# **Community has lost 'an** incredibly caring person'

The sudden loss of Dennis Burns, president and CEO of the United Way of Volusia-Flagler Counties, leaves some big shoes to fill at the agency.

The beloved Ormond Beach resident died unexpectedly Feb. 3 from heart-related issues.

"It was always the aspiration of Dennis to lead a local United Way," a news release from the local agency states. "He was very grateful to the Volusia-Flagler community for their expression of confidence in him. He was an amazing leader, advocate for this community and supporter of the United

The release added he recently reiterated his vision and legacy for the community and the local United Way, citing his confidence in the organization's ability to create lasting change.

Mr. Burns, 65, had been the UW's local leader since November 2015. He led the implementation of a Community Impact model locally. He was involved on many local boards and committees, including: Flagler Cares, Commission on Homelessness for Volusia & Flagler Counties, One Voice for Volusia and VMA Education Committee. He was a member of the Daytona Beach Rotary and a graduate of Leadership Daytona.

# **Spread those butterfly wings** to your garden

Butterflies are not just beautiful insects with delicate, colorful wings, they are important pollinators of fruit trees and vegetable gardens.

Unfortunately butterflies are being depleted at an alarming rate (nearly a billion over the last 25 years, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service) due to loss of habitat, and herbicide and pesticide use.

But there is hope, in the form of Monarch City USA, for the monarch butterflies in the Deland and New Smyrna Beach areas, and expanding to more areas as garden enthusiasts plant more butterfly-friendly plants.

The New Smyrna Beach and Edgewater Men's Garden Club is in the midst of certifying neighborhood and resi-

dential gardens as monarch friendly. New Smyrna Beach was the second city in Florida to become a Monarch City USA city, after Deland.

The Deland Garden Club's certification began when a few people, including Karen Hall and John Hatfield, got together and approached the city about a Monarch City USA designation. The first garden they did was the century garden at the Bill Dreggers Park in Deland. Now there are 114 certified Deland gardens.

While New Smyrna Beach is already certified as a Monarch City USA, the New Smyrna Beach men's and women's garden clubs are working on certifying more neighborhood and residential gardens of all sizes as monarch friendly.

## 'Firefighter for **Kids' gives back**

Ricky Francois is the 2018 Port Orange Firefighter of the Year, largely thanks to his contributions to school children and teachers throughout Volusia County.

"The reason he was nominated was for a number of things," Port Orange Fire Chief Ken Fuston said. "He is a firefighter, he has taken several classes seeking certification as a fire inspector, he stepped up into the position of acting driver/engineer while we were going through the promotional process for those seeking permanent driver/engineer positions. He also is enrolled in the Daytona State College paramedic

program." Another big reason is his nonprofit organization, Firefighter for Kids, which is entering its third year. The organization helps young and underprivileged children throughout Volusia County to obtain school supplies.

"Since Ricky started Firefighter for Kids, he has assisted over 2,000 children in Volusia County with backpacks and basic school supplies,"Chief Fuston said.

Originally from Newark, N.J., Mr. Francois remembers the school he attended where many students came from low-income families and he also needed assistance from relatives to provide him and his two siblings with basic school supplies.

"I started this at the end of 2016," he said. "I started it because I came from it. I've gone to low-income schools. Unfortunately there were many children there unprepared. Kids see that and you get teased. I had great parents, aunts and uncles, they would get together (and) put money together to make sure we went to school with supplies. Once I had nephews and nieces, I did that for them. I said I wanted to do that for other children on a bigger

get money, he said. "Some people bring bookbags, bags full of notebooks, crayons and markers, things that the students and teachers can use."

But besides the basic supplies, he tries to bring schools some specific items they need, he said. "Some schools need mouse clickers for their computers. Some schools need

headphones."

So far, he has donated to seven schools within Volusia County as well as Easter Seals, each contribution totaling between \$500 and \$1,000.

So far the schools are in Port Orange, South Daytona and Daytona Beach with his sights set this year on a school in Ormond Beach. Port

Orange Elementary was the first school he donated to. He plans on helping schools in West Volusia as well.

"He came to school one day (last fall) and told us about the program he has, firefighters supporting the students and just wanted to make a

ers, for the endangered butterflies and for our initiative," said Skip Bednarczyk, a Men's Garden Club member.

"We need to do more for the butterflies," added Jim West, another member.

