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Bonaire/Kralendijk –
On Sunday, May 12, about 20 experienced volunteers joined the activities of the Fishing Line Project, a division of the STCB (Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire). They met at the Dive Inn, one of the many locations of Dive Friends Bonaire, which provided free air fills to the SCUBA divers, to plan a major elimination of discarded fishing line from the Town Pier area.

Sue Willis from the Fishing Line Project had finally received permission from the Harbormaster and the cruise ship *Freewinds* to remove as much new or newish fishing line as possible from the underwater world.

Weather conditions and water temperature were optimal—hardly any current and perfect visibility. The contents of a huge bucket of used fishing line was recovered. (And, in

passing, the smallest-ever lion fish was caught.) The photograph shows the bunch of tired and satisfied volunteers after the recovery dive. The author, more or less in the middle of the photo, held firm by STCB Coordinator Mabel Nava, displays the broken plate with the smallest lion fish ever. But let's take life seriously. But not too seriously. After the recovery dive all volunteers were invited for a tasty sandwich lunch aboard the *Freewinds*.

Good job, volunteers! Thank you, *Freewinds*. And thank you again Dive Friends Bonaire for the supply of free air, the location and fresh water to rinse the diving gear. We presumably can't save this world, but at least we can make it better. Let's continue tilting at the windmills. ■

Research conducted by Institute for Marine Resources and Ecosystem Studies Imares of University of Wageningen in The Netherlands showed that the mangroves at Lac Bay in Bonaire are seriously polluted with litter. The study was published on the university's website.

The problem is mainly caused by rubbish coming from offshore, either blown by the wind or washed ashore. The researchers suggest seeking a solution to the problem especially internationally at the source, rather than only symptomatically by removing the waste

►THE HAGUE--The Dutch Audit Chamber is critical of the financial management of the branches of some Dutch Ministries in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba. The Chamber will therefore carry out an investigation at the ministries in the Caribbean Netherlands this year.

The Audit Chamber has detected "problems" with financial management at the branches of the Ministries of Education, Culture and Science OCW, Social Affairs and Employment SZW and Public Health, Wellbeing and Sports VWS.

►THE HAGUE--Bonaire-born former governor of Bonaire, Curaçao and the Netherlands Antilles Frits Goedgedrag, will become extraordinary Member of the Dutch Council of State where he will mostly focus on Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba.

Goedgedrag (61) will be a member in extraordinary service at the Department of Advice of the Council of State. He will have a special role in the advising of law proposals for the islands.

►THE HAGUE--The Dutch economy remained in recession in the first three months of this year, contracting 0.1 percentage point compared with the final quarter of 2012, according to national statistics office CBS.

►Dutch Prime Minister Mark Rutte leaves The Hague on July 13 for a one-week visit to all six Dutch



Caribbean islands. The Prime Minister will visit Aruba, Curaçao, St. Maarten, Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba.

►Between June 3 and July 5, interviewers from the Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) in the context of the Omnibus inquiry (OMNI) will start to interview previously selected persons on Saba, St. Eustatius and Bonaire (BES islands).

The purpose of this research is to gain an insight into the social situation of the population of the BES islands. This involves issues such as health, housing, safety, communication and spending time.

The omnibus survey is conducted every four years. It is the first time that this research takes place on Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba.

You have or see an emergency, when every second counts: Call the emergency line 911. This number is free.

You have a tip (can be done anonymously): It is very important to pass on what you have seen or heard in the commission of a crime. This can be done via the website www.politiecn.com (button 'Online service' => I have a question / comment), but also through the anonymous tip line of the police + (599) 717 7251.

You want to report a crime: That can be done personally at the police station and in special cases, you may also report a crime with an officer at your home. Currently it is not legally possible to report a crime online. Please remember to bring your ID to the police station.

You have a Complaint: You can use the online complaint form. This can be found on the website (www.politiecn.com) in the 'Online services' button => [I have a complaint or compliment](#). You can also write to the Chief of Police of the Dutch Caribbean, PO Box 360, Kralendijk, Bonaire, Dutch Caribbean Netherlands.

Compliment: when one of the employees of the Police Force acted so well that you consider

►The VVD became the first Dutch political party to formally establish itself on Bonaire. The VVD is Dutch Prime Minister Mark Rutte's right wing party.

On Saturday 18 May, supermarket tycoon Gerard van den Tweel and two other individuals founded the VVD branch on the island. It was registered by notary Kenneth Arends. The branch will enable the VVD to efficiently campaign on Bonaire. Most likely, the VVD will participate in the insular elections in spring 2015. On 22 April, the Netherlands VVD gave its permission to establish a Bonaire branch.

A dozen people have already signed up to join. Gerard van den Tweel will serve as the chairman of the VVD Department Bonaire. Van den Tweel owns the Van den Tweel Group, including Van den Tweel Supermarket and BHG, which sell Albert Heijn products on Bonaire. Recently, Van den Tweel also became the owner of Warehouse Bonaire. He now owns the three largest supermarkets on the island.

