Taking account of oral health

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY — Treasure Coast Community Health is putting their resources where your mouth is, literally.

When bones break or fevers rise, most people know to seek treatment from a medical professional to get their health back on track, but when it comes to oral health, many are hesitant to make the same move.

Treasure Coast Community Health, a nonprofit federally-qualified community health center in Indian River County, is hoping to show the community how important dental health is, and recently won a grant opportunity to help them on their way.

For five weeks, Treasure Coast Community Health had a licensed community dental health coordinator from Wisconsin making connections with the community and discovering the gaps in dental health care in Indian River County, said Richard Huot, interim dental director for Treasure Coast Community Health and a board member of the Florida Dental Association.

Jenna Linden is one of 34 graduate students in the country that has completed the 18-month training course to become a community dental health coordinator and is traveling the country to show communities, dental associations, colleges and universities the benefits of the licensing

program.

A community dental health coordinator is essentially a social worker for the dental health community and is trained in oral health promotion, community organization and networking, cultural competency and public health. The goals of this effort are to promote oral health education and disease prevention and empower underserved

communities to manage their own oral health, a press release said.

By having someone on staff that is dedicated to doing this, that frees up the dentists and hygienists to see their patients in a timely manner, while still making sure they are getting the education they need to take back home with them, Dr. Huot said.

Treasure Coast Commu-

nity Health has a good working relationship with Eastern Florida State College and Indian River State College and their dental programs, so he is hopeful they will see the benefit of the program.

This sort of training and licensing opens up a new career avenue for people in the dental field, Dr. Huot said.

Finding someone with a

dental background, such as a hygienist, like Ms. Linden, who was from the community to dedicate themselves to dental education and disease prevention would be an enormous help, Dr. Huot said.

During her five-week stay, Ms. Linden visited with nonprofit groups and other organizations that interact

Building a future with plastics

VERO BEACH — If a 30-pound spool of bright yellow filament showed up at your doorstep, could you turn it into a crown, a vase, or a flying object?

Vero Beach High School senior William "Taylor" Norman of Vero Beach and his family have a hobby-turned-garage-business that can do just that with the help of 3D printers, computer software and a little bit of imagination.

At any time of the day, the Normans can have up to four 3D printers with robotic arms laying down dozens of micro-thin layers of melted plastic to

create sturdy, useable objects from a digital model created on a computer.

"It's the same plastic that is used to make LEGOs," said Brad Norman, Taylor's father.

Several years ago, Mr. Norman purchased a kit to build a 3D Cartesian printer and became fascinated with the possibilities the printer opened up, including the possibility to print out the pieces to build another 3D printer.

Taylor got on board with the program and the family now sells entire kits for others to build their own 3D printer and create their own plastic inventions through their website,

Drugs-by-mail scheme goes to pot

Two jailed for mailing marijuana scheme post bond, more arrests expected

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY — Two men were arrested and more than 15 pounds of marijuana was seized last week as a result of a month-long drug investigation involving mailing marijuana.

Michael David Fedick, 28, and Clifton Lloyd Garrison, 56, both of 1590 20th Ave. Southwest, Vero Beach posted bail last week after being arrested on drug possession charges.

Mr. Fedick was charged with two felonies, possession of more than 20 grams of marijuana and possession

of marijuana with intent to distribute, while Mr. Garrison was charged with misdemeanor possession of marijuana, which means less than 20 grams of marijuana.

The investigation is ongoing more arrests are anticipated, law enforcement said.

According to a press release from Sgt. Eric Flowers of the Indian River County Sheriff's Office, the investigation and arrest was coordinated by the sheriff's office multi-agency criminal enforcement, or MACE, unit, which includes agents and detectives from the Sebastian and Vero Beach police departments.

with both ends of the age spectrum, including senior congregate meal sites and childcare facilities.

"One thing I've learned since starting this is that you can't assume that people know the basics of dental

care," Ms. Linden said.

