


Storm highlights importance of emergency training, readiness



Tropical Storm Nicole moves over central Cuba Sept. 29. Nicole formed north of South America and caused up to 10 inches of rain for areas 345 miles from its center. Had the storm passed over Guantanamo Bay, the Emergency Operations Center may have been stood up and maintained by the personnel trained in emergency management by the Shore Operations Training Group (SOTG) Sept. 27-30.

Shore Operations Training Group trains base personnel in emergency operations

Tropical Storm Nicole moved northeast at approximately nine miles per hour over Cuba Sept. 27-29 after forming in the south Caribbean Sea. The storm left up to 10 inches of rain on areas up to 345 miles from its center.

“Nicole formed north of South America and was upgraded to a tropical storm in about 48 hours,” said Kevin Robarge, the installation training officer and emergency manager. “We got all of the rain bands from the storm.”

When the Naval Station anticipates destructive winds, the commanding officer stands up its emergency operations center, where representatives from many departments on the base pro-actively observe and assess the base conditions.

“The main focus and our number one objective is to save and protect the people,” said Robarge.

Currently, Robarge is helping the base align its operations with

Tattoo artists bring fresh ink, morale boost to GTMO

Seven tattoo artists visited Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, to design new tattoos and repair or cover old tattoos for service members and civilians Sept. 25-Oct. 1.

Morale, Welfare and Recreation invited the tattoo artists to the island in an effort to improve morale and bring residents a service they do not normally have access to at Guantanamo’s isolated location.

“We’re here to give you your ‘GTMO Ink’ tattoo,” said Kevin Bleifuss, a professional tattoo artist from Port of Worcester Tattoo in Worcester, Mass. “You

can’t really leave a place like this [frequently], so we bring the tattoo to you.”

Bleifuss said he and the other tattoo artists have visited Guantanamo several times. This is the seventh year MWR has invited tattoo artists to the base.

“I couldn’t say ‘no’ to something like this,” said Bleifuss. “I’m one of the only guys who has professionally tattooed in GTMO.”

The tattoo artists completed more than 50 tattoos each during their 10-day stay in GTMO.



Smoke Alarms: *A sound you can live with*

Why is the 2010 Fire Prevention Week theme about smoke alarms this year?

The National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA) is the official organization for Fire Prevention Week. NFPA establishes the theme each year. This year's campaign is designed to educate people about the importance of smoke alarms and encourages everyone to take the steps necessary to update and maintain their home smoke alarm protection.

◆ **Never take the battery** out of your smoke alarm- for the Naval Station community contact housing trouble desk to replace you smoke alarm battery if it is periodically chirping (Which indicates the battery power is low)

◆ **Test the detector monthly** by depressing the test button (if you can do so without standing on furniture)

◆ **When vacuuming**, place the hand held vacuum extension wand up to the detector which help remove dust buildup from the smoke sensor.

For Guantanamo Bay and our unique situation here, it is imperative workers and

residents know how to properly use fire extinguishers. Unlike other communities, if a fire here gets a head start on our firefighters we are not calling in second and third alarms for additional firefighter support, we have Naval Station firefighters and resources and that is it. Quick action by workers and residents using fire extinguishers is essential.

What events are being held this year in honor of Fire Prevention Week?

◆ **Monday, Oct. 4 and Tuesday, Oct. 5:** Firefighters and the Fire Prevention Chief will be at the NEX handing out items with fire safety messages and literature and will be conducting live-fire fire extinguisher training. Don't be shy and walk by without stopping and taking a turn practicing using the fire extinguisher trainer.

◆ **Thursday, Oct. 7: 5:30 to 9 p.m.:** The Guantanamo Bay Fire Department is inviting all base residents to come out and join us for this year's main event which is being held in the parking lot area adjacent to the base library. Many free handouts, live-fire fire extinguisher practice training,

and an aircraft firefighting display using the fire departments Mobil Aircraft Firefighting Trainer. There will also be an unaffiliated hamburger and hot dog stand from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. followed by the Aircraft firefighting display.

◆ **Friday Oct. 8:** Firefighters, Sparky and the Fire Prevention Chief will be at the W.T. Sampson elementary school teaching fire safety and what children need to do in the event of a home fire.

What are some of the causes of fires in the homes and offices in GTMO?

Home fires are mostly associated with unattended cooking. It is important to note that improperly discarded cigarettes are another leading cause of home fires.

Office fires are mostly electrical in nature. Faulty extension cords which have been damaged in one way or another and with the lack of an over abundance of outlets, especially in older buildings, the overuse of power strips and multi plug outlets taxes the electrical circuits.

