## School taxes could rise

Geneva Elementary School will get a new roof this year, but it may cost Seminole County homeowners an average of \$130 each to pay for it. The Seminole County School Board passed a vote Tuesday that could lead to a tax and \$25.6 million for repair projects for aging schools across the county.

The School Board voted 4-1, with Board member Diane Bauer dissenting because she said the tax wouldn't be focused enough on funding repairs. The money would also be used for modern upgrades to older classrooms.

Three more votes, ending in Sept. 10, will determine whether the tax and the projects are part of next year's budget. Superintendent Walt Griffin said it's a necessity.

"We need to preserve the quality of the school system we have," Griffin said.

## Oviedo Council gives city a design makeover

Oviedo on the Park is only the beginning.

A meeting in late May made plans official for the city to establish a more diverse aesthetic theme throughout Oviedo, with some parts looking more urban and less suburban.

Oviedo's new set of standards will encourage connected buildings with varying heights and the use of materials such as stone and brick instead of stucco.

"We want the creativity of developers to come out," Mayor Dominic Persampiere said.

The Oviedo City Council is transitioning to a form-based code, a set of laws and regulations that focuses on giving a community an urban look. The new code will target the thoroughfares of State Road 426, Central Avenue in the historic downtown and those surrounding Oviedo Mall, leaving them open to development resembling Park Avenue in Winter Park and

stretches of road in Baldwin Park – separate buildings with varying heights moved closer to the street and against each other.

The city plans on using Oviedo on the Park as a new standard for future urban development in these areas.

"That's one of the things that a form-based code is designed for;

it's designed to help you migrate from the suburban development pattern to a more urban, compact development pattern," Interim City Manager Bryan Cobb said. "It actually encourages to do it."

"Our City Council is very concerned about the aesthetics of the city, so they want to make sure that our architectural stan-

dards reflect the types of standards they'd like to see built in the city."

Council member Cindy Drago assured that there is plenty of room for both urban and suburban development in Oviedo.

"We don't want to turn Oviedo into a whole urban area, be-

## Local docs fight to end risky elective deliveries

Reaching rubber-gloved hands through the arm-sized holes of the thick plastic incubator walls, a Winnie Palmer newborn intensive care unit nurse cups the wire-laden crown of newborn baby Kevin Skoog's head with her left hand. Her right places a stethoscope on Kevin's peach-fuzz covered back, checking the rhythm of his teeny-tiny heart.

Basking in the warmth of the incubator's yellow spotlight, premature born Kevin – nicknamed "Peanut" by his parents for his small size – uses his little fingers

to grasp the large purple pacifier protruding from his mouth while the nurse works. Between the purple plastic of the pacifier, dark cloth-constructed shades covering his eyes and thick tube settled in under his nose, the only distinguishable characteristic above Kevin's shoulders are wisps of light brown hair sticking out from amongst the wires affixed to his forehead.

Kevin is one of a decreasing number of premature born babies needing care from Orlando's Winnie Palmer Hospital for Women and Babies' NICU. From 2011 to 2012, the number of late

cause we still have the neighborhoods that we love," Drago said. "We love the big trees, we love the open space and we love the neighborhoods, but there are places in Oviedo that can be developed into more of an urban area."

Council member Stephen Schenk said that the standards would ensure better quality buildings by setting more specific guidelines. He explained that, many times, builders will construct buildings at the lowest bar of what the city demands, and that there needs to be further requirements to prevent that.

"As there's a new round of development happening and commercial building has started, with Oviedo on the Park being the main thing, we want to make sure that the quality that we've been asking for is put into code," Schenk said.

"We want to raise up, to make building and the quality of what's

being built move to a higher level."

An aesthetically pleasing theme throughout the city will also drive more businesses to come to the area, boosting the local economy, Schenk said.

"That's probably the thing that drives it all is trying to make things clear and concise, so that it will help drive economic development and make those builders want to come here and continue to come here," Schenk said.

The city is still developing the new architectural standards, which are expected to be put into place by 2014, Cobb said.

"Whatever is being built from now on, we really want it to reflect the richness of our city and the customs and traditions, and at the same time show that we are moving forward, that we are progressing and it's a place where you would want to bring in your business and bring in high paying jobs," Drago said.

### DELIVERIES | Intentionally early babies stay in ICU longer

pre-term babies being born and needing stays in the NICU have dropped by 50 percent. Winnie Palmer doctors credit the drop to hard-stop guidelines restricting early elective deliveries (EED), which has helped moms deliver healthier babies.

That means 50 percent less families leaving their babies in the hospital when they go home, and half as many moms sleeping in chairs waiting to see their newborns, said registered nurse Lorraine Parker, the administrator for patient care at the hospital, and one of the people leading the change against unnecessary EEDs at Winnie Palmer.

"It's the right thing to do for the baby," she said. "There are too many benefits to waiting."

