## Incumbents will face opposition for seats

### Two newcomers run unopposed, will take office in November

There will be a new mayor in town as the qualifying period for the city council concluded Friday, with Curtis

Dale Burns the lone qualifier to file for the remainder of Walter Green's term in Seat No. 1.

In addition to Burns, William "Bill" White ran unopposed for Seat No. 2, where

he will replace Larry Winkler in November in Seat No. 2. Winkler, who ran unopposed in 2016, chose not to seek another term on the council. But voters will make the trek to the poll for the November

General Election – the first time since 2012 there has been a runoff for a city council seat as incumbents Chuck Dillon (Seat No. 3) and Valerie Hanchar (Seat No. 4) will have

### Deonath rocks Ultimate Elvis, Images of the King

Much like his idol, Elvis Presley, Cote Deonath has had to pay his dues since becoming a professional Elvis Tribute Artist.

But the untold travel, the countless hours of practice honing his craft, or perhaps Presley's, finally paid off, figuratively, not literally, for the 21-year-old Dunnellon native who first donned one of Presley's signature jumpsuits at the age of 5.

Deonath finished third in the world in the Ultimate Elvis competition, an event backed by Elvis Presley Enterprises. He was the highest finishing American in two years in the 16-person field.

"It was totally surreal, because it's like, I don't have words," explained Deonath, who broke into the top 10 two years ago. "Validation, validation in that I belong in the top tier; validation this is a success. I'm improving and this is taking off."

"It's humbling to me; I can't wait to see what's next. There's so much more to achieve than that. It made it seem like, and I'm putting this in perspective, that maybe one day (winning Ultimate Elvis) could happen. I could be an Ultimate winner; it's not a pipe dream anymore, I broke that ceiling into top 5."

In the Ultimate Elvis, the

field is whittled down to 10, then to five. In the semifinals, Deonath and his competitors were required to perform two songs; those songs chosen by Elvis Presley Enterprises off a list each contestant submits prior to the event. And as fate, luck or chance, whichever you prefer, would have it, the judges chose the first two submissions off Deonath's playlist: "You'll Never Walk Alone" and "How Great Thou Art."

"I took them to church," Deonath quipped. "But 'You'll Never Walk Alone,' that's been my signature song. It was my grandma's favorite; it speaks to me. That is why I sing it, because of her."

But as he stood on stage as the competition was whittled

down to 10, the nerves and, perhaps, a bit of disappointment began to well inside of Deonath.

"It was, like, 'OK, everyone is being called down to top 10,' he admitted. "Another year gone by and I didn't do it."

But, maybe the judges were saving the best, or one of the best, for last.

Deonath was the last of the 10 names chosen.

"I couldn't react any other way, I went into a ball, I fell to my knees," he said. "It was relief, redemption from last year. I'm just elated to be there; in the back of my mind, if I can make top 5, that would be the icing on the cake."

In the follow-up round to

## Bryant, Zalak capture primary

The Marion County electorate overwhelmingly approved continuing the one mil ad valorem school tax. Voters cast 53,472 (72.56 percent) ballots in favor of the measure and 20,218 (27.44 percent) against.

In local races, County Judge, Group 2, Sarah Ritterhoff Williams retained her seat against William "Bill" Ramputi by a 41,451 (60.64 percent) to 26,903 (39.36 percent) margin.

Group 3 County Judge Tommy Thompson garnered 36,778 (54.81 percent) to 30,320 (45.19 percent) for LeAnn Mackey Barnes.

Group 4 County Judge Robert Landt kept his seat by collecting 39,987 (59.94 percent) of the votes compared to Bryon R. Aven's 26,727 (40.06 percent).

District 2 County Commissioner Kathy Bryant won another term with 22,399 (54.26 percent) to 18,885 (45.74 percent) for Mike Crimi.

In the 4th County Commission District, Carl Zalak III held off former Marion County Sheriff's Deputy Eddie Leedy by a margin of 20,995 (52.69 percent) to 18,851 (47.31 percent).

In the nonpartisan school board races, Ed Wilson 28,187 (43.22 percent) defeated Eric R. Cummings, 21,528 (33.01 percent) and Donnie Prophet, 15,501 (23.77 percent) in District 3.

In the 4th School District, Nancy Thrower 32,538 (49.24 percent) defeated incumbent Angie Boynton 18,400 (27.84 percent) and Jane Moerlie 15,149 (22.92 percent).