Southeast region's gulf oil spill response det demobilizes

JACKSONVILLE, Fla.—

In Gulfport, Miss., Navy Region Southeast personnel are preparing the last skimmers and utility boats for return to their home installation following their use in cleanup of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico. Rear Adm. Tim Alexander, Commander, Navy Region Southeast, reflected on the support the region received from Navy commands around the country.

“From Puget Sound to Key West, and San Diego to Rhode Island, installations and Navy regions stepped up to help us in our efforts to clean up oil in the Gulf region,” Alexander said. “The professional response we had from so many commands nationwide ensured the success of the Southeast Oil Spill Response Detachment.”

The Southeast Oil Spill Response Detachment (SE OSR DET) was created under the cognizance of Navy Region Southeast in June when the Coast Guard asked the Navy for assistance in the cleanup efforts.

The Navy’s response was to bring 27 skimmers, 35 utility boats, and four Harbour Buster skimmers into the Gulf region from installations around the country. Navy Region Southeast brought these boats and nearly 200 crew members and support personnel to the Gulfport, Miss., laydown area.

“Moving all these assets took a lot of cooperation and hard work by so many organizations and people,” Alexander said. “Environmental departments had to coordinate with state agencies to ensure that we weren’t leaving other areas vulnerable.”

Alexander said the Fleet Industrial Supply Center coordinated transportation and a myriad of other things to stand up the detachment.

“Our Port Operations folks were the experts on the ground,” said Alexander. “And SUPSALV gave us great support in the Gulf region, from helping with maintenance contracts to giving us the lay of the land in oil spill response.”

Crews quickly started operating in Pensacola, Fla., Perdido Pass, Ala., Myrtle Grove, La., and Bay St. Louis, Miss.

After initially recovering oil and tar balls, the crews found that oil was becoming harder and harder to find.

“I think we all feel very fortunate that the amount of oil to be recovered was less than expected,” Alexander said. “Though we were prepared for a worst-cast scenario, thankfully it didn’t come to pass. I hope we brought some measure of assurance to the people of the region with our presence, but the Coast Guard has released us from our mission, and it’s time to get our people and assets home.”

In addition, Naval Air Station Pensacola and Naval Support Activity Panama City are serving as incident support bases, providing support to the Coast Guard and BP.

As the last of the skimmers is prepped for transportation back home, the now-demobilized Southeast Oil Response Detachment will serve as an example of Navy teamwork, professionalism, and rapid deployment.

e-leave

Starting Oct. 1, Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, Cuba will implement electronic leave requests through the Navy Standard Integrated Personnel System (NSIPS) online.

"E-leave is a program where we're switching over to from paper," said Chief Yeoman Loring Walker, the Command Leave Administrator (CLA) and leading chief petty officer at the Naval Station administrative department.

For the first week, the administrative department will be testing issues with the program and ensuring it works properly.

Immediately following these tests, Admin will begin processing leave requests through individual electronic service record (ESR) self-service accounts via NSIPS.

According to NAVADMIN 103/10, once prepared, the leave request will electronically route through the chain of command for

approval. This process streamlines the leave request process and automates the command's leave control log, ensuring the proper number of days is taken.

Walker said the process makes it much easier to check out on leave and check in from leave.

"Normally, you'd have to come in to me and I'd have to write a letter to [the Personnel Support Detachment] requesting them to adjust the number of days in your leave and earnings statement," said Walker. "Now, it's all automatically done by you logging into NSIPS."

the Department of Defense and the Department of Homeland Security's National Incident Management System.

NIMS is used by the Department of Defense as uniform way to handle all significant hazards that can happen on a military base, Robarge said.

"NIMS brings a team in where there could be flooding, an active shooter, or a collapsed building," said Robarge. "We assess the situation and think of what to do next."

Another storm is forming in the eastern Atlantic.

"That storm is about 800 miles east of us," said Robarge. "It has a 30 percent chance of becoming a tropical storm or hurricane."

Robarge said residents should prepare their disaster supply kits for sudden, inclement weather.

