"Ladies and gentleman these men that sit behind you are beyond a doubt the best crew a skipper could ever wish to have,"



## Energy checklist bolsters cost savings

Effort is to improve utility, building infrastructure

As each of the five pillars of the Naval District Washington energy policy build upon one another into a comprehensive strategy, efficiency becomes a keystone in the hierarchy.

Energy leaders within Naval Facilities Engineering Command and other NDW commands are teaming up in an effort to improve building and utility infrastructure and vehicles by incorporating technology and management practices in the hopes of saving power and money.

One of the main areas being looked at is renovation and construction of high performance and sustainable buildings through the NDW-NAVFAC Capital Improvements Energy Checklist and the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in

Energy and Environmental Design Green Building Rating System.

The energy checklist is a tool to help bridge the gap between more than 40 energy mandates and the end products and services, explained NAVFAC architect Mike Gala, the checklist leader.

Working with the checklist becomes a collaborative process across many disciplines and people from architects and policy makers down to individual installation energy managers in the field implementing the projects.

"I'm helping focus their targets in the earliest phases of the projects so they can better allocate resources-dollars and technology-in the right direction," Gala

said of the IEMs. "We need installation energy managers to help us define what the performance goal is and what that performance target is. This is that collaboration that is really necessary."

The energy checklist is composed of 15 different areas covering various aspects of buildings and systems including efficiency, data measurement and verification, fuel choices, and renewable energy sources, and is continually monitored throughout the life cycle of the project.

As goals are continually met and more are set for the future, Gala adapts the checklist as time passes to ensure it meets the changing needs in NDW.

## Survey seeking female input

Voluntary query will gauge level of interest in submarine duty

The Navy has opened a voluntary online survey to all female enlisted Sailors to understand the level of interest among women to serve aboard submarines.

A Navy task force was formed last summer to develop options for integrating enlisted women into the submarine force. The survey results will be used to help guide ongoing planning efforts.

"We seek input from professional women Sailors throughout our Navy, even if they aren't interested in serving aboard submarines," said Rear Adm. Ken Perry, a career submariner who leads the task force. "Responses to the survey questions will help shape future Navy policy and are key to getting the integration right."

Perry emphasized that all survey responses will remain anonymous. "I value honest input. Give it to us straight. All responses will remain anonymous, period," he said.

Female Sailors can access the online survey by logging on the Navy Standard Integrated Personnel System commonly known as NSIPS.

Once logged on, personnel can follow these steps:

- Locate the "Employee Self Service" link in the column on the left side of the page titled "Menu."
- Expand the "Employee Self Service" link options.
- Then expand the options under the "Electronic Service Record" link.
- Click the "Tasks" link.
- Then click the "Survey Requests" link.

The survey will be visible under the "Pending Surveys"

## Stopping child abuse a Navy priority

It Only Takes A Minute theme for April observance

April was proclaimed Child Abuse Prevention Month by Congress in 1982.

Since then, child abuse and neglect awareness activities have been promoted across the country during April each year.

The Navy's theme for the 2014 April Child Abuse Prevention Month is *It Only Takes a Minute*. It reinforces to our community that children are fragile and responsible age-appropriate supervision is mandatory.

The message is to educate parents and other child caregivers that child abuse and neglect and child fatalities often times occur very quickly.

There have been numerous child abuse and neglect incidents and child deaths re-

ported to have been caused by young parents or other caretakers who were focused on playing a video game or using another electronic device, instead of tending to the needs of the child.

The theme serves as a reminder that all child abuse and neglect incidents and child fatalities are preventable when healthy parenting and child-care practices are incorporated into your daily routine to prevent child abuse. Be on the lookout for *It Only Takes a Minute* billboard displays around the base.

There are many ways to support awareness and prevention of child abuse in our community. The Kings Bay community must work together to prevent the tragedy of child abuse and death that happens all too often.

One such awareness activity is the Blue Ribbon Campaign.

Blue ribbons are tied to car antennas, worn as pins and placed around communities to commemorate children who have died from

abuse and to promote awareness of the need to prevent child abuse. This movement was started by a Virginia grandmother whose grandson died from child abuse at the hands of her daughter's boyfriend.

The Blue Ribbon Campaign has grown into a nationwide event.