Mr. West comes from a long line of gardeners. His uncle, Walter West, was a gardener for President Dwight D. Eisenhower, and his wife, Marjorie Cooley, had a vegetable garden, he said. His grandmother owned a flower shop. Mr. West has had a long-time interest in

He has been a volunteer for more than 25 years, tagging butterflies. (Tags are available from monarchwatch.org)

Monarch City USA came into being to promote education and development of public and private gardens. Faith Miller, public works director for New Smyrna Beach, is working with local clubs to get people to build gardens.

The Men's Garden Club will be at the New Smyrna Beach Springfest from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, April 6, at Canal and Live Oak streets with

information on residential monarch certification.

To become a certified monarch butterfly sanctuary, participants must have a minimum of 20 nectar food plants, three of which are host/larval plants, which includes five milkweed plants, as they are the primary host plants for the monarchs. Nectar food plants include penta, salvia, porterweed, plumbago, buddleia, beach sunflower, lantana, bottlebrush and firebush. Larval food plants include milkweed, passion vine, cassia, parsley, dill and fennel. The brighter the color in the garden, the more butterflies will visit, according to the garden club.

Applications to become a certified monarch butterfly sanctuary will be reviewed and the New Smyrna Beach men's and women's garden's clubs will be in touch with participants. (Deadline for submission is April 30. Participants will have the option of buying a Certified Monarch Butterfly Sanctuary sign for \$25.) ## Racing's greatest natural track

e all know our beach was the world's first automotive test track and the site of numerous land speed records, but why, exactly?

What made the beaches of Volusia County the desired destination for the early inventors and daredevils?

Sure, the easy answer is that our beach has 26 miles of gently sloping, hard packed sand, but it is much more than that. After all, when the speed trials and racing began at Ormond's beach in 1903, it was a monumental task to get a race car here from points north where they were being made. Back then we were a remote outpost fraught with soft, uneven sand roads, biting insects and snakes, and populated by many assorted outlaws and ner-do-wells.

What then would prompt inventors like Henry Ford, Ransom Olds (both from Michigan) and Alexander Winton (Ohio) to make the long and dangerous trek to our shores? Surely they could find a mile track closer to home.

First off, you must know one of the main enemies of the early automobile was dust.



Inventors would build an internal combustion engine that ran just fine in their shop, but once mounted onto a buggy to run the dirt roads they would soon become choked with dust and stop. In the beginning, the methods of air filtration on those engines were either poor or non-existent. The rudimentary carburetors would quickly plug up, leaving the cars to be thought of as unreliable. But. There was no dust on the

Until this day, when some sports writers hear the City of Ormond Beach claims to be the birthplace of speed, they go to work trying to dispute that fact. The mistake most make is to substitute the word "racing" for speed. Ormond Beach was not the site of the first auto race they correctly claim. As Henry Ford famously said, "The first race probably happened about five

minutes after the second car was built."

For eight years in a row, Ormond Beach hosted the world's first sustained tournaments to attempt the world's land speed record. Before 1903 there had been many organized racing events around the country and the world, but those were mostly singular events on short city streets or quarter mile and half mile dirt horse tracks.

Our beach was unsurpassed. With the world's top speed prize being the flying mile, no other place was better suited to try for it. It was extremely difficult to run a car flat out on the small oval tracks due to all the turning. Here a driver could run his car two or three miles before the traps in order to get up to full speed. Our beach provided a place to run 10-mile tests or even 20 miles without turning. From 1903 to 1935, 59 world records were set here from one kilo to 100 miles.

Another reason for the success of our beaches was safety. Early auto races were mostly road races on city streets where the crowd stood right along the roadway to

watch. Spectator deaths at events like Vanderbilt's Long Island cup races would result in an outery to halt all racing.

During the 33 years of land speed record attempts here, no spectator was ever killed. A safety record unmatched by any other racing venue in the world. The dunes served as a natural grandstand where onlookers could sit high up for a safe and unobstructed view. Errant race cars would be safely slowed by the soft sand at the dunes base.

So, is it any wonder that almost every auto manufacturer and most professional drivers came here? Little dust, long straightaways and a safe track would demand that those with a need for speed make the pilgrimage to the world's greatest beach.

## Volusia beach season has begun

With the beginning of beach season, beach access ramps increased their operating

capacity Feb. 1. When using primary thoroughfares to access the beach, such as Granada, International Speedway and Dunlawton boulevards, or Third Avenue, beachgoers are encouraged to travel north or south of these locations for alternative beach ramps, which may not be as congested. Less busy ramps allow for easier access and parking.

