#### Baptist Church Egg Hunt

First Baptist Church of Dunnellon will host the second annual Communitywide Easter Egg Hunt at 11 a.m. Saturday at First Baptist Church of Dunnellon. Registration starts at 11 and the hunt begins at 11:20. The event is open to children ages 1 to 10. Food, prizes, balloons, face painting and more will be offered free. Sarah Joe Thomas, event coordinator, said the church is excited to once again offer the event.

"We are thrilled, we had a great response last year," she said, noting about 300 people attended a year ago. "It was just a really fun exciting time. We just wanted to re-create that family friendly, Christ-centered event for people to come be a part of."

Last year, Thomas explained, there were 5,000 eggs, hidden for children to find. She said they'll have about the same amount this year.

"The kids got a lot of candy and prizes," she said. "We think they'll be happy again this year."

The Dunnellon Chamber of Commerce, in partnership with Happy Acres Ranch, will host an Easter egg hunt from 1 to 3 p.m. Saturday, at the ranch at 10051 S.W. 125 Terrace.

### Water Tower taken down

For slightly more than three-quarters of a century, the Dunnellon Water Tower stood as a beacon in the center of town.

The tower served as an iconic landmark for many who have lived here, but for others an eyesore that

had the potential to be a disaster waiting to happen.

For others, as the years have passed and the construction of a new water tower in 1990 provided a new structure for residents, the Historic Water Tower began to lose its shine. In 1990, when the new water

## Agency seeks \$1M grant

Annie W. Johnson Center, Walmart team up for funds

The Annie W. Johnson Family and Senior Center needs the communities help, and a lot of it as the nonprofit agency begins pursuit of a \$1 million grant starting Monday.

Walmart is sponsoring the nationwide contest, which is a part of their "Fighting Hunger Together" campaign. The Arkansas-based big box retailer will award \$2 million in funding to nonprofit agencies such as the Annie W. Johnson Center, which provides food and meals to those in need.

Overall, 200 Walmarts nationwide will compete for the most Facebook page "likes" and the \$1 million grand prize, not that officials are scoffing at the 20 first-place prizes \$50,000 Walmart will award to those stores finishing behind the grand-prize winner.

"We want people to help us as much as they can," Becky Mays, manager at the Dunnellon Walmart, said. "Can you imagine what it would be like for Dunnellon to win this money? It helps our people; it supports our people, the ones who need it most."

"Sure, the million dollars would be great and would help a lot of folks, but the \$50,000 would be a bonus, too."

According to the rules established by Walmart, residents can "like" Walmart once a day through April 30. The Walmart with the most votes at the end of the month will be awarded \$1 million to pass along to a nonprofit agency like the Annie W. Johnson Center. Anyone with a Facebook account can vote daily.

The campaign, the rules state, features the U.S. Department of Labor's top 200 communities with the highest unemployment figures. Larry Cooper, the executive director of try Annie W. Johnson Center, said figures show Marion County is third in the state while ranking 47th nationally. Florida itself is 45th in the nation with an unemployment rate of 9.4 percent, six states rank ahead of Florida in that category.

In 2011, the agency assisted 14,000 individuals and provided 354,000 pounds of food. Cooper said he wants to see the agency

people do survive and that it's a good cause, and we're doing a good thing and she would be proud."

When officials with the American Cancer Society and Dunnellon Relay For Life first approached her, she was hesitant to participate, Gilley explained.

"I didn't want to bring in those memories of what I went through," she said. "Again, the memory of my mom wouldn't let me say no, mom did it for years. I feel like I needed to follow in her footsteps. She was a great supporter of Relay, it was something she cared about, something she was passionate about."

While her mom might be gone, Gilley knows the extended family that will be present at Relay For Life will provide her the support to make it through the night's festivities.

"It's going to be amazing," she said. "I cannot thank them enough for everything everyone has done. They are my family."

"It's very emotional

and overwhelming to see how many people cared about my mom and how involved she was in so many people's lives."

