County will consider referendum

City of Ocala pushing for half-cent sales tax to build minor league stadium

If you build it, they will come. The “they” is not the spirits of the 1919 Chicago White

Sox, famously, or infamously, dubbed the Chicago Black Sox.

No, the “they” is the New York Yankees Single-A Tampa Bay affiliate, which competes in the Florida Gulf Coast

League with 14 other teams. The Florida Gulf Coast League is an advanced rookie league for Major League Baseball.

But to build “it,” a proposed 4,000-seat stadium

along State Road 200 near Interstate 75, the city of Ocala wants voters to approve a five-year half-cent sales tax referendum. Before voters can have their say in March, the Marion County Commis-

sion must approve the referendum be placed on ballot for a special March election. The half-cent sales tax would be levied countywide.

The County Commission will host a workshop at 3 p.m. today at the Marion County

Life for Violet Fort is anything but typical a 5-year-old.

The Blue Cove resident cannot giggle, nor can she squeal with delight.

She cannot practice cartwheels, nor can she reel off handspins with deft agility.

Instead, Rhett syndrome, a rare genetic disorder, as well as mitochondrial cellular disorder, have the left bright-eyed, blond-haired youngster confined to a wheelchair, unable to speak, walk or use her hands. Violet is fed a special formula through a feeding tube.

Both Allen and Kim Fort realized Violet had problems at an early age; despite multiple tests, however, doctors were unable to pinpoint the precise problem. Once the problem was diagnosed, the Forts set about learning everything they could. They admit, they’re still learning on a daily basis.

For Allen, it was tough to watch doctors not be able to solve the problem at first. The son of the late-Allen Fort Sr., who owned and

Organizers revive once popular bluegrass festival

After 5-year absence, event back in spotlight

For 28 years, the Withlacoochee River Bluegrass Music Festival was the place to be. But since the death of Lonnie Knight, “the driving force” behind the event five years ago, the festival was put on hold.

Now, Dave Elliott is hoping to rekindle the magic and following of the Withlacoochee River Bluegrass Music

Festival, all with the blessing and encouragement of Knight’s widow, Peg. After all, it was Peg Knight who personally called Elliott in hopes he lead the charge to restart and reinvigorate the once popular event.

“It was overwhelming when she called me,” Elliott said. “I had to sit there and soak in what the conversation was all about. I’d been going out there for close to 20 years. We were raised

out there practically. To have Mrs. Knight call me personally and ask, it is an honor. Not just because of the event, but the history of the venue too. It was one of the biggest bluegrass festivals in the South-west when it was going. There have been a lot of famous artists who’ve played there. To go from being a fan like I was, a patron out there, to having her call

● **Pasture Prime:** The band in 2012 with two members of the long running Sweetwaterbluegrass Band — Mickey Summers and Mike Matz. The new group, with great lead vocals, harmonies and musicianship includes Summers on the mandolin; Matz on the resonating guitar; Brian Young on the banjo; and Will Hardin on the upright bass.

● **Wry Whiskey:** Ed Wybranowski, of Hernando, leads the band playing banjo, guitar and vocals. He is joined by Chris Wybranowski on bass, guitar and singing lead and harmonies. Both are formerly of Up the Creek, Wybranowski Mountain Boys and Taylor Creek. Wes St. Onge, of Beverly Hills, brings his many talents including fiddle and guitar. Ann Osborn plays banjo and is also a lead singer. Harry Trott plays guitar and is a well-known banjo player with Bob Juntunen playing mandolin.

● **Dale Kennedy Band:** The group, which formed in 2010, consists of Dale Kennedy on guitar; David Brady on mandolin; Norman Green on banjo; and Mark Crawley on stand-up bass. They have performed with national acts such as Ernie Evans, Southern Lite and many more, both locally and on the road.

● **Jerry Sanders & Seminole Ridge:** The group formed in 2002 and includes former Canada Brothers members Clarence and Lester Canada and their sister, Marie Hawley. Sanders plays guitar and is the lead singer; Clarence Canada plays mandolin and sings baritone; Lester Canada plays banjo, guitar, mandolin, fiddle, bass and dobro as well as harmonizes; and Hawley plays bass and sings tenor and harmonies. The band leans toward the hard driving traditional side of Bluegrass with some progressive overtones thrown in for flavor.

