USNH Cares for American Victims of Haiti Earthquake

Nine injured Americans arrived at U.S. Naval Hospital Guantanamo Bay, Cuba at approximately 10:37 a.m. and 4 p.m., Jan. 13 from the U.S. Embassy in Port-au-Prince, Haiti to receive medical care for traumatic injuries suffered in the earthquake that struck the region Jan. 12.

The patients included one active-duty U.S. Army lieutenant colonel, one active-duty U.S. Army staff sergeant, one female U.S. foreign service employee and six private U.S. citizens.

"The key role [of the hospital] was to offer immediate stabilization for incoming casualties," said Navy Capt. Monty Bible, the U.S. Naval Hospital commanding officer. "We didn't know what [injuries] we would receive until they got here."

Victims were evaluated, stabilized, treated and prepped for medevac by hospital personnel. All nine were flown by fixed-wing aircraft to Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami, Fla.

The victims' care was monitored by the U.S. Naval Hospital commanding and executive officers to evaluate the

hospital's emergency response.

"We had approximately 110 folks that were directly involved," said Bible. "We practice for this routinely. The people that were engaged in the direct care... they prepare for this, so we flex our manpower."

Bible said all hospital personnel were trained to respond to an emergency of this magnitude.


"This is our mission," Bible said. "Our mission is to take care of folks in the Caribbean."

The naval station responded and supported humanitarian and disaster relief operations through the hospital and its other resources, including the Leeward airfield, which supported aircraft from Naval Air Station Key West and Carrier Strike Group One.

VITA: Vital to GTMO

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program's doors are scheduled to open Jan. 19 at the Navy Legal Service Office located in building 760.

The service is free to active-duty, retired and dependent military personnel and Department of Defense civilian personnel.

The program helped more than 600 servicemembers last year including some who chose to file their taxes online.

"Last year, we had folks that did their taxes online and still came into the legal

office to ask us questions," said Legalman 2nd Class Sarah Kelly-Alston, a VITA program coordinator.

Unaccompanied, married servicemembers need to issue a power of attorney to, or obtain a power of attorney from, their spouse in order to file taxes jointly.

The NLSO can draw up power of attorney paperwork, Kelly-Alston said.

The volunteers are certified by the IRS in basic, intermediate and military income tax filing.

MLK's Legacy Marches On

Members of the Guantanamo Bay community will celebrate famed civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s 81st birthday with several events around the base.

In honor of King, the Guantanamo Bay Black Heritage Organization plans to hold a march re-enactment Jan. 18 at 5 p.m. from the Windjammer Ballroom to the Naval Station Chapel, followed by a ceremony.

"It's a privilege for me to be able to be a part of this," said Tracy Gamble, the organization's president.

Gamble is originally from Alabama, where several civil rights movements took place during the 1960s.

"My grandparents actually marched with Dr. King," Gamble said. "Having a chance to re-enact the things they did in honor of civil rights is very rewarding to me."

Dr. Marcella Casey Cooper, the organization's vice president, has participated in civil rights re-enactments and celebrated the life of King for more than 25 years.

"I have been a part of this for several years to commemorate the achievements of the civil rights [movement] and equality for

all people," Cooper said.

Cooper extended an invitation for the march to all members of the Guantanamo Bay community, including foreign nationals, contractors and children.

When the march concludes at the chapel, a member of the Black Heritage Organization will speak to participants about the accomplishments of Dr. King and the civil rights movement.

Obama Makes Haiti Response Top U.S. Priority

WASHINGTON (NNS) -- President Barack Obama said Jan. 14 he's made helping Haiti in the wake of a crippling earthquake the top priority of every U.S. government agency.

Speaking from the White House, Obama called the quake an unimaginable tragedy and said the United States has launched "a swift, coordinated and aggressive effort" to help.

Flanked by his national security team, the president said the U.S. response will require help from every government agency and the compassion of Americans.

"I've made it clear [to Cabinet officers and government agency heads] that Haiti must be a top priority for their departments and agencies right now," Obama said. "This is one of those moments that call out for American leadership."

American service members are deploying to the area, the president said.

"Several Coast Guard cutters are already there, providing everything from basic services like water to vital technical support for this massive logistical operation," he said. "Elements of the Army's 82nd Airborne Division will arrive today."

