Niceville youth council seeks wider membership

Members of Niceville's Youth Advisory Council (YAC) agreed to broaden the rules for membership in their organization, in an effort to make membership more inclusive for high school students in the Niceville area.

The YAC is a youth organization that parallels the functions and procedures of the adult, elected Niceville City Council. The group usually has five voting members, as well as an unspecified number of nonvoting members who take part in community service projects and

other activities sponsored by the YAC, but do not vote during meetings.

The stated mission of the YAC is to "provide a voice for youth in the City of Niceville and establish a direct medium for civic involvement among this group. The council is meant

City charter review panel winds up

The Niceville Charter Review Committee held its final meeting April 9, ending its three-month life with mostly minor recommendations for change in the city's foundational document.

The group of volunteers appointed by the Niceville City Council has been meeting since January to discuss how the charter might be brought up to date, and what changes, if any, should be made to improve governance of the city.

During one of the review committee's first meetings, City Clerk Dan Doucet noted that the charter is the basic document that defines the organization, functions and essential procedures of the city government. The committee was to study the charter and recommend any changes which, if also approved by

the city council, would be put before the citizens of Niceville for a vote. The current charter dates from 1983, successor to one written when the city was founded in 1938.

On April 9, the review committee voted to recommend that proposed ordinances or amendments be read and approved during two city council meetings, rather than the currently required three meet-

Funds sought to rehab homes

The city of Niceville will apply for a grant of up to \$700,000 from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, to continue its Community Development Block Grant program to replace or fix up substandard housing in Niceville.

During the April 9 meeting of the Niceville City Council, consultant Dennis Dingman briefed council members on the next cycle of grant applications for the federal-state program. He said the city is eligible to apply for up to \$700,000 in U.S. grant money, for which the city must provide \$50,000 in matching funds.

He said the money would be sufficient to replace or rehabilitate up to 10 dwellings within Niceville.

to represent the diverse youth population in Niceville."

Prior to the YAC's April 9 meeting, membership requirements for voting members were:

—Live within city limits of Niceville

-Attend Niceville High School, Rocky Bayou Christian School, Collegiate High School, Florida Virtual School (or other online school), or be homeschooled.

—Preparing to enter grades 9 through 12 in the fall of the current year.

-Have a grade point average of at least 2.25.

Requiring YAC members to live within Niceville city limits was intended to parallel the eligibility requirements for adult elected members of the city council, said Councilman Sal Nodjomian, the adult advisor to the YAC.

During the meeting, however, YAC members recommended opening voting membership to

students who live anywhere within the 32578 ZIP Code, as long as they meet the other requirements. The city council approved the recommendation later that evening.

Member Martin Bouldo said the expanded eligibility would make it easier to recruit members, and will make the YAC "more inclusive."

Bouldo and YAC Chair Katie Lightfoot said that the Niceville community includes "patches" of unincorporated areas, such as East Niceville and Bluewater Bay, which are not within the city limits, but in which students have an interest in the wellbeing of Niceville, and may want to participate in a youth organization that models the function of an elected city council, but have no opportunity to join such an organization in the places where they live.

Following the meeting, a reporter asked YAC members whether students who live in Valparaiso, but who also attend local high schools, would be eligible for Niceville YAC mem-

Bouldo said they would not, but that the YAC is open to considering such membership if students from Valparaiso suggest it. Valparaiso has no youth advisory council reporting to the city commission.

About 13 potential recruits for the Youth Advisory Council attended Tuesday's meeting. They received applications for membership, observed the YAC meeting, and chatted with current YAC members and with Niceville City Councilman Sal Nodjomian, the adult advisor to the YAC. None of the potential recruits at the meeting raised the issue of membership for students from Valparaiso.

According to the city of Niceville website, "All those interested in joining the Niceville Youth Advisory Council should fill out the application (PDF) and submit it to the City Clerk, Mr. Dan Doucet. His office is located in the Niceville City Complex."

"Five youth members will be selected from the group of appli-

bership under the new rule. cants. This coincides with the five city council members. Each city council member will select one applicant to sit in the youth advisory council."

Students selected for membership in the YAC are expected

-Attend meetings regularly. -Maintain positive conduct inside and outside the council

—Report on youth issues to the city council.

Of the \$700,000 applied for, said Dingman, about \$582,000 would be used for actual construction work, with the remaining funds used for administration and for temporary relocation expenses of people who may be displaced from their homes while the structures are being replaced or renovated.


