

## Solar paying dividends for FPL customers

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY — Florida Power & Light Company announced that the Blue Cypress Solar Energy Center in Indian River County and the Loggerhead Solar Energy Center in St. Lucie County started producing power as of early March.

Thanks in part to this increased solar power

generation, FPL says customers will immediately see a decrease in their bills of approximately \$3.35 per month for a typical 1,000-kWh residential customer.

The decrease is not due exclusively to the solar plants. In another cost-saving and pro-environment move, in January FPL retired the St. John's River Power Park, the largest of three coal-fired plants FPL is phasing out.

"We are committed to advancing affordable

## Sebastian doubles storm water fees

SEBASTIAN — The Sebastian City Council voted May 9 to raise stormwater fees.

According to the city, the purpose of the resolution that the council adopted unanimously is to generate an additional \$1,000,000 for the Sebastian Stormwater Utility Fund by increasing the Equivalent Residential Unit fee from \$5 per month to \$10 per month, doubling total stormwater revenues to \$2,000,000. The increase is due to a need to stabilize the stormwater fund balance, generate additional revenue which will help the city continue stormwater maintenance programs, replace equipment, and prepare for future capital investment.

This increase will be effective throughout the corporate limits of the City of Sebastian. The stormwater fee is collected by the Indian River Tax Collector on the annual tax bill. Failure to pay the assessment will cause a tax certificate to be issued against the property which, the city warned, may result in a loss of title.

In arguing for the increase, City Manager Joe Griffin said Sebastian has fallen behind on major stormwater projects. He said doubling the stormwater fee would, over time, pay for a potential \$18 million seawall project.

Mr. Griffin added that if there is a seawall failure, it would take about two years to receive permit approval and ten years to replace the seawall. If council



# District to charge nonprofits for after-school busing

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY — Residents packed the Indian River County School Board meeting on May 22, most opposing the superintendent's decision to stop paying for busing to after school programs at Gifford Youth Achievement Center, Dasie Bridgewater Hope Center, and the Boys & Girls Clubs.

A letter sent from the school district to the leadership of those organizations read, in part, "Students that are currently participating in your program will continue to be provided transportation through the end of the current school year, however, once the annual agreement expires at the end of the 2017-2018 school year, courtesy rides will no longer be provided. Please accept this letter as timely notification of the school district's decision to non-renew the transportation agreement."

According to figures provided by Jennifer Idlette, the school district's Transportation Director, the annual amounts in question include roughly \$8,800 for Dasie Hope, \$27,350 for GYAC, \$8,550 for the Vero Beach Boys & Girls Club, \$19,800 for the Sebastian Boys & Girls Club, and \$14,165 for the Fellsmere Boys & Girls Club. The annual total for the estimated 268 students using the bus service is about \$78,670.

When the school board meeting began at 6 p.m., the room was packed with parents, teachers, and nonprofit representatives who wanted to speak and had filled out speaker cards. Board discussion of this item began at

about 7 p.m., with public input not starting until after 9 p.m., well after many hopeful speakers had left, unheard.

School Board member Laura Zorc appeared as the momentary hero of the nonprofit groups, receiving praise from speaker after speaker for meeting with them and seeking a solution that would continue the busing.

Superintendent Dr. Mark Rendell said that the free transportation to the nonprofits had been identified by Ms. Idlette as a potential area for savings. Dr. Rendell said that Ms. Idlette had informed the three nonprofits last spring "that the district would no longer be able to provide this service at no cost."

"Before this decision is finalized by the superintendent and the director of transportation, I wanted us to have a board discussion of the cause and effects of the defunding of the nonprofit transportation courtesy stops," Ms. Zorc said.

"After carefully looking into the cause and effects of this cut, I am hopeful that we can collectively seek other options for savings and cuts with lesser impact on students. I ask that we completely abandon the idea of defunding the nonprofit transportation as an option."

Ms. Zorc then outlined the important benefits to the community of all three nonprofits.

"Long-term, is this budget cut worth the price?" she asked. "For our at risk students, making the dream work means the entire community coming together in partnership."

Ms. Zorc added that providing courtesy transportation to these nonprofits after school, providing mentoring, tutoring, and after school supervision "in a safe, loving, and learning environment," was an example of the board and school system playing its part. She said the \$78,000 was "a small price to pay for the immeasurable amount of life-long benefits our students are receiving," adding that the three organizations have a combined waiting list of nearly 200 students, who they can't serve due to lack of funding.