Another awareness activity is Pinwheels for Prevention. This national organization's mission is "to prevent the abuse and neglect of our nation's children."

Pinwheels will be placed around the Kings Bay community to bring attention to the tragedy of child abuse. Pinwheels were chosen as the symbol because they remind us of childlike notions and stand for the healthy, happy and full lives that all children deserve.

Mail for personnel living in UH, where USPS does not provide service should be addressed to their unit address or box number address in order that it may

be handled separately from the activities official mail."

In order to get mail delivered in a timely manner, members should include their command in their address.

This helps the Mail Room get the mail to individuals as quickly as possible.

If the Mail Room is unable to determine which command the individual is attached, the mail is returned to the sender.

## Navy JAG can help with adoptions

Adoption can be a very exciting process for many military families.

This life altering process, though, is also one that can be very challenging, costly and time consuming for many military families.

Fortunately, installation Region Legal Service Offices and the Department of Defense offer a wide range of legal advice and cost saving measures that can make the process much easier for our service men and women.

For most military members seeking assistance with adoptions, the most common type is the stepparent adoption, in which one spouse legally adopts the child of the other spouse from a previous relationship.

To complete a stepparent adoption, a court must terminate the parental rights of the other biological parent. In cases where the adoption is not contested, the biological parent may voluntarily waive his or her parental rights.

Sometimes, however, there are situations in which the whereabouts of

the other parent may not be known or perhaps that parent is not willing to voluntarily relinquish his or her parental rights. In these circumstances, there are very specific, and sometimes lengthy, steps which may need to be taken in order to terminate the parental rights of the other parent. Consult a local RLSO Legal Assistance office regarding any questions on terminating parental rights.

One big burden for many military families seeking to complete an adoption is cost.

Between court costs, attorney fees and other incidental expenses, the financial burden of completing an adoption can be overwhelming. Most states require that individuals seeking adoptions have an attorney to represent them.

To help alleviate many of these costs, the Department of Defense offers an adoption reimbursement program that provides up to \$2,000 of expenses per child, not to exceed

\$5,000 per year.

More information about this program can be found on the DFAS website or in DoD Instruction 1341.9. It is important to note that reimbursement will not occur until the adoption process is complete.

Local RLSO Legal Assistance offices can provide guidance in preparing the reimbursement paperwork. Additionally, while RLSO Legal Assistance attorneys cannot represent military members and their families in adoption cases, RLSO Legal Assistance offices have resources available to interested families that can put them in touch with local family law attorneys, many of whom offer discounts to military families.

For individuals considering adoption, it is very important to have a complete understanding as to what obligations attach once the adoption is final.

RLSO Legal Assistance attorneys can answer questions regarding parental rights and responsibilities that prospective adoptive parents

# Tragedy strikes again at Ft. Hood

The three soldiers killed in the April 2 shootings at Fort Hood, Texas, have been identified while the search continues for answers that might explain the motive for the killings.

Army Lt. Gen. Mark A. Milley on April 4 identified those killed as:

- Army Sgt. First Class Daniel Michael Ferguson, 39, from Mulberry, Fla., enlisted in July 1993 as a transportation management coordinator. He had deployed to Kuwait, Iraq and Afghanistan.

- Army Staff Sgt. Carlos Lazaney Rodriguez, 38, from Aguadilla, Puerto Rico, enlisted in February 1995 as a unit supply specialist. He had deployed to Kuwait and Iraq.

- Army Sgt. Timothy Wayne Owens, 37, from Effingham, Ill., enlisted in July 2004 as a motor transport operator. He had deployed to Iraq and Kuwait.

Six soldiers remained hospitalized, the general said. Three were at Scott and White Memorial Hospital in Temple, Texas, and three were at Darnall Army Medical Center at Fort Hood. Ten other soldiers wounded in the shootings have been released and returned to duty.

Investigators have started looking closely at the background of the alleged shooter, Spc. Ivan Lopez.

"We are digging into his combat experience in Iraq," Milley said. "And so far, we have not discovered any specific traumatic event, wounds received in action, contact with the enemy or anything else specific that he may have been exposed to while deployed."

It does not appear that any of Lopez' underlying medical conditions were a direct precipitating factor in the shootings, Milley said. "We believe that the immediate precipitating factor was more likely an escalating argument in his unit area," he said.