From there, survivors will walk the second lap, with all teams taking to the track for the next 18 hours to raise money for the American Cancer Society, in hopes of one day finding a cure for the dreaded disease.

"Colors of Hope" is the theme this year, said Tammy Myers, event chairwoman, because so many people are affected by the many types of cancer. Myers said her team will certainly be just as emotional as Gilley.

"It's going to be very difficult," Myers said. "Last year, Lori was helping us plan our team and our team activities. None of us had any inkling that this year it would be in honor of her. It's really difficult; it brings it home it could be any one of us. It hits close to home."

In addition to the opening ceremonies, there will be a Survivor's Dinner starting at 6:30 p.m., which Gruff's Tap and Grille will cater the event, said

Jennifer Brannon-McKathon, ACS representative for Dunnellon. She added Gruff's has become a major sponsor of the event this year.

"They've stepped up and have been doing a lot for us," she explained.

In addition to the opening ceremonies, Survivor's Dinner, the traditional luminary, honoring those who've lost their lives to cancer, will start at 9 p.m. Friday. Brannon-McKathon said food, fun and entertainment will be available throughout the evening. She also noted Ocala-based band, the Modules, will perform from 6:30 to 8:30 Friday.

"This is a free, family friendly event, that's open to the public," she said. "They can come and go as they please and we'd love to see everyone come out for a great cause."

provide 1/2 million pounds this year.

"We are one of the neediest communities in the nation," Christine Avina, client services coordinator, said.

Promoting the contest to the community was the focus of a meeting Monday at the Historic Depot, where board members from Annie W. Johnson asked folks from the community how to spread the word.

Intermingled in the crowd were city officials, civic leaders and church members. Several folks suggested pushing the plan among middle and high school students as well as family members who have Facebook accounts.

For those not computer savvy or those without Facebook accounts, it was sug-

gested Greenlight Dunnellon Communications set up a "Voting Booth" during Boomtown Days, which is scheduled April 21 and 22. Harold Horne, community development coordinator with the city of Dunnellon, said setting up a computer and providing Internet access to lure the almost 5,000 visitors at Boomtown Days to vote for the Dunnellon Walmart would be possible.

Not only are officials attempting to push the "Like Dunnellon Walmart" initiative, Annie W. Johnson will set up its truck for residents to make food donations to stock the shelves at the agency. Officials said as spring arrives and Snow Birds head north for the summer months, donations usually dwindle. They're hoping the push to raise awareness of the need for food will spur people to donate during "Fighting

Hunger Together" campaign.

Avina said the more food donated to the agency, the less money is spent trying to find the best bargain and fewer dollars are spent, when it can go to helping people pay their utility bills. With summer approaching and air conditions running, she said higher utility bills are likely.

Avina said volunteers are needed to man the truck while it's park at Walmart during the days it's not being used for food pick-ups.

# City officials need to answer questions

As a resident of Rainbow Springs, I would like to address some items brought up in the past several weeks in guest columns in the Riverland News. There are many issues to address, but here are some critical issues for a start.

The Dunnellon city government has been poorly managed for years. The taxpayer base is too small for all the city services rendered even if the city was run efficiently.

Consolidation with the county for police, fire, roads and other services would have avoided the present situation. Economy of scale, duplication of effort and consolidation of resources, all the code words the city uses to justify the Rainbow Springs Utility purchase certainly apply to a city/county merger.

I believe this merger is what ultimately will happen especially with the Greenlight debt fiasco. The Greenlight debt is secured by city revenue.

How many cities with 1,800 residents and a small tax base can sustain itself in today's economy? Consolidation with the county should have happened years ago.

The Florida Statute 180 was not misinterpreted or misused by the many municipal governments that purchased private utilities. The statute was passed so developers with political muscle could unload their aging utility systems at a premium price to municipal governments.

The city can than pass on the high cost of purchase, plus their even larger profit margin on to the unrepresented, non-voting residents. The surcharge coupled with non-regulation from the PSC encourages cities to do what Dunnellon did. It is in effect a tax without representation.