The other board members of the new political party are Hans Els (general secretary) and Wil Verhoeven (treasurer). The Bonairean executive committee of the VVD party will consist of three board members together with 10 supporting members for district representation. The new party has announced that a strategy and a plan to organize a recruitment drive and to keep Bonaire's population informed of its plans. VVD Bonaire plans to meet with VVD Netherlands in July for further discussions.

►US Consul General Valerie Belon will shortly leave her post on Curaçao to continue her career in the US Embassy in Suriname.

►Did you feel the earthquake earlier this month? On May 15 a magnitude 5.0 quake occurred at a depth of 30 km below the surface, at 6:29:17.0 UTC. Its geographical location was 12.09 N ; 73.30 W, or 73 km NW of Río-hacha, Colombia, about 525 km west of Kralendijk.

►Colorado State University hurricane experts Phil Klotzbach and William Gray forecast in their early April report enhanced activity for the hurricane season with 18 named storms, of which nine will become hurricanes and four of those will become major hurricanes with winds over 111 miles per hour. Bonaire is south of the hurricane belt and has not experienced sustained hurricane force winds according to weather records. However, the island's shoreline is vulnerable to the sea swells generated by distant hurricanes.

►Last week a couple from Aruba had the first same-sex wedding on Bonaire, legal on the island now that it is now part of The Netherlands. Aruban Jean Ardley Baiz (43) and Nolbelto Miguel Torrealba (30) of Venezuela came to Bonaire because gay marriages are not allowed yet on Aruba.

►AMSTERDAM--The Donkey Sanctuary in Bonaire has started construction of a new feeding area with financial support from the International Fund for Animal Welfare (IWWAF). IWWAF donated €5,000 to the sanctuary, which provides a home for most of Bonaire's donkeys. The construction includes building a feeding area needed for the 500 animals that live on the premises. It was designed originally to care for 100 donkeys.

Marina Melis and Ed Koopman, who started the sanctuary about 20 years ago, have also submitted a plan to the government of Bonaire to capture all the remaining 150 wild donkeys, including many pregnant females. The



Helmin Wiels

►On behalf of the population of Bonaire, Island Governor Lydia Emerencia wrote an open letter in connection with the funeral of slain political leader Helmin Wiels.

Besides extending her heartfelt sympathy, she also expressed the wish that the killing of the politician will give the strength to build up a Bonaire free of hatred.

According to Emerencia, Bonaire is aware of the historic significance of what happened. "It's the first time in the history of the islands of the Kingdom in the Caribbean area that a parliamentarian in office was murdered," she wrote.

Last weekend Curaçao police issued its seventh press release on the status of the investigation into the murder of Wiels, who was a member of the Curacao Parliament. According to the report, police received 65 tips so far via the special telephone numbers made available. Related arrests have been made but direct suspects have not been named.

Police spokesperson Reginald Huggin, confirmed that -contrary to some media reports- two confiscated vehicles haven't been released. One of them matched the description of the gold colored KIA used at the time of the murder. ■ G./L.D.

New Owner For Power Plant

Contour Global, an international energy concern with offices in 17 countries and owner of 33 power plants in various part of the world, has bought Ecopower in Bonaire. The management of the electricity plant at Karpata was taken over as of Wednesday, May 15, in the presence of Commissioners Burney el Hage and James Kroon. Regional CFO of Contour Global, Stefan Dijkers, made further announcements on the purchase. The local company is now named Contour Global Bonaire.

The parent company has 1,650 employees in total and focuses on generating energy worldwide in its 33 power plants. Its most significant operations are in Africa, South America, Europe and the Caribbean area.

Contour Global already manages several power plants in the region, including in Guadeloupe and St. Martin (the French side).

"Bonaire is especially interesting for Contour Global because of the combination of wind energy and conventional generators. The company masters the various techniques of generating power including solar and wind energy; hence the interest in taking over Ecopower," said Dijkers.

He continued, "A considerable investment is necessary to expand the power plant at Karpata, to bring it to a higher level and meet the standards of Contour Global." The company says they will invest \$1 million into upgrading the facility. The expansion has priority because the existing power plant can hardly meet the increasing demand for

electricity and has no reserve margin. Electric service on Bonaire has been unreliable particularly when there is no wind.

However, it will take at least a year before this can be done. No mention was made of the power plant at the former Radio Netherlands transmitter site which Bonaire acquired for \$1.

Contour Global said that apart from the considerable investment to expand and the presence of an international integration team of experts, not much will change for the management and local personnel for the time being. The existing plant will remain intact and the current staff and plant manager are to stay on. Dijkers stated that rates will remain unchanged for the time being.

"Using a combined approach with WEB NV we hope to eventually improve service to customers with the expansion and better operation," said Dijkers. ■

“I met Robert on the internet through Facebook. He was a FB friend of somebody I knew and that’s how we started talking. The first time was in March 2009, but then I got too busy. However, when Robert appeared in June again we got reconnected. From then on it went fast; soon enough we were talking seven days a week!

