

Transition Begins From HSL To HSM

After nearly 25 years and 125,000 flight hours, Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron Light FOUR ZERO is transitioning to Helicopter Maritime Strike Squadron 40 and the MH-60R aircraft. The transition became official during a ceremony held on April 9.

HSL-40, which was established on Oct. 4, 1985, will start a five-year transition from the SH-60B aircraft to the upgraded multi-mission MH-60R. HSM-40 is expected to begin training MH-60R pilots and Aircrewman in October this year.

HSL-40 is the only SH-60B Fleet Readiness Squadron (FRS) in the world that trains pilots and aircrew of the U.S. Atlantic and Pacific Fleet, along with foreign students from around the globe.

With the transition to HSM-40, it will be one of two Fleet Replacement Squadrons dedicated to training pilots and aircrew in the new MH-60R aircraft. HSM-40 is expected to continue training SH-60B aircrews through 2015 making it a dual T/M/S FRS.

The Navy is continuing its transition to the H-60 as its sole helicopter platform.

The MH-60R combines the capabilities of the SH-60B and SH-60F with sophisticated new cockpit, avionics and mission systems capable of projecting enhanced combat power to perform missions of surface warfare, anti-surface warfare, area surveillance and command and control warfare.

HSL-40 is proud to transition to HSM-40 and will continue to train and mold the pilots and aircrewmembers that will become Fleet Replacement Pilots and Aircrew for service in LAMPS MK III and MH-60R Fleet squadrons.

Changes To Help Sailors With PTS

A Navy message released last week announced policy, timeline, and procedural changes to the Perform to Serve program.

“At a time when retention is at an all-time high and attrition is at an all-time low, we have to make sure we keep the right number of people while maintaining a quality level that enables us to sustain a work force for the future,” said Fleet Master Chief (AW/SW/SCW) Scott Benning, Navy Total Force/Manpower, Education and Training Fleet Master Chief. “PTS continues to evolve to ensure performance based opportunity is maintained for our best and brightest Sailors.”

NAVADMIN 128/10 provides the timeline when PTS applications should be submitted, eliminates the Page 13 “commitment of intent to reenlist” entry, addresses Navy Reserve affiliation options, and explains exceptions to PTS for limited groups of Sailors.

Working with their chain of command, Sailors should consult their career counselor and submit a PTS application no later than 13 months before their end of active obligated service (EAOS) or projected rotation date (PRD) if service obligation will be required.

Commands may submit applications 15 months prior to EAOS/PRD if they will be deployed during the regular processing months, or for Sailors who require early approval for special programs or decommissioning.

Applications are required for Sailors in paygrades E-3 to E-6 with less than 14 years of service, regardless of reenlistment intentions. According to the NAVADMIN, commands may submit applications for ineligible Sailors by selecting “no” to question one, “Is member eligible for reenlistment?”

This enables accountability of all Sailors, according to the message.

The new message eliminates the requirement for Sailors to sign a Page 13 stat-

ing their reenlistment intentions. However, commands are required to submit a Page 13 to BUPERS 320 when a Sailor with PTS approval no longer desires to reenlist.

“All members of the command leadership team should read NAVADMIN 128/10 in its entirety and remain fully engaged in the conduct of timely career development boards, counseling and mentoring,” said Benning.

PTS was first launched in 2003 as a method for the Navy to shape manning to match mission requirements. It is a centralized reservation system used to manage reenlistments. While most Sailors are permitted to reenlist in their current rate, Sailors in overmanned ratings may be offered reenlistment in an undermanned rating. When PTS began, it applied only to “first-term” Sailors in overmanned ratings but has grown. Last year, the Navy expanded PTS to Sailors E-3 through E-6 with six-to-10 years of service (Zone B), and then to Sailors E-3 through E-6 with 10-to-14 years of service (Zone C). Performance is a critical factor in PTS selection. Sailors in paygrades E-1 and E-2 cannot apply to reenlist.

