Vice Mayor Stark dies at 73

The name plate read F.C. Stark, Vice Mayor.

But to many, he was Fred, more notably Starkie.

Frederick "Fred" C. "Starkie" Stark, the vice mayor of Dunnellon, died Mon-

day, July 2, at the age of 73.

Stark had served on the City Council since 2006 after a long and distinguished career with the New York Fire Department. He retired from there, relocating to Florida. Once here, he served as a Bureau Chief at the Florida State Fire College in Ocala, retiring in 1993. He had a master's degree from

Fordham University.

Robert Altman, Stark's son-in-law and family spokesman, said the family is doing well despite the circumstances.

"It's just one of those things that are not expected of course," Altman said, noting the death is being ruled as a cardiac, but it's not yet been confirmed. "He was the pillar of the family."

Stark and his wife, Juliette, celebrated their 56th anniversary this year. The couple has been together since they were 12 years old, Altman said.

"If you're looking for guidance on a relationship that's the kind of people you want to look to," he explained. "He was a very great father in law; we always got along great. We had a very good bond. I had a lot of respect for him. He was a very smart man. He was



Local Sonic competing in company games, in semifinals

2012 is the time for all the games to begin, even for restaurants.

The 16th annual national Dr. Pepper Sonic Games have been going on for awhile now. Narrowing about 2,900 stores from the contest to 668, the games are moving onto the semifinals round.

About 175 Florida stores entered the contest; however, 11 Florida-based stores remain, including the local Dunnellon Sonic, which is a semifinals contestant.

The whole store competes through rigorous questions and has to perform their normal job positions.

"We do a lot of studying through a program called e-learning and just practicing our overall position every day," said Bobby Hubbard, the manager at the Dunnellon Sonic for about four years.

Hubbard has been with Sonic for 28 years, taking his 1997 team to the final 12.

Every year, Sonics around the nation register to compete in the games for roughly \$400. From January on, employees begin to study and prepare waiting for the games to begin.

"I believe it is good for the workers to compete like this," Hubbard said. "They learn their position while having

fun."

The competition last is for about five months out of the year.

The competition goes from preliminary to semifinals, then top 48 and, at last, the final 12 stores.

"It is a proven fact that stores that compete in this type of competition have better sales," Hubbard said.

Not only is the staff at the Dunnellon Sonic prepping for the nationwide competition,

they are learning the ins and outs of the newest addition to the fast food establishment.

Store owners recently added a drive-thru window, Hubbard said.

"Instead of the older version where you had to wait for your food or drinks and have it carhopped to you, now you pull up to the drive-thru window and pick up your food," he explained, noting carhops still deliver food if you are stuck behind the car that is at the window.

"It gives us more personal one-on-one time with the customer where we actually get to talk to them instead of here's your food, bye," Hubbard explained. "To add on, it makes it faster and more efficient than before."

Store owners are considering adding a television screen above the window, so as customers wait they can watch Sonic commercials.

"Taking care of customers is the main goal you have and that is the No. 1 thing you must do in order to get far in the games," Hubbard said. "I believe I have a good crew this year and that we will make it far in this competition."

Hubbard is also trying to set up a local competition for area Sonics to compete for which chain is the best. He hopes to have details worked out later this year.

Deputy struck by vehicle, out of hospital

Hernandez hit by car Saturday

A Marion County Sheriff's deputy who had been in stable condition after being struck by a car Saturday afternoon while directing traffic on U.S. 41 in front of St. John the Baptist Catholic Church has been released from the hospital, a Marion County Sheriff's spokeswoman said.

According to reports, Deputy Luis Hernandez, who was wearing his road guard vest, was struck and fell to the ground, when an 85-year-old woman drove her Nissan Maxima into the law enforcement official.

The report stated Hernandez motioned for Rita C. Ryan, the motorist, to exit the church. She did, however, authorities said she drove the car into the deputy, which propelled him over the vehicle's hood.

According to the report, Hernandez's head hit the ground and he had lacerations on his back as well as possible stomach injuries.

The report stated Hernandez was able to call dispatch himself to let them know about the incident. The deputy was airlifted to Shands Hospital in Gainesville. The accident, which was called in at 5:32 p.m., forced authorities to close the roadway for about two hours as officials worked the scene.

According to the report, Ryan had left the church and was on her way home. Her speed was slow and she showed no signs of impairment. She provided a blood sample.

Hernandez has been a deputy with the sheriff's office for less than a year.

The accident remains under investigation.