Dr. Huot emphatically agreed with her observation.

Many times what can happen is that a family has habits, including nutritional and hygienic habits, that have been passed down from generation to generation, but those habits can be shaped on misinformation, Dr. Huot said.

One common habit that has a negative effect on oral health is putting a small child to bed with a bottle containing juice or milk, Ms. Linden said.

The sugars in the drink will stay on the gums and teeth of the children for a prolonged amount of time, often causing early tooth decay, often called "bottle rot," Ms. Linden said.

Another way a coordinator helps the community is by working with the patient

to develop treatment plans, or to find specialists that accept the patient's insurance coverage, Ms. Linden said.

"We can connect them to the care they need," she said.

Ms. Linden said the community response she has seen in Indian River County and during her time in Vermont has been quite positive.

"The community recognizes a great need for dental

care but doesn't necessarily know who to turn to for advice and direction on the topic," Ms. Linden said.

Grand prize house is valued at nearly \$300,000

TREASURE COAST — The YMCA of the Treasure Coast is kicking off its biggest fundraiser of the year: The annual Easter House raffle.

This is the 27th year the YMCA has raffled off a house in the area, providing one lucky family with a brand new abode or \$150,000 and thousands of others with YMCA scholarships.

Every \$10 raffle ticket goes toward providing Treasure Coast children and families with scholarship dollars that they can use toward the 87 programs like gymnastics and

tae kwon do or senior pilates and tai chi that the YMCA offers.

"We don't ever want to turn anyone away for an inability to pay," said Robin Sutherland, Easter House project director. "Every year we provide thousands of scholarships with the money we raise."

That's what the Easter House raffle is truly all about.

"It's not just about the house," Ms. Sutherland said. "First and foremost we're supporting the children and families of the Treasure Coast."

That's what she has loved about her job for the many years she's been giving away Easter Houses for the YMCA.

"I feel very privileged. I've changed 16 people's lives, but we've touched tens of thousands of children and families of the Treasure Coast."

Last year, more than 60,000 raffle tickets were sold, raising more than \$250,000. This year the goal is to sell 62,000 tickets for the house that is valued at around \$50,000 more than last year's.

"It's a beautiful home in a great neighborhood," Ms. Sutherland said.

The model house is on display and open for touring, but the actual house

to be awarded to one lucky individual will be built after the drawing so the winner can select details like the color of the tile, cabinets and countertops.

Of course, if the winner is happy with the home they already have, they can opt for the \$150,000 cash prize instead. There's also a second prize this year that can only be won by purchasing three Easter House tickets at the same time. It is a 2014 Harley Davidson Dyna Switchback donated by Treasure Coast Harley Davidson and valued at \$16,000.

ST. LUCIE COUNTY – St. Lucie County's Department of Public Safety and Communications announced that through its partnership with the National Oceanographic Atmospheric Administration's weather program the NOAA Weather Radio service is up and running again on the Treasure Coast.

St. Lucie County worked with the NOAA's Melbourne

Forecast Office of the National Weather Service for the past five months to provide space and equipment for the National Weather Service's weather radio transmitter to be replaced and upgraded to put out a 500-watt signal.

"We are pleased to be able to return NOAA Weather Radio service to the Treasure Coast this week and appreciate the partnership from St. Lucie County to help make it happen. The new transmitter will allow the

power to be increased nearly three-fold once FCC approval is granted, which will further improve and expand coverage of the broadcast. When it comes to severe weather, seconds can save lives, and we encourage all citizens to have a NOAA Weather Radio and to move to a safe location immediately when a warning is issued for their area," said Scott Spratt, Warning Coordination Meteorologist from the Melbourne Forecast Office of the NWS.

Working with the Federal Communication Commission's Emergency Alert System, the National Weather Radio Service is an all hazards radio network, making it a single source for comprehensive weather and emergency information. In conjunction with emergency managers and other public officials, the NWS broadcasts warnings and post-event information for all types of hazards including natural events such as extreme weather events,

Understanding 'estimated time remaining'

I was backing up some data a while back to an external USB drive, when I noticed a behavior that is not uncommon at all.

