RRC prez: We will fight settlement

Eno wants battle in court and has board's full backing

The Dunnellon City Council as well as state agencies such as the Department of Economic Opportunity and the De-

partment of Environmental Protection signed off on a deal to bring closure to the Bert Harris lawsuit filed against the city several years ago.

The City Council praised the efforts of City Manager Lisa Al-

giere and other officials for "getting the job" done.

"It's time to move forward," Mayor Fred Ward said about the long-standing, costly issue. "I'm in favor of supporting this."

Mark Penfeld, an Ocala-based attorney representing Jerry Dodd, the developer of the property, called the agreement a win for all involved.

"We should all be happy and satisfied with this agreement,"

he said. "We all worked together to reach a compromise most everyone was happy with."

Rainbow River Conservation Inc., one of the parties that stepped in to intervene in the original settlement between the city and Dodd, hasn't

Pickin' Patch, a developing tradition, opens Saturday

They're back, and ripe for the picking.

For the third straight year, the Pickin' Patch is set to open its gates Saturday, pull the tractor for old-fashioned hayrides and allow thousands of guests the opportunity to enjoy what has quickly become a fall tradition for families throughout the region.

The Pickin' Patch opens at 10 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 29, and will be open until Oct. 28. The hours of operation are 3 to 7 p.m. Fridays; 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturdays; and noon to 7 p.m. Sundays.

What started out three years ago as an idea and prayer has grown well beyond what Scott and Sarah Jo Thomas and Steve and Andrea Dixon could have ever envisioned.

In 2010, the couples

planted what seemed a meager 6 acres of pumpkins. The response was so overwhelming they added three additional acres a year ago as more than "an estimated" 8,000 people converged on the property.

"Obviously, when we started, it was next to unheard of to grow pump-

kins here because of violent swing in weather, the humidity, the heat, the disease, the insects,"

Thomas said of the start three years ago. "We were even discouraged by some to not even try. Both the Dixons and us felt very compelled that this was a direction God was leading us."

"We've been surprised in every facet of our business, not by just people, just the comments they make to us, such as 'We've made this part of our tradition,'" Thomas explained. "Just the sheer turnout, friends are telling friends, we couldn't be more blessed. There's no way we thought this would grow like it did. We anticipated a little year-to-year growth, but there's no way we could envision the magnitude of the growth we've had thus far."

This year, the size of the "patch" has grown to a whopping 13 1/2 acres of pumpkins, Indian corn, decorative gourds and pumpkins as well as sunflowers. In addition to the larger swath of goodies for families to choose from, there'll be a small corn maze, hay fort, hayrides and plenty of

Mayor, Algieri talk new contract

Council OKs 2013 budget

City Manager Lisa Algieri was brought aboard three years ago to lead a city in a state of flux and mismanagement, to bring about changes and improvement in the community.

The Dunnellon City Council praised her efforts, vision and guidance at the recent Dunnellon City Council Workshop. Now, Mayor Fred Ward and Algieri are in discussions for a new three-year contract to be presented at its next meeting.

Her evaluation from four of the five Council members — Erik Collop opted to not provide an evaluation because he had only served a month when the process was due — was nothing less than stellar.

The council graded her in four areas: personal and professional skills; provides effective support to council; continues to improve quality services to citizens; and supervise city operations.

Councilwomen Penny Fleeger and Lynne McAndrew gave Algieri the highest point totals in their respective evaluations. Fleeger, in her rankings for all four categories, scored Algieri 278.5 points out of a possible 280 points, while McAndrew gave her 278 points.

In Fleeger's evaluation she wrote, "Despite rumor to the contrary, Lisa is looking out for the citizens of Dunnellon with guidance and complete oversight by Council."

She added "her knowledge, kindness and abilities have

Report: Man had 400-plus grams of marijuana in possession

All told, narcotics weighed more than 1 pound

A 19-year-old Clearwater man faces charges of possession of marijuana, more than 20 grams, with the intent to sell and possession of drug paraphernalia after law enforcement authorities discovered the young man had more than 1 pound of narcotics in his possession Saturday in the parking lot at City Hall, according to an arrest report from the

Dunnellon Police Department.

