CABLEGRAMS

October 15th 1913.
Paris, 13.—Half a million persons gathered in Tuilleries Gardens and the surrounding parks today saw the start of the balloon race for the international aeronautic cup.

Great Britain, the United States, France, Italy, Belgium, Austria, Germany and Switzerland were represented.

Uniontown, Penna. 13.—Plans have been made completed for the dedication next Wednesday of the monument to General Braddock in the mountains near here. The monument has been placed on the grave of the famous English General who was buried where he fell in the battle with the Indians in 1775.

Washington, 13.—Members of the National Geographic Society here today said that the reported discovery of a Continent 500 miles north of Asia, if true would be the last great discovery of land. They pronounced it the most important discovery in the Arctic Circle in the last century.

Messina, 13.—An earthquake was felt here today. It caused much alarm but no serious damage.

London, 13.—The latest accounts of the disaster to the steamer Voltorno confirm that the loss of life will be limited to about one hundred and thirty six.

The Carmania, first of the rescuing ships to reach the burning steamer, arrived off Queenstown this morning, but owing to the gale, proceeded direct to Fishguard.

London, 13.—The Right Hon. Alexander Ure, Lord Advocate of Scotland, has been appointed Lord President of the Court of Sessions. This will necessitate a bye-election in Linlithgowshire for which constituency the Lord Advocate held his seat in the house of commons.

London, 13.—John Redmond, leader of the Irish Nationalists, speaking at a great home rule demonstration here today, declared himself unalterably against the suggestion made by Winston Spencer Churchill, in his speech at Dundee last week, that a settlement of the Irish question might be reached by the exclusion of a portion of Ulster from the operations of the home rule bill.

Mr Redmond said that the suggestion was impracticable and unworkable. Such a proposition would have no support from the Nationalists and even the Unionists of Ireland were against it.
