Gulfport Gets Save-a-Lot and Family Dollar

After sitting vacant for several years, the site of the former Winn Dixie will once again be a place where Gulfport residents can go for milk, meats, and cleaning supplies.

On Friday afternoon (February 26), the city of Gulfport issued a building permit for a Save-a-Lot and Family Dollar to reshape the space formerly occupied by a Winn-Dixie on 49th Street South and Gulfport Boulevard.

The permitting process took the contractor (Gerardi Construction), the architect (RoJo Architecture)

Robert Vincent told city council Tuesday night as he presented Sergeant Zachary Mills as the Gulfport Police Department Officer of the Year.

Sergeant Terry Taylor nominated Mills for the honor. Taylor, who has three years service as an officer, he has made the lion's share of the police department's DUI arrests, contributing to zero DUI-related fatalities in Gulfport

Mills received a standing ovation for the police officers present at the meeting.

Six Inches Matters

GULFPORT- The city bent the rules slightly and allowed a resident to build a home on property that the building department told her wasn't large enough. Angela LePore bought property in Gulfport and demolished the existing house. According to the city's interim Andrew Salzman, the home was "in deteriorated condition."

When LePore applied for a building permit to build a new home, however, the city denied her building permit because building officials noticed her property was six inches shy of having enough land to meet requirements.

After LePore's attorney consulted with the city attorneys, city council opted Tuesday night to grant LePore permission to build a single-family home.

The Late Joe Kolac

Dear Editor: When I first thought about writing this letter, I thought the subject matter would be "Near The End of An Era" or "An Honor to Know". When I sat down at the computer, it came easy. I was born late September of 1934 and like all Americans, men in the services were my heroes. No sports figures then. I knew the airplanes, the carriers, battle ships and most of the heavy cruisers by name and number of guns and of course, the difference between the blue and gold stars. I

helped my older brother carry papers and he and the other carriers knew it all. The first think we looked at in the paper was the box score in the lower left hand front page. Planes lost, ships lost and men lost. I can also remember being scared several times.

I first met Joe Kolac about 10 years ago at our condo and the friendship was slow in developing. He was single and my wife was sick. Early breakfast was a mainstay for Joe and we seldom joined him. Then he invited us to go to the American Legion, Post 125 with him and it soon

became a ritual. We would anchor the table while he would dance with every lady he could, even when his friend Dorothy was with him. When she was tired, he wanted to dance.

Joe could talk of his exploits in the war as he must have put the bad stuff out of his mind. There was the time he was carrying a BAR (heavy automatic rifle) and shrapnel hit it, ruining the weapon. All he got was stung hands. More than several times he had bullet holes in his coat and pants. Once he got shrapnel in his back, but did not go to an aid station where it would have been documented, making him eligible for the Purple Heart. After the war was over, he was shot in the hand taking a pistol away from a drunken soldier.

His favorite story was when their platoon was taking a farm house and his lieutenant sent him around to the rear. Kolac lobbed a hand grenade through the kitchen window, kicked the door off the reaming hinge, letting off a burst of automatic fire from his Tommy gun as he entered. "You know what I killed?" he would ask, almost in disbelief. After a brief pause, he would blurt out "A canary." He would then tell about the 15 Germans that came out of the cellar to surrender. Another of his stories was a German was going to shoot him but the gun was empty. Kolac captured him and returned to his lines. Kolac's lieutenant wanted to take the German back to the rear, but Kolac knew the lieutenant, "I captured him, I'll take him back." responded Joe. Joe's parents immigrated from Poland and he knew the history of Poland being invaded. Sgt. Joe Kolac was an honorable soldier, Joe Kolac was an honorable man.

Another of Kolac's exploits was, he was the first GI to enter Berchtesgaden (Hitler's hide away in the mountains). This fact cannot be disputed as he captured a German captain there, which is a matter of record.

Now you know why I did not know how to address the subject matter. He was "An Honor to Know" and Kolac is "Near The End of An Era." When I was a child, he was a hero, one I finally got to meet.



The US Postal Service is renewing their effort to drop Saturday delivery in order to save money.

Do you think they should?



Mike Levine, Gulfport: "Personally, it wouldn't affect me much; any mail I get on Saturday is usually bills anyway. I do all my banking online now; I've mostly gone paperless. I do get most magazines on the weekend, but I think with all the budget problems, the government needs to look at creative solutions to save money. By discontinuing Saturday delivery, I'm sure they could save a whole lot of money. On the other hand, people at the Post Office need their hours. I wouldn't want to take away their ability to earn their honest pay. They work really hard and their job is not easy. Everyone has to sacrifice something if we're going to get through this recession. Maybe this might be the least painful way to help do it."



Rob Hill, Gulfport: "I'm neutral; I don't care either way so I'm not too worried about it. All I get on Saturday are bills anyway. Obviously, I don't favor a rate increase, but I would be ok with mail delivery five days a week instead of six."



