# Brown and Vincent plan to seek election to Sasser's LBTS mayoral seat

**Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** -- Two commissioners have announced their plans to run for mayor in the March 13 election here.

Mark Brown, now serving as vice mayor, and Commissioner Chris Vincent will be vying for the seat. Mayor Scot Sasser recently announced he will not be a candidate for reelection to a third term.

Brown is in the second year of his second four-year commission term. He plans to resign from the seat to run for mayor. As a result of that move, three commission seats will now be up for election, two in the north end of town and one in the south.

Vincent is wrapping up his second four-year term on the commission and can't run for commissioner, but can run for mayor.

Brown said he fully expected Sasser to run again. In that case, they would both have been term limited in 2020, and Brown planned to run for mayor then. Sasser's move expedited Brown's timetable.

"It's Politics 101," he said. "It's easier to win with an open seat than to run against an incumbent."

Brown said he enjoys the service side of the commission job. He

# Hillsboro Beach turns to private firm for building and code enforcement services

Hillsboro Beach – With little discussion, city commissioners agreed this week to terminate the contract with Broward County for building and code enforcement and to hire a private firm, Calvin Giordano.

The move is projected to net the town \$43,500 this fiscal year and was recommended by Town Manager Mac Serda who said the quality of service being given by the county is not "up to a standard appropriate for the town."

Calvin Giordano [CGS] provides

building and code personnel to several nearby cities including Deerfield Beach. The town will piggyback onto the Deerfield's contract with the company.

"This is a no-brainer," Vice Mayor Irene Kirdahy said. "A 100 percent improvement."

Norm Bruhn, a principal of the 80-year-old company, said the focus is to become a "team member" in Hillsboro Beach and he has the staff to do that job with consistent service, improved technology, "platinum" permitting and visibility.

# Purchase of chamber building for \$550,000 gets approval from CRA Board

Deerfield Beach- In an historic move, the Community Redevelopment Agency Board has approved the purchase of the chamber of commerce property for \$550,000. The 3,800 square-foot building was built for the chamber in 1961 by developer Bob Sullivan, one of the first modern buildings in the area.

CRA Director Kris Mory said the acquisition has been in discussion with the chamber's building committee for some time. The price, she said, is

## Proper maintenance of storm water comes at a cost

**Deerfield Beach** – Levying new taxes to support the city's storm water system is being considered by city officials.

**Environmental Services** Director Tom Good is presenting such a proposal at public meetings around the city. It recommends an additional \$4 a month fee on residents' water bills; \$1.70 for condominium dwellers. He plans to bring an ordinance before the commission next October and if approved a new storm water utility district will be established in 2019.

Good made his first presentation at last week's city commission meeting. An educational campaign to alert the public on the proper care of storm drains began a month ago on the city's web and

With the funds raised by the new fee the city can:

- Provide better flood
- Improve water quality in

canals

- Provide funds for dredging canals
- Build better storm water infrastructure
- Preserve the eco system in

regard to water recreation

• Provide the money to develop a strategy to address sea level rise.

Residents may also get a break on flood insurance premiums once the district is in place and Good said the results of the tax could improve property values.

The utility district will provide dedicated funds to improve the health and safety of residents, he said. Currently, money is taken from the road and bridge fund for storm water projects.

The new taxing district is not a surprise. City Manager Burgess Hanson has made references to the need for it at budget discussions for at least two years.

The monthly rates are set according to a formula that involves the amount of



# Commissioners in LBTS give Bentley high praise

Lauderdale-By-The-Sea - Town Manager Bud Bentley received glowing

reviews Tuesday at his annual evaluation.

In a rating system of 1 to 5, with 4 being "more than satisfactory," he received scores of 4-plus from all five commissioners.

#### Scores:

Mayor Scot Sasser . . . . . . 4.88 Vice Mayor Mark Brown . . . . 4.41 Commissioner Chris Vincent . .4.95 Commissioner Buz Oldaker . . . . 4.93 Commissioner Elliot Sokolow .... 4.83

Bentley's contract requires a written performance evaluation annually and that the commission discuss the evaluation.

