Solar power helps energize Guantanamo Bay

GUANTANAMO BAY, Cuba—Last year, Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus announced five energy targets that would help to ensure at least 40 percent of the Navy’s total energy consumption comes from alternative sources.

One of those targets is to produce at least half the shore-based energy requirements from renewable sources, such as solar, wind and ocean generated by naval installations by 2015.

When it comes to producing the base’s electricity, Naval Station Guantanamo Bay Cuba is self-sufficient because the United States has no diplomatic relationship with the Cuban government.

Most of GTMO’s electricity is produced by conventional diesel generators; however, solar technology is used to power various systems around the base.

“Currently we use solar power for security lighting at the Expeditionary Legal Complex, the base-wide public announcement system and the cathode protection for the

cross bay fuel and water lines,” said Tim Wagoner, the GTMO Resource Efficiency Manager. “There is also a solar hot water system on the enlisted barracks for the U.S. Naval Hospital.”

The advantage of using solar energy is reduced pollution.

“Since sunlight is your fuel source, the only time you run out is if the sun isn’t shining, which at GTMO isn’t very often,” said Wagoner.

The base has seen monetary and electrical grid benefit from the use of solar technology.

“Currently the base saves approximately 200,000 kilowatt hours of electricity through the use of solar power,” said Wagoner, “this saves \$61,290 and 15,385 gallons of diesel fuel (annually).”

There are two types of solar power technology currently used at GTMO. One type uses the sun’s radiation to heat a liquid.

“The collectors concentrate the sun’s radiation using

Columbia College provides students options

In addition to online courses, the college offers students in-seat classes

Guantanamo Bay residents interested in continuing their education have many options available to them despite being located at an isolated base in the Caribbean.

Students are able to attend classes in an online environment with many colleges located in the states.

Columbia College, the only on-site college located at the naval installation, offers students the opportunity to attend college in person or take its online courses. They offer associate, bachelor's and master degrees.

For residents contemplating attending school, the college will evaluate their school transcripts to determine the number of credits that can be transferred to Columbia College and to develop a degree plan for earning a diploma.

"We meet with students to evaluate their previous educational history, academic transcripts from other colleges, and military transcripts if they are active duty," said Michael Matheny, Director for Columbia College, Guantanamo Bay Campus.

Residents interested in having their past course work evaluated do not have to be a registered Columbia College student for this service.

"Anyone can schedule an advising appointment for an unofficial evaluation," said Annie Stuart, an Enrollment Assistant at the Guantanamo Bay campus. "To get a formal evaluation, you have to be a student."

For many students, physically attending classes with others is preferable to taking online courses.

"It offers yet another way for students to learn," Matheny said. "There are several different learning styles and we frequently hear from the students who look for and seek out the in-seat classes."

For students beginning college after high school or others who are returning to college after a period of time, in-seat classes can help ease them into the online learning environment.

"It gives them the college and classroom experience and helps them connect with the teacher and the other students," said Stuart. "It helps students jumpstart their education because it gets them interested in a subject and they are able to continue with online classes as well."

For upcoming semesters, Columbia College will be

introducing in-seat courses that have not been held before at the GTMO campus.

The college is offering a Spanish course that will begin in August and will also be introducing an environmental science course and a religion course later this year.

According to Stuart, many prospective students worry about having access to information when trying to complete their courses.

"A lot of students are worried about library access when they take classes," said Stuart. "But we have a massive online database of books, journals, and catalogues, so there is no need to worry about not having a college library right down the street."

Students also have access to the college's computer lab to help complete their courses.

"The lab is intended for people working on their educational pursuits," said Matheny. "It's an educational computer lab for active students."

Although the computer lab is run by Columbia College, any student attending a college is welcome to use it.

"We welcome people from other schools if they would like to do their class work in the computer lab," said Stuart. "It's a nice quiet place to study and is air conditioned."

Although the base is remote, there are still opportunities available for GTMO residents to further their education, according to Matheny.

"I want the community to understand that they have access to a valuable resource here that offers an opportunity to further their education and be productive in that process during their time here in Guantanamo," said Matheny. "Their education does not have to be on hold because they are at a remote place. They still have avenues to access higher education."

mirrors or other shiny material to focus the radiation on pipe,” said Wagoner. “As the pipe heats up, the system begins to produce steam or hot water. The hot water is stored in insulated tank so that ‘it’ is available at night.”