Kelly King won a nail-biter over Shelia Arnett and Pete Anderson in the 5th



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

## RSPOA Board reinstates night security

### Decision overturned after residents voice displeasure

The Rainbow Springs Property Owners Association President Burt Eno made the recommendation to reinstate the nighttime security patrols he cancelled the first of August at its Aug. 14 meeting.

After hearing the outrage of residents, Eno decided to hold a town hall meeting on Aug. 9 to clarify his decision. The town hall meeting was filled with residents which did not agree with Eno's reasoning. He told the audience a decision about the nighttime security would be decided by a vote of the board on Aug. 15 at the BOD's meeting.

After lengthy discussion, the motion to reinstate the third shift of

security patrol was passed unanimously by the board.

The board also talked about the code violations and asked the

POA Manager Dick Lemma why some of the violations are not corrected in a timely matter.

Other items on the agenda included discussing the park passes and some are giving their passes to people not listed on the appli-

cation. If a pass is lost, a \$25 fee will be assessed before the resident can receive the new pass.

In other action, the board:

Set up committee appointments to go over the security policies and review the duties

of the guards and another to find candidates to fill any vacancy on the board.

Their next RSPOA Board meeting will be Sept. 19.

## Attacks on news media irresponsible

We've been complacent. We thought everybody knew how important a free press was to our world and that all this talk about us being the enemy of the people would be dismissed for the silliness that it is.

But the reckless attacks have continued, instigated and encouraged by our president.

When the leader of the free world works to erode the public's trust in the media, the potential for damage is enormous, both here and abroad. We once set an example of free and open government for the world to follow. Now those who seek to suppress the free flow of information are doing so with impunity.

The time has come for us to stand up to the bullying. The role journalism plays in our free society is too crucial to allow this degradation to continue.

We aren't the enemy of the people. We are the people. We aren't fake news. We are your news and we struggle night and day to get the facts right.

On bitter cold January nights, we're the people's eyes and ears at town, village and school board meetings. We tell the stories of our communities, from the fun of a county fair to the despair a family faces when a loved one is killed.

We are always by your side. We shop the same stores, attend the same churches and hike the same trails. We struggle with daycare and worry about paying for retirement.

In our work as journalists, our first loyalty is to

you. Our work is guided by a set of principles that demand objectivity, independence, open-mindedness and the pursuit of the truth. We make mistakes, we know. There's nothing we hate more than errors but we acknowledge them, correct them and learn from them.

Our work is a labor of love because we love our country and believe we are playing a vital role in our democracy. Self-governance demands that our citizens need to be well-informed and that's what we're here to do. We go beyond the government-issued press release or briefing and ask tough questions. We hold people in power accountable for their actions. Some think we're rude to question and challenge. We know it's our obligation.

People have been criticizing the press for generations. We are not perfect. But we're striving every day to be a better version of ourselves than we were the day before.

That's why we welcome criticism. But unwarranted attacks that undermine your trust in us cannot stand. The problem has become so serious that newspapers across the nation are speaking out against these attacks in one voice today on their editorial pages.

As women's rights pioneer and investigative journalist Ida B. Wells wrote in 1892: "The people must know before they can act and there is no educator to compare with the press."

## Real American heroes

**Editor's Note:** I wrote this before Sen. John McCain's death and that is why I wrote of him in the present tense.

I want to write about Sen. John McCain and how brave he is, but I can't.

I don't know the Arizona senator.

I don't know how Sen. McCain's years as a prisoner of war affected him, but I served for a time under a captain and commanding officer of an oiler who was a former prisoner of war.

My commanding officer was a Navy pilot who was shot down over Vietnam. He was captured and held as a prisoner of war for about four years.

He returned to active duty and since he was a pilot, he needed experience on a large noncombatant before he could take command of a warship. He was a good man and a good commanding officer - unless something did not go according to plan or he was forced to deviate from his daily routine. Unfortunately, something always went wrong on the nearly 40-year-old ship.

I was responsible for maintaining the sound powered phone system, which is nothing more than an upgraded version of two tin cans and a piece of string. The phones were generally very reliable, but nothing is sailor proof and the phones sometimes broke and when they did, he either got

frustrated or angry, ripped the phone from its socket, threw it overboard. He was fine after that and returned to his usual congenial self. However, someone was always close at hand to provide him a new phone.

He was still the commanding officer when I left the ship. I heard later that a lieutenant junior grade made a mistake on the bridge. The captain blew his stack and threw a cup of hot coffee at the young officer. That incident led to the captain's retirement.