Adam Bollinger, Chairman of GYAC, said that when Ms. Idlette presented the figures to the group, she said "take it or leave it."

"There is no conversation about this, it is just being jammed down our throat," Mr. Bollinger said. "Mrs. Zorc is the only one who has decided to actually meet with us and talk about these things."

Anthony Brown, head of the Indian River County NAACP, seized on a discussion from earlier in the evening about the district's legal fees. Referring to the ongoing lawsuit over school desegregation and other incomplete mandates from the federal court, Mr. Brown said "You're close to a million dollars playing with me but you're crying over \$78,000."

"You're talking about 12 years you've had this contract (where the nonprofits were supposed to be charged)," Mr. Brown said. "I'm talking about 50 years you've had a contract you didn't live up to. So let's not play this game."

"Dasie Hope, GYAC, and Boys and Girls Clubs take care of the least of our children. Your school board would not be doing as

well as it is doing academically and socially without these programs. You owe them. This is socially wrong, economically wrong, spiritually wrong."

Elizabeth Thomason, Executive Director of the Boys & Girls Club of Indian River County, said her organization has had a very positive relationship with the school district.

"We provide an extension of the school day by helping children complete their homework and participate in quality programming with caring staff and volunteers," Ms. Thomason said, listing many benefits of their programs to the performance of students in school.

"We provide this service to the children who need us most," including hiring a full time career counselor to work with at-risk high school youth, to supplement what she said were overworked and understaffed guidance counselors. Ms. Thomason said their goal was "to help kids graduate on time and with a plan for the future. Charging us for transportation will diminish our ability to provide quality programs. In the upcoming school year we are providing a rent-free place for the school district to work with suspended students, despite the cost that we will incur. We have no intention of passing these costs along to you, because we see you as a partner."

As the agenda item was a "discussion item" and not an "action item," no vote was taken, meaning that the superintendent's decision to start charging the three organizations for bus service will take effect with the beginning of the next school year.

did not spend the money now, they would have to spend it later.

Mayor Jim Hill noted that stormwater has been the biggest issue in Sebastian since at least 1999. Council Member Ed Dodd said that stormwater problems in the city are the result of 30 years of neglect, and that the infrastructure must be addressed now to alleviate the cost and time required for street repairs. Mr. Dodd said that the biggest problem is neighborhood drainage, and that the best way to address that is for the city to assume responsibility for the entire system and fix it.

Residents speaking at the public hearing had mixed feelings. Opponents of the raise focused on the burden to residents who are

on a fixed income. Others asked that the raise be increased gradually over time, rather than all at once.

Supporters of the raise argued that drainage and seawall problems have been neglected for too long, and that the result would be not only neighborhood improvements, but also improvements to the health of the lagoon.

Resident Russell Herrmann said that untreated stormwater runoff is the state's leading source of water pollution, and that the economic value of the lagoon was also tied to the value of real estate.

Tim Glover, President of the Friends of St. Sebastian River said his group supported the increase.

The increase, which begins in October, applies only to residences. The City Attorney said determining the rate for businesses would be a separate process.



clean energy the right way," said FPL President and CEO Eric Silagy. "We are building some of the lowest-cost universal solar ever in the country, which keeps costs down for our customers. The completion of these newest plants demonstrates that it is possible to be both clean and affordable, bringing numerous economic and environmental benefits to our customers and the communities we serve."

The FPL Blue Cypress Solar Energy Center is the second solar center in Indian River County. It will generate 74.5 megawatts of solar energy per year.

FPL says its average bill, about \$99 per month, is now more than 30 percent below the national average of \$139 per month, and 20 percent lower than the Florida average of \$120 per month.

When the solar panels were installed in July, 2017, Florida Audubon Executive Director Eric Draper told Hometown News that his organization gives an enthusiastic thumbs-up to FPL's growth in solar energy.

"Our members love what FPL is doing with these solar facilities all over the state," said Mr. Draper. "Solar uses no water. Water is one of our biggest challenges, so we have to come up with things like this. This is not just an electricity issue, this is a water issue."

"With this site and the seven others that we're doing, we will be tripling the amount of solar that we'll be installing here in Florida," said Mr. Silagy. "It's an amazing thing to see these sites come out of the ground in just a few short months."

Combined, Mr. Silagy said, the eight new solar plants will produce "600 megawatts of solar energy. That's enough power for

120,000 Florida homes."

Florida Audubon's director also emphasized the benefits to the environment.