Mike Strait, Gulfport: "It's good to have mail on Saturdays. It keeps people working. Also it's nice to get a birthday card or a present on time, especially if it falls on a Saturday too. Otherwise, it would just hold it up. I guess postal workers need something to do on Saturdays; they need a paycheck like everyone else. Most people work during the week; they only have Saturday to get their mailing stuff done. As to the rate increase, obviously there are two sides to the debate. Gas prices go way up and people say "Oh No"! But they pay it, because it's a necessity. It's the same way with a postal rate increase. People may complain but in the end they'll pay it. One point though; most promotional mailings for stores are mailed to hit on Saturdays so the people can go out to those stores for the bargains. If they don't get those coupons and discounted ads, it may affect how they spend their money. Who wants to pay full price if there's a coupon for a discount on something? But if it doesn't come in Saturday's mail, the people may not go out and spend their hard-earned money."



Naomi Humphrey, St. Pete: "I would really miss Saturday delivery if it was discontinued. I still mail letters; I don't use a computer for any of my bill paying or banking. I don't trust them. It's not safe. Sure, a lot of Saturday's mail can be mostly bills. But I often send things out to relatives on a Wednesday so that it will arrive by that Saturday. Also, what if people have to mail me something important during the week? If it's not mailed early enough in the week, it will take longer to get there without the Saturday delivery. You know, a lot of people work 9-5 jobs during the week and Saturday may be the only day they can get to a post office to mail packages or letters out. I think it would definitely inconvenience them. But I know if I was a postal worker, I would enjoy a full weekend off. It's a lot of work, carrying around heavy bags of mail, dealing with the weather and people's dogs. As to the rate increase, I guess they probably need it. I mean, stamps go up all the time. But I would miss that Saturday delivery because I'm just so used to it."





The Beginning of the End of Puppy Mills?

What comes to mind when you think of West Hollywood, California? Swank hotels, celebrity sightings, organic meatless hot dogs and a famously gay population? Well, yeah. But this incorporated village in the heart of Los Angeles is also a strong and fervent leader in the prevention of animal cruelty.

In a unanimous decision last Tuesday, West Hollywood city council members voted to ban most sales of dogs and cats in the city's pet stores -- that is, "companion animal" stores. In 2002, WeHo city code was rewritten to replace "pet" with "companion" and "owner" with "guardian." And in 2003, it became the first city in the country to outlaw the inhumane practice of cat declawing.

In a city where you're much more likely to share a park bench with a dog than a child, none of this is surprising. What is surprising is that more places haven't done the same.

"The West Hollywood ordinance, which provides exemptions for 'humanely bred, reared or sheltered animals,' is the second of its kind nationwide," reported the LA Times. South Lake Tahoe passed the nation's first such ordinance last year. But support for this movement isn't limited to the West Coast.

At the time of this writing, the verdict is not in on Maryland Senate Bill 505, which would prohibit the commercial sale of puppies fewer than 9 months old. If passed, the bill will go into effect in October of this year. And West Hollywood City Councilman Jeffrey Prang told the LA Times that "his office had been inundated with calls from city officials across the country seeking advice on how to craft similar ordinances."

The urgent goal of all this legislation is twofold: 1) to put a stranglehold on the business of puppy mills and kitten factories, and 2) to encourage people to turn to local shelters and rescues when looking for their next companion animal.

According to Humane Society estimates, some 3 million to 4 million homeless dogs and cats are euthanized in the United States every year. Since the housing bust and the economic fizzle in late 2008, the nation's 3,500 shelters have struggled to stay afloat as donations and volunteers ebbed and the influx of dogs and cats swelled. The mass production of pets is the enemy of their good work.

Puppy mills and kitten factories are not referred to as such for no reason. They are large-scale breeding facilities that churn out animals like car parts. But hubcaps don't require TLC.

The products of this mass-breeding industry include sick animals with genetic defects that receive no healthy socialization and little if any veterinary care, and are subjected to unsanitary and often inhumane living conditions. Wayne Pacelle, president of the Humane Society of the United States, underscored the importance of this legislation, saying, "At the very time that we're paying for the pet overpopulation problem, we're allowing pet stores to continue the problem by churning out dogs from puppy mills."

Pet stores, along with unscrupulous brokers and illegal breeders, are the lifeblood of puppy mills and kitten factories. Cutting them out of the equation is like taking a scalpel to a malignant tumor -- a necessary first step to stopping the spread of a lethal cancer.

Said mother Sherry, "its hard at first, for the kids to see them leave when they get adopted, but fostering these dogs really teaches them a great sense of responsibility."

The 5th Annual Get Rescued event in Gulfport got off to a slow and rainy start last Saturday with many vendors throwing in the towel after a few hours of cold, steady rain. Event organizer Suzie King was overall still pleased with the day.

