Air Jamaica said it will introduce new, less generous baggage weight regulations for checked baggage on October 6. "Passengers traveling economy class cabins to the US and Caribbean destinations will have a free allowance of two checked pieces, each weighing a maximum of 50 lbs (it was 70 lbs) with a total dimension of 62 inches. There will be no change to the free baggage allowance for first class passengers." Bags weighing more than 50 lbs and up to 70 lbs will get a US\$25 excess baggage charge, while baggage weighing more than 70 lbs will not be accepted as checked baggage and will have to be shipped through cargo services.

"Space permitting, passengers will be allowed to carry as excess baggage a maximum of three pieces. Each piece must not exceed 70 lbs and each will cost US\$75," said the airline. Air Jamaica flies to Bonaire on Saturdays.

► According to Dutch Antilles Express (DAE, the company that owns BonaireExpress and CuraçaoExpress) Director Floris van Pallandt, **service is improving.** He said, "The airline had zero cancellations in August, while the on-time performance was 94%, which, he said, is "very good in this industry." To compare: the on-time performance rate in May was 61%, in June 77% and 89% in July. The cancellation rate was 8% in May, 1.5% in June and 1.2% in July.

► Last week we reported that air traffic control in the southern Caribbean was suspended for 20 hours as a result of the printer breakdown. **Two second hand printers were ordered to back up the failing strip printer whose function is critical to control of Antillean air space.** The obsolete Brother M2528 printer that the software requires- costing \$300 each, plus \$1,500 express shipping- is a cheap price to pay considering the impact that a loss of air traffic control would have, said officials.

► **Drug monitoring for all plane passengers who arrive in the Netherlands from Surinam, the Netherlands Antilles, Aruba and Venezuela will continue** was the decision of the Dutch House of Commons following a hearing last week. The Chamber, however, expressed concern about the way some passengers are treated by customs authorities and the Military Police.

► Representatives of the smaller islands of the Antilles protested against the intention of the Antillean government to restrict the number of state sec-

retaries in the next cabinet. According to Senator Ramonsito Booi, there is no need to even discuss the subject, be-

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Flotsam and Jetsam (Continued from page 2) cause the Netherlands Antilles, as a country will soon disappear. He said, "I don't see why we have to hurry and handle this bill. **Didn't we agree to dissolve the country by August 2007?**"

► **The High Court in The Hague has confirmed the 15-month corruption prison sentence of Curaçao political leader Anthony Godett.** For the implications of this ruling see the story on page 18.

► President of the Joint Court of Justice of Aruba and the Netherlands Antilles, Luis de Lannoy, in his speech at the installation of seven new Antilles Court judges emphasized the explicit desire of the Court to acquire more independence by getting its own statutes and budget. He said, "I dream that one day I can stand up in the courtroom and say: 'Ladies and gentlemen, *bosnan ta liber pa papi Papiamentu*' (you are free to speak Papiamentu)." With that, Anita Geelhoed of the Netherlands, one of the seven judges who was newly installed, stated that also the Joint Court of the Netherlands Antilles and Aruba advocated an "Antilleanisation" of the Court.

► According to Central Statistics Bureau of the Netherlands Antilles, in Au-

gust **Bonaire's consumer price index rose 0.1%** as compared with the previous June. As a group, food costs rose the most (1.4%). Over the previous 12 months prices increased by 1.7% with respect to the same period a year earlier. Within the food sector the prices rose in all groups, with exception of cooking oil (-0.2%). Meat and fish rose the most (3.3%), followed by dairy products (1.3%), and potatoes, vegetables and fruit (1.3%). Housing costs increased between June and August by 0.4%. Increases in other sectors were personal

care (1.2%), living (0.3%) and health care (0.1%). The index for the transport and communication sector decreased in August 2005 by 1.8%, primarily because the cost of making cell phone calls dropped. Also a fall of 0.4% was registered in the spirits and smoke product sector. ► Bonaire now has a **Tourist Information Radio Program in English**, spearheaded by Lucia Beck of Creative Ideas. It's on Mega FM (101.1 FM), every day, 30 minutes after the hour, starting at 9:30 am until 7:30 pm. Hear local, regional and international headline news, local and international weather, flight information, island events like happy hours, live music, etc., island information, tourist attractions. The station will be doing live broadcasts during special events. Tune in next week for live coverage of Regatta 2005.

► The mother of Natalee Holloway, the girl who disappeared in Aruba, said on American TV that she would **go to the Netherlands to distribute posters** and keep focus on her daughter's disappearance and the chief suspects.

