## Tow truck stolen from Gould's

Vehicle taken from local business prior to Christmas

Christmas was a little less merry for a long-time business in Dunnellon.

When John Belcher arrived to work Monday at Gould's Tire & Auto, 12029 and 12038 S.

Williams St., he noticed the automotive repair center's roll-back wrecker was missing. He had left the flat-bed tow truck parked across the street from the Dunnellon Police Department, but when he arrived to start his day at 6:30 a.m. Christmas Eve, it was gone.

According to a Dunnellon Police Department report, Belcher told authorities when he left at 4 p.m. Friday, Dec. 22, the wrecker was parked to the south side of its building and was secured. When he returned Christmas Eve, it was gone.

Gould's Tire & Auto has operated in Dunnellon for more than 20 years, Belcher said.

"It's not really shock, it's quite a bit of disappointment," he said. "George has been in business for a long time, and to see this happen, it's quite disappointing, in general."

Belcher said while Gould's didn't use the tow truck much, the loss of the equipment will

certainly put a dent in business.

"You have to wonder who would just come and steal it," Belcher said while repairing a truck Thursday afternoon.

According to the report, authorities searched the area and found broken glass, which might have been that from the

## Starting from scratch

### 32-year-old resident raising funds for kidney transplant

When Dorothy Flemton was born 32 years ago, she knew there'd come a day when her life would be forever altered.

For years, the life-long Dunnellon resident always monitored her health, knowing the inevitable would eventually occur.

That day finally came in June 2011, as the 1999 Dunnellon High School graduate began dialysis treatments three days a week to combat her failing kidneys.

When Flemton was born, she was diagnosed with Bartter Syndrome, a hereditary kidney disease thought to be caused by a defect in the kidney's ability to reabsorb potassium. This makes the kidneys remove too much potassium from the body.

Sometimes, Bartter syndrome may occur in someone with no family history of the disorder. It is not known exactly how often Bartter syndrome occurs, but one study estimates it to affect 1.2 individuals per million people. Bartter syndrome affects both males and females of all ethnic backgrounds.

One of five children, Flemton wasn't the lone family member to receive the diagnosis. Her sister, Reeshmah Fleming, was too. None of Flemton's three brothers tested positive for the disease.

Flemton recalled when her sister, who died in 1994 of a massive heart attack, began dialysis treatments. Knowing the same fate awaited her, Flemton made frequent trips to the dialysis center with her sister.

There, she learned more about the process and the toll dialysis would take on her body.

"I didn't understand back then, but as I got older I understood why she had to go through what she went through," Flemton said. "I already knew what I was going to go through."

Though the day finally arrived in June 2011, Flemton's doctors began preparing her in her late 20s when she began to show signs of fatigue and other telltale symptoms. In October 2010, her doctors placed a shunt in her to prepare for the inevitable.

"It takes a lot out of you," Flemton said about the three-time weekly dialysis treatments. "You

have some good days, you have some bad days. On my good days, I can go home and cook and clean. On my bad days, I'll sleep until 8 or 9 o'clock."

The dialysis treatments are just the beginning of a longer road ahead for Flemton.

She needs a kidney transplant, and she's been approved for one. But before her name can be placed on the recipient's list, she has to raise \$5,000 for the initial supply of anti-rejection drugs she'll have to take for the remainder of her life.

For Flemton, the task is a tall one. No longer does she work the two jobs she held for years. Because of her three dialysis treatments a week, she's found full-time work fleeting. Though she does run a small catering business, her bad days often limit how many catering assignments she can take.

"I miss working," she said. "I miss being able to do the things I loved, having the energy I had."

A long-time member at Beulah Missionary Baptist Church, Flemton told her church family about her plight.