"After the rain stopped and the sun started peaking out, some of the vendors that had left came back and set up again. It was amazing, because people were still adopting animals from the beginning of the morning, even in the rain!" she said. King was in her usual "pirate mobile" with her new chocolate lab, Bud, by her side.

"Even though the crowd wasn't as big as last year, (the weather was better), I think we made an impact on the rescue community," King said.

Dogs of all sizes, shapes and colors, some wearing high fashion, some wearing old leather collars, strolled up and down Beach Blvd. There were birds and a few ferrets scattered among the crowd as well.

In a small circular wire pen, eleven year old Katelin and brother Ryan, eight, held two perfectly adorable dachshunds; rescues with the organization D.A.R.E., Dachshund Adoption Rescue and Education. Their mother, Sherry Hunter said that they had fostered ten others in their home in the recent past.

"My kids both understand that these are foster dogs; that they will get adopted to other homes. They had a little bit of a hard time at first, especially Katelin, who gets attached really fast. It seems to get easier for her with every dog. It may be a bit sad, but it's a great lesson for them. They have to feed, water and walk them every day. It teaches them responsibility," Hunter said with a smile.

Most local pet stores donated dog and cat food for the event, for families who need the extra help taking care of the foster animals. Some local families also benefited; they have their own animals and could use the extra help as well.

In all, King said the event was a success. It brought attention to the overwhelming issue of overpopulation caused by not spaying and neutering and the often dire consequences for the pets if they're not properly cared for.





ere's a dilemma for Tea Partiers: U.S. Senatorial candidate Marco Rubio, former Florida State Speaker of the House. How pure does he have to be and what is pure?

Rubio leaped ahead of Gov. Charlie Crist largely because of the support and enthusiasm of the Tea Party faction of the Republican Party (Tea Partiers are not restricted to the GOP, by the way). Young, fresh, experienced, dynamic and fiscally conservative, Rubio surprised the "Tve got-the-election-in-the-bag" governor who has come off lately as another business-as-usual easy spending politician.

The problem is that Rubio got caught misusing Republican Party credit cards as well as "mistakenly" spending \$3,000 of taxpayer funds while Speaker. His first response was to complain that Crist leaked the info to the press. Not good. The point is he got caught using someone else's money. Maybe it was just sloppy and not so venal. Maybe it was the result of sloppy fiscal controls of the party and the government.

Either way, this is not the behavior Tea Party people expect. I'm not making light of the Tea Partiers. I support their mantra of smaller, less intrusive government run by fiscally conservative and honest public officials. I attended the 9-12 "march" on Washington, and talked to 50 or 60 attendees. Most were fresh to politics, anxious for a different kind of political leader and angry in general of a perceived and felt government take-over of personal lives and wallets. Few were radicals. Most were just fed up.


Rubio benefited from this at the same time that Crist endorsed the massive \$787 billion stimulus (9,000 earmarks) bill. Rubio sprang into prominence and responded with a vigorous campaign. So, the new revelations are more than disappointing. The question is his image ruined or just scratched? Is this just a part of politics; are there none that are "clean"?

All in all, would he still be a better Senator than Crist? Oh, by the way, there will be a Democrat in the race. He's likely to be Kendrick Meeks from the Miami area. However, the stronger candidates are likely to be Rubio or Crist. In the meanwhile, what can we expect from the politicians? Are we too idealistic? Is the process itself a spoiler: raising money from many sources, promising certain results to get certain votes, being all things to all people, being part of a "gotcha" culture?

The big problem, of course, is that politicians are spending someone else's money. It's very easy to spend someone else's money. And, government spending is not so much about what we need as about what we want. That's a line that easily gets blurred by politician and the public alike as well as in our home budgets.

However, the fact is that government is a profligate spender in general. There are huge pressures to open the treasury for the "better good". Too often that means a special interest, or any interest that will get a vote. So, it is important that those guarding the money that has been forcibly extracted from us has to have some respect for that money.





Safer Crossing Sought On Blind Pass

ST. PETE BEACH- An electronic message board reminds motorists to stop for those trying to cross the street by the Sweetbay Supermarket on Blind Pass Road. The crosswalk is where a pedestrian was hit Feb. 22. Resident James Roberts is still in serious condition at Bayfront Medical Center. The crash remains under investigation. The police are waiting on lab results said Officer Robert Micklitsch. Resident Tom DeYampert who knows Roberts and mentioned the traffic accident at the Feb. 23 City Commission meeting and shared his concerns.

"That crosswalk is a problem. Its one of the most dangerous I've seen and I grew up in Los Angeles. You go out and push the buttons and drivers will drive right through the crosswalk. This is year round," DeYampert said.

The City Commission discussed pedestrian safety. They suggested continuing with sting operations, which is when one police officer poses as someone who is trying to cross the street and another officer will ticket motorists who do not yield to the pedestrian.

"I think we are going to have to continue with the sting operations, maybe (we can install) an island they can get to in the middle (of the crosswalk) where they can have a safer place (to wait). We need better lights. We need a much safer environment for them to cross that street," said Mayor Michael Finnerty.