Commanding officers must ensure PTS applications are screened and certified for accuracy in accordance with MILPERSMAN article 1440-060 and notify BUPERS 320 of any action that may adversely affect PTS eligibility. Actions may include loss of a security clearance, three Physical Fitness Assessment failures in a four-year period, reduction in rate, submarine disqualification, elected separation, non-judicial punishment, refusal to obligate service for orders, and high-year tenure.

More guidance is available in NAVADMIN 128/10.

SE Region Committed To Greener Future

Commander Navy Region Southeast Rear Adm. Tim Alexander kicked off the 40th Anniversary of Earth Day, to be celebrated April 22, by signing a proclamation on April 16 urging the Navy’s Southeast community toward environmental stewardship, environmentally-healthy mission partnerships, and energy conservation.

“As stewards of the earth, our mission must always be performed in a manner that protects the environment, prevents pollution, and protects our natural, historic and cultural resources,” Rear Adm. Alexander said. “The Navy will continue its evolution toward a green fleet and its commitment to a high standard of stewardship. I urge all personnel to conserve energy, protect the environment and participate in your local Earth Day events.”

Naval Air Stations Jacksonville, Pensacola, New Orleans, and Naval Seabee Base Gulfport, already have activities planned to foster environmental stewardship on their bases April 22.

NAS Pensacola has been doing beach clean-ups since the middle of the 1980s.

“We have 17 miles of shoreline at NAS Pensacola,” said Mark Gibson, natural resources manager for Navy Facilities Engineering Command Pensacola.

“We have nine adopt-a-beach base groups who do quarterly clean-ups, and this past September was the 22nd consecutive year NAS Pensacola participated in the International Coastal Cleanup,” Gibson added. “Earth Day is a great opportunity for us to get the Navy community to come out, roll up their sleeves and invest in the environment by picking up the debris that washes up on Pensacola beaches.”

Coinciding with the Navy’s Earth Day 2010 theme of “Partnering for a Greener Future,” Navy Region Southeast is a member of the Gulf of Mexico Alliance, the South Atlantic Alliance, the Southeast Partnership of Planning and Sustainability, as well as many other local and regional partnerships.

According to Southeast Region Environmental Program Manager Camille Destafney, partnerships provide the opportunity to learn partners’ values and missions, and to educate them on the Navy’s mission, resulting in greater understanding and oppor-

tunities to further all missions while protecting the environment.

“Over the past 40 years, the Navy has made huge strides in environmental stewardship and protection of our natural resources,” said Destafney. “Forty years ago, no one understood hazardous substances and the impact they have on health; today we understand that and have laws in place to regulate them. The Navy has embraced and become a leader in the environmental movement.”

When Depression Strikes Do You Have A Plan?

It is a condition most times associated with middle-aged men (ages 40-55). Some have called this experience the "mid-life crisis."

However, it is no respecter of persons or age groups. It is not confined to particular genders and is not necessarily limited by age. It can be a time in anyone's life when one experiences the pain that comes along with unfulfilled dreams.

Perhaps one feels forced to admit that he/she has only a limited amount of control over the particular conditions and circumstances that surround them. It is a time in life when reality denies and defies the ideals one had established.

The conditions just described can be simply defined as having a bad bout of depression. The symptoms are a loss of hope, a low level of motivation, lack of energy and sometimes an exhausting battle of mental games.

The inner struggle usually brings up a bunch of unanswered questions. The biggest question is typically: Why? The struggle with depression can bring about a dark and dismal personal disposition that can immobilize one mentally, emotionally and physically.

In acute circumstances a person can even become physically ill. Whether for a moment, a month or years at a time,

anyone of us can experience depression.

I am not a mental health specialist nor do I have advanced degrees in clinical counseling. Our Fleet and Family Support Center and Naval Hospital JAX have access to outstanding referral resources that can provide invaluable support through the trying times posed by depression.

By all means we should use all the good resources made available to us. As a Chaplain I seek to provide a faith-oriented option in confronting depression.