William (Bill) Norwood, of Cleveland, Tennessee, was a prisoner of war in Korea. He died earlier this year, but I got to know him well. After he returned from the war, he married Liz. She knew he was an ex-pow but married him anyway. Being Bill's anchor was her calling and with her support, Bill went on to have a successful corporate career. He and Liz raised two children without his past becoming an issue.

Bill did have his quirks. For example, he could not go to church because he felt claustrophobic. He had terrible nightmares that forced Liz to sleep in a separate bedroom because Bill was afraid he would hurt her. When she heard him still fighting that long-ago war in those awful dreams, she got up out of her bed, went to his room and watched over him until the fighting ended for one more night.

How anyone survived the brutal treatment meted out by the North Koreans, or in Sen. McCain's case, the North Vietnamese, is a mystery to me. It seems they clung to little things: an ideal, a memory, a belief. Bill, who enlisted when he was 17 years old, held on to a vision of his mother praying.

I don't know Sen. McCain, but I knew one soldier who endured as a prisoner of war.

Bill survived. He came home and lived a productive life. I don't believe Bill was ever an ex-prisoner of war because he woke up each morning knowing that when he went to sleep that night, the soldier he once was returned to that prison camp in North Korea.


I strongly disagree with President Donald Trump who said at the Iowa Family Leadership Summit when moderator Frank Luntz brought up McCain, who spent more than five years as a prisoner of war in Vietnam.

"He's not a war hero," Trump said.

Immediately modifying his original remarks, Trump said, "He's a war hero 'cause he was captured. I like people that weren't captured, OK?"

"Perhaps he's a war hero, but right now he's said some very bad things about a lot of people," Trump said.

I don't know Sen. McCain, but he, Bill Norwood and others who survived prisoner of war camps are real American war heroes.

took me back to a chair where I was to have my pedicure.

A very nice young lady came and said something to me that I could not understand. Then she pointed to my shoes and said something else I could not understand. I believe she wanted me to take off my shoes and socks.

I did so and while I was doing it, she got the hot water in the pan in front of the chair I was to sit in. As soon as I took off my shoes and socks, she pointed to my feet and said something and everybody looked at me and started laughing.

She said something in English that sounded like, "Too long." Then everybody in the salon began to chuckle.

I honestly did not know what she meant. I did not know if my toenails were too long or if I waited too long to come and get a pedicure.

Then she started the process of a pedicure. I started feeling like a "girl."

She was rather gracious, and knew exactly what she was doing and did a wonderful job with the pedicure. She cut my toenails like they have never been cut before. And, there was no blood!

## In short, a road to nowhere

I recently read about "Blue Cove" residents who are very unhappy with a city council decision to remove a 20-plus year old blockage.

My only motivations for commenting on this matter are what is lawful, what is unlawful and restricting all levels of government to their proper roles, so that people can enjoy their natural rights. I do find it interesting, that after more than 20-plus years, all of a sudden the city council is "upset" that "no one came to city about it." It sounds to me like Councilman Chuck Dillon has a personal motivation more than anything else, and is using his political office to help a family member.

Municipal codes and regulations, what are they?

One of the greatest misconceptions in America today, is this - that any "statute" or "code" passed by any governing body is the "law of the land." This is absolutely 100 percent false. Contrary to popular belief, "municipal codes" are not "the law."

At best "codes" are only "evidence of law." In and of themselves, "codes" are not "law."

When a city becomes incorporated an "artificial being" is created. A legal fiction, a "corporation." "The city of ..." is the corporation - an "artificial being."

The new corporation creates its own "codes." These codes are not "law." They are merely the regulations to operate the corporation ... and its employees.

Municipal codes only apply to certain classes of people. Those are the employees of the corporation and those that may contract with the corporation.

"Codes do not apply residents of the state or residents within the incorporated city. They only apply to employees of the city, those contracted with the city, other "artificial beings" created by the city and any natural person who willingly submits to the "codes."

The legal master of

"the city of ..." is the state which granted the creation of the new corporation. And, unless the Florida Constitution has been properly amended, the only governing body that has statutory authority to make laws of the state is our state legislature.

So obviously, if city council could legislate, then we have two sets of law in conflict! What "law" would be superior within the city limits? The state's law, or the corporation's codes?

The "artificial being" has no sovereign powers. It only has privileges, which are granted by its legal master, the state of Florida. The corporation cannot exceed the authority which created it.

So this artificial being, "the city of ..." is only administrative in nature. It is not "legislative." The corporation has no authority to create valid law that is applicable to any resident of the state.