As I began backing up the contents of a rather bloated My Documents folder (gigabytes worth of data), during the copy process I noticed the "estimated time remaining" figure was jumping all over the place.

It started out saying something like 48 minutes remaining, and then jumped down to 30, 18 and then 11 minutes.

As I watched the file copy process progress, I noticed the estimated time remaining figure stayed at 11 minutes for more than an hour. The progress bar was moving slowly to the right, and just as I thought the file transfer was just about over, the progress bar jumped back about a third of the way across.

The time remaining figure jumped to a whopping 25,464,387 minutes. Consulting my trusty calculator watch, I figured that 25,464,387 minutes was the equivalent of 17,683 days or 48 years. No, that couldn't be right.

As I watched, the number bounced around some, dropping from the incredibly high 25 million mark and dropping to more manageable numbers, such as 45 minutes, 28 and once again 11 minutes and there it stayed for another 45 minutes.

I finally got fed up with watching (it's like watching paint dry) and shut off the monitor, so I don't know when it actually finished. But when I came back to it in the morning, the file copy was complete. And it didn't take 48 years. But it got me thinking; what is this estimated time remaining business all about, and can that figure ever be trusted?

I've certainly seen that behavior before with other file copy operations, downloads from the internet, CD burning and other similar procedures, and I've always taken that number with a grain of salt, but that 25 million figure caught my attention. What is going on

with this picture?

Well, in order to understand why that number fluctuates so wildly, it's necessary to keep in mind that, on any given computer, what's happening at any given moment is not necessarily the way things are going to happen in the next moment. So the "estimated" part of "estimated time remaining" is just that an estimate based on the conditions taken at that particular time slice. And what happens, from second-to-second is those conditions are changing. Rapidly.

What that means is when the computer starts a file transfer; it grabs hold of a chunk of data and looks to see how much bandwidth is available. Then it bases its estimate of how long it will take on that. But that estimate does not take into account things such as the overhead activity between the device and the computer and how much of the buffer is still available, etc., you know, lots of other technical things that are happening at the same time as the data transfer.

Let me rephrase it like this: As soon as the file transfer starts, all the figures the computer based its' estimate on change, because of the way computers do things.

One question that is bound to come up is: "Is this strictly a Windows issue?" and to that I would have to say no. I've observed the same behavior on my Macs as well as my Windows boxes.

I would personally like to see them do away with the estimated time figure and just stick with a graphical progress meter. That would make a whole lot more sense than the arbitrary numbers we get now, and they are easier to read at a glance.

I've worked since I was 15 years old, and paid into a system that I never thought I would need. But now I do need it, and you know what? I'm damn well going to use it.

So before you judge someone who is using food stamps to keep their family fed you need to know the story behind it. The only reason I know the woman in the story wasn't me is because I've already sold or pawned all my gold jewelry, what little of it I had.

One person's opinion

The president did his state of the union address, and let's see... he sold the American people a big lie and the ones who voted him in are the ones who think others need to pay for them. We need a change in this country. Let's quit giving money out to those who produce kids just to be on welfare and cut out Social Security Disability, two of the most abused systems we have. Computer assistance that goes the distance

SEBASTIAN — Whether you have one personal computer or a business office full of networked gadgets and gizmos, Computer Healthcare in Sebastian is a great resource for instruction and repair.

Since 2004, Tony Galentine and his staff have offered top-notch technical services to Sebastian and the surrounding area, ranging from computer diagnosis to installing Wi-Fi hot spots and everything in between.

Unsuspecting computer users believe the scam and allow the caller to remotely access their system, and once they realize it was a scam, the damage has already been done, Ms. Martin said.

Identity theft is a definite possibility in those types of circumstances, she said.