I was born in Caracas, Venezuela, and I moved to the States to study when I was 18. I studied psychology and got my Master’s in social work. When I first graduated I started working with the farming community – usually Mexican immigrants – and there I set up a school drop-out prevention program. The experience inspired me to continue my education and once I’d made that decision I got my Master’s. Then I started working with families and children and people with psychiatric problems. I was working at psychiatric hospitals and at partial hospitalization programs and it affected me in such a way that for as long as I live I feel I should be thankful every day because I can live my life to the fullest.

So, I worked and worked and worked and then I had my son Adrian whom I raised with the help of my family. For years life went on like that until Adrian became 13. All of a sudden he was looking for a boyfriend for me and every male teacher at his school was a potential candidate! Nothing happened. But what did change was that I’d always been with my son and it seemed like from one day to the next he wanted to be independent. He went out to the movies and he didn’t want me to drop him off in front of the school any longer. He wanted to go to parties by himself. When he was 18 I thought, ‘You know what? I did a good job – I kept all the bad guys away from the house!’ And then I was ready to meet Prince Charming in the form of my Facebook friend Robert! Ha! Ha!

During the time I met Rob on Facebook I was working with dialysis patients as a social worker and living in Miami. The first time we saw each other was in Caracas in February 2010.” Robert says, “I liked her immediately and it felt like we had known each other for a long time. I suppose that was because we’d talked so

much over a long period of time before we finally met. I was nervous, but it felt good and familiar.”

“I also thought it was very nice,” Patricia says, “and I liked him and he met my family. But, to me it was like we were friends. I wasn’t sure yet; I wanted to come to Bonaire to see how he lived and how his dogs were... as he had no family on the island!

That same year I came here to visit. It was dusty and hot and the mosquitoes had an appetite for me. But then it became an experience and fun. I felt much more for him. And another time that year, when I

visited him again, I met both his daughters who were studying and living in Holland. And my son, who lives in Oregon and is a hippy, has also come a couple of times to visit us.

The fact is, Rob likes his island and I knew that he was not going to move to the States or Venezuela. It was more feasible for me to come here. Well, then he proposed and we got married in June 2011.

It has not been easy with the paperwork of my legal status. We went through some hard times, but now everything is much better. The mosquitoes have lost their taste for me and it is so nice to wake up every morning to a warm cup of tea and cinnamon cookies.” She smiles. “Every morning I have someone who brings it for me. He is a very good cook, but most of the time I am cooking now, and when I go to the supermarket he carries my bags. I did that for years, all by myself, and let me tell you that’s not fun! It’s very nice to have somebody who is patient with me, and you know, he even put air-conditioning in the bedroom and hot water in the shower – all for me – even though he used to be the anti-airco man!

In order to avoid fights we have come to an agreement: He handles the remote of

the TV and I control the temperature with my air-conditioning remote! The consequence is – and it’s not a problem for me – that I am only seeing Dutch shows now like ‘Vermist’ (Missing),

‘Sporloos’ (Lost and Found) and what I call ‘the cow-people’ (Farmer looking for a wife) – I love that program!

I have gotten used to the island - to the donkeys running around the house and the roosters singing at 4 in the morning and to the scooter rides I get from Robert, like I was a 15 year old...

When I first arrived here, I took the training to become a tour guide, and I enjoyed it tremendously. It gave me the opportunity to get into contact with other

Rob also found a new job. He’s now the concierge at the Liseo Boneriano, Havo/VVO high school.” “I started almost two years ago,” Robert says, “and it’s the nicest job I’ve had in my life! Every day is different and full of surprises. The children always ask me ‘How’s ‘Amor’?’ meaning Patricia of course, and when I say something bad about her jokingly, they all jump on me: ‘How dare you! You have such a beautiful woman!’

“We both have jobs that we love,” Patricia says, “and for me life is simple; I don’t have a commute and there is no stress. I go to work with my car. I bought a bicycle, but after half a block I was about to faint, so the Dutch way is not for me! I love all the languages people speak here. I mean, where in the world do they tell you all at once, ‘have a good day and a good week!’ It’s a nice challenge at my age with all these languages. Yesterday I went for the first time to my Dutch classes at the Venezuelan institute. I do understand Papiamentu, but I still make mistakes.

We’ve travelled together to Holland and I got crazy at the markets in Amsterdam. We stayed at a farm and we saw lots of cows and sheep. We went in the summer, in July and the last three days it was 13 degrees Celsius (55.4 Fahrenheit). We were freezing and I wanted to come home, because now this is home and when the plane landed at Flamingo Airport I was ever so happy!

Next plan is to walk the Santiago de Compostella pilgrim’s route in Spain with my sisters and together with Robert I hope to go to Surinam, because that has been Robert’s wish for a very long time. I am looking forward to travel with my husband anywhere! We have a new beginning. It’s not always easy and you have to work on it 100% every day to make things happen. But we do love and respect each other and we worry and care about each other and also we’re pushing each other to do better. I wish for many, many years together with my sweetheart – my love Robert.” ■

people and to learn about the island. I like the history and I like the music and I feel lucky to be surrounded by friendly people, because when I came here I didn’t know anybody but Rob. A few weeks ago, Robert’s daughter, Tessa, was visiting and she noticed. She told me, ‘How good to see that you already know so many people here!’

