Area One-Stop Career Centers are seeing fewer visitors

Fewer folks are darkening the doors at local One-Stop Employment centers.

At the Volusia County Council's last regular meeting, Aug. 23, Rick Fraser, president of the Center for Business Excellence of Volusia/Flagler, said an improving employment market has fewer job hunters heading to the centers. The CBE runs the One-Stop centers in Volusia and Flagler counties.

"The number of people going to the One-Stops has steadily decreased, and that's a good thing," he told the council.

The CBE gets funding from the state and federal governments, but

the county oversees its budget and operations. During the meeting, the county council approved its requested 2012-2013 budget, \$10,726,000.

Mr. Fraser told the council that in the first quarter of the 2011-12 fiscal year — July to September last year — about 20,320 visitors went to the three One-Stop centers in Daytona Beach, Orange City and Palm Coast. In the last quarter — April to June this year — that dropped to about 8,500 visitors.

Those visitors were using a number of services, from attending classes to sending faxes. A single person can be counted as a "visitor" multiple times.

The drop in visitors continues a trend in recent years. According to

the CBE's 2011 annual report, which covered July 2010 to June 2011, about 31,300 unemployed people sought services at the local One-Stop Employment centers. However, slightly more than 45,600 unemployed people sought job-hunting help the previous fiscal year.

In an interview, Lou Paris, communications manager, said at the beginning of the 2011-2012 fiscal year, Volusia's unemployment rate was 11 percent. By the end of the fiscal year, it dropped to 9.1 percent. Mr. Paris said while dropping unemployment rates have meant

fewer folks needed services at One-Stop centers, there are other reasons.

One reason, he said, is greater use of Internet technology that lets people use One-Stop services without having to go to them. For example, some of the One-Stop classes have become webinars, too. This

Disc golf helps locals lose weight with low injury risk

you're throwing the Frisbee disc you used to throw on the beach as a kid," Mr. Junior said.

Participating in disc golf worked to tone every muscle in Mr. Junior's body except for his quadriceps, which he tones by jogging. Not only is it an effective toning exercise, but also it provides a good workout with a very low risk of injury, he said.

"I've seen people out there with leg and arm injuries (playing disc golf)," he said. "They use it to get their mobility back."

After reaping the health benefits of playing disc golf, he's aiming to expand participation of the sport in the area so others can experience the positive results he achieved.

He plans to form a disc golf club for adults ages 45 and up with practice at Pickwick Village in Port Orange, where Mr. Junior resides, and competitive play at Reed Canal Park.

"What we've got so far is a signup sheet going

around," he said.

Mr. Junior said he is working on having two metal baskets installed on the lawn in front of the clubhouse in Pickwick Village to show people how to play disc golf before they play competitively. A secretary who answered the phone at the Pickwick Village park office said the baskets have not been installed yet.

For now, Mr. Junior plays the sport recreationally at

Reed Canal Park's mile-long course, where he plays with a group of people every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday morning. Reed Canal is not the only hotspot for disc golfers in Volusia County; Tuscawilla Park in Daytona Beach is also well known for its disc golf course.

Mr. Junior isn't the only one who's experienced the benefits of playing disc golf firsthand.

On a recent afternoon at


Reed Canal Park, a small group of friends said disc golf has aided in their weight loss and they value the camaraderie the sport provides.

Among them was Joseph Ledden of New Smyrna Beach, who plays on the course with his wife Kat. Mr. Ledden said people of all ages enjoy the sport, regardless of their ability or skill level. He said he's

Mike Bowen was visiting a friend when his next business idea struck him.

"A friend's roof was leaking, and it collapsed — right on my head," he said.

However bad Mr. Bowen's headache was, his friend's was worse. He had to find three roofers to give him repair estimates.

"An insurance company will tell you they need three bids," he said.

Mr. Bowen figured there had to be a website that made it easier to get those

three bids, one at which folks and property managers needing work done could post jobs for contractors and service providers to bid on. He couldn't find one. In July last year, he started working to be the first.

B3B, best3bids.com, is one of 11 businesses enrolled at the University of Central Florida Business Incubator, 601 Innovation Way, at the Daytona Beach International Airport. Mr. Bowen was accepted into the program last December.

Former Port Orange chief aimed for best fire services

PORT ORANGE — Mike Ertz began and ended his career as the city's fire chief with one goal in his mind — to provide the best fire service for the residents he served.

Chief Ertz, credited with expanding the department's staff and services in his 20 years at the helm of the city's fire and rescue department, died Aug. 20 at his home after a long battle with colon and bone cancer.

The 61-year-old first took the lead in 1983, when the city only had two fire stations. In his time as fire chief, he modernized the community's fire services by building and staffing three more fire stations and implementing new programs within the department.