Beth (Holloway) Twitty, who is calling for a boycott of Aruba and other Dutch territories, presented her story on the morning show of two networks. She was responding to an interview that Joran van der Sloot, one of three young-

sters last seen with Natalee, gave to the program, "A Current Affair," in Holland, where he went to study after he was released.

Twitty claims Van der Sloot confessed having raped Natalee, but he denies it. He said neither he nor the other two suspects, the Kalpoe brothers, had sex with Natalee and that he left her alone on a beach before she vanished.



► Bonaire's dive pioneer, **Captain Don Stewart will be honored for his contribution to the dive industry on October 12 by being named to the International Scuba Diving Hall of Fame.** In addition to diving Captain Don has promoted environmental conservation and is credited with starting the Bonaire Regatta. He opened Bonaire's first "Dive Hotel" at Zee Bad, at what is now the Divi Flamingo Beach Hotel.

► **Japanese scientists have taken the first photographs in the wild of one of the most mysterious creatures in the deep ocean--the giant squid.** Until now the only information about the behavior of the creatures, which measure up to 18 meters (59 feet) long,

has been based on dead or dying squid washed up on shore or captured in commercial fishing nets. **Such remains have been found on Bonaire shores in the past.**

Now Tokyo researchers have captured the first images of *Architeuthis* attacking bait 900 meters below the surface in the cold, dark waters of the North Pacific. "We have the first wild images of a giant squid in its natural environment," they said in a report last Wednesday in the Journal Proceedings B of the Royal Society.

"The most dramatic character of giant squids is the pair of extremely long tentacles, distinct from the eight shorter arms," the scientists said in the

BROKEN PROMISES CAN BE EXPENSIVE

Dear Editor:

On the local radio station I heard the last information concerning the plans to construct a new hotel on the site of the former Bonaire (Sunset Beach) Hotel. The island government is currently negotiating in this matter with the Marriott group, and there are also another two groups interested in building a hotel on this site - Radisson and Hilton. As expected, the stumbling block is the condition put by Marriott, and certainly also by the other groups for the beach in front of

the hotel to be reconstructed to meet the standards for a beach of a high level international hotel.

The local government should be warned not to repeat the errors made on Aruba and on Curaçao where the promises given to the hotel investors could not be fulfilled and, after lengthy legal proceedings, the governments were obliged to pay many millions to the investors.

There have already been several articles on the enormous amounts to be paid for damage to various investors by the government of Aruba, but I would like to mention in this connection a case on Curaçao which can be a similar problem on Bonaire - an unfulfilled promise to construct a beach.

In the begin of the 90s the Van der Valk international hotel group reached an agreement with the island government of Curaçao to build a beach, to be called Marichi Beach, close to the existing Plaza Hotel. The Van der Valk group would build another hotel at this beach and Marichi Beach would serve the guests of both hotels. A condition of the govern-

ment of Curaçao was that the beach would also be open to the local inhabitants. The sand was planned to be extracted from the bottom of St. Joris Bay on the northeast coast of Curaçao and transported by trucks to the beach site. Under contract to the Curaçao Department of Works a hauler started the project in November 1992, but in 1993 a joint effort of Reef Care, *Defensa Ambiental*, *Amigu di Tera* and *Pro Monumento* Foundation, all fiercely opposing the project, succeeded in halting the work, and that was the definitive end of the project.

Consequently, the Van der Valk group started very lengthy legal procedures against the island government, claiming an amount of NAf110 million for the damages caused by not fulfilling its commitment. In order to settle out of court, in March 2003 the island government formed a special committee to reach an agreement with the Van der Valk group. According to this committee, the damage in connection with the Mariachi Beach and three other claims was "only" NAf 35 million, NAf 18 million of which was for not realizing the Marichi project. Finally, in June 2003, the Van de Valk group agreed to settle for NAf27.5 million.

The Marichi Beach case is a warning for our island government. An action of similar environmental groups can block the realization of the beach construction also on Bonaire.

In addition, there would also be serious technical problems because there is absolutely no sea sand available on our island which could be used to build a beach.

"Solid as a Rock"



A Candidate for Funding
from AMFO and the NGO

On Sunday September 18th *Platforma Rincon* held its first official general town meeting since being established on April 22nd. During the meeting the people of Rincon had the opportunity of not only exchanging experiences and opinions but were informed what the Platform had achieved in the last four months and what is planned for the future.

