Valp. ratchets up shoreline litigation

Litigation over rights to waterfront property in Valparaiso may continue for the foreseeable future, after the city commission agreed to file a countersuit against a property owner who had sued the city, claiming ownership of some waterfront land on Toms Bayou.

Also, Valparaiso voters may soon vote in a referendum on

whether to change the city's charter.

At a Valparaiso City Commission meeting Oct. 14, City Attorney Hayward Dykes suggested a countersuit against residents Jason and Angelle Rosenbleeth, who have sued the city over the land ownership issue.

For years, the city has faced lawsuits from property owners who live along the city's water-

front streets, and who seek to establish ownership to the water's edge. The city maintains that it has rights to land seaward of city streets in front of such homeowners' property, even if such streets are only platted as streets but never actually paved.

During the meeting, Dykes asked the city commission to decide whether the city should "aggressively pursue" its claim to the right of way along a portion

of Bayshore Drive that runs along Toms Bayou west of John Sims Parkway. Unlike Bayshore Drive to the east, the portion to the west of John Sims Parkway is an unpaved track.

Dykes recommended that the city's countersuit be handled by Bruce Bowman, a member of Dykes' firm of Connerly, Bowman and Dykes.

During the discussion that followed, City Commissioner Kay

Hamilton initially expressed doubt about filing such a countersuit. "I ran on a campaign for cooperation, not litigation," she said. She said the city has rarely if ever prevailed in such suits, and

that she would prefer to discuss some sort of settlement with the landowners.

Dykes, however, said that the

North Bay debates grievance procedures

The North Bay Fire Commission has been considering allowing the firefighters' union to appeal labor grievances to an arbitrator in the event of an unfavorable decision by the commission.

A split vote by the commission earlier this month was inconclusive, and the matter may come up again at a commission meeting scheduled for Nov. 12.

Opposing views on the proposed change in the firefighters' union contract highlighted a meeting of the North Bay Fire Control District governing board in Bluewater Bay Oct. 9.

After reviewing the financial report for September, Fire Chief Jim Miller introduced North Bay Firefighters Association President Travis Zaal, who asked to address the fire commission on the union's proposal to amend article 52 of its contract with the district.

The proposed change to the article, which covers arbitration

Members of the Mid-Bay Bridge Authority Board of Directors learned things about the Mid-Bay Bridge and other spans that they may have never known before, as they received an informal briefing by an 8-year-old Oct. 17.

Michael James Panarisi, a student at Bluewater Elementary School, briefed MBBA board members during a meeting in Destin about his construction of model bridges, and his recent visit to the Mid-Bay Bridge connector route construction project. He was accompanied by his father, Michael Troy Panarisi.

Young Michael showed

board members one of the model bridges he has recently built with the help of his father, a former Air Force test pilot who works at the Air Force Research Lab at Eglin Air Force Base as a civilian.

Michael said that he has been fascinated by bridges ever since his family arrived in the Niceville area, and that he is working on building models of each of the major types of bridge design.

Michael told the board members that the model he brought to the meeting, for example, illustrated a "truss suspension double-decker bridge," but that the Mid-Bay bridge is a

County suspends catering contract

The Okaloosa County Commission has suspended its contract with Aramark, the company that has been providing catering services to the county-owned Emerald Coast Convention Center on Okaloosa Island.

During a commission meeting Oct. 15 in Fort Walton Beach, the contract was suspended on

motion of Commissioner Nathan Boyles, who said he had recently observed Aramark employees using county vehicles and personnel to perform catering duties for some of the company's commercial, rather than county clients.

In a written statement following the meeting, Boyles wrote: "The Convention Center has the potential to spur future economic development for our county. However, the center is a public asset and must be operated accordingly, meaning it can't always operate like a private business. In August, conference center staff was advised that it was inappropriate for the center to aid

the contracted caterer, Aramark, in its outside catering business even though the county had been receiving 15 percent of those revenues."

"Unfortunately, the message was either not adequately delivered or implemented as I personally encountered the use of a center vehicle and staff in the furtherance of an outside catering event. Upon further inquiry I was advised that the existing contract actually expired on Oct. 1, and had not yet been renewed. Based upon the information available to me, I presented the issue to my fellow commissioners and submitted a motion that all further actions under the expired contract

be suspended immediately. The motion passed unanimously."

"I will push to have the catering contract put back out for bid in light of the current issues," Boyles stated.