•For a list of beach access

and click on the "Beach Driving and Parking" tab.

•Beachgoers should anticipate intermittent or lengthy closures of vehicle access ramps at times (possibly one to two hours during high tide, although some will remain open). To help offset this, beachgoers should plan to be at the beach early.

•Beachgoers are encouraged to consider off-beach parking, which is available at designated locations from Ormondby-the-Sea to Bethune Beach.

There is a \$20 daily fee to drive on the beach, which includes one same-day re-enbe bought or renewed at volusiabeachpass.com or at a staffed access ramp.

If an annual pass no longer scans, the toll attendants may require a new pass to be placed on your windshield. Annual beach passes are \$25 for Volusia County residents and \$100 for non-residents. County inlet parks passes are available for \$20 for residents and visitors. An annual inlet parks pass can be added to a resident or non-resident annual beach pass for \$20.

As always, free annual passes are provided to patrons who have a permanent handicap

ramps, visit Volusia.org/beach try. Annual beach passes can license plate or a disabled veteran license plate. The passes are non-transferable between vehicles.

Beach drivers are reminded to have one front window down and headlights on at all times; observe the 10 mph speed limit; and watch for pedestrians, children and wildlife. Texting while driving is prohibited, and cell phone use is discouraged.

As always, please put your trash in the can. Compostable trash bags are available upon request at the booths.

worked hard to mentor people," Ms. Edgcomb said. "He had a heart for wanting to see this community become better. He had a lot of projects on the table."

He was proud he won his fantasy football league this year and how much he loved the beach and his family, especially his grandkids, she said.

"Dennis did a good job of getting all of us to work independently. He said my job is to hire the right people and then get out of their way. He did that," Ms. Edgcomb said. "We are still here and operating. We are in the middle right now of our next community impact grant process. We are more focused in the way we distribute funds and that is a vision Dennis had."

Mr. Burns also was the consummate family man. He is survived by his wife of 41 years, Mary Burns, and their three children, Cameron Robert Burns, Carlyn Linker and Charisse Bitner; sisters, Margaret Burns and Roberta Riggsbee; and four grandchil-

"He was one of those people that was so kind and immediately put people at ease," Cameron Burns said. "My friends would come over when I was still young and hang out with

him. He was a Little League coach and made a big impact on a lot of my friends and made a big impact on a lot of people for a lot of reasons. He loved the beach and was an avid sports fan and loved to golf as much as he could."

He wants his dad remembered as a kind, selfless person, Mr. Burns said. "Even before he worked in nonprofit he was 'that guy'. He was the guy that would give you the shirt off his back, he was the guy who would pick you up if you needed help. It wasn't just his job. He was the kind of person who wanted to help

Working for United Way was the job that allowed him to be himself, his son said. "It's

almost like the job found him. Something we would do on a Saturday is the same way he would go to work on a Monday. He was like everyone's dad. He didn't care what you were, he cared who you were."

He added his family is appreciative of the outpouring of support and testimonials they have received. He also laughingly said his parents were "annoyingly in love. They spent all their time together. My dad adored my mom, they were perfect for each other in an opposites attract kind of

Dennis Burns grew up in Hornell, N.Y., and earned a bachelor's degree in communications from the University of Central Florida. He worked for the Orlando Sentinel before completing a stint as a Loaned Executive for the Heart of Florida United Way in Orlando. He then joined the Heart of Florida United Way full time in resource development and began his 20-plus year career there.

## A Little Library, a giant sloth and a path to literacy

A new Little Free Library was recently installed in South Daytona, reflecting the historical significance of its location in Reed Canal Park.

In 1975, the bones of 13-foot giant ground sloth was discovered at the bottom of a retention pond in the park. With a nod to this discovery, the Little Free Library depicts the extinct mammals that once roamed the area.

The library structure was donated by South Daytona Elementary School and was painted by Carol Sperber, a retired teacher and media specialist at the school.

The driving force behind the installation of the fourth

Little Free Library in the city was Wendell Christensen, an academic intervention teacher at the school. Known as the Book Doctor on campus, Mr. Christensen created Wendellville, the Little Free Library in the school's atri-

Wearing a white decorated lab coat extolling the virtues of reading, Mr. Christensen literally wears his passion for literacy on his sleeve. "Since we don't have a library in South Daytona, this is a way of getting books in the hands of kids," he said. "Reading is everything."