It was an impressive sight to enter the Sentro di Bario and see that, despite the fact that it was Sunday, the townspeople took the invitation very seriously and attendance was high. The sight of the new board was no less imposing: 10 people sitting at a large table and looking directly at their audience.

Each member of the board in his/her respective area had the opportunity to elaborate on their accomplishments and projects they want to see in the future.

In addition to the members of the *Platforma*, Ben Oleana, coordinator of *Fundashon Desaroyo Rincon* (Foundation for the Development of Rincon), was invited to speak as the project coordinator of the *Platforma*. Other speakers were Jeanette Juliet-Pablo, president of the *Unidat di Bario di Korsow* (Unity of the Neighborhood of Curaçao) and Pancho Cicilia of the NGO Platform. AMFO, as the principal subsidizer of the *Platforma*, together with various government institutions and officials, was also represented.

According to Jeanette Juliet-Pablo, people have different reasons for joining a neighborhood platform: to maintain the culture, nature, healthcare, childcare etc. "Compared to other towns on Bonaire, Rincon was always a very united, motivated village. It's an 'isolated area' with its hills and distance from Playa, it has its own history, its own specific nature and distinctive way of life and customs."

These common aspects don't necessarily mean that there are no differences within such a platform, she continued. Age differences can lead to different perspectives. What approach to use is also a point of discussion. Development work in *barios* requires a certain approach. Although the well known 'bottom-up approach' (starting with the populace) has been successful in many cases, it may not be right for the *Platforma Rincon*, with its various areas of focus.

A neighborhood platform requires a **vision**, including a **mission** and **strategy**, which should be clear to everyone. **Values** are also necessary and decided upon in the 'campaigning' process (e.g. respect). They should not necessarily be 'fixed' but can change or be replaced by others along the way. **Predetermined indicators** should also be known in order to be measured. For instance in dealing with teenage pregnancy numerical statistics are vital.

Structure, communication, dialogue and hard work to gain trust are also essential in a town *Platforma*, otherwise its

validity can be challenged by the population. Juliet-Pablo advised taking **surveys** to 'taste the feeling' among the people. **Continuous education** is vital for development in the town/neighborhood.

For a real change in development you need: a clear mission, pressure, capacity (human resources) and a plan. "Has Rincon these requisites for the continuous development?" she asked.

Christopher Frans as the young new vice president and Janie Rombly (second secretary) were appointed for the **Youth** section. Well known Roosje Vinck was assigned to the position of **PR** and head of the **Safety/Security** section. Ermine Pourier was elected 1st secretary of the **Spirituality** section. The **Senior Citizens** section is represented by Ms. Gacha Coffie, a dynamic lady who proved during the meeting to be an excellent mediator on burning issues.

The ever dynamic and 'fighter for a good cause,' Maritza Juan Pedro, was assigned the job of President and represents the **Infrastructure and Tourism** section.


Freddy Piar, as member of the board, is the head of the **Sport** section. The position of Treasurer was assigned to Mrs. Lourdes Winklaar, who, as **Culture** section representative, delighted us with colorful examples of cultural promotion.

And last, but not least, Echi Trinidad will assist Mrs. Winklaar as second treasurer and will work in the **Family** section.

Christopher Frans, a dynamic and eloquent SGB student, spoke on the following achievements of the **Youth Committee**.

"The St. Micheal Scouting group went on a summer educational trip to Aruba, subsidized by AMFO. Bonairean judokas (judo athletes) were successful this year and the Rincon section was no exception. They made us proud in the Dominican Republic and at the *Weganan di Reino*.

The new 'dojo' to be established is financed by AMFO. On the spiritual side, the praying group, 'It's Time to Pray,' will be representing Bonaire at the next Antillean Youth Explosion. During the summer the *Hobenan Aktivo Rincon*

(Active Youngsters Rincon) trained 41 youngsters in different areas such as leadership skills. This project was also sponsored by AMFO.

Rincon had four representatives together with other youngsters from around the island, for the last Youth Conference Summit in St. Martin (Christopher Frans, Gino Offerman, Ajimil Janga and Jonathan Clarinda). Rayvah, (a computer training company) Rincon section, is also working on a plan in cooperation with the Youth section of the Platform. Finally, the folk music group, *Foyan Boys*, helped organize a youth folk music contest while *kuarta* lessons are also being given to the youngsters.

There are even more potential projects: musical instruments and Youth Day Rincon. The latter is planned for November 19 and should attract approximately 200 young people. The goal is to make an inventory of what goes on among youngsters in Rincon: their future plans, concerns, sexuality, interests etc."

At the end of his speech Frans urgently asked AMFO to help sustain this project.