Asked for comment, David Freireich, a spokesman for Philadelphia-based Aramark, issued the following statement: "We truly value the partnership we have had with Okaloosa County and the Emerald Coast Convention Center since 2003 and remain committed to continuing that relationship. We believe there was a misunderstanding regarding the contract renewal and hope to resolve this matter quickly. In the meantime, we look forward to continuing to serve guests and visitors of the convention center."

In other business Oct. 15, the commission approved making a final payment to the Emerald Coast Children's Advocacy Center for services rendered associated with mental health counseling for crime victims in the amount of \$2,355.

The Niceville-based CAC provides central services for children who are alleged victims of various forms of abuse, allowing them to meet with physicians, law enforcement, counselors, and other agencies in a single location, rather than being taken from office to office and being required to retell the stories of what they have suffered over and over again. The single-stop approach is intended to reduce the trauma suffered by victims.

Commissioners also voted unanimously to reinstate County Administrator Ernie Padgett to full-time regular status following temporary medical leave of absence.

different type—a “combination concrete beam and cantilever bridge.”

The 3.5-mile toll bridge over Choctawhatchee Bay is held together by cables that run through its precast segments. Groups of eight to nine segments are tied together by the hidden cables, which are anchored at each end to bulkheads that rest on concrete piers.

Michael proudly wore the hardhat he had been given by HDR Engineering personnel, who recently gave him a tour of the Mid-Bay Bridge Connector,

including the 10 bridges along the 11-mile expressway route under construction east and north of Niceville.

Michael’s father informed the board that in addition to being fascinated by bridge construction, Michael also has a unique talent – the ability to classify bridges by the pitch of the sound vehicles make as they drive over the bridge. The Mid-Bay Bridge, according to Michael, “is an E flat bridge,” said his father.

The senior Panarisi added that his son can even tell whether the family car is traveling above or below the posted speed limit when driving over

the bridge, by hearing slight variations in the sound the car makes as it travels. Recently, he said, Michael warned him that he was driving over the bridge at 49 miles an hour rather than the posted 45 near each end of the span.

In other business at the board meeting, HDR Engineering representative John Vannoy noted that the Mid-Bay Bridge connector route is nearing completion, and is expected to be open by Jan. 5, 2014, about a month ahead of the project’s original schedule. He said the roadway is about 93 percent complete, and that most bridge work is done. Construction of the tolling point for the new bridge connector is now underway, and the Florida Turnpike Authority plans to begin installing electronic toll monitoring equipment at the unmanned tolling station on Oct. 28.

MBBA Executive Director Jim Vest told the board that toll revenue over the Mid-Bay Bridge itself was up about a half percent during September over the revenue collected during the same month last year. He also told the board that he is awaiting an \$11,000 payment from the Florida Department of Transportation to reimburse the MBBA for toll revenue lost earlier this year when the FDOT temporarily suspended toll collection on the bridge in order to reroute traffic from the Brooks Bridge in Fort Walton Beach after it was struck by a barge.

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

From page A-1 facts in this case differ from those in the previous cases, and that by filing such a countersuit, the city might obtain better opportunities for a resolution of the case, to include the possibility of resolving it through a settlement.

Mayor Bruce Arnold said that it has always been the city's position that the land between the platted but unpaved section of west Bayshore Drive belongs to the city. "We'll defend it vigorously," said Arnold.

After further discussion, the city commission voted unanimously to go ahead with a countersuit.

Dykes said that commissioners should expect to hold some closed, "executive" meetings with Bowman in the future to discuss the progress of the case.

In other business, commissioners approved the first of two readings of an ordinance to authorize a referendum March 11, 2014, on whether to change the city's charter, and possibly to change its form of government from its current "commission" form to another, such as a "city manager" form.

Commissioners Hamilton and Joe Morgan cast the opposing votes, as the ordinance was approved 3-2.

The language of the referendum ordinance, said Morgan, "gives short shrift to the fact that we're changing the form of government. That should be made clear."

Former City Commissioner T. G. Miller also addressed the commission meeting, expressing opposition to the proposed referendum. He said the proposed referendum, as currently worded, asks for a yes-or-no decision by voters on a new city charter that actually includes up to nine changes. Miller said these changes should each be addressed separately by voters. To do otherwise, he said, would present voters with a deceptive choice, which he likened to "a Las Vegas stacked deck."

The proposed ballot measure reads as follows:

Shall the city of Valparaiso amend its 1921 charter providing for:

- The City Administrator as a charter officer;
-Delete offices of City Tax Assessor, Tax Collector, Treasurer, and Municipal Judge;
-Amend qualifications for commissioners;
-Amend powers and responsibilities of officers and commissioners;
-Amend budget adoption;
-Amend how vacancies on the

commission are filled;
-Amend Articles VII, VIII, XI, XIII as described in Ordinance No. XXX;

Delete Articles IX, X, and XII of the 1921 Charter?