The chief's colleagues remembered him as "visionary."

"Mike was an extremely strong advocate for the citizens of Port Orange," Ken Burgman, deputy director of fire services, said of the late fire chief. "He always fought for what was right for the citizens, even if it


wasn't accepted in the mainstream."

Mr. Burgman said Chief Ertz expanded the city's paramedic program to an advanced life support service model, initiated a public safety education program, and successfully advocated for residential sprinkler systems within the city.

He also helped Port Orange's fire department become one of the first in the state to institute a flu shot program and utilize trucks with computerized reporting systems for dispatch and mapping information.

In addition, the late chief was an early advocate of consolidation within fire departments. He was instrumental in joining the cities of Port Orange, New Smyrna Beach and Edgewater together for a uni-



lets some class attendees stay at home, so they're not counted as visiting the center.

"There is a course we offer called Next Step to Success," Mr. Paris said. "Think of it as a gateway to all we offer. We created the online version, and that has 1,800 unique visitors, 1,812 actually."

He said there's anecdotal evidence that job hunters are again finding other means to seek employment rather than visiting the One-Stop centers, too.

"You don't come through our doors unless you have no other options," he said. "Your initial reaction (to unemployment) is to handle the situation on your own."

The CBE is joining the Business Advocacy and Self-Employment Consortium's Startup Quest. Florida-Works, the workforce investment board in Alachua and Bradford counties, started the regional program with a \$12 million grant from the U.S. Department of Labor. Startup Quest provides entrepreneurial training, technical assistance and business mentoring to unemployed degreed pro-

fessionals who've opted to start businesses.

John Wanamaker, board chair of the CBE, said many details of the new program are being developed, but the aim is straightforward.

"They're helping people who would like to start their own businesses," Mr. Wanamaker said. "They've got the talent, but have always worked for someone else."

The CBE is one of 24 workforce investment boards that operate under the new Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, which replaced the Agency for Workforce Innovation last year.

fied dispatch service known as the Regional Communications Center, which operated until Volusia County took over dispatch services last year.

"Mike was a big proponent of municipalities working together," Mr. Burgman said. "(RCC) was a functional consolidation through sharing resources."

Chief Ertz retired in 2003. City Manager Ken Parker described Chief Ertz as an "exceptional leader." What stood out to him most about the chief was his passion for fire service.

"Mike was always looking for opportunities to provide services for our residents and to the public in general," he said.

The city manager said Chief Ertz's death marks "a great loss to our community."

"He was a trusted friend and a good advisor," Mr. Parker said.

The chief's brother-in-law, David Cobert, Lt. Col. (ret.), U.S. Marine Corps, also spoke kindly of his service. To him, Chief Ertz served with "the same pride, honor and devotion to duty as anyone who has worn a military uniform."

"... We as citizens are grateful to you and your fellow firefighters who protect our communities and our homes and earn the title as fellow comrades in arms," Mr. Cobert said in a tribute to the chief.

Chief Ertz, a native of Reading, Pa., began his career as a volunteer firefighter in Central Square, N.Y. in 1968. He moved to Virginia in 1973 and became

a paid firefighter with Prince William County, rising up to the rank of captain.

He left Prince William County in 1981 and became an instructor with the Florida Fire College in Ocala. He achieved his dream job of fire chief when Port Orange hired him in 1983.

Chief Ertz also served as president of both the Volusia County Fire Chiefs Association and the Florida Fire Chiefs Association. He taught firefighting and fire management classes at Daytona State College.

He enjoyed playing golf and spending time with his family.

Chief Ertz is survived by his wife Kathy, his children Michael, Melissa, Matthew and Kristin, and four grandchildren.

A memorial service in his honor was held Aug. 24 at Lohman Funeral Home in Port Orange.



Things are fine until the ladies of the town catch on to what their men folk are up to and put a stop to it.



When Barbara complains to Andy that she does not know why she now has no business his response is classic. "Well see," he begins "Mother Nature has been real good to you. Reeeeal good. In fact, I can't remember when Mother Nature spent so much time in one place." No one could top Andy for country logic.

Young Sarah Carden is a middle school teacher over in Polk County.

Each year in her history class she plays them the episode where Andy's pal Barney Fife (Don Knotts) tries to recite the preamble to the Constitution from memory. Barney assures Andy that he remembers it from high school and Andy wants to hear it. Barney then needs Andy's prompting for the first word and every word after that. All the while he is pulling his hair and making all sorts of faces. When Andy finally gets to the end, Barney straightens up and says, "See once I learn it I never forget." The children in Miss Carden's class don't know Andy or Barney but each year they find it hilarious. Can you think of a better way to get them to remember the preamble?