● **Backwater:** Established in 1983 as Grassland Express, the band evolved into Backwater in 2002. Originally a traditional bluegrass band, they drifted into the contemporary bluegrass realm. Core band members include David Dean on 5-string banjo; Chuck Rickolt on guitar; and Billy Taylor on mandolin, all on vocals. The band is known for bringing "Bluegrass to the Boulevard," playing in many of the popular downtown Ocala hot spots as well as opening for many national big name artists in the Silver Springs attraction's concert series.

● **Florida State Bluegrass Band:** Ernie Evans and the Florida State Bluegrass Band successfully bridge the gap between traditional and contemporary bluegrass styles. Evans plays multiple instruments, sings lead and harmonies and is joined by his wife, Debi, on the bass and vocals. Isaac Taylor on banjo and lead vocals as well as Josh Griffin on mandolin and vocal harmonies round out the band.

● **Xtremegrass:** Xtremegrass is a bluegrass band originally formed in 2004 with Albert Johnson as the founding member and banjo player. They redefined their sound in 2012 with the addition of new and talented musicians including Marty Cox on guitar and vocals; Jim on mandolin; David McBrady on bass and vocals; and Chris Kalakaukis on dobro.

● **Arnold Messer and Lonesome Highway:** Arnold Messer, originally from West Virginia, is now based out of Starke. He plays foot-stomping, hand-clapping traditional bluegrass. He has played with Chubby Wise and toured with Ralph Stanley II. Arnold plays banjo and sings with his full backup band Lonesome Highway.

me and ask to get the festival started again. It is an honor for me."

For the past year, Elliott — along with numerous other volunteers — has been working tirelessly to secure entertainment and vendors to return to the event, which is behind Robinson Ranch Trap & Skeet Club, off of State Road 40. Yet, unlike past events which were typically three days, Elliott believed it was critical to relaunch the event on a smaller scale.

"Just starting out, we wanted it to be more of a community type of event," he explained, noting organizers are using local vendors and bands. "We're just trying to get this thing going. We're kind of going back to the roots. We just kind of want to let it grow on its own. Finances were one key thing. We're going to live within our means."

In addition to creating a community-type event, a portion of the proceeds will be given to the Stephens family, whose son, Daniel, suffers from a rare form of a restrictive lung disease as well as scoliosis.

"Talking to Peggy, my idea was to start a community event and she believed it may not be a bad idea to gain more community support, such as doing something to assist somebody," Elliott said. "And while I was talking to her, she said I've got the person right here. She had a flier for a barbecue fundraiser, which Daniel's school and church were doing for him. She still had the flier. So I contacted the church and the school and told them what I was thinking about doing. They were very appreciative of it."

Bands slated to perform at the event, include: Pasture Prime, Wry Whiskey, the Dale Kennedy Band, Jerry Sanders & Seminole Ridge, Backwater, the Florida State Bluegrass

Band, Xtremegrass and Arnold Messer and Lonesome Highway. Most of the acts are regional performers, consisting of various musicians who've toured with other bands at certain times, Elliott said.

"I work with a lot of these bands doing other local festivals," he explained. "I know them and they've all had something to do with the Withlacoochee Bluegrass Music Festival. Whether it was attending as ticket holder and camping or performing. I had a hand in choosing a couple of these bands to perform."

"They can relate to this festival, so they've been great in giving a lot of their time to get this going on again. Every one of these bands is familiar with this

festival, and I think they are more excited than I am. I'm excited, too. But to be a part of the performance and play on stage, they are ready."

The Withlacoochee River Bluegrass Festival will be from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday at 19730 SE 127th Terrace off State Road 40 in between Dunnellon and Inglis. The venue is located behind Robinson Ranch Trap & Skeet Club.

