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Firefighters Are Everywhere, Protecting The Beach Population Night and Day

When the alarm rings at the Pensacola Beach Fire Station, an emergency is usually happening. And no one, not even Santa Claus, stands in the way of their immediate response to their calls.

If a 911 call should come in during the annual Christmas parade while firefighters are proudly transporting Santa Claus, they would drop him off and head to the scene of the emergency. Once they receive a call, everything else falls to second place. And they do get calls. Beach

not the least of which are medical emergencies. "We are fortunate now to have

firefighters respond to all 911 calls,

an ambulance on call on the Beach," Paul McCleary, firefighter on the Beach since the 1980s, said. "We used to have to wait for one to arrive."

Sometime in the 1950s, a volunteer fire department was started on the Beach. By February 2000, there were two career firemen at the station from 7 to 4, Monday through Friday. Volunteers covered the other hours. Less than a year later in December 2001, the entire staff consisted of all full-time firefighters.

They work twenty-four hour shifts, and then have two days off. Getting to be a firefighter carries rigid requirements with it. They must complete classroom and physical training, before they can apply for the job. There are two academies in Pensacola where stu-

dents finish the course in about six months. Beach personnel must take additional training to be prepared to respond to events at high rises and water rescues.

Training never stops. Every Monday night the Beach members and other firefighters have a training session on the Beach. All personnel must also pass annual training and agility tests and pass a physical.

So, why do firefighters ask to be assigned to Pensacola Beach?

"The Beach is unique in many ways," firefighter John Houk said. "The mentality on the Beach is having fun. We have more partiers than other beaches, so we have a different set of challenges."

Assignment to the Beach

gives firefighters a unique responsibility and since Hurricane Ivan, they have faced other differences like being homeless. They have worked from The Hilton, part time in the old Fire Station, a travel trailer, the Comfort Inn, and finally in 2005 a modular home which was delivered to them on the Beach.

"We are really looking forward to our new digs," Houk said. "The completion date has been extended a couple of times but we hope to be in before the spring season."

Right now equipment consists of Engine number 13, two four wheel drive trucks and two wave runners. After the new building is complete, a new ladder truck will be delivered to the Beach.

Although emergencies are their priority, the Fire Department has always found time to become involved in community events. They have always been involved in the Christmas parade, and at one time, built their own float, a sleigh. For years, the fire truck with Santa Claus traversed the Island throwing candies to the children. Before the Beach began to celebrate Christmas, the Santa Claus on the fire truck was the only visible public Christmas event.

Many people would not remember the Firehouse Five, a choral group who wore their red coveralls and Santa hats to entertain at the Sandspur Republic's Christmas on the Island.

"We had a lot of fun with that," McCleary said as he recalled carols with his buddies, Matt Drees, Sean Harris, Rick Ruminski, and John Savelli, Jr.

The have made presentations at Leaseholders meetings, the Woman's Club, and Pensacola came when they deloused the stowaways in the Krewe of Wrecks Mardi Gras court. A highlight of the program will be the presentation of the somber Empty Chair ceremony which honors all Americans still unaccounted for from World War II. the Korean War, Vietnam War and other conflicts

The placing of the POW/MIA flag on the empty chair is a reminder to spare no effort to secure the release of any American prisoners from captivity, the repatriation of the remains of those who died bravely in defense of liberty, and a full accounting of those still missing. The Beach American Legion Post will direct this ceremony.

Local Guardsman Represents All Veterans

Master Sergeant Matt Drees is a symbol of American veterans. He has been serving his country for 15 years in the military. He was on active duty with the Second Armored Calvary Regiment when he went to Desert Storm/Shield in 1991 and went back with the 256th Infantry Brigade Combat Team from the Louisiana National Guard in 2004 and 2005 for Operation Iraqi

Currently, Drees is serving with Task Force Gator in the National Guard. He is the Operations Non Commissioned Officer in Charge of Task Force Gator which supports the New Orleans Police Department.

"We are not deploying again until early 2010," Matt said. "But there is a lot of work to do since TF Gator is drawing down."

Gator has 250 soldiers and airmen working 24/7 in three different districts in New Orleans.

Matt Dress who grew up on Pensacola Beach is from a military background. His dad, Morrie, who now lives in Gulf Breeze, was a

Navy Commander and aviator. Morrie founded the Pensacola Beach veterans parade in the 1980s.

Matt works four days in New Orleans and spends weekends with his wife and children in Gulf Breeze.

The Pensacola Beach Elk's Lodge, the Island Times and the entire Beach community rest easy, knowing the Country is still well protected by dedicated military men like Matt Drees, who is symbolic of all the veterans who have bravely fought American wars.