In my free time I still do some tours now and then, but one year and four months ago I started working at *Fundashon Kuido Pa Bista i Oido*, a foundation for the blind and the deaf, for people and children who have vision impairment or who have hearing difficulties. I’m working there as a youth rehabilitation therapist and I really enjoy going to my job every morning. I enjoy being of service to the community and again I am learning. It’s an incredible field. We offer a lot of information and when it’s about their children we give education to the parents and we are there for them. We teach the adults how to be independent and how to stay independent and we support them in finding a job and how to remain employed when they are losing their vision, for instance. We also have a social worker. I am lucky to work with a very dynamic staff that is willing to go the extra mile.

Fundashon Kuido pa Bista i Oido

Professional support for people with visual or hearing disabilities

This year in December, *Fundashon Kuido pa Bista i Oido* (Foundation for Care for Eyesight and Hearing) will have existed for 30 years. Up until a few years ago the foundation was mainly focused on organizing activities, outings and occupational therapy for deaf and blind people and those who are visually and/or hearing impaired.

However, by the end of 2011 everything changed and the foundation has become fully professional. According to director **Genara Silberie**, the social worker and the secretary were hired in 2011 and in 2012 the therapists were employed.

"Our purpose is," Genara says, "to give care to blind and deaf people and people who are visually and/or hearing impaired in such a way that in spite of the fact that they have this handicap they still can function independently in the community. The foundation has three therapists in permanent employment; two of them work with youngsters and one works with older people. We also have a social worker who gives guidance and support to all target groups. We have a secretary/executive assistant, and there is Nelly, our interior caretaker who works here half days.

Our building is located at **Kaya Mgr. Niewindt # 3, next to the old office of Dr. Dorville** and we're open from 8 am to 4 pm. Our foundation is partly subsidized by ZVK (the healthcare insurance office). For the rest we depend on donations and funds. At the moment we are working with 174 visual handicapped people and 24 who have hearing disabilities. And there are 98 people on the waiting list. The majority of our clients are 30 and older. Here we call people up to 24 years of age, 'youngsters.' Lately we're getting more young people. Sometimes it runs in the family, but it can be congenital as well.

The therapists make the appointments with the clients beforehand. Then they go to their house where they give mobility training to the clients. We call that DLA, daily life activities, such as cooking, cleaning, doing laundry and going shopping – everything one needs to live independently. For instance, our therapist Patricia goes to people's houses to give training in using devices like a liquid indicator or magnifying glasses.

We also give computer lessons, Braille lessons and mobility lessons, like teaching the client to walk with a white cane. We offer group activities as well. Every

Wednesday a number of clients get together and we give them general information about what's going on in society and also useful tips how to manage on their own in daily life.

We also give information about where our clients and their families can go for assistance and subsidies, and we provide information to other healthcare institutions, like *Kas di Kuido* (the nursing home) and FKPD (the foundation for handicapped people) on how they can improve their care for clients who have visual or hearing disabilities. Because in general their staff is not trained to work with these people; it's a specialty.

We're now working on setting up courses for these institutions and all other interested parties on how to provide optimal care for people with visual and hearing disabilities. We also have established a working group through Public Body Bonaire, of which we are a member, and from that group we advise on the accessibility of all public buildings on Bonaire. Also we have a Facebook page and we're working on a website.

Of course we also work on prevention. At schools we give advice and recommendations, like a child should wear sunglasses from an early age because excessive UV radiation is - besides from aging - another major contributor to developing cataracts. Also during local festivities with

loud music children should wear earplugs to prevent hearing loss. This year during *Karnaval* we worked on that together with Youth and Family. And then there are several illnesses, like high blood pressure and diabetes, which can cause blindness and these are the most common causes on Bonaire. Here, the people tend to wait to seek help until they are blind. It is a process and one must be checked every two years. And people should look for help instantly the moment they notice their vision becomes worse. Go to the doctor or come here! Our door is open for everybody. People can come here with their questions, but we also go with them to see the eye doctor if they don't dare to go alone, because they don't want to hear the bad news, but also to give support to the clients and their family.

We also ensure that children with visual or hearing disabilities are guided at school. We have a young lady here, who is now 25, but who went blind because of diabetes at a young age. First she went to school but then they couldn't do anything for her anymore and they sent her home. This week we have an appointment with MBO (middle professional education) to have her written in at school again. Patricia will go with her to see which aids she needs for the school.

Our social worker, **Roethleen**, took a special job coaching training through

New Approved And Fashionable Jet Helmets On The Island

Just recently I received a phone call from Harry van den Tillaart (700-3942) about a bunch of new helmets that arrived. About a year ago it was very difficult to find a new helmet on the island of Bonaire as they were simply almost not available. She was an English school teacher who found her way to Bonaire via Hong Kong, Kenya, Gibraltar and the Bahamas and became an important individual in our island's tourism scene. Marion Wilson, slender, loyal, well-organized, efficient, fast talker and a self-described Caribbean girl, passed away peacefully at 3 am on Wednesday morning, May 15, following a long struggle with cancer.