"When they call us, we tell them to disconnect the Internet and unplug the machine and bring it in to us so we can try to fix it," Ms. Martin said.

Computer Healthcare also has some computer equipment available for retail purchase, for both residential and commercial customers.

TREASURE COAST — Indian River and St. Lucie County students who will attend the University of Florida as undergraduates this fall are invited to apply for a \$1,500 scholarship from the Treasure Coast Gator Club.

The online application process is new this year to the Gator Club Scholarship program. According to Melissa DePriest, scholarship committee chairwoman, the change was necessary to handle the growing number of scholarship applications.

"There are some years

when we have had more than 70 scholarship applications to review," said Ms. DePriest. Florida Scrub-Jay topic of Audubon meeting

PELICAN ISLAND — Pelican Island Audubon invites the public to attend "The Secret Life of the Florida Scrub-Jay" with Bob Montanaro on Feb. 17, starting at 7:30 p.m. at the Vero Beach Community Center, 2266 14th Avenue.

The Florida Scrub-Jay is an attractive and personable bird with many unique qualities. They are cooperative breeders often living in extended family groups with young from previous years staying around as helpers to help raise and care for the latest offspring.

As Florida's only endemic bird they are found only in peninsular Florida and nowhere else in the world. They are fairly sedentary birds that do not travel very far and have evolved to live successfully in only one type of Florida habitat; oak

scrub unique to the well-drained, dry, sandy conditions found in parts of central Florida and along the Atlantic coastal ridge; areas that are also highly prized by developers. Habitat loss is the bird's greatest enemy causing an almost 90 percent decline in population over the last one hundred years leading to the bird's designation as a threatened species back in 1987.

To illustrate the life history of the Florida Scrub-Jay, Pelican Island Audubon Society office manager and wildlife photographer Bob Montanaro spent considerable time this past year under the guidance of wildlife biologist Joe Carroll waiting for opportunities to document Florida Scrub-Jay behavior through still photographs and digital video. "The Secret Life of the Florida Scrub-Jay" brings to life the often-elusive behavior of these birds

and why the preservation of their habitat is one of the best ways to preserve the Florida Scrub-Jay along with the myriad other species that make the scrub their home.

The Pelican Island Audubon Society is a local chapter of the National Audubon Society dedicated to the preservation and protection of animals, plants, and natural communities in Indian River County through advocacy, education, and public awareness through monthly meetings, field trips, and other programs. During the investigation, law enforcement discovered Mr. Fedick was receiving shipments of marijuana from California, hidden inside boxes with other items, including children's books and crossword puzzles,

Sgt. Flowers said. Detectives believe he may have been receiving more than 200 pounds of marijuana per month through the USPS.

UltiBots.

In addition to plastic pieces, the kits include heaters, motors, cooling fans, glass printing surfaces, belts and other tiny hardware pieces that when put together can be used to make virtually anything, Taylor said.

"You can learn so much just by putting the printer together," he said.

After graduation, Taylor would like to pursue a career in engineering. He hopes his interest and experience working with 3D printing software to build strong, durable shapes and developing communication and networking skills through the business side of his hobby

will pay off in the long run.

"I feel like I'll always be able to use what I have learned doing this. I like the design aspect. You can take a model of something that someone else created and make it your own, make it better," Taylor said.

"And the business experience has been great; finding where to get products and deal with customers. But it is also just a lot of fun to do," he said.

In some ways, the excitement around 3D printing technology, which has been around since the 1980s but only recently became widely available, is a combination of a love for old-fashioned "do-it-yourself" projects and electronic technology.

"We're geeks and we're proud of it," Mr. Norman

said with a laugh.

There is a growing grassroots movement known as the "Maker Movement" where personal 3D printing and similar technology-based creating is embraced and emphasized.

A website, Thingiverse.com, is full of free user-submitted model instructions on how to create and build with 3D printers, Taylor said.