When we cannot get the answers to the questions – when we cannot realize our goals – when the "real" destroys our "ideals" – when we ask in despair "where is God in all of this?" – when times are simply unjust.... You see, depression can destroy the myth of the old cliché "when things get tough the tough get going" because there are times, my friends, that there is no more toughness left!

It is precisely in those moments that an unconditional, unadulterated faith in God must be exercised (along with other good resources).

Perhaps I can best relate this through a personal experience and what I learned from it. When our older son was four years old he underwent a series of elaborate surgeries.

During that process I found myself gradually sinking into a depressive state. I sought help. A gifted hospital Chaplain, plus the support and prayers of people that loved my family, taught me a few good things about exercising my faith in the midst

of depression. I learned that:

1. GOD'S KNOWLEDGE IS COMPREHENSIVE: I believe in a sovereign God. I can try but I cannot fully discern the mind of God. I need to trust that God knows more than I do and I need to superimpose my faith over the circumstances that surround me.

It is an active faith which calls me to act upon those things over which I have some

measure of control.

Ultimately my faith compels me to trust in the eternal knowledge and integrity of this divine and majestic being who is never surprised by circumstances. God's knowledge is comprehensive.

2. GOD'S TIME IS THE RIGHT TIME: God possesses the eternal calendar and God is always right on-time.

To put it in biblical terms: "In the fullness of time" God acts. The God I believe in has a history of acting at the right time. The Almighty has intervened in history and still answers prayers.

God has dealt with and wants to deal with me and with you. And, when the fullness of time comes...

3. GOD'S GRACE IS SUFFICIENT: I have learned that in the midst of personal anguish, grief, loss and depression

God will use the prevailing conditions to shape a person of faith. Much like the potter forms the clay, God can and will use his grace to create a new work in our lives.

The result can be a maturity born in strife and nurtured to strength by the hand of God.

McInerney Returns From Deployment

Marks More Than 30 Years of Gas Turbine Service to the Navy

Sailors manned the rails of USS McInerney (FFG 8), as their ship, which is older than most of them, brought them home safe and sound to Naval Station Mayport April 15 after a regularly scheduled deployment to the U.S. Southern Command (SOUTHCOM) area of responsibility.

This deployment marked the 14th deployment for the 30-year old, gas turbine ship. This feat is no small endeavor and is credited to its crew of dedicated Sailors.

"It takes a very focused crew to keep a ship like this in operational status, a crew that works very hard at the material readiness of their ship," said Cmdr. Paul Young, McInerney's commanding officer. "We have hit all our commitments and it all boils down to the crew."

McInerney's Command Master Chief echoed his Commanding Officer's sentiments.

"The crew has taken good care of the ship and we have been through many inspections and maintenance periods to make sure we were fully capable to run a 30-year old ship," said Command Master Chief John T. Lawry, McInerney's command master chief.

The deployment was a busy, yet successful one and included over 50 Sailors earning their Enlisted Surface Warfare Pins (ESWS), said Lawry.

"We had a lot of good days, every day we advanced a Sailor was a good day, every day we pinned on a warfare pin was a good day, those are all good days. We recently raised the retention pennant and that's a real good indication that we are doing the right thing by our crew and Sailors," said Lawry.

The deployment, which engaged McInerney to work with other allied nations in the SOUTHCOM area of responsibility, was full of successes.

"This deployment went very well, we disrupted nearly 10 tons of narcotics, we did four multinational exercises and executed various operations, its been a great a deployment," said Young.

Some of the narcotics disrupted marked another first for McInerney. Their most recent drug bust April 3 was achieved with assistance

from the embarked MQ-8B Fire Scout, the first Vertical Takeoff and Landing Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (VTUAV) onboard a U.S. Navy Ship

McInerney has a continued history of firsts. On their last deployment in 2008 they were the first ship to ever capture a Self Propelled Semi-Submersible (SPSS) drug smuggling vessel.