Disaster Supply Kit Checklist

- One-week supply of non-perishable foods and drinking water per person.
- Fill plastic jugs with drinking water upon receiving warning of imminent danger.
- Maintain a supply of disposable eating and drinking utensils.
- Bottle and can openers.
- Special diet and baby foods.
- Supply of plastic bags.
- Prescription and non-prescription. *Warning: Many medications have short shelf-lives. Do not place them in the emergency kit until the time of the emergency.*
- Copy of all prescriptions.
- Prosthetic devices (eyeglasses, hearing aids, etc.)
- First aid kit
- Pocket knife
- Hand saw, pliers, tape, compass
- Battery-operated radio
- Batteries
- Flashlight and batteries
- Battery operated lantern
- Candles and matches
- Whistle

Defense Department Launches Absentee Voting Week

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27, 2010 –

The Department of Defense today announced Absentee Voting Week, Sept. 27 to Oct. 4, to help servicemembers and civilians serving outside their home states make their votes count.

With all U.S. House of Representatives and some U.S. Senate seats at stake during the mid-term elections Nov. 2, the department's Federal Voting Assistance Program has launched a new set of tools to connect voters with their state election processes.

Bob Carey, FVAP director, said the program's online electronic voting support program and federal write-in absentee ballot are designed to ensure voters get the appropriate ballot and can submit it before deadline.

FVAP's voting support program, launched this year, offers precinct-specific online ballots and submission instructions for the 19 states so far participating: Virginia, Utah, Montana, New Jersey, Nevada, Kansas, Mississippi, Washington, New Mexico, Indiana, Nebraska, Missouri, New York, Delaware, West Virginia, Idaho, Arkansas, Colorado and Tennessee.

Through the online program, located at www.FVAP.gov, "We can actually give you a direct link to your state's ballot delivery system," Carey said. "Or if your state doesn't happen to have that, then we have an online ballot that has all your federal candidates. You can select online and print out the ballot online. It will give you a pre-addressed envelope and complete instructions about how to get the ballot back home."

Some states allow ballots to be returned by fax or online, Carey said, but the military postal service will express-mail any ballots military members or their spouses submit from overseas.

"So Bexar County, Texas, has already gotten back two ballots from

Korea that were sent back by the express mail," he said. "E-mailed out on Friday, and the voter got it, put it right in the mail, it got express-mailed back, was back in San Antonio's hands on that Tuesday. Four-day turnaround."

FVAP also relies on unit commanders and voting assistance officers worldwide to help troops and civilians get their ballots back on time.

"We have over 9,500 voting assistance officers in the military," Carey said. "They're doing a good job; they got the military registered at a higher rate than the general population. What we're finding, though, is that while 91 percent of the absentee ballots in the general population are returned, only 63 percent of the military ballots were returned [during the last election cycle]."

In the past, ballots were sent by mail, which slowed the voting process and meant some absentee ballots weren't received before voting deadlines, Carey said.

"Now they're being sent by e-mail or being posted online. We've taken a 30-day transmission process and reduced it to 30 milliseconds," he said. "Hopefully that's going to be one of the biggest things we can get out there – let people know they don't have to wait."

For troops deployed to remote locations where computers and printers aren't generally available, Carey said, units may need to make special arrangements.

"What we're urging all the units to do during Absentee Voting Week [is] to maybe set up one day where they have a computer available that has a printer available," he said, "so anyone can come on in and at least get their ballot printed out if it's being delivered by e-mail or online delivery."

Carey said FVAP also is using social networking tools to reach potential voters.

"FVAP is on Facebook, and we have a tool, an invitation for people to send to all their friends to say, 'Hey, here's how you can get your ballot now.' And if they go to the Federal

Voting Assistance Program Facebook page, they can find out all that as well," he said.

The program's goal is to make the FVAP Web site the only tool that Defense Department absentee voters need, he said.

"We're trying to make the FVAP Web site the single portal to be able to go to any state, any system, and it will be seamless and intuitive for the voter," Carey said. "The experience of a California voter may be very different than the experience a New York voter has, because of the technology used. But hopefully, the experience in terms of the ease of voting is the same."

GTMO Wildlife Regulations

NAVSTAGTMOINST 1710.1A —Outdoor Recreation and Wildlife Instruction states that the use of parks, beaches and waters in and around Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, is a privilege that carries an inherent responsibility to preserve the fragile ecological balance of these areas. Therefore, the “taking” of any animal, fish, or plant—or any part thereof—is prohibited. (“Take” means to intentionally harm, kill, harass or remove from the natural habitat.) Beaches, parks and facilities are available for the enjoyment of all personnel. Be courteous and respectful of the rights of others...including the wild life.

It's Conch Season!

Remember the “take” requirements for Queen (pink) Conchs: Immature open Queen Conchs, or “rollers,” are subject to NAVSTAGTMOINST 1710.1A regulations. Only one live shell per person per day. The shell must be over 9 inches in length or the thinnest part of the lip must be at least one-eighth of an inch thick.