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GOODBYE TO ANN

1 cup sugar

out clean.

3 Tbsp. milk

1 tsp. vanilla

1/4 to 1/2 Cup good Bourbon Melt butter in 1 quart Saucepan over medium heat, add remaining ingredients, except vanilla and Bourbon. Cook, stirring constantly until sugar is dissolved and mixture begins to boil. Remove from heat, stir in vanilla and bourbon. Let cool 10 minutes before serv-

THE RIGHT INGREDIENTS

Chefs are not likely to use cooking sherry and other so-called cooking wines in their recipes. They use better quality wines, instead. With this in mind, when a recipe calls for a dry white wine, try a domestic Sauvignon Blanc, which is dry and fresh with a hint of herbs. If the dish has a bold or spicy flavor, reach for Gewurztraminer, Rielsing or Voignier. On the other hand, when a dry red wine is called for, lean toward big-bodied red Zinfandel or Petite Syrah for long-cooked casseroles and stews. For less hearty dishes, try a Merlot or a Chianti (Sangiovese grape) from Italy. Then again, some wines simply match certain foods flavor for flavor, like Pinot Noir and sautéed mushrooms.

HINT: Fortified wines such as port, sherry, Madeira, and marsala provide a great deal of flavor to dishes that call for cooking wine.

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SRIA Ponders Jumping Over Obstacles in the Path Of Island Improvement

The Board of the Santa Rosa Island Authority knows it is facing some jagged bumps in the road as it proceeds to find a way to put an extreme makeover on the Beach's landscape. Speaking at their October 22 meeting, Richard Lott, Escambia County bond attorney told the Board, "This is a fairly complicated arrangement. You will have to adopt a resolution approving this and create an interlocal agreement with the County that will ask the County to get a loan, promising that the SRIA will pay it back." Lott was referring to the

Island, per an agreement with Portofino. The original agreement includes a sum of \$3.5 million to be spent on Island beautification. Portofino has excess lease fee payments which will go into a fund to pay for improvements. This plan would take about ten years to ma-

Authority's plan to beautify the

ture before any steps could be taken. The SRIA wants it to happen now and is seeking a means of making it happen.

The SRIA wants the County to borrow the \$3.5 million, and the Authority would guarantee repayment, which would come from Portofino lease fees. The SRIA cannot issue bonds or take out a loan, so they must ask the County to take out the loan.

Right now, the County Commissioners appear to be reluctant to acquire new indebtedness although the payback would come from the SRIA.

"Your obligation to the County would be to make payments so the County can pay the debt service to the loan," Lott said. "The money would come to you from Portofino. If for some reason, the Portofino money did not cover it, then it would come out of your lease fees."

Lott added that County Attorney Alison Rogers says the County staff is concerned by the plan.

Bob McLaughlin, County administrator, who attended the meeting said, "The County is very reluctant to approve anything that would create any more debt."

Tammy Bohannon said it was her impression that the County Commission does not want to do this. "Securing a loan of this amount with the future excess lease fees from Portofino which could fall prey to hurricanes, liens, and we still have an irrigation issue. These are what I understand to be some of the challenges."

Lott recommended that the SRIA get together with the County Administrator before going to the Commissioners with their request.

Vernon Prather moved to task Buck Lee, SRIA executive director, to work with engineers and get costs to bring to the next SRIA committee meetings scheduled for November 19. The motion passed unanimously.

The SRIA moved along from the Island Beautification dilemma to the development of the core area. They are considering doubling the bridge toll as a means of funding the massive project.

Lee told the Board that the only way to secure the funds is by increasing the toll. He said charging \$2 will bring in an additional \$2.5 million per year.

"You will have to find three votes on the Board of County Commissioners to raise the toll,"

Tammy Bohannon said District Four Commissioner Grover Robinson is reluctant to approve an increase in toll.

"This is a bad time to do this," she said. "But, I think it would be a stimulus to the area. I urge each of you to speak with your Commissioners."

Ed Guernsey noted that as a bargaining chip the SRIA should offer a part of the revenue to be used to renourish the beaches of Perdido Key.

"If you want the County to approve this toll, you give the money to the County to pay for Perdido Key renourishment. If you want to get it done, you let the County have part of the revenue," Guernsey said.

Lee told the Board they should be on the County's agenda in December or January so they can get a commitment from the BCC. You need to say, "This is what we want to do."