During its long career in the Navy, FFG 8,

served the United States during 14 deployments, from the Middle East in 1984, to the Caribbean in 1993 and finally in South America in 2010. Lawry stated this deployment, as with most deployments, boils down to a few major things.

"There were some tough moments, as with most deployments. There are always challenges, but every day you get up and face those chal-

lenges head on. Each day is another day closer to completing your mission, another day closer to being home with family and another day closer to bringing everyone home safely," said Lawry.

McInerney returned home to Mayport after completing its mission with all its crew onboard and proud to serve on the oldest operating gas turbine ship in the Navy.

Fire Scout Returns With USS McInerney From First Operational Deployment

The MQ-8B Fire Scout, a Vertical Takeoff and Landing Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (VTUAV), returned from its first operational deployment April 15. The VTUAV was embarked on USS McInerney (FFG 8) during their recent 6-month deployment to the U.S. Southern Command (SOUTHCOM) area of responsibility.

Fire Scout is an autonomously controlled helicopter used by McInerney to scan waters for drug smugglers.

Senior Chief Aviation Electronics Technician (AW/SW) Stephen Diets, the fleet liaison for Fire Scout and one of the first enlisted Air Vehicle Operators (AVO), said Fire Scout has the advantage of being able to hover unlike traditional Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAV).

Fire Scout is one of the Navy's newest unmanned flight technologies and McInerney is the first ship

to support it.

"It's one of the Navy's newest systems, we brought it to bear on the mission and it has challenged us to think in new ways to accomplish our goals," said Cmdr. Paul Young, McInerney's commanding officer.

McInerney is the first ship to make a drug bust using a VTUAV following a drug interdiction April 3. Fire Scout was on a post maintenance check flight when the operators spotted suspected narcotics smugglers.

"We got the first Fire Scout drug bust on the deployment, it was very exciting and it's mostly thanks to all the hard work by the air detachment's maintainers," said Diets.

The Ship's crew also shared in the excitement of the bust.

"It's exciting to make a bust, when you stop the drugs and put people in jail it really defines our whole mission, it makes it all worth being out here, and this bust was groundbreaking," said Command Master Chief John T. Lawry,

McInerney's command master chief.

The VTUAV, while on deployment, was kept up and running thanks to the maintenance crew of Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron Light 42 (HSL-42) Det. 7, who served as McInerney's air support.

According to Lt. Tobias Walters, lead AVO with HSL-42 Det. 7, Fire Scout did well during its first deployment.

"I think the deployment was a success, we were able to operate in a shipboard environment and even got the first successful drug bust, I think we proved that Fire Scout is an asset that can bring the Navy success in the future," said Walters.

Fire Scout can reach speeds of up to 85 knots, reach altitudes of 20,000 feet and fly for over six hours on one tank of gas. It has officially completed its first operational deployment and according to Walters, it's a technology that will integrate well with today's Navy.

Joint Warrior Kicks Off With Fast-Paced Training

The multinational exercise Joint Warrior 10-1 commenced April 12 off the coast of Scotland with high-tempo training exercises.

Joint Warrior is a United Kingdom-led, multiwarfare exercise designed to improve interoperability between allied navies and prepare participating crews to conduct combined operations during deployment.

The concentrated training schedule for the guided missile destroyer USS Laboon, one of the six U.S. Navy ships participating in Joint Warrior 10-1, included a mine leadthrough and a Fast Inshore Attack Craft (FIAC) exercise, which occurred immediately upon pulling out of port in Faslane, Scotland.

"All underway time is valuable. We want to maximize every training moment, and it puts everyone into the scenario," said Capt. Stephen Evans, deputy commodore of Destroyer Squadron (DESRON) 24. "We're in scenario from the very start, and we're operating under very realistic circumstances."

The first exercise of the day was a mine leadthrough, in which a minesweeping ship, HMS Brocklesby (M33), led

Laboon and Leroy Grumman are participating in Joint Warrior, a semi-annual event that encompasses multi-national and multi-warfare exercises designed to improve interoperability between allied navies, and prepares participating crews to conduct combined operations during deployment.

