## Request bogs down in red tape

City relents, provides data for number of Greenlight subscribers

The city of Dunnellon late Tuesday provided the registered number of customers with Greenlight Dunnellon Communications, its fiber to the home program.

The request was filed two days after a lawyer with the Florida First Amendment Foundation contacted Marsha Segal-George, the assistant city attorney, to notify the city they were in breach of the state's public records law. Johnathan D. Kaney Jr., an attorney with the Florida

First Amendment Foundation wrote in a letter to Segal-George. Segal-George, who works for the Orlando-based firm of Fowler, O'Quinn, Feeney & Sneed, that the city twice denied records requests submitted by the Riverland News to the city seeking information about

who has registered for services with Greenlight Communications Dunnellon as well as the types of services they are using.

"The city denied these requests, and the City Manager provided Mr. Bryan with a copy of your memorandum dated June 29," wrote

Kaney Jr., who works for the private, nonprofit, non-partisan, organization, dedicated to promoting the public's constitutional right to oversee its government through Florida's Sunshine and Public Records Law. Acting as the public's advocate, the Foundation provides a variety of services to citizens, gov-

## Man bites ear off of another in fight

Bieber charged with aggravated battery

A 46-year-old man, involved in a stabbing at Crock's Pub in December 2011, once again found himself in trouble with law enforcement officials Sunday after biting a man in the cheek and biting part of his ear off.

According to reports, Walter Bieber of Dunnellon was charged Sunday with aggravated battery after he became involved in a verbal altercation with another person. The report stated Bieber intentionally or knowingly caused great bodily harm or permanent disfigurement while committing battery upon Charles Olson.

The report stated Bieber attacked Olson following a verbal argument and while commencing the attack, Bieber bit Olson on the left cheek and then bit his left ear, detaching a large portion of Olson's ear and then spitting it on the floor.

Olson was taken Munroe Regional Medical Center for treatment to his cheek and ear. Bieber was transported to the Marion County Jail. Bieber made bail later Sunday; his bond had been set at \$5,000.

In December 2011, Bieber was involved in a verbal disagreement at Crock's Pub, which turned into a physical confrontation. During that fight, three people were stabbed, none by Bieber. However, Bieber was charged with disorderly intoxication and aggravated assault.

Career fireman, father honored at Celebration of Life

Frederick "Fred" C. "Starkey" Stark was known for his passion about firefighting and the industry itself.

It was more widely known his "burning" passion was for his family, especially for his wife, Juliette, whom he had been married to for 58 years.

Stark died July 2 at Timber-ridge Medical Center after his wife found him outside their Vogt Springs home.

On Thursday, family, friends, former colleagues and current colleagues gathered at the Florida State Fire College to honor the three-term Dunnellon City Councilman who worked at the Florida State Fire College from 1978 to 1993, the last 11 as Bureau Chief of Fire Standards and Training.

Prior to working at the sprawling campus, north of Ocala, Stark worked as a fire-

fighter with the NYPD from 1958 to 1973. The Staten Island-native served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1954 to 1957.

Chief Rick Talbert spoke on behalf of the family to the

packed room.

"While I believe that as his son and oldest surviving child, that duty should fall to me," Christopher Stark wrote on the Facebook page the "Celebration of Life for Frederick C. Stark."

"I know it would be an exercise in futility for me to attempt to get up in front of those in attendance and try to pay tribute to my dad in a manner he would approve of. Translation: I do not wish to cry in front of that many witnesses. He would not have it."

As Talbert spoke, he touched upon Stark's storied career with the NYFD and the mark he made on those who'd passed through the doors at the Florida State Fire College.

"It's been a tough year for us here, we lost another brother," Talbert said, noting two former FSFC instructors — Charlie Dill and John James — had also died this year. "I'm very humbled to share a few words with you. I didn't feel worthy and privileged to speak. He left an

## Dunnellon man, 19, involved in robbery

Suspects shot during holdup

OCALA — A customer at Palms Internet Café at 8444 S.W. State Road 200 thwarted a robbery attempt by two 19-year-old men Friday night at the Internet Café in Ocala.

