



## Man faces charges in sex crime

**Citrus authorities charge 27-year-old with 27 felonies; Dunnellon levies six felonies**

Law enforcement authorities reported a 27-year-old man faces six felony charges, including two for

lewd and lascivious battery on a child older than 12 but younger than 16, just in Marion County alone.

Reno Wolfgang of Tampa is also being charged with two counts of use of a child

in a sexual performance, one count each of traveling to meet a minor and carrying a firearm during commission of a felony.

All told, Wolfgang's bond was set at \$50,000 for the

charges he faces in Marion County; however, these are not the lone legal issues he is facing.

According to an arrest report from the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, Wolfgang is

being charged with 27 felony crimes, including 14 counts of knowingly transmitting information harmful to a minor; four counts of

#### Marion Sheriff's Office sponsors Teen Driver

The Marion County Sheriff's Office, in partnership with the Florida Sheriff's Association, offers the Teen Driver challenge, a free driver's safety course for young people, ages 15 to 19. The Teen Driver Challenge consists of two training days totaling 12 hours.

The first day includes a four-hour lesson in a classroom setting. The second day is spent on the driving range, giving teens an intense eight-hour and hands-on driver safety lesson.

### Tropical storm creates some havoc around town

Tropical Storm Debby left her mark on Dunnellon the past three days, and she might not be done dumping her deluge of water on the area.

The rainfall soaked the region, mired in a years-long drought. The much-needed rain caused a pine tree on The Granada to uproot and fall on a house. No one was at home at the time, authorities said.

Through Tuesday morning, the season's second named storm had dumped between 6 and 10 inches of rain. State officials are expecting just as much rain to fall when Debby made landfall Wednesday in North Central Florida. The system is expected to take up to three days to make its way across the state before exiting on the East Coast in the Atlantic Ocean.

If that is the case today, Police Chief Joanne Black urges those who don't need to be on the road to stay at home.

"We would just like to ask everyone to use care and caution," she said. "If there is no pressing reason to be out, we ask that you remain at home until the weather clears."

The much-needed rainfall caused minor flooding in the area, Black said. The most noticeable flooding was in the Rain-

bow Plaza, which brought water up to the welcome mat, covering the parking lot with up to 3 feet of water at Cadence Bank.

Bank officials were forced to be creative, setting up curbside service on the back side of the bank. Charlene Williams, branch manager, said making sure customers needs were met was most important.

"This is the worst I've ever seen it," she said, noting the former Superior Bank moved to the location in 2006. "We didn't want to take a chance of a customer damaging their car or injuring themselves while attempting to

get into the bank."

Though the water receded throughout the course of the day, Williams said the bank planned to place sandbags at both the front and back entrances to prevent flooding problems inside the bank as the forecast calls for more rain today as well as throughout the weekend.

Throughout the past five days, Marion County has consistently been under a flash flood warning and tornado watch. As of Tuesday, there was a flash flood warning for the Withlacoochee River.

The Atlantic Hurricane season runs through Nov. 30.

## Council approves new rate study

Project due in time for budget talks

The Dunnellon City Council is wading back into familiar territory again.

The City Council on Monday approved an agreement with Burton & Associates to complete a Water & Sewer Revenue Sufficiency Analysis, including a Rate Structure Analysis, to the tune of \$39,570.

It's the second straight year in which Burton & Associates has been tasked with completing a study regarding the city's water and sewer rate structure. In May 2011, the firm presented the initial results to the City Council, which approved a five-year rate increase plan about a year ago.

When the Council approved that five-year rate increase, it also drew plenty of discord among residents. The city's current plan calls for rate increases of 6.75 percent per year for the next four years, not including the 6.75 percent hike that went into effect Oct. 1, 2011.

However, when the City Council adopted the five-year plan those rate increases were based on the lone acquisition of the Rio Vista Utility System. Since the five-year rate increase was implemented, city officials have added the Rainbow Springs and Juliette Falls Utility System into its customer case.

