's or anybody else's, that they may very well be attracting a population of people that would not necessarily drive to a destination casino to gamble, but now, they're right there on their street."

In defense of the establishments, gaming lobbyists and owners regularly compare the cafés to playing the

Holly Hill commissioner to run for county council seat

HOLLY HILL — City commissioner Donnie Moore says he's throwing in for the District 4 County Council seat. He announced his decision at a recent Holly Hill City Commission meeting.

"I'm positive I'm running," he said in an interview. "I don't foresee anyone stepping up that'll cause me to change my mind."

Mr. Moore said that he's picked up needed paperwork from the Supervisor of Elections office, but won't file it until January. Voters elected him to the District 3 Holly Hill City Commission seat last year. That was the first time he was elected to office.

"I think the main reason (to run for the county council) is that in the short year I've been in office in Holly Hill there are a lot of issues I don't have any control over because of county ordinances. In short, I feel I can do a lot more for Holly Hill from a county seat."

Carl Persis is vacating the District 4 county council seat to run for County Chair. Frank Bruno, who's now the County Chair, is running for the State Senate. So far, four candidates have filed papers with the elections office to run for the county council seat. They are Thomas Blawn, Jennifer Hammack, Damien Richards, and Jay Young.

Mr. Moore has generated some political interest for advocating the elimination of property taxes. He favors Volusia County instituting special-event taxes to replace property taxes. He was also largely credited for Holly Hill department heads, city manager, city commissioners and the mayor forming and discussing a list of ideas for reducing the city budget. Many of Mr. Moore's ideas for cutting the city budget involve expanded use of renewable energy, particularly solar. He's worked in fire and medical emergency services for 17 years.

Additionally, Mr. Moore said he'd like to find ways for the county to do more

for veterans, especially veterans with disabilities, and reduce homelessness.

"We need to look at that," he said. "How are the homeless costing us money, and can we do better?"

He also believes the county should do more to help homebuilders.

"Another way we can make Volusia County prosperous is to streamline all of our building permits," he said. "We need to be more building friendly. We need to streamline the procedure of getting building permits."

The election will be held on Nov. 6, 2012.

Monopoly game at McDonald's. Mr. Kongsvik finds this to be misguided.

"Never, in my 22 years of dealing with problem and compulsive gamblers, has anybody called us and told me that they're losing their house, have lost their job, are getting a divorce or are in financial dire straits because of the Monopoly game at McDonald's," he said.

Future restrictions

State Rep. Plakon said banning the businesses outright as opposed to regulating them is the right thing to do.

"To merely regulate these businesses would create thousands of gambling establishments around the state," Mr. Plakon said. "Wouldn't that be the largest single expansion of gambling in the state?"

The bills are still in committee review and Mr. Plakon said it is uncertain whether they will make it to the floor

for a vote in the upcoming legislative session.

Several owners of Internet cafés in the Daytona area refused to comment for this story. Managers running storefronts for the Allied Veterans of the World referred calls to the company's St. Augustine headquarters where a receptionist referred questions to Jacksonville attorney Kelly Mathis.

rants that regularly feature live music were concerned of "subjective enforcement" of the law if police enforce noise regulations based on their own judgment.

The noise ordinance wasn't the only local issue that generated headlines this year.

Councilors also decided against settling with Pacetta, LLC for \$13.7 million to avoid trial after the development firm sued over a charter amendment limiting what they could do with a large piece of riverfront property. Also, after years of discussions, councilors approved changes to the town's sign regulations.

Family of missing woman still hopeful

The family of missing woman Laurel Rogers continues hoping one day she will return home.

Laurel's mother, Lauretta Rogers, held a candlelight vigil in January, 2011 to mark the one-year anniversary of her daughter's disappearance, hoping it would lead to someone providing her with information leading to Laurel, who was 28 when she disappeared from her home on Feb. 1, 2010.

Earlier in the year, the discovery of a woman's remains in Ormond Beach investigators thought belonged to Laurel, as well as a tip from Crimestoppers leading investigators to search three retention ponds outside an abandoned church, left Ms. Rogers "horrified," thinking Laurel would be found dead.

But she remains hopeful her daughter is still alive. "I can't think negative thoughts, or I'll fall apart," Ms. Rogers said in a May interview.

Another candlelight vigil will be held this January to mark tow years without Laurel.

Pavilion adds market, new tenants

Port Orange's open-air shopping center, the Pavilion at Port Orange, got a little bigger in 2011.

The Pavilion marked its first year in business with the premiere of the Green Market, a gourmet farmers market offering organic and locally grown produce, fresh seafood and artisan breads on March 19.

Originally scheduled for a 12-weekend run between the months of March and June, the Green Market was successful enough for it to be held every weekend. The market is held Saturday mornings from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m.

Also new to the Pavilion this year: restaurants Asian SauceBox, 27 Fathoms and Texas Roadhouse, craft beer establishment House For Beer, and a Florida Hospital Memorial Medical Center walk-in clinic.