According to police reports, Davis G. Dawkins of Dunnellon and

Duwayne B. Henderson of Ocala entered the businesses shortly before 10 p.m. The report stated the two entered wearing masks while one of them, later identified as Dawkins, was in possession of a baseball bat, and the other, Henderson, was brandishing a black firearm.

Upon entering the establishment, the report stated, the suspect with the firearm told patrons to turn over their valuables.

One of the customers, Samuel Williams, approached Henderson and began shooting at him and Dawkins. Both Dawkins and Henderson fled the scene as Williams continued firing at them, the report stated.

After fleeing the establishment, Williams locked the door as authorities were called.

According to the report, once on scene, enforcement authorities observed blood, which appeared to be from one of the suspects who was believed to have been shot.

Williams told authorities he was at the Internet Café with his wife

# Appeals court to rule on road assessments

Suit stems from 2006 when Rainbow Springs residents fought county about roads

The long-drawn out battle between residents in Rainbow Springs and Marion County government over an assessment regarding repaving of road could come to a dead end today, depending on how appellate court judges rule.

"We are asking them to reverse the ruling that the reassessments are illegal," said attorney Richard Bennett, hired to represent the residents of Country Club Estates in Rainbow Springs. "Depending on what the outcome is, de-

pends on what we do next. "I think the percentages on appeals the ruling of the trial court generally stands. Statistically, you don't fare well, but I believe our facts in this case are unique and we have a chance of prevailing."

A hearing is scheduled for today as judges will make the final ruling about the reassessment Marion County officials levied against homeowners years ago regarding repaving in the Villages of Rainbow Springs.

In 2006, residents Patricia and Michael Slattery, Louis Benza and Donald Senger

formed a committee opposing the road work assessment and question the ballot process. That group became known as F.A.R.E., standing for Fund All Roads Equitably.

However, Deborah Techentin, Joan and Edward Duggans and Penny and Ioannes Fyrogennis filed suit on behalf of the residents of the Villages of Rainbow Springs. It hinged on the issue of whether a clear majority of affected landowners has actually voted to approve the project back in late 2005. The county thought it had the necessary ballots to go ahead, but

some residents disagreed. They argued that under Florida law, 51 percent of all the landowners had to approve the assessment, but the county went ahead with approval from only about one-third of the landowners.

According to Florida laws, 51 percent of all landowners must approve the assessment. The county created the MSBU with the approval of only about one-third of them, Bennett argued in court.

The group eventually hired the Coral Gables-based Bennett, who had prior experience with a similar case. Court

records show legal action against the county started in June 2007.

Since the roughly \$900 assessment started, residents had the option of making payments over 10 years at about \$132 a year, or paying up in full, saving the interest. But the money is just part of the problem.

The court will decide today if the county must refund the assessment its been charging or residents will remain on the hook for the cost to pave the road.

How that will be affected is unclear, and with the road work already been done, it is uncertain where the county would get the money to refund the homeowners if necessary.



# Teens charged with burglary, petit theft

An 18-year-old Ocala man and four teenage juveniles were charged with burglary and petit theft July 9, after authorities revealed they had broken into the Dunnellon Little League concession stand.

Nikolai Pierro and four other teens, whose names are being withheld because of their age, broke into the concession stand of the Dunnellon Little League, which was closed.

The report stated the five defendants took miscellaneous food and drink items such as Gatorade, candy as potato chips, totaling up to \$100.

Pierro told authorities he and the other four defendants threw the items out of the broken window in which one of the other defendants had broke to gain entrance into the concession stand, the report stated.

According to the report, the stolen items were placed into two of the defendants vehicles before the five left the park.

All of the items were recovered, the report stated.

Pierro's bond was set at \$2,250. He bonded out July 9 of the Marion County Jail.

