Sailors are reminded to update records regularly

Navy Personnel Command (NPC) is reminding Sailors to review their records before selection boards, using NPC's Early Warning System that can rescue a promotion opportunity.

The Early Warning System can be used one week before the selection board's convening date. However, Sailors should be reviewing their records at least six months prior to this date.

Board recorders will arrive to review the records of promotion-eligible Sailors one week before the selection board convenes. It's not the responsibility of the recorders to interpret records; they only verify continuity and completeness of records.

Missing officer and enlisted evaluations will be noted at https://www.npc.navy.mil/Apps/SB_Discrepancy_list/.

During this timeframe, a member may visit the site and enter his or her social security number to see if a record discrepancy is noted.

Discrepancies will be displayed along with a note giving the definition and guidance on submitting corrections.

The servicemember is then responsible for quickly correcting these errors.

While the online discrepancy

check is a good last-minute insurance against missing items, a comprehensive record scrub six months in advance is essential.

Six months out, the servicemember should visit the BUPERS OnLine (BOL) Web site and order their official military personnel file. Next, the performance summary record (PSR) and enlisted summary record (ESR) or officer data card (ODC) should be checked and verified.

Updates and corrections to these can be made by following the directions on BOL. When checking records six months out service members should submit corrections to PERS-312.

If a selection board is about to convene service members must send missing information via letter to the board president. Your letter should be sent by mail or fax to the NPC Customer Service Center (CSC) https://ahdsedstws16.ahf.nmci.navy.mil/OA_HTML/npc.html. This information must be received at least one day prior to the starting date of the board.

No one other than individuals being considered may submit information directly to a board. Information sent to the board will only be used during the board and will not be changed in your permanent record.

Officers and enlisted members who served as individual augmentees (IA) should ensure their official records reflect this service. NAVAD MIN 273/06 and NAVADMIN 300/06 give information on advancement points, Navy enlisted classifications and additional qualification designations given for IA service.

Officers and enlisted members are strongly encouraged to call the NPC Customer Ser-

vice Center at 1-866-U ASK NPC (1-866-827-5672) or DSN 882-5672 to confirm receipt of their package for statutory promotion selection boards. They may also check the Customer Service Web-site online using the CSC link on the NPC homepage: https://ahdsedstws16.ahf.nmci.navy.mil/OA_HTML/jtflogin.jsp.

Here is a board preparation checklist that can be used to make sure your records are up to date. BUPERS Online (<https://www.bol.navy.mil>) is your main tool for board preparation and helps you to be proactive in making the most of your promotion opportunity.

— Check your PSR and ESR or ODC on <https://www.bol.navy.mil> click on "ODC, OSR, PSR, ESR"

Speaking about sports officials, someone once said, "It's the only occupation where a man has to be perfect on opening day and improve as the season goes on."



Giant 'devil' ray spotted in the bay

When a person spends most of their time in and around the water, they might just stumble upon something they've never seen up close and personal before.

For one local recreational diver a recent chance encounter took her completely by surprise. She came across a 12-foot-Manta Ray near Hospital Cay recently.

"I first thought it was a dolphin until I got a little closer," said Beverly Cairo. It was the biggest thing I've ever seen in the water here," she added.

The giant Manta Ray scientifically called a "Manta Birostris" has gone through many names throughout history. Names may include Devilfish, giant Atlantic manta, Prince Alfred's Ray, sea devil, skeete to name just a few. The giant manta normally inhabits temperate, tropical, and subtropical waters worldwide, between 35° N and 35° S latitudes. In the western Atlantic Ocean, this includes South Carolina south to Brazil and Bermuda. Occasionally this ray is observed as far north as New

Jersey and San Diego. Other locations include the east coast of Africa, in the Gulf of Aden, Red Sea, Arabian Sea, the Bay of Bengal, as well as the Indo-Pacific.

Manta Rays sometimes swim in loose groups and spend considerable time near the surface. Some sightings of Mantas have been observed jumping clear out of the water and returning with a splash.

According to the Florida Museum of Natural History, adult rays are easily recognized by their large triangular pectoral fins and projecting cephalic fins, forward extensions of the pectoral fins that project anteriorly on either side of the head. Each cephalic fin is about twice as long as its base is wide. The length of each cephalic lobe, from tip to the mouth, is 14 percent of the disc width. They are rolled like spirals when swimming and flattened when eating.

The ray seen in Guantanamo Bay had smooth skin, a broad, rectangular terminal mouth located at the front of the head, and a tail that lacks a spine.

Males reach maturity at a disc width of at least 13 feet, while females mature at a disc width of 16.5 feet. Local fishermen say sightings like this are not rare, but for someone to see this massive creature for the first time, it can be an extremely rewarding experience.

"It was an amazing site," said Cairo. "I have never seen anything glide through the water with such power," she added.

Dive tourism has benefited

greatly from the manta in locations where they are reliably encountered and sometimes approach divers. In these areas, where divers often touch and interact with mantas, the rays can develop skin lesions in response to the removal of the protective mucous layer.

"We followed it for hours, but decided not to enter the water, mainly because we weren't sure if it was dangerous," said Cairo.

Pass on financial wisdom to children

Every day our children are inundated with ads in magazines and on TV that entice them to buy the latest fad. Most parents go into debt to get these items because we want our children to be happy.

But what values are we teaching our kids when we subscribe to the notion that we are unfulfilled unless we have the latest "hot item"?

Are you setting your children up for future financial disaster? Are you teaching them that it's okay to spend more than you can afford?

How do you encourage your children to become savers?

Here are some ideas:

— Begin by teaching your children money management skills: the fundamentals of debt, earning, spending, and saving money.

— Teach your children the purpose of money: to provide food, shelter, and clothing.

— Explain to your children the importance of employment. Your children need to know that you work so that you can provide for them. Explain that if you didn't work, you couldn't

provide for your family.

— It's imperative that you teach your child to be a savvy consumer. Grocery shopping offers an opportunity to demonstrate this.

When your child asks for the cereal they see on TV, grab the comparable store brand. Ask your child if it makes sense to spend more money on the name-brand cereal when you can get the same type with the generic brand. Let them know that advertisers just want their money and don't care about their health. Do this on a regular basis and your children will learn frugality.

Saving money is important because we don't know what the future holds. We prepare for the unknown by putting money aside. We save money to accomplish our goals and dreams.

Use examples children can relate to — if your child wants a bike, make him or her save for it.

How to Teach Kids to Save:

— Start small. Have your kids drop their extra change in a jar. Open a bank account when it totals \$50.

— Involve your children in the process of saving for college.

— Be a role model. Don't be materialistic, pay yourself first, and avoid debt. Your children will follow your lead, especially if you talk to them about what you're doing.

— Teach them the difference between "I need" and "I want."

— Offer to match what your kids save.

If he or she is saving for that bike, this will encourage them.