Former mayor, magistrate go to prison for bribery

South Daytona was rocked by a corruption scandal involving two former officials.

Former mayor and councilman Ron Clifton and former special magistrate Jerome Mitchell, both 42, pleaded guilty to bribery in June and were sentenced to two and three years in prison, respectively, in September.

In June 2010, each man accepted \$5,000 in cash bribes to assist a "purported investors' representative" in reducing \$241,000 in city liens on the River Club Condominiums, a local condominium complex.

Additionally, Mr. Clifton

accepted \$2,500 after agreeing to speak with county officials about \$500,000 in county liens, and lied about the bribes when first questioned by the FBI in October, 2010.

Documents from the U.S. Attorney's Office showed Mr. Mitchell was disbarred in July 2009 for mishandling \$25 million in escrow funds, but was allowed to continue serving as magistrate because he had an active license to practice law in Pennsylvania.

Hoping to prevent a similar incident from occurring, city leaders changed the qualifications to become a special magistrate in South Daytona, forbidding anyone who's been disbarred or convicted of a felony or crime involving personal gain from serving.

"If you get disbarred, you're gone," City Manager Joseph Yarbrough said in July.

Ralph Schoenherr won a special election in March to replace Mr. Clifton in City Council Seat 4.

South Daytona moves forward with power acquisition

This year brought forth a power struggle in South Daytona.

The City Council approved purchasing Florida Power and Light's assets for a city-run electric utility in July, despite vocal opposition from some citizens and demands to put the issue to a public referendum.

In circuit court, the value of FPL's assets was determined to be \$15.5 million. Additionally, the court and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission denied FPL's claims to additional costs from potential losses in profits, which FPL refers to as "stranded costs."

Opponents feared their electric rates would go up, citing statistics from FPL saying the company offers lower rates than municipally owned utilities.

"We're not opposed to change," Bill Titcomb, a city resident opposed to the city takeover, said in July. "What we're afraid of is we're not going to afford to live here."

But citizens who favor the transition said the City

would match FPL's rates and provide better service, also believing city leaders are looking out for them while FPL is looking to make a profit.

"South Daytona is a number to FPL," Amy Yelverton, a citizen who favors city-run electric, told councilors.

The power struggle will continue into the new year, as an FPL-initiated petition drive seeks to get a charter amendment on the ballot requiring a referendum on city-run electric before South Daytona can move forward with establishing its own utility.

Shores councilman resigns amid scandal

Councilors in Daytona Beach Shores called on Hank Smith, 54, to step down from office after city staff determined he authored a letter accusing two city employees of impropriety at the city-owned Oceans Racquet and Recreation Club.

Mr. Smith, who began serving on the City Council in 2007, announced his resignation at 10:32 a.m. on Aug. 22. Had he decided not to resign by noon that day, he would have faced formal charges from the City over the matter.

The letter accused his sister-in-law Kim Smith and his former boss Michael Schmidt of having an intimate encounter in the men's locker room at the Racquet Club.

In a phone interview, Kim Smith said it's possible she was targeted in the letter because of a property dispute Mr. Smith had with his brother, Eric Smith, who is also her husband.

Recently, Mr. Smith was arrested for passing counterfeit money at a local liquor store. The charges have since been dropped.

Port Orange may acquire Gamble Place in land swap

The former winter retreat of industrialist James N. Gamble of Proctor and Gamble — currently owned by the Daytona Beach Museum of Arts and Sciences — may be turned over to Port Orange.

That possibility emerged as a result of initial discussions in August regarding a multi-level land swap involving several parties, including the Museum, Daytona Beach and Volusia County.

Talks hinted at Port Orange receiving ownership of Gamble Place, which includes 175 acres of preserve land and three historical buildings, by exchanging environmental mitigation credits to the Museum, which would be used to resolve issues with a conservation easement on a parcel on Nova Road the Museum wants for an administrative center.

On Dec. 22, Port Orange City Manager Ken Parker sent a memo to councilors saying museum staff is willing to discuss a land swap with the City "subject to certain terms, conditions and restrictions."

The next step is for the City Council to decide whether Port Orange should move forward with land swap negotiations with museum staff. That vote is expected in January 2012.

Ponce Inlet police chief dies

The seaside community of Ponce Inlet mourned the loss of its police chief, Wayne Lurcock, who died Sept. 26 after suffering a heart attack.

Chief Lurcock, 60, had three decades of law enforcement experience, beginning as a member of the Daytona Beach Police Department, where he served for 22 years.

He moved on to Ponce Inlet's police department in 1999, serving 11 years as sec-

ond-in-command and was promoted to chief in 2010.

"It is hard to describe the contribution Chief Lurcock has made in 12 years with the police department," Town Manager Jeanene Claus said following the chief's death. "His loss is felt through a small community like Ponce Inlet."