The report stated Joshua K. Hawkins was

driving a green Ford truck along River Drive, turning right on U.S. 41 when officer Adam Robinson, who was conducting traffic enforcement in the area, ob-

served that the vehicle registration was out of date. Robinson then initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle, which stopped in the parking lot of Dunnellon City Hall.

According to the report, Robinson made contact with Hawkins and requested his personal information and advised him of the reason for the traffic stop. Hawkins stated he was unaware of the expired registration.

While speaking with Hawkins, Robinson detected the odor of marijuana emanating from inside the vehicle. Robinson asked Hawkins if he would consent to a search of the vehicle; Hawkins responded "yes."

Upon conducting the search of the vehicle, the report stated, Robinson observed a black pipe in Hawkins' backpack and a marijuana cigarette (0.6 grams) under the car's front seat.

According to the report, Robinson then located two large vacuum-sealed bags containing marijuana behind the driver's seat, along with a "Seal-a-

Meal" vacuum bagging system. One bag weighed 87.6 grams, the report stated, while the other bag weighed 228 grams.

The report stated Robinson then located another large plastic container under the driver's seat, which contained marijuana totaling 159.4 grams, and plastic bags. Robinson conducted presumptive field tests on the marijuana, marijuana cigarette and the residue inside the black pipe, which all tested positive for the presence of marijuana.

Hawkins was transported to the Marion County Jail. His bond was set at \$5,500. Hawkins bonded out Sunday from the Marion County Jail.

Tensions flare at city workshop

Councilwoman chastises mayoral candidate, RS resident

Tensions boiled over at the most recent Dunnellon City Council Workshop as Councilwoman Penny Fleegeer chided mayoral candidate Nathan Whitt, who had addressed the council concerning several issues, especially those related to the aging water main along U.S. 41 and the community development block grant the city is actively pursuing.

As Whitt wrapped up his comments and the meeting

seemed head for closure, Fleegeer's patience ran short.

Whitt had called out Mayor Fred Ward for calling Monday's public hearing regarding the settlement about the Bert Harris lawsuit "a courtesy to the residents."

"A courtesy?" Whitt questioned. "I believe it's in the best interest of the city to let the residents have a voice. They're frustrated."

Whitt questioned the decision to seek the grant funding to run a water line from the Dunnellon-Marion County Air-

port west to Dunnellon Heights to improve water pressure there as well as in Blue Cove, and not to repair the city's aging water line along U.S. 41. If the grant funding is acquired, the city would have the water line run on the south side of the road, not the north side where proposed subdivisions — Blue Run Ranches and Rainbow River Ranch — are planned.

"Let's focus on what the city needs," Whitt said. "Let's fix the town."

Fleegeer pointed to the re-

cently adopted fiscal year 2013 budget, which included a two-year plan to replace the aging water line along U.S. 41, before addressing Whitt's comments.

"If you want facts, look at what we've done," she said. "We've already decided how to fix it. I'm tired of having people come in here and not knowing the facts. This is not the place for you to do your campaigning."

"I'm tired of the (expletive) and moaning. You don't know a damn thing about what we're doing. If you'd come to the meetings regularly, you'd know what we have planned."

During her outburst, Rainbow Springs' resident Dr. Burt

Eno, PhD, chuckled from the back of the chamber.

"Dr. Eno, you're the worst," Fleegeer shouted.

Because the meeting was officially in progress, Mayor Ward quickly called for an end to the meeting as Dr. Eno made his way toward the front of the council chamber.

Guests remained in their seats as Dr. Eno and Fleegeer exchanged words, at which point Harold Horne, the city's community development coordinator, told Dr. Eno he would not speak to the councilwoman in that tone.

"Next time you'll answer to me," Horne said.

signed off on the newest agreement and doesn't plan to, said Dr. Burt Eno, PhD, the president of the environmental group.

"We fully plan to go back to court," Eno said.

Dr. Eno alleges the current agreement was done behind closed doors without presence of the RRC.

"They conspired behind closed doors," he said. "We were taken advantage of."

