All Eyes On The Skies, The Angels Are Overhead

Air Fills With Music And Maneuvers This Week

It's hard to imagine getting chills on a warm July day on Pensacola Beach, but it happens. The sight of the world famous Blue Angels soaring across the sky coupled with the roar of the F/A-18 engines thrills and chills. The chills are accompanied by awe, waves of overwhelming pride and sheer delight during Red, White and Blues Week, July 8-12.

The air above Casino Beach is filled with musical notes during the week's kick off concert, hosted compliments of the Santa

Rosa Island Authority. Guests may bring beach chairs and coolers to hear the rock and roll beat of Touch of Gray at Bands on the Beach from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Gulfside Pavilion, Tuesday, July 8. They will get the crowds tuned up for the events which follow.

Have Breakfast with the Blues on Wednesday, July 9 when the Navy's Flight Demonstration Team performs their Circle and Arrival maneuvers at 8 a.m. over the white sands of Pensacola Beach.

This aircraft, which is piloted by the United States Marine Corps aviators, flies support for the Blue Angels. After several impressive passes over the cheering crowds, Fat Albert's powerful engines head for the hangar and the Blue Angels jets scream across the horizon.

A Blue Angels flight demonstration showcases choreographed refinements of skills possessed by all Naval aviators. It includes the graceful aerobatic maneuvers of the four-jet Diamond Formation, in concert with the fast-paced, high-performance maneuvers of its two solo pilots. The team illustrates the pinnacle of precision flying, performing maneuvers locked as a unit in the renowned, six-jet Delta Formation.

The spectators are entertained from noon until 2 p.m. by an impressive list of civilian pilots Friday, July 11 in a dress rehearsal for Saturday's premier performance. Pensacola Beach's hotelier Julian MacQueen will fly his Grumman Widgeon G-44. Look for Skip Stewart in his Prometheus, acrobatic Team RV-8, Gary Ward in his MX2 and Boeing Stearman flown by Roy Kinsey to turn the skies above Pensacola Beach into an aerial circus of maneuvers.

Here's a few other things to know about:

Blue Angel's facts:

- · An estimated 12 million spectators view the squadron during air shows each year.
- This year, the team is celebrating their 25th year of flying the F/A-18 Hornet.
- The highest maneuver performed in an air show is the vertical rolls performed by the Opposing Solo, up to 15,000 feet and the lowest maneuver performed in an air show is the Sneak Pass, performed by the Lead Solo at 50 feet.
- The fastest speed flown during an air show is about 700 mph (just under Mach 1; Sneak Pass) and the slowest is about 120 mph (Section High Alpha).
- The basic acquisition price of a single F/A-18 Hornet is approximately \$28 million.
- The F/A-18 can reach a speed approximately Mach 1.8, almost twice the speed of sound or about 1,400 mph.
 - An F/A-18 weighs about

24,500 pounds empty of all ordnance and aircrew.

• The smoke is produced by pumping biodegradable, paraffin-based oil directly into the exhaust nozzles of the aircraft where the oil is instantly vaporized into smoke. It provides a traceable path for spectators to follow and enhances safety of flight by providing a means by which solo pilots can see each other during opposing maneuvers. It poses no hazard to the environment.

Your Arrival Maneuver:

Come early. Plan to stay all day. Parking is free in the public areas and fills up fast. Residents will tell you, ride the trolley, bike or walk to the show site. Good advice. Special Trolley service begins at 7 a.m. on Friday and Saturday with multiple trolleys to whisk you where you need to go. The regular trolley route will be extended to Park East, located a mile east of Portofino. Two busses will be added on Saturday. Transportation to Park East ends at 6 p.m. After 6 p.m., there will be two trolleys running the regular route until midnight.

What To Bring:

A load of patience and a cooler full of water. Sunscreen and snacks. Beach chairs and umbrellas. Beach businesses will be open and serving before, during and after the show.

Keep Your Cool:

The Gulf is open for swimming under the watchful eye of the Pensacola Beach lifeguards except during the air show performances. All other water remains available for swimming – after all, this is an island. There will be a giant water mister set up at the Casino Beach.