Roosje Vinck, representing the **Security/Safety** committee, explained that the original commission, *Rincon Ban pa e Solushon* (Rincon, Let's go for a Solution), automatically merged into the cur-

rent Security /Safety section of the Platforma Board, so this section's achievements and projects were farther along than other sections.

The *Rincon Ban pa e Solushon* commission started as an urgent plan by Ms. Vinck and others due to the alarming

number of burglaries last year in Rincon.

On July 29, 2004, there was a high attendance at the first town meeting. The first priority to be resolved was the drug problem. The solution: work preventively. Police Chief Daantje and Lt. Governor Domacassé promised and followed up, providing extra supervision and sea surveillance radar on the Bonairean coast.

AMFO financed the November 2004 town meeting with ex-drug addicts to keep brainstorming on solutions. Later came anti-drug workshops, not only for the youth, but also focused on the whole family, lectures by ex-drug addicts, special programs at schools, flyers and t-shirts. It's even become a tradition to wear these anti-drug t-shirts during sports events.

Currently, the Security/safety commission is waiting for approval by AMFO for the *Buriko* (donkey) project.

Tera Cora Honors Franklin Scherptong

Last weekend all Bonaire, but especially the *bario* of Tera Corá, honored Franklin Scherptong. Franklin grew up with music. His father is very musical and still plays. When he was seven years old he practiced on his father's accordion in secret –because no one was allowed to touch it. Finally he was ready and played a song for his father - *My Bonny Lies Over the Ocean* - and made his father proud. At 17, Franklin went to sea as an engineer-in-training. After many voyages and additional engineering education he returned to Bonaire and went to work at WEB. At that point his musical and social life began. Some years later he became a technical instructor at the SGB high school.

He's noted for his work done with great devotion and dedication. He spent six years studying music and plays many instruments: the bass tuba, steel pan, piano, organ, accordion, guitar, quato, bass and zither. In addition to his music, Franklin's passion is aviation, not as a pilot, but as a hobbyist, learning all about the world's aircraft and their movements

On September 12, 1999, Franklin was named "Treasured Citizen of Bonaire" because of his great musical merits and their effect on the island. Last Saturday, October 1st Commissioner Jonchi Dortalina paid another tribute to Franklin during a large party in his honor at the Sentro di Bario in Tera Corá which he helped found. Franklin received a special Plaque of Merit for his community contributions. Other neighborhood leaders as well as representatives from the barios of Rincon and Antriol added their praises and shared humorous stories about Franklin. Franklin then spoke of Tera Corá and its strong belief in Unity, Positivism, Peace, Love and Justice.

On his 12-base accordion, he delighted the crowd with his rendition of *My Bonny Lies over the Ocean*. In turn, Franklin was serenaded by talented vocalists and bands including Tutti Fruitti and Pal' i Wiri. This year it is his 19th year of participation; a very remarkable achievement that definitely has to be celebrated when Regatta will celebrate its 40th anniversary in 2006 and Ethienne his 20th year of participation! For every year of the 18, Ethienne has placed in the top three. When asked if he thinks that he will achieve this again this year he responded: "I think that the only one who can give me a hard time in the Racing Formula category is Taty Frans. But I have been training enough and my mind is set positively so I am definitely ready for it!"

Ethienne will be participating only in the category Racing Formula because as he says, "I will leave the other categories for the Frans brothers to fight it out with each other."

Another guy you can see every day around the Kas di Regatta before or after

his training session is Jaeger **Sint Jago** (NB107). This year will be his fourth year of participation. In his first year he won Third place in the Optimist sailboat category and one of the last two times he won Third place in the Windsurfing category. Jaeger will be participating in Junior Formula Racing and also in Freestyle: "My most troublesome competitor is Choco Frans, and in case there is light wind it will be Kiri Thode. But I have been preparing myself very well in the waters where the competitions will take place. Therefore, I am going for the First place in Formula category this year. I only hope the wind will cooperate with us during the Regatta."

Speaking of wind, during these last few days it has not been very windy, and according to the wind websites on the Internet it does not look like this condition will change for Regatta 2005. But let's just hope and keep our fingers crossed that this is only a momentary condition and that the situation will change one way or another.

Harvey Piar (NB109) is participating this year for the second time in Regatta. "I am very excited since I think that Regatta 2005 will be big when it comes to the water sports part and especially the windsurfing category. This year the organisation has added a new category to windsurfing: Baby Class. This category is for all small children and I am sure that it will attract the attention of many spectators. I will be participating in the Junior Class Formula and Freestyle. I only hope that I will have better results this year. Since I am the rookie of the clan, I consider them all as my big competitors. Nevertheless I believe in myself, and with all the preparation I did already, I am ready to participate in Regatta 2005!"