Mayor Bill Hall and Councilman Doug Quartier joined school representatives and others in celebrating the opening of the free library.

"This is a wonderful example of a community approach to promoting literacy," Mayor Hall said. "Our city, the local school and volunteers worked together to make this happen."

The library, located in the park's playground, joins those on Brian Avenue, Lantern Drive and at the school. All sites are registered with the Little Free Library website so they can be found on a map. The location has proven to be a big hit, likely due to its daily proximity to chil-







## Stop the insanity, I want to get off

s regular readers of this column know, I'm fairly **1** pro-development, but also expect sensible infrastructure to go with it.

So, it pains me to point out we really need to say, "slow down on the development."

While not quite having everything in place for the development along LPGA Boulevard in Daytona Beach is bad enough, at least it has an interstate interchange to help with the movement of traffic. The same can be said for all the development along Orange Camp Road at DeLand and Lake Helen, and State Road 472 (Howland Boulevard in Deltona).

All three of those areas, especially LPGA Boulevard with its massive amount of residential development, will have to look at continually upgrading for roads, water, sewer, schools and recreation.

But where we almost need to look at a moratorium on development is Pioneer Trail and Williamson Boulevard along the New Smyrna Beach/ Port Orange border. You already have the Cypresshead and Water's Edge developments in Port Orange and Venetian Bay in New Smyrna Beach putting a strain on the area. Two more planned developments, both closer to I-95, include ICI Homes' Woodhaven, which would

have 1,300 single-family houses, 400 townhouses and a retail village with a supermarket, pharmacy and retail shops. Right on the other side of Pioneer Trail, Rural King Supply of Mattoon, Ill., has proposed Shell Pointe Colony, which would have 745 houses and 30 acres of commercial development in two retail villages.

ICI was instrumental in extending Williamson Boulevard to Pioneer Trail, so you have some outlet for traffic, but that's as far as Williamson goes. Also, an interchange at I-95 and Pioneer Trail is years away from reality, especially with many people still opposed to the interchange.

ICI is already too far along and you can't stop it from its first phase of Woodhaven, which will have 178 single-family houses and 93 townhouses on about 116 acres, but that's near the intersection with Airport Road and doesn't impact Pioneer Trail quite so much,

But let's face it; putting that

much development along a tiny, narrow country lane with no access to the interstate is a recipe for disaster. So, please cities of Port Orange and New Smyrna Beach, stop the madness and get the infrastructure in place.

May not be anything yet, but B. Braun is getting all of its land on Mason Avenue in Daytona Beach under one zoning designation, and it's general industrial zoning. Documents filed with the city just state it's for expansion, but it could mean the second medical products plant is coming, which would be a big economic boost for the area.

Still not a lot of big commercial real estate deals happening, but one big one was Silver State Realty & Investments of Las Vegas buying the News-Journal property at 901 Sixth St. in Daytona Beach (adjacent) for \$10.458 million. International Speedway Corp. bought the Space Coast Credit Union property at 200 Bill France Blvd. in Daytona Beach for \$3.6 million. Safe Lock Storage of Windermere bought an industrial storage

property at 333 Marion Ave.


in Edgewater for \$2.73 million. A Canadian investor bought the townhouse apartments at 2322 S. Palmetto Ave. in South Daytona for \$1.025M.

On a final note, some interesting developments include SunTrust and BB&T merging. The new entity will be based in Charlotte, N.C. With so few BB&T offices in Volusia County, it may not mean any office closings, so little impact unless you happen to have a relative who was working in the SunTrust headquarters in Atlanta. Demolition is starting on the first of the First Baptist Church properties in downtown Daytona Beach; an office building at 115 N. Ridgewood Ave. An Urban Planet store is replacing the VF Outlet at Tanger Factory Outlet Center in Daytona Beach. The mobile home park on Natures Woods Boulevard, south of East New Hampshire Avenue in DeLand is adding 45 lots.

# **Aerospace physiology students complete rotations**

The nation's only undergraduate aerospace physiology program, based at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, recently dispatched its first cohort of students to complete clinical rotations, in collaboration with AdventHealth Daytona Beach.

Students Haleema Irfan of Plantation, Jenifer Schuman of Cape Coral and Morgan Ackermann of Longwood have, so far, observed the diagnosis and treatment of patients in the hospital's operating room, emergency room, hyperbaric wound center, physical therapy center and other settings.