All of us football fans, and quite a few more, will miss you Andy.

Meals on Wheels needs more drivers

VOLUSIA COUNTY — Every morning at the Port Orange Adult Center, volunteer delivery drivers with the Council on Aging of Volusia County's Meals on Wheels program wait anxiously to deliver a fresh batch of hot lunches for elderly people who need them.

As he watched a volunteer seal up the meals in plastic wrap and place them in red meal carriers containing a routing number, John Humiston said he became a Meals on Wheels driver because he felt it was necessary for him to donate his time to help seniors in need.

"You've got so many people who are shut in," he said. "They're using a cane or a walker and are too old to drive. If it weren't for us, they wouldn't be able to eat nutritionally and maintain good health."

Meals on Wheels staff said their existing volunteer base is not enough to meet the needs of the large number of seniors throughout the county who depend on the delivery drivers for their food.

"We always need drivers on all of our sites," said Charly Poniatowski, Meals on Wheels nutrition pro-

gram manager. "We need them desperately in a few of our locations."


Both the east and west sides of the county are in need, but Daytona Beach and Holly Hill are seeing the greatest shortage of delivery drivers, Ms. Poniatowski said. She attributed the need in these areas to the size of both communities; Daytona Beach "covers a lot of ground" due to its large size, while the small size of Holly Hill makes it difficult to find volunteers because most drivers choose to serve the communities they live in.

Another reason new drivers are needed, Ms. Poniatowski said, is because many existing drivers are also aging. She said the median age of Meals on Wheels drivers in the county is between 60 and 70.

The task of transporting the meals from place to place is vital to providing seniors with an essential source of nutrition, she said.

"These are seniors who can't get out, the frailest of the frail, who don't have family members to help them and desperately need our services," Ms. Poniatowski said.

Through its Meals on Wheels program, volunteers deliver 700 meals every day

to seniors living in private residences and apartment buildings throughout the county on about 80 to 90 individual routes. Ms. Poniatowski said Meals on Wheels has over 600 volunteers, with eight to 10 driving each route.

It usually takes about 20 minutes to prepare 60 to 70 meals at the Port Orange site, she said.

The council operates the program out of eight different senior centers throughout the county, where they

also serve lunches on site for seniors who are able to leave the house. Besides the Port Orange Adult Center, Meals on Wheels also operates out of the Windsor Apartments in Daytona Beach, the Brandon Center in New Smyrna Beach, the Lexington Club at Hunter's Creek in DeLand, and the Sunshine Senior Center in Deltona.

Meals on Wheels, Ms. Poniatowski said, is more than just providing seniors

Geekspeak : 4K TV, Quad HD next

Remember when you shopped for your first HDTV and how you struggled to understand those confusing new terms like 720p, 1080i, 1080p and Full HD?

Well, get ready to get confused again.

Now that most of us have finally made the transition to HD, the companies that make the TVs are about to unleash yet another new variation that promises to be better and, you guessed it, more expensive.

Say hello to 4K, or Quad HD, or 4X 1080p -- or maybe another name altogether. That hasn't been fully sorted out yet. What seems certain, however, is the HDTVs of the future will have at least four times the resolution of the one you watch today.

I know what you are thinking. Why do I need more resolution when current generation 1080p sets -- currently the highest resolution TVs available in the US -- already are razor-sharp?

It's a valid question and may not have a good answer in the short term, unless you are big into 3D.

That process reduces the effective resolution on some of today's 3D sets because two sets of images must be produced at virtually the same time (for each eye) and each uses part of the set's resolution. Since the new TVs have four times the resolution, they can, in

theory at least, deliver full HD in to each eye.

Some manufacturers, including Toshiba, also are using the new ultra-resolution HDTVs (my term, not theirs) to deliver 3D content without any glasses at all, which sounds good, if it actually works.

Early reviews from Europe, where the one Toshiba quad HD set is already available, are not exactly glowing. Those who have seen the sets in person complain of fuzzy backgrounds in 3D mode and problems keeping the picture in focus if the viewer moves more than a few inches. Not what you expect from a \$10,000 TV.

One would hope they would improve over time.

If you believe the hype, 4K and/or quad HD sets will go sale in the U.S. before Christmas, but take that with a grain of salt. We have heard similar promises for several years now and so far, none have materialized.

The good news for consumers is there won't be a pressing need to buy one of these super-expensive sets in the near future -- except having bragging rights. There is no native 4K content yet except in the movie theaters, many of which

already use 4K projectors. So you will gain little by buying a 4K set.