The pact with the city, Dodd, the DEO and DEP was approved Monday night by the City Council. That deal remains contingent on a judge's approval; however, Dr. Eno said the RRC will object to the court signing off on it.

"A hearing will be requested," he said. "I thought we made a good pitch."

Dr. Eno said citizens don't fully understand the financial ramifications they'll be subjected to if the deal is approved by the courts. Currently, the city has spent more than \$600,000 in legal fees since Dodd originally filed his lawsuit.

"We want to see a battle in court," Dr. Eno said. "My board, 100 percent, feels that way."

According to the deal, the agreement does not be-

come final until: (A) the plat is recorded, and (B) the settlement agreement is approved by the Circuit Court as provided in 70.001, F.S., and the time to appeal has run, or, if appealed, when a decision is rendered which affirms the legality of the agreement. When the agreement becomes final, the property owners and the city will file voluntary dismissals of all pending claims against each other.

The deal, if granted by a judge, stated the site design properly reflects the importance of the protection of the critical environmental and natural habitat areas of the property. Some of these environmentally friendly design features include large, contiguous greenway trails, neighborhoods traversable by foot, a variety of housing choices and a protective buffer along the Rainbow River.

According to the deal, the property owners will place a protective buffer along the riverfront of the Rainbow River. As used in this agreement, the term "protective buffer" means the area along the riverfront measured landward 100 feet from the ordinary high-water line or to the landward extent of the existing railroad berm, whichever distance is greater. Plat approval will

require the protective buffer setback as noted above and a 25-foot setback from a jurisdictional wetland delineation line for the primary residential structure on each waterfront residential lot. All residential structures on non-riverfront lots will also be set back 25 feet from any jurisdictional wetland delineation lines. Within the protective buffer, the only structures permitted shall be docks, walkways, footpaths and gazebo-type structures. No residential structures may be located within the protective buffer and no gazebo may be converted to a residential structure.

The agreement states the development of this project shall be subject to the requirement that all structures shall be connected to a central sewer system and an approved public or private central water system as to be outlined in a future Utility Services Agreement.

The deal, agreed to by the city, DEO, DEP and Dodd, states the property owners recognize the city does not have sufficient water or wastewater capacity to serve the project at full buildout (349 homes and a 100,000-square-foot business district) without

significant infrastructure improvements.

To establish water and wastewater concurrency, the property owners agree to the following:

- Equivalent Residential Connection (ERC) is defined as: One ERC wastewater is equal to 300 gallons per day for wastewater and one ERC potable water is equal to 350 gallons per day for potable water at average daily flows.

- Wastewater impact fee: The wastewater impact fee per ERC is \$1,805.

- Potable water impact fee: Per city ordinance, water impact fees are \$100 per fixture unit and, for the purposes of this agreement, each 15-residential unit is assumed to have 12 fixture units. Therefore the potable water impact fee per ERC is \$1,200.

- Potable water: The city engineer is currently doing a water system study for the city to determine the condition and capacity of the existing city water system. As an outcome of that study, the city will notify the property owners if it is found that any water capacity exists. At that time, the property owners will have the right to reserve ERC capacity by

paying \$1,200 per ERC.

The property owners understand that the estimated cost associated with the construction of a water facility, sized to provide potable water and fire flow for the project, is \$850,000. Furthermore, the agreement states, the property owners understand that prior to developing any phase of the project either:

- The city has existing capacity to serve the planned phase and the property owners will reserve the capacity by paying the appropriate impact fee.

- The city has constructed a new water facility and the property owners will reserve the required capacity for the planned phase by paying the appropriate impact fees.

- Property owners will construct a new water facility. Upon completion of such a facility, will transfer to the city, all rights to the facility as agreed upon in a future utility services agreement between the parties and in turn will receive credits as noted.

- The property owners

have identified a 1-plus-acre site for the construction of a new water facility for the project or regional facility. If it is determined by DEP that the site identified is not suitable for any reason, then the property owners will make a contribution of \$50,000 to the city toward the purchase of an alternative site. The terms and condition of this contribution will be addressed in the future utility services agreement.