I also spoke to **Payo Soliano** (NB63). He will be competing in the Junior Formula Racing and Freestyle classes. Payo is not a new face in our windsurfing world. For two years he has been participating in the Windsurf category. Both times he won second prize in the Big Kids Class. Payo: "I have been waiting so long for the Regatta that by now I am hungry to compete. Mentally I am totally ready for it. These days I have been doing my very best to practice as often as I can. I only hope for good wind this year because last year the wind was very bad. I am sure that under good conditions I will be able to beat my biggest competitor, Jaegar Sint Jago."

One thing for sure is that our Windsurfing participants are ready for Regatta 2005. When asked if there is something specifically that they want to say, something specifically to the readers, several answers were given:

Payo: "I want everybody to come and see all the action. If more people come to see us we will be more motivated and give greater shows, which will result in an even greater Regatta."

Harvey: "An invitation goes to all the readers to come enjoy the Regatta 2005 and also cheer for all the participants. This way we will make the Regatta bigger and better and Bonaire will have its Re-

gatta for many, many more years!"

Jaeger: "Everybody come and be great spectators along the beach by cheering for the participants!"

Ethienne: "Everybody, let's be more positive about everything and specifically about Regatta 2005. If all citizens help us to carry the Regatta, Regatta will grow and be even greater."

So, people, the message is clear. You should all come to the *Kas di Regatta* to enjoy all the competitions and festivities going on there but especially to motivate the participants. They are our local stars and the future of windsurfing. From October 9th to October 15th it will be Regatta 2005. Whose dream of winning will come true? How will they perform? And what do they think of their performance in the Regatta 2005? All of this in one week's time, when we will be back to tell you about the results of the windsurfing category in general and of these four guys in particular.

Congratulations to Andy Owens (see picture) from the US who followed technical dive instruction for the past two weeks and got certified for advanced nitrox, decompression procedures, extended range and trimix. To complete his package, Andy also took the gas blender class. Also one of the Divi dive team instructors, Pepe Mastropaolo, became a certified technical diver up to extended range.

Andy Owens has said already he'll come back to Bonaire to get his advanced trimix certification. According to Andy, Bonaire is a superb training location for technical diving and has much more to offer than a lot of people are aware of. On one of the trimix dives, they discovered a huge vertical wall at 195 ft., dropping down to the blue abyss, just off Klein Bonaire. Andy can hardly wait till next year to explore this wall while getting his advanced training.

Journal. They added that the giant squid appears to be a much more active predator than researchers had suspected and tangles their prey in their elongated feeding tentacles.

► **SELIBON employees and Bonaire youngsters cleaned up Donkey Beach and some beaches on Klein Bonaire last week.** The SELIBON employees sacrificed their Sunday voluntarily to clean up Donkey Beach near the airport. And groups from Jong Bonaire, the Boy Scouts drum band and Trupial Scouting plus others followed by cleaning up No Name and Jerry's Jam beaches on Klein Bonaire in cooperation with the crew of *Free-winds* and STINAPA.

► **The island is blooming right now**, thanks to recent rains, and our "opportunistic" trees and shrubs are taking advantage and flowering wildly in preparation to scattering their seeds during this possibly short wet period. Many of the dams are filled and we've even spotted flamingos enjoying the new watery areas. Especially gorgeous are the yellow flowering Brasilwood or Dyewood trees (*Brasia*) which dot the hillsides in the northwest of the island. A rather small, unobtrusive tree with strikingly deep grooves in the stem, it was sought as a source used to prepare a red dye. Unfortunately, the dye came from the roots so the whole tree had to be destroyed to get the product. In certain areas of the island

Ask the Dietitian

Teach Good Food Habits to Your Child

Like reading and writing, brushing teeth, and hand washing, learning good food habits is a life skill that can help your child live a healthy, satisfying life. Here's how you can nurture good food habits.

Give Your Child Enough Table Time

Does your child seem to play around at the table? That's normal. A young child does not have the coordination to eat as fast as you. So slow down yourself and eat at a pace that allows you to enjoy your food. Keep in mind that it takes about 20 minutes for the stomach to feel full. Rushing mealtime only leads to frustration for you, your child, and others at the table.



Be a Good Role Model. Your Child Watches What You Eat.