It's a little like the early days of 1080p HD sets, also known generically as "full HD." Standard HDTV broadcasts fall short of that mark -- then and now, all programming is either 720p or 1080i. So the only native 1080p content was coming from the very early Blu-ray and (now obsolete) HD-DVD players, which almost no one had. Higher resolution HDTVs will upconvert content that was produced at a lower resolution, but it's done through some electronic trickery so the resulting image is not as sharp as native 1080p content.

Even when 4K content does become widely available and affordable, there may not be much reason to upgrade because the improvement in resolution will likely be unnoticeable on all but largest HDTVs. Again, think of the difference between today's 720p and 1080p sets. It's often hard to tell the difference on screens smaller than 50 inches.

Of course, I am writing this in an era when few homes have sets bigger than 60 inches. You may have noticed ever-larger sets making their way into your friendly neighborhood electronics store, at ever-lower prices. Sets with diagonal measurements of 70 and 80 inches are commonplace now in the big box stores. Some

even have the mammoth new 90-inch sets that Sharp began selling in June. (Only \$11,000!) A 100-inch model can't be far behind. (Larger ones have already been produced, but not for the broad home market.)

When lots more folks have one of these giant screen TVs in their homes, perhaps 4K will make more sense. That may seem crazy given the stratospheric prices, but recall the first 50-inch plasma HDTVs once cost somewhere around \$10,000 and now sell for as little as \$500.

Be aware that moving this new 4K format will eventually involve replacing more than your TV. You will probably need a new 4K or Quad HD-capable Blu-ray player too (as it was with the introduction of 3D) and probably a new audio receiver if you use one in your home theater setup.

As for regular broadcast and cable TV, don't expect any native 4K content anytime soon. Changing TV standards can take decades, given the bureaucracy and costs involved. And since 4K won't bring that much to the party in terms of improved picture quality, there won't likely be much of a demand for it in the near future.

Seeing is believing for consumers

In the psychology of the economy, consumer confidence reigns supreme.

But it's not just what's in your wallet that affects your confidence; it's also what you see. When you see a lot of vacant stores and other buildings, you can't help but wonder about the security of your financial situation. So empty buildings getting used again is like a salve to your sore eyes.

It's difficult to get a full handle on the number of empty buildings going back into use compared to newly empty buildings, but it appears there has been some improvement, especially at some heavily traveled intersections.

A good example is the vacant convenience store/gas station as Madeline Avenue and Nova Road in Port Orange. Southeast Petro of Cocoa bought the property for \$700,000 and a spokesman said it will reopen as a BP in a few weeks. Just 12 years old, when a property that new sits empty for awhile, it really makes you wonder about the state of the economy.

But even better, although it hasn't sat vacant long, the old Walmart at New Smyrna Beach Regional Shopping Center is getting redeveloped. GC Development of Mount Dora has bought the property for \$3.875 million and plans to redevelop it into a four-unit center. There are already plans for

Big Lots and Bealls stores there. Haven't quite gotten it cleared up yet whether Bealls plans to move its department store there from Third Avenue, move its Bealls Outlet store there from elsewhere in the shopping center or it's a new store. I should be able to update that by next week.

There also are small improvements, such as Charming Charlie going into International Speedway Square in the spot left vacant when Old Navy downsized two years ago.

there are enough new jobs getting created to put a big dent in unemployment, but it was good to see AO Precision and Playtex Manufacturing (Hawaiian Tropic) posting a large number of manufacturing job openings. For prospective moonlighters, Macy's has already begun hiring for the holidays.

The dollar stores continue to hit the news with Dollar General planning to add a store to north Deltona. It already had started the permitting process for one in west Deltona. Also, the Dollar General property in DeLeon Springs recently sold for \$1.24 million. Not to be forgotten, Family Dollar Stores is planning a location in DeBary.

Already putting together a new plan for its property across West International Speedway Boulevard from Daytona International Speedway, International Speedway Corp. is now seeking rezoning for the area around the Speedway. ISC wants a mixed-used zoning so it could develop the land for hotels, restaurants or other businesses. It's probably safe to say that ISC would love to have the option of building a casino next to the track like the one it now has in Kansas City, Kan. Of course, it would require state government approval for any expansion of gambling.

It still doesn't seem like

Next up for The Pavilion at Port Orange probably will be a Firestone auto care center directly on Williamson Boulevard. It's between the entrance that goes to Marshalls and the other stores in the big strip, and the entrance to US Foodservice. Another car care place, Boulevard Tire at Bellevue Avenue and Nova Road in Daytona Beach is expanding.

On the restaurant beat, Maria Bonita's in Ormond Beach has finally opened. It took awhile, but with so much anticipation, it will be packed with patrons for awhile. Just across the railroad tracks from there,

construction is starting on a Jimmy John's Gourmet Sandwiches. The center where Red Lobster is located in Daytona Beach Shores has been redeveloped, and now the Denny's has reopened and the center has a Dairy Queen.