Tickets for the event are still available. Tickets are \$15 for adults; \$10 for children ages 6 to 12; and children 5 and younger are free with an adult. For information, call 352-318-3872. Concertgoers will need to bring their own lawn chairs. No alcohol and coolers are allowed.

Dunnellon boasts 15 new Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) members, who were recently certified as volunteers after an eight-week intensive training course offered through the Marion County Sheriff's Office, Bureau of Emergency Management. New members were welcomed by veteran CERT members Kathryn Taubert, Terry Rapp, Sandy Peterson-Pilling and Clinnon Alexander at a potluck dinner at Clinnon's home.

The CERT course is offered free of charge to train citizens to be the "first, first responders" in their neighborhoods if a disaster occurs that overwhelms local emergency service providers.

CERT volunteers are trained to give critical support to friends, family and neighbors in their immediate area until help arrives. The program provides volunteers with education and training about disaster preparedness for hazards that might impact their area. This includes basic response skills such as fire safety, light search

and rescue, team organization, emergency first aid and disaster medical operations. Hazards can take many forms which include storms, hurricanes, tornadoes, fires, sinkholes, chemical spills and power outages.

Using training learned in the classroom, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhoods or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help.

CERT members can also assist with non-emergency projects that improve the safety of the community, such as distributing smoke alarms, replacing smoke alarm batteries for elderly Floridians, distributing disaster preparedness in-

formation and educational materials, and providing services at special events.

More than 220 Florida communities throughout the state of Florida have CERT programs. Marion County now has 22 CERT teams comprised of 500 certified volunteers.

The Dunnellon CERT team will meet at 3 p.m. the third Thursday monthly at the Dunnellon Sheriff's office at 19995 SW 86th St. Interested neighbors are welcome to attend.

UF/IFAS Extension Service Auditorium at 2232 NE Jacksonville Road in Ocala to discuss the issue.

In addition to approving the referendum, County Commissioners must also agree to take over ownership of the venue, which will cost \$60 million to construct and serve as the future home of the Yankees' minor league squad.

If the county agreed to do so, it would eliminate the Yankees' responsibility for paying property tax on the facility. The renowned organization would be required to pay for day-to-day maintenance as well as other tangible property tax.

All told, the half-cent sales tax would generate more than \$80 million in revenue. Each municipality throughout Marion County would benefit financially from the additional sales tax. Additionally, the referendum would generate an extra \$20 million for quality of place/life projects.

That could bode well for the city of Dunnellon, Mayor Nathan Whitt said. The city would like to construct a new youth sports facility north of the city limits, allowing the Office of Greenways and Trails to resume ownership of the property, which currently is used by the Dunnellon Little League.

Officials with both the Greenways and

Trails and the city have discussed a property swap, allowing control of the land where Little League facilities are to revert back to the state in exchange for property abutting the Rio Vista development.

To do that, the city would need to build a new facility. Earmarking proceeds from the referendum to construct such a facility could allow the respective properties to change hands.

"It's a wonderful and exciting opportunity," Mayor Whitt said. "We have, hopefully, tentatively identified to utilize some of that money. We can all beat up how we're going to spend ad nauseam, but I think do we really have to dog-ear a specific part of a project to piggyback on to it, because it will be a wonderful thing for the county if it can happen."

Additionally, Eddie Esch, interim city manager, told the Council the city would stand to benefit from an additional \$400,000 in tax revenues during the course of the five-year referendum.

Baseball could benefit city, if Council steps to the plate

The city of Ocala and the New York Yankees are set to play ball.

However, before ground is broken on a proposed stadium along State Road 200 near Interstate 75, Ocala will have to deliver one heckuva pitch not only to the County Commission but to voters as well.

Keys here are the County Commissioners' willingness to place the half-cent sales tax on a ballot for a special election in March as well as their willingness to take ownership of the \$60 million stadium the Yankees would call home. If the county does take ownership, the Yankees would not be required to pay property tax on the stadium.

Voters might have a difficult time digesting that fact.

Let's face it the Yankees have plenty of bucks in the bank to pay taxes for the venue.

