

Bear habitat safe for now

State abandons effort to sell conservation lands to developers

Conservationists throughout the state enjoyed a significant victory for local wildlife recently as the Florida Department of Environmental Protection officially ended its bid to sell 5,200 acres of conservation land – a turn of events in the wake of a controversial bear attack and investigation.

The FDEP sought to sell the land in order to buy other conservation areas with water resources – a bid to protect the state’s springs and aquifers. The land would also have been used to buffer military bases, according to a statement released by the FDEP.

Florida officials had their eyes set on selling 27 acres encroaching on the Wekiva Springs State Park – a hotbed for Florida black bears.

The state’s abandoned pursuit of selling the conservation land as of Feb. 28 means no development in the forests where the bears call home – for now.

“Had that happened, the bears and wildlife would have

been routed through the subdivisions bordering the park along Markham Woods Road,” said Chuck O’Neal of Speak Up Wekiva, a local nonprofit group that pushed the state to leave the conservation lands alone. “We really don’t need any more bear/human interaction in that area.”

Florida black bears became a hot button topic last December when Longwood resident Susan

Chalfant was mauled by one of the animals while walking her two dogs in her gated community.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission immediately began an investigation to find the bear responsible through DNA testing. They captured two bears in the Longwood area between Dec. 4 and 9, euthanizing both of them before testing results came back.

A study of the DNA revealed that neither of the bears were responsible for the incident.

“There should be provisions made and backup plans to those plans for holding black bears while DNA results are coming back,” O’Neal said. “The Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission told a group of us that the reason why they put down those two bears was they did not have a facility to hold those bears.”

“That’s just totally unacceptable.”

More controversy arose when a female bear captured shortly after tested positive as a match to the one involved in the mauling and was not killed. The bear currently resides at Busch Gardens in Tampa with two of her cubs, who were also captured.

Public information coordinator Greg Workman confirmed that Florida Fish and Wildlife didn’t have a place to keep the two bears that were captured in early December. But that wasn’t the only reason they were euthanized, he said.

“These bears have already been imprinted,” Workman said. “They know they can go into a garage that has the door open or

Giraffes give zoo a boost

Central Florida Zoo stands tall with new giraffe exhibit

The Central Florida Zoo’s newest occupants have already made a towering impression at their new exhibit, helping to fill a void left at the zoo after a tragic turn of events four years ago.

Two male giraffes – 19-year-old Emba and 2-year-old Rafiki – are drawing hundreds of visitors as they both get acclimated to their new home.

The Zoo opened the giraffe exhibit last month and recently added a feeding opportunity for visitors starting March 14.

More than 500 visitors have already gotten the chance to feed the lofty creatures a lettuce leaf or two.

“These particular animals have a tremendous draw and they’re really good with helping people understand wildlife, which is what we’re all about,” said Brenda New, business communications manager for the Zoo.

Emba stands 16 feet tall and

weighs about 2,400 pounds, while his younger counterpart stands at 12 feet tall and weighs 1,200 pounds. Each of them will eat 75 pounds in lettuce, Alfalfa hay and grain each day, Senior Keeper and Hoofstock Jamie McMaster said.

The Zoo expects a 10-percent increase in attendance this year from the exhibit, New said. Visitors such as Sanford resident Sophia George and her 5-year-old son Lorne had never seen a giraffe up close before their visit.

“That’s what made me come today was the signs for feeding the giraffes,” George said. “I think it’s really cool, especially for the kids.”

“I could tell everybody what we did today.”

Longwood resident Ileana DiMario came to see the giraffes with her daughter. She bought her first Central Florida Zoo pass in 1995 and has renewed it every year since.

“I’ve been coming here for a long time, since my girls were babies,” DiMario said.

“The Zoo was very small back then ... you could walk the whole thing in 45 minutes.”



that they can go open up a refrigerator.”

“They were so far imprinted that there was really nowhere to put them.”

Florida’s population of black bears has continued to grow over recent decades. The state once had several hundred roaming the state in the 1970s, but that number exceeds 3,000 today, according to records kept by Florida Fish and Wildlife.

The number of bear encounters continues to rise as well. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission received 6,159 calls about bears in 2012 – more than quadruple the number seen in 2002.

“We continue to encroach on the habitat of black bears and other wildlife in that area through the development,” O’Neal said. “It pushes them out of their historic roaming areas and into areas that they’re unfamiliar.”