Laboon through a simulated mine warfare track, which permitted Laboon to practice ship maneuvers and operate astern of the minesweeper. During the exercise, Brocklesby escorted Laboon through a mine track, which ensured Laboon had a

clear, mine-free, path as it transited a potential dangerous area.

Ensign Michele Rollins, DESRON 24 staff navigator, said this minesweeping exercise is unique because it is not practiced the same way U.S. Navy ships would practice off

the U.S. east coast. During U.S. Navy exercises, navigation would plot a path for ships to follow and simulate a minesweeper escort ship. In Joint Warrior, Laboon and other ships were able to actually follow a minesweeping ship, achieving

a realistic experience for Sailors aboard the ship.

Meanwhile, the crew remained ready to execute the FIAC. The crew was not briefed on what time the attack would happen, but was told to be ready and waiting for the call to go out. When Laboon's crew was called to man stations for the attack, they found four jet skis inbound and executed proper procedures to neutralize threats.

As sailors manned gun mounts and blew the ship's whistle, the at-sea fire party members manned fire hoses spray and deter the inbound jet skis. The exercise also challenged Laboon's navigation and bridge team, while personnel executed proper pre-planned responses, they continued to maintain the ships speed and maneuver the ship, in different ways, to keep the jet skis in the ships wake.

Master-at-Arms First Class (SW/AW) Joseph Lucy, Laboon's anti-terrorism force protections watch officer, said this exercise was beneficial great because attempts to gather information from approaching jet skis approaching ships is an increasing realistic scenario.

"This is our home; we have to protect each other. Everyone was reacting to the situation as if it were real, and we were

working together in the mindset to protect each other and protect our home," said Lucy.

Ships led by DESRON 24, commanded by Capt. Aaron C. Jacobs, commodore, will be participating in the Joint Warrior training exercise until April 23, with different, realistic scenario-driven exercises planned everyday. The exercise promotes Commander, U.S. 2nd Fleet's three focus areas: conducting safe and effective fleet operations to achieve mission, providing ready maritime forces for global assignment and teaming with allies and partners in execution of the maritime strategy.

Joint Warrior serves as a certifying event for ships that will deploy with coalition forces in the future. Laboon is participating alongside the guided missile destroyer USS Barry (DDG 52), guided missile cruisers USS Vella Gulf (CG 72) and USS Vicksburg (CG 69), guided missile frigate USS Kauffman (FFG 59) and Fleet Replenishment Oiler USNS Leroy Grumman (T-AO 195). Nations participating in the exercise are Belgium, Brazil, France, Germany, Italy, Netherlands, New Zealand, United Kingdom and the United States.

Tools To Maintain Your Personnel Records Online

The Navy is planning to phase out enlisted field service records, and Sailors, who are ultimately responsible for maintaining their service records, need to access their records online.

Tools currently available, such as the self-service Electronic Service Record (ESR) and Web-Enabled Record Review (WERR), help Sailors review their records to determine if anything is missing or out-of-date.

ESR and WERR are two separate tools with differing functions. Some of the differences are illustrated below in order to clarify confusion between the two.

ESR is an online version of the service record and replaces the paper service record used in the past. Sailors review and update their personal emergency contact information and other service record items through their ESR self-service account. Service members with a Common Access Card access their accounts through the Navy Standard Integrated Personnel System (NSIPS) Web site at <https://nsips.nmci.navy.mil>.

Sailors afloat access their ESR self-service account through the ship's NSIPS server.

ESR was implemented in 2006 via NAVADMIN 292/06. The more recent NAVADMIN 043/09 directs all Navy commands to use NSIPS/ESR as the single data entry point at the field level for all Sailors.

"This means that clerks and supervisors working in the personnel office, as well as individual Sailors accessing their ESR, have this one place to enter personnel transactions, including those personnel transactions that affect pay," said Art Tate, NSIPS/ESR/CIMS implementation manager. "Sailors should review their ESR data and pages and then work with their personnel support office to ensure their data accurately reflects their personal and professional achievements."