"We do have credible information he was involved in a verbal altercation with soldiers from his unit just prior to him allegedly opening fire," said Chris Grey, public affairs chief for Army Criminal Investigation Command.

window if these steps are followed.

The survey takes approximately 15 minutes to complete. It is scheduled to remain open through the spring.

The submarine force is developing plans to integrate enlisted women following the Secretary of Defense's rescission of the 1994 Direct Ground Combat Definition and Assignment rule last year.

All positions currently

closed to women are to be opened by January 2016 unless granted an exception by the Defense Secretary. Today's submarine force includes 72 nuclear-powered submarines located among seven homeports in the Atlantic and Pacific regions.

The submarine force began integrating female officers into ballistic-missile and guided-missile submarine crews in 2011. Many have since earned submarine qualifications and completed a number of strategic deterrent patrols and missions in multiple theaters of operation.

"It's an ongoing process and it's a live document, so as criteria changes, I'm updating the energy checklist," he said.

The checklist is not automatically used in every energy project, however. Depending on the scope and scale of an energy project, the checklist may not always be necessary, Gala explained.

Some smaller projects might only need to renovate certain key components within a building or system without necessitating the broader strokes of the checklist.

The true power of the checklist, Gala said, is when architects and energy personnel are able to affect a broader range of projects, such as constructing all new infrastructure that incorporates LEED certifications.

"Our focus with the energy checklist is really high performance buildings," said Gala of smarter and more efficient structures.

That focus expands beyond simply building the framework and systems,

and delves into the monitoring of the building's performance to help evaluate processes and adapt if necessary. While many of the smarter systems may cost more up front during construction, having the data to prove the eventual energy savings helps to justify the extra initial funding, Gala said.

"It's a very cyclical relationship," he noted.

After architects design the systems, the IEMs are the field-level experts in providing the data and feedback crucial to maintaining that relationship.

Having many different people involved in the collaborative process of the checklist is beneficial because it prevents "stove-piping" of people and resources into competing forces, Gala said.

While implementation often poses the biggest challenge, the checklist helps focus efforts and work toward the ultimate goal of building the NDW energy strategy.

"It's helping you navigate all those mandates and all those requirements in a multidiscipline approach," he said. "The ultimate goal is to reduce our energy footprint."

# Port Ops 'Code Oscar Sierra' means Oil Spill

A typical first response is on a Boom Boat.



Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay

Lots of roles on the waterfront are done everyday by Naval Submarine Base's Port Operations Department members. Their primary job is responding to spills of hazardous products, like oil or diesel fuel, on navigable waters.


Port Ops is manned 24/7 with personnel and tools ready to respond. Conventional navigation tools are still the best. This compass, below, is used to get the boats needed on station.



Once on station, the Port Ops On Scene Leader will access the type of hazardous material, the severity, what's at risk and the best method to contain the spill. Right, a Platform boat lets out boom.



The Boom Boat pulls the boom on scene. The Platform boat and boom can be seen in the distance.



BMC Steven Douglas prepares line to anchor the boom to land. The plan during this exercise is to deflect the oil to be safely recovered.







## Afghan elections held

Joint Chiefs of Staff Chairman Army Gen. Martin E. Dempsey, and Marine Corps Gen. Joseph F. Dunford Jr., the commander of the International Security Assistance Force, congratulated the people of Afghanistan on their historic election April 5, and also saluted the Afghan security forces for their efforts to make the elections happen.

"Today there is reason for celebration in Afghanistan," Dempsey said in a statement. "Millions turned out to vote, with Afghan National Security Forces looking out for the safety of Afghan people as they cast votes at more than 6,000 polling sites. Clearly, this is an important step in the first democratic transfer of power in Afghanistan's history."

"But today's election did not come without significant sacrifice the sacrifice of the Afghan people and many Americans and service members from partner nations who have been killed and

wounded fighting there since 2001," the chairman continued. "We look forward to the outcome of the elections and the opportunity to continue to work together, with a willing partner, for a better Afghanistan."

The Afghan people "can be proud of their security forces. For months, they've conducted planning and security operations to ensure that the conditions were set for inclusive elections," Dunford said in an ISAF news release issued today.