But allowing the ownership rights of the stadium to remain in county hands might not be all that bad. The county could sell the naming rights, generating revenues that weren't there previously.

Locally, Mayor Nathan Whitt is a firm believer and supporter of the project. If the referendum were to pass, the city of Dunnellon would stand to profit to the tune of \$400,000 during the next five years. It might not sound like a large chunk of change, but considering the current financial fiasco the city is mired in, every little penny

would make a difference.

Additionally, the sales tax referendum would generate an extra \$20 million or so to fund quality of life projects such as youth sports facilities. And that's where the first-term mayor sees the benefit of backing the city of Ocala's ambitious goal of bringing the Yankees Single-A farm team to town.

Certainly, Dunnellon's youth, and adults, could benefit from a state-of-the-art recreational facility. What isn't clear is how this fits into the bigger picture of tourism in Marion County, let alone Dunnellon.

Mayor Whitt believes the potential influx of tourists into Ocala could spill into Dunnellon.

He believes a new, modern sports facility could lend itself to Dunnellon hosting large-scale travel ball tournaments. I've seen firsthand how tournaments such as these generate additional revenues for businesses. There's no doubt that hundreds of extra visitors to a community is a boon for local businesses.

The problem here folks is if Dunnellon can latch onto the city of Ocala's "field of dreams" and buys into the mantra "if they build it, people will come."

Great, I'm all for seeing our local businesses benefiting from a boost in the tourism industry. The problem here, isn't about those folks who are coming or will come, it's



Bank not one at fault for city's fiasco

The mayor and interim city manager seem to be "fed up" with Regions Bank, because it won't negotiate with the city. I can't understand the bank's position. They actually want the city to pay them back for money they borrowed. What a strange concept.

Why would the bank want to continue negotiating? The bond payments were restructured at least once before when the city could not make payments. To top it off, the loan was probably granted based on the same false information that was being fed to the Council and public. Why should the bank now believe anything from city representatives? Council members all claim ignorance about what was happening with Greenlight financing. They claim they were kept in the dark or given wrong information. Council members say it's easy to "Monday morning quarterback." They must not have been listening to public comments at Council meetings or reading comments in the Riverland News. The real facts about Greenlight costs and projected revenues have been obvious to everyone except some council members.

How could the Council possibly believe the Fiscal Year 2013 projected income for Greenlight? It is mathematically improbable, as was pointed out at the meeting where

the budget was approved.

If the income figure was knowingly wrong when put in by staff and knowingly wrong when approved by Council, then someone has committed fraud and should be legally prosecuted.

The city has played a budget scam by approving a budget containing an income figure that was known to be inaccurate. This allowed city staff to submit purchase requests for money that wasn't there by just saying the expenditure was in the budget. It's just that the actual money wasn't there. This was done on purpose and those responsible should be prosecuted.

Financial fiasco should trigger investigation

My water/sewer utility company, doing business as the city of Dunnellon, is in serious trouble to say the least. To clarify, a portion of the total cost of the Greenlight debacle the real amount of money borrowed and spent needs to be explored.

There was the initial \$7.3 million borrowed from what the city now regards as the foolish, evil, Regions Bank. There was also Resolution 2012-19 in November 2012 "borrowing" \$1.47 million from the utility.

Through hard negotiations with itself, an interest rate of .01 percent was secured. In addition \$300,000 was transferred from the CRA fund that really just about wiped it out.

This was after the money was spent so Resolution 2012-19 had to be done to balance the books in Fiscal Year 2012. It appears no one approved or was requested to approve the transfer of funds before the fact, why not?

Now in Fiscal Year 2013, we find out \$907,825 was transferred out of the general fund, again without prior approval, at least not in a public setting.

The breakdown is \$728,062 from the public

safety infrastructure, \$58,318 from capital replacement and \$102,443 from the emergency fund.

In addition, a total \$3.32 million was transferred from the water/sewer utility funds. The breakdown amounts on the utility fund transfers are: \$1,765,262 from unrestricted equity; \$1,341,664 from bond proceeds Series 2013; and \$71,567 from the emergency fund. The total transferred from the water/sewer funds is \$3,325,490 for FY 13.