So when "code enforcement" tells the residents "you cannot do that, because the "codes" say you can't ... "code enforcement is actually in the wrong."

They are actually violating constitutional law, and attempting to impose "civil law" upon residents unlawfully.

In conclusion, my letter is to attempt to educate other Americans of their Natural Rights, which existed before the advent of "corporations" and are, therefore, superior to all "codes" and other such "regulations."

I'm not out to attack any individual. However, I will say, I think it is short-sighted and uncaring on the part of Councilman Dillon to "offer an option" to Blue Cove residents that will impose significant cost to that group of people: Legals costs that is. It will cost the councilman, nothing.

The lawyers will argue all day long, but the truth is still the truth.

"Codes" are not the law. They are administrative in nature; only for the "smooth" operation of the corporation.

They are not for the governing of people!

## Don't forget about 1961 Tigers

I enjoyed Dwight Porter's article "Greatest Generation" in last week's Riverland News. It was good reading for this lifelong Floridian with a lot of Citrus and Marion County sand in my boots.

I would like to mention the 1961 DHS football team, coached by Bill Bomar. That team went undefeated in the regular season (10-0), then beat Father Lopez in the Ocean Bowl at Daytona Beach. That was almost a home game for Father Lopez. That school is located in Daytona Beach.

Football Championships at the high school level were decided by classification and a poll by the Florida Sports-writers Association and consisted of being ranked No. 1 in your respective classification in the final poll.

DHS was classified as a "B" school. The win over previously unbeaten Father Lopez clinched that ranking making the Tigers the Florida Class B Champions in 1961.

I have memories of that DHS Tiger football team because as a junior on the Citrus High Hurricanes, we were soundly beaten by those Tigers on our own field. Even though Dunnellon came in undefeated, we thought we could handle them. They were only a couple of years removed from 6-man football and their schedule was filled with more teams north of our school while most of our competition was south of Inverness.

We were a pretty tough bunch, but to put it bluntly, we were slower than pond water. We lacked speed: Dunnellon did not.

That Dunnellon team had a pair of guards that looked small. We discovered early on that there was nothing small about the Jones boys. Tommy and Johnny were tough, hard-nosed football players who were strong as oxen.

Wayne Powell was a big tight end and defensive stalwart. Frankie Heath was the Tiger quarterback. He was stellar.

A few other names I remember from that team are Chuckie Cassidy, Stan Stephens, Earl Otting, Robin and Chuck Davis, and a young guy who became a whale of a running back a little later named Larry Jinright, although I may be confusing Jinright with the following year.

Trying to tackle him was an adventure.

Crystal River's colorful coach Lou Cappola was reported as telling

his players to "grab ahold of Jinright and wait for help." He ran like a wounded bull.

Also, I can't remember if Stan Stephen's brother, Dix, was on that team. Stan was a very good left-handed quarterback, but that Tiger team was so loaded he played behind Frankie Heath who was named, along with Wayne Powell, to one publications All America team and invited to play in an All-Star game in California.

Neither Powell, nor Heath could make the trip.

I see some of these old guys bumping around Dunnellon now and then. Maybe I should contact a few of my old CHS buddies that are still around to challenge those old Tigers to a rematch.

Probably have to challenge them to a game of checkers. I don't think many of us could walk from end zone to end zone, much less run it. Hey, that might be the equalizer we need!

Somehow I don't think the results would be any better.

## Shame mayor was run out of office

In short order, he was "waited on" by some officials from Dunnellon who pointed out that May had a nice little business and he was welcome to keep it in Hernando where it be-

longed.

Dunnellon was a mining town full of bad actors and the upstanding Dunnellon folks were concerned something might happen to May if he set up shop in such a dangerous place.

May would have none of that and soon after setting up his business in Dunnellon, he ran for and won a seat on the city council. He served right along with some of our fine citizens who were so considerate of his safety before moving here.

May was a "strive to make a difference" public servant and was responsible for the first 100 feet of paved road in our otherwise unimproved town. After paying for our 100-foot of road improvement and requesting payment from out council, he was accused of being dishonest and refused reimbursement. He was shown the "you can leave now" hospitality by his fellow merchants on the council that was offered before he arrived here.

The rest of the story is that May made use of a parliamentary procedure move to keep council in session indefinitely and after several hours of the council in limbo, it relented and paid the \$40 for our road improvements.

For many years after that, our town had exactly 100 feet of improved road.