"The town manager is doing an excellent job," Sasser said, adding that Bentley exceeded expectations during the recent hurricane and staff did fabulously. "Bud was always there when needed," Sasser

The manager shows much improvement and is open to new ideas and different solutions, Sasser added.

"Department heads do an excellent job. He is quick to complement and acknowledge others. Bud, at heart is a problem solver. This is one of his many strengths," Sasser

In achievement of stated goals, Sasser said simply, "Bud is awesome."

Vice Mayor Brown said, "Bud is always very straightforward with me.

I like to think outside the box and come up with new ideas to solve problems or create new opportunities for the town. Bud listens and never hesitates to give me an honest opinion, even where he disagrees with me or sees where I haven't thought things all the way through. I appreciate his feedback and honesty."

Brown said he is looking forward to working with Bentley on the El Mar Greenway project. "He will be a strong leader in working with FDOT [Florida Department of Transportation], the commission and town residents."

Commissioner Buz Oldaker thanked Bentley for bringing him up to speed. "He's taught me a lot, and he's tremendously accommodating," he said.

In his written report, Oldaker suggested "greater attention should be given to particular agenda items that may be more complicated, giving commissioners more time to fully understand any particular issue prior to receiving agendas on Friday. He praised Bentley for how

# Commission supports Powerline Road project

Oakland Park -- In a unanimous vote on Wednesday, commissioners approved a resolution supporting a Powerline Road narrowing project funded by a federal TIGER grant.

"This is an extrordinary opportunity for the city to be business friendly and create a safer road," City Manger David Hebert said, in introducing the resolution.

With the resolution approved, the proposed project can move on to Florida Department of Transportation to complete final design and begin construction.

The project calls for reducing lanes from six to four on Powerline Road from just south of Oakland Park Boulevard to Commercial Boulevard. It also includes adding a five-foot bike lane and landscape buffer between sidewalk and bike lane.

"It's intended to promote safe passage for bicyclists and pedestrians," said Albert

Carbon, public works director. "The project will result in improved aesthetics and encourage investments in the area," he said.

No changes are planned in access points, but the speed limit will be reduced from 45 to 40 mph.

No reduction is lanes is planned for 1,200 feet as drivers approach and leave the intersections with Oakland Park and Commercial Boulevards.

Cost of the project is \$1.3 million with the city paying half and the rest paid for with TIGER grant funds.

The city spent \$97,000 on preliminary design work in March. Construction would occur from 2019 to 2021.

"What we have heard for years is Powerline Road is ugly, it's not safe. We're losing businesses there," said Commissioner John Adornato. "I'm disappointed that some residents don't feel this is part of the beautification and improvement of Powerline Road."

He said the federal grant was approved because Complete

Streets projects are effective in providing safety, beautification and helping with development.

Community members had concerns about traffic backup at major intersections; Adornato said he shares those concerns. "The intersections are terrible, but it's not the corridor between. More needs to be done with those intersections, but this middle section [of Powerline] doesn't affect that."

Newly installed Mayor Tim Lonergan, vice mayor Sara Guevrekian and Commissioners Michael Carn and Matthew Sparks all said they were also fully in support of the Powerline project.

Guevrekian said she was pleased to see that as a result of residents' concerns the distance was increased from 750 feet to 1250 where lanes would not be reduced near the major intersections.

Three residents addressed the commission urging them not to approve the resolution or the project.

Jeff Helyer, president of the Lloyd Estates Neighborhood Association, noted, "By reducing lanes and speed, you will increase congestion and frustration and give a handful of bicyclists a false sense of security."

Helyer said that at every informational meeting, there was almost universal opposition to the project. "That should guide your decision. Powerline Road is not the place for this project. The road is severely congested."

Former mayor Steve Arnst said that at the same time Broward County is talking about increasing sales tax to widen roads, this city is looking at narrowing Powerline Road.

He urged the commission to reject the TIGER grant and give the money back. "Infrastructure should be your No. 1 initiative," he said. "Take that \$600,000 and put it into generators for lift stations. Three hurricanes, and the power goes out and sewers back up. Make sure the lift stations have generators. My neighbors are livid with the city, and I can't blame them."