- The city may decide to construct a regional water facility, which it has estimated may cost \$1.6 million. If the timing for the construction of this regional water facility corresponds with the time frame for the development of the project, the property owners and the city will endeavor to pool their funds as earmarked for their independent water facility needs and build the regional facility to serve the project and the city public service territory. The terms and conditions of this partnership will be addressed in a future Utilities Services agreement between the parties.

yards and accommodate wildlife with Florida friendly yards and native plants? How about urging new residents to establish lawns/gardens that are genuinely water efficient and require no irrigation like my lawn?

Someday, we would hope, all of the feuding will cease and there will be peace here in Dunnellon.

Those people with environmental concerns would

be a genuine asset if they would join in, work alongside developers as they add new residents to our community to assure that Dunnellon would achieve the status of a growing entity with a track record of genuine environmental protection.

I believe our current city leaders and staff are on the path and heading in that direction.

just about as rare as being hit by a football at a football game.

I had just gotten into the spirit of watching the game when all of a sudden I heard a whistle and a coach yelled, "Timeout." At that moment everything stopped. I looked at the clock on the scoreboard and it had stopped. I had forgotten about this little quirk in football.

The clock did not start and the game did not commence until the coach yelled, "play ball." Or something to that effect.

That got me thinking. If they can do that for football, why can't we do that for life? After all, life is far more important than a football game. Who is that coach that yells, "Timeout," and everybody stops? What kind of authority does he have?

We need to bring this kind of thinking into life in general. It seems to me that everything in life is thought out in great detail except actually living life. Football has been well thought out and is comprised of rules and regulations. Baseball the same. Hockey... Well maybe not so much hockey. Most games are well thought out, have rules to live by, and if something isn't going the way it is supposed to go, the coach has the privilege of yelling "Timeout."

How many times could I have used this little rule in my life?

Wouldn't it be nice to stop life when you have made an inappropriate remark, maybe you said something to your wife that came out the wrong side of your mouth. I have done that many a times. I think it would be rather nice if when I realize what I have just said, to be able to yell "Timeout." Then do it over again.

The other day one of

my checks from my checking account bounced. That would have been a perfect time to yell "timeout" and redo the whole thing.

There are so many things in life that could benefit from this one little thing called "timeout." I suggest that we began implementing this into our daily life. After all, our daily life is much more important than a football game, a hockey game, or a baseball game. I think whenever something goes awry we should have the privilege to stop it right in its tracks and do it over again. It does not matter how many times we have to do it over again, we continue doing it over until we get it right.

It would make life more exciting if I knew that if I made a mistake I could call "Timeout," do a do-over, and make everything right.

I think we need to have a very stern conversation with good old Father Time. He is so much a stickler for time marching on. But sometimes you get tired of marching and need to sit down and take a breather. Then sometimes, you need to change the direction in which you are marching. It is not so bad the time marches on but when it needs to turn around and march the other way that is a completely different story.

In thinking further along this line, I discovered God already has a "Timeout" plan. I found it in 1 John 1:9 (KJV), "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

With this in mind, I certainly want to take full advantage of God's "Timeout" plan.



Merchant Marine Academy, U.S. Coast Guard Academy, U.S. Naval Academy, U.S. Air Force Academy and West Point.

If he goes to a standard university one day, he is interested in the University of Florida or Florida State University, and joining the ROTC programs there his freshman year.

"I chose the military because they offer some of the best education for an engineering degree, while guaranteeing you a job, a paid education, and a paycheck while you study," Molloy said.

made it to the 3-yard line as senior Austin Betzer capped the drive with a 3-yard run up the middle. The Rams' extra point was not good, but they did trim the Tigers' lead to 14-9 before half time.

"The turnovers in the first half were big, they kind of killed us," Dunnellon coach Frank Beasley said.

In the second half, both Dunnellon and Eastside brawled back and forth trying in an attempt to take advantage of field position and scoring opportunities.

But it was the Rams who were able to take advantage of pair of fumble recoveries and a turnover on downs.

On fourth-and-4 for Dunnellon, Eastside recovered a Tigers' fumble, which paved the way for the Ram's Corey Carol 15-yard touchdown reception with 4:58 left in the third quarter.