New vision for Riverwalk

Port Orange scaled back its vision for Riverwalk, hoping to bring several proposed concepts from a local developer to reality.

In October, local developer Buddy LaCour proposed a floating restaurant on a riverboat and a Walgreens drive-through pharmacy at the intersection of Dunlawton Avenue and U.S. 1 as possible ideas for the 35-acre mixed-use riverfront town center.

Since establishing the ini-

tial vision of Riverwalk as a master planned development, officials spent 13 years discussing possible concepts — none of which were developed, with the economy playing a large role in recent failures.

With city leaders now believing the project would be best developed incrementally, they are considering Mr. LaCour's concepts, as well as a possible land swap in which the City would give Mr. LaCour 11 parcels at Dunlawton Avenue and U.S. 1 in exchange for six riverfront parcels.

The Town Center CRA Board will meet Jan. 10 to discuss a new request for proposals and the development of a park on property the City owns.

dropped over the last several months. I see reports about improved retail sales and consumer confidence."

"I don't have a crystal ball," Mr. Fraser added. "If there's another world event out of our control that causes the economy to sputter, my predictions are out the window."

Taking out the trash in Port Orange

This year Port Orange kicked their garbage hauler of 10 years to the curb.

Since November, city residents have seen Waste Pro handle their trash pickup. Councilors signed on with Waste Pro following an abrupt end to negotiations with Veolia Environmental

Services for a five-year solid waste contract.

Veolia's bid anticipated its fleet of vehicles would be powered with compressed natural gas and a fueling station for natural gas would be built on the company's existing site in South Daytona. But city staff asked Veolia to build that site within Port Orange city limits.

An inability to agree on a suitable site location resulted in Veolia's attorney withdrawing the contract signed for councilors' consideration, replaced with a revised contract stating Veolia could not guarantee the fueling site would be built in Port Orange.

Councilors unanimously approved a 45-day "emergency" contract with Waste Pro to ensure residents would see trash pickup.

Ultimately, Waste Pro was awarded the City's five-year solid waste contract at the City Council's Dec. 13 meeting, with no debate or discussion from councilors and citizens.



A big old snook took me and the peanut on a wild ride

I took my kayak down to Sleepy Hollow Park, which lies between Port Orange and New Smyrna Beach. If you go looking for it, watch the east side of U.S. 1 just south of the three bridges of Spruce Creek.

When I slid the Green Peanut in, the water was slick

with the wind mercifully calm. The tide was just at the end of its incoming phase.

My goal was to replay the spot where I had so much fun on my very first trip in the Peanut a little over a year ago. On that outing, I had gotten into the big reds. I could only hope for the same success.

As I pushed back through the mangroves, I could see bait moving all about. That's always a good sign; the big fish always follow the bait.

As I began moving tighter and tighter into the brush, I could see fish feeding hard. Right where a big oyster bar connected to the mangroves

on the shore, a very large predator exploded on a school of finger mullet. The little silver fish shot into the air in every direction, mimicking a New Year's Eve skyrocket.

Oh man! That sent my blood pumping. Throwing my red and white Mirro Lure, I made a pretty good cast, but I had guessed wrong. I had thrown the plug about 15 feet from where the explosion had occurred thinking the fish had moved in that direction.

Nothing.

On my next cast, the bait splashed down right where the action had first happened. I didn't even have time to give it a twitch. The plug disappeared and the line sizzled off at a right angle to the cast.

My foe made a long run. A very long run. Snook! Not just any snook but a big one. It's times like this when I anguish over my stubborn persistence of fishing 10 pound mono without a leader.

The big fish was pulling hard and sharp. Oysters were everywhere. When it turned out to deeper water and away

from the shells, I felt better but still wondered if the damage to the sheer line had already been done. Just then the big female tried to jump but was so fat she could only get about halfway out of the water.

Now I was having fun.

Back and forth the snook raced trying desperately to throw the treble hooks. As snook will do, when the fight was finally over, she lay up quietly alongside the kayak as I used my grippers to hold her head.

I was at least 100 feet from where I had made the hookup. I ran the tape measure down her length and found that the fish was 30 inches and more if you were to pinch the tail. I released her without boating her for both of our safety. Those sharp gill plates can do a lot of damage.

As I watched her swim away, I tried to remember the

last big snook I caught. It was certainly before the cold winter of 2009. Now with the sun beginning to peak up, I could see fish feeding all around. I made about a dozen more casts before another snook took the bait. This time it was a 20-inch and much more manageable. I had a few more hits but caught no more. By 8 a.m. they stopped biting and feeding altogether.

Boy, it was a long time since I had such snook fun. I took it as a good sign for our fishing future.

Snook season is closed right now, but let's release them all anyway and give them a chance to recover. Here in Volusia County, we are on their northern range, and it will take a few good, warm winters in a row for us to get them back. If that happens, there will be fun times ahead for all.