Actually, it makes perfect sense when you consider that Florida leads the nation with 18 percent of its population age 65 and older. In fact, by the year

2030, over 27 percent will be over age 65, with half of those 75 or older. Mirroring this growth, an increasing proportion of drivers in Florida are getting older. Currently, nearly 3 million drivers in Florida are over age 65. "Most people experience a steady decline in some of the skills needed to safely drive as we get older, however, these changes do not affect all drivers at the same age or in the same way," says Gail Holley, Florida Department of Transportation's Safe Mobility for Life Program and Research Manager. "It is important for everyone to understand the impact

that aging can have on their driving and learn the warning signs and resources that are available to them so they can make the transition when driving may no longer be a safe option." The guide is designed to help aging drivers strike a balance between safety and the need for independence. The hope is that users of the guide will take the time to consider their driving abilities, take steps to improve their driving skills, explore other transportation options if needed, and start making a plan for retirement from driving if it becomes necessary in the future.

always willing to help somebody."

Mayor Fred Ward learned of Stark's passing late Monday morning.

"My condolences go out to his wife, Juliette, and their children. He was so healthy and full of life and he will be missed by the City Council and city staff," Ward said.

Ward said he'll miss the end of meetings when he would ask Stark for a motion to adjourn the meeting.

"His response was always, 'you got it.' It had become quite a ritual between us and I will miss it dearly," Ward said. "We had learned to work together in a positive and friendly way and he will be missed by me. I will miss his ability to get the nub of an issue."

City Manager Lisa Algieri said she learned a lot from Stark, especially from his experience as a firefighter.

"In dealing with him as a councilman he was always

very caring of the community. He always wanted to know if what we were doing was best for the community," Algieri said. "I will personally miss him. He was like a mentor to me with all the life experiences he shared. I will miss him very much. His smile always lit up the room."

Louise Kenney, who served on the Council with Stark from 2006 to 2008, was shocked and saddened to hear the news about her former colleague.

"He was totally committed to the city, he cared about the people who lived here, he was a," she said, pausing. "He was a great leader. I will miss him dearly."

"My prayers go to the family and Juliette."

Services are pending. However, in lieu of flowers, the family requests donations be made to the Wounded Warrior Foundation or Dunnellon Fire Rescue.

Stark is survived by his wife, Juliette; two children, Christopher Stark and Suzette Altman, and several grandchildren.

offer youths a better perspective of the practical operation of government and to show that the individual is responsible for character and success for government.

Officials choose 530 boys from Florida each year and boys must have a 3.2 GPA or above to attend. Molloy has a 4.0 GPA and Smith is upholding a 3.72 GPA.

Each delegate is assigned to a political party which has no philosophy or platform until the delegates develop one.

"I wanted to go because I love history, and I wanted to learn more about my government and my state," Molloy said.

They collect credits as they attend this course. They also have the possibility to get a scholarship from Tallahassee Community College with the remaining two years at Florida State University.

"I am looking to go to USF or UCF," Smith said. "But if I received the scholarship I would definitely go to FSU."

Previous boys who have participated have met with governors, cabinet members, legislators, Florida Supreme Court Justices and military officials from service academies.

"I am ready to meet new people and visit the state capitol since I have never been there before," Molloy said.

Both boys heard about this event through Ms. Love, their guidance counselor at Dunnellon High School.

"I am most excited for a new experience and for meeting new people," Smith said.

Both Molloy and Smith want to major in engineering.

After the boys graduate from this program, it will place them with the ranks of alumni such as

former Gov. Charlie Crist, President Bill Clinton, Congressman Trent Lott and radio host Rush Limbaugh to name a few.

"I think this is a good program to get involved in," said George Wehrli, Boys State chairman. "It teaches the kids about their government and looks good for the future."

County taking applications for Comp Plan amendments

The Marion County Growth Management Department (Planning Division) is now accepting applications for small- and large-scale land use changes, or amendments, to the Marion County Comprehensive Plan 2035 on a daily basis. Previously, applications were only accepted during limited application cycles throughout the year, per Florida statutes.

Owners interested in changing their land's designated use, such as

going from rural to commercial use, are eligible to apply for a small- or large-scale amendment. Small-scale amendment applications may be submitted for land 10 acres or less in size. Large-scale amendment applications may be submitted for any number of acres.

The amendment applications may be picked up at the department (2710 E. Silver Springs Blvd., Ocala) or downloaded from http://www.marioncountyfl.org/Planning/land_use.aspx beginning July 2, 2012. Required

public hearings associated with the amendment requests will be scheduled as soon as possible and on an as-needed basis upon receipt of completed eligible applications.

Growth Management hosts amendment application cycles as part of its activities to keep the county's comprehensive plan up to date. The plan

Get your SS statement online

If you would like to get a Social Security Statement, which provides estimates of your future benefits, it is now available online at www.socialsecurity.gov.

"Our new online Social Security Statement is simple, easy-to-use and provides people with estimates they can use to plan for their retirement," said Michael J. Astrue, Commissioner of Social Security. "The online Statement also provides estimates for disability and survivors benefits, making the Statement an important financial planning tool. People should get in the habit of checking their online Statement each year, around their birthday, for example."

