Chamber celebrates local businesses

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY — Last week during industry appreciation week, several businesses were recognized by the Indian River County Chamber of Commerce for their achievements.

A new category, Entrepreneur of the Year, was added this year to the industry awards event held by the chamber on Sept. 20 at the Indian River State College Richardson Center.

The award was given to True Colors Salon and Spa, which has grown from seven employees in 2008 to 16 employees in 2011. The

salon and spa has experienced 40 percent annual growth for the past three years and the owners are looking to grow even more.

SEBASTIAN — Four candidates are competing for two seats on Sebastian City Council.

Jim Hill, current mayor of Sebastian, is in the race along with first-time candidates Tim Slaven and Jerome Adams and businessman, Damien Gilliams.

Mr. Slaven and Mayor Hill are featured in this article.

Tim Slaven

Tim Slaven is a first-time candidate and Department of Children and Families employee. He has lived in Sebastian for close to seven years and was attracted to the area because of the small, hometown feel and natural beauty, he said.

Preserving that quality of life and environment is important to Mr. Slaven, but he isn't all talk and pipe dreams.

While he hasn't served in an elected position before, Mr. Slaven was on the city budget advisory committee last year and is very familiar with the numbers and the city budget.

His analysis of the budget is that all the cuts that have been made were the ones that could be made.

"We went over that with a fine-tooth comb," Mr. Slaven said.

Should he be elected, he would continue to study the budget with city staff to see what else can be done to cut down on costs as the year progresses, but also make sure the money that is available is spent wisely.

Areas he would like to see the council address include the business corridor on County Road 512, ensuring it has what it needs to prosper and flourish.

Bringing in jobs, or a focus on economic development, will help improve Sebastian's quality of life and make for a happier and healthier community, Mr. Slaven said.

Incumbent seeks another term on mosquito control district

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY — Two candidates are going head-to-head for Indian River County Mosquito Control District seat three.

Janice Broda, a 20-year incumbent is being challenged by political newcomer Scott Stradley for a leadership role in the special district.

In the 20 years she has been on the district board, there have been changes and challenges to mosquito control that needed to be addressed.

"We have new imported mosquitos and diseases," Ms. Broda said.

West Nile and encephalitis were first found in Florida in 2001, and so addressing new health concerns had to be a priority. Around the same time, mosquito control faced increased regulations.

"The regulations required a decrease in the toolbox of available pesticides," Ms. Broda said.

"We have more challenges, more pests and less tools to meet the challenges," she said.

One thing many people

forget when they look at the district's budget, is that weather and disease transmission are very uncertain and difficult to predict, Ms. Broda said.

The board feels the responsibility is on them to budget in case of a public health emergency and so each year, there is a \$345,000 line item for three treatments of aerial insecticides, which looks like a large amount, but protecting the public health is their job, Ms. Broda said.

In an effort to be wise with taxpayer dollars, the district contracts out work

to the private sector, she said.

Ms. Broda said she believes the district has done a good job of mosquito control, even though it is expensive, by trying to target the mosquitos before they become adults, in the larval stage in watery, marshy places in the county.

One area Ms. Broda said she would like to see improved is the district's website information and accessibility and to increase its amount of public outreach programs.

Grant proposals sought

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY — The Future Leaders Professional Advisor Council of the Indian River Community Foundation is inviting county nonprofit organizations that serve local youth to submit grant proposals for programs targeted at children ages 12-18.

The council is a group of emerging leaders who have an interest in charitable giving, estate planning and other philanthropic instruments. The group formed last year and just completed a successful fundraising campaign to establish a charitable fund at the Indian River Community Foundation.

The council chose youth development as the first strategic focus for their funding and spent the summer working with Community Foundation staff to develop the grant guidelines.

"Research shows that

successful youth development programs support the healthy development of adolescents," said Shaun Fedder, Board member of the Future Leaders. "Our members are excited to learn how our local nonprofits are supporting youth as they transition from adolescents to adulthood."

The Future Leaders Council will award two grants of \$1,750 each in November.

The funds must be expended by May 31, 2013, said Kerry Bartlett, executive director of the Indian River Community Foundation.

"The role of the Community Foundation is to assist the Future Leaders group, or any of our fund holders, through the request, selection and grant funding process," Mrs. Bartlett said.

"Once the grants are awarded, we will continue working with the recipients on behalf of the donor to monitor progress and provide a final report on the

outcomes of the funded projects."

The Indian River Community Foundation is a nonprofit organization that provides donors with flexible philanthropic tools to achieve their current and long-term charitable giving goals. The foundation's mission is to build a stronger community through donor-driven philanthropy.