Eastside's extra point try failed again; however, the Rams found themselves with their first lead of the game, 15-14.

On the Tigers' ensuing drive, Dunnellon turned the ball over on downs, failing to convert a fourth-down attempt. With the ball back in Eastside's hands, sophomore Sam McGinnis scored on a 23-yard run on a second-and-8 play with 11:49 left in fourth quarter. The Rams' extra point try was good, giving Eastside a 22-14 lead.

After a fumble recovery from sophomore Cole Fagan, the Tigers turned the ball over themselves.

After forcing the Rams to punt, Dunnellon fumbled again on a third-and-6 play; however, Dunnellon Dalwin Landrum picked up a safety, trimming the Tigers' deficit to 22-16 and giving Dunnellon a chance to score.

The Tigers' did just that, only to see their

touchdown called back on a penalty on a third-down play. Two plays later, on a fourth-and-goal, a Boley pass attempt fell short as time expired.

"We played harder Thursday night than we have the whole season," Beasley said. "That last play where our touchdown got called back was the best play of the night. In order to change our streak, we will keep doing what we do and we'll battle through it. Next week will be a tough game, but we will play strong."

started Dunnellon on a real road to recovery. Thank you!"

McAndrew touted Algieri's accomplishments of acquiring additional water utilities; the implementation of Greenlight Dunnellon; annexation of Blue Run Ranch; improved intergovernmental relations between state, county and city; and improved community relations through the school-blast and renaming of City Beach to Dinkins Park, to name a few.

As an area to improve upon, McAndrew cited the relations with Rainbow Springs Utility customers.

"Only time and Ms. Algieri's patience and peacemaker skills will effectively deal with this issue."

McAndrew credited Algieri for a "patient persistent job."

"Dunnellon is seeing great things already, we're the talk of the League of Cities," she wrote.

In evaluating her skills to continue to improve quality services to citizens, McAndrew wrote, "a quick observation of our roads, medians, sidewalks and city properties is all one needs to see that our city is much better off than it was three years ago."

Mayor Fred Ward scores totaled 268 and Councilman Dennis Evans gave Algieri 244 points out of a possible 280.

Ward touted her accomplishments with the Rain-

In other action, the Council:

- Authorized the submission of the application for a community development block grant. The grant would be used to a run a 12-inch water main from the Dunnellon-Marion County Airport along the south side of County Road 484. Overall, the project is estimated to cost slightly more than \$1.2 million. The grant itself would cover \$650,000 of the cost while the city would contribute up to \$600,250. The deadline to submit the grant application is Oct. 1.

- Approved the first reading of Ordinance 2012-07 by title only regarding the transmittal of comp plan amendment CPA2012-13 for Boger Farms. The property, recently annexed into the city, is currently zoned rural by the county; however, the city will zone the property agricultural, because it is the closest zoning regulation to what the county offers.

- Approved a \$35,000 donation from the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) to the Boys & Girls Club for the purpose of installation of the sewer lift station and force main.

- Approved three purchase requests:
 - The Council OK'd an expenditure of \$18,877 for Radio Read Meters from Single Source to replenish the city's supply.

- The Council also approved an expenditure for \$138,444.80 with Service & Technology Network Solutions for the complete installation of conduit and fiber for the Woodlands, Rio Vista and Southwest 186th South.

- Approved a \$20,000 contract with Customer Drops & Installs to replace Hewitt installers, who no longer are meeting City/Greenlight needs due to cost.

bow River Ranch settlement; the purchase of Rainbow Springs, Juliette Falls and Rio Vista utility systems; negotiating the financial package to establish

Greenlight Communications; and the ability to deliver a budget with a half-mil reduction.

"There are no major issues that need to be addressed in this evaluation," Ward wrote. "Any suggestions can be made one-on-one with Ms. Algieri. Her willingness to respond to suggestions is still one of her greatest strengths."

The fiscal year 2013 budget was approved by the Council on Monday night as officials set the millage rate at 6.8013, a half point lower than the 2013 rollback rate. Overall, Mayor Ward pointed out, the decrease equals a 6 percent drop in property taxes for property owners compared to a year ago.

