

The exciting educational journey of UF nursing students

University of Florida undergraduate nursing students only have to wait 10 more days to receive their hard-earned degrees during the College of Nursing commencement ceremony at 11 a.m. on May 1 at the Phillips Center.

For many of these soon-to-be graduates, the undergraduate experience included the usual experiences of college life, as well as hectic schedules and life-changing experiences.

"The nursing program at the University of Florida is very intense," said Karen Miles, clinical associate professor and associate dean for academic and student affairs at the UF College of Nursing.

Unlike most undergraduate students who spend the first semester of their program in traditional classroom settings, BSN (bachelor of science in nursing) students begin their education with not only a regular course load of classes, but also clinical labs to develop basic skills, such as measuring blood pressure and body temperature.

Additionally, students complete a clinical nursing practicum during their final semester by working alongside a practicing nurse.

"The student works with the nurse during their regular shift, which may be eight or 12 hours," Miles said.

Holly Williamsen, a fourth-year nursing student, works from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., three to four days per week.

"This is my first time working a 12-hour shift," she said. "I've never pushed myself to work this long."

Williamsen said she believes it is necessary for students to experience life and death while learning about nursing.

"As nurses, we are going to see a lot of life and death," she said. "I feel like I'm ready, and I'm really excited to get started."

Her fondest memory occurred last semester when she saw a baby delivered at North Florida Regional Medical Center, Williamsen said.

"I just hope for more special moments like that," she said.

As a student at a college ranked in the top 10 percent of nursing schools in the U.S., Williamsen should have no trouble

getting a job. The program is one of the state's largest providers of new baccalaureate-prepared nurses, and its graduates regularly achieve excellent pass rates on the NCLEX-RN licensing exam.

Although both her practicum and undergraduate experience end May 1, this Gator nurse is able to look forward to building many special moments during her nursing career. Just like 195 fellow UF nursing BSN graduates, she's just begun.

Gators give back on International Gator Day

On May 16, Gator alumni will show their Gator spirit by volunteering in their hometowns for the 11th annual International Gator Day.

International Gator Day is an event associated with the Gator Club Network, a global system comprising all Gator Clubs. Every third Saturday of May, University of Florida alumni and friends volunteer time and effort to make a difference in their communities.

Danny Wuerffel, former UF quarterback and executive director of Desire Street Ministries, is chairman of this year's event.

"It is this mission of service and dedication that personally draws me to the cause of helping those less fortunate," Wuerffel said. "While we share a common bond of being part of the University of Florida family, we share an even greater commitment to the betterment of society."

Last year, 64 clubs partnered with 54 nonprofit organizations to perform community service. Projects ranged from the Lone Star Gator Club's house-building project with Habitat for Humanity to Northeast Ohio's cereal and snack drive held for residents of a local Ronald McDonald House Inc. Gator Clubs across the

globe, such as the Japan Gator Club, have participated in the past.

The Houston Gator Club has hosted a "Gator Style Carnival" at the Texas Children's Cancer Center at Texas Children's Hospital for the past six years. This year, volunteers will join the patients for activities, including face painting and learning to juggle.

Laura Reddell, a club member, enjoys the event because of the spirit of young patients and volunteers. "I believe it is important to participate in International Gator Day because we make a difference — no matter how big or small," she said.

Lynn Watson, Music City Gator Club president, shares Reddell's enthusiasm. Watson said her club has participated in International Gator Day since it began.

Each year, the Music City Gator Club

volunteers with My Friends House Family and Children Services Inc., a nonprofit group home for 12- to 18-year-old males. Club members join the boys for a cookout, golf cart rides and sports activities, Watson said.

"This is our way of helping those who are less fortunate than us," she said. "The event also gets the Gator name out there in a positive way."

Virginia Horton, assistant director of Club Relations and Special Interest Groups, said she believes all International Gator Day projects are memorable because they serve a greater purpose of giving back.

"It is a great opportunity for Gators to participate in philanthropy and show the breadth of The Gator Nation," Horton said.

UF leads Pitt, Michigan and Minnesota

The University of Florida currently leads participating universities in the percentage of surveys completed in the Student Experience in the Research University (SERU) survey. Other participating schools include the University of Pittsburgh, University of Michigan and University of Minnesota.

SERU is an online survey designed to broaden understanding of the undergraduate experience at selected research universities. The survey takes approximately 20 minutes to complete and may be accessed through the ISIS system.

Each student who completes the survey receives a buy-one, get-one-free offer of admission to the Florida Museum of Natural History Butterfly Rainforest and is eligible for other rewards, including meal cards from Gator Dining, \$50 UF Bookstore coupons and personal training sessions at the Student Recreation and Fitness Center.