To be eligible for the grant program, nonprofit organizations must have an active profile on the Indian River Community Foundation Nonprofit Knowledge Center before the application due date.

Applications are due Oct. 3 and must be submitted on the Indian River County Funders Forum core grant application, which is available at www.ircommunityfoundation.com.

the downward spiral of the economy is slowing and financially the community is close to the basement and the council as a whole has been successful in maintaining city services at an expected level and have kept taxes down.

"I have a tremendous amount of experience on Sebastian City Council and working with neighboring communities in Indian River County," Mayor Hill said.

Reducing spending, consolidating departments, shrinking staff and implementing furlough days have put the city in a good place, Mayor Hill said.

"I think we're in a pretty good place, finding the balance for the leanest government and high quality of life," he said.

In the early 2000s, the city drainage system was the primary topic of con-

versation, but now it's rarely spoken of because the city was able to improve the system and all but eliminate flooding issues, Mayor Hill said.

Earlier this year, a tremendous rain event unrelated to a hurricane caused flooding in Vero Beach and various places in unincorporated county lands and made the news, but there was no mention of Sebastian at all, he said.

"Sebastian didn't have a flooding problem. What

we're doing in regard to drainage is proving beneficial," Mayor Hill said.

Budget issues will always be around and people will be divided on what to spend money on, but Mayor Hill said he stands by the council's decision for the betterment of the city.

"We hadn't raised our (storm water) rates in 11 years and now we've adjusted that rate \$1 per month. These are things that are not easy to do to generate revenue, but necessary to improve the city," Mayor Hill said.

The working waterfront project, an area the council has high hopes for bringing in traffic and revenue to the area, is on point and moving forward, he said.

The first part of the project, renovations to the former Hurricane Harbor site and opening a fish market and the opening and closing of a restaurant, came about so quickly it seems like the rest of the project is dragging.

Turning the blighted area into a productive and vibrant area is worth the time and money spent on it, Mayor Hill said.

"The last thing they need to do is scuttle the project," Mayor Hill said.

TREASURE COAST — After a series of layoffs, Sarah Pizarro decided to open her own health care business, Ability Home Care.

Energetic and motivated, the single mom had previous work experience in health care, but knew she had to polish her business skills and create a business plan for her new firm.

Ms. Pizarro found the education and guidance she was looking for through the Indian River State College bachelor's degree program in organizational management.

"The professors were so helpful. Their knowledge base and real experience helped me expand the business," Ms. Pizarro said.

Since graduating with her bachelor's degree, Ability Home Care has grown more

extremely impressive," she said.

NetBoss Technologies, Seacoast National Bank and Vero Insurance were all recognized as companies of the year, in the large-, medium- and small-size company categories.

Paying bills online saves time, stamps

Well, it's that time of the month again; it's bill paying time. Have you ever noticed how close the end of the month is to the beginning of the month?

The monthly ritual seems to never end but it has become worlds easier with computers, the Internet and online bill paying services that most utilities have added to their systems.

Here's the way life used to work every month: the bills would come in at the beginning of the month (as they still do) and then, I'd go through each one with the checkbook and a book of stamps. I'd write a check, write it in the check book, stick it in the envelope along with that month's payment stub, write my return address on the outside of the envelope, stick a stamp on it and drop it in the mail. Every month like clockwork, it was a chore that consumed a bunch of stamps, checks, time and usually resulted in a little writer's cramp.

How are things now? Well, the bills still come in every month like clockwork but the hassle of writing checks and dropping them in the mail is almost a thing of the past. Sure, the chore of sitting down and "paying the bills" is still there, but with my trusty pc and my Internet connection, I can get the job knocked out in half the time that it used to take and I can get a book of stamps to last months now.

So, what's involved? Well, it helps to have a credit card (or a "check card" with the Visa logo that most banks are happy to provide), a computer and an Internet connection. It also helps to know the web addresses of the companies that you wish to pay online, but the nice thing about that is they usually print the web address somewhere right on your monthly statement.

Connect to the Internet and navigate to the companies' website whose bill you are trying to pay and follow the onscreen instructions. Hint: you will usually find a link that says "pay online." Follow that link and you are on your way.

Now, here's the catch;

each website is setup different from the others so you kind of have to think about what you are trying to do on each site and follow their particular set of links.

Some sites may have you sign up first; that is to create an account on their website first before you can pay your bill online, but you only have to do that the first time; once the account is created, the next month when you log in (remember the username and password when you set it up) all of your information from the last time should be already there.