It's helpful to remember that ESR is used to track a service member's status while serving. But once retired or separated from service that Sailor's ESR is turned off. ESR is simply an electronic version of the service record, not a permanent account like the Official Military Personnel File (OMPF), which

Sailors view when using WERR.

Sailors use WERR online to review documents in their OMPF, commonly known as the "microfiche." WERR, available through the BUPERS Online Web site, <https://www.bo1.navy.mil>, displays individual scanned service record pages. Service members use WERR to view, download and print Page 13s, performance evaluations and other service record items. Sailors should review their WERR to determine if any items are missing from their records. This is especially important, because the information in WERR is what selection boards review when considering candidates for advancement and special programs.

"Sailors should do a periodic validation of their records. Missing 'evals,' training documentation, etcetera, can cause a

lot of problems—such as missing a promotion," said Chief Personnel Specialist (AW) Catherine Diaz, customer support leading chief petty officer at Navy Operational Support Center Fort Worth. "This doesn't have to happen."

When the paper records close out, scanned copies will be submitted for documentation in the OMPF and the original paper record will be given to the Sailor for historical retention. The Sailor should then ensure the self-service ESR account established, with the ESR data verified.

If service members find any discrepancies in either system, Diaz advises members to seek assistance with their servicing personnel office for correction.

CHSMWL Talks With WWII Landing Craft Group

Capt. Carl Bush, Commander, Helicopter Maritime Strike Wing, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, was invited to address the Landing Craft Tank (LCT) Flotillas of World War II Reunion Group at the Crown Plaza Riverside on April 10.

The LCT Flotillas of World War II organization maintains the memories, experiences and camaraderie of those who served aboard the landing craft (tank) vessels between 1942 and 1945 in both the European and Pacific Theaters of Operation. The organization boasts a membership of veterans, their families and anyone who has served, or is serving, in the "Gator Navy" as well as any individual who has an interest in preserving the memory of these wartime vessels. The LCTs were critical components to the amphibious assaults at Normandy on 6 June, 1944, and various other campaigns throughout the war. The success of Operation OVERLORD ensured the victory of the United States and her Allies in the European theater.

The LCT Flotillas organiza-

tion publishes a quarterly newsletter and hosts an annual gathering that reunites veterans and friends 65 years after the end of World War II. The wartime experiences of these aging veterans, who were in their teens in the 1940s, remain fresh and vivid in their collective memories. Many active members are the children or grandchildren of an LCT veteran. The LCT Flotillas of WWII group is keenly interested in keep-

ing the legacy and heritage of these patriotic Sailors alive as the original group of members slowly diminishes.

Bush addressed the group following a dinner with the LCT Flotillas membership. He commented on the massive military buildup between June 1940 and June 1943, during which the Navy built 15,376 ships and 15,567 aircraft. The Navy also gained an additional 8,300 aircraft that were built by

the Army for a total wartime inventory of more than 24,000 aircraft. In 1942, President Theodore Roosevelt placed particular emphasis on the construction of more than 25 distinct types of landing craft. These vessels were to support the amphibious assault strategy to gain a foothold on German and Japanese occupied areas. The construction of Navy ships between 1940 and 1943 resulted in 465 LCTs in the Navy inventory. The average age of the young Sailors on these LCTs

was 18 and they were led by 21-year-old Ensign officers-in-charge. The cost of building all 15,000-plus ships in 1940's dollar, in only three short years, was approximately \$5.3 billion. By contrast, the aircraft carrier USS George H.W. Bush (CVN 77), delivered in 2009 after eight years of construction, cost more than \$6 billion. In 2010, the Navy inventory of ships is 286 vessels and the Navy maintains 3700-plus aircraft in service.