According to Burton & Associates a year ago, had city officials not added Rio Vista to its system, increases would have been 11 percent a year for the length of the plan.

With the addition of

## FINAL BELL: HULTMAN MARKS END OF CAREER IN EDUCATION

Today closes chapter on 27-year career in district

One doesn't pack memories in boxes; they keep them stored in their conscience forever.

So for Kathy Hultman, as she prepares for her final day as an employee of the Marion County School District, it's now just a matter of packing up a few personal effects still scattered on the walls and shelves of her

office.

Today, marks her final day as a longtime educator in the lone school system she's ever worked for.

Friday, she begins a new life as a retired educator.

"The kids create those memories," she said, a week prior to her official retirement date. "You get very attached to that staff and the kids, you really are a family. I'm going to miss that the most."

Hultman started her career with the Marion County School District in December 1985; she had just completed an internship necessary to acquire her degree from the University of Florida.

"I completed my internship on a Friday; then started working on a Monday," she recalled, noting her first job started the week prior to Christmas

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# Teenage men face charges from burglary

Bond set at \$7,000 for each

Two Dunnellon area teenage men face charges of burglary and grand theft after breaking into a car on Illinois Street and taking up to \$1,400 in stereo equipment, a computer and cash, law enforcement authorities said.

According to reports, Warner "Wayne" Trauthwein, 19, and Shane M. Styers, 18, face one felony count each of burglary of an unoccupied conveyance and grand theft. Bond for each of the young men was set at \$7,000 each.

The report stated Levi Henderson and his roommate heard a noise outside of their apartment on Illinois Street shortly after 1 a.m. Saturday. Upon looking outside, Henderson and his roommate observed Hernandon's vehicle doors wide open.

According to the report, Henderson and his roommate left the apartment in an attempt to locate the suspects. Henderson and his roommate observed Trauthwein and Styers sitting in Syters' silver in color Eclipse, which was pulled over in front of a residence on Illinois Street.

Henderson made contact with Trauthwein at which time Henderson observed his items — two Pioneer brand 12-inch subwoofer speakers, one dual-brand CD receiver, one Eclipse brand amplifier, one Acer brand laptop, one radar detector and \$100 cash — in the backseat of the vehicle, the report stated. At this time, Styers drove away

from the location as Henderson was attempting to reach inside the vehicle to verify he observed his belongings in the car.

According to the report, Cpl. Bruce Arnold and Officer Mike Miley were dispatched to Henderson's apartment at which time he provided authorities both Trauthwein and Styers' names and directions to their residence on Bostick Street. Authorities arrived at the location, the report stated, and observed Styers' vehicle parked in the back yard, hidden behind the residence.

Cpl. Arnold and Miley made contact with both Trauthwein and Styers who were outside, the report stated. After further investigation and separating them, the report stated, each admitted to their involvement in the burglary and theft.

According to the report, Trauthwein said Styers advised him to hide the stolen items in a wooded area of Nine Island Cove. The report noted Styers told authorities he was asked by Trauthwein to assist in stealing the items; however, both provided conflicting statements about who asked who for their involvement.

The report stated Trauthwein and Styers showed authorities where the discarded items could be found in Nine Island Cove. All of the items, but the radar detector was recovered.

According to Marion County Jail Records, both Trauthwein and Styers remained in custody.

all three systems, City Manager Lisa Algiere said it was important for the City Council to review the rates including the tiered structure.

In addition to a newly approved rate study by Burton & Associates, Kimley-Horn and Associates is in the process of finalizing a master plan for Utility Capital Improvements, which would be tied to any rate increase presented by Burton & Associates, Algiere said.

Both the newly created master plan and rate study should be completed by August, Algiere said, in time for the City Council to factor all of the results into the Fiscal

Year 2012-13 Budget. That process will likely begin in late August or September. The FY 2012-13 Budget must be completed and approved by Sept. 30, because the city's fiscal year runs from Oct. 1 to Sept. 30.

In other action, the Council:

- Authorized Fire Chief Joe Campfield to proceed with the Assistance to Firefighters Grant Application.