Not comfortable using a credit card online? Well, you are actually safer with credit card orders because the bank spends an enormous amount of resources preventing fraud and will usually back you up if something does go wrong but hey, I can understand the worry. In lieu of a credit card, many sites will allow for electronic fund transfers by asking for your bank account and routing numbers (is that really safer?) or you may even have luck checking to see if your bank's online system allows for web-based bill pay to the companies you pay each month. Most online banking systems these days provide for it and if they don't, you can also check PayPal. They've been offering a bill-pay service for a while and you may be surprised at who you can use them with.

Let's go back to paying the bills individually. Let's see, you can navigate to www.fpl.com to pay your electric bill. You have to set up an account online first, but then every month, log back in and make a payment.

Do you have a telephone setup through AT&T? You can go to www.att.com and sign up for online bill pay there. Again, you have to set up an account the first time but every time after that;



Who said, 'You can't have your cake and eat it, too?'

Hello smart shoppers. The holidays are around the corner, so I must repeat this amazing cake for special occasions in both the original and the low-fat version.

I found the recipe in a magazine when I was a teenager. It was so intriguing I saved it. Years later I made it for my father's birthday. The fact that he didn't like cake in any shape or form didn't enter the picture.

My granddaughter, Christy, another one who doesn't like cake, requested it for her birthday. She was forewarned and promised she would eat it, which she did.

This cake is a project, but for a special occasion, you can just count on the applause. Enjoy, see you next week.

This cake is large and can't be changed; leftovers freeze great. You can cut the fat and cholesterol if you

use my recipe for a fat- and cholesterol-free cake and by substituting low-fat or fat-free whipped topping for the heavy cream.

I will repeat the recipe for a fat and cholesterol free cake for those of you who missed it and then go onto the recipe in its original form.

FAT- AND CHOLESTEROL-FREE CAKE

When using a cake mix, substitute applesauce for the oil, egg substitute or egg whites for the eggs, adding one extra white and 1 tbsp. flour. Add water as package directs. Spray pans with cooking spray.

END OF THE RAINBOW CAKE

2 packages white cake mix
Food coloring (optional)
3/4-cup canned crushed

pineapple, well-drained
1/2-teaspoon almond extract
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
1/2-cup finely chopped pistachio nuts
1/2-cup apricot preserves, slightly beaten
1/2-cup raspberry preserves
1 quart heavy whipping cream OR 8 cups frozen whipped topping*
2 tablespoons confectioner's sugar

NOTE: I prepare all of the whipped cream mixtures first and then layer the cake.

Day before: In two 8-inch by 8-inch by 2-inch square pans or two 8-inch round pans, bake 1 package cake

mix as package directs. Repeat. Refrigerate four cooled, wrapped cakes.

Early next day: If you're using heavy whipping cream, whip half the cream (2 cups). Heavy cream doubles when whipped, giving you 4 cups. Refrigerate remaining cream.

1. With long sharp knife, split each of 3 cakes, making 6 layers. On large, low cake plate, place one of the split layers, cut side up.

2. With yellow color, tint pineapple pale yellow; then fold in one fourth of the whipped cream. Spread mixture on split layer; top with second split layer, cut side up.

3. With red color, brighten raspberry jam; fold in one fourth of the whipped cream. Spread on second layer; top with third split layer cut side up.

4. With green color, tint one fourth of whipped cream pale green. Fold in almond extract, granulated

sugar and nuts. Spread on third layer; top with fourth split layer, cut side up.

5. With yellow color, brighten apricot preserves; fold in rest of the cream. Spread on fourth layer; top with fifth split layer cut side down. (Use rest of cake elsewhere).

6. Refrigerate cake for at least 2 hours to set.

7. Whip remaining 2 cups of cream, adding confectioner's sugar.

Frost top and sides of cake, refrigerate until serving time.

This cake is so tall you will need dinner plates to serve it. An electric knife cuts it best.

Decorate cake as you choose. I used fresh cut, washed flowers from the garden. Remember, the flowers are to decorate, not to eat, just to look at.

WHIPPED CREAM

Whipped cream is

extremely tricky to catch it just right before it turns to butter. Use 2 tablespoons confectioner's sugar to 2 cups heavy whipping cream. Use a high narrow bowl. Chill bowl and beaters.

Using an electric mixer, beat at high speed until frothy. Add sugar and continue beating, watching the cream very carefully. It will start to thicken.

Continue beating, scraping bowl occasionally. The cream is whipped when it starts to have a slight "break-up" look. (Overbeating by just a few seconds will suddenly turn it into butter. It will become a mass with water around it.)

This makes enough to frost two 8- to 9- inch layers.