"Gulf Boulevard is designed to move cars. Its not designed to move people walking and that's part of the problem," said City Manager Mike Bonfield.

Commissioner Beverly Garnett said the city should have crosswalks like those in Saint Petersburg.

Since 2005 St. Petersburg has tested and now has operational a rapid-flashing crosswalk system in 32 locations, which is effective 85 percent of the time in having a motorist yield to a pedestrian.

The system's manufacturer, The Enhancer, came to them, said Saint Petersburg's Manager of Neighborhood Transportation, Mike Frederick.

The new crosswalk system's technical name is RRFB or rectangular rapid flashing beacons. The signal's shape as the name indicates is a rectangle instead of a typical circular traffic signal. The signal transmits to the driver's eye level. The signal looks more like the shape of a flashing light on an emergency vehicle, Frederick said.

The rapid-flashing system is pedestrian friendly. The pedestrian can activate it with a push button. But if they don't the infrared system comes on by sensing the person's body and voice. The system evens gives the pedestrian instructions on how to cross the road, Frederick said.

The rapid-flashing system is designed for the specific location. The location of the posts, push buttons and orientation of the beacons has to be custom designed, Frederick said. "Each crosswalk location is unique, you have to modify the product."

The rapid-flashing system costs about the same as an amber light system (the type at the Blind Pass crossing) which St. Petersburg found is only effective 17 percent of the time in getting motorists to stop. The solar powered, radio-controlled system requires no wires, digging or power to install, Frederick said.

The rapid-flashing system gained federal approval in 2009 so anybody can use it. St. Petersburg even has one crosswalk site by Sunken Gardens that uses the system on a state road, Frederick said.

Four or five additional or modified crosswalks could come to the Gulf Boulevard/Blind

Pass Corridor. When asked if any of the crosswalks would use the flashing beacons like in St. Petersburg, Bonfield said the state was in the process of planning the upgrade and the city had not seen the details.

Bonfield said two years ago because the state did not have the funding, the city paid for the installation of the crosswalk on Blind Pass and the Don Cesar paid for the crosswalk near that hotel.

Save the Creamed **Carrots for Later**

Every new parent works toward the day when their child makes the leap from breast milk to complementary baby foods (the mushy stuff that comes in little jars). It's a sign of growth and development. A new study, however, cautions against rushing into baby foods, suggesting that delaying their introduction simultaneously extending breast-feeding may help prevent babies from becoming obese adults.

Danish researchers followed a group of individuals from birth to adulthood, noting how long they were breast-fed, when they began eating baby foods and what kind of weight gain they experienced through the years. They found that neither breast-feeding duration nor timing of complementary foods had a significant impact on body mass during childhood, adolescence or early adulthood. However, when volunteers reached age 42, the risk of being overweight decreased with the increasing age at which complementary foods had been introduced when the volunteers were infants.

For example, for each month the introduction of vegetables was delayed, the risk of being overweight at age 42 was reduced by 10 percent.

GET ME THAT. STAT!

The typical length of a patient visit with a general practitioner is 21.8 minutes. More than 133 million Americans (as of 2005) had at least one chronic condition, such as heart disease or diabetes. If a general practitioner were to provide all of the recommended preventive and high quality chronic care services prescribed under the current health care model to a typical patient roster, that work alone would require 18 hours per day.

STORIES FOR THE WAITING ROOM

If you're not already feeling sick waiting to see your doctor, consider this: People with migraine headaches may be at increased risk of heart attack and other risk factors for heart disease. The overall risk is small, but a study out of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York found that people who had migraines were about twice as likely to have a heart attack as people without migraines, or 4.1 percent of people with migraines compared to 1.9 percent of those without.

What Steps are Involved in the Probate Process? Part II

This Article is Part II in our review of the Florida probate process and follows our last feature on probate.

$\begin{array}{ll} {\bf 3.} & {\bf APPOINTING\,THE\,PERSONAL} \\ {\bf REPRESENTATIVE} \end{array}$

The court authorizes a Personal Representative to administer the deceased's estate. A Personal Representative, also called an executor/executrix, assumes the responsibility for closing an estate as soon as possible in an effort to distribute the estate's assets to those

who rightfully inherit them without delay. This person is critical to the probate process.

Personal representatives have a legal obligation to perform their duties honestly and efficiently. The heirs to an estate can hold a Personal Representative personally accountable for harming the estate's financial standing by neglect or deliberate action.

A will typically names the deceased's choice for Personal Representative, and Probate Courts will normally honor this choice. When no will exists, or if the Personal Representative named in the will declines to serve or cannot serve, the court has the authority to appoint a Personal Representative Once the Personal Representative is appointed, the Probate Court recognizes the Personal Representative's authority to act on behalf of the deceased's estate. The Court issues a document, called "lettersofadministration," identifying the Personal Representative as the estate's official representative. Personal Representative can show

this document to a bank officer, for example, to gain access to a checking account.