For Irfan, who wants to be a neurosurgeon, clinical rotations have helped her gain valuable interpersonal and communication skills.

"When you go into any field that involves the diagnosis of patients, you have to be able to communicate efficiently so every person in the room — including the patient, family and anyone else — understands what the condition is, the prognosis, and how will it be treated," said Irfan. "I feel like this is something people don't learn early enough."

For about two days per week, totaling six to 10 hours, the students attend rotations at the hospital. They meet with a registered nurse, shadow them for a shift, then confer with Dr. Karen Gaines, dean of ERAU's College of Arts and Sciences, to recap what they learned.

"What makes this experience unique is not only the hands-on learning experiences that Advent Health gives our students, but the time our students spend together to reflect cation. "I've been so impressed with the dedication of these students as they juggle the demands of school, work, and their time at the hospital during their clinical rotations."

on what they learned," Dr. Gaines said. "I require students to perform a literature search on the medical procedures they saw at the hospital, and then they present in class on how that research is going to improve patient care. This brings a full-circle experience for the student to understand what they see in the clinical setting."


"We work hard to develop unique and engaging experiences that will provide a solid foundation for their future careers promoting the health and wellbeing of pilots, astronauts, and other flight crew members," said Linda Misko, the hospital's director of education. NASCAR announced updates for the 2019 season recently with the biggest change a warning to anyone who doesn't follow the rules will be immediately disqualified.

Previously NASCAR performed full post-race inspections at its Research & Development Center in Concord, N.C., and any results were announced days after a race. But now the inspections will occur immediately after each race in NASCAR top three series. If a vehicle fails postrace inspection, it will be dis-



## **NASCAR** fans love to fish **Catch of the Week FISHING**



That is pretty much a fact just as it is a fact the 24 hours crowd do not. OK you might think I am dealing in stereotypes, and I am. Stock car racing fans also are famously the shot-and-abeer bunch while sports car fans tend toward wine and cheese. Oh, I suppose the crowd at the 24-hour endurance race occasionally toasts with a cold beer, but Heineken and Amstel Light do not count. We're talking Busch

and Bud here.

I am also pretty sure the fans of the open wheelers might wet a line once in a while. Good enough, but I know the fans of NASCAR are also fans of Bill Dance and Roland Martin - Son! I believe the only thing that keeps these folks from fishing is racing. Right now our little corner of the world has increased in population by about 150,000 and it's time to get our visitors fishing.

If fresh water angling is their thing, point them toward West Volusia County where the mighty St. Johns River and its tributaries will blow their minds. There, crappie (speckled perch) of more than two pounds and wall-hanger largemouth bass are common. I have said many times that I am sure I have eaten specks that would be a crappie state record up north.

While right now is prime time for speckled perch fishing you could also send them a bit south to Osteen to try for shad. That is great fun and it only happens for a short time each winter.

You might direct them down to the famous Mosquito Lagoon at New Smyrna Beach, Oak Hill and Edgewater. Our cooler months mean

large spotted sea trout and there is no better place in the state to try for gator trout than The Lagoon. Over the years I have seen several at more than 12 pounds caught there and I know the world's record of 18 pounds lurks there someplace. In the meantime, the schoolers will keep your guests pretty busy.

As good as the trout fishing is in Mosquito Lagoon, it is more famous for red drum. NASCAR folks from points north all want to do battle with our powerful redfish. At times I have encountered schools of lagoon reds numbering in the hundreds. They are Eastern Volusia County's most popular line stretchers.

To get the really big ones, send the race fans to Ponce Inlet where the bull reds may easily top 20 pounds. Also the inlet has some of the largest sheepshead you will find anyplace. Just inside Ponce

and south on the Indian River your guests can fish for black drum weighing more than 50 pounds. Both the heads and the drum are at their peak in the winter.

In the Northern Halifax, you can direct your company to some of the best flounder fishing around. Around Tomoka State Park, the description "doormat" is no exaggeration. Going west from there, tell them to fish the Tomoka River for the Sportsmen's favorites, tarpon and snook. Those acrobatic tackle busters are a foe any serious fisherman would love to tangle with.

Down at Oak Hill, shrimping is the way to go. Each night in the winter, scores of lighted boats work the outgoing tide in the Indian River for limits of succulent shrimp. This is so popular, I have met people there from as far away as Fort Pierce dipping their nets. Some winter

visitors are able to pay for their entire trip with the money gained from selling their shrimp catch.