## Man charged with simple battery

A 21-year-old Inglis man was charged with Simple Battery (Dating Violence), according to arrest reports.

William G. Degennaro was charged July 10, after he and his girlfriend of seven months were involved in an altercation at the Dunnellon Wal-Mart.

According to the report, Degennaro admitted to grabbing the victim by the arm and trying to pull her out of the store, saying "babe, let's just go home," at which time the victim pulled away and yelled, "leave me alone or I'll call the police." Degennaro then grabbed the victim by the hair pulling her to the ground. The report stated the victim got up, pushed Degennaro away

and ran out of the store. According to the report, two eyewitnesses told authorities they observed Degennaro grab the victim by the arm and push her down after the victim told Degennaro to leave her alone.

Both Degennaro and the victim told police they had been dating for about seven months and were still currently in a relationship.

No bond was set. Degennaro was released July 12 from the Marion County Jail.

## Man charged with trespassing

A 52-year-old Dunnellon man was charged with trespassing (after warning), according to police reports.

Joseph M. Borst was charged July 12, an arrest

report states, after knowingly and unlawfully entering the property at the Dunnellon Circle K after being issued a trespass warning in April 2012.

According to the report, law enforcement officials witnessed Borst standing in the parking lot of Circle K. Upon seeing a patrol vehicle, Borst ran toward the sidewalk and began stating, "I was on the sidewalk."

The report stated upon making contact with Borst, police detected a strong odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from Borst's breath and body. Borst told authorities he knew he was "not supposed to be on Circle K property." Officer Mike Miley made contact with the store clerk who provided a copy of the trespass warning issued in April. Per the warning, Borst is not allowed at the location for one year. The clerk said she observed Borst yelling at customers in the parking lot and causing problems prior to Miley's arrival.

Borst's bond was set at \$10,000. As of press deadline Tuesday, he remained in the Marion County Jail.

and was afraid the suspects were going to shoot somebody. He told the detective he and his wife were "scared (expletive)" and he began shooting at the men. He told officials he could not remember how many shots he fired.

Shortly after the incident at the Internet Café, law enforcement authorities received information that two subjects were being transported from Marion Oaks to a hospital with gunshot injuries after telling residents they had been shot while at Scott Carrigan Baseball Park on Southeast 17th Street in Ocala. Officers, the report stated, went to the ball field but found no evidence of a shooting there.

Both men were transported to Shands Hospital in Gainesville. Officials later confirmed Dawkins had a superficial wound in his left arm, but Henderson was shot in two places: his left buttock and his right hip.

In an interview at the hospital, Dawkins admitted to Detective Erik Dice he took part in the robbery, accord-

ing to the report. The young man said he had the bat, which had been in his vehicle. Dawkins told the detective he was confronted by two people at the ball field and forced to assist in the robbery.

Officials said Dawkins previously had worked for the cafe but had been fired.

Henderson, in his interview with authorities, said both he and Dawkins planned the robbery together, the report stated.

Dawkins' bond was set at \$11,000. He bonded out Sunday of the Marion County Jail.

Henderson's bond was set at \$31,000. He remains in the Marion County Jail.





#### Grilled Chicken Fettuccini

Yield: 4 servings

- 3/4 teaspoon salt, divided
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 tablespoon ground cumin
- 3 chicken breasts
- 1/2 pound fettuccini, uncooked
- 2 tablespoons canola oil
- 1 yellow bell pepper, seeded, julienned
- 1/3 cup green onion
- 1 lemon, juiced

ernment officials, and the media.

"This appears to respond only to the June 27 request but might have been intended also to respond to both requests. I write because the city has not complied with the public records law in its response to these requests."

At this time, Mr. Jeff Bryan (editor of the Riverland News) has a cause of action for this breach. See, *Barfield v. City of Eatonville*, 675 So.2d 223 (Fla. 5th DCA 1994); Fla. Stat., § 119.12.

"Before advising him to seek this remedy, I would like to discuss this matter with you. It is possible the city may be able to satisfy the request quite simply."