The United States also is deploying a Marine expeditionary unit, the aircraft carrier USS Carl Vinson (CVN 70) and the hospital ship USNS Comfort (T-AH-20).

The first waves of the U.S. rescue and relief effort are on the ground and at work, the president said.

"An airlift has been set up to deliver high-priority items like water and medicine," Obama said.

The United States is working closely with the Haitian government, the United Nations and relief organizations to deliver supplies, but it will take some time for supplies, personnel and equipment to arrive in Haiti, he added.

"Right now in Haiti, roads are impassible, the main port is damaged and communications are just beginning to come online, and aftershocks continue," he said. "None of this will seem quick enough, ... but it's important that everyone in Haiti understand that one of the largest relief efforts in our recent history is moving toward Haiti."

The earthquake struck the evening of Jan. 12 near the capital of Port-au-Prince. The magnitude 7.0 quake flattened many areas of the city. Port-au-Prince is one of the largest cities in the Caribbean, and Haitian officials fear that at least 100,000 people may be dead.

American assets are pouring into the country. U.S. search and rescue teams have arrived, and medical personnel and relief supplies are arriving.

In the best of times, Haiti is the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere. The country suffers from extreme poverty, deforestation, a lack of infrastructure and political instability.

Obama pledged not to forsake the people of Haiti in their hour of need.

"American stands with you. The world stands with you," he said. "We know you are a strong and resilient people. You have endured a history of slavery and struggle and natural disaster and recovery. Through it all, your spirit has been unbroken and your faith unwavering. Today, you must know that help is arriving and much more help is on the way."



Top 10 Mistakes People Make in the Gym

1. Not stretching enough. Stretch immediately following an aerobic activity while your muscles are warm and pliable to prevent injuries.
2. Lifting too much weight: Gradual, progressive resistance is far more effective and safe way to increase muscle intensity
3. Not warming up prior to activity: Muscles take time to adjust. Start slowly and gradually increase intensity.
4. Not cooling down after a workout: Take a few minutes to lower your heart rate and stretch your muscles. This improves flexibility and helps recovery.
5. Exercising too intensely: It's more effective to sustain a moderate workout for longer periods of time than to exercise intensely for only a few minutes.
6. Not drinking enough water: Don't wait until you're thirsty to drink water – You're already on your way to dehydration.
7. Leaning heavily on a stair stepper: Leaning on the stair stepper is hard on both the wrists and the back. Lower the intensity so you can maintain good posture while lightly resting your hands on the rails for balance.
8. Not exercising intensely enough: Exercise intensely enough to work up a light sweat and get your heart beating in your training zone.
9. Jerking while lifting weights: This can lead to strain and injury, with the muscles of the back being particularly vulnerable. Control the weight, don't let it control you.
10. Consuming energy bars and sports drinks during moderate workouts: Unless you're working out for longer than two hours per day, you don't need to supplement with high-energy bars and drinks. (High-energy is often a code word for high-calorie.)

Two New Navy Working Uniforms Announced

WASHINGTON (NNS) -- Two new Navy Working Uniforms (NWU) will hit the fleet in fiscal year 2011.

The first, NWU Type II, a desert digital camouflage uniform of four colors with the anchor, Constitution and eagle (ACE) logo embedded in the print, will be worn by special warfare operators and Sailors who support them during deployment and deployment training exercises.

"The desert camouflage uniform is not going away," said Capt. Vince Drouillard, branch head within Navy's personnel, plans and policy division. "Sailors, other than Navy special warfare operators and supporting Sailors, will continue to wear the current tricolor desert camouflage utility uniform in desert environments when issued by authorizing commands."

The second, NWU Type III, is a woodland digital camouflage uniform which also has four colors and the ACE logo embedded in the print. It will be the standard camouflage uniform worn in non-desert environments and stateside.

Both uniforms, announced in NAVADMIN 374/09, are organizational clothing provided to Sailors by commands authorized to issue them.

The unisex uniforms will begin conformance testing to validate design, fit and wear later in fiscal year 2010. Fleet implementation is expected to begin in late 2011 with deploying combat and direct command support commands and units receiving priority in the distribution process.

Both new uniforms have an authorized matching pattern Gortex parka with a removable fleece liner. Sailors can get complete information on the new NWU Type II and Type III uniforms in NAVADMIN 374/09 available at www.npc.navy.mil.