"The land around these power plants provides a great opportunity to take fields that for a long time have been producing good agricultural products, and give a little of that back to nature," Mr. Draper said. "Florida Audubon has entered into an agreement with FPL at these solar sites to create bird-friendly and pollinator-friendly habitats. Imagine that field full of birds and butterflies and dragonflies and all the beautiful creatures nature made. It's not just about water and electricity. It's also about producing beautiful habitat for birds and butterflies and people."

FPL now has 14 solar plants in operation across Florida in what it calls one of the largest expansions of solar energy in U.S. history. The company is the largest generator of solar energy in Florida. The result, the company says, is lower customer bills than a decade ago.

The eight FPL solar plants that came on line in 2018 are projected to generate more than \$100 million in customer savings during their operating lifetime, over and above the cost of constructing and operating the plants.

In addition, FPL is developing a new battery storage technology that would expand the benefits of solar even further. By increasing solar energy storage capacity, one of the greatest challenges to solar energy, FPL says it will be able to increase the amount of solar energy a plant can deliver to the grid by more than half a million kilowatt-hours per year.

Once the battery storage technology is perfected, FPL predicts that solar will provide more energy nationwide than coal and oil combined.

FPL is also installing small-scale solar arrays throughout the state, most funded by voluntary resident contributions. In April, the Sebastian City Council approved a new solar project to be installed at the Splash Pad at Riverview Park.

The agreement was made under FPL's SolarNow program, which FPL describes as "an easy way to bring clean solar energy to your communities."

"Our SolarNow program allows customers to voluntarily contribute \$9 a month to support solar projects in the community," said FPL Senior Product Development Manager Anuj Chokshi. "We utilize those contributions to build solar projects within the service territory at no cost to our hosts. In Sebastian, we have over 100 residents currently participating in the program."

FPL customers may volunteer to support the program by paying the \$9 fee on their monthly bill. Customers may also choose to not participate.

The Solar Canopy will use solar panels to capture sunlight and generate electricity that is fed into the local grid.

FPL President Silagy noted how far Flori-

da's solar industry has come, winning converts along the way.

"We continue this march in a new direction for how we produce power, despite the fact that it hasn't always been popular," Mr. Silagy said. "In 2001, FPL burned more oil than any utility in America to generate electricity, 41 million barrels of oil. All of it was imported. Much of it came from places that frankly don't support the United States. Places where we send our finest young men and women to go and defend our oil interests. We made a decision as a company that we were going to change the way that we produce power. We made a decision that we were going to embrace new technologies and wean ourselves off of foreign oil."

"Over time, we've changed, quite a bit. Last year we burned almost no oil at all. We switched to domestically produced natural gas, we expanded our nuclear facilities, and we moved to solar. Because of that, we don't have to rely on bringing oil in from places where we shouldn't have to be fighting for it."

# Rain, rain go away

Someone, please, turn off the faucet. Tell Mother Nature that we have had enough rain! While we will now see greener fairways and lakes with water in them, we will also lose 50 yards of roll on our drives (insert sad face here).

As the rain washed out yet another planned round, one of my buddies wondered aloud why it is that some courses or holes drain well and others do not. Most of us don't ever think about what is under the course. The myriad of catch basins and drainage pipes installed before the first blade of grass grew on the course is usually of no concern. When the rains do fall, however, all of these work in concert with the design of the course to rid each hole of water as quickly as possible.

My late friend, Charles Ankron, was an internationally acclaimed golf course architect. I used to do some side work for him and I remember asking him that very question.

"There are three factors that affect course drainage," he explained. "Site, soil and the client."

The first factor, site, varies from course to course. Some courses are located in areas with little rainfall, strong drying winds and an abundance of sunshine. Of course these courses drain well.

In Florida, courses are normally subject to a lot of rain, and while we do have strong winds and abundant sunshine, we suffer from high humidity. The evaporation rate is much lower than you'd expect. We also suffer from not having much elevation change. Water simply has no desire to run

anywhere.

Soil content is next. The greater the amount of topsoil that a course has, the better it can handle a downpour. Topsoil will absorb a large amount of water, and the thicker that layer, the more water the course can handle.

However, it is the subsurface soil stratum has the biggest influence on course drainage. A course with a sandy subsurface will have an excellent absorption rate. A course with a very sandy sub-base course can stay open when some of the exclusive private clubs in the area have to shut down. That's because it absorbs water so well.

Courses unlucky enough to have a hard subsurface, such as marl or sandstone, will need more lakes, more storm drains and more collection areas for the water that the course will shed during a storm or wet season.