# ArtServe offers a wide-range of cultural experiences from the visual to the intellectual, it's a 'worth the trip' adventure

Fort Lauderdale - Broward County's least known cultural facility may be ArtServe, a place that offers fulfillment from dance classes to violin lessons to art exhibits to workshops on how to succeed in the business of art.

The 25,000 square-foot building on US 1 just north of Sunrise Boulevard houses a county branch library, an auditorium that seats 150, a 4,000 square-foot art gallery, a dance studio, board room,

working space for artists and a full-service business center for non-profit organizations. Among the non-profit tenants are the Stonewall National Library, Gold Coast Jazz Society and the Ft. Lauderdale Rotary Club.

Its stated purpose is to "empower artists and cultural entities to achieve their vision."

It all began when Broward County instituted the Broward Cultural Affairs Committee. A three-year \$150,000 grant from the National Endowment of the Arts seeded the concept of ArtServe.

Now, it is financed by a combination of government and private sector grants, sponsorships and donations, leases, gallery and gift shop sales, memberships, curating off-site galleries and

collaboration with events such as the Great American Beach Party.

Shelly Bradshaw, chair of the ArtServe Board of Directors and operations manager at the Broward Center for the Performing Arts, says it does just that.

"It's hard to describe its impact," Bradshaw said. "We

It is also a place to go for a good time.

Since he became general manager of ArtServe one year ago, Hal Axel has restructured the programming to create "constant activity."

A look at the calendar confirms this.

A monthly art exhibit opened last month with 60 artists showing 120 works of art. Titled "True Colors," it can be viewed online giving the public a chance to vote for their favorite.

Open Mic Night is on the fourth Tuesday; Teen Mic Night the fourth Friday.

At the W Hotel, in the cocktail lounge on the fourth floor, a reception on Wednesdays, 8 to 11 p.m. showcases the new work of ArtServe members.

ArtServe is a partner at the Men of Style event held at the Galleria where a dozen menabout-town model fashions to raise money for charity. That event features pre-party cocktails at Trulocks and an afterparty at Blue Martini.

In a new music room, piano lessons are in progress and ukulele classes will begin soon. Axel has also added acting/comedy classes, writing and publishing workshops.

and informative, i.e. yard fertilizers account for one-third of the excess nitrogen in the waterways.

# Changing health insurance providers saves nearly \$200,000

Wilton Manors – United Health Care will provide insurance benefits to city employees in 2018 after submitting what some commissioners believe was a controversial low bid.

Maureen Pentland with Employee Benefits Solutions, the city's insurance broker, was on hand to present the bids at Tuesday night's commission meeting.

For the 2018 renewal, the bid solicited quotes from Cigna, United Health Care, Blue

Cross, and Symetra.

According to Pentland, "for the first time in many years, the city received a rate pass (0% increase) from its current health insurance provider, Cigna. The city also received a competitive bid from United Health Care that is significantly lower than its current premium."

United Health Care's bid was a 15.30 percent, or \$197,868.24, decrease, according to Pentland.

Blue Cross Blue Shield's proposal would result in a 4.84% increase and Symetra's proposal would result in a 2%

increase.

However, she said that both plans do not offer the same level of coverage as the options presented by Cigna and United Health Care.

Commissioners did express some concerns about going with United Health Care's bid.

Commissioner Scott Newton questioned the motives.

"Are they trying to get us hooked in now, so we get bit later?" he asked.

Commissioner Julie Carson made a motion to stay with Cigna, which was echoed by Commissioner Tom Green.

"I'm very happy with the current situation," Green said.

However, Mayor Gary Resnick said he questioned whether it was prudent to walk away from such a decrease in rates especially

"This is madness," Commissioner Earl Maucker said. "If there is a way to get out of this, we should."

Lighthouse Point has a long-standing agreement with Pompano to maintain the Intracoastal Waterway park. FIND retains the right to use the beach area to store dredged material from the waterway.

In 2015, FIND began a park rehab that removed the non-native invasive plants and planted native resilient plants, mulched the nature trail and increased the sodded area from one-half acre to more than two acres.

Now, Public Works Director Chuck Schramm said the weeds are taking over the slower growing plants and major weed control needs to be done. Another new expense will be the annual replacement of 115 cubic yards of mulch as well as more tree trimming.