Her almost 25-year-long Bonaire career, about half her life, began as retail manager and dive instructor at the Divi Flamingo resort. After spending two years in that position she went to work as the dive operations manager at Great Adventures Bonaire at the Harbour Village Beach Resort. She stayed there for the next 11 1/2 years and during that time was elected to the board of directors of BONHATA. She had two stints working for BONHATA interrupted by the start-up of her own company in 2002, "Bonaire Sales and Marketing."

Her serious illness and surgery hindered her, and after she parted company with BONHATA, she contributed her skills to help several other businesses on Bonaire, including *The Reporter*.

The lifelong single person, who once swore she would never own a dog, wound up adopting four. Two survived her and will be adopted by friends.

Marion's mother, Vera, a familiar face on Bonaire, and her sister arrived from England to take part in the celebration of Marion's life along with her many, many friends, last Saturday, May 25th at the Kanti Awa on the sea-side. ■ G.D./ Greta Kooistra


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

PART 8 - THE HISTORY OF THE REGATTA, SECOND PART

Niki Tromp remained Mr. Bonaire Regatta from 1971 until his sudden death in 1992. He combined the duties of director of the Bonaire tourist office, Regatta coordinator and member of the Regatta race committee. Annual visits were made to the sister islands and to yacht clubs in Venezuela to promote the Regatta. As the coordinator of the Bonaire Regatta, he was working on this special project almost all year round. **Henk Dreijer** and **Cees Siebesma** were his race directors for many years. **Siebesma** held this position until he left the Bonaire Regatta race committee in 1988.

In 1989 **Roy Bottse** from Curaçao be-

came his successor; he had been coordinating the windsurfing department of the regatta since 1985. With his "Manon Services" company, he introduced professional managing to this sailing event that grew larger and larger every year. In 1987, the Bonaire International Regatta Foundation was created, allowing the board more financial scope. The government, however, retained its influence in the board and in the financial management.

Roy Bottse remained race director until 1995. He proposed that a windsurfer from Bonaire, **Elvis Martinus**, take over. From 1995 **Elvis** directed the races on his own, with the help of a new team of officials.

In August 1992, **Niki Tromp** flew to Curaçao on his way to Venezuela for the promotion of the 25th edition of the Regatta. Upon arrival at the Hato airport, he became unwell as the result of a heart attack and he passed away at the moment that he arrived at the hospital. **Niki Tromp** was just 54 years old when he died and he had been the Regatta coordinator for 20 years. The 1992 Bonaire Regatta had lost its general coordinator. A challenge trophy for the overall winner of the yachts division, the **Copa Niki Tromp**, doubles as an annual tribute to this great man, who was

instrumental in the success of the Bonaire International Sailing Regatta.

In 1992 **Toontje Nicolaas**, a local politician and member of the board of the Lions Club, took over **Niki Tromp's** work. In that same year, the Regatta office was inaugurated – the Kas di Regata on the Boulevard, overlooking the site where the Regattas are held.

In 1993 it was **Judy Diaz**, a genuine Bonairean lady, who became the successor to **Niki Tromp**. **Elvis Martinus** and **Judy Diaz** embodied the fulfillment of **Niki Tromp's** dream, namely two young Bonaireans in charge of the operational side of the Bonaire Regatta. **Judy Diaz** served

as Regatta coordinator from 1993 until 1997. **Byron Tromp**, son of Niki Tromp, took over as the Regatta coordinator in 1998, also representing the Bonaire Sailing Foundation (BSaF). **Elvis Martinus** and **Byron Tromp** went on to lead the Bonaire Regatta into the 21st century. As the sailing regatta with the longest history in the Caribbean (it celebrated its 45th edition in 2012!) it went through many changes. Up to 1994, it was organized from Playa Lechi and from the Sunset Beach Hotel. In 1995, it was relocated to the Plaza Resort for a few years. It returned for one year to the Sunset Beach Hotel before making its final move to the current location: the "Kas di Regata" at the Playa Pabou waterfront in 1999.

New categories were added. Windsurfing, in which local youths excel at top world level, was organized both at Sorobon and in the Kralendijk Bay. The youngest participants set sail in their tiny Optimist boats and the locally favorite category is the one of Microboats, propelled only by the wind and the shouts of their owners, captains who are forced to stay behind. Other categories saw their numbers dwindle: beach cats have been absent for many years and the number of yachts has declined, both due to the absence of participants from Venezuela as a result of the political situation in that country and due to stricter regulations imposed the past few years by custom authorities in Curaçao. Sadly, the

participation of local Fishing Boats has also become minimal. But, while regattas world-wide see their numbers of participants dwindle significantly and often are no longer on the calendar, the Bonaire Regatta is still going strong, maintaining satisfactory numbers of participants over the years, thanks to the addition of new categories.

Since 1995, the organizing committee includes sailing experts from all over the

Caribbean, like **Ivo van Dooren** (Curaçao), in charge of rating and judging; **Alfred Koolen** (St. Maarten), CSA Official Measurer and also in charge of rating; **Hernan Salcedo** (Colombia), Head Judge; and, me, **Evert Bongers** (Aruba), MC and Race Announcer from the tower in front of the Kas di Regata. A special place in the committee has been occupied for years and years by a wonderful lady from Curaçao, **Militza 'Icha' de Palm**, who was in charge, among a lot of other things, of the scoring and the publishing of the results. A long list of Bonairean volunteers can be seen at the starts and finishes, handling buoys and anchors, registrations and finances, safety and rescues, too many people to name them all here.