The guidelines aim to stop the trend of the induction of labor as early as the 37th week of pregnancy — 40 weeks being full-term. For the past 20 years, moms and doctors have chosen to induce labor early for the sake of convenience, because the new grandparents will be flying into town or the mother just can't take the back pain and misery pregnancy can

cause, among other reasons.

New research shows, though, that waiting until full-term is important to the baby's development, and several national health organizations involved in maternity and delivery, including the March of Dimes and the American Academy of Pediatrics, are calling on hospitals across the country to institute their own EED policies.

Vital organs including the brain and lungs are still growing in the final weeks and days of pregnancy, said Karen Harris, M.D., who is the incoming program services chair for the March of Dimes Florida Chapter, which offers a tool kit to help hospitals start the policy in their own delivery rooms.

For healthy moms, waiting until full-term and letting spontaneous, natural delivery happen is the way to go, Harris said.

"It allows the baby's brain to develop to its maximum potential," she said.

Late pre-term deliveries hold several risks for babies, including asthma, ADD, feeding problems, a longer stay in the hospital and even admittance to the NICU. It also increases the risk of the mother having to have a cesarean

section, which is major surgery requiring a longer hospital stay.

At Winnie Palmer, which is the country's second busiest labor and delivery hospital, when doctors want to induce their patients at the 37-38 week time period, the mom and baby must meet certain criteria that deem it medically necessary. If mom doesn't want to do an EED but the doctor does, they must discuss it with another physician to get permission.

As a result of tightening those guidelines, Winnie Palmer has reduced their EEDs for non-medical reasons to less than seven percent consistently, with a goal of three percent for the future.

While many moms deliver just fine during the 37-week mark, there are some babies who need extra care, and that's a risk doctors at Winnie Palmer don't want to take for families.

"Just having a premature baby has a tremendous emotional impact on families," said Dr. Gregor Alexander, a neonatologist at Winnie Palmer.

It also puts financial stress on the families and community to pay for the care of the premature babies. The recent reduction in Winnie Palmer's NICU admittance rate from 2011 to 2012 has saved the community nearly \$1 million.

Parker and Harris believe ending EEDs will become the norm for labor delivery hospitals in the future. But first, doctors and patients need to learn more about the benefits and research.

"The key is education," Parker said.

# Making attics less scary

Casselberry resident's invention set for spotlight at convention

Jeff Seyler remembers the ladder wobbling as his brother-in-law tried to be graceful with a fake reindeer he hoisted over his shoulder and out of the narrow opening of his attic. It was the same trip he took every year to find the Christmas decorations at the top of that shaky ascent.

In 2010, 164,000 Americans started up a ladder and landed in emergency rooms. Watching his brother-in-law on Thanksgiving that year, Seyler had an idea. There had to be an easier, safer way to do this.

Two and a half years later, Seyler is on the verge of marketing his new invention, the Attic Buddy, which moves stored items up and down from attics with a remote control elevator device.

The Attic Buddy will be one of the featured items in the INPEX Invention Trade Show in Pittsburgh, Penn., the nation's largest invention convention, from June 19 to 21. Seyler is hoping for a licensing agreement with a company to manufacture and distribute his product.

"I'm incredibly excited about it," Seyler said. "I want to see one in everybody's house in the country. It's a safety thing. I'd like to see people not have to worry about killing themselves or hurting themselves."

Many of the 450 daily ladder fall hospital visits in America occur with the disappearing ladders because they are often poorly made or not installed properly, Seyler said.

Inspired to create a safe device

after watching his brother-in-law climb into his attic, Seyler went to the drawing board, developing an elevator contraption and testing it on a simulated attic made of two walls and two trusses in his backyard.

The Casselberry inventor became even more motivated to work on his invention as a result of his work as an insurance inspector for the Sanford-based

company Insurance Risk Services, performing thousands of wind mitigation inspections in people's attics.

"As I was going around, talking to people and climbing in these attics do to these inspections, again and again people would tell me 'Heck, I haven't been up there for years, I don't even know what's up there anymore, I'm too old to get up there or I'm too feeble to

get up there,'" Seyler said. "For whatever reason, they weren't using the attics. That just made me think more and more that that's kind of shame. That's a good storage area and it doesn't have to be like that."

Three years later, Seyler believes that Attic Buddy is nearly ready to hit the shelves.

"After a trial and error of a few

different things, I got down to what I think is a very simple, safe and affordable way to store and retrieve items from your attic," Seyler said.

The Attic Buddy is made up of a 6-foot-long metal cart on wheels. The cart is lifted up and down through a space cut in the garage ceiling using ropes connected on each side, and operated through a pulley system run by an electric motor.

This isn't the first big idea that Seyler has come up with. The inventor previously ran a handy appliance store in the Altamonte Mall with his wife Lorna back in 2003 called Lots of Gadgets. The couple acquired the rights to sell a number of handy gadgets that can be used in everyday life: wedges that propped up wobbly tables, small drilling devices that held beach umbrellas in place, and small fans that could be plugged into cigarette lighters for cars without air conditioning.

The business eventually fizzled

out though due to lack of time to promote it.