"When you're worshipping with

## Church slates revival


Concert will feature Ivan Parker

### Lobster Salad with Asparagus Herb Mayonnaise

Yield: 4 servings

- 1/2 pound thin asparagus, tough stems removed
- 1/4 cup chopped mixed fresh herbs, such as chervil, parsley, tarragon or chives
- 1/3 cup mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons champagne or sherry vinegar
- 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
- 2 tablespoons walnut or hazelnut oil
- 2 1 1/4-pound lobsters, steamed, tail and claw meat removed from shell
- 4 cups mixed baby lettuce
- Juice of 1 lemon
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

Prepare large bowl of ice water, and set aside. Bring shallow pan of salted water to a boil. Add asparagus and blanch until bright green and just tender, about 2 minutes. Remove and plunge into ice water bath to stop cooking, reserving asparagus water. Once asparagus is chilled, remove from ice water bath, pat dry and set aside.

Place herbs into blender and puree with 2 to 3 tablespoons reserved asparagus water until smooth. Whisk mayonnaise with pureed herbs and 1/2 the lemon juice. Then season with salt and freshly ground pepper to taste.

Whisk vinegar, mustard and remaining half of lemon juice together in large bowl. Slowly whisk in walnut or hazelnut oil until smooth. Season with salt and pepper to taste, and set aside.

Slice lobster tail into 1-inch pieces. Cut asparagus in half on diagonal. Add sliced lobster, asparagus and baby lettuces to dressing and toss gently to coat.

Spoon herb mayonnaise onto 4 plates in a circular pattern. Divide lobster evenly over plates. Place asparagus around it; mound salad greens in center of each, and top each with lobster claw.

Serve.

### Pan-Seared Cod Fish

Yield: 4 servings

- 4 6-ounce filets black cod, skin on
- 4 sprigs fresh thyme, roughly chopped
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- Kosher salt
- Pinch of cayenne pepper

Pat fish dry with paper towels and season on both sides with thyme, 1/2 teaspoon salt and pinch of cayenne.

Heat butter and olive oil in large non-stick skillet over medium high heat. When butter is melted, add fish, skin side down, and cook until skin begins to get crispy and golden, about 5 minutes. Turn fish and cook until golden and firm, about 3 to 5 minutes, spooning some of the butter over filets to keep moist.

To serve: Mound mashed potatoes onto four serving plates. Place fish diagonally over mashed potatoes. Spoon tapenade over fish and top each with a slice of bacon.

### White Bean and Olive Tapenade

Yield: 4 servings

- 1/4 cup thinly sliced red onion
- 3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1 14-ounce can white beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 anchovy, optional
- 1/3 cup oil cured black olives, roughly chopped
- 1 small orange or lemon, 2 tablespoons juice, 1 teaspoon zest
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
- Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper

Soak onions in cold water. Heat olive oil in a large non-stick skillet over medium to high heat. Add beans and anchovy, and cook without stirring until beans begin to fry, about 5 minutes. Add olives, juice and zest. Stir and continue to cook until beans become golden and slightly crispy, about 5 more minutes. Drain onions and squeeze dry. Turn off heat, stir in onions and parsley and season with salt and freshly ground pepper to taste. Set aside until ready to serve.

### Crispy Bacon Mashed Potatoes

Yield: 4 servings

- 1 pound Yukon Gold potatoes, peeled and quartered
- 4 slices bacon
- 1/2 cup half and half, warmed
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
- Freshly grated nutmeg
- Kosher salt and freshly ground white pepper

Place potatoes in large pot of cold salted water. Bring to a boil over high heat; reduce heat to medium and continue to boil until potatoes are fork tender, about 15 minutes. Turn off heat and let potatoes rest in hot water for 5 minutes. Drain, reserving 1 cup of the starchy water.

Meanwhile, place bacon in large cold skillet. Turn on heat and cook until crispy, turning once, about 7 minutes. Drain bacon on paper towels, reserving bacon fat.

Warm half and half slightly over medium heat in the same pot potatoes were boiling in. Add potatoes and 1 tablespoon reserved bacon fat. Using potato masher, mash potatoes until smooth. Add melted butter and season with a pinch of nutmeg, salt and freshly

# Report: Man battered woman with cane

## 37-year-old charged with domestic battery, false imprisonment

A 37-year-old Dunnellon man faces charges of aggravated domestic battery and false imprisonment after a Christmas day altercation in which he used a cane to assault a 60-year-old female, a Marion County Sheriff's Office report stated.