- Authorized the mayor to sign an agreement with PS Group Consultants for Engineering Services for Greenlight Dunnellon Communications.

- Approved the purchase of a 2011 Chevy pickup from Gary Stevenson's Dunnellon Motors in the amount of \$22,649. According to city officials, the vehicle will be fur-

nished to the Rainbow Springs crew leader. Currently, they use their personal vehicle at an average cost to the city of \$600 per month.

- Approved the purchase of a 2005 Ford F550 Super Duty Bucket Truck from PDQ CATV in the amount of \$21,000. The vehicle will be used for maintenance and installation of aerial fiber.

- Approved the purchase of fiber and conduit runs from Service & Tech Solutions in the amount of \$88,000. The material will be used for Rainbow Springs — The Woodlands and Rainbows End.

- Approved the inspections and pre-attachment engineering agreement

with Sole Source in the amount of \$25,000.

- According to officials, the request is to increase an additional \$25,000 for a total amount of \$53,128.54. This is a requirement of the city's pole rental agreement with Progress Energy for all aerial fiber runs.

- Approved the purchase of Neptune Meters and Antennas from Sunstate Meter in the amount of \$26,654.50. The city plans to use the items to continue installation of radio-read meters.

- Approved the purchase of backflow preventers from HD Waterworks in the amount of \$9,292. The deal allows the city to restock its supply.

# City's purchase of golf course would create a hazard

Two different folks shared their opinions in the most recent edition of the *Riverland News* about the potential of the city purchasing Rainbow Springs Golf & Country Club.

One person, a letter writer, was tongue in cheek in reasoning, and if readers didn't pick up immediately that the idea was absurd, we suggest you re-read the letter.

The other person, columnist Walt Wayne, was rather serious; at least that's how we determined the tone of his suggestion.

However, for those folks out there who might be concerned the city is actually contemplating a purchase of a privately owned golf course and turning it into a municipal (public) course, we can assure that won't happen.

OK, so perhaps we should be cautious about any assurance we receive from city officials.

They've given us plenty of reason to be cautious in the past two years. (i.e., red-light cameras are for calming traffic, not revenue); a fiber to the home program (to create job opportunities for local residents and to attract high-tech Industry); and the purchase of a utility system in top shape (add a 25 percent surcharge and later tell customers the system needs millions in repairs and upgrades).

However, let's point out the cons about purchasing the nearby local course.

First, the asking price is too much. Spruce Creek Preserve along the State Road 200 corridor between County Road 484 and County Road 39 sold for much less about a year ago.

Secondly, the maintenance and upkeep of a course is costly. Mak-

ing sure the right course superintendent and golf pro are on your staff is essential.

Third, the current membership is likely to revolt, setting off another potential firestorm among its existing members. There is a reason they belong to a private course, not a public facility. Less traffic on the course keeps it in better condition.

Frankly, most folks who likely belong to a country club aren't your ordinary duffers, they know how to play. They don't want your average John Q. Public and his buddies showing up at the course, treating the carts like race cars and causing a drunken ruckus (reference "Caddy Shack").

Finally, the idea of the city purchasing the club is absurd. It would require more borrowed money (we think the city has done enough borrowing for the foresee-

able future), and most importantly, we'd prefer the government stay out of the picture when it comes to running a business. Let the folks who know about golf courses run the golf courses.

And if you have any knowledge of the game whatsoever, let's consider the past few ideas the city has undertaken — red-light cameras, construction of its one fiber network and the purchases of privately owned utility companies — as errant tee shots that have found their way into the thickest rough on the course. Officials can still be found knee high in the rough, still hacking their way out of the problem.

We would recommend for those who think it is still a great idea the city explore this option to take a mulligan.

### Perhaps mayor should take close look at remarks

Re: "Congressman visits with business owners, officials," *Riverland News*, Thursday, June 21, 2012.

There was an interesting statement in this newsy piece by Mayor (Fred) Ward of Dunnellon.