Probably the biggest factor, aside from nature, is the client. If the course owner or developer has the money and is sensitive to the golf course, he or she may be willing to spend the money needed to design and build a good drainage system. If the owner simply wants an amenity for the housing development, then chances are that money will not be spent and the course won't drain

well.

If the soil can absorb an inch of rainfall and it rains two inches, the ground is fighting a losing battle. The high points of the course will absorb the first inch and then the second inch will flow downhill. As that water flows to a low point or a catch basin, it grows exponentially adding itself to the water already accumulating downhill.

Most architects use many more drains now than 15 or 20 years ago. I remember a total renovation that Ankron did where he added 220 additional drains to capture water. The original early 1970s design had water running a thousand feet before finding a drain. That was changed so that water ran no more than a hundred feet.

Modern architects also use nature to help drain the course. Sand retention areas and waste areas have become quite popular. Lakes are used to do three things, disperse water, generate fill for building the course, and storm water storage.

The fairways and rough aren't the only places that a golf course architect works to drain water from the course. The greens of a modern course have a complicated drainage system built into them as well.



Today's modern green is topped with 12 inches of custom topsoil. Under that is four inches of gravel followed by a herringbone system of drainpipes set 20 feet apart. The water that makes it to the drainpipes is taken to a lake, swale, dry well or other low point well away from the green.

Thanks to modern irrigation, courses are kept very lush. Unfortunately, sometimes very hard rains follow this and simply adds too much water to the equation.

For now I'm happy to see the rain. We can always use a few drops. I just need Mother Nature to turn it off by the weekend.

# The food that helped win D-Day

D-Day, June 6, was a very special moment in history when 160,000 troops landed on the beaches of Normandy, creating the turning point for the allies in WWII.

To accomplish this great victory, the allies needed a special food that had to be light-weight, nutritious and have the ability to generate lots of energy to keep the troops ready to fight. The Hershey Chocolate Co. was approached in 1937 to create what was later called the “D ration bar.” It had to be high in energy, withstand high heat, and weigh 4 ounces.

What they created isn’t the Hershey bar we know today, which is wonderful. The bar created for the troops was a blend of chocolate, sugar, cocoa butter, skim milk powder and oat flour. The mixture was so thick, it had to be hand molded at first. The bar was like a chocolate brick that had to be shaved with a knife to be eaten. The worst part was the taste, which was extremely bitter because of the chocolate and oat flour recipe.

Later, during the war, a tropical blend was created for the Pacific Campaign. Fortunately because sugar was used to give

quick energy to the troops, caramels, orange and lemon-flavored powdered drinks with lots of sugar were included in the troops’ rations. Hershey produced more than 3 billion bars for the war effort.

I am sure after the war, veterans couldn’t wait to eat Hershey chocolate kisses again. It’s amazing how something that tasted so bad helped win the war.

Chocolate is the number one dessert in the world with a history that dates back to the ancient Aztec and Mayan civilizations.

It seems the first time chocolate was used in war was by Hernando Cortez when he conquered Mexico. The Mayans would make a chocolate drink from ground cacao beans (cocoa beans), chile peppers and water whipped until frothy. Cortez is reported to have required all of his troops to drink the chocolate mixture daily as an energy booster.

During the Revolutionary war, medics would give the drink to wounded soldiers to help with their recovery. Thomas Jefferson was so impressed with the chocolate drink he predicted it would replace tea and coffee in America. In the early 20th century, members of expeditions to the North and South Poles drank hot chocolate to provide warmth, nutrients, and energy boosts.

OK, so it gives you energy and nutrients, but that’s not why we eat it today. We eat it because it taste sooooo good. Place a piece of milk chocolate in your mouth and feel it start to melt and you get that burst of sweet and bitter creaminess. WOW! Now we know it makes a great dessert, too.

If it wasn’t for the Italians, who started adding sugar to chocolate, we might be still drinking a bitter drink. But did you know chocolate is used to make some savory dishes taste great as well? Try my chocolate sauce. You might be surprised! It’s good on steaks, chicken or pork.

## COSTA’S CHOCOLATE SAUCE

### Ingredients

1 tablespoon unsalted butter  
2 cloves garlic, minced small  
1/2-cup chicken or beef stock  
1/2-cup heavy cream or half & half  
2-3 ounces semi-sweet chocolate, chopped  
Your choice, a splash of bourbon, whiskey or vodka  
1 tablespoon hot sauce, more if you like it hotter  
Salt and pepper to taste

### Directions

In a sauce pan, sauté garlic in butter over medium heat for 1-2 minutes; don’t burn. Add stock and continue cooking for 1 minute. Add preferred alcohol and cook 1 more minute. Add heavy cream, chocolate and hot sauce. Cook until it starts to thicken. If it gets too thick, add a little stock. Salt and pepper to taste.