He estimated the cost to maintain the 5.4 developed acres in the park this year will be \$187,000. The annual budget in the past has been about \$40,400.

Exchange Park is included as open space in the city's land use plan, but that acreage may not be needed to fulfill the covenants of the plan - three acres for every 1,000 people living in the city.

Planning and Zoning Administrator Michele Mellgren said taking figures from the 2010 census, it appears the city doesn't need the park acreage and can accommodate 700 more residents with its current open space. At 31 acres, the city now has a surplus of two acres.

Should the city decide to give up the park, it probably could not be reclaimed in the future, Mellgren said, but developers could be tapped for open space contributions if a large project is ever proposed.

Mayor Glenn Troast called the new costs "very sobering," and asked the commission for direction. "Do we negotiate [with Pompano Beach] or are we done?"


Commissioner Mike Long said he walked the park with City Manager John Lavisky. "The nature trial is wetlands 80 percent of the time and the invasive species are taking over. They [Pompano Beach] want a pristine park... it was meant as a nature area.

"See what it takes to get out of this. At the end of the day, our residents will still have access ...It's an open park."

Vice President Jason Joffe urged negotiation. "There may be a way to come to terms. The mayor [Fisher] is a standup guy."

Said Maucker, "Let the mayor know the city commission is shocked. Unless there is a constructive discussion this [the ILA] won't fly."

Commissioners urged Mayor Troast to initiate those discussions with Mayor Fisher and he agreed.



Elsewhere there are classes in fitness, jazz dance, ballet and violin, philosophy and meditation sessions, photography workshops and acting/standup coaching.

"Not everyone is ready to exhibit their art," Axel said. "Here, they can learn their skill as well as learn how to be successful in the art business."

Axel came to ArtServe from his position as executive director of Cinema Paradiso and the Fort Lauderdale Film Festival.

One of the things he has done to give exhibiting artists exposure is to integrate the main gallery into private events booked in the auditorium. Now when 200 people gather for an event, the reception is in the art gallery. "We want our artists to be seen. That's part of our mission," Axel said.

"Our aim when renting our spaces is more about exposing people to the art that is here," he added.

ArtServe also curates art exhibits in other locations around the county such at the "W" Hotel, Holy Cross Hospital, the Atlantic Hotel, the Urban League, the Ft. Lauderdale Chamber of Commerce and at South Side School, soon to be opened as a cultural center.

An enhanced feature during the holidays will be the Art-Serve Gift Shop which is always stocked with items made by local craftsmen, but this year will have new inventory and be well promoted.

Axel says one of his frustrations is hearing people say they have driven by ArtServe hundreds of times not knowing what is being offered there.

"Just stop in. There is always something going on," he said.

for being reported and even fired."

Another said, "Females accepted mental and even physical abuse from men. Oh, we resented it, but if you expressed a negative response, you heard something like, 'You brought it on yourself.'I'm thrilled that women are fighting back publicly."

"A white WASP society was in power. Businesses actually used percentages to show that they were inclusive and hired a certain percentage of Jews, blacks, Catholics That has changed thank heavens."

"We must expect and even demand accountability from those we voted into power. It's becoming more difficult to get through to legislators who are not directly responsible to us geographically. When I try to reach a congressman or senator from another state, I don't even get a response."

"It takes generations to accept and even understand change," someone offered.

"Our grandchildren have

# Cardinal Gibbons wins in Orlando; moves on to Rockledge

For the second time in three weeks, Cardinal Gibbons suffered a knockdown only to get up and earn a knockout victory.

The Chiefs did it to Dillard (a 36-6 victory) late in the regular season. This time, with its playoff life on the line, Gibbons overcame a quick one-touchdown deficit by scoring 20 points en route to a convincing 43-30 victory over Orlando Jones in Friday's second-round game of the FHSAA Class 5A postseason.

The Chiefs (10-1) will travel to Brevard County to take on Rockledge (7-3) in the round of 16. A victory will

likely earn them a rematch against district rival American Heritage, which defeated the Chiefs 23-19 in the game that decided the district championship

"American Heritage, by winning districts, gets to stay at home so we've had to become road warriors," Gibbons Coach Matt DuBuc said. "We have to be the team with energy getting off the bus. I believe we're peaking and we're relatively healthy."