New Church Family, a Christian congregation, has bought the headquarters of the Volusia Building Industry Association for \$287,500. The church is moving there from a storefront at 815 Beville Road, South Daytona, and will have its first service there Sunday, Sept. 2. Chris Butera of NAI Realvest represented the seller and Sue Turnbull of Swann and Associates represented the church in the transaction.

An Apopka investor has bought several commercial and multi-family properties at Browning Avenue and Boynton Boulevard in Daytona Beach Shores for \$1.95 million.

A Winter Park manufactured homes seller has bought a big chunk of land at West State Road 44 and Glencoe Road in New Smyrna Beach, paying \$1.5 million.

on their own.


She comes to the Adult Center three days a week, and the friendships she made are why she enjoys being there.

Stetson football aids enrollment

More undergraduates are heading to Stetson University than ever. It could be the new pet-friendly apartments the school has. Maybe it's the expanded honors program that allows many students to craft specialty degrees. Maybe it's the two new women's sports.

Or maybe, just maybe, it's football. Oh, yeah, football.

Starting in 2013, the Hatters will be hitting the gridiron after a 57 year football fast.

The school has its sights set on having 3,000 undergraduate students by 2016, and it seems to be closing in on that goal with about 2,400 this fall. Bob Stewart, director of admissions, said about 950 undergrads are starting their first year at Stetson this month, 850 freshmen and 100 transfer students. That tops last year's record-setting 850 new undergrads, about 715 freshmen and around 135 transfers.

"We're doing a really great job of telling our story, and we're telling it everywhere," he said.

That whole football thing is the big part of the story Stetson is telling these days.

"I think it's great for the

school," James Dreggors said. "I heard enrollment is up, and I think football has a lot to do with that."

Mr. Dreggors was a guard on Stetson's last football team, 1956. The 79-year-old aims to be at Stetson's inaugural game in the Pioneer

Football League. He said Spec Martin Stadium, 260 E. Euclid Ave., will probably become his second home during college football season.

Ricky Hazel, Stetson's assistant director of athletics for communications, said 120 students are signed up for the non-scholarship football program.

"Football is not the only sport we added either," he said. "We're adding women's lacrosse and last year we added women's sand volleyball."

The 2013 sand volleyball roster has 17 names, up from 15 for the 2012 spring season.

Mr. Hazel said women's lacrosse, which will start in 2013, has attracted 30 students. He said all the new sports add vibrancy to the campus that attracts students and others.

"The primary thing about Stetson bringing back football is to reconnect with their alumni and reconnect with the community," Mr. Hazel said. "Football is a real community builder. There's nothing else like college football. There's nothing in the world that feels like college football."

Stetson isn't the only Volusia County university attracting more students

than ever. Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University's Daytona Campus is getting more crowded, too. From 2002 to 2011, the school went from about 4,500 students to nearly 5,000. The undergrad count went from about 1,150 to around 1,310 in those 10 years.

The school started its Women Ambassador Program last year. It's trying to increase its female student count to 25 percent. From 2011 to 2012, the number of new female students at the Daytona campus climbed from 169 to 203.

Most of the school's 2012 enrollment numbers weren't completed by press time.

According to Mr. Stewart, Stetson's growth spurt goes against a recent trend among small, liberal arts colleges and universities. Most, he said, are seeing enrollment stagnation, or declines.

"Our number of students who've shown an interest in Stetson has actually decreased," he said. "We're doing a better job of talking to the students who are showing an interest."

Enrollment numbers for Volusia County's other four-year college, Bethune-Cookman University, also were not available.

DELAND—Michelle Lazar is going up and down stairs at the University of Indiana these days thanks to Cricket. That might not seem like a big deal, but it is to a college student who can't climb stairs without help.

"She's a balance-and-brace dog," Ms. Lazar, 20, said. "She helps me up and down stairs and walking through campus."

Ms. Lazar has brain injuries that started at age 6. Recent surgery left her with hemiparesis, a profound weakness on her left side. My Angel With Paws, a DeLand non-profit organization that trains and gives away service and therapy dogs, united Cricket and Ms. Lazar. The service animal came with an unexpected bonus — easier socialization.

"Everybody loves her," she said. "People don't even notice the brace on my leg anymore. Now they say, 'Oh, I love dogs,' instead of 'Oh, what happened to your leg?'"

Chris Tejcek, founder and director, said My Angel With Paws, 3098 Marsh Road, started in January 2009 and has given away 18 service and therapy dogs. Three went to veterans with service-related injuries — one with a spinal-cord injury, and two with traumatic brain injuries. The majority of the dogs are in Florida — nine have stayed in Volusia County.