According to the report, James Robert Price was charged with both counts after deputies responded to the 8200 block of Southwest 204th Court in reference to a female who told authorities Price had struck her in the hand, face and forehead with a

wooden cane after the two had argued about money.

The report stated when deputies arrived on scene the woman had made her way to a neighbor's house who allowed her to call 911. The woman, who was crying, told authorities she and Price were arguing about finances about 9:30 a.m. when Price picked up a wooden cane and struck her on her right hand, forehead and face. Deputies, in their report, noted the victim had two lacerations on her right hand and swelling of three knuckles on her fingers. The report also noted there were two

small lacerations to both sides of her face. The victim told authorities she had washed most of the blood off of her face prior to their arrival.

According to the report, the victim told authorities Price had dragged her by the hair to the floor and kicked her in the kidney area of her right side. She told officers she did not have any visible bruising to the area. She further advised Price pulled her back up onto the bed in the north bedroom and held a short sword, blade side to the right side of her throat and ordered her to stay put and not to leave or he

would "kill" her.

The report stated Price then went to the living room, placed the cane and the sword next to a chair and went to sleep. The victim told authorities she was in fear for her life to leave the residence until Price went to sleep at which time, the report stated, she was able to escape and call 911. The female told deputies she was held against her will by Price for two hours before she was able to call her for help.

According to the report, authorities went to the residence where Price met them at the front

door. Deputies said they asked Price what had happened. He told them he and the victim had been arguing and she became very loud. At first, the report stated, he did not strike her but then he told authorities he struck the victim with the cane to "protect" himself.

The report stated deputies observed a short sword and cane on the floor next to an easy chair in the living room as it was described by the victim. Authorities noted the sword had small droplets of dried blood on the blade. Price denied holding the sword to the victim's throat and could

not explain how her blood was found on the blade. The blood from the laceration on the right of the victim's face had dripped onto the sword.

According to the report, Price was charged with aggravated domestic battery and false imprisonment. Post Miranda, Price told authorities the victim only received her injuries after he "pushed her against the wall."

According to Marion County Jail records, Price's bond was set at \$6,500. He remained in the Marion County Jail as of press deadline Wednesday morning.

# Inglis woman, 30, charged with DUI

A 30-year-old Inglis woman faces a charge of driving under the influence after blowing more than twice the legal limit, a Dec. 28 Dunnellon Police Department arrest report stated.

According to the report, Jennifer A. Ralph was stopped after authorities observed her driving 43 mph in 35 mph zone along West Pennsylvania Avenue in a blue Toyota truck. Upon initiating a traffic stop, the report stated Ralph continued to travel an additional 300 yards before coming to a stop.

The report stated Officer Aaron German made contact with Ralph, whom he noted had bloodshot watery eyes, slow, slurred speech in which he could detect the odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from her breath/body. German and Officer Scott Houts, the report stated, then asked Ralph to partici-

pate in field sobriety exercises to which she agreed.

According to the report, Ralph failed each exercise she was asked to perform, which includes the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Exercises; the Walk and Turn Exercise, which at one point during the exercise she told authorities: "I'm not trying to fool you, but I'm not going to do something that I know I can't do"; the

One Leg Stand Exercise in which she told officers, "let me just call my mom, I know I shouldn't have drove"; and the Rhombberg Alphabet Recitation Exercise in which she could not recite the whole alphabet.

The report stated Ralph was transported to the Marion County Jail, where she blew a 0.187 percent and 0.194 percent. The legal limit in Florida is 0.08 percent. Ralph was booked into the Marion County Jail, where her bond was set at \$500. She made bail Dec. 28.

vehicle stolen. The report described the vehicle as a white in color international rollback wrecker, which Belcher told officials was paid in full, but did not have full coverage insurance on it. Belcher advised authorities the vehicle had an old style rotator type emergency lights on top and Dunnellon Tire and Auto on both doors.

"I would hope that someone saw something and will come forward," said Belcher, noting the

cost of such a vehicle likely starts at \$60,000 or higher.

Belcher said authorities told him they would check the security footage from the cameras at the police station as well as the red-light cameras at the three intersections in town to see if they could determine in

which direction the vehicle was heading and if a description of the suspect(s) could be made.