Needless to say, the Personal Representative should be a trusted family member or close friend who will act to carry out the wishes of the deceased.

A person who decides that he/she does not want to be a Personal Representative can decline the appointment. Aback-up, or successor, Personal Representative is then appointed. Similarly, if the Personal Representative feels that the job involves more effort than one person can handle, the Court may appoint a co-Personal Representative.

4. INFORMING THE AFFECTED PARTIES

The Personal Representative is responsible for formal notification and the publishing of public notices in newspapers to inform potential heirs and creditors about the probate proceeding. After giving notice, waiting periods follow. Creditors, heirs, and others can file their claims against the estate during these periods of time.

If you are looking to go out for one day only, you can choose the Daily unlimited ride GO card which is valid for one day of unlimited rides. The Regular fare is \$4 and the reduced fare is \$2. YOUR HEALTH COULD BE AT RISK!

What Global Warming?

I'm writing this in the midst of yet another snowstorm, with a few inches still piled up from the last one. Many people have taken this opportunity to wag their fingers and say, "What global warming?!"

Pulitzer prize-winning columnist Thomas Friedman coined the term "global weirding" last week to replace the misleading phrase "global warming." While the Earth has warmed a degree, and is projected to warm quicker than natural over the next century, most of us are not feeling very warm today.

Our weather is indeed weird, with massive snow in the South and rain at the Winter Olympics in Canada. Australia is having a record 13-year drought, and Texas ended a drought this winter with massive snowstorms. As a matter of fact, Texas got snow this year before New York did.



What does all this prove or disprove? Nothing. "Climate is what we expect, and weather is what we get," according to NASA. We have only been collecting data on weather for the past 100 years, and trends in climate are measured in thousands of years. A single weather event -- like a hurricane, or a spell of unusual weather; like snow in Texas -- may be unprecedented but still within the "normal" range.

What is actually happening to our climate is right in line with predicted climate change models. Some parts of the earth are experiencing drought, while flooding happens elsewhere simultaneously. Storms are more severe, summers are hotter, spring comes earlier and polar ice is diminishing.

Many old-timers in my region of New York remember waist-high snow drifts and ice skating to school on frozen rivers. We haven't seen a REAL severe winter in a while if you talk to those who actually lived through them. Some of us tourists (residents who haven't lived here 20 years yet) quake in fear at the thought of a Nor'easter.

Whether one actually believes in human-driven climate change or not has become irrelevant. The truth is that we all have to eat and breathe, and both things are becoming more difficult as our population swells and resources become tight. If you care about clean air, water and food security, then we have enough common ground to rebuild our country with green energy and localized economies.

We sorely need industry in our country, and unfortunately, most of it has been outsourced overseas. Renewable energy, energy efficiency, cultural tourism and other similar industries are the only ones that can't be completely outsourced because they are place-based. You can't wrap up an apartment building and send it to China for weatherization. That is something that has to be done here, by a trained local person.

Friedman writes: "I suspect China is quietly laughing at us right now. And Iran, Russia, Venezuela and the whole OPEC gang are high-fiving each other. Nothing better serves their interests than to see Americans becoming confused about climate change and, therefore, less inclined to move toward clean-tech and, therefore, more certain to remain addicted to oil."

Let's stop debating each other and actually do something for a change. Let's get America back on her feet and into the green millennium so that our kids and grandkids stand a chance. Support renewable energy, and move our country away from imported oil. Create jobs here by supporting small local businesses and farms.





Additional Exemption for Low Income Seniors

If you are over 65, and received homestead exemption, may be eligible for an additional property tax benefit. The Low Income Senior Exemption is a "local option" exemption, which means the governing bodies of the county and cities can choose whether or not to offer it, and they can choose how much of an exemption to offer, up to \$50,000. Currently, it is available to qualified property owners in unincorporated Pinellas and 20 of the 24 municipalities, and is in addition to any other property tax exemptions owners receive. Only the county Municipal Services Taxing Unit (MSTU) millage or the city millage is exempt. Cities not offering the exemption include Belleair, Belleair Shore, Gulfport and South Pasadena.

To qualify, at least one homestead property owner must be 65 years old or older on January 1, 2010; the applicant must receive a Homestead Exemption; and the total household income for 2009 must be \$25,780 or less. Social Security income is usually not included in that amount because the income calculation is based on "adjusted gross income" as defined by the IRS for federal income tax purposes. Those seniors who are not required to file with the IRS because their income is very low almost always qualify.

This exemption does not automatically renew like the homestead exemption does, but reapplying is simple. If you received this exemption last year, a renewal form will be mailed to you in late January. Just complete the form and return it by mail.