Taylor and Mr. Norman have submitted the plans for two of their favorite plastic creations, a quad-copter and a hexicopter, both of which have been flown at Riverside Park.

"These are up there for free and people can download them and make it themselves," Taylor said.

Recently the Normans went to a maker fair in Orlando and set up a booth showing what their 3D printers can do, and even created all the plastic pieces to a new 3D printer in four hours.

"The Maker Movement is really like a club for making stuff," Mr. Norman said.

On a serious note, not everyone who has a 3D printer may be interested in creating fun things like helicopters, or useful things like pencil holders, he said.

There have been news reports that some people have used the technology to build operational firearms, Mr. Norman said.

"We can't know what people will do with the printers," he said.

Most people that have 3D printers or want something printed want to build prototypes and work out the kinks in designs before manufacturing, Taylor said.

One thing Taylor and Mr. Norman would love to see is a local group of similar-minded Makers to meeting together on a regular basis to exchange ideas.

"There is a group in Brevard, but it would be nice to have one in Vero Beach," Mr. Norman said.

in 2012, Woody's earned the Hometown News Reader's Choice award for best BBQ in Sebastian.

Dave McCauley, owner of the restaurant, said the formula to a successful and popular restaurant involves two ingredients: great food and great staff.


Setting up an irrigation system, benefits of doing so

Normally during the summer months, Mother Nature leaves us with enough daily rain to keep our lawns green and lush with only a minimal amount of manual watering. Most of this beneficial rainfall falls during the months of June, July, August and September. The remainder of the year can often leave our lawns and yards with a serious deficiency of water. This either requires us to water our lawns by hand or use portable sprinklers. The problem with this is that you have to move the sprinklers around the yard in order to get even coverage. Another alternative is a home irrigation system.

A well-planned, in-ground system can be easily controlled with a timer box and can even shut itself off when it rains to conserve

water. The drawbacks of an in-ground system are maintenance and cost. Even a good system will require regular maintenance to maintain efficiency. The good news is that the system will eventually pay for itself over time with what you will save on landscape maintenance.

To design a good system, you should start out with a map, drawn to scale, of the area you wish to irrigate. Be sure to include all the details including plants and buildings. Then, draw in the diagram of the route you are going to use for the PVC pipe. Mark off the spots where you will install your sprinkler heads and consider whether you need a full, half or quarter spray and also the distance needed to cover that segment. Be sure your segments overlap to ensure you have no dead spots. You can draw this out

on graph paper or you can buy special kits that guide you through the planning process.

The next thing that must be considered is how many zones you will have on your system. If you try to put too many sprinkler heads on your system, the water pressure may be too low to operate that zone correctly. You may only want to put four or five sprinkler heads in one zone or even less if you have poor water pressure. The various zones will be rotated automatically by the electronic water timer. In fact, more zones give you more versatility

when it comes to managing your system.

The best water source for your system is to have a separate well and pump to feed water to your sprinklers but for some people this is not in the budget. You can use an existing well and pump that you use for your home water supply with good results. If you happen to have an onsite pond or water retention area, you can recycle this water by pumping directly from these sources.

One important part that should be installed on your system is an automatic rainfall override. These inexpensive devices automatically shut off your system when sufficient rain falls and satisfies the adjustable sensor. These devices not only save water and electricity but they also prevent your lawn from getting watered too heavily.

In fact, they are required by code in many counties.

There are three basic pumps that are most frequently used to power irrigation systems: A surface centrifugal pump, a jet pump and a submersible centrifugal pump. The most commonly used pump for home use is a jet pump. These pumps can be used for both shallow and deep well applications. For very deep well applications, a submersible centrifugal pump may be used. The disadvantage is if the pump needs to be serviced it has to be removed from the well.

One last consideration is the quality of the water being pumped from the well. If the water has a lot of sediment or sand, it will be necessary to install a sand filter inline before the water reaches the sprinkler heads. This will help

prevent clogging of the sprinklers and will provide more enjoyable and trouble free operation of your system.

