## GTMO responds to medical emergency

Guantanamo Bay officials responded to a medical emergency Oct. 24 that originated onboard a Columbian patrol vessel enroute to its homeport.

*ARC Valle del Cauca* (PO-44) received diplomatic clearance to enter Naval Station (NAVSTA) Guantanamo Bay (GTMO) with its emergency.

Naval Hospital Guantanamo, NAVSTA Port Services and GTMO Fire, Crash and Rescue Department personnel were standing by at about 4 p.m. when the Columbian ship arrived at the pier with a 38-year-old male Sailor with a traumatic back injury.

The Sailor, who had previous back prob-

lems, fell down a ladderwell while the ship was transiting the Caribbean.

The ship had just completed a visit to Baltimore, Md. and was heading back to South America when the incident occurred.

# MCPON: New Maritime Strategy will guide Sailors

Sailors will be called upon to build and strengthen relationships with regional partners on a personal level as part of the new maritime strategy plan set forth by the Chief of Naval Operations (CNO), said Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON) (SW/FMF) Joe Campa Jr., during a breakfast held at Naval Support Activity Bahrain.

"Our blue jacket Sailors will be engaging our allies, working side-by-side with them, to grow partnerships and help our regional friends whenever possible," Campa said. "The future of our Navy will be built on the hard work of today's en-

listed Sailor."

Among the priorities outlined by CNO in the maritime strategy is a renewed commitment to help developing nations build maritime capacity. Sailors, Marines and Coastguardsmen will be deployed in mobile "force packages" around the world to promote closer cooperation with maritime forces in other nations.

Working alongside foreign navies, who may observe different customs and speak a different language, will be a challenge for Sailors, but Campa says they're up for the task.

"The Navy has always given its Sailors

difficult missions, and Sailors have risen time after time to the challenge," Campa said.

Roughead and Campa are traveling through the U.S. Fifth Fleet area of responsibility to give the new CNO an opportunity to meet Sailors and Marines serving here first-hand.

"This is a dynamic part of the world," Campa said. "The CNO wants to shake hands with as many of the Sailors and Marines serving here as he can."

## Local school's namesake to be commissioned

The Navy's guided missile destroyer *USS Sampson* will be commissioned in Boston Nov. 3.

The ceremony for the *Sampson*, built at the Bath Iron Works in Maine, will be held at the Massport Black Falcon Cruise Terminal.

The *Sampson* is equipped with the Aegis Combat System, which Navy officials said is the most advanced computerized defense system in the world. It includes a rapid-fire 5-inch, 62-caliber gun and Tomahawk cruise missiles.

The ship, 511 feet long and 66 feet wide, will have a crew of 25 officers and 250 enlisted men.

It displaces 9,200 tons and has a top speed of more than 30 knots. It will be the fourth Navy ship to be named after Rear Adm. William T. Sampson, who destroyed and captured a Spanish fleet in 1898, and the fourth *Sampson* commissioned in Boston.

William T. Sampson was the Commander of the U.S. blockading and North Atlantic squad-

rons during the Spanish-American War of 1898. Prior to the war, he served in a variety of assignments and rose to rank of Captain by 1890 and later became a Rear Admiral.

He was appointed president of the U.S.S. Maine Court of Inquiry, the group that was responsible for the investigation of the incident in Havana harbor.

During the war with Spain, *Sampson* was in charge of the North Atlantic and conducted the blockade of Cuba. *Sampson* himself was not

present at the battle when the ships under his command destroyed the Spanish vessels of Admiral Cervera as they attempted to escape from the Harbor of Santiago.

In nearby Puerto Rico, *Sampson* commanded the blockade and bombardment of the San Juan Harbor.

*Sampson* became commandant of the Boston Navy Yard in 1899 near the end of his career.

The ship's home port will be in San Diego, Calif. Its captain will be Cmdr. Philip Roos.

Valle del Cauca had one corpsman onboard so the skipper, Capt. Louise Borrero, made a decision to transport the wounded Sailor to NAVSTA GTMO, where he could receive proper medical attention.

After the ship arrived, its captain decided to wait until the Sailor was medically evaluated before heading back to sea.

“We will wait until the medical evaluation is complete and make a decision on whether we leave the sailor here,” said Borrero.

Personnel from the Naval Hospital Guantanamo and the GTMO Fire, Crash and Rescue Department reached the injured Sailor on the deck of Valle del Cauca, just moments after it arrived.

According to a Guantanamo Bay Fire, Crash and Rescue Department spokesman, the man was laying in a prone position when they arrived.