The wartime contributions

of the Landing Craft (Tank) and her assigned crews were instrumental to the war effort and the ultimate victory of the United States in 1945. Captain and Julie Bush expressed their deep appreciation for the contributions of the Sailors of the LCT Flotillas of World War II and were honored to have been invited to speak with them at their annual reunion.

A 'Day To Remember' For Vicksburg Crew

During USS Vicksburg's recent port visit to Brest, France, the crew took a day to observe and remember the heroes of D Day.

The idea came about when the ship was originally scheduled to visit Cherbourg, France and a member of the crew wanted to reenlist on the beaches of Normandy. What started as one Sailor's desire to reenlist in this historic location grew to nine Sailors, as well as an additional 80 members of the crew to participate in the Color Guard and Honor Guard and support their shipmates.

After a 5-hour bus ride, the crew arrived at Omaha Beach and were greeted with warm smiles from the friendly staff at the Normandy national historic monument. Following completion of lunch, provided by the staff, members quickly fell into place for the ceremony.

The re-enlistment began with an introduction by Vicksburg's Executive Officer, Cmdr. Joseph Thomas, and by the parading of the colors by the ship's Color Guard.

After an invocation by Senior Chief Information Systems Technician (SW) Daniell Jackson, Thomas introduced Vicksburg's Commanding Officer, Capt. Timothy Mahan. Entering from the rear of the memorial and proceeding to the front, Mahan stopped a few paces short of the nine re-enlistees and asked them to raise their right hand as he recited the Oath of Enlistment.

After each member reenlisted, a wreath was passed from the junior Sailor all the way to the most senior Sailor, Command Master Chief (SW) William Powell, who was joined by Mahan as they marched up to the center of the memorial to lay the wreath.

Following the wreath presentation, the Honor Guard fired a 21-gun salute in honor of the fallen heroes and the ceremony closed with the playing of Taps. Flags were then hoisted for the re-enlisting Sailors and a guided tour was provided by the staff.

When asked how he felt about the overall experience, Information Systems Technician 2nd Class (SW) Alan Lawley responded, "It was a great honor and a privilege to re-enlist where so many of our fore-fathers gave their lives. It was definitely a humbling experience and something I'll never forget."

Before boarding the bus to Utah Beach, Mahan took a minute to thank the staff and pre-

sented them with a plaque to show his appreciation.

On the way to Utah Beach, a staff member onboard each bus provided a narrated tour to the crew, pointing out numerous structures and landmarks, many of them still intact from World War II.

Boatswain Mate Seaman (SW) Ryan Perry was asked what he liked most about the visit and stated, "It was a true honor and privilege to visit the location of the largest invasion in history. To do so on my birthday has made this a day I will never forget."

At Utah Beach, Mahan was joined by the Mayor of St. Marie, the first city liberated by the Allies, to lay a wreath at the memorial for all Naval forces.

The privilege of visiting one of the Armed Forces most sacred historical sites is something no one present will ever forget. Coupled with the ability to re-enlist in the shadows of these fallen heroes, to swear a commitment to upholding freedom and democracy, is the greatest honor a Sailor could ever imagine.

Region Southeast Raises Sexual Assault Awareness

Commander, Navy Region Southeast underscored the region's initiatives against sexual assault by signing a Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) proclamation Apr. 15. Rear Adm. Townsend "Tim" Alexander signed the proclamation while the Region's Executive Director Bruce Cwalina and nine members of the Southeast Region's

family readiness program looked on.

"This proclamation is a springboard for education and awareness," said Alexander. "Effort from every individual is necessary to ensure safety and quality of life for our shipmates and in our communities. Sexual assault is an affront to mission readiness because it undermines the health and dignity of individuals. The well-being of the Navy is dependent upon the well-being of its people. I urge

all personnel to reach out to victims, learn more about this crime, speak out against it, and intervene to prevent it."

According to Commander, Navy Installations Command, the Navy recorded approximately 600 reports of sexual assault in fiscal year 2009. A sexual assault is an attack that can reverberate throughout a unit and beyond, degrading readiness by harming the life of the victim and the ability of a unit to work effectively as a

team.