Dunnellon bought Rainbow Springs Utility to avoid the high rate increases city customers faced, in effect Rainbow Springs will subsidize the city's finan-

cial short fall with utility revenue. It may be legal - maybe - but it is not right.

The purchase of the failed Rio Vista utility is another crucial item that needs exploration. Why would the city purchase a failed, under court order contempt charged, private utility system with only 44 sewage customers?

The city also made an agreement that the Rio Vista residents will only pay 31 percent of the total connection charge whether grant money is secured or not. Why? Why put other utility customers at risk for paying off the more than \$1 million the hook up will cost?

The only semi-official answer I have gotten about this issue is to protect the river from sewage pollution and no other county, state or federal agency would step in and fix the problem of Rio Vista.

Why did the city step in and take on the burden? I do not know the answer to this question, but do any city officials live downstream on the river from Rio

Vista? Has the value of Rio Vista and downstream river property owners improved with the sewage problem solved?

I also believe the hook up of Rio Vista to Rainbow Springs Utility will be the capital improvement. Was the Rainbow Springs Utility purchase plans made before or after the Rio Vista purchase decision? Should the protection of the Rainbow River be shared by the county, state and federal taxpayers up front, not Dunnellon/Rainbow Springs customers?

In my opinion, Rainbow Springs, Rainbow Lake Estates, Lake Tropicanna, Citrus Springs and all surrounding Dunnellon zip code communities have added value to the city of Dunnellon and its businesses within the city limits. None of these communities require or take any Dunnellon resources.

#### Legislation is needed

On March 9, the 2012 legislative session concluded. Unfortunately, no legislation passed addressing the protection against arbitrary evictions for residents living in assisted living facilities (ALFs).


The need for legislation is apparent - the Governor's Assisted Living Facility Workgroup recommended enacting eviction protections for residents of ALFs, and several legislators proposed bills that included additional protections for ALF residents from arbitrary evictions. However, lack of protections for ALF residents remains a reality.

Why are additional laws necessary? Florida law currently allows an ALF administrator to relocate or terminate

Do not surcharge me to finance the "visions" of the city leaders especially with their track record. If the city can grow through normal good governance methodology, which should be the goal, that is fine.



a resident from an ALF for almost any reason, as long as the administrator provides the resident with 45 days' notice and documents the reason. Florida ALF residents, numbering almost 80,000 cannot challenge their eviction in court even though they rent a unit just like an apartment dweller. Although many residents have advanced care needs, similar to residents of nursing homes, they lack a process for an appeal of an involuntary discharge. This leaves Florida's elders vulnerable to threats of retaliation.

Because ALF residents do not have basic due process protections from being asked to leave their homes, administrators may decide to relocate a resident for making what may be legitimate complaints to state agencies involving things like poor care or lack of food. For example, a resident was recently evicted after fil-

ing a complaint with the Ombudsman Program. What was the administrator's reason for evicting the resident? "The resident was not happy here." Incidents like these serve as an example to other residents that if they complain, they could be evicted too.

The Ombudsman Program investigated 75 inappropriate ALF eviction complaints and 72 fear of retaliation complaints during 2010-11. An even greater number of arbitrary discharges may have occurred but were not reported to the Ombudsman Program. When a resident is relocated from an ALF, the facility

is not obligated to report its action to any governmental entity, no matter the circumstances or the frailty of the resident.

How can ALF residents be protected? We need to pass legislation providing basic due process to ALF residents, including the ability to challenge a proposed relocation in a neutral forum and the requirement that a 45-days written notice be handed to the resident, and docu-

mented as being given. Establish standards for the appropriate relocation of residents, such as changes in medical condition, failure to pay, and behavioral changes necessitating a different setting. Require the ALF to notify the Ombudsman Program of any notice issued and permit a representative of the local ombudsman council to meet with the resident and work with the admin-

istrator to resolve the issue, if possible and appropriate.