Robert Rinke, Portofino developer, told the Board that the toll raise is controversial. "The development on Pensacola Beach at \$40 million is also controversial," he

The toll increase will be discussed again at the November 19 committee meeting. It is possible that the Board will ask to be on the agenda for the BCC Committee of the Whole meeting on December

Money matters continued to dominate the remainder of the meeting when the Board once again discussed ways to reduce the costs of legal services to the Board. The Board is considering adopting a flat yearly fee for attorney's services.

Although Lee and Committee member Fred Gant and Guernsey favor the flat yearly fee, Vernon Prather prefers the hourly system they now have.

A motion was made to ask staff to prepare a Request For Proposals for legal services and bring it to the next committee meeting. The motion passed, two to one, Prather against, Thomas Campanella and Guernsey for.

On a good note, Dottie Ford, director of finance, told the Administrative Committee that revenues through August were up by \$500,000 and expenses were down \$531,000. She was commended for

The next meeting of the Santa Rosa Island Authority will be the Full Board at 5 p.m. today, November 5 at the Authority Office. Meetings are open to the public.

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Bridge Pass Rules Change - No January Grace Period

The procedure for getting bridge passes for your vehicles has changed this year. Primarily, there will be no grace period in January. All passes will expire as of December 31. Passes are now available as follows:

REGULAR RENEWAL: Renewals at the Santa Rosa Island Authority office require a completed application, cash, money order or check made payable to the

Credit cards and debit cards are not accepted. You will receive

EXPRESS RENEWAL: Submit completed application with payment, annual transponder number and vehicle tag number to any toll collector in any open lane, day or night, or drop off at the SRIA office. Check or money order will be the only acceptable payment, made payable to the BCC. Your cancelled check or money order will be your only receipt.

MAIL IN RENEWAL: Re-

newal much be received by the SRIA prior to December 31, 2008. No cash should be mailed and credit or debit cards are not acceptable. Mail application and check to Bob Sikes Toll Bridge, 415 Pensacola Beach Blvd., Pensacola Beach, FL 32561

New annual passes can be purchased at the SRIA office beginning Monday, January 5. Provide an application for each vehicle and check for each. Payment may be made with cash, check or money order. Receipts will be given.

The SRIA office will be open January 5 through January 31 from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Beginning February 1, hours will be 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The cost of annual passes is never pro-rated. The fee for vehicles, automobiles, and motorcycles is \$50 for residents living both on and off the Island. Commercial passes are \$70. All vehicles displaying markings or advertising including magnetic or roof top advertising signs are classified as commercial.

Annual passes must be installed on each vehicle by an authorized SRIA employee.

The important dates to remember are that renewals will be available from now through December 31 and 2008 passes will expire on December 31.

Q: "How can I make Internet use safe for my kids?"

A: The most obvious ways are to limit their access and observe what they are doing. You can set up parental controls on your computer to limit access to certain areas of the Internet. Parental control software will provide reports that give you the ability to observe their computer activities without looking over their shoulder. The downside --- you have to take the time to monitor it. It is a good idea to keep the computer in a central area of the house if you do plan to look over their shoulder.

Young children should be given rules about using the Internet, to include not giving out personal information, either to others or by filling out forms on the Internet. Also, you should require them to tell you when anyone on the Internet tries to set up a telephone call or a meeting. If your child has an online profile at MySpace or Facebook, make sure you know how to look at and approve its content.

You can become more aware of how your children use the Internet by becoming more savvy about the lingo and the software that they use. Instant Messaging is a popular form of communication, with its own foreign language. Use the Internet to find lists of the abbreviations that are commonly used in conversations.

Last but not least, if your computer has a webcam, make sure you know how and when it is being used.

There is a new section 403.7033 in town. It became part of the Florida Statutes when Governor Charlie Crist signed it into law. What is it? It is the Energy, Climate Change and Economic Security Act of 2008.

The Department of Environmental Protection will perform an analysis on both local and statewide regulation concerning bags consumers use to carry products from a store after shopping.

What is this the precursor to? Possibly, enacting regulations, and you guessed it, a tax on using retail bags. Now, I do know that some large health food stores give a small discount for each bag a person brings to use for groceries. Beach residents had an opportunity to

grab to reusable shopping bags for free at the Santa Rosa Island Authority Office last month.

Why is this analysis needed and what will it determine?

You have probably already seen the ads and notices heralding the official arrival of Fall: "Flu Shots Available." Perhaps you have already been immunized this month or perhaps you are thinking maybe you'll skip it this year. As a physician specializing in primarily natural means of disease prevention and wellness, I am often asked whether I recommend the flu shot. You may be surprised, but the answer is a resounding "yes!"