“His chief complaint was that he had lower back pain. The patient was resting in the most comfortable position to relieve his lower back pain.”

Boatswain's Mate 2nd Class Jefferson Cevallos from the GTMO port services department communicated with the Spanish speaking crew members once they arrived.

“In any case with a back or neck injury it is always difficult to move a patient regardless of the environment they are in, said the Fire Department spokesman. “In this case it was extremely difficult due to the tight space of the ship and the severity of pain the patient was in.” Due to the pain the patient was in and his prior medical treatment, this certainly was an emergency that could not be delayed due to the time of travel to their next destination.”


Firefighters secured the Sailor to a Stokes basket stretcher and carefully brought the Sailor out of the small space, up one deck and around to the brow. They were extremely careful while walking across the brow down to the waiting ambulance and other medical personnel.

“He has been resting comfortably, and we’ll have an officer stay behind if the Sailor needs to stay a few days or until he’s ready to be flown out. We’ll have to wait and see what happens,” said Borrero.

## DIVING SAFETY NOTICE



IAW NAVBASEGTMOINST 1711.1, Recreational divers are required to notify Port Control upon completion of their dives. Divers who fail to notify Port Control within one hour of their projected completion time will have diving privileges immediately suspended pending a review of the incident. Divers unable to reach Port Control (busy line) within 30 minutes of completion should immediately notify the NAVSTA CDO at 84405. The standard suspension for failure to “call-out” a dive is 30 days (barring any additional violations). FMI call NDC(DSW) Castilla / Harbor Magistrate at 4444.


The best female costume contest winner was Mass Communication Specialist Seaman Kellie Bliss from The Naval Media Center.

From hundreds of promising nominees, officials have narrowed the field to 14 finalists in the following five categories:

— **The Effort Award:** Presented for providing outstanding support and comfort to troops, and enhancing their morale and personal welfare. The recipient inspires other groups or individuals to create new and

unique ways to show their support of the troops through widely influential guidance or mentorship.

— **Medical Attention Award:** Presented for providing superior medical attention to the wounded and injured. The recipient makes a broad impact across multiple communities, providing guidance, mentorship and resources to better the lives of the wounded. He or she inspires others to enhance their own support.

— **Promotion and Success Award:** Presented for outstanding impact and success in generating promotional support for the USO. The recipient provides selfless commitment to promote and create awareness of the USO, and helps enhance the morale and personal welfare of troops.

— **Every Day Difference Award:** Presented to someone who makes a difference in a seemingly small, but significant

way to improve servicemembers' quality of life. The recipient is an unsung hero who makes the most of personal, non-financial, resources to positively affect servicemembers' basic needs or way of life.

— **Youth Leadership Award:** Presented to a youth leader — ages 17 or younger — who champions and represents outstanding troop support.

The recipient organizes self-generated or motivated individuals or groups that provide genuine support to the troops, and shows his or her troop support through innovative and unique ways.

# Creature Feature: Cuban Trogon



The Cuban Trogon (*Priotelus temnurus*) is a member of a tropical family of birds related to roadrunners. This bird is a Cuban endemic [found only in Cuba] and is the national bird of Cuba.

Cuban Trogons are brightly colored with a red belly, whitish chest and throat, green back, blue on the top of the head, and a long tail. They have a distinct posture when perched and, when combined with the brilliant colors, their identification is easy. There are not any other birds in Cuba which could be mistaken for a Cuban Trogon.

The Cuban Trogon is also known by other local names such as Toco-ro-ro, Toroloco, and Tocoloro, names which are descriptive of the bird's song. Ancestral Cubans called this bird Guatini, a name it is still known by in many of the Eastern provinces.

Cuban Trogons are widely distributed throughout Cuba. They occupy tropical rain forests, pine forests, and dry forests at

all altitudes and are quite common in certain areas. They are usually found in pairs, perched in the shade, high in a tree and are

relatively immobile.

They are strictly arboreal (confined to trees) and remain perched for extended periods of time. Their flight consists of short bursts, usually in pursuit of food such as insects, fruits, and buds. Insects are sometimes taken in mid-air but often are taken off the foliage of the tree. Trogons are considered weak flyers although they can hover while feeding.

Cuban Trogons nest in abandoned woodpecker cavities or other holes in trees. They breed primarily from May to August and lay three to four eggs per clutch.

Trogon are considered the most beautifully colored bird in Cuba.

This is the national bird of Cuba for two reasons. First, it dies almost instantly if taken into captivity and this is considered symbolic of the Cuban people and their resistance to captivity. Second, the brightly colored bird contains the colors of the Cuban flag.