The proposed charter itself contains about 4,600 words.

Following the commission vote in favor of the ordinance, Mayor Arnold said the issue will be considered again for a final reading during a commission meeting in November.

Commissioners also approved unanimously a recommendation by Public Works Director James Valandingham to switch most refueling for city vehicles from the city's own gas pump to a contract with Citgo. Doing so, he said, will be less costly and more efficient, although he added that the city pump will remain open on a limited basis for those city vehicles requiring special fuel.

Also during the meeting, members of the Young Marines, a youth organization affiliated with the Marine Corps, addressed the city commission meeting and handed out red ribbons in honor of a proclamation by the city commission of "Red Ribbon Week."

NHS men's swimmers take 1st at Panama City Beach Invite

The Niceville men's and women's swim team boarded the bus Saturday, Oct. 12, for the Panama City Beach Invite at Frank Brown Park. With 16 men's team and 14 women's team competing, it would come down to the very last race of the evening with a must win for the men 400 free relay team.

Racing began at 9 a.m. with preliminaries in 11 events for each of the men's and women's teams. The top 16 individual and relay teams would advance to the finals that would begin at 6 p.m. that evening. Niceville's teams advanced 51 swimmers to individual events and all six relay teams.

At the end of the night, the men were faced with a must win race, the 400 free relay, in order to edge out Washington High School for first place team honors. of grievances, was introduced to the commission during its August meeting. Though the board discussed the proposed changes at that time, no representative from the union attended and the board unanimously voted to leave the article as written.

At the Oct. 9 meeting, Zaal cited a letter the union received from the district stating the commission "agreed unanimously to not give up their rights" and that the commission felt changes to the article would have a financial impact on the fire district.

"We believe that both of these arguments are misguided," Zaal said.

The contract article states that when a labor grievance can-

not be resolved through negotiation with the fire chief, the union can present it to the commission or to professional arbitration.

If the union brings the matter to the elected fire commission, however, it gives up its right to appeal the decision to arbitration, rendering the commission's decision final. The union wants to open the option of appealing the commission's decision to arbitration.

"This situation is not reasonable to the association or the taxpayers of the district," Zaal stated. "It creates a situation where both parties are forced to arbitrate based on the inability of the association and the management to negotiate a reasonable settlement."

Referencing two examples where negotiations did not result in a resolution, Zaal said the firefighters association was con-

fident in their case but "could not risk approaching the (commission) and losing our ability to arbitrate to an impartial third party." In both instances, the opportunity existed for the board to review and intervene without eliminating the option for arbitration, he added. In the cited examples, the union's first case was upheld in arbitration while the second was settled just prior to scheduled arbitration.

Zaal explained the changes to the article would not void the board's role in grievance issues nor result in added financial impact, but would instead open

the option for the commissioners to review cases and potentially save the district from attorney and arbitration fees.

"We want to be able to come to you with a case, while at the same time preserving our right to rely on the state to maintain all legalities we feel are not being represented," said the union's vice president, Nathaniel Ark.

Commissioner Steven Strait voiced concern that the proposed changes could result in the union sidestepping any decision the board would make in a case.

Ark countered that the board part of the process makes it easier to reach agreement without going to arbitration.

"We aren't going down this path (toward arbitration) unless we are 100 percent sure we are in the right," said Ark. "If we

can't come to an agreement with the administration, the next best step is to come to the board of fire commissioners. We would rather you have input to the conflict resolution without having to go to a third party."

Commissioner David Scholl agreed that the proposed change is a reasonable request from the union that offers an option to avoid the legal avenue of arbitration.

Commissioners Jim Boswell and Strait, however, asserted the proposed changes would diminish the board's authority.

Though the current three-year union contract is not up for negotiation until next year, either the fire chief or the union can ask for review and revision of articles. Currently there are several articles under review, but article 52 was

brought to the board separately as it directly addressed the commission's role.

After more than 30 minutes of debate between the union representative and the board, Commissioner Janet Santner asked if the matter could be tabled.

Commissioner Boswell said it had been three months since the initial discussion and a decision needed to be made now.

Commissioner Strait made the motion to reject any change in article 52, Boswell seconded, and the vote split 2-2 with Scholl and Santner voting nay. The motion thus failed. Commissioner Lee Wetzell was absent, leaving open the possibility that the issue may come up again. The commission is scheduled to meet next on Nov. 12.
