WAR SUMMARY.—There has been little concentrated in fantry fighting on the European battle fields. Along the border between Roumania and Transylvania the opposing armies continue the fray but with little change. In the region north and

east of Campalung the fighting goes on and Bucharest claims the capture of Mount Rosca at Bratocea, and the repulse of enemy attacks north of Campalung. In Galicia the Austro Germans have checked attacks below Stanislau and have occupied Russian positions near Halicz.

On the Anglo British front there has been little but artillery fire. The Germans shelled the British front around Ypres, and south of the Ancre the positions of Stuff and Scheaben Redoubts.

There has been some artillery activity on the Austro Italian front.

The German submarine U. 53 which after paying a brief visit to Newport sunk several British and neutral steamers off the American coast, is reported to have reached a German port in safety.

Six American lives were lost in the sinking of the British steamer Marina, the American Consul at Queens town is informed, according to an official despatch. Of the 51 Americans reported rescued at least two were injured. It is reported that the Marina was attacked by two submarines and that she sank within ten minutes. A heavy sea was running and the number of lives lost is in doubt.

The loss of six draft net boats in addition to the sinking of the Transport Queen and the destroyer Flirt in the recent raid in the English Channel was admitted by A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty, in the house of Commons today. The torpedo boat destroyer Flirt, he said, was surprised in the darkness by a German destroyer which fired on her at close range and sunk her. The destroyer Nubian torpedoed while attacking the German squadron should have been brought to harbour, the first lord asserted, but for the gale.

He believed that the Nubian can be saved. "There is ground

for believing", Mr Balfour declared, "That two German destroyers after being hit during the action struck mines and were blown up and probably sunk".

The Overseas News Agency says that French newspapers praise Serget. Lufbury of the American flying corps for having shot down his fifth German aeroplane during the raid against Oberndorff on Neckar on October 12th. In the air encounter in Southern Germany on the date mentioned not one German flier was disabled or even hurt.

A French official statement issued in Paris on October 15th said that Sergt. Lufbury on the American air squadron had brought down his fifth enemy machine during a bombardment of the Mauser factory at Oberndorff.

London:—The corrected list shows that there were 52 Americans aboard the Marina six of whom were killed.

Paris:—The French gained in the region of LesBoeufs on the Somme front. In Macedonia the Serbians continue to advance slowly.

Berlin:—The Fort Vaux region at Verdun has been evacuated by the German Crown Prince thus losing to the Germans most of the gains made last Spring.

Attempted advance of the British north of Courcellete on the Somme front was repulsed. The French gained advances in the region of LesBoeufs and Rancourt.

VonLinsingen attacking the Russians on the left bank of the Stokhod took 1500 prisoners.

In Roumania all attacks have been repulsed. The Austro-Germans progressed south of Rothenthurn Pass.

Bucharest:—Pursuit of the Austro-Germans in Jiu Valley continues. North of Campalung and East of the River Alt all attacks were repulsed by the Roumanians.

Rome:—The Italians yesterday opened a new offensive against the

Austrians in the Goriza region scouring advances at some points and capturing nearly 5,000 prisoners.

Petrograd:—The Germans captured advanced Russian trenches on the west bank of the Stokhod south of Witoniez. The battles are continuing.

Havana, Cuba:—Alfredo Zayas, Liberal, was elected President of Cuba yesterday by nine thousand majority. There was but little disorder.

San Salvador:—The Volcano Santiago in Nicaragua is active. Many plantations have been ruined.

Chihuahua, Mexico:—Villa bandits after shooting 29 Carranza guards on a southbound passenger train from Juarez Monday looted the train, robbed passengers and took clothing from women. They then abandoned the train carrying away the loot in wagons.