If you eat and enjoy vegetables, chances are your child will try them too, if not now, then probably later. It's not just what you say, it's also what you do. As kids grow up, a brother, sister and others in their life are role models too. Remember, most children want to grow up doing what others do.

Skip the Urge to Reward or Punish Your Child With Food.

Have you ever been tempted to say: "I'll be mad if you don't eat one more bite!" or "No dessert until you eat your vegetables!" or "Stop crying, and I'll give you a cookie."

Remarks like these may lead kids to eating problems. They may create unneeded conflict and struggles between you and your child at the table.

- Eating for parental approval or love teaches unhealthy behaviors, attitudes, and beliefs about food and themselves.
- Offering a food (dessert) as a reward for eating another (veggies) make some foods seem better.
- Getting a food treat to feel better teaches kids to relieve negative feelings by eating. This can lead to overeating later on.

Instead..... Use a Non-Food Approach.

Reward your child with attention and kind words. Console with hugs and talk. Show love by spending time and having fun together.

A Nurturing Place to Eat is.....

Caring, calm, and respectful.....

- Focus mealtime on eating and family talks that includes your child. Turn off the TV.
- Plan quiet time for eating so your child comes to the table relaxed

Comfortable and safe from injury....

- Always stay with a young child who is eating, even if you must do other tasks
- Get a stable, comfortable, child-size chair.
- Get easy-to-hold, child size utensils and cups.

Born on Bonaire....

Hubert Vis

“I was born in 1952 at ‘Mentor,’ the bright orange house at the end of Kaya Korona. My parents, Cor Vis and Helena Vis-Nicolaas, had 12 children. Father was chief of the hygienic service but also a businessman; he owned a brick and tile factory and a carpenter shop. He owned a bakery together with his brother and a bar/restaurant which he operated for a long time until he rented it to a Chinese.

I had a good childhood; very few problems. At 17 I left for Holland to go to a teachers’ college. I wanted to become a teacher; to teach others, to transfer knowledge - all that was attractive to me. Life in Holland was completely different. Both the culture and the climate came as a shock to me. The way people interacted with each other, especially the lack of warmth, was something I had to get used to. I had one brother living in Holland, but he was three hours away from where I was, and with the little money I had I could only visit him once a month. After five years I returned to Bonaire and started teaching at the Stanislaus School in Rincon, then later at the Watapana School. I’d left the island when I was still a boy and came back as a teacher. Suddenly I was ‘Sir’ to everyone!”

Hubert Vis, head of the cultural department and director of the museum, is a thoughtful and quiet person, but also open minded, friendly and relaxed. “In Holland I’d met a girl from Friesland, Anneke. She’d seen something of the world as she had been living in the States as part of a student exchange program at high school. Three months after I’d gotten back to Bonaire she came... to stay. A year later, in 1975, we got married.

In Holland Anneke had been a group leader at a boarding school. In Bonaire she was a homemaker the first three years until she found a job at an administration office. In 1977 we got a foster child, a boy named Tico, and in 1979 our daughter Ñeka was born. It was around that time that we both got the itch to study again. We adopted Tico and in 1980 returned to Holland to live in a very small town in Friesland - Augustinusga: one church, one supermarket, one soccer field! The little old house we lived in was freezing cold in winter time. I would wake up with icicles in my moustache! I started studying to become a high school English and geography teacher, and a year later Anneke stepped in, doing English and domestic science.

In 1981 a friend, a single mother with a child, moved in with us and stayed for three years, being a great support to Anneke. For me it was different this

time in Holland. I had my family and I didn’t feel so lonely, but it wasn’t easy to go from a paid job to living on a scholarship when you have a family to support.

After five years I completed my studies and was offered a job at a high school in another province, five hours away by train. I’d leave the family on Sunday night and return on Friday afternoon. Anneke was still studying, and around that same time our son Ibo was born in 1985. It wasn’t easy for her: two small children, a baby and her studies and me being away the whole week... it was hard. After she finished her studies she came to live with me in Alkmaar. Around that time we had another foster child, Geeske, whom we took care of, off and on, for about a year. In 1986 Hidde was born. His mother was Anneke’s sister. She couldn’t take care of her baby so we took him in.

It was always our intention to come back to Bonaire, so we’d never made any lasting moves; we always lived ‘out of a suitcase.’ But what kept us in Holland was Hidde. Off and on we took in other children - George, Roos, and Juny, a nephew of mine, and in 1991, another foster child, a four-month-old baby, Irving, our grandchild, the son of our adopted son Tico. The house was always full!