May did eventually return to Citrus County, but he was not forced out by fellow merchants. He left to assume the position of county judge. He would also go on to be a "make a difference" public servant for our area in the state legislature and write a book about his path from merchant to public servant.

Our town has plenty of "you can't make that up" moments in our politics, but even in this town

you have to go back over 100 years to find an analogy to what happened with our former mayor.

It is entirely possible we will have to wait another 100 years to find another public servant with the character and integrity of our former mayor and former council member and, given our track record, we will most likely give him the same treatment.

Crystal River had dropped 16 straight to the Tigers, including the last three season openers, with its last win coming in 2001. Crystal River had been outscored over the past two meetings by a combined 100-12.

But it was the Tigers who had trouble holding on to the ball in the second half. Miles Hampton recovered a fumble on the first play from scrimmage in the third quarter, then caught a 20-yard touchdown pass from Ethan McDaniel on

the semifinals, Deonath scored again when the judges chose another pair of songs he was well-prepared for: "I Can't Stop Loving You" and "Unchained Melody."

"Strong songs again," Deonath explained. "They were the first and third picks on my list, still got really good picks on that (list). I felt good about the performance."

But then there's another delay as judges call the top five back to the stage.

For this final performance of the night, he went back into Presley's well of cover songs and belted out, "My Way," by Frank Sinatra.

Once the round was complete, the five contestants milled about on stage.

That's when Deonath's name was called

out for a third-place finish.

"My brain just shut off," he said.

The key with his performance wasn't about channeling Presley's moves as much as his voice, Deonath said.

"I just decided to stick with my voice," he explained, "I chose all totally, strong songs all the way through. It was more about the voice this year; I'll make it that way next year if I make it. The voice is my win."

After hearing his name called for third place, Deonath said he was just "numb."

"I was OK, well it can't get any better than this," he added.

But he was wrong.

After the conclusion of the Ultimate Elvis, Deonath was "riding high."

opposition as the pair both seek another four-year term on the council. Cynthia Anita Williams filed to run opposite Dillon, while Pam Kern will challenge Hanchar. Dillon is on vacation and was unavailable for comment; Williams could not be reached for comment.

"I think it's exciting," Hanchar said of her upcoming campaign.

One key aspect for seeking another term, Hanchar said, is strengthening the city's financial stability.

"We have made great strides," she said. "I see positive growth, keeping our finances well-rounded, keeping it going forward, being mindful that monies we spend are just not taxes through home ownership. We have a positive financial outlook."

Hanchar believes the city "can have positive growth" in the future. She cited Publix coming in will be a major contributor, more economics, with our economics and positive growth.

"I'm excited for the bike trail," she said.

But there's also the challenge of trying to work on the Rainbow River and conserving it, "not just for those who use it today, but the generations to come."

"It's extremely important, we don't become so commercial-

ized," she said. "There's a quality people move to Dunnellon for, the small-town charm, the summer nights when you can be sitting on your front porch and say hi to neighbors. We have to keep our small charm, encourage it and be mindful of our unique watershed, the environment we all love in Dunnellon. If you build up so much, you ruin the rivers then you cannot replace that. Those have to be protected at all costs, because they are the rarest gems that Dunnellon has."

Hanchar said it's vital the city work with the Dunnellon Chamber & Business Association's business development. "We need to foster good relations that we have with the businesses we have now, to welcome the tourism," she said, noting the bike trail will bring extra visitors to the city. "Those are things that will bring people to Dunnellon and we need to make them stop, slow down and enjoy what we have to offer. We need to welcome those who come and visit, let them know they found the gem of Florida."

For Kern, it's about a change in the city government

"I think the city needs some change, and I'd like to see a lot more professionalism coming from the dais," she said. "When you're in the public eye, you should act accordingly."

Key, Kern said, we need to have some vision, some growth that is going to help the tax base and also help keep Dunnellon hometown feel.

"Whatever my constituents feel that would make their

lives better, or whatever they feel is pertinent or important to them," she explained. "I'm just a vehicle for the people I represent."

Kern considers entering the race, a "challenge." She currently serves on the Board of Adjustments for Marion County. In Treasure Island, where she grew up and lived, she served on the planning and zoning, land planning agency and the city charter review committee. Essential to her campaign, is getting out and talking to the residents and business owners.

"Discuss their concerns and listening to them," she explained. "It's important we plan for the future of Dunnellon. The more people involved, the better. We have a lot of talent in the city; there are a lot of smart, talented people here."