A few years ago, **Elvis Martinus** decided to withdraw from the organizing committee, handing his position over to a young and ambitious race director from Curaçao, **Viktor Wijand**, who lived on Bonaire for a few years. He now serves as Principal Race Officer.

Side-events have emerged in the course of the years: the All-Nations Flag Parade, the Swim to Klein Bonaire, the Youth Football and International Softball Tourna-

ments, just to name a few. Organizers, officials and sponsors enjoy themselves at the annual Working Boat Parade.


Last, but certainly not least: the Bonaire Regatta also includes a popular, week-long festivity: the Regatta Festival. Its organization is coordinated by **Byron Tromp** who describes it in his own words: "There was never a time that I remember that we did not all look forward to this festive celebration with music, food, dancing in the streets and the good cheer that filled the island."

The Festival yearly attracts crowds of visitors from the neighboring islands, contributing to fully booked hotels and thus to the island's tourism industry.

On its way to the celebration of half a century of Bonaire Regattas, due in 2017, the legacy of the 'Velia' and the 'Sislin' lives on, thanks to the tireless efforts of organizers and sponsors.

From the story :Hubert Domcasse, the Man Called Ebo. By the @Wicked Mind's Eye of Capt'n don/ ©Feb 18 1999

A young Bonairean called Ebo stood fascinated as he watched two grey haired lady tourists, older than his own grandmother, don steel tanks and dive gear, pull down their masks, lock arms, and walk confidently down the old boat ramp to disappear into the sea.

Born to the sea, Ebo sailed before he could walk, swam with the agility of a fish, and dived, breath holding, deep into the reefs, often without mask or fins. Naturally at ease in the water, no part of the sea brought him fear, but SCUBA seemed to impose a caution that kept him from learning the art. Until... these grandmothers...

In 1967, Ebo Domcasse was in many ways the heart of the old Flamingo Beach Club, a family resort built out of the remains of a WW II internment camp. A trusted employee, Ebo was often administrator, waiter, boatman for water skiers or fishermen, and then bartender. As natural as Ebo was with the sea, he was equally at ease with international guests and visitors of all kinds. Ebo had observed the shenanigans of this crazy Capt'n Don and his divers for years and had virtually watched the birth of the Caribbean diving craze, without any sign of a real desire to learn to dive. A hidden reserve held back a desire for compressed air breathing, but now these grandmothers

had touched a nerve.

Not long after, Ebo donned his first tank and simply taught himself SCUBA. Having been through that self teaching route himself, Capt'n Don thought it most natural, and simply cautioned Ebo: Never do two tanks back to back. Pull this 'J' rod when you run out of air to give you enough air to get to the surface, but don't trust it. When it fails, just

come up slowly, but most important never, never hold your breath. Just tilt your head back and breathe out slowly, kinda like whistling.

Several years later, Ebo had logged some hundreds of dives. A visiting scuba instructor diving with Ebo was horrified to learn that he had never had proper SCUBA instruction. Ebo smiled, knowing that he had more than triple the instructor's time underwater. Nonetheless, Ebo Domcasse became the first certified diver on Bonaire. Capt'n Don wasn't certified until five years later.

It was not certification or instructor status that propelled Ebo into the throngs of the developing diving industry but his phenomenal compatibility with the reefs, fish and the sea. It was as if a new aquatic Tarzan had moved into the oceans of his fathers to take charge. His aim had never been less than total conservation. With compassion for his charges, over the years he guided innumerable divers through his virgin reefs, relaxed but with a constant awareness. Few historians know of his remarkable record of unsung numbers of safe entries into the reefs as a shepherd to literally thousands of visiting divers who ventured with him without

harm or incident.

As a sailor, Ebo became a hero in 1968 when he bested Capt'n Don in a sailboat race that won him 27 cases of beer. It was the birth of the now famous Bonaire International Sailing Regatta.

Ebo Domcasse, a diving pioneer, was awarded two reefs in his name, Ebo's Reef and Ebo's Special, as a gesture of respect and love from other guides as well as from his diving guests. Ebo, with his quiet ways and relaxed manner, has given so much of himself to the building of Bonaire's renowned underwater image.

It has been an honor to dive with you, Ebo. ■ **Captain Don/**

BONAIRE'S NEW GAME—SUPERMARKET MONOPOLY

Dear Editor,

We all know Van den Tweel has bought Warehouse. And last week owner Gerard van den Tweel himself established a branch of the Dutch VVD political party on Bonaire.

While specific details of the supermarket sale are not generally available, one might wonder what is in store for the customers and employees of Warehouse as well as all island shoppers. Before the van den Tweel markets and Warehouse opened Bonaire residents all shopped very well on the island, but we and especially newcomers now find these markets important for our food shopping needs.