In the past, the city has received such grants, and used the money to rehabilitate or replace a number of homes in Niceville. Dingman said that after the current grant cycle is complete, another is expected to begin in October, at which time the city may apply for further funding.

After hearing from Dingman, the council approved a resolution to make application to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity for the grant.

In other business, the council approved spending up to about \$123,000 to purchase and install a metal building on a site behind the city community center. The new building will be used to store equipment and supplies for the city's water and sewer department. Although the council authorized up to \$123,000 for the project, it is hoped that the work can be done for less.

Also during April 9 meeting, council members approved a proposal from the city's Youth Advisory Council (YAC) to broaden membership eligibility rules for YAC membership (see related story, Page A-1). The YAC is a youth organization that parallels the procedures and functions of an elected adult city council, and performs charitable and community service projects.

The new rules, according to YAC members who addressed the city council, will allow some students from unincorporated areas such as East Niceville and Bluewater Bay to become eligible for membership, even though they do not live within the city.

range, elimination of "dead" areas, and a wider variety of frequencies on which police may communicate.

Niceville, said Popwell, is not the only police force in Northwest Florida to make the switch from analog to digital. Others, he said, include Fort Walton Beach and Crestview. The Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office is also in the process of switching to digital.

"We can now communicate to and from anywhere in Niceville," Popwell said, "without the dead spots that previously existed in some parts of the city." Such dead spots, he said,

posed potential dangers to police, and to the people they serve, by making it more difficult for police to communicate.

The new radio system has no such dead spots, and allows reliable communication between

> Niceville officers and those from Fort Walton Beach and Crestview whenever it becomes necessary to back each other up during emergencies. In addition, the system allows Niceville officers to stay in communication with their

David Popwell own police station even when traveling to or from Crestview or Fort Walton, as is sometimes necessary for administrative reasons, court appearances, or when participating in joint operations.

Changes to the charter recommended during earlier sessions of the committee include:

-Including a brief statement of how the city was incorporated. The addition would state, "On July 7, 1938, some of the registered voters of Niceville, Florida signed a petition to determine whether or not to incorporate. The final count was

329 in favor and 4 against. House Bill number 13022 to 'establish a municipality in the city of Niceville' was introduced in the Senate, May 18, 1939."

-Including a statement that, "On May 14, 2013, the city Council voted to add to the seal the established date when the community first received mail service on July 28, 1868."

—Adding "medical marijuana" to the intoxicating products subject to city regulation.

—Adding storm water control to the list of city services.

During the committee's March 22 meeting, members discussed whether to update procedures for city elections.

They heard a briefing from Okaloosa County Supervisor of Elections Paul Lux, who described alternative ways of electing city council members, such as at large, by individual council seats, or by geographic districts.

During the April 9 meeting, committee members decided to recommend no changes to current municipal election procedures, in which the five city council members are elected by citywide vote to specific seats.

Committee members also discussed whether Niceville's mayor and city council members should be paid for the work they do. The committee decided

the elected officials should remain unpaid. They do receive reimbursement for official expenses.

Committee members also discussed whether to recommend regulation of short-term vacation rentals of homes within Niceville, but decided to make no such recommendation, because the issue can more easily be addressed, if necessary, by the city council through the passage of city ordinances.

Copies of the Niceville city charter, and changes proposed to it, can be obtained through the Niceville City Clerk.

Popwell said that hobbyists, news media, and other people who use scanners to listen to police radio calls will still be able to do so, but will probably need to upgrade their own equipment from analog to digital. Digital scanners are available from commercial sources, he said.

encourage listening,"

Popwell said. "I want people to know what their police are doing, what we are dealing with, and how we are serving the public." The only exceptions to such open communication, he said, are during some sensitive investigations or during such tactical situation as hostage negotiations or rescues, when police use encrypted channels to avoid being overheard. In Valparaiso, Police Chief

Joe Hart told the Beacon that his

department is researching and trying out digital radios, but emphasized that no decisions have yet been made about if, when, or how to make such a change. "We currently are using two handheld digital radios," Hart said. One is at the dispatch center in the city police station, and one in a patrol car.

The two digital radios, said the chief, "provide a safety net, and allow us to communicate with our sister cities."

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
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
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Niceville crushes Choctaw


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