"That'd be great if the cameras can find something," he said.

It's not the first time a tow truck has been stolen from a local business. According to Citrus County Sheriff's Office records,

Scally's Tow and Lube had a wrecker stolen in 2009.

Anyone with information or who might have seen the vehicle is asked to call the Dunnellon Police Department at 465-8510.


Long live "Bones," "NCIS" and "Survivor" and kudos to some new shows I'm beginning to love such as "Nashville" and "Chicago Fire."

How about we, as a community, push for a ban of fast-release fertilizers? Why don't we condone green lawn rules several communities have in place? Members of local property owners' associations should be pushing for a rewrite of those rules, encouraging the use of drought-resistance lawns and Florida friendly

landscaping.

All of the wells being dug in the past year are just as harmful to the health of the springs as folks pump thousands of gallons a day upon their yards to give it a healthy green in the middle of the winter.

As we move into the New Year full steam ahead, we encourage those who are in favor of moving toward a common goal of making Dunnellon a thriving community for years to come, speak up now. For those so adamantly against it, we'd ask for your input so long as it's for the good of the common goal, not to derail the goal of our future.

Christ, no matter their denomination.

"We want to let the Holy Spirit convict them so they can give their lives to Christ," he explained.

When planning began, Mihok said church officials did not realize there was a movement, led by the Billy Graham Ministry, to launch revival throughout churches nationwide. Mihok said First United Methodist followed Graham's model for a revival and much of the training volunteers went through will help assist with the nationwide revival planned for this year.

"We want people to know what the good Lord has in store for the nation," Mihok said. "This fits in so beautifully with what we're doing. The good Lord is guiding us."

In addition to the revival celebration, First United Methodist Church will host a motorcycle ride through the community to launch the celebration.

All bikers should assemble at 11:30 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 5, at the First United Methodist Church at 21501 State Road Highway 40, for prayer and the blessing of vehicles.

All riders may then join a "Ride for the Son" with the Florida Chapter of the Christian Motorcyclists Association. The ride will end at Dunnellon Plaza for a time of prayer for the revival on the evenings of Jan. 6 to 9.

Mihok said by chance, he had met Claude Ray, a former pastor turned motorcycle evangelist, at a diner in Beverly Hills.

she was successful, then states her secret namesake is Light much Desires to have a Ball.

"My sampler book is filled with 72 namesakes to validate the power of a name," Krewson said. "Everything has been introduced, when the name manifests itself, you know it."

The age-old universal law of traction is basically positive thoughts and words that draw things to you, according to Krewson.

"I didn't understand the power of it and I was leary if it was cult or something," she said. "God is going to want you to be positive."

The whole idea of positive thinking started when Krewson's daughter, Kaylee, had her car broken into and her purse was stolen. Trying to think positive, Krewson called the police, looked

for the purse and started canceling the credit cards.

"I didn't want to panic. I wanted to be positive," she said. "About a week later a policeman knocked on the door and brought back the purse."

Positive thinking, a book called "The Secret" and going to a medical transcription school got Krewson inspired to start her book.

"The school taught me to tear apart the words to better understand them and 'The Secret' started me on the teaching process. It's how I learned to inquire about the names," Krewson said. "If it works to tear apart words, why doesn't it work for names?"

One of the first names she worked on is Eiffel. Gustave Eiffel built his tower in Paris, which had 72 names of French scientists, engineers and other notable people engraved on the side of the famous structure. There is also the Eiffel Mountains in

Germany.

"You have the Eiffel Tower, the Eifel Mountains and then you have the eye full. It is the meaning of names and the pronunciation that bring about the parable," Krewson said. "It all was a set-up for me to write this book."

This book is called a sampler because she has six more completed books on different names that are ready, but still need to be edited and prepared for publishing.

"Everyone who reads this book will understand that this really works," Krewson said. "I didn't give it all away. I believe there are things I know

that even theologians don't know."

Krewson also started her own publishing company called the Keeper of the Keys Publishing to help out other authors get their books published.

"I know a lady who has written a children's book and another lady has a tragic life that she wrote about and I want to help them fulfill their dream of publishing their books," Krewson said.