What effect will this consolidation have on market prices?

Reportedly Warehouse has reopened as a "bargain outlet." Will the name be formally changed? Will it no longer carry the many popular non-Dutch products?

And, of greater interest, will Warehouse (or whatever it's going to be called) still give its customers the benefit of the 8% tax reduction in food exemption that was effective January 1st of this year? In a survey done by the Consumers Union (*Unokobon*) of 13 local supermarkets, Warehouse passed on 75 – 100% of these savings as opposed to 25 – 50% passed on by van den Tweel.

The lower prices offered by Warehouse were an important factor in shopper loyalty.

It appears that Van Den Tweel strives for control of



the grocery market in Curacao with two Albert Heijn stores and has a strong presence in Aruba having acquired the Ling and Sons supermarket. Combined with three large stores here on Bonaire (Van den Tweel also owns the BFG wholesale market) his collective buying power should be great. Will the result of these savings be passed on to us, their customers? Will its bottom line solely benefit or will its customers share the savings from volume purchasing?

We have asked for answers but none have been forthcoming and requests for interviews with management have been unsuccessful.

Do the *Reporter's* readers have any more observations or comments?

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

Koninklijke Visio (www.visio.org), a Dutch expertise center for the visual handicapped and the blind. She also confers with employers to hire our clients. Not only is it important for one's self-esteem and for one's social life but... with a government allowance of only \$172 per month it is an absolute prerequisite if you want to be independent and not a burden to your family for the rest of your life. That's the hardest thing for our clients, to find a job. Presently the Public Body has a subsidized program for companies when they employ a handicapped person.

So, these are the things we do. What we need is a building. We have applied for funding to set up a visual and auditory center so we can work more focused and professional. And yes – of course – we need funds. We do have Braille translators and typewriters, but we need Braille keyboards for computers and portable light boxes to stimulate children with bad vision. Such a light box costs

\$135 and the contents cost \$409 for the 1st level, and from there on you add.



This aid is used for vision tracking. You observe how the child reacts and then you know how much the child is capable of seeing. We also need baby mobiles with colors and sound so we can detect at a very young age if they can see or hear well. We now have a two-year old toddler with a visual disadvantage, which could have been detected at an earlier stage.

As mentioned before, our foundation is working together with Koninklijke Visio in Holland, but we are in close contact as well with Curacao, Aruba and Surinam, and now we will expand to Saba and Statia. We're working on it! ■ *Greta Kooistra*



local building crew, he said "I was very impressed with the enthusiasm and skills the local youngsters showed during the building."



What's My Name ?

The 40- 45 War was just over when my father got his first car from "the company." It was a delivery van, a Ford Anglia, painted on both sides with four happy-looking cooks of different heights. The broadly smiling gentlemen with their cook hats were carrying plates with colorfully decorated puddings. Father used to work for a company that delivered custard powder, vanilla sugar and custard to grocers and he enthusiastically sold these products to the middle class chandlers.

His nickname was "the Pudding Guy," and my mother, as was predictable, was "the Pudding Wife." I was, maybe because of the free and abundant consumption of custard puddings, a fat little kid and soon enough I was called "Fat Ted" by all my friends in the street. And because the bus company in Twente is called T.E.T. in the end I was blessed with the forename and nickname "Tetbus."

I was not very happy with the situation, but there was a change when I started playing in a band. My friends thought that I was handy stroking the brushes over the drum set, and on one of our posters with the honorary performance with Greetje Kaufeld, they wrote my name, "Gus Geritsing" on drums. Was I better off now? "Lucky Gus" would have been more appropriate. Around that same time I met a nice girl. She was from a neighboring village where everybody had a nick name. She was called "The Milk factory" because of her -it's easy to guess - very feminine frontal appearance. The latter I liked, the former not so much.

This might explain my more than ordinary interest in nicknames. Pester and satirical names, that's what they were! Not something to be happy about. Especially since there is a different way of doing things. I envy people called Dudi, Dushi, Ronchi or simply Moppy, Popchi or Doggy. These are pet names .They don't hurt your ego, and your ego is even slightly flattered.

On Bonaire, giving a nickname is quite common. Our island is like a small village community in which- just consult your phonebook - many identical names appear. In such circumstances, nicknames are used to indicate, in a simple and fast way, what the identity of the person involved is. In a large number of Dutch village communities, things are no different.

My neighbor Alfred also has a nickname. He baptized himself "Yellow Man" because his dreadlocks reminded one of a singer from Jamaica who had "King Yellow Man" as his stage name. It was Winston Foster, born in Jamaica in 1956, an albino and a famous "dub reggae" and "dance hall" musician who was enormously popular in the 80s. Furthermore, there is a dive buoy behind Klein Bonaire with the name "Yellow Man." That name was given to the buoy because my

neighbor Alfred regularly used to spend the night on Klein Bonaire, against all regulations. In this way Stinapa and he himself took care that his name will forever be connected to the smallest island in the Caribbean.

But Alfred has, as far as nicknames are concerned, more on his conscience. He gave many islanders a nick name, sometimes just to pester and tease them a little and sometimes just to make fun of them.