"This is a pivotal time in Navy history surrounding sexual assault awareness and prevention, with the highest level of attention from Navy leadership on the issue that I have seen in my 10 years experience


working for the Navy," said Julie Mooney, Southeast Region credentialing and programs manager. "Leadership and those on the front lines working in sexual assault prevention and response have called for a culture change within the Navy

where sexual intimidation, harassment and assault are not tolerated."

Alexander's proclamation echoes the Department of Defense 2010 SAAM theme of "Hurts one. Affects all."

Lawn Mower Maintenance Keeps Grass Cutting Easy

Spring is definitely here and the sound of lawn mowers is present throughout all of our neighborhoods. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), there has been a steady decline in the average number of gasoline fires in homes each year since 1980 when there were 15,000 fires. Other NFPA Facts and Figures:

Between 2003-2006, municipal fire department responded to an estimated 2400 gasoline structure fire in U.S. homes, annually. These fires resulted in 110 civilian deaths, 313 civilian injuries and \$105.9 million in direct property damage.

Forty-nine percent of home gasoline structure fires each year between 2003-2006 were categorized as intentional. Almost three-quarters of civilian injuries resulted from unintentional causes.

Fuel spills or releases; using gasoline to kindle fire, and gasoline too close to a heat source; were the leading factors contributing to ignition in home gasoline structure fires.

Spark ember or flame from operating equipment was the most common ignition source in home gasoline structure fires, followed by matches and lighters.

Follow these safety tips to help make your spring and summer safe:

- Keep gasoline out of children's sight and reach; children should never handle gasoline.
- If fire does start while handling gasoline, do not attempt to extinguish the fire or stop the



flow of gasoline; leave the area immediately and call for help.

- Do not use or store gasoline near possible ignition sources (i.e., electrical devices, oil- or gas-fired appliances, or any other device that contains a pilot flame or a spark).

- Store gasoline outside the home (i.e., in a garage or lawn shed) in a tightly closed metal or plastic container approved by an independent testing laboratory or the local or state fire authorities. NEVER store gasoline in glass containers or non-reusable plastic containers (i.e., milk jugs).

- Store only enough gasoline necessary to power equipment

and let machinery cool before refueling it.

- Never use gasoline inside the home or as a cleaning agent.

- Clean up spills promptly and discard clean-up materials properly.

- Do not smoke when handling gasoline.

- Never use gasoline in place of kerosene.

- Only fill portable gasoline containers outdoors. Place the container on the ground before filling and never fill containers inside a vehicle or in the bed of a pick-up truck.

- Place lawn mower on a level surface and allow to cool down before refueling.

Spring Cleaning Essential

A thorough spring cleaning can do much more than simply give the good feeling of having a clean house. If done properly, spring cleaning can also drastically improve the safety of your home and family in the event of a fire.

One of the most important ways that cleaning around the house can improve safety is if you spend the time to reduce the clutter inside and around your home and garage. While clutter does not start fires, it can become the fuel for a fire. More fuel makes fires more difficult for the fire department to extinguish. Clutter may also make it more difficult for those in your home to escape when a fire

breaks out.

Start by taking a few minutes to plan your safety clean up day. You will want to check each room in your house, including the attic and basement. Also, don't forget the garage, yard and storage shed.

Another important step in the spring cleaning process is to reduce or eliminate hazardous chemicals in your home. Cleaners, paint and other common household chemicals can fuel a fire and are often hazardous to your health. Maintain only the amounts you need and be sure to use, store and dispose of household hazardous materials in a safe manner as outlined on the product. Never mix chemicals, even when disposing

of them.

Pay particular attention to lint build-up in clothes dryer vents and in the exhaust ducts. Lint build-up blocks the flow of air, causing excessive heat which can result in fires.

Now is a great time to make sure your smoke alarms are in working order and to review your home escape plan so that if in the event of a fire, everyone in your household knows how to get out quickly and safely.