In his effort to "court/impress" the visit by Rep. Cliff Stearns, R-Ocala, he takes license to vilify the taxpaying county residents living north of Walmart (he makes no mention of those living south across the Withlacoochee River).

He expresses a disdain for rooftops and says: "Without jobs you cannot have the rooftops." And furthermore, he says no way he wants to annex Rainbow Springs in that "they suck the services out of our City." ... "We don't want to annex a bunch of rooftops."

When he gets his foot out of his mouth, perhaps the good mayor should sit down with a pencil and paper and figure out just what those rooftops are worth in terms of feeding the property tax revenues of Marion County of which Dunnellon is a part.

For instance, approximately along every 75 to 100 feet of roadway in Rainbow Springs alone there sits a rooftop paying \$1,500 to \$2,500 in annual property taxes.

If you cannot figure this out, perhaps you should call up Mr. George Albright, Marion County Tax Assessor, he might provide you with some interesting figures taken directly off the books. And if you're truly interested in sources of revenue, you might also find that a pretty good slice of the disposable income from these "sucking" rooftops finds its way into the retail coffers of Dunnellon.


Furthermore, perhaps this would also be a good time for Mr. Mayor, et. al., to revisit Lester Dinkins book, "Dunnellon," which provides a pretty good account of historical events that took place in this region of Marion, some of which were not all that beneficial to all the people all the time.

"Boomtown Days" is really somewhat of a farce that celebrates a shameful past when "capitalism" running rampant in the quest for quick riches, left the community as well as the landscape in shambles.

Why not face a few facts? Dunnellon, built along a coal railway line, is a quaint town that has served well as a destination for sport fishermen and others seeking water recreation in a natural setting.

Indeed, the subdivisions surrounding it were located because of these same benefits ... all unique benefits that seem to fly over the heads of Dunnellon leadership. Way back, when cheap real estate was a good incentive for commercial development. No longer is that true. The bubble has burst and recession has set in.

Dunnellon has a minimal population and still fewer assets to attract heavy industry for the purpose of job creation, and ironically, if any jobs were created

# 'Speaking Up' at Silver Springs

This past Saturday we drove about 28 miles over to Silver River State Park near Silver Springs to meet up with about 1,200 other angry Floridians who basically all got together to scream in unison to send a message to those in power.

We told them just how mad we were about the fact that Florida's natural springs, Silver Springs as well as others, were under constant developer and agribusiness assault without letup and that we were not going to take it anymore.

The Florida Conservation Coalition led by former Gov. and Sen. Bob Graham did not mince any words about why they had come to Ocala to lead this rally — to ratchet up pressure on those who have the power to make the decisions over our water resources, from Gov. Rick Scott on down, to take real action to stop the continuing detrimental practices that are siphoning off unsustainable quantities of water from our aquifers and poisoning those that remain by the unabated runoff from industrial and agribusiness operations, despite lip service to the contrary.

From the stage set up under a large

tent, which only served to hold in the heavy blanket of humidity that covered us all, several of the speakers recounted their individual memories from their visits to Florida's oldest tourist attraction during their respective youth; remembering the magnificent beauty, clarity and vitality of the Silver River and the springs that had created it.

They made comparisons between its clarity then and the current cloudiness of the river now and warned that if the dwindling flow rate of the springs is not turned around soon Silver Springs will disappear as others already have like the Kissengen Springs near Bartow.

Charles Lee of the Audubon Society painted the clearest and also the starkest picture of the plight of Silver Springs by reciting the severity of the diminishing flow rate statistics from more than 800 cubic feet per second just 12 years ago to 250 cubic feet per second now.

This fact gives credence to the prediction that Silver Springs remaining timeline, after its eons of existence,

I would like to think the love and protection we give them make them stronger and more confident. However, I cannot take all the credit. I think some of that just comes naturally.



**Congressman needs to clarify his position**

The following letter was sent to the office of Congressman Cliff Stearns following the published article in the *Riverland News* of his recent visit.

No reply as of yet; will be glad to post any reply received.