"We're committed to our clients and very committed

to our dogs," Ms. Tejcek said. "We want to make sure both are safe and happy."

The non-profit organization has 38 puppies that are in, or will go on to, different kinds of training. Some will be retrievers that can help paraplegics and others pick up items, turn on lights, open doors and other functions. Others will be response dogs — animals that detect when people with conditions such as post-traumatic stress disorder are getting overwhelmed, and give them assistance.

Karen Grimes, 59, recently received Chance from My Angel with Paws. Ms. Grimes is a wheelchair user due to myotonic muscular dystrophy. She lives near Lake Mary. Ms. Grimes said Chance is a service animal that helps her with daily tasks, such as taking off pants, but has turned out to be a therapy dog, too.

"I'm a little agoraphobic," she said. "Chance makes it possible for me to feel safe going outside. So, I take myself places. Before I had a service dog, I wasn't able to do that."

Ms. Tejcek said about 100 volunteers help My Angel With Paws at different levels. The organization has found some individual donors, and gets help from the Port Orange Fraternal Order of Eagles, #4089. In April the organization hosted the Doggie Dinner, which included an auction.

"The dogs will take the items to the person who bid, and take the payment to the cashier," Ms. Tejcek said.

About 30 people are wait-

ing for service and therapy animals from My Angel With Paws. Ms. Lazar and Ms. Grimes said they contacted other service-animal organizations and found that some charged as much as \$15,000 for service animals.

ber. He was no stranger to making businesses work. In addition to being in the construction business for about three decades he owns a bait and tackle store. Like other entrepreneurs seeking the incubator's help, he had to make several presentations to show he had the right stuff to make a go of the new business.

"I was called a serial entrepreneur at my last meeting, which I thought was funny," he said.

The 47-year-old "serial entrepreneur" said he sought the incubator's help despite frequent business successes because he was trying something very different and potentially much bigger than before.

"You can't do something out of the house and go nationwide in four years," he said. "I realized best3bids.com is bigger than me . . . that's why I came to the incubator."

The UCF Business Incubator opened in July last year, and was the ninth the university started since 1999. Another opened since

then.

"The business incubator is a place to start a company," Doris "Connie" Bernal, site manager, said in a previous interview. "The entrants have a lot of resources to work with here. They have professionals who help them with a number of areas."

Businesses pay anywhere from \$270 to \$1,000 a month to have office space at the incubator's facility. Most are paying \$270 to \$350. While that's inexpensive rent, it's not why the businesses are there. The entrepreneurs did a lot of work to hang their shingles there. To get in the program, prospects go through a rigorous application process. They have to show they have business ideas that'll work, that they have the dedication to make them work, and the resources they'll need to see them through until the ideas start generating sufficient income.

Importantly, too, the applicants have to show they're dedicated to their ideas, but not hung up on how to turn them into reality.

"If an entrepreneur is not coachable, we cannot help

them," Ms. Bernal said.

Mr. Bowen said that was the toughest part for him, but he's been learning the value of humility.

"I'm not the type of person who likes listening to what others have to say," he said.

B3B is opening an office at 100 E. Granada Blvd., in Ormond Beach, and hiring four employees. He believes that'll grow to more than 25 employees in coming months. While the site is free to customers registering to post jobs, contractors and service providers pay \$50 a month to register to make bids. Mr. Bowen said about 200 have joined the site. They offer everything from cleaning and hanging blinds to building home additions.

Mr. Bowen is married. His wife, Dagmar, and he have three sons, two minors and one adult. The adult son was B3B's first employee.

La Italiana serving traditional favorites made-from-scratch

SOUTH DAYTONA – If authentic, made-from-scratch Italian food is what you're craving – and you don't want to spend a fortune on it – look no further than La Italiana. Although the family-owned restaurant has only been in business for a year, it's become a must-visit for those looking for a true taste of Italy.

Located in the Nova Fountain Business Park on Nova Road, La Italiana is recognizable for its sign on the front door that reads "Home Sweet Home." The atmosphere inside the restaurant made me feel like I was at home – and the food tasted as good as Mom's, too.

Upon entering the restaurant, I was warmly greeted and seated to my table. The tables are far enough apart to offer an intimate dining experience.

The menu at La Italiana offers a wide selection of Italian specialties, everything from classic Italian dinners, including chicken Florentine and chicken marsala, to seafood dinners, such as Italian style clams and mussels, sautéed in a white wine sauce. The restaurant also serves pizzas, calzones, strombolis and sandwiches, as well as Italian pinwheels, an appetizer where pizza fillings are rolled up in bread dough.