In addition to helping with financial planning, the online Statement also provides workers a convenient way to determine whether their earnings are accurately posted to their Social Security records. This feature is important because Social Security benefits are based on average earnings over a person's lifetime. If the information is incorrect, the person may not receive proper benefits.

The online Statement provides you the opportunity to save or print the document for future reference, or to have handy for discussions with family members or a financial planner.

According to the American Customer Satisfaction Index, users are giving the online Statement a score of 89, making it competitive with our other top-rated, best-in-government online services, such as the Retirement Estimator and online retirement application.

To get a personalized online Statement, you must be age 18 or older and must be able to provide information about yourself that matches information already on file with Social Security. In addition, Social Security uses Experian, an external authentication service provider, for further verification. You must provide identifying information and answer security questions in order to pass this verification. Social Security will not share your Social Security number with Experian, but the identity check is an important part of this new, thorough verification process.

When your identity is verified, you can create a "My Social Security" account with a unique user name and password to access your online Statement. In addition, your online Statement includes links to information about other online Social Security services, such as applications for retirement, disability, and Medicare.

Congressman needs to understand situation better

Re: Article about Rep. Stearns in the June 21, 2012, edition of the *Riverland News*. This letter was sent to Rep. Stearns and the letter writer asked that it be printed in its entirety.

Rep. Stearns, I read in our local newspaper that you visited Dunnellon to talk with business owners, local officials and constituents. It's unfortunate that you didn't take the time to also visit with your constituents just north of Dunnellon in Rainbow Springs.

The population of Dunnellon is about 1,800 and only about 1,500 of them are over the age of 18. I don't know what their voting record is, but I would venture to say it's less than 50 percent.

On the other hand, Rainbow Springs is about 2,500 residents and 99 percent are voting age. As a retirement community of former career military, retired airline pilots, judges and senior corporate managers, we are very concerned about government, and we vote.

It was interesting to note that Dunnellon city officials touted their fiber to the home project. Did they mention that they were deep in debt, over a year behind schedule and had missed the first loan payment on the project?

Did they mention that close to 2,000 residents in Rainbow Springs have signed a pledge to boycott the fiber project to protest Dunnellon's water rates? It now looks like they want you to find federal grant money to bail them out.

You campaign as a conservative. I was under the impression that conservatives want to stop government handouts to loser projects like Dunnellon Greenlight.

Dunnellon has embarked on a series of projects with one purpose - find revenue to get them out of debt. Can you imagine a city of 1,800 being \$20 million in debt?

The residents of Rainbow Springs have been at odds with Dunnellon officials since December 2011. Maybe a little background information would be appropriate.

On Dec. 28, 2011, the Dunnellon City Council held a "public hearing" concerning a resolution to purchase the water utility serving Rainbow Springs.

As part of the acquisition, the city raised the water rates, instituted a tiered rate structure and added a 25 percent surcharge on top of the increases.

The "public hearing" was a thing of beauty.

Hundreds of Rainbow Springs residents tried to attend, but the mayor ordered police to close the doors because of limited seating in the facility. These people were, in effect, barred from attending a "public hearing."

During the hearing, when the mayor was asked why the city was applying a 25 percent surcharge, his response was "because we can."

Following the acquisition, water rates

in Rainbow Springs have forced hundreds of residents to install irrigation wells. There are instances where individual water bills have gone from \$70 to \$100 to over \$600. These are retired people living on a fixed income.

City officials have refused to discuss the water rate issue with residents of Rainbow Springs. As a result, a significant number of Rainbow Springs residents have been boycotting the city's fiber project (Greenlight). Some residents have taken things one step further and are boycotting all Dunnellon businesses.

It's interesting that Dunnellon's mayor mentioned annexation during the meeting. City officials may not want to annex Rainbow Springs, but they sure do want as much money from us as possible in the form of outrageous water rates.

I think the mayor's comments tell it all: "They suck the services out of our city. We don't want to annex a bunch of rooftops."

So now the residents of Rainbow Springs are nothing more than a bunch of "rooftops." Such a comment shows again the arrogant and demeaning nature of the mayor and city officials.

The mayor and city manager do have a dream, but it's not to create jobs.

Their dream is to maintain their "small town charm." Problem is they don't have the necessary revenue. They want everyone else to pay for their own inability to sustain themselves.

They want banks to loan them money they can't repay. They want people outside the city limits to pay in the form of high water rates. They want the state and other agencies to give them grants. Now they want the federal government to give them money. They actually have the nerve to ask for federal tax dollars to save their charming little town.

Maybe someone should take a hard look at this charm.

Did you take the time to walk around and see how many businesses are boarded up? Did you look at the condition of the properties in the downtown area?

As one of your constituents, I am against using any type of federal tax dollars to support the Dunnellon Greenlight project or any other project the city decides to undertake.