As the world watched, Afghan National Security Forces provided the opportunity for the Afghan people to choose their new president, securing over 6,200 polling centers across the country, the ISAF release said.

Soldiers and policemen confidently patrolled the cities and countryside to protect innocent civilians and prevent insurgents from disrupting today's elections, the ISAF release said, and Afghan voters displayed confidence in their army and police, turning out in unprecedented

# Coast Guard training for close-quarter combat

In the labyrinth and confluence of ladders, corridors and gangways aboard the 540-foot T. S. Kennedy, the Massachusetts Maritime Academy's cadet training ship, it was a "hellish" close quarters combat training for 15 members from four maritime safety and security teams from Boston, New York, New Orleans and Galveston, Texas.

In the chilly shores off Sandwich, Mass., someone joked of how much warmer it was in Texas, but, it sure heated up as soon as the games started and ramped up for a couple of hours.

Training multiple law enforcement teams simultaneously is a rare and precious opportunity, so this particular event means a lot to the trainees and to unit commanders.

Maritime Safety and Security Team Boston Command Senior Chief William P. Klein's role is crucial as one of the training observers.

"MSST Boston and New York had previously worked together; Galveston and New Orleans the same," said Klein. "However, the connections ended there."

The New York members

had never worked with Galveston, New Orleans never with Boston, and so on and so forth, and it didn't matter.

Rank insignia was non-existent.

Several members graduated from the Coast Guard Special Mission Training Center's Basic Tactical Operator Course in Camp Lejeune, N.C., where they trained in advanced weapons and close quarters combat.

However, as the hellish event began, BTOC graduates' performance were barely distinguishable from non-graduates, a testament to each unit's standard training programs and the inevitable result from the teams' "forming, storming and norming" phases that unfolded within a compressed two-hour timeframe.

"BTOC really establishes a solid foundation for all Deployable Specialized Force Tactical Operators to employ CQC in a real-world event," said Petty Officer Third Class Jon W. Sykes of MSST Boston. "Honing our skill-set during training opportunities like this is absolutely essential to establish and maintain proficiency."

The teams were grouped into two Advanced Interdiction Teams: 3, MSST New Orleans and Galveston; and 5, MSST New

York and Boston.

AIT-5's major component is currently deployed to U.S. Central Command in support of the Coast Guard Atlantic Area's ongoing participation in anti-piracy operations off the Horn of Africa. AIT-3 is preparing to deploy this spring.

Training goals were simple: (1) have each advanced interdiction team share their respective standard operating procedures for executing CQC through a crawl, walk, run approach during a

basic training evolution and (2) to reinforce and "hardwire" standard CQC tactics, techniques, procedures and nomenclature taught by SMTC during BTOC back at home base during daily training.

Overall, it all came together in one succinct event for one "hellish" adventure.

The gauntlet at hand consisted of executing exterior CQC movement along a weather deck leading to the focal point — hitting a complex system of dual stairways ac-

cessed via two center fed, opposing double doors — the guts of the "stairway to hell."

Surprisingly, the first evolution went smooth, followed by increasing proficiency across the second and third runs.

Best practices were shared; self-critiques led to lessons learned and teachable moments.

"The real win here was the ability for all of us to come together in rapid fashion as a team and compare CQC notes to improve our ability to re-

spond to a crisis," said Petty Officer 1st Class Oliver "Ollie" Haeske of MSST Galveston.

Impressively, the trainees' demonstrated their collective and individual abilities to effectively navigate several principles specific to the CQC: rapidly process information, effectively deal with a maze of angles, red zones and sectors of fire.

In fulfilling the training objectives, the teams were outstanding in seamlessly shifting between deliberate and dynamic CQC movements.

Whether direction was given from a seasoned tactical operator who joined the U. S. Marine Corps in 1989 and participating in Desert Storm before joining the 82nd Airborne which eventually led to his enlistment in the Coast Guard, to a junior Maritime Enforcement Specialist A-school graduate preparing to attend BTOC in a month, success was achieved through mutual exchange of ideas, increasing individual proficiency and contributing overall to the team's ability to respond to a non-compliant boarding.

From obscure vantage points throughout the massive ship, observers said the teams "jelled" through the intensive training.