La Italiana's staff prepares their food in small batches so everything is made fresh. As my guest and I sampled some of the highlights of the menu, we could easily tell they lived up to their promise.

We started with two appetizers, a half-dozen order of garlic knots (\$2.25) and an order of bruschetta (\$8.75),

which was piled high with fresh tomatoes, basil and garlic. While garlic knots are a great snack before a pizza, my guest and I both preferred the bruschetta, which we believed was outstanding. The homemade bread was lightly toasted with a crunch to it, and the tomatoes and basil tasted like they had just been picked from the garden. Highly recommended!

For the main course, we split a 14-inch margherita pizza (\$14.75) and a plate of spaghetti and meatballs (\$10.99). The pizza, topped with fresh basil and tomatoes, had the taste of true New York style brick oven pizza,

To wrap up our culinary tour of Italy, my guest and I split a cannoli (\$2.25) and a tiramisu (\$3.99) for dessert. Both desserts, sprinkled with a pinch of powdered sugar to add to the presentation, had the right amount of sweetness to them. We both felt the cannoli was the best we ever tasted!

Foods to enjoy, especially when camping

Hello smart shoppers. Gone camping yet? With the economy the way it is, you lucky people who have campers are just about the only ones who can take a vacation.

I've come up with a few recipes that are a cinch to make while camping. You can get pretty tired of the usual fare: burgers, hot dogs, chicken and steak. Kids love to be able to eat their dinner with a spoon.

What's for dessert? How about whoopie pies? Years ago, when we lived in Connecticut, we had them while visiting friends.

Whoopie pies are the best tasting cake/cookie on the planet. I got the recipe and it became a family favorite. I've seen different recipes in magazines, but none compare with the original. This is a great dessert; just make the cookies and filling at home, then assemble them at the camp site.

MEXICAN FIESTA (NIB) serves 6-8

This recipe is an original; and great for camping. Serve it as is, or topped with grated cheddar cheese, chopped tomatoes and lettuce and sour cream, if you choose. Roll it in a burrito or tuck it in taco shells.

1 pound ground beef (preferably fresh ground fat-free), or ground turkey
1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
1 medium onion, diced
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon chili powder
1/4-teaspoon pepper
1 can (14-1/2 to 16-ounce) tomatoes, smashed
1 can (14-1/2 to 16-ounce) corn with liquid
1 can (14-1/2 to 16-ounce) can black beans, drained and rinsed, optional
1-1/2 cups beef or chicken stock or bouillon
1 small green pepper, seeded, cut in thin strips
1/2-cup uncooked rice

Brown meat in oil in skillet, leaving in coarse

chunks. Add onion, cook until translucent. Add seasonings, tomatoes, corn, beans and stock; bring to a boil. Cook 15 minutes. Add rice; cook 10 minutes more. Add green pepper and cook 10 minutes or until rice is tender, adding more stock or water if necessary.

HOB STEW (NIB) serves 6-8

1 pound virtually fat-free fresh ground beef or ground turkey
1/2-pound hot dogs* (sliced)
1 envelope (1-ounce) onion gravy mix
1 can (8-ounce) tomato sauce
1 can (14-1/2 to 16-ounce) mixed vegetables or peas and carrots, drained, or 1 10-ounce package frozen mixed vegetables
1 cup broth, either beef or chicken
Salt and pepper to taste

*Note: Use low-fat beef or turkey hotdogs.
If using frozen vegetables, cook until tender in part of the water; then add water to skillet. If using canned peas and carrots or frozen vegetables, add one 14-1/2 to 16-ounce can of potatoes, rinsed, drained and cubed. (NOTE: canned mixed vegetables contain potatoes.)

In a large skillet, brown meat while breaking up; brown hotdog slices. Stir in remaining ingredients; heat until hot and bubbly.
Serve in bowls with biscuits or bread and a butter substitute.

When my daughter was in Girl Scouts, this dinner in a bowl was everyone's favorite.

Brown 1 pound ground





Kitchen Band keeps old toes tapping

DEBARY — At least one Thursday morning a month, you can bet Ruth Chester will be wheeling down to the activity room at DeBarry Manor nursing home to take her monthly trip back in time with the Kitchen Band.

She hears the 14 members singing along with Pat Boone writing "Love Letters in the Sand," Dean Martin advising the lovelorn to "Powder Your Face With Sunshine," while The Drifters stroll "Under the Boardwalk" and take the 80-year-old longtime DeBarry resident right back there with them. She's singing right along, a wide smile showing in her eyes.

