NAVSTA receives 'Golden Anchor' award

Naval Station Guantanamo Bay was recently awarded the 'Golden Anchor' award for outstanding Navy retention during fiscal year 2006. The Golden Anchor' also known as the 'Retention Excellence Award,' recognizes commands that meet or exceed retention goals in the Navy. GTMO surpassed these goals and objectives for the second year in a row.

GTMO's career counselors attained these impressive results through a variety of career management tools and incentives.

According to NCC Jon Monteleone, NAVSTA's Command Career Counselor, "Good retention is the end result effects-based decision making and sound leadership. Every leader on this base plays a role in our retention numbers. We have a solid Command Retention Team that is properly trained and on the deckplates working side-by-side with our Sailors."

Recent ARGUS surveys have shown that Sailors are more likely to reenlist when they are performing in clearly defined missions, in this case, the Global War on Terrorism.

"Monetary incentives play a part in a Sailor's decision to stay in the Navy, but it has always been about being involved with something meaningful, appropriate and clearly defined goals," states Monteleone. "Sailors like to be a part of something important, and that's what serving in the Navy is all about. They are making a difference in our world."

"Sailors have many different reasons for staying in the Navy," said, CMDCM(SW/SS) Larry Cairo, NAVSTA Command Master Chief, "but we all have one common goal, to be successful. The Navy provides us the tools to be successful, both in and out of the Navy."

A 'real opportunity' to make a real difference

Editor's note: As part of a continuing effort to promote Lean Six Sigma, Rear Adm. Mark S. Boensel provides the last of a three-part series on the subject with his personal thoughts and opinions.

Have you seen any preliminary "success stories" that struck you?

What can EVERY CNRSE employee do to ensure the success of LSS?

Rear Adm. Boensel: "Lean Six Sigma is a real opportunity to make a real difference all across Navy Region Southeast. Make the effort to understand LSS conceptually.

"Most of all, it is important to remain open to new ideas and go through the process in good faith. My message: keep an open mind and embrace it.

"LSS gives everyone in the organization the opportunity to contribute in a really big way. We need that!

"We all have thought, 'I wish I had the opportunity to tell someone, "I know a better way to do it!" Here is just that opportunity!

"Leadership is looking for those ideas - your ideas! And so feel free to give them to us. We will put them through the rigors of the process – and I'm sure we'll find a lot of them are exactly on target. But even

if we find that they aren't, that's ok too, because we had the opportunity to explore that avenue and determine its value."

What gets you the most excited about LSS?

Rear Adm. Boensel:

"I think the most exciting thing operates on a couple of different levels.

"First, for mission accomplishment on the organizational level, it is tremendously exciting to have the opportunity to make quantum leaps in how we do business.

"Secondly, it is an opportunity for each individual to get involved in making an institutional level of change. From the individual perspective, it's an open invitation to really get involved in the way we do business and make changes in the way we do business.

"In both cases if I had to

sum up LSS in one word it would be 'opportunity.' There's a tremendous opportunity to make significant organizational change through individual contribution."

"Keep an open mind. In addition to keeping an open mind, go beyond embracing LSS to lean forward and push the process along. Be aggressive about implementing LSS. Become a part of it. Defeat the temptation to just sit back and just watch — you could miss a really enjoyable experience, because we're looking for people to step out. Take some risk — be forward thinking be forward leaning. In my mind there are no penalty points for being forward leaning -if we don't get it \ right the first time, ok, we'll tweak it and we'll press on.

"And we'll keep pressing on till we get it!"

MyPay new security feature offers protection

Department of Defense Finance and Accounting Services

MyPay officials announced today another new security feature has been added to protect customers' data on the pay account system. As part of an on-going commitment to

strengthen password and account security to protect customers' data, Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) has implemented the "virtual keyboard" to assist in

protecting against malicious software such as spyware, trojans and keylogging.

The virtual keyboard is available beginning mid-May. Each time a user arrives at MyPay to log on, the virtual keyboard will appear on the screen. The user will type in their LoginID and then the user will "press" the keys on the screen by clicking on them with their mouse to enter their Personal Identification Number (PIN) instead of typing the actual keys. The virtual keyboard is to be used only for the user's PIN.

To enhance security, the keyboard layout changes or keys are displayed randomly every time the page is re-

"This is a significant move toward adding yet another layer of security to our MyPay system," said Pat Shine, director of operations for DFAS. "We want to reassure our customers that we are proactively working to secure their pay account information.

"DFAS uses a variety of security features to protect your data on the MyPay system, yet we ask that customers do everything they can to protect data from being compromised or captured on home computers."

Under frequently asked question on the myPay homepage (https://mypay

Navy Nurse Corps marks 99 years

The Navy Nurses Corps (NNC) celebrated 99 years of service, May 10.

Approximately 40 Sailors, DoD civilians, and other invited guests gathered at the Guantanamo Bay Hospital quarterdeck to honor the Navy's primary caregivers.

According to the Wikipedia website, the NNC was established in 1908 and consisted of 20 women known as the "the sacred twenty." They were the first women to serve formally as members of the Navy.

Today, the NNC is more diverse and consists of male and female officers of the rank of Ensign and higher.

"While I was an instructor at Explosive Ordinance Disposal school in 1997, my wife became disabled," said, Lt. Frederick Huss, Emergency Room department head, "I had to do a lot of nursing-type care with her, and I enjoyed it, so it inspired me to become a Navy Nurse."

The NNC is a force of 3,000 active-duty and 2,000 reserve nurses equipped to use their medical skills in support of their fellow Sailors and Marines worldwide. These nurses are vital to military medicine and integral in the military healthcare system.

"[We] are the glue of the hospital. We make sure patients get complete care through the end. We look at the

big picture," said Lt. Michele Dobson, Primary Care department head.

In order to sustain operational readiness at all times, the NNC and the entire hospital staff must stay current with the ever changing theoretic and practical requirements of the field.

"We provide important training to our staff and corpsmen which helps strengthen our force here and abroad, so that we may provide high quality care to both military and civilians," said Huss.

"As a corpsman, we rely on nurses for their skill and ability to teach us," said HM2 Travis Gann, pharmacy department assistant leading petty officer. "The nurses at Naval Hospital Guantanamo Bay exemplify the NNC values in all of their everyday dealings."

To Login to MyPay using the Virtual Keyboard: (1) Type LoginID under Account Access on the homepage; (2) Next, click on the numbers and letters (if using a restricted access PIN) of your PIN using the mouse and virtual keyboard on the screen. (Each number and/or letter will appear as an asterisk in the textbox above the virtual keyboard), (3) When finished, click the "GO" button. Once in MyPay users will continue to navigate as usual.