So, with all that great cool weather action let's encourage the race fans to stay awhile and get in some fishing. Help them contact our talented cadre of local guides either to the east or on the St. Johns and the lakes. We all know they came down here with a pocket full of money to spend. With a little nudge, the NASCAR fans could be tempted to leave some of it behind at one of the world's greatest fishing destinations.





not enough or personal enough for me. Nothing is more personal than cooking for someone, especially someone you care about. Yes, you're creating something with your own hands and in that moment, a memory is

born that could last a life time.
Of course, you have to make sure it's a good memory. Don't try to make something fancy you've never made before.
Because more often than not, you may not succeed. Keep it simple, but nice.

I think my favorite is a breakfast in bed treat. Get up early and prepare a special breakfast he or she likes. Surprise your sweetheart with a glass of champagne with a fresh peach slice. There are several rose champagnes as well. Then prepare a combination plate with fresh berries and fruit. Find a special small bowl and mix 1 cup of the fruit together. Set aside. Make a special French toast (recipe to follow). Poach two fresh, cage-free eggs. the harpsichordist, on par with Bach's massive Goldberg Variations in terms of technical difficulty," Mr. Jones said. The solo cadenza in the Brandenburg Fifth's first movement "is quite simply much more difficult than most harpsichord music of that or any time. Some scholars assume that it was meant as a vehicle for Bach himself, or perhaps one of his sons, to 'show off.'"





## The nice advantages of a portable computer

make laptop computers so appealing is they are portable.

With a laptop, you are free to roam where you want to. A laptop with a wireless internet connection gives you the ability to work in any room in the house and even beyond.

With a laptop you have the freedom to leave your home (or office) entirely and still have the full-blown computer power you would expect to have with a desktop machine.

With free wireless "hot spots" popping up all over the place, the possibilities are endless. You can get the same amount of work done you would expect to get done if you were confined to a desk all day, from places like coffee shops, airports, the lobby of a fine hotel or even (if you live in a gated community) down at the clubhouse by the pool!

But, as is true with all good things, there are a few "gotcha's" you have to be aware of if you decide to take your machine out on the road.

One issue that causes a fair amount of confusion for the budding "road warrior" is the inability to send email from on the road. Receiving mail is usually not a problem, but the inability to send mail when you are on a connection other than your home network is a complaint that I used to hear quite a bit.

Now, not everyone has this problem. There are plenty of people out there who are able to use their laptops wherever they want and sending isn't a problem, but there are others who (try as they might) can't send an email when away from home to save their life.

The answer usually lies in what email service their system is set up to use when the mail fails to send versus the email services that works no matter where they are.

Confused? Let's back track a bit and talk about the typical home internet service and what's included. When you sign up for internet service for your home, one of the things you get with that service is an email address. Your Internet Service Provider (ISP) gives you access to the internet from home and sets up a username which typically becomes your email address.

Then your email program (Outlook, Windows Live Mail, etc.) gets set up with vour username, password, "POP" and "SMTP" settings.

The "Post Office Protocol" (POP) are the settings that tell your email program from where on the internet your incoming mail can be retrieved and the "Simple Mail Transfer Protocol" (SMTP) tells your mail program where on the internet your outgoing mail needs to go when you click the "Send" button. The problem in sending mail usually lies with the SMTP settings.

**Internet Service Providers** take Spam (junk email) seriously and in an effort to try to thwart it, some providers will prohibit relaying outgoing mail through their SMTP servers. outgoing mail message is being sent from within their network, it goes along without a hitch. But when you try to use your machine in a network that is different than the network you use at home (maybe your home network is AT&T and the coffee shop you are trying to send email from is Comcast), then the SMTP server rejects the outgoing mail because it's not originating from within its network but from some other network. The message gets blocked as part of the service provider's efforts to thwart Spam.

So what do you do? And why is it some people have no problem sending mail and others can't?

Well, many ISPs have a different SMTP address for people when they are on the road but one of the easiest ways to work around this issue is to set up a free "web-based" email service like Gmail so it doesn't matter where you are when you try to send email. With an email service like Gmail, you can set up your SMTP settings in your email program to point to Gmail's server and bypass your ISP's SMTP settings altogether. It's a simple fix and using a web-based email service also lets you keep using the same email address even if you move or change internet service providers. But that's a whole other issue altogether isn't it?