All told, the city's general fund budget for the upcoming fiscal year, which starts Oct. 1, will be \$3,662,792.

The city's water enterprise fund budget will jump from \$752,593 a year ago to

\$4,178,333, an increase of 455.2 percent. Revenues are up 240 percent from \$389,125 to \$1,322,868.

The city's sewer enterprise fund budget will increase from \$2,030,870 in 2012 to 3,298,180 for fiscal year 2013. According to the proposed budget, revenues are increasing 349.8 percent, from \$351,035 last year to \$1,578,830.

The City Council did approve water and sewer increases to the tune of 5.75 percent and 6.25 percent, respectively. The increases are 1 percent less than proposed a year ago. The council also approved changes in the way developments with one master meter, such as hotels and Dunnellon Mobile Park, will be charged for their water usage.

The budget for Greenlight Communications is increasing to \$4,693,599 after the council approved it Monday. A year ago, Greenlight had a budget of \$2,749,218, but the FY 2013 budget shows a projected revenue stream of \$4,693,599. Thus far, the city's fiber-to-the-home program has more than 800 registered residential and business users. The city's first bond payment of more than \$1 million is due in November to Regions Bank in Orlando.

Former Councilman Ron McAndrew, whose wife Lynne holds a seat on the council, praised the efforts of the City Council and particularly the performance of Algieri.

"Thank you," he told Algieri for her commitment to the city of Dunnellon.



Spinach and Artichoke Heart Two Potato Casserole

Spinach and Artichoke Heart Two Potato Casserole

Makes 8 servings
Prep time: 20 minutes
Cook time: 1 hour 30 minutes

- 1 pound red potatoes
- 1 pound Yukon Gold potatoes
- 1 1/4 cups vegetable broth or stock
- 1/2 cup shredded Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 4 ounces Neufchatel (1/3-less fat) cream cheese
- 4 ounces fat-free cream cheese
- 1 7.5-ounce jar marinated artichoke hearts, drained and chopped
- 1 6-ounce bag baby spinach, coarsely chopped
- 1/2 cup sliced green onions

Preheat oven to 425°F and coat a 9-inch square baking dish with nonstick cooking spray.

Cut potatoes in half lengthwise. Place cut side down on a board and slice very thinly. Place in a large bowl and set aside.

Heat broth, Parmesan, garlic salt, cheeses and artichoke hearts in a medium saucepan until cheeses are melted.

Stir in spinach and cook until wilted.

Stir mixture into potatoes with green onions, mixing well to coat potatoes as evenly as possible.

Spread in prepared dish and bake for 30 minutes. Cover loosely with foil and reduce temperature to 375°F; cook for 1 hour more or until potatoes are tender when pierced with a fork.

Quick Tip: To shave an hour off the cook time, boil potatoes for 5 minutes or until tender, then drain well. Prepare as directed above then bake at 425°F for 30 minutes.

Mediterranean Mashed Potatoes

Makes 4 servings
Prep time: 15 minutes
Cook time: 10 to 13 minutes

- 1 1/4 pounds russet potatoes, cut into 1-inch cubes (best for light and fluffy mashed potatoes), or 1 1/4 pounds white or red potatoes, cut into 1-inch cubes (best for creamier mashed potatoes)
- 1/2 cup nonfat plain yogurt
- 1/2 cup fat-free milk
- 1 1/2 tablespoons heart-healthy buttery spread
- 1/4 teaspoon sea salt (or 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt)
- 1/2 cup reduced-fat Italian blend shredded cheese
- 1/4 cup sun-dried tomatoes, chopped
- 2 tablespoons snipped fresh basil
- 2 green onions, sliced
- 1 2.2-ounce can sliced ripe olives, drained
- Freshly ground pepper to taste

Bring a large pot of water to a boil. Add potatoes and cook for 10 minutes or until tender; drain well. Transfer back to pot and mash well, then stir in yogurt, milk, buttery spread and salt. Gently stir in remaining ingredients and cook for 2 to 3 minutes more to heat through.