My school closed in 1994. Anneke was working as a manager for an organization that provided schooling for adults. I started working as a substitute teacher, as a trainer for a foundation, as a Papiamentu teacher, giving night courses in Amsterdam, and as a translator. So, in that same year, when Hidde’s mother came to take him with her, we felt free to go back to Bonaire. I was offered a job with the government of Bonaire to take charge of what was to become SKAL, the department of culture.

On our wedding anniversary in August 1996 I was on the plane to Bonaire with our son Ibo, who was 11 years old. Anneke stayed in Holland. Her


father had just passed away and she moved in with her mother for a while.

For Ibo it was a big thing, a tremendous change as school wasn’t child friendly at all. On Animal Day he went to school with a little chicken and the teacher punished him by throwing him out of the classroom! For me it was different. I was happy to be back after the original plan of staying six years in Holland had turned into 16 years! But the fact that Ibo was having a hard time gave me a lot of headaches, so I transferred him to another school where he found a teacher with a heart for children and he started doing much better.

At the end of January 1997 Anneke and Irving came to Bonaire. Our daughter Ñeka had left for Ecuador in 1996 for a student exchange program, after which she returned through Holland to Bonaire to finish HAVO high school here. Finally I had my whole family, except for Tico, with me on Bonaire. But it didn’t last long as in 2000 it turned out that Irving needed special education. We sent him to the Watapana School, but that was a complete failure. We found a foster family for him in Holland where he could get special education. But soon after we found out that he and his foster mother didn’t get along and there were huge problems. I went to bring him back to Bonaire, and in August 2002 Anneke and Irving left for Holland. At the moment she’s living with Irving in Alkmaar again, and he’s doing job training to become a cook.

Ibo went back to Holland after HAVO, and now he’s studying Middle Professional Education in graphic design. Our daughter Ñeka is finishing a Higher Professional Education study in international hospitality and management. Our son Tico did it the hard way, but now he’s training to become a cook. Hidde lives with his mom in Belgium; he finished his studies and started working. And...I am alone on Bonaire.

I feel like a cosmopolitan who found his base on Bonaire. I would go back to

Holland for my family, but... I can’t see myself in Holland anymore. All the time I lived there I was always very conscious of the fact that I belonged to ‘them,’ and over the years that feeling has grown worse as the non-tolerance towards immigrants has grown in Holland. But it’s still an option for Anneke to come back to Bonaire when Irving is ‘ready.’

I am still the head of SKAL and I like my job. We’re involved in any cultural thing that takes place on the island: music, literature, dance, art, drama, the museum, festivals and projects. The management, the execution and the subsidizing from the island territory of Bonaire all goes through SKAL. But I see a new future for SKAL on Bonaire, something like that on Curaçao, *Cas di Cultura*, House of Culture, however, that has to be a foundation and then I’ll have to choose to either go with the foundation or stay with the government. We’ll see.

For me Bonaire is a magical place; it’s a combination of the material and the spiritual worlds. It’s as if here the door to the spiritual world stands wide open. Many people feel that way. Once someone came to visit me and told me, ‘Bonaire is a navel where many souls have to go through to be able to reincarnate again,’ and that’s just how I feel about Bonaire. The local people should become more conscious of what their roots are and how rich they are in culture.

I see my future here. I love my island and I feel I am a rich man, spiritually rich. The responsibilities I got in my life have determined my road, but they also made me wiser and I find it has been worth it.”

Popular Curaçao Politician Anthony Godett Must Go To Prison

The High Court in The Hague upheld the conviction of Curaçao political leader Anthony Godett. The High Court was the final appeal possibility for the popular Curaçao politician, who will now have to go to prison for 10 months minus the month and a half he already spent in jail between September 7 and October 18, 2003.

When he goes back to jail depends on the Curaçao Prosecutor's Office, which said Godett's case would be handled just like those of all the others who are still awaiting incarceration because of the limited space in Bon Futuro Prison. "But everyone's turn comes sooner or later," added the prosecution spokesperson.

Meanwhile, Godett's Dutch attorney, Gerard Spong, announced immediately after the High ruling that he would file a complaint with the European Court with the request to suspend the sentence. In addition, a pardon request will be filed with Antillean Governor Frits Goedgedrag.

However, because of provisions in the Antillean Constitution, Godett can not only be elected, but can remain in both Parliament and the Island Council. The constitution (article 46) suspends the active voting rights for anyone who has been legally locked up for more than one year, but that is not the case for passive voting rights. Those rights (article 48) are suspended for persons excluded from exercising the right to vote, "except those who have been excluded from such right on the basis of the legal deprivation of liberty, or of jail sentence for some reason other than begging or vagrancy, or for an act that proves their being drunk in public."