“The victory with the DEP shutting down this program is shared victory with all the wildlife in the Wekiva Basin.”

Florida Fish and Wildlife are currently holding public meetings throughout Central Florida to encourage the public to join Bear Stakeholder Groups made up of local residents, government officials and landowners who will work with the conservation commission on bear-related issues.


Florida’s bear population has surged in recent decades, as have the number of complaint calls received following human/bear encounters, which have quadrupled.

She remembers the sloth near the front entrance and a number of tropical birds back in 1995, but she also recalls two elephants, who would eventually leave the Zoo after more than 30 years there following sad circumstances.


Mary the elephant passed away in 2010 and her compan-

ion Maude was sent to Zoo Miami the next year, passing away several months ago.

The elephants had built a large following of visitors over three decades, New said. A gaping void was left in their absence.

"Our guests and members felt the same sadness at the loss as we did, but they have continued to contribute and support the zoo," New said.

The Central Florida Zoo sought to bring something new when they added two rhinoceros last year, placing them in the exhibit where

the elephants once called home. Attendance eventually reached a record high of 300,000 guests that year, drawn as well by the river otter exhibit added in 2012.

Since the opening

of the giraffe exhibit on Feb. 15, Zoo attendance has almost doubled compared to last year's numbers, another record in attendance, New said.

The Zoo plans to obtain two more giraffes by the end of the year.

Knights win big over Bearcats


The Knights spring-boarded off a surprise trouncing of Miami last week to pounce on Cincinnati in their first district series, sweeping the Bearcats in three games last weekend.

Eric Skoglund pitched a two-hit start to hold the Bearcats to a 7-1 loss in the Knights' debut game in the American Athletic Conference, dropping his ERA to 1.76 in the process.

Meanwhile the top of the Knights' order went to work, with leadoff man Dylan Moore cranking out three hits and crossing the plate three times, with Derrick Salberg helping knock him in with four hits of his own. Salberg extended his hitting streak to 11 games with that performance.

Unfortunately for Salberg, that streak would end the very next game in a 7-4 comeback win. Salberg would put the ball in play four times in the game, but all landed in the gloves of Bearcats players.

Picking up the slack was a five-run barrage in the sixth inning to give the Knights the lead thanks to five hits and a few throwing errors that gave the Knights all the runs they'd

need. Meanwhile Spencer Davis was making music on the mound with six strikeouts in 4 and 1/3 innings pitched while giving up just two runs. Jarrod Petree was in the right place at the right time, pitching the sixth and walking away with the win after retiring three batters.

Salberg decided to start up another hitting streak as the Knights tried for the sweep,

smacking a single in the fifth. The Knights would score a run per inning in five of eight innings at the plate to slowly run away with the game. Erik Barber and Tommy Williams provided the fireworks with two solo shots in the game en route to a respective two and three RBI.

Zach Rodgers would pitch a scoreless one-hit, four-inning start before head coach Terry

Rooney pulled him for Robby Howell, who promptly gave up two hits and a run before being pulled two outs later. The Knights would go on to win 5-1. Ryan Meyer, the only pitcher to draw a balk in the game, would come away with the win, his first.

As of this week, the Knights (13-12, 3-0) have never been defeated in their history in American Athletic Conference play.

They were set to play Bethune Cookman in a non-conference game 6:30 p.m. at press time March 26. They'll hit the diamond for a three-game homestand against Temple starting at 6:30 p.m. March 28, then 4 p.m. March 29 and 1 p.m. March 30. The Tigers are 7-10 overall and 2-1 in conference play.

High school baseball

The Oviedo Lions have had an up and down season so far, but have dominated in the district, winning remarkably close games in the process. Three of their last four district games have been decided by two runs or less, including a 1-0 win over East Ridge March 13, holding the Knights to three hits.

They played Lyman Wednesday at press time, but will face their most anticipated game all season March 28 when they host Hagerty at 7 p.m. The Huskies have only lost once all season, and are undefeated at 6-0 in their own district.





I think it was their way of saying goodbye, probably heading toward the central U.S. for a few months before continuing

on to southern Canada and the northern states. The northern climes are where they breed for the summer, and the pelican bird parents share duties of incubating, feeding and caring for their young.

Fragrant memories

The sense of smell is ancient, and some argue it is our most powerful sense bringing our oldest memories to the surface across the decades. How we love watching the hummingbirds flit and hover around the jasmine vines and the firecracker bushes.