Memo to the mayor, Rainbow Springs is relieved that annexing our rooftops is not being considered. I believe that we would rather have a better managed government entity like Somalia or Greece over Dunnellon City management.

To Congressman Stearns: I just read the *Riverland News* article dated June 21, 2012, about your recent

visit to Dunnellon, Fla.

In the article, Congressman Stearns seemed to praise the Greenlight Communications business endeavor by the city. If Congressman Stearns is the conservative he claims to be, how could he support this venture?

Greenlight Communication funded by government money competes with private enterprise (Comcast, ATT, Dish, DirectTV, Verizon), which services Dunnellon with communications services.

With a borrowed \$7.5 million secured by government tax revenue, the city has tried to compete against established companies that provide good, affordable service already.

Do your research and you understand this project does not deserve "stimulus" funds. Greenlight Communications will bankrupt this city of 1,800 people with a tax base of about 1,850 taxpayers. Please research it and rethink the issue.

The other point in the article is a mention of support for the city's foresight about implementing the utility system. I do not know if you are aware, but the city government recently purchased the free standing Rainbow Springs Utility for \$6.5 million dollars (a utility appraised for \$3.5 million).

Rates on 1,500 county residents who cannot vote about Dunnellon City issues were raised and a 25 percent surcharge added to non-city residents.

Of course, this has created quite an uproar. I will not go into further detail as your staff can do their background work and fill you in on the details.

I am writing you this email to let you know that I believe you were not aware of all aspects of what is happening in Dunnellon City and the surrounding areas.

As a conservative, surely you cannot support city government money being used to compete against private enterprise.

The city manager knows that the reason they did not even apply for a federal grant is that Dunnellon is not an underserved community. We are currently serviced at competitive rates.

The utility purchase of the private owned utility

company was to finance a city drowning in debt. If there are your true outlooks on the state of Dunnellon city affairs as stated in the article you will lose a lot of support in the Rainbow Springs area.

I would hope you would contact the local newspaper and clarify your position.

Stimulus money for an unneeded fiber optic system that is broke is more of a Democratic solution.

could be between 12 years or just a short 20 months depending whether you use the most conservative method of computation or the least conservative method.

Most of the speakers, including long-time state Sen. Lee Constantine, cognizant of the historic schism between the environmental community and Florida's agribusiness-development complex, made sure to try to bridge that gap by stressing the belief that our state's future economic wellbeing is dependent upon saving Florida's water resources, because they are why people have always come to Florida all the way back to Ponce de Leon; and why they will continue to come here in the future.

Sen. Graham said they were there to draw a line in the sand on the bank of Silver River beyond, which they would not retreat in their defense of Florida's precious water resources. He and the others basically said that if Floridians were not willing to fight to save their iconic Silver Springs then what would they be willing to fight for?

Failure to win their fight to save Silver Springs would in effect be the death knell for the continued existence of Florida's remaining springs, including our own Rainbow Springs. Rainbow Springs is physically connected to Silver Springs, so its fate is inextricably tied to that of Silver Springs.

All of the support groups of the various springs and waterways were eager to tell us what they had been doing and trying to do to improve the state of our water resources in North Central Florida. The most interesting fact I came away from visiting and talking to them was that they were not connected and as a rule did not usually work in unison. In light of what we heard from the

speakers on the stage and their pleas for united citizen action in the fight to save Silver Springs and other water resources, I had to wonder why these groups hadn't worked together more often in the past for the preservation of the entire system.

All in all it was a nice day to be a Floridian. We met a lot of very nice people who love this state and who were there to find out what they could do to try to preserve its natural wonders for future generations.

We also met some dedicated public servants and hardworking volunteers who worked together to make it a visitor-friendly experience including free parking and tram rides down to the river. Charles Lee encouraged all of us to get on the trams and take a look at the river now since it wouldn't be there much longer if those in Tallahassee do not do the right thing to ensure its survival.

We went down to the river and it was sad - I had visited Silver Springs before, but had not been back in decades and the water sure looked bad, real bad! A far cry from what I remembered it being.