The bottom line: A well designed water system can save you loads of time and take the worry out of getting the proper amounts of water to your lawn. In the long run, it can pay for itself over time by saving you money on lawn maintenance. There is also one added bonus; you can install an inline device that will actually allow you to fertilize your lawn directly through the water system! This can be a real time saver and convenience option.



A hidden gem lies in Winter Haven

It's always a treat to play golf in a pristine setting. Finding just such a place in Florida is often difficult. Most of our courses are built as part of a community or development and are simply an amenity.

On the way to Orlando a few weeks back, my friend Dan Shube and I discovered a true gem. Located on the southern shores of Lake Hamilton, just a stone's throw west of U.S. Highway 27, lies the Country Club of Winter Haven.

Founded in 1923 by members seeking a place of natural beauty, and a congenial way of life, this club has become Central Florida's most prestigious and historic private club. Originally named Lake Region Country Club, the club endured The Great Depression, two World Wars, hurricanes, and countless financial setbacks. It wasn't until 1964

that the club evolved into a modern country club.

In 2013, the course sold to a small group of equity members and became known as the Country Club of Winter Haven. These new owners have exciting plans for the property.

The property sits on approximately 200 acres with a mile of lake frontage. There are some of the most beautiful mature oaks and pines in Florida on this property, many dripping with Spanish moss. When Dan and I were about to walk off the first tee he said to me, "Wait a minute. Stop and just look around."

It was a great call. It was an amazing view. There were the tree-lined fairways,

the shimmering lake, birds chirping and a slight breeze. It was a surreal feeling of relaxation and bliss.

Just a few months ago a major renovation on the golf course was completed by Rees Jones and Bill Bergin. Several holes were re-routed. A new practice range was built. Greens and bunkers were rebuilt and upgraded. The entire experience is like a walk in the park.

The par-72 course features five sets of tees, playing from 5,165 to 7,029 yards. At least six holes begin, end or play alongside the shore of Lake Hamilton. In fact, you can see the lake from just about any point on the gently rolling course.

Most of the holes have a slight dogleg making positioning off the tee a necessity. The raised greens roll fast and true and are receptive to most approach shots. They are almost all perfectly framed by trees

and water, and protected by bunkers filled with fluffy white sand and closely mowed chipping areas.

Water only comes into play on about six holes. There are only a couple of forced carries and the fairways widths are pretty generous. You must beware of the trees though. I found a few and had good practice punching back out to the fairway.

My favorite holes are on the back nine. The trees between the 11th and 16th holes are home to a nesting pair of bald eagles. Dan and I witnessed the pair feeding on fish they had just caught. It was an amazing feeling seeing these great birds so close.

Despite being distracted by the eagles and the shimmering lake, there is work to be done down the stretch. The par-4 16th is a dogleg right that requires you to work the ball or risk running your drive through

the fairway. Depending on your success, you could find yourself hitting a short iron or a middle iron approach to a narrow green.

Seventeen is a mid-length par-3. The green is guarded by tall trees and deep bunkers. From the tees you are sheltered from the breeze coming off the lake and have to pay careful attention to where the wind may carry your shot.

The final hole is fantastic. The entire length of this par-5 runs along the lake. It's only 535 yards from the back tees, and just over 400 from the front making it reachable in two. After a drive over marshland to a twisting fairway you have a decision to make. Laying up may be more difficult than going for the green. A pond pinches in from the right and the lake sits to the left. The green is narrow and deep and features a lot of undulation. It's a great hole that brings any score from

three to eight into the equation.

While there are a few tweaks to the course to complete the renovation work there, the project is far from finished. The clubhouse is going to see a complete restoration and upgrade. A new state-of-the-art tennis center is being built along with a new pool.

The Country Club of Winter Haven has a rich history. It looks like it is going to have an even richer future. For more information on the club and memberships, call (863) 324-6666 or visit the website at www.ccofwinterhaven.com.