In other words, people sentenced to jail in the Netherlands Antilles, who are not beggars or vagrants, can participate in elections, confirmed Curaçao's foremost constitutional expert Carlos Dip when asked for an explanation. He said the law was antiquated and based on an incident in 1917 when a vagrant was elected to the municipal council of Amsterdam. So shocked was the political establishment that it was decided to include in the constitution that persons locked up for the above reasons could not take office.

To prevent people held for their political beliefs from also being excluded from the democratic process, the exclusion from exercising the passive voting right was limited to this category, perhaps without full realization that this would allow criminals sentenced to prison for other crimes, including corruption, as in the case of Godett, to be elected. The Dutch constitution has since been changed, meanwhile, that of the Antilles, which was modeled after that of Holland, has not.

Not only that, but the constitutional "loophole" would allow Godett to remain in both Parliament and Curaçao's Island Council while in prison, even though he wouldn't be able to function as a Council member. As long as he does not resign, he maintains his seat and cannot be replaced, confirmed Dip.

Godett, whose FOL party won big in the last two Curaçao elections, has already hinted that in such a scenario his sister, Mirna Louisa-Godett, will become the next Antillean Prime Minister, as was the case in 2003 and 2004 when his candidacy was similarly blocked.

Godett, whether or not he is made to serve

his prison sentence before the January 27 federal elections, can head the FOL party list and be elected to the next Parliament. However, he cannot pass the anti-criminal screening requirement that is performed by law enforcement authorities.

Godett was sentenced to 15 months in prison (three more than he initially received), of which five months were suspended by the Appeals Court in July, 2004. He was found guilty of allowing himself to be bribed as a civil servant, money laundering and having a fraudulent NAf107,000 "IOU" drawn up.

Venus and Mars' Rival Pay Each Other a Very Close Visit

Last week I explained how this week the Moon would pay a visit to both the brightest planet, Venus, and the star called the "Rival of Mars," Antares. And this week I'd like to show you how to watch the slow approach and very close meeting of Venus and Antares.

On Thursday this week, October 6th, about 45 minutes after sunset, face southwest where you'll see an exquisite crescent Moon parked right beneath our twin sister planet, 8,000-mile-wide Venus, which is a sight that will truly knock your socks off. Then on the next night, Friday the 7th, the Moon will almost slam into Antares, whose name literally means the "Rival of Mars" because it resembles Mars in color, and when Mars is at the right distance, looks like the same brightness. But Antares is not an 8,000-mile-wide planet like Venus. It is a super star! It's so huge that if we placed one edge of it where our Sun is it would stretch out past the orbits of Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars and Jupiter. In fact it is so huge it could hold 280 trillion Venuses or Earths.

So this week you have a chance to see our 2,000-mile-wide Moon visit both Venus on the 6th and Antares on the 7th. After that it will move farther and farther away, night after night. But then something magical happens between Venus and Antares because they will slowly approach each other, night after night, and have a super close meeting a week from this Sunday, on October 16th. And I guarantee that if you go out every night just after sunset and keep track of these two you will be amazed at how dramatically they'll change their position from night to night.

This Friday, when the Moon is close to Antares, Antares and Venus will be 10 degrees apart from each other, or to put it simply, since a full Moon is one half a degree wide they will be 20 full Moon widths apart from each other. But that's not for long because the following night they will be two full Moon widths closer, only 9 degrees apart. On Sunday, the 9th, two full Moon widths closer, still only 8 degrees apart. And on Monday, the 10th, another two full Moons closer-only 7 degrees apart. On Tuesday, two full Moons closer, still only 6 degrees apart. And then on Wednesday, you guessed it, also two full Moons closer or 5 degrees apart. On Thursday they'll be a whopping three Moons closer. Only 3 and 1/2 degrees will separate them. And on Friday they really start to close in and are only 3 degrees or six full Moons apart. On Saturday, 2 degrees or four full Moons apart. And on Sunday, the 16th, they'll have their closest meeting of all when only three full Moons would separate them, little more than 1 and 1/2 degrees apart!

So Sunday the 16th is the night when the brightest planet visits the rival of Mars! After which they will slowly move away from each other. Indeed on Monday, the 17th, they'll once again be 2 degrees away from each other or four full Moons apart.

Wow, what fun! Keep track of them every single night. It's addictive.