As I looked at it, I could only think about our beautiful Rainbow River and Springs and the dreaded thought that since they are connected to Silver Springs it could be possible that they too could end up in this sorry condition. Connected or not the Rainbow or any river including the Withlacoochee, a stretch of which went dry this Spring and only three other times ever just within the past few years, can be damaged if our local officials fail to protect them from the damaging runoff that increases pollution and nutrients and by not stopping excessive consumption by both residential landowners and commercial interests.

It was pointed out at the event that the biggest and most unreasonable

and unproductive use of our water is by those of us who are raising a cashless crop - grass. Over fifty percent of our most precious of all resources - water is thrown away to grow a crop that is mowed down and then thrown away into our landfills. Residents including us in Rainbow Springs need to think about how much grass we cultivate on our lots. That water we are wasting to raise a useless crop could be the water we need to keep up the flow rate of Rainbow Springs by recharging it thus preserving it and the river it creates which together constitute the true economic engine of our community.

I personally will not have a lawn. I am not saying that in an effort to make you think that I am a great conservationist, because I am not. One summer, when I was a kid, my brother and I got jobs mowing lawns for a landscaper. Not only were these huge lawns of great estates built on the slopes of hilly country, but our employer made us use hand movers. That seemingly endless summer of backbreaking lawn mowing made me swear off ever wanting to be the proud owner a beautiful manicured and well mowed lawn for the rest of my life.

We have and still do opt for a natural yard as grass free as possible. I encourage all my readers to take steps to scale back or eliminate your lawns not only to replenish our watershed and Springs, but also to save yourselves time, work and money (a whole lot of

money especially if you are among the surchargees of the city owned Rainbow Springs utility.) In light of what I heard Saturday, I urge you to check out a practice called xeriscaping.

The Florida Springs Institute ([floridaspringsinstitute.org](http://floridaspringsinstitute.org)) asks you to do four things to save the springs: first turn off your sprinklers; second don't fertilize your lawn; third go to a water meeting to learn more and fourth talk to your elected officials. The Silver Springs Alliance ([silverspringsalliance.org](http://silverspringsalliance.org)) adds that there are three things that your government should do: first reduce permitted groundwater withdrawals; second establish minimum flows that fully protect the springs; and third fully fund springs restoration efforts.

There were two reasons why there was such an overflowing crowd there Saturday - one was because people are incensed over the water consumption permit sought by Adena Springs Ranch.

break. "That's when the kids are the rowdiest, and the class was a mixture of students from three grade levels. I had all sorts of challenges that first week."

None of which ever deterred Hultman.

"I love coming to work," she said. "I would have paid them to let me work."

Hultman remained at Dunnellon Elementary School for 15 years. She remembers when Dunnellon Middle School housed both elementary and middle school students. That's before the district built what is now Dunnellon Elementary School.

Hultman recalled the added technology at the time in the classrooms at the then newly built facility created a buzz among the administration, staff, teachers and students.

"We were all so tickled, so ecstatic from the newness of it all," Hultman explained. "(the building) was all so fresh. It sparked a lot of creativity and new energy among the teachers."

It wouldn't be long though before Hultman would leave "home."

In 2000, she transferred to Sparr Elementary School for her first administrative position. She served there for four years, before relocating to Romeo Elementary as an assistant principal. Hultman was in that position for two years, being promoted to principal in 2006.

Having worked at Romeo for the past eight years, Hultman said, was like being part of a large, intimate family.

"When people come here, they stay here," she said. "We haven't had a lot of turnover during my time here; the students stay here, too, because they enjoy being here."

The faces of the students have changed as much as the technology throughout the course of her career. Hultman has witnessed firsthand how chalkboards have become obsolete, as more

and more schools have switched to white boards (dry erase) or smart boards, which can hook to a computer and display the information for students in the classrooms.

"If we buy a box of chalk now, it lasts the whole year," she explained. "I remember the chalkboard used to be my right arm when I was teaching. It's all changed so much, there's just no comparison. It's so different, we do everything electronically now from providing textbooks to recording grades. Technology has come a long, long way in a short period of time."