One Chief who is definitely hitting his stride is kicker Griffin Serra, who made all five of his field goal attempts with kicks of 47, 48, 25, 38, and 45 yards.

"He was the reason we kept the (scoring) momentum going," DuBuc said. "There was a point in the game where we scored on seven straight possessions. To get at least three from each drive demoralized them."

Jones (9-2) scored quickly on an 80-yard pass from scrimmage for a 7-0 lead. Two weeks earlier, Gibbons suffered an early touchdown by Dillard before pulling away to a 36-6 victory.

"Just like the Dillard game, it was a wake-up call for us," DuBuc said. "Our guys did a good job of coming right back and scoring (a 47-yard field goal) on our first possession.

"The defense then forced them to punt and we started to get on a roll after that."

Nik Scalzo threw the first of his two touchdown passes to Lavontae Decius on a 17-yard score to give the Chiefs their first lead at 10-7. Gibbons scored twice more in the quarter, including a 50-yard Tavontae Decius reception as the Chiefs stretched their lead to 24-7.

Scalzo finished with 14

completions in 21 attempts for 195 yards and no interceptions. Gibbons, in fact, committed no turnovers.

On the ground, the Chiefs' Vincent Davis and Tajai Davis combined for 177 yards, including a five-yard score by Davis.

Gibbons managed to control the clock, running 77 offensive plays in the game.

Defensively, DuBuc was pleased with the play of his line

"Khris Bogle, Evan Loesel, and Trevis Robinson did a good job of providing pressure and harassing the quarterback," DuBuc said. "They made it easier for the secondary to make the plays they had to make."

In addition to the five field goals, the special teams were able to recover a surprising on-side kick during a first half in which the Chiefs led 34-17.

# Grant could pay for Colohatchee boat launch

Wilton Manors – The city will apply for a 2018 Recreational Trails Program grant for a public boat launch at Colohatchee Park. The launch would be constructed adjacent to the existing parking area on the west side of NE 15th Avenue.

The grant requires between a 20 and 50 percent match. Staff intends to request 80 percent of the project cost (\$135,000), requiring a match \$35,000 from the city. Staff will seek alternate funding or budget for this item in the next fiscal year.

The Colohatchee Park repurposing focus group determined the boat launch was one of the top three highest priority elements for the park.

# Streets eligible for federal monies

Wilton Manors – City commissioners expressed their continued support for complete streetscape improvements to NW 29th Street between Powerline Road and Andrews Avenue at its meeting Tuesday night.

The city first applied for a \$1,500,000 grant through the Metropolitan Planning Organization in 2016, according to Leisure Services Director Patrick Cann.

According to Cann, "The MPO Complete Streets and other localized initiatives program affords local governments the opportunity to apply for federal funds for multi-modal transportation projects that may include pedestrian and bicycle facilities and general roadway safety improvements."

As designed, the project includes lane narrowing and the creation of bicycle lanes on both sides of the roadway. No local match is required for this program.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) will be the agency responsible for the design and construction of the project.




A visitor might find volunteers relieving security at the front desks or working in the Village Mart, a convenience store, offering



Building permits on average are issued in Deerfield Beach in seven days for large projects and as few as two days for small ones, Bruhn said. The length of time to obtain permits has been an issue in the town.

Bruhn also promised the company would be present following hurricanes. A situation following Hurricane Irma that had commissioners questioning safety issues was at the Seabonay, an oceanside resort that suffered wall, window and roof damage. Bruhn said he had already visited the site and determined the roof and building have been secured.

The financial arrangement will return 15 percent of revenues to the town as well as a small surcharge. Currently the county keeps 100 percent of the revenues raised from permit and code fees.

For the first year of the new contract, the county's fee schedule will stay in place, Serda said, but he suggested a review of those fees the next year.

As soon as the town officially announces its intent to terminate the county, CSG will begin the transition Bruhn said.