Your brochure states: "Cliff Stearns was elected because he is conservative and we should re-elect him because he's never wavered." It goes on to state, "Cliff Stearns is a proven and consistent conservative."

If that's true, why are you looking into the possibility of getting stimulus money for Dunnellon? It would be a complete waste of taxpayer money.

There are a few hundred voting residents in Rainbow Springs watching how you handle this. If you are going to support the financial blunders of the Dunnellon city officials, you certainly are not going to get my support.

'911, what's your emergency'

I don't do well with bruises, cuts or blood, especially when it involves my grandchildren.

What started as a nice evening with my grandson, James, turned into a nightmare. But I have a whole new appreciation for the 911 operators.

It was last Thursday when my daughter and son-in-law decided to head down to Clearwater to check out a boat and they invited my husband to ride

along. Nanaw was looking forward to having dinner and some fun with James.

James is a very finicky eater. I think he survived his first four years on grilled cheese and fish sticks. So I decided to get creative and make scrambled eggs with cheese and bacon. How excited I

was to see him eating with such gusto. We were sitting side-by-side at the kitchen bar chatting about SpongeBob, who else? I thought the night was going quite well.

Next thing I know, James said: "I can't move my arm."

I jumped down off my seat to discover he had somehow gotten his arm caught in the rungs of the bar stool. Yep, caught in that 1-inch space, and it was stuck all the way in so he couldn't move at all.

I was trying to calm him down while trying to calm myself down but neither was working. After assessing the full situation and realizing there was no way I was going to slide his arm out, I had to put my thinking cap on.

I left his side for one minute to find the phone and then he did the worst thing possible. He tried to jump down, and his arm did not move.

So there he hung with his arm still caught and pulling tighter. That's when the tears started...for both of us.

- 1 box Betty Crocker Suddenly Salad Ranch & Bacon Pasta Salad Mix
- 1/2 cup Hidden Valley Original Ranch dressing
- 1/2 teaspoon dried dill weed
- 1 1/2 cups small broccoli florets

- Make the salad a few hours before serving or a day ahead. Stir in a few drops of milk to moisten the salad.

Zesty Potluck Pasta Salad

Prep Time: 15 minutes
Total Time: 20 minutes
Yield: 14 servings

- 2 boxes Betty Crocker Suddenly Salad Classic Pasta Salad Mix

Drain pasta with broccoli; rinse with cold water. Shake to drain well. Stir pasta with broccoli, chicken and tomatoes into dressing mixture. Serve immediately, or refrigerate until serving.

Notes:

- Make it your own. Stir in cubed cheese, chopped red or green bell pepper or sliced ripe olives with the chicken.

9-10, Junior All-Stars run away with district championships

Teams win title games in routs

CRYSTAL RIVER — The undefeated Dunnellon 9-10 baseball team came into Sunday's District 15 Championship game leaving nothing to chance. Using its big hitters and some splendid pitching, Dunnellon proved too much for Central Citrus as it cruised to a 14-2 victory.

"We rely on pitching and defense," Dunnellon head coach Mike Michaud said. "We had one rough inning there where we gave up a couple of runs, but the kids came back."

Dunnellon batted first and immediately let its intentions be known by scoring the first run off Richie Fox's double. Fox had a huge game for Dunnellon, going 4 for 4 (two doubles and a single) with a two-run homer in the third, including a game-leading six RBIs.

Central Citrus demonstrated some real poise at bat in the first inning. Dylan Pollizi (3 for 3 with two singles and double, one RBI) connected as well as teammate Daniel Sayadoff. But Dunnellon's Kayme Hickey, who pitched almost five full innings with seven strikeouts, allowed no runs.

Brandon Di Rosa, who pitched three innings, and a confident Central Citrus managed to shut out Dunnellon in the top of the second to further the impression of poise. Central Citrus then took the lead in the bottom of the inning, as Pollizi doubled, batting in Donovan Willmon (1-for-2 with a double). Pollizi then capitalized on an error and stole home, giving Central Citrus the 2-1 lead.

Then in the third inning, Dunnellon's Fox struck a devastating blow to Central Citrus. Fox smacked a homer over the left field fence following Jay Frazier's double, which brought home the tying run. As Frazier (4-for-4 with two singles, two doubles and four RBIs) and Fox crossed the plate to give Dunnellon the 4-2 lead, the wind appeared to go out of Central Citrus' sails.

"We played our worst game in the field of the whole tournament," Central Citrus head coach Dan Sayadoff said of the loss. "We just got outmatched today. They're a great team and they deserve to win. They completely outplayed us in all phases. We made too many errors."

Dunnellon never looked back, outhitting Central Citrus 15-6. Dunnellon smoothly added more runs every inning to win the game, 14-2 for the championship.

"Our goal is to get our top few guys on base