Stay hydrated. Officials stress the importance of water all day long. The Krewe of Bananimals will be selling ice cold bottled water to benefit the Santa Rosa Kids House.

Helpers:

If you feel the effects of the heat such as dizziness, headache or worse, trained staff is on site to help. Pensacola Beach Lifeguards and emergency medical personnel are plentiful and will know just what to do.

Hear ye, Hear ye:

Bonnie and David McDonald bring the power of Boogie, Inc. to the Air Show. Everything from weather announcements,

lost children and the officialsounding Blue Angels narrators will be broadcast to the spectators through their speakers. They let you know when the Gulf closes to swimming and give the all-clear to get back in. At the conclusion of the Blue Angels performance, in a moment of pure patriotism, crowds pause to listen to the national anthem. The American flags fluttering in the beach breeze make a perfect ending to a great day.

Friday Only:

The Baptist Hospital sponsored skin cancer check station, affectionately referred to as The Mole Patrol, will operate on Friday, July 11 from 8 a.m. to noon. Let them look you over.

Show Central:

Pensacola Beach Chamber coordinates a mini-marketplace under the oversized white tent. Shop. Sip. Grab a bite. Dog House Deli, Repici's Italian Ice, Santa Rosa Kid's House Ice Cold Water, Jean & Gean's Lemonade, Caroll's Corn Crib, Dixon Shaved Ice and Tin Tin Oriental Food are stocked to serve refreshments.

United States Marine Corps recruiters are a big hit with young and old offering prizes to strong armed visitors at their chin-up bar. Look for the giant inflatable Marine. Navy pride soars with a number of kiosks, lots of free stuff, too. Search and Rescue helicopter will land in the western parking lot.

Float My Boat

The waterways around the island are packed with vessels. If you plan to boat, arrive early. The U.S. Coast Guard vessel will serve as centerpoint out in the Gulf. As always, it's worth walking over to see the flotilla in the Sound and Little Sabine Bay. Swimmers should use caution near the hundreds of pleasure craft.

Exit Strategy:

Chill out. If you don't have to rush, don't. Walk to a nearby beach restaurant. Get in the air conditioning. Go shopping. Go swimming.

If you are compelled to leave immediately, use care. Be patient. Be sober. Deputies will direct traffic. If you are on your bicycle or on foot, the same things apply.

Forever...Barefoot on the Beach

What do baking and frosting a cake and patching a stucco wall have in common? Not as much as I originally thought when I blithely decided to repair some bare spots on the west wall of my house. Most of the chipped areas have been there for nine years, but recently I noticed that every strong wind that blew across the Gulf took a toll

The fact that the trash man, the meter reader from Gulf Power, and I are the only three people who ever walk on that side of the house makes most of my worry over the broken wall pretty unnecessary. Besides, the bottom of the wall is obscured by dense sea oat growth. Realistically, this flaw in my old house could have gone unnoticed for nine more years.

That did not stop me from running out and purchasing two

cartons of gray dry stuff to be used for patching concrete and stucco.

I put together equipment for the job – a plastic bucket, a rusty trowel, a scraper, a teaspoon, a towel, and a paint brush. The instructions on the box read, "add water." That sounded simple enough, so I emptied the gray stuff into the bucket and turned the hose on it. My first attempt at stirring up a batch of stucco resulted in

a soupy mixture that slid down the wall and settled into a dismal puddle on the sidewalk. I added the second carton and brought it to a consistency that would stick on the wall if I was super careful to apply it with a delicate touch. The trowel I used was too heavy or something. Every time I thought the stucco was sticking, I would trowel a little pattern and the trowel would scrape the whole thing off. After working most of the morning, using up both cartons of cement, I had covered about a square foot area. I decided this was going to be one of the great challenges of my life, so I marched out on Monday and bought six more boxes of mix. That was in April. Just this last weekend I finally found time to tackle the wall again. After working Saturday and Sunday, I am again out of mix and have three or four square feet left to cover. But I have conquered such horrendous problems as consistency, how to make little decorative swirls, and how to make the stuff stick on the wall. The very next free weekend I have will find me "frosting the wall." Looks like it will be sometime in October.