I think that unrestricted equity amount of \$1,765,262 would be called profit in the private sector. Again the transfers have already been made without any approval before the fact, just as in FY 2012. This does not seem right to me. Simply put, Resolution 2013-18 is just the city justifying on paper the past taking of money from funds to cover money already spent. Is it even legal to take 2013 bond proceeds money?

So the amount, that we know about that the city has sunk into the financial black hole known as Greenlight, is \$13.5 million. I do not think that is even the current full amount as Greenlight has been somehow operating for the past several months. I am sure we will find out next year how much money was transferred to run Greenlight and the city. Maybe the Dunnellon City motto is Ex Post Facto.

Dunnellon, years ago, should have addressed the issues that needed to be addressed instead of looking for magic sources of revenue such as Greenlight and gouging utility customers. That simple issue that a city of 1,733 residents, a small declining tax base and low per capita income cannot afford it's own police, fire and road departments.

The city administration is too bloated and expensive for a city this size. Inverness and Crystal River have gotten rid

of their police departments as they finally faced economic reality.

If Dunnellon residents want to have all the services, they should pay for them through city taxes and fees. The millage rate is too low for a city with the expenses of Dunnellon.

A fire assessment fee should have been in place for years. The city, police and fire department equipment is aging and costs will rise. There is no money in city coffers.

The city looks terrible and is dying because the city has lived beyond its means for years. It is just wrong to do what the city has done to all its utility customers. The Fiscal Year 2014 budget is a sham; resolutions will be forthcoming moving more restricted equity from the utility fund to keep the city going.

Legal costs alone will inflate the FY 2014 budget as the city battles the evil Regions Bank. I do recall that Regions Bank modified and extended the loan terms, cutting the yearly payments in half I believe.

I think this was done at the city's request and Regions worked with the city. It is ironic to hear the city blaming Regions Bank for being trusting and foolish enough to loan them money.

The city's pitiful defense seems to be what logical, sane person would ever think Greenlight would work. The, "we don't know what we were doing and do not know what happened defense" may be true, but is probably not legally sound.

It's Regions Bank's fault for trusting Dunnellon City would honor their legal contract secured by good collateral. Truly, the people who got Dunnellon in this shape should be ashamed and held accountable.

At the least, the financial crisis should trigger a much-needed outside investigation.

operated Allen's Auto Parts well into the 1990s in Dunnellon, he is accustomed to fixing things when a problem arises.

"I'm a fixer and when it's broke, you want to try and fix the problem," said Allen, a 1992 Dunnellon High graduate, as Violet looked on, days after the family hosted her fifth birthday celebration in late October. "I just wanted to ask the doctors why they can't fix it."

For Kim, perhaps the toughest thing to endure isn't the treks to the hospital, homeschooling the couple's six other children, ranging from 16 years old to 7 months old, which include four boys and two other girls.

Recently, the family was given the opportunity to test an "eye gaze," an infrared device, doctors say deciphers eye communication.

"It's not being able to hear her speak, hear her say, 'I love you,'" said Kim, explaining Violet was her great-grandmother's first name and Grace means "undeserved gift."

"We want to know what she needs, what she's thinking. It's tough. But you look into her eyes, and you know it's all there wanting to come out."

However, this isn't a tale of woe; this is about a blessing, the Forts said.

Sure there are the medical expenses, but the couple said they are blessed Allen's job as a salesman with AT&T provides "great insurance." They have a wonderful family support system who helps out when needed and their other children, at least Vance, 16, and Kimber, 14, are able to help with their siblings when the need arises.

"God has blessed us," Kim, a 1994 Dunnellon High graduate, said. "God's provisions have been enough; it might take us a while to pay off bills, but God's provisions are enough."

Instead of self-loathing and pity, the Forts said they live each day as if it's the last, especially surrounding the uncertainty

of Violet's health. Depending on Violet's health, they try to take in as much as possible when the time allows. They go camping at least once a month.