If you have never applied for the Low Income Senior Exemption but believe that you qualify, come to one of their offices to complete an application. Bring proof of age, such as a driver License, Voter ID, or Birth Certificate. We will also need to see proof of income. If you are required to file a Federal Income Tax Return (Form 1040 or 1040A), bring the completed form for 2009. If you are not required to file an Income Tax Return, bring income documentation such as your end of year bank statements, pension summaries, or any other income summaries you received for 2009. Only 2009 income information can be accepted.

The supplement included with Homestead Exemption Renewal Receipt lists additional dates and locations where representatives from our office will take applications.

The deadline to file for this exemption is March 1, 2010. If all of your income information is not available by that deadline, apply anyway! The deadline to supply income information is June 1, 2010.

I know. As is the case with almost anything when you get right to it, it comes down to feces. Homeowners don't like crap in their yards or paw prints on their hoods. OK. That's fair. But if that's fair, then what are we gonna do about all those birds flying around? Huh? I'd sure like to see a law against finding their crap on my windshield and I'm sure I gather the signatures for a petition....

I read that Gulfport is also agonizing over what to do about those pesty RV's in the neighborhood. What offends folks about them? Is it their size? If so, what about SUV's? Are some in

disrepair? There's a lot of old beat up cars that are registered with four inflated tires in driveways that are more of an eyesore than a trailer. Do we need a law about paint jobs on our vehicles? You don't have the right to dictate what you see when you look out your window unless you can afford to buy up the block.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Arf! Arf! Barking up the Right Social Security Tree

Q: I made an appointment to talk to someone at my local Social Security office about filing for Social Security benefits. All I wanted was general information to help make plans for my future retirement. But she tried to talk me into filing for Social Security now, telling me it could work to my advantage. I was so baffled that I left the office more confused than I ever have been about Social Security.

One part of the mystery is she kept using a term that I swear sounded like a barking dog! Something like "ruff." Can you help? Here are the particulars of my case. I just turned 62 in January. Even though I cut back my work hours, I am still making about \$45,000 per year. My Social Security benefit estimate at age 66 is \$2,200. My rate at age 62 would be \$1,650.

A: ARF! ARF! ARF! And no, that's not a dog barking. It's a little known quirk in Social Security law that has benefited millions of beneficiaries over the years and could work to your advantage, too.

ARF is Social Security Administration jargon for "adjustment to the reduction factor." It's a policy that requires your reduced retirement benefit to be refigured at age 66 to give you credit

for those months when you did not get a Social Security check because of your work and earnings.

Here's another way to look at it. If you take reduced retirement benefits at age 62, that benefit would come with a 25 percent early retirement penalty. And normally, that reduction is permanent, staying with you for the rest of your life. But if you are still working between age 62 and age 66, your earnings could cause you to forfeit some of your monthly Social Security benefits. (The law says that \$1 must be deducted from your Social Security benefits for every \$2 you earn over \$14,160 per year.) And for any month you don't get a Social Security check because of your excess earnings, the ARF rule says you cannot be penalized with an early retirement reduction for that month. So, when you reach age 66, they adjust your benefit (i.e., raise the amount of your monthly Social Security check) by removing the reduction factor for the months involved.

Now we'll get even more specific with an example using the information you provided.

Let's say you take Social Security at age 62. Your initial reduced retirement rate is \$1,650 per month, or \$19,800 in Social Security benefits per year. But according to the earnings penalty rules, from that amount we'd have to deduct \$15,420 -- or one-half of what you earn over

the \$14,160 Social Security income threshold. So, you would only be due \$4,380 in Social Security benefits for the year. (\$19,800 minus \$15,420 equals \$4,380.)

In other words, because of the earnings penalty, you would get only two full Social Security checks and one partial check for the year. And let's say you keep doing that until age 66. Once you reach age 66, the earnings penalty goes away and you would be due all your Social Security checks. That means you would collect eight full Social Security checks and four partial Social Security checks between age 62 and 66. And when you reach age 66 and the ARF rule kicks in, your ongoing benefit will be refigured. Instead of the initial 48-month early retirement reduction resulting in a 25 percent penalty, you will have only an eight-month reduction resulting in a roughly 4.5 percent penalty.

Finally, let's look at your Social Security options.

Option One: You could wait until age 66, and at that point begin receiving \$2,200 per month.

Option Two: You could take benefits at age 62 with an initial 25 percent reduction and be due \$1,650 per month. But because of the earnings penalty rules explained above, you would only receive eight full Social Security checks and four partial Social Security checks between age 62 and 66, totaling \$17,520 (or \$4,380 per year times four years). And at age 66, your monthly benefit would be adjusted to an ongoing rate of about \$2,100 per month.

Option Two (the ARF option) looks pretty attractive to me. You'd get \$1,520 in Social Security benefits you would not get in Option One. And with an ongoing Social Security benefit rate that's only \$100 more per month, it would take you a long time to make up that difference if you waited until age 66.

I say you should bark up that age 62 Social Security tree!