If you're biking, jogging or driving past my house, please

do not look at the west side. Yet. Some day, it will all be stucco. It will be painted white. It will not be as historic as the Berlin Wall, the Great Wall of China or the Vietnam Wall. It will be Jane's Wall. And after it is repaired, I will return to baking and frosting cakes to satisfy the mixing and swirling instincts which seem to lurk in my subconscious......

All summer long the Escambia Amateur Astronomers Association has given novice stargazers a chance to spend a night in the cosmos. The program has been running since early April and will continue on into October crossing three different locations.

Over at Battery Worth in Fort Pickens there will be guided star walks on July 25 and August 22. Anyone interested in attending will still be subject to paying the eight-dollar park entrance fee.

The Gulfside Performance Pavilion will be available for Star Gazes August 1 and 2, September 5 and 6, and October 3 and 4. Club Members and other attendees will be able to park for free in the Casino Beach lot near the Beach Ball Water Tower.

Another location the Astronomers Association will be using is at the Big Lagoon State Park. Anyone who decides to visit this location must be inside the park with the entrance fee paid before the sun sets. After sunset the gates to enter the park will be locked.

While park entrance fees still apply, the actual events are free. As long as the weather is kind, members will be setting up their Telescopes before sunset. Members' binoculars will also be set up for better views. People are not required to bring their own equipment; however, Association Members will be happy to help

people set up any telescopes or binoculars they bring.

In the next couple of weeks, views will be available of the first quarter moon, Saturn, Mars, and just barely Jupiter. As the summer progresses some constellations will be able to be viewed. Scorpius, Sagittarius, and the Summer Triangle are three of the things club members will be pointing out.



Authority Board Approves Budget, Saves For Storms

The Santa Rosa Island Authority burned through three agendas June 25 completing committee meetings, a budget workshop and a special full board meeting. The highlight was the unanimous approval of the 2015 budget.

SRIA Director of Finance Dottie Ford projects a conservative 2.8 percent increase in operating revenue totaling \$7.5 million. The operating expenses are budgeted at \$7.1 million. By comparison the actual revenue for the fiscal year which ended September 30, 2013, was \$7,858,968. Ford noted that staff considers all contingencies such as the slower winter months and potential reserves necessary for operations should a hurricane strike.

Board Member Dave Pavlock wanted planning dollars allocated for amenities to support the future ferry service, Visitor's Center furnishings, boardwalk planning, and a small stipend for a Beach Photo Contest. Board Chairman Tammy Bohannon asked that the legal staff look into a donation to support the Pensacola Beach Elementary School's building fund.

Board members agreed that pedestrian safety is a high priority. The upgrading and safety in crosswalks on Pensacola Beach must be addressed by the County and the state, according to Board Vice Chairman Janice Gilley. The Board and staff concurred that adequate reserves for storm rebuilding and operations must be maintained.

"We operate in the black and are conservative, as we must be," said Bohannon. "We have reserves which we must keep especially going into hurricane season. We can have staff look at any surplus after hurricane season is over."

The SRIA budget is sent to the Escambia County Board of Commissioners for their review and approval.

Committees discussed money matters. The Administrative Committee accepted the April financial report which showed 7.3 percent increase in revenue over the prior year. The \$643,433 income showed an uptick for April, but Ford reported that overall year-to-date revenues were slightly behind compared to last year.

The Committee denied a \$7,500 sponsorship request from Thunder on the Gulf, which is a speed boat competition hosted in Orange Beach, Alabama.

"The event is asking for the maximum amount of sponsorship for the category of an event on Pensacola Beach," said Board Member Dr. Thomas Campanella. "But it does not fit any of the criteria for an event on the beach."

The Architectural and Environmental Committee approved

the annual resolution for Florida Beach Erosion Control Program. The resolution cites the previous and continuing need for beach renourishment and monitoring on Pensacola Beach.