### Tax collector’s west office offers new services

The Tax Collector’s office is pleased to announce a partnership with IdentoGO by IDEMIA, to help local citizens obtain expedited screening at airports around the country.

The Tax Collector Indian River County’s West Office in Vero Beach will now be able to enroll Florida customers for State Licensing, Certification, or Employment requirements, TSA Pre-Check, the Transportation Worker Identification Credential (TWIC) and the Hazardous Materials Endorsement Threat Assessment Program (HME):

- State fingerprinting includes agencies like Department of Children and Families (DCF), Department of Financial Services (DFS), Health Care Providers (AHCA), Department of Health, Florida Board of Bar Examiners, and others.

- TSA Pre-Check is a program that allows travelers to enjoy a fast and efficient screening experience at U.S. airports. Once approved for TSA Pre-Check, travelers do not need to remove their shoes, liquids, laptops, belts and jackets as they go through security. There are more than 450 TSA Pre-Check lanes at over 200 U.S. airports. The cost of enrollment in the program is \$85 and is good for five years, that breaks down to just \$17 per year.

- The Transportation Worker Identification Credential, also known as TWIC®, is required by the Maritime Transportation Security Act for workers who need access to secure areas of the nation’s maritime facilities and vessels.

- The Hazardous Materials Endorsement Threat Assessment Program conducts a threat assessment for any driver

seeking to obtain, renew and transfer a hazardous materials endorsement on a state-issued commercial driver’s license.



# Poisonous plants to be aware of

If you look around your yard and neighborhood, you will find ornamental plants of almost every size, shape and color. What you don't know about some of these common plants can be deadly. Some parts of the ornamental plants or flowers in your yard may contain deadly poison. The most susceptible to being harmed by these plants are children and pets.

One of the most toxic and common poisonous plants is the Oleander. The Oleander plant contains a deadly heart stimulant that resembles the prescription drug digitalis. If a child eats a single leaf or two from this plant it could be deadly. There have been several instances where people have died from eating meats that were roasted from a wood fire that contained Oleander twigs or branches.

Dieffenbachia, which is a common tropical that many of us have in our homes, is also a highly toxic plant. All parts of this plant are poisonous. If eaten, the plant can cause intense burning and irritation of your mouth. The plant can be deadly if enough swelling occurs to block your airway. You

should always wash your hands after handling this or any of the listed poisonous plants.

Another surprising plant is the Azalea. All parts of the Azalea plant can be toxic if ingested. The symptoms include nausea and vomiting along with difficulty in breathing and possibly coma. The end result can be fatal. Even the berries of Jasmine plants can be toxic. They can cause digestive problems along with nervous system disorders.

The foliage from oak trees can be toxic but the effects are gradual. If foliage is ingested, it can slowly affect your kidneys. You need to ingest a substantial amount for severe poisoning to occur. Lantana, which is commonly used by many as a colorful

ground cover, is another specimen that is toxic if ingested. Acute poisoning can cause hemorrhagic diarrhea and rapid heart rate.

Although this list includes some of the most common plant varieties, there are many more that could be added to this list including Milkweed, Narcissus, Daffodil, poison Oak, Purslane and Snow on the Mountain. Bear in mind that just because some of your favorite plants can be toxic if ingested, common sense and keeping these plants out of the reach of small children and pets can totally avoid tragedy.

We have talked a lot about common and seemingly innocent plants that can be toxic but here is one plant that many people think is deadly poisonous but in reality, it is harmless. The plant I am referring to is the Poinsettia. The Poinsettia plant is one of the most widely produced plants in the country. During the holidays, almost every household has at least one Poinsettia adorning their décor. Fear not, as today's commercially distributed varieties are not poisonous.

There are some people, however, that

may get a mild allergic reaction to the milky sap if it comes in contact with their skin. The affected areas can be washed with soap and water to remove the sap if irritation develops. Poinsettia plants are not a serious risk for animals although it is always best to keep any plant out of the reach of pets if they like to chew plants.

Finally, there are also several common houseplants that can be toxic to animals and children. Probably the most common is the Philodendron. The toxic part is the leaves. If ingested, it can cause burning of the lips and mouth and can also cause contact dermatitis if the plant juice contacts the skin. Similar symptoms can occur with Pothos, Golden Pothos and Devil's Ivy.