These recommendations will protect ALF residents from inappropriate evictions, allowing residents to seek redress of any concerns about their care and quality of life without fear of retaliation.

tower was constructed, the Historic Water Tower went offline. It's been used sparingly throughout the years. The last time city officials used it was about a year ago when the other tower had to come off line for its annual five-year inspection.

City Manager Lisa Algieri said a new tower will need to be constructed on the east side of the Rainbow River. If and when that will be done in the coming years is uncertain at this point; however, the new tower will be scheduled for its next inspection in 2016.

The bulk of the 76-year-old structure was dismantled Friday in eight-plus hours, shocking residents and business owners, while causing passing motorists to slow down and gawk as a large crane lowered sections of the water tower to the ground.

"It makes me sad, I didn't know they were tearing it down," said Cole Northsea, a Dunnellon High graduate in town on a weekend break from Florida State University, who spent a good portion of her morning sitting atop her truck watching as crews from Pittsburg Tank & Tower Maintenance dismantled the tower.

"I think they should have tried to save it, it's been there for a long time. It's a part of Dunnellon," she explained.

A group of passing students making the trek to Dunnellon Middle School questioned why the tower was coming down, but their query apparently unheard by a couple of nearby city employees.

Friday wasn't the lone day residents paid their respects.

On Thursday as crews continued with prep work to bring the tower down, Frank Strobl stopped to watch, lamenting the fact a way to save the tower could not be reached. He recalled when a group of citizens banded together in the early 2000s, forming a group called "Save the Water Tower."

He said it was a shame more could not have been done to save the structure and refurbish it.

Officials, though, said the cost to save it was just too much. Because the structure was coated in lead-based paint, another structure would have needed to be placed over it before sand-blasting it. In addition to that, Eddie Esch, public utilities director, said the paint chips would have to be properly collected and disposed of in a safe way. All told, officials said, it would have cost between \$100,000 to \$200,000 to refurbish the structure.

Commissioned in 1936, the cost to erect the now decades-old water tower was more than \$20,000. In 1935, city officials secured a federal grant for more than \$10,000 and a federal grant for \$9,000-plus to cover most of the costs to install the tower as well as run water lines from it.

The company contracted to remove the tower is Pittsburg Tank & Tower Maintenance of Henderson, Ky. The cost to remove the tower is \$12,000; \$4,000 less than a bid received a year ago.

The reduced cost, officials said, was also made possible by the fact the city of Dunnellon partnered with the city of Inverness, which was having an old water tower removed as well. Public Utilities Director Eddie Esch told the Council earlier this year when the bid was awarded that the company said it would have the tower removed within three to four days, barring any complications or inclement weather.

Pittsburg Tank & Tower Maintenance began prepping the tower for dismantling Wednesday and began tearing it apart Friday. Cleanup of the area was finished Monday.

## License-free fresh water fishing available Saturday

The possibilities for taking advantage of the upcoming license-free fishing day, Saturday in Florida are almost endless.

That's because people of all ages can cast their lines into 3 million acres of lakes, ponds and reservoirs and 12,000 miles of fishable rivers, streams and canals.

The hardest part might be picking your destination.

These abundant resources, coupled with responsible freshwater fish management, are why Florida is known as the "Fishing Capital of the World."

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) scheduled the first of four license-free recreational fishing days on this holiday weekend so more people will have the chance to get out and try their luck.

Plus, this weekend coincides

with a productive freshwater fishing period, when the weather is usually pleasant. Many of Florida's recreational sport fishes, such as black bass, bluegill and redear sunfish, move into the shallows to spawn during spring, making them more available for anglers to catch.

The FWC also made June 2 and Sept. 1 license-free saltwater fishing days and set June 9 as the second license-free freshwa-

ter fishing day. These days coincide with a holiday weekend, National Fishing and Boating Week or open-harvest seasons for popular bay scallops, lobster and king mackerel.

All other bag limit, season and size restrictions apply on these dates for recreational, not commercial, fishing.

As far as his future plans, Brill would like to keep playing in college.