The Committee also approved investing \$31,000 to hire French Wetmore to serve as a consultant for the upcoming National Flood Insurance review. Wetmore would be responsible for updating the SRIA's Flood Insurance Community Rating System program. If successfully implemented, the SRIA could lower the flood rating designation and earn a 25 percent discount on flood insurance policies. The current rating earns a 15 percent discount.

The Committee approved an enhancement at Castaways. Their request to add a small bandstand to the public area near their boardwalk location was approved. The stage would be suitable for one musician and already has seating. The location is open to the public.

Committees chose to hold a few items for further review, they included:

□ A policy to give local vendors a preference: Board Attorney Mike Stebbins noted that the Fourth of July and Pensacola Beach Air Show preparation did not allow staff ample time to thoroughly review the issue. Board Member Janice Gilley voiced concerns about fairness and implementation.

☐ Bonifay Watersports request to bifurcate their concession agreement: John Ehrenreich, owner of Bonifay Watersports, is agreeable to relinquishing the area where his current mini golf course is located to the Pensacola Beach Yacht Club. The PBYC intends to build a clubhouse and add more classes, camps, and regattas, pending a 38-year concession agreement. The Committee wants to review legal documents, potential zoning prior to making a decision.

☐ A Flyboard Concession at Flounder's: Robert Mercier's request to operate a flyboard ride 200 yards out in Santa Rosa Sound was met with concerns of safety, need of a U.S. Coast Guard captain's license, and overall Soundfront congestion. The rider wears two jet boots, connected to an air hose and holds two hand held stabilizers. The extreme

sport is popular in other beach towns and has a good safety record according to Mercier.

The SRIA Full Board Meeting is Wednesday, July 9 at 5 p.m. at #1 Via de Luna. The meetings are open to the public and the agenda is available online at www.sria-fla.com/reports.php.

Several years ago, the legendary Appalachian folk singer Ralph Stanley issued a twovolume recording of bluegrass and mountain songs. Tellingly, the first volume was called Saturday Night, and the second titled Sunday Morning was about "preachin', prayin', and singin'." Saturday Night was about the "real stuff" of life, like working hard, raising children, seeking joy, having your heart broken, trying to stay sober, taking care of Mama and Daddy, dealing with betrayal, finding one's way down the highway of life, and facing death. Worship, church, and Sunday were on one side of the ledger, and the Saturday stuff of life was on the other.

Unfortunately, many of us have the same split playing in our heads all the time. There is the "Sunday morning" experience of prayers, hymns, sermons, and there is the "Saturday night" (and we can add the "Monday afternoon") experience of kicking up our heels, balancing the checkbook, building a career, deciding who we are, dealing with relationships, and generally figuring out how to find some purpose and joy in things we do and say every day.

On the one side is the religious side of us, and on the other is the "just trying to make it through life" side. We go to worship, and we sing the hymns, pray

It is actually a good thing to know that worship informs and changes life, and life informs and changes worship. 
Slowly my inner child starts

Dealing with Snakes...

Due to the heavy rain in May we have received numerous calls

about snake encounters. The heavy flooding forced these slinky reptiles

their natural habitat to higher drier ground... in many cases this meant Rick O'Connor at roc1@ufl.edu your driveway or garage. Most in our community do not like snakes but most do understand their role in the natural environment and that they do us a service by consuming unwanted rodents. There are a variety of reasons people do not

like them but the fact that some are venomous, and we do not know how to tell if they are venomous, makes us very uneasy.

There are 46 species of snakes in Florida, only 6 of these are venomous and only 4 of them are common in our area. The water moccasin (Agkistrodon piscivorous) is the most frequently encountered venomous snake. They resemble many of the nonvenomous water snakes but differ in the shape of their head and the dark "raccoon mask" that runs across their eye. Snakes are attracted to places where rodents are found. Stacks of wood, bird feeders, brush piles, greenhouses, and garages all attract rodents and thus snakes. Keep these areas clean and consider placing them away from the door of your house so you are not startled as you step out.