Flu Truths

True flu or influenza is a very serious illness. Some think of it as an inconvenient winter nuisance that can keep you out of work or make you feel rotten for a week or two, but that is not overly worrisome. Unfortunately, nothing could be farther from the truth. Hospitalizations due to influenza are an astronomical 226,000 annually in the United States alone. Additionally, we have an average of 36,000 U.S. deaths each year from influenza.

Flu Shot Fallacies

The most common complaint I hear against being immunized is that, "I took the flu shot once and it gave me the flu." Fear not, the flu shot does not cause the flu! However, some people may not feel well for 2-3 days following the flu shot, this is due to your on bodies immune system ramping up and responding to the antigens that it "sees" as the flu. There is one form of flu "vaccine" that actually can give someone the flu and that is the FluMist, because it is a live virus vaccine. Flu shots, however, are not live and do not cause the

Other concerns center around the preservative. Typically, the preservative used is thimerisol, a mercury-containing compound. Many people are sensitive to thimerisol and some patients have problems with mercury, and those patients likewise should avoid thimerisol-containing vaccines.

Another common concern is "I got the flu shot and it didn't keep me from getting the flu." This may occur. The flu shot is the most common predicted strains of flu for the upcoming season. Since it is a prediction, sometimes it is wrong. However, even when wrong, it still helps our immune system prepare to fight that type of virus.

More commonly, a severe cold may be mistaken for "flu." There is an easy test your doctor may be able to perform in the office to determine whether you have flu or another viral illness. This can be very helpful information. Especially since influenza will respond to the new anti-flu medications, such as Tamiflu*, especially when started early in the disease course.

For a quick home assessment to determine whether you may have flu instead of a cold, consider that flu usually has very sudden onset, may be accompanied by prominent headache and muscle aches. Patients with flu typically suffer from extreme exhaustion and run fever, which is sometimes very high. Flu may also present with gastrointestinal symptoms as well as some upper respiratory symptoms. Whether a cold or flu, if symptoms are concerning to you, the best course of action is to see your doctor for a full evaluation.

There are other steps you can take this winter. The CDC recommends we all "Take 3": (1) take time to be vaccinated, (2) take everyday preventive measures, like stringent hand-washing and avoiding sick contacts, and (3) take prescription anti-viral drugs if recommended by your physician. 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

The other day my son came home from school with a family project for Spanish class. The assignment was to shop at a local supermarket that carried a wide variety of Hispanic foods. We had to buy eight different items and prepare them for dinner. I was so excited. I kept thinking this is my kind of homework assignment margaritas, chips and salsa, tacos, guacamole, black beans and rice, and churros for dessert. Then I read the fine print: "Try to select eight foods that you have not tried before." Since there are not too many Hispanic dishes I have not tried and there is a reason why I have not tried some, I immediately translated the "you" to mean child, not parents. So off we drove to el Mercado and without spending too many pesos, we returned home to prepare our little fiesta.

We began with appetizers -Fritangas or fried wheels. They
tasted a bit like salty Styrofoam.
Based on the ingredient list, they
may have actually been derived
from the same chemicals that make
up expanded polystyrene foam.
The serving size was one ounce or
about seven wheels. I think something must have been lost in translation because the entire bag
weighed nine ounces and I know
we ate more than 63 wheels. We
had enough Fritangas left over for
at least 100 more pit stops.

Our main meal consisted of beef empanadas, Loroco's flowers, hominy and Spanish style yellow

rice. Our frozen beef empanadas were nowhere near as good as the señora's at the third taco stand on the left on Avenida Revolucion in Tijuana, Mexico. I thought we were all a little loco to eat Loroco's flowers. In fact, I was concerned we all might pop positive on a surprise urinalysis, but they weren't half bad and tasted like asparagus tips wrapped in jasmine. The yellow rice was the brunt of all bad yellow snow jokes and it gave me great pleasure to watch my son eat enlarged grits. Maybe some day I would convince him to eat the real thing with butter, salt and pepper. And as much as I wanted a margarita, I sipped on my guanabana nectar and kept thinking that it might have actually been palatable if it were served over ice in a salt-rimmed glass with a shot of tequila. For dessert we devoured Guatemalan sweet bread dipped in mango jam (mermelada de mango) and drank hot cocoa made with Mexican chocolate. I must admit, this was quite delicious.

As we sat by the fire and listened to Latin jazz musician Tito Puente, I started to converse with my son in Spanish. We quickly ran out of things to say after introductions, greetings, numbers, days and months. It's a beginning. At least I know he understands gracias and por favor and who knows maybe one day he will be able to comfortably order food from street vendors in Mexico. Until next time