Do not become a victim, statistic or the subject of a search and rescue. Be prepared for unforeseen, challenging and potentially dangerous events on the water:

Always have plenty of fuel and remember the 1/3rd Rule: Use only 1/3rd out, 1/3rd back and you should never run out of gas.

Start out with a charged battery and back-up when possible.

Always file a Float Plan with someone who cares and cancel it when you get back.

Do not go out in bad weather or when it is threatening. Keep a weather eye and go home before you need to do so.

Always have the required U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) equipment in good working order and not outdated: USCG approved life jackets for each passenger that fit properly and wear them, appropriate fire extinguishers that work, visual distress signals (flares, etc.), navigation lights that work properly, an appropriate anchor with sufficient line and a marine VHF radio that works.

Always appoint a lookout to help watch for other boats, crab traps, shallow water, etc.

Always carry sufficient water/gator aid to prevent dehydration, hypothermia, and sunscreen to prevent burn.

Do not boat under the influence.

Drive safely and carefully at a reasonable speed based on the conditions at the time.

Activity-Related Leg Pain Could Be a Sign of Heart Disease

If you routinely experience leg pain while walking, you shouldn't dismiss it as just a muscle cramp or a joint ache. It could be a sign of peripheral artery disease, a serious condition that affects approximately 10 million Americans.

Peripheral artery disease, or PAD for short, is a condition in which narrowed arteries impair blood flow to the limbs, particularly the legs. When the leg muscles don't receive enough oxygen-rich blood to keep up with the demands of exercise, pain is often the result.

Activity-related leg discomfort caused by PAD is known as intermittent claudication, derived from the Latin word meaning "to limp." It is characterized by muscle pain or cramping in the legs that is triggered by exercise, such as walking or climbing stairs, and disappears after a few minutes of rest.

The location of the leg pain or cramping corresponds to the narrowed artery. Although PAD-associated leg discomfort may be felt in the thigh or the buttock, the calf muscle is most commonly affected.

In some cases, the affected leg or foot may feel cold, weak or numb. Individuals with PAD often notice changes in skin color and toenail growth, as well as a loss of hair on the feet and lower legs.

As the condition progresses, the pain may become more intense and unrelenting, even at rest. Infections and slow-healing sores may develop on the legs, feet and toes.

While the pain and visible changes may be limited to the lower extremities, PAD is considered a red flag for circulatory problems that are far more widespread.

The narrowing of the arteries that occurs with PAD is caused by the accumulation of fat, cholesterol and other inflammatory substances in the blood vessel walls. Unfortunately,

this process isn't limited to the arteries of the legs -- it often occurs simultaneously in the blood vessels leading to the heart and brain.

Narrowing of the arteries that supply oxygen-rich blood to the heart and brain can lead to heart attack and stroke. A growing body of scientific evidence suggests that a significant percentage of individuals with PAD also have coronary artery disease, the most common type of heart disease and the leading cause of death in the U.S.

Risk factors for PAD and heart disease are the same: smoking, high blood pressure, high cholesterol levels, diabetes and advancing age.

If you have signs or symptoms of PAD, your doctor can perform several noninvasive tests to diagnose the condition. A physical examination may reveal telltale signs, including a weak or absent pulse or a lower blood pressure reading in the affected limb.

Ultrasound imaging may be used to evaluate blood flow to the limb and identify narrowed arteries. For some patients, physicians may recommend angiography, a test that involves injecting contrast dye into the blood vessels so that narrowed or blocked arteries can be identified using X-ray or other radiologic imaging techniques.

When narrowing or blockage of an artery is identified, treatment may involve angioplasty, a procedure in which a hollow tube, called a catheter, is inserted into an artery

in the groin and then guided to the affected area. There, a small balloon on the tip of the catheter is inflated to flatten the blockage and widen the artery so that blood flow is increased.

The specialist performing the procedure may also insert a mesh tube, called a stent, in the artery to help hold it open. In more severe cases, surgery may be necessary.

For some individuals with PAD, prescription medications are recommended to improve blood flow and lower blood pressure and cholesterol levels. Almost everyone with the condition can benefit from positive lifestyle changes, starting with switching to a heart-healthy diet.

If you smoke, quitting is the single most important step you can take to reduce the progression of the disease, and for folks with diabetes, maintaining good control over blood sugar is critical. People who smoke and those with diabetes have the greatest risk of PAD-related complications that can necessitate limb amputation.

Regular exercise is a key component in the prevention and treatment of PAD. Success of treatment is typically measured by how far patients can walk without experiencing leg pain.

If you have activity-related leg pain or other symptoms of PAD, it's time to take them seriously. Early diagnosis and treatment can improve the health of your limbs, and it might even save your life.

Gulfport: Celebrating 100 Years

The first settlers came to this isolated corner of the peninsula just after the Civil War. To survive, they fished and farmed small plots of land hacked out of the palmettos and pines. With no roads or bridges, contact with the outside world was made only by boat, and that was irregular and undependable. There was hope for a time that the railroad would make the tiny town a terminus, but St. Petersburg was chosen instead. In the early 20th century, however, a trolley line was built, running directly to the waterfront along today's Beach Boulevard and bringing with it new residents, tourists, and trade.