"It used to be, when you had to communicate with a teacher you had to send a note to their classroom, now you can just turn around and send them an email."

Hultman recalled in the late 1980s and early 1990s when she and other teach-

ers had to learn how to use Apple computers. They would haul the monitors and towers from school to the district office.

Hultman recalled she always went with Susan Williams to the training, and how Williams was "always pregnant."

"So I stacked the computers on top of each other and carried hers, too," Hultman explained with a wide smile. "She just sent me an email recently and told me not to be a stranger, that I should volunteer some. She even offered to carry the computers for me. She ended the email with 'Thank God for iPads.'"

Hultman said the best part of her job is the impact she's had on thousands of lives throughout the past 27 years. She's even hired teachers who were once students.

"When did I become older

than everyone?" she jokingly questioned. "It's definitely weird when you hire a former student, but at the same time, I recently had one of them tell me, 'I hope I can be as good as you are one day.' That's the best compliment one can ever get."

The toughest challenge of her career isn't the changes in education, testing and budgets, but dealing with tragedies. Sharing the news of a death of a teacher, staffer or a student's family member is always difficult.

"It's always, always been the hardest part of the job," she said. "It affects us all, because everyone here knows everyone. We're a family."

As for what retirement holds, Hultman is unsure. She does plan to spend more time with her 12-year-old grandson and 3-year-old granddaughter.

"Camp Grandma" opens in the next couple of weeks, it's earlier this year," she exclaimed. "Usually, we always had to work around my schedule, but not this year."

Hultman said she won't miss the fire alarms, the early morning phone calls when security alarms go off; but it's the connection she had with students, staff and parents she's going to miss the most.

"I think you become disconnected from the community when you're not always around it, and that makes me sad," she explained.

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## Agencies combine to enhance service to citizens

*DEP, DACS to merge July 1 with FWS*

Officers and staff from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and the Department of Agricultural and Consumer Services (DACs) will be combined with the Florida

Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) July 1 in a move directed by the Florida Legislature and approved by Gov. Rick Scott.

The 145 new sworn officers will don FWC uniforms and integrate completely into the

ranks of the FWC, resulting in more efficient service to Floridians and visitors.

"We will have more field-level officers available to respond to calls," said Col. Jim Brown, division director. "New and current FWC officers will be expected to patrol state forests, state parks, wildlife management areas and state

waters as a more efficient and effective team."

The reorganization will save the state more than \$3 million over the next five years and \$1.28 million in recurring, annual savings.

"Through rearranging extra management and support positions, the consolidation will establish additional patrol and

first-response capabilities and expand law enforcement coverage," Brown said.

The public can expect to see FWC officers in state parks and state forests and call upon them for help.

"We will continue to provide excellent resource protection,

boating-and-waterways services and public safety protection," Brown said.

People should report fish and wildlife crimes, boating violations as well as environmental crimes and state park and state forest issues to the FWC's Wildlife Alert Hotline: 888-404-3922.

DEP's Bureau of Emergency Response (BER) will not move to the FWC, but will continue responding to emergency chemical spills and working with law enforcement on environmental crime matters at DEP DEP's emergency numbers, #DEP or 877-2-SAVEFL should be used to report environmental emergencies, such as oil and chemical spills.

"The consolidation of officers will provide a more extensive network of environmental crime law enforcement coverage throughout Florida," said BER Chief Gwen Keenan. "DEP's Bureau of Emergency Response will continue to work closely with

its law enforcement partners on environmental crime issues as it has done in the past."

In 2011 the Florida Legislature created a Law Enforcement Consolidation Task Force, which met to develop work groups and evaluate functions of several law enforcement agencies. Ultimately, it recommended that DEP's Division of Law Enforcement be integrated into the FWC's Division of Law Enforcement. It also suggested that some person-

nel from the DACS Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement — the officers assigned to patrol state forests and the investigator responsible for commercial aquaculture violations — be incorporated.

"FWC officers in the field have been working alongside DEP and DACS officers for years," Brown said. "The consolidation simply provides an official, more efficient method of serving the public."