#### Shuttle running three days a week instead of five

Hillsboro Beach - The town's free shuttle service has been reduced from five days a week to three, a savings of \$11,000. A public hearing held Tuesday drew no comment from either the audience or the commission except for Mayor Deb Tarrant's request that the driver keep a log of the ridership at each stop.

The bus makes a loop from town hall to Pompano Beach, up US 1 with stops in Lighthouse Point and Deerfield Beach. Tarrant said residents of those towns take advantage of the service, but Hillsboro Beach pays for it.

The shuttle bus will operate Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

#### Project will cause water outages Hillsboro Beach -

Residents living within the first phase of the water main replacement project can expect interruptions in water service in the coming weeks. Addresses affected will be 1169 to 1239 Hillsboro Mile and the interruption in service may be six to eight hours.

When service is restored,

residents will get a "precautionary boil water" notice, which will be in effect for 48 hours.

"The goal is service interruption for four hours," consulting engineer Peter Moore said.

The start of the project, to replace the town's water main, has been long delayed. Completion is now set for May.

#### Town sets time limits for home construction

Hillsboro Beach-

Commissioners adopted an ordinance Tuesday designed to move along construction projects. The proposed ordinance was altered on second reading on the advice of builder Bob Mayer who said the time frames as written were too tight. "I would add six months in every category," Mayer said, "and longer if a

subterranean garage is being built."

The categories were adjusted from 12 months for the smallest homes to 18 months, 24 months, 42 months and for a home larger than 12,000 square feet, an additional month for every additional 1000 square feet.

For the largest structures, another six months construction time will be allowed for underground garages.

Mayer has pointed out in the past that building custom homes is prone to delays because the homeowners make design changes. "This [the ordinance] will actually help . . . clients may answer my questions quicker," he said. And Mayor Deb Tarrant said this measure is not meant to penalize, but "to keep things moving."

# Marine committee dissolved; chair blames **Sunshine Law**

The commission will not appoint any new members to the Marine Advisory Committee, effectively ending that board's tenure.

The committee was formed three years ago to investigate matters concerning the beach and waterways and bring recommendations to the commissioners. This week Mayor Deb Tarrant said chairperson Rene Males had resigned and that the board had had trouble achieving a quorum.

Florida's Sunshine Law also makes it difficult for the board to operate, Tarrant said. Members are prohibited from discussing board business except at official meetings so matters are slow to move forward.

Commissioner Vicky Feaman said, "I hate to lose their input. They have helped us make decisions. They are an informed group."

Males said the board had only three regular members when he resigned and two alternates. He is the first and last chairperson and said he resigned "because it is so difficult to be productive." The Sunshine Law, he said, is "a huge part of the problem."

Without Males, the board did not have a quorum. Town Attorney DJ Doody said by not naming new members, no further action was necessary.

Seat 2 in District 2 is held by Vincent, who is term limited for that seat.

Although commissioners represent specific districts, they are elected by all the voters.

when the commission struggles to keep taxes low.

"This translates into a quarter of a million dollars. This is a way to lower taxes," Resnick said. "I don't see a reason not to switch. It's not normal practice for these companies to bait and switch. We haven't used Cigna for that long. I can't discount saving our taxpayers a couple hundred thousand dollars."

"They're the same type of product. It's too attractive for me to ignore," he said. "We should be committed to saving as much money today."

Flippen went on to say that it is the responsibility of the city commission to be fiscally responsible whenever possible.

"I can't believe that United Health Care has presented us with an illegitimate claim," he said. "We have to look at any avenue of cost savings that we can. We've done our due diligence to our employees. Now I have to do that with the tax payers."

Ultimately, Commissioner Carson withdrew her motion to stay with Cigna.

Commissioner Green said he still wasn't convinced.

"I suspect that this is really great this year but it's going to hit us next year," he said.

\$20,000 below the average taken from three appraisals done in 2016.

She said the chamber, located at 1601 E. Hillsboro Blvd., was identified in 2011 as a key property for acquisition. Since then Sullivan Park, which abuts the chamber, has been redeveloped as a nautical destination with splash fountain, picnic areas and boat docks.

The board unanimously approved the terms of the sale giving Mory the go-ahead to bring the sale to contract and closing.