The second type of solar technology is the use of silicon-based photovoltaic cells (PV) that converts the sun’s radiation into electricity.

“Sunlight is converted into electricity using photovoltaics,” said Wagoner. “This is a method of generating electrical power by converting solar radiation into direct current electricity, or indirectly with concentrating solar power (CSP), which normally focuses the sun’s energy to boil water which is then used to provide power.”

In an effort to extract more savings using solar power, the Naval Station is trying to procure larger solar array.

“We are trying to get a 1 megawatt solar array on the Leeward side of the base,” said Wagoner. “The Leeward side of the base only has a 1 megawatt demand so at peak production that side of the base will be totally running on solar power.”

In addition, solar hot water systems are being planned for all barracks buildings, according to Wagoner.

“I would like to see at least 4 megawatts of solar arrays on the base to supplement our diesel power plant and solar roof panels to supplement individual buildings power consumption,” said Wagoner, “Also there would be solar hot water at residential units.”

GTMO Chiefs Refurbish Memorials

Members of the GTMO Chief Petty Officers Association aboard Naval Station Guantanamo Bay began a project to restore memorials and monuments on July 24.

Established in 1903, the Naval Station is the oldest U.S. Navy installation. Throughout its history, various memorials and monuments were erected honoring service members and civilians who served at the base.

Over the years, the GTMO climate degrades the base’s monuments and memorials.

“We thought it would be good to get out,” said Chief Master-at-Arms James L. Lloyd, attached to the NAVSTA GTMO Security Department, “Guantanamo Bay has tropical weather and tropical weather tends to affect things that are out in the open.”

“There are several memorials on the base,” said Lloyd, “We identified a few memorials for Marines who had lost their lives in the line of duty at GTMO. We also identified some memorials of historical significance throughout the base.”

For the CPOA members, the restoration project was very important.

“The CPOA wanted to get the senior enlisted together and show that we care about the base, we care about the past, and to show the community that we are out here as a group to take care of the base and to remember those who came before us,” said Lloyd.

The Chief Petty Officers Association is a social networking organization for senior enlisted service members at GTMO.

“We get together and it is a good forum for us to talk about issues that affect our commands,” Lloyd said. “We talk about professional challenges and how we can solve these issues within the Chief’s Mess. We also figure out how we can affect the base around us. It also gives us the ability to have fun as a group.”

DOD to Resume Restructured Military Spouse Career Program

WASHINGTON (NNS) -- The Department of Defense announced July 20 the resumption of a restructured military spouse career advancement account program - MyCAA, following a comprehensive review.

The program will be available to spouses of service members in the pay grades of E1-E5, W1-W2 and O1-O2 beginning Oct. 25.

“The changes announced today reflect a return to the original intent of the program, which is to help military spouses, with the greatest need, successfully enter, navigate and advance in portable careers,” said Clifford Stanley, undersecretary of defense for personnel and readiness. “We fully support the program and are committed to ensuring the program’s sustainability. To that end, we are making several critical operational changes.”

Amongst these changes, eligible spouses will receive a total of \$4,000 in DoD-funded financial aid, with an annual cap of \$2,000 per fiscal year; funding must be used within a three-year time period from the start date of the first class; and must be used to obtain an associates’ degree, licensure or certification. A waiver may be granted when fees for licensure or certification require an up-front fee greater than \$2,000 and up to the total maximum assistance of \$4,000.


“The MyCAA program popularity grew beyond our expectations and became too expensive to continue. Therefore, we are returning to the original intent of the program in a way that is attainable and fiscally responsible for the Defense Department,” said Stanley. “As we look to the future, we envision a program that is much broader than DoD’s financial assistance component. Military spouses

will be guided along a more holistic approach to career planning.”

Under the long-term program guidelines, career counselors will continue to work with all military spouses to help develop career and education goals and plans and assist them in identifying and accessing available federal education benefits toward these goals.

“Families play a crucial role in supporting our men and women on the battlefield. When service members are confident that their families at home have access to resources and support, they are better able to focus on their mission,” said Stanley. “The Defense Department is committed to investing in military families. When we invest in the well-being of the family, we invest in the well-being of the force.”