"We try to do as much as possible as a family," Kim said. "We want to make the most of every day with everyone together."

They've been on a Disney cruise and Kim's mother, Cheryl Lawson, bought the family season passes to Disney World. During their first visit, Kim said, Violet was given the royal treatment.

"We kept telling employees, we'd wait like everyone else," she said with a smile. "But they brought all of the characters over to Violet and formed a big circle around her to protect her from the crowd. You could tell Violet just loved every minute of it."

Balancing their time between providing hourly

care for Violet with spending quality time is a trick, but it works. The Forts said they make sure they schedule time with each of the children to do what they want, to make sure they are receiving the love and attention they deserve.

"They're great," Kim and Allen said. "They understand the situation. They never complain, but they also know they can tell us if they feel like their 'love tank' is empty, all they have to do is speak up and we make sure we provide that."

And everyone plays a part, no matter if the role is big or small.

"We're all hands on deck around here," Kim said.

While the family has been able to handle their day-to-day expenses of raising seven children and medical bills, they are in need of a new vehicle to transport Violet to

the various hospitals, which includes a trek to Atlanta. Currently, the Forts drive an older model van. That van is starting to show the wear and tear of the more than 200,000 miles on it.

In addition to making sure the vehicle is the right size for the whole family, it needs a wheelchair lift. Currently, the family is raising money through a variety of fundraisers. Recently, Chick-fil-A in Ocala hosted an event to benefit Violet. Other events are planned in the coming months, including this Saturday at the Victorian Holiday in the Historic District.

"Right now, by the time we get everyone in the van, it's pretty packed," Kim and Allen said.

"When we stop, we kind of make everyone get out at once. But it's funny to see everyone unload from the van."

Beasley steps down

Coach guided team for 9 years; never had losing mark

A decade of stability at the top of the Dunnellon High School football program came to an end Friday when head coach Frank Beasley announced his immediate resignation.

According to Dunnellon High School principal Ken McAteer, Beasley will remain on as a history teacher, a post McAteer said he is "great" at.

Beasley was in charge of the Tigers for nine seasons, compiling a 59-33 record while at the Marion County school. He never suffered a losing campaign and led Dunnellon to back-to-back district titles in 2009 and 2010, the Tigers' only playoff berths under his leadership. In both trips to the postseason, Dunnellon suffered first-round defeats to Ocala Vanguard.

"I have had a great nine years at Dunnellon and felt like it was the right time for a change," Beasley said in a statement via text message. "I am not sure what my future holds at this point."

McAteer confirmed Beasley's decision.

"Frank had a job (at Dunnellon) as long as he wanted one," McAteer said. "It's something that we had talked about for a couple of weeks. He gave his heart and soul to a program seven days a week for nine years, and that takes a toll on you."

In his time at Dunnellon, Beasley held a 14-1 record over Citrus County schools, with the single loss coming at home this season in a 14-8 setback to Citrus. The coach also showed a propensity for helping his players move on as student-athletes to the collegiate level, something he said was among his greatest memories while leading the Tigers.

"I'm obviously proud of all the student athletes that we helped move on to the next level," Beasley wrote.

When he joined the Tigers in 2004, Beasley came from Lake City's Columbia High School. In 2003, he was the interim head coach at Columbia and guided that squad to a 7-3 record.

At Dunnellon, Beasley suc-

ceeded Perry Brown, who left for another coaching position following the 2003 season after guiding Dunnellon to a state semifinal appearance.

A young Tigers team finished the 2013 season 6-4 overall and 3-3 in District 5A-5. McAteer said Beasley is not leaving the cupboard bare.

"Frank's left the program in great shape. We're extremely young," McAteer said. "We had a winning season, so we're looking for someone to come in and continue the great things that Frank did."

McAteer said the next coach would have to strike the same commitment to academic and athletic excellence that Beasley did. That coach will come via a statewide search.

In a small town where football rules the roost, the next person to lead the Dunnellon football team must also understand something both Beasley and his predecessor Brown were able to.

"One thing that Frank and Perry both understood was, as the head football coach, you're out there in the community," McAteer said.