What do I do when I encounter one? Typically snakes will be in a "frozen" position when they first see you. This is something that prey do when they first encounter predators, indicating they are afraid of you. Typically their next move will be to flee if they have a space to run to - do not block their escape route. Most snakes will strike only when they feel they have no other option. This happens because they feel you are too close or they have no way out. Ninety-five percent of the people bitten by snakes were trying to either catch them or kill them, so allowing them to escape significantly reduces your chance

June and July are favorite months for sea turtle patrollers because the majority of nests in our area are laid during those sixty days. Our excitement grows as fast as the nest count when we start tallying up numbers. This year took a little wind out of our sails when there had been only two nests by the end of May, but by mid-June activity had increased and spirits were especially high on days we had multiple nests.

I admit to being a pest around the biologist, bio-techs, and our long-time patrollers when the sea turtle activity seems unusual (to me), annoyingly asking as many questions like a six-year-old on a road trip. It was encouraging to talk with our local fishermen, however, because they were experiencing similar delays with the cobia running a month later than usual. They talked about catches being off in May, whether by boat or just a day of fishing on the beach, and shared their opinions on why (we all agreed on the unusually cold winter/cold water). Now in my sixth year of patrol, I've finally realized that each sea turtle season is unique to itself and we can only do our best to watch over these amazing marine creatures while they are in our care. The rest is up to Mother Nature.

At this point we are only a couple of nests behind the count compared to this time last year, so hopefully it will be another good season for sea turtles. Each one of us can help make that possible if we work together to educate

people about things that can help or things that may hurt sea turtles. One problem in every area we patrol - and which seems to be getting worse – are huge holes which people dig in the sand and neglect to fill in when they leave the beach at night.

While a hole on the beach may not seem like a problem, our challenge is to make people aware of the dangers posed when the holes are not filled in at the end of the day. After all, what could possibly happen when our sand is so beautiful and soft, right? Wrong! The larger the hole, the more dangerous it can be. People running or walking on the beach can sustain injuries if they fall into a hole on the beach, sea turtle patrollers who start before dawn can be seriously injured if they hit a large hole and their UTV/ ATV flips on them, and both adult and hatchling sea turtles can be trapped and die in holes left on the beach

Just a couple of weeks ago an adult loggerhead sea turtle came ashore to nest on a South Walton County beach, about 40 miles east of Pensacola Beach. Something disturbed her on her first attempt to nest and when she came ashore a second time to try, she fell head first into a deep hole that someone had neglected to fill in. It was early the next morning before a volunteer sea turtle patroller discovered the mother sea turtle with her head completely buried beneath sand. The patroller thought the sea turtle was dead. Her weight, which was probably 250-300 pounds, had pushed her head directly into the sand at the bottom of the hole, almost suffocating her. It took hours and many people to help extricate the loggerhead, but she was finally able to make it back into the Gulf. I encourage you to learn more about this amazing rescue by Googling "South Walton Turtle Watch Rescues Loggerhead." This is one of those times when a picture is worth a thousand words.

Please help us by filling in deep holes in the sand before you leave each afternoon. If we make others aware of the problem with a positive attitude, in nearly every case they will happily join the effort in helping our sea turtles survive. Spread the word!



Q: "Can Malicious Programs Be In My Computer Without My Knowledge?"

A: Yes, that is certainly possible. In fact, that is the case in many computers. Every time you visit a website, there is a risk of having that happen. Malicious programs, such as viruses and malware, often drop into your computer from websites without you knowing it. When I examine computers and show the bad programs to the computer's owner, the owner almost never is aware that those programs were present.

Sometimes, when the computer user downloads one program intentionally, several programs get downloaded and installed. If you read the legal agreement that appears when software is being downloaded, you will often see that multiple programs are being installed on your computer.

In some cases, I have seen as many as 30 malicious programs in the list of installed program on

a single computer. That happens when a "downloader" program is present on the computer. That program automatically manages the schedule for downloading programs belonging to their business partners. Each program that is downloaded may bring another 5 or 6 programs with it. By that time, the computer is so slow that the owner knows something is wrong.

There is also a function in the computer known as the Task Scheduler. The Task Scheduler is responsible for making certain things happen automatically, on a pre-determined schedule. Malicious programs will insert themselves into the Task Scheduler to cause downloads, updates, and programs to automatically start running in the computer. So, the tasks in Task Scheduler have to be cleaned up when the malicious programs are being removed.