Kaney explained to Segal-George when an agency denies a public records request, Section 119.07(1)(e)-(f), Florida Statutes, provides as follows:

(e) If the person who has custody of a public record contends that all or part of the record is exempt from inspection and copying, he or she shall state the basis of the exemption that he or she contends is applicable to the record, including the statutory citation to an exemption created or afforded by statute.

(f) If requested by the person seeking to inspect or copy the record, the custodian of public records shall state in writing and with particularity the reasons for the conclusion that the record is exempt or confidential.

The City's denial does not comply with subsection (e) of this statute, Kaney wrote, and, if the June 29 memorandum is intended to serve as a response to the July 11 request, which expressly invokes subsection (f) of this statute, the city has not complied with this statute either.

The third (unnumbered) paragraph of the memorandum to the Riverland News states:

As a lawfully recognized telecommunications company all records containing the names addresses and telephone numbers of subscribers are confidential and exempt pursuant to Section 119 Florida Statutes and Section 24(a), Article I of the State Constitution Further all proprietary confidential business information as further defined by Florida Statutes including customer lists customer numbers individual or aggregate customer data by location usage and capacity data network facilities used to serve subscribers technology descriptions technical information or trade secrets is exempt from inspection or copying pursuant to Section 119.07(1) Florida Statutes and Section 24(a) Article I of the State Constitution.

Neither this paragraph, nor any other communication received by Mr. Bryan complies with the requirement that the city provide "the statutory citation to an exemption created or afforded by statute." See Section 119.01(e).

Also, of course, the memorandum would not comply with the further requirement that agency state with particularity the reason for the conclusion that the cited exemption applies to the requested records. See, Section 119.07(1)(f)

Therefore, the city has breached the public records law, Kaney wrote.

However, Kaney notified Segal-George that he would like to discuss the matter with her.

"It is possible the City may be able to satisfy the request quite simply," Kaney noted.

The original information the Riverland News sought was a verbal request with City Manager Lisa Algieri was for the number of subscribers Greenlight has registered thus far. She declined to say, citing competition in the area. However, Algieri in a message left with Bryan late Tuesday said Greenlight has 824 subscribers.

"Even though you asked for other stuff it is considered propitiatory information and your lawyer has pretty much confirmed that with Marsha," Algieri said. "So if all you want is a number, then the number is 824."

With an hour of requesting Comcast's subscriber base Tuesday afternoon, a company official provided it. Comcast has approximately 2,220 subscribers in the Dunnellon area, which includes the city limits, said Billy Ferry, the regional vice president of Government and External Affairs for Comcast.

impression on many young firefighters. He helped mold and shape my career."

He touched on his son Christopher's Facebook post about his dad's career. He recalled the time he was at a Christmas party at Stark's resident in Dunnellon when he saw his office and the many accolades, photos and newspaper clippings.

"I remember Chief Stark's mom being there and she asked him to show it all to me," Talbert recalled. "He said no one wants to be bothered by stories. I was humbled by his service. I was truly blessed to be taught by him."

However, Talbert said, Stark's most notable influence among the many young firefighters he taught, it was the lasting impression of the family man he was that left an indelible impression on the thousands of former students.

"His real passion, his true passion was his lovely wife, Juliette, and his family," Talbert explained. "It was always family first for him and a strong legacy of commitment."

Toward the end of the Celebration of Life, a video montage with songs ranging from Tony Bennett's "Because of You" to Bruce Springsteen's "Terry's Song" played as his wife clutched a photo of her late husband she had snagged from a table top prior to the start of the memorial.

Stark is survived by his wife, Juliette Stark; his son, Christopher and daughter-in-law, Gina, of Tampa; his daughter, Suzette Altman, and son-in-law, Rob Altman of Ocala; grandchildren, Joshua Stark, Lucien Stark, Alexandra Altman, Robert Altman Jr. and Nicole Altman; and great-grandchildren, Caden Stark and Maci Slayman.