The bidding:

Opening lead — jack of clubs.

Good timing is extremely important in the play of many hands. When declarer has several different things to do, the order in which he does them frequently makes the difference between success and failure.

Consider this deal where West leads a club against four spades. How should South proceed? Let's say he starts by winning the club with the king and returns a trump. East takes the ace and plays another club. South

must now go down one, losing a trick in each suit, since the diamond and heart finesses both lose when they are attempted.

The outcome is surely unlucky, but it can be traced to a wrong choice of plays. Declarer should not stake his chances on either of the red-suit finesses working when there is a more promising approach available.

When dummy comes down, he should realize that there is more urgent business to attend to than tackling trumps at once. An early trump lead gives the defense time to establish a club trick. Instead, declarer should win the club lead with the king and play the A-10 of hearts, deliberately rejecting the heart finesse in order to establish an immediate heart trick in dummy.

If South plays in this fashion, he winds up losing only a spade, a heart and a diamond, and so makes the contract. West can take his king of hearts and return a club, but South wins with dummy's ace and discards his remaining club on the queen of hearts.

By attacking hearts first, South wins the crucial race against time. He develops a heart trick before the defense can develop a club trick. If declarer leads the wrong suit at trick two, he loses a vital tempo and goes down one.

traveling to seduce/solicit a child in a sex act; three counts of compile/enter/transmit with a computer minor information; two counts of attempt to commit an offense prohibited by law; two counts of use/display/attempt to use a firearm while committing a felony; two counts of lewd and lascivious battery on a child older than 12 but younger than 16. His bond for Citrus County charges was set at \$87,000.

According to reports, authorities from Dunnellon Police Department, working in conjunction with the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, were told by the victim the incident occurred Dec. 31, 2011.

The report stated the victim met with Citrus County Sheriff's Office Detective Kat Liotta in May. She was in fear of Wolfgang, who threatened to post pornographic pictures and videos of her as well as videos of her engaging in sexual acts, because he was angry with the victim because she was dating someone else. The victim told authorities about multiple incidents in which the two engaged in sexual intercourse as well as pornographic photographs at Wolfgang's re-

quest.

Posing as the victim, Detective Liotta contacted Wolfgang via texts and emails. She arraigned to meet Wolfgang with a 15-year-old friend at a local store. She instructed Wolfgang to purchase alcohol and cigarettes for her as well as an iTunes gift card.

During the June 17 meeting with him, Detective Kat Liotta was working inside the store posing as a trainee. She witnessed Wolfgang purchase the alcohol she had instructed him. Upon Wolfgang exiting the store, Citrus County authorities apprehended him and took him into custody.

Wolfgang was read his Miranda Rights at which time he agreed to speak with detectives. He agreed to knowing the victim, having traveled to Citrus County on more than one occasion; however, Wolfgang stopped the interview and requested an attorney.

Wolfgang's vehicle was seized and an inventory was conducted, revealing he had brought sex toys, a camera, cell phone, computer, two firearms and cigarettes.

According to the Dunnellon Police Department report, the victim told authorities Wolfgang picked her up Dec. 31, 2011, from

her home in Citrus County, bringing her to a local motel inside the Dunnellon city limits.

The victim told authorities, the report stated, that Wolfgang stopped at a gas station and when he exited the vehicle he removed a black automatic handgun from a holster on his right hip and placed it next to her. Upon his return to the vehicle, Wolfgang was again in possession of the weapon for the remainder of their time together.

According to the report, Wolfgang then drove the victim to a hotel in Dunnellon where he rented a room. The victim told authorities she and Wolfgang engaged in sexual and oral intercourse.

Wolfgang then requested the victim pose while he took pictures of her. The report also stated Wolfgang took pictures of the two of them naked while standing in front of the mirror as well as pictures of them kissing.

According to the report, the victim told authorities all actions in the photographs were at the request and instruction of Wolfgang, who took the pictures using a small camera which he brought with him and took after their meeting.