"Music has always been a big part of my life and I'm not alone," Ms. Chester said, pointing to her two-dozen neighbors who wanted to be there, too, many just to listen with their eyes closed. "I sang in the choir since I was a little girl. We used to get in the car and sing our way wherever we were going and all the way back. So all these songs here, I know most of them. We all do."

Formed a dozen years ago by residents of The Cloisters of DeLand, the members of the Kitchen Band are about the same age as their audiences. They stay seated during most of one rehearsal and one half-hour performance every Thursday at a different area nursing home.

They don't bother with instruments, settling instead for some form of kitchen utensil — hence the name.

"We used to do pots and pans, too," said Roger Wagner, The Cloisters' assistant activities director, "but pots are gone now. Hard on the ears."

Although some have evolved to more practical instruments, such as tambourines, maracas

or bongos, others, like Beth Klein, prefer to stick with tradition. She's got a cheese grater she lovingly scratches with a potato masher.

She's been performing with the Kitchen Band for three years and adores it when Mr. Wagner, the group's master of ceremonies, pulls her up to dance and sing a duet.

"You're mashing potatoes again?" he asks her between songs.

"No, silly" she replies curtly, "I'm making music!"

Keeping all these songs close is what matters to Ms. Klein the most.

"These were the songs we sung back when we were young," she said. "I've always had music in my life, and this is a way to keep it in my life."

Then she whispers, "I'm 92 today."

Mr. Wagner said the group has no pretensions.

"This was started by residents getting together and wanting to do something for the community," he said. "A lot of them couldn't sing then and they can't sing now, but it didn't matter then and it doesn't matter now."

After the show, performer Tom McNerney of DeBarry stood in the lobby of DeBarry Manor before hopping back on the bus to The Cloisters. He lived here for three years, and every minute brings another shout of "Tom!" or "My man!"

Mr. McNerney shakes hands with his old neighbors. One asks him why he's playing the traveling Vaudeville circuit these days.

"It's this old music," he says. "It makes me feel like I'm young again. And I've got all these ladies along for the ride. Can't beat that."



Having fun in the Spruce Creek mangroves

I slid the kayak onto the roof of my old Ford Explorer before dawn and headed south. On this trip I was heading down to the Spruce Creek area, and it was going to be all about fun.

My freezer was well stocked with flounder filets and shrimp from a recent run in the Halifax, and now it was time to get my line stretched. I dropped the Green Peanut in at Sleepy Hollow Park just north of the New Smyrna Beach Airport and a little south of the Three Bridges area of Port Orange. Right away, I could see the tide was very low, but charging in with a force as it does when you are near the inlet.

With the fast tide, I didn't need to paddle much to get back into the red fish hole. On the way, I cast my red and white Mirro Lure a few times and attracted the attention of a small trout. As I twirled the plug on the surface, the game little trout hit it once, twice and then a hook-up. It was a fun start, and I was happy to release it.

Once at my destination, I found the water smooth, and I could see fish moving all over the place. Plainly, there were lots of large mullet in the area, but I also knew they were not all mullet. I began catching 16-inch reds one after the other. The small reds were so thick; I began to throw lures that I ordinarily ignore. They were ready to play with most anything I threw. Now that's fun!

After awhile that action slowed and I moved deeper into the mangroves in search of big game. Now, I was in very shallow water, but bull reds were pushing water about like submarines. It was a tight little cove, but was holding three or four of the big boys.

I made a lot of casts, but could never get the big ones to hit. I suppose they were too spooked in the tight

confines. One that was not spooked was a red of around 20 inches. I saw it swimming toward my boat with its back out of the water. I sat very still and tried to drag my lure in front of it, but it was having none of it, so I just watched. The fish was totally oblivious to my presence and was slowly moving along stopping now and then to nose the bottom when it found something of interest. It was fun to see the object of my affection going about its daily business.

Overhead a large pink flamingo soared low over the swamp. In this area, our pink flamingos are actually roseate spoonbills, but this one was the real deal. I wondered if it had come all the way from South Florida or had escaped one of the theme parks. It was fun getting such a good look at it.

Once the sun was bright, I admired all of the big mangrove bushes surrounding me. Back in the '80s, those mangroves were frozen down to their roots, but are very healthy now. All were dripping with the

seedpods that will float to places unknown to make more mangroves.

If you pay attention, you know they are a plant of a deep green color, but look closer and you will notice there is always a few leaves of yellow on each bush. Although the mangrove is salt tolerant, when it takes on more salt than it can handle, it sends it to selected leaves. They turn yellow, die and fall off. Just how the mangrove selects those certain leaves to sacrifice is unknown. The next time, you are out having fun ponder that mystery. My day ended with one 18-inch flounder on the stringer, and when I went to the truck, I presented it to a shore-bound angler. It was fun to see the big smile on his face.