When he was still going to the elementary school run by the friars, one of his friends was allowed to sleep over at Alfred's. Alfred was still awake when he heard all kinds of sounds coming from under the blankets of the bed next to his. They sounded a lot like farts. The next morning he said to his friend, "From now on I'll call you "Pujachi" because you kept me from my sleep last night." And that 's the way it is up until today. In a select group of people, everybody knows who "Pujachi," or in other words, "the Farter" is. Maybe it's not so nice for the victim. I can sympathize with him because of my nickname, "Fat Tetbus" from my youth.

During my stay on Bonaire, as far as nicknames are concerned, I personally did quite well. From Yellow Man I got the pet name, "Papa Bubi." It was the name of my Bonairean fishing boat, built by Kador, a fisherman and boat builder, all in one. I had borrowed that name from the tugboat of our island, the *Bubi*. I couldn't come up with a name in a jiffy when the harbor clerk "Boei" Tromp asked me for the name of the new boat while registering at the harbor office.

But who and what is really a Bubi? A Bubi is a bird that I first saw at the end of our trans- Atlantic crossing on the beaches of the Aves islands, the last stop before Bonaire with about 30 miles still to go.

Of the Booby there are roughly speaking two kinds of birds: the Brown Booby (*Sula Leucagaster*) and the White Masked Booby (*Sula Dactylatra*). The latter sometimes has red feet and is crazy about squid and flying fish.

I think that I am the "White Papa Bubi." Our neighbor "Yellow Man" saw that distinctive color white correctly. And it surely feels a lot better than "Fat Tetbus" from the days of my youth. ■


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Pet of the Week

Manta

That manta rays can move over 100 kilometers just to eat? This group of marine mega-vertebrates feed at a depth of 50 meters or less and up to 20 kilometers offshore. They are found feeding in a variety of habitats including areas of upwelling (high nutrients) as well as low nutrient waters. It was discovered through a new tracking study that these groups tend to stay near some of the Caribbean’s busiest shipping lanes! Some of these large rays are caught intentionally for parts of their gills or to be used as bait in the growing shark fishery. Currently very small areas of their ranges lie within marine protected areas. More research needs to be done in order to establish accurate protected areas and to conserve these sea giants. ■ Alexis Ferrera

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

SUMMER IS COMING

Early in June, three planets will line up in our west-northwest sky for us to see; but we will need to look during the first half of the month, for two of them will be in conjunction with the Sun and therefore invisible after June 16th.



On June 1st, **Jupiter, Venus, and Mercury** will form a straight line angling to the upper left from twilight's glow at the horizon. The lowest, Jupiter, will be at -1.9 magnitude; the middle one and the brightest, Venus, will be at -3.9 magnitude; and the uppermost, Mercury, will be at -0.3. The constellation **Gemini** will be seen nearby, sitting atop the trio and just to the left of Mercury, and will come into view as twilight fades and the sky darkens more. The three planets will span about 9 degrees of space, from Jupiter, up and left to Mercury, which is about as much sky space that one can cover with a clenched fist held out at arm's length. Jupiter will be invisible to us by June 15th, but Venus will appear to gain altitude slowly all month as its orbit takes it around the Sun. On June 25th Venus will form a straight line with Gemini's two brightest and uppermost stars, **Castor and Pollux**. Meanwhile Mercury will appear to gain altitude for a few more days, reaching its peak on June 12th, when it will be 12 degrees above the horizon, 40 to 75 minutes after sunset. On June 10th a slim crescent Moon may be seen just 6 degrees to the lower left of Mercury. This will help direct one in spotting the innermost planet in our Solar System.

Summer Solstice occurs on June 21st this year; at precisely 1 pm, Sky Park Time. This places the Sun at its highest point above the horizon for all northern hemisphere skywatchers, which for us

will put the Sun at 73 1/2 degrees above the southern horizon at noon. This marks the official start of summer,

As the sky darkens in June, **Saturn** is the other planet that can be seen, nearly halfway between the southern horizon and the **zenith**. It is nestled among the stars of **zodiac constellation Virgo** all summer. Saturn makes a great sight — a real treat to the eye — for those skywatchers who can look at it through a telescope. Its beautiful rings are without rival, but decent sized scopes will reveal several of Saturn's multiple moons.

Coming up now in summer's first month in the northeast sky is the **asterism** known popularly as the **Summer Triangle**. It consists of three first magnitude stars, that can be connected in a triangle, each one found in a separate constellation. The brightest and highest up is **Vega**, in the tiny constellation shaped like a parallelogram, called **Lyra the harp**. Below and left of Vega is **Deneb in Cygnus the swan**, and then below and under Cygnus, we can see **Altair, in Aquila the eagle**. During the summer months this bright asterism will ride up and high up near the zenith, and then descend in late summer and all through the fall toward the northwest horizon. Indeed, the Summer Triangle can still be seen low in the northwest sky in the weeks just before Christmas!

After a **New Moon on June 8th**, 1st quarter will be on the 16th; Full Moon on the 23rd, and Last quarter on June 30th. ■ *Dennis Herrmann*

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
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