Internet search engines, such as Internet Explorer, Google Chrome, and Firefox are all used By Joe Stukey, Your Computer Pal

by malicious programs to further infect your computer. The bad programs insert themselves into the search engines and take over the search process. They are then able to re-direct the user's website searches and download more bad programs from other websites. Quite often, the malicious programs will replace your "home page" with their own page, causing you to click on unwanted website links. Seeing your home page get replaced is a big clue that something is wrong. Internet Explorer, Google Chrome, and Firefox all have to be examined and cleaned up when removing malicious programs.

It Can Be Dangerous Out There

The heat index outside today is "105 degrees." Most of us probably think that "heat index" is some combination of temperature and humidity that means "something" (misery?). Technically, it's a carefullydevised, scientific formula that tries to determine the human body's perception of how hot it is. It also portends the effects of this physically-perceived heat, which can range from extreme to fatal. When you are tri-training outdoors, you need to pay attention to it.

Perspiration cools the body by pulling high-energy molecules (heat) from the interior and bringing them to the skin in sweat and there they evaporate into the air. The higher the humidity is, the slower the evaporative process. In high-humidity situations, the cooling mechanism is much less efficient, and we are much more miserable. When the heat index is from 90 to 105 degrees, heat cramps and heat exhaustion are possible. Continued activity in these conditions could result in heat stroke. Higher than 105 is definitely trouble.

Our training group met and ran the other day when the heat index was 104 degrees. There was

Young triathletes have an event all their own. The fifth annual Sea Turtle Tri is set for Sunday, October 5 at 7:30 a.m. on Pensacola Beach. The event is open to children ages 7 to 15 and is governed by USAT rules.

a slight breeze and we planned to run 4-5 miles. After two miles our pace slowed perceptibly. We took turns taking the lead, but still the group slowed down and we kept checking our GPSs to see how far we had gone. Each time we checked there was still plenty of distance to go and finally we cut the run short at a little over four

So, it's July and August in Northwest Florida and we still have to train. What do we do? The first thing is to stay hydrated. You must increase your fluid intake on a daily basis and you need to mix it up with water and electrolytes (i.e. sports drinks). Some runners and triathletes think that if they hydrate the day (or the hours) before an event that is sufficient. Wrong! Your tissues take time to absorb fluids and get truly hydrated. Think of each training session as an event instead of just that race on the weekend. Before and during your exertion you'll want to ingest very cold drinks to bring your core temperature down. Eat small, low-fat meals and snacks during the day.

Next, try to bike or run in the early mornings or the late, late afternoons. The visibility is much worse for drivers at those times and you'll need to be very careful. Wear light, brightly-colored clothes, use warning lights on your bike or clothing and try to stay off the main roads. Take fluids with you and plan your routes to include places (such as convenience stores) where you can get extra water or sports drink.

Finally, slow down. You may need to cover a certain

distance, but you can take it a bit easier. Supplement your outside training with running on a treadmill or riding a spin bike in a gym. Ramp up your swim training to maintain or increase your aerobic and cardiovascular capabilities. If you are breathing heavily, feel your heart racing or just feel bad....stop! No one ever got a medal or an award for gutting out a training run in the extreme heat.

I fell down when I was running at 5:30 a.m. a week ago. I was able to quickly get up and keep going, but I got a serious cut on my knee and some severe road rash on my leg. Except for colliding with other runners and getting knocked down twice in trail runs, I've never come close to falling while running. Was it just an error or am I "getting old"?

I work on my balance all the time. Yoga poses and stretching are part of my daily workout as is bi-lateral strength training. So what happened? How did I wind up on the ground with blood flowing down my leg?

The truth is we almost all take our mobility for granted and we need to pay attention. I was running down an incline in the early morning light, glanced over my shoulder to see where my running companions were and then turned to see a patch of mud in front of me. I hit the mud, my foot went sideways and a collision with the pavement followed. I need to be more focused. pay more attention and not take anything for granted.

We all need to be careful out there.