The sales agreement gives the chamber the right to lease the property for \$1,300 a month for up to a year.

Chamber Executive Board Chair Kirsten Charlson said a search team is looking for a new location and is considering size, parking, accessibility and visibility. The building committee that negotiated the CRA contract was composed of Rick Jorden with JM Family; Betty Masi, Seawood Builders; and banker Dave Mirantz.

Zoned for community facilities, the property can be used only for churches, fire stations, government facilities, libraries, museums and the like.

Tuesday, the CRA board presented some ideas for the future of the site.

Board member Todd Drosky said he favors a link with FAU to develop a marine biology program to tie in with the city's marketing efforts to present Deerfield Beach as a nautical destination. "They can study sea turtle and beach groins in Deerfield Beach," Drosky said. "Make it not just a visitor's center."

Member Gloria Battle agreed with the nautical research but cautioned that FAU's track records at FAU Boulevard has not been good. "They have not done right by us," Battle said. The university has controlled acreage along I-95 and the boulevard for 10 years, earmarked it for research and development. Little progress has been made

thora

Battle said a two-story building on the chamber site could include a visitor's center and a community room.

Vice Chair Joe Miller who represents the neighborhoods around the site said, "I've been wanting this for a long time." Miller favors demolishing the old building and building a multi-story one. It could house a nautical museum on the first floor, CRA offices and research facilities on the second as well as a community center. "We should be open to a lot of great things there," he said.

Resident Marge Hilton pointed out that the chamber is

in an historic building which might be preserved, but Board Chair Bill Ganz countered, "It is historic, but would be limited in its uses. A community center is a dire need."

As the motion to proceed with the sale passed, Ganz said, "This is kind of historic. This is a big deal."

The chamber has been in transition for years after pulling out of an economic decline. Currently, it lacks an executive director but has an increasing membership and this week again hosted the State of the City networking session that highlights the economic growth here.



# Cop faces charges after being fired by Wilton Manors Police

Wilton Manors – A former Wilton Manors police officer is charged with submitting forged documents when he applied to work for the department, according to the Broward state attorney's

office.

Douglas Dickinson is being charged with submitting a forged or false instrument for allegedly providing two letters and a form he said were from his former supervisor at the Camden County Police Department.

He worked there for three months but was fired after it was discovered he was convicted of simple assault prior to his hiring.

Dickinson, 27, was fired by Wilton Manors Police Chief Paul O'Connell in April, just seven months after he was hired. Dickinson was

still on probation, O'Connell

Dickinson surrendered himself to the main jail in Broward County and was released after posting bond.

Chief O'Connell said he was limited on what he could say regarding the investigation, other than to confirm Dickinson did work for the department and was terminat-

"Mr. Dickinson was a member of our police department and was making approximately \$52,000 per year," he said. "He was terminated for failing to meet probationary standards. Subsequent to his termination, the police department presented an investigation package to the State Attorney's Office in which it was alleged that Mr. Dickinson produced forged documents during the application process."

More than 70 vehicles have been targeted for their air bags in the month of November throughout various cities in Broward County.

Investigators believe thieves are selling the air bags to body shops in the black market, pocketing hundreds of dollars. According to the National Insurance Crime Bureau, the body shops in turn place fraudulent claims to insurance companies for the cost of new air bags.

So far this month, there have been 13 vehicles burglarized in Tamarac, nine in Weston and around 50 more in Deerfield Beach. The latest car burglary spree took place Monday, Nov. 13, at the Crystal Lake apartments in Deerfield Beach, where approximately 20 vehicles were broken into and the air bags

Thieves are targeting large apartment complexes to burglarize a large number of vehicles in a short period of

time. They are keying in on Honda Civics and Accords as well as various Acura models. They tend to break the windows or pry the door locks in order to gain access. In some cases, they have also stolen the rims and wheels from certain cars.

Detectives say awareness is key in preventing these types of crimes. Park vehicles in well-lit areas and as close to foot traffic as possible. Contact your apartment complex or neighborhood management company to make sure they're aware of this crime trend so they can remain vigilant and share it with your neighbors. If you spot suspicious activity, contact your local law enforcement agency to report it.