By 1910 the settlement had grown to more than the 25 registered voters required to petition for incorporation, and that they did, establishing a town and naming it Gulfport. The mayor and council borrowed \$100 under their own names and began the long struggle to develop this unique community. Over the last 100 years, Gulfport has suffered the devastation of a major hurricane and a great Depression, entertained bootleggers and moonshiners, and lost its boys to war, but through it all has always risen, buoyed up by the spirit of its citizens. Today it is known throughout the area as a very special place, full of art and history, unique individuals, and charming homes, restaurants and shops.



Confederate Troops Claim Victory against Yankees at Ft. DeSoto

This time, the South won. If not the war, then at least part of it. The Battle of Ballast Point played out on the green at Ft. DeSoto last Saturday afternoon as reenactment actors dressed in period dress recreated the battle with all the gusto of true Rebels and Yankees. A large crowd was treated to booming cannon fire, muskets flashing smoke and hand to hand combat with swords as the two forces clashed.

The battle looked and sounded so authentic, you could feel the ground rumble as the cannons were shot off; a loud, raucous blast followed by belching columns of smoke that wowed the crowd. Some soldiers fell where they stood; "shot dead". In the end, the Confederates took five Union soldiers as prisoners of war.

The Battle at Ballast Point was precipitated when two Confederate blockade running ships, owned by the future mayor of Tampa, James Mackay, were burned by Union soldiers in a raid as they advanced up the Hillsborough River. The battle actually happened just outside of Tampa, with the Union soldiers hell-bent on capturing as

many blockade running ships as possible. They also wanted to destroy the rebel salt works operations, which dried sea salt to be used for curing provisions that could then be sent to Confederate troops all across the South.

The US Navy had an outpost Egmont on Key, comprised mostly northern sympathizers and caretakers for the Egmont Key Lighthouse, which was used spot Confederate ships bringing guns and provisions to the city of Tampa.

Confederate soldiers were not limited to just men; women donned guns and swords to fight for the South as well.

Point as a landing and pickup point for the soldiers who had helped destroy MacKay's two large ships. Several Confederate troops, who had escaped capture on those ships, alerted troops in Tampa that the Union soldiers would be staging a pickup of some Union troops on Egmont Key. Confederate soldiers hid in the woods and fired on the Union militia, wounding ten, and killing three and taking five prisoners. Both sides claimed victory; the Rebels because they had caused the Union soldiers to run to their ships. The Union considered it a victory for the North because they had achieved their main objective; to destroy two of the most active blockade running ships for the South.

Everyday Cheap\$kate

Uncovering the True Cost of Prepaid Debit Cards

Dear Mary: I have opted out of my credit cards, but I may have to travel in an emergency, so I need a card for this purpose. I am looking at Walmart's MoneyCard (http://www. WalmartMoneyCard.com). What's the best secured credit card or money card for this purpose? -- Joe, e-mail

Dear Joe: The Walmart Money Card you mention, which is a reloadable Visa prepaid card, works like a debit card. However, instead of drawing

money from your bank account when you make a purchase or get cash from an ATM, it draws down the money you have loaded onto it. As far as prepaids go, it is probably one of the most reasonable. Even so, you will be charged a gamut of fees -- a \$3 issuance fee, \$3 to reload, \$2 for each ATM transaction, \$1 for each ATM balance inquiry and a \$3 monthly maintenance fee, among others. It all adds up and comes right out of the balance you have remaining on the card

If you decide to go this way, you will be able to use the MoneyCard to

purchase an airline ticket, but you could run into problems trying to rent a car or hotel room with it. That's because both car rental agencies and hotels put holds on funds in excess of the actual charges when you pay with a debit card. That easily could amount to an additional \$500 or more. If you do not have enough money on the card to cover the hold, the card may be denied. And if you do have enough, the hold may not be released for days, perhaps even a week, after your stay. That could really mess up your trip because you would not have access to the money you loaded onto the card.

In my opinion, a credit card is a much better tool for travel. You can make a credit card work just as you would this Walmart MoneyCard. Here's how: When you anticipate traveling, simply make a payment in advance to your credit card account in the amount you will need for the trip. This will create a credit on your account. Then any charges you make for your airline ticket, car rental, hotel and so on will draw down the credit until it reaches \$0. There should be no fees and no interest, as you will not be creating any debt. Car rental agencies and hotels will not place holds on those funds because you will not be using a debit card. A credit card does make for a fabulous tool for the financially mature person who knows how to use it and maintain it without ever creating debt or incurring fees.

I suggest that before you make a decision, you read the Walmart MoneyCard Cardholder Agreement, which is on the Web site. It is 13,433 words of fine print. (In comparison, this column is about 500 words.) That fine print deserves your attention.