Despite the setback, Seyler was determined to move on to the next project, whatever it was.

"I don't get discouraged too easily," Seyler said. "I'm a pretty positive guy; if one thing doesn't work, you just go to the next. Keep on keeping on."

For Seyler, the next big project was the Attic Buddy, seven years later.

Seyler's wife was hesitant about the new project at first, but became a believer after seeing the prototype in action.

"I certainly think it's a product that's needed," Lorna said. "We're not young spring chickens anymore and I certainly don't want to walk up the attic stairs, so I think it's a great idea."

Seyler's sister Karla is also supportive of her brother's efforts.

"I think it's innovative. After he told me about it, I looked around to see if there's anything out there really like it and I didn't really see anything," Karla said. "I think it's pretty creative and that's

it's got a great shot."

While Seyler hopes that the Attic Buddy will be a successful business venture, he stressed that he ultimately hopes to make homes safer with the device.

"It was more of a safety thing that motivated it than anything," Seyler said.

"I'm pretty sure there's been a good pile of people that have been injured every year."

Seyler plans to make some final touches on the invention, including the addition of an automatic brake system and changing the cart to a hard plastic material.

The Casselberry inventor and his wife also plan on putting together a demonstration video before the trade show, so people can see how the device works and how it's used.

"I'm proud of him," Lorna said. "I think it's a great thing. It's what this country is built on: good ideas, capitalism, and people taking what they have and making something out of it."

"That's what makes this country great."

Last but not least, Nest Learning Thermostat has released its second-generation "smart" thermostat. Its slim, one-button, single-bezel circle has mirrored sides to blend into the paint on your wall and lend it a sleek modern touch. But it's not just a looker, this thermostat learns your preferences and can even sense when you are home or away, then adjust the temperature accordingly. Saving time money and energy? But June 10, after three straight canceled games, the River Rats made up for their season-opening two-game losing streak in a big way, trouncing DeLand 6-1 in their first grudge match of the season.

John Sever and Parker Perez combined for a one-run effort from the mound, with Sever giving up just one hit in 4.1 innings of work, striking out four. From the plate, the River Rats teed off, smacking four doubles — two from Luis Benitez alone — and a triple to rack up the score.

The Diamond Dawgs took a beating from mother nature, ceding three of their first six games to the clouds and by coincidence only playing Leesburg in their three games so far this season.

# Flags & fathers

*"Only love sails straight from the harbor  
Only love will lead us to the other shore  
Out of all the flags I've flown  
One flies high and stands alone  
Only love."  
— lyrics by Wynonna Judd*

Her long pigtailed wrapped in red, white and blue sparkly ribbons brushed her daddy's sunburned arms as she squirmed on his shoulders. The plastic flag in her chubby right hand waved wildly when each horse, band or float moved along the parade route before them. At 3 years old, she didn't know exactly why she was waving it, but everyone else was, so she yelled "Woo-hoo!" with all her might.

Fathers and flags have a lot in common. They have the power to elevate us spiritually and physically. We look up to them for belief and inspiration. Like grandpa's shaving mirror, they reflect back what we should stand for.

### Leading the way

Throughout history, flags have served to orient and rally troops in military confrontations. From the earliest cloth flags that the Romans affixed to spears to those that represent the American military branches, flags have identified friends and foes, comrades and leaders, and led the way as standard bearers and signalers. In the smoke, noise and chaos of battle, the position of the flag was a critical rallying point.

Dads – like flag bearers – accept their leadership role and all the risk and responsibility that come with it as they lead their family around life's battles and obstacles.

### Vexillology

The scientific study of flags called vexillology examines the design, use and symbolism of flags. The Latin word vexillum refers to the cloth emblem hung from a crossbar on a pole carried by Roman soldiers and English crusaders. Also associated with this study are related fields like heraldry, emblems, flag design and coats of arms.

### Flag Day in America

Wisconsin, Pennsylvania and New York all lay claim to the early stirrings of Flag Day in the late 1890s. Although Woodrow Wilson established it by proclamation in 1916, the momentum was slowed for the next three decades of economic depressions and world wars. In 1949, President Truman signed the Congressional act for National Flag Day, June 14.

### Origins of Father's Day

Mother's Day had its origins in the decades after the Civil War and became an official national observance in 1914. Father's Day took much longer to become a national holiday, meeting resistance from some who found the celebration to be unmanly, and possibly greedy. Although states celebrated Father's Day as a way to support the wars and troops, it did not become a Federal holiday until 1972.

### Flags and fathers intimidate and inspire

Significant events like landing on the moon, setting foot on unexplored land, and conquering a foe's territory have always been marked by planting a flag. Flags that endured, after long-fought

battles, have similarly found their place in history – such as the flag that survived the battle at Fort McHenry and the flag raised at Iwo Jima.

Fathers and flags can inspire and influence us for greatness or greed, character or carnage. Like all symbols, hopefully they inspire us to nurture the best choices from our own hearts.

It's time again for Geneva's signature event, the annual Geneva 4th of July Parade and Festival. 