Burns, a homeowner for 13 years, but a full-time resident since June 2017, said he sought a way to serve.

"I love Dunnellon, I love the people of Dunnellon," said Burns, who lives on Short Tower Way and is the treasurer of the Blue Cove Association. "It's a great place to be, a great

place to bring my grandkids and my kids."

One important aspect of the future of Dunnellon is making sure the city stays on a financially stable path.

"The mayor and council have done a fantastic job up to date," he said. "I hope to continue with fiscal responsibility of keeping city on focus and on task."

Not nervous, really very excited, White said.

"Even though I've only lived here not quite a year and a half, I'm familiar with city over a longer period of time than that," White said. "I'm equally excited as the city moves forward. It's a win-win, living here and being able to get involved."

A resident of Florida since the late 1960s, White lived in South Florida before moving here full time, he's seen on numerous occasions how quickly and rapidly cities can develop and change.

"I really see Dunnellon being on the cusp of something like that happening here, although you cannot stop change, do your best to make change, smart growth, you just cannot let it be uncontrolled growth, without infrastructure and planning," he said, noting South Florida exploded without roads, schools, other utilities and "not keeping up with growth."

Tourism, White said, and how best to plan for it, should be "right on the front burner."

"You already have a budding ecotourism industry here and

in the year I've been in the city, I'm seeing the attraction, so it's here," he said. "I think what the city needs to do is figure ways that people who came here to experience the rivers, the area, take in what this area offers to encourage them to stay a while and spend their money before they leave. I think it's a lost opportunity; right now, it's nothing more than day trippers who tube down the river and get back in their cars, and maybe aren't enticed to spend a dime when they're here."

But it's the folks who come to kayak, bike and enjoy the other experiences is the target audience.

"I think that is a big part of the equation of what will make the ecotourism concept fly," he said. "It is a big ingredient in the cake. I live on the river, Blue Run Park is right across from me, I can see it, I'm quite impressed, how many people are using the trail for hiking, walking, biking and running; it's become so en vogue. Ten to 20 years ago people weren't inclined as much to do that. Visually, I can see how much that trail is being used. I think this is just the beginning, the expansion of public taking advantage of what is around them."

While Florida is growing rapidly, for the city to have the chance to take advantage of opportunities of expanding the trail system is "quite fortunate."

"We need to take advantage of it, before it slips by," White said.

School District. King garnered 25,025 (37.95 percent) to Arnett's 24,495 (37.15 percent) and Anderson's 16,418 (24.9 percent).

In the race for Circuit Judge, 5th Judicial Circuit Group 4, Don Barbee Jr. defeated Edward C. Spaight by a count of 36,480 (57.67 percent) to 26,774 (42.33 percent) to win Marion County. Barbee won the district with 131,966 (60.53 percent) to 86,064 (39.47 percent) for Spaight.

For the most part, incumbents carried the day in the local races and in the wider races, Marion Countians votes mirrored those of the rest of the state. The huge exception was in the race for governor.

Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum surprised the world Tuesday evening when he won the statewide race for governor though he lost Marion County to former congresswoman Gwen Graham. The surprise win sets up a General Election between the Sen. Bernie Sanders-backed Gillum and Ron De Santis. Graham won the county with 10,115 (41.12 percent); Gillum 7,206 (29.3 percent); Philip Levine, 3,273 (13.31 percent); Jeff Greene won 2,723 (11.07 percent). Chris King (811/3.3 per-

cent), John Wetherbee (300/1.22 percent) and Alex "Lundy" Lundmark (168/0.68 percent). The statewide contest ended with Gillum bringing in 517,833 (34.3 percent) votes to Graham's 472,914 (31.32 percent) and Levine's 306,605 (20.31 percent). Greene finished with 151,981 (10.07 percent).

Ron De Santis, backed by President Donald Trump, trounced his seven competitors that included Agriculture Commissioner Adam H. Putnam. De Santis won 23,152 (53.16 percent) of the vote compared to Putnam's 17,815 (40.9 percent). Bob White (751/1.72 percent), Bob Langford (550/1.26 percent), Timothy M. Devine (408/0.94 percent), Bob Baldauf (324/0.74 percent), and John Joseph Mercadante (183/0.42 percent). De Santis won statewide with 913,954 (56.47 percent) to 591,506 (36.55 percent) for Putnam.

Republican Gov. Rick Scott 39,332 (89.28 percent) handily Roque "Rocky" De La Fuente 4,723 (10.72 percent) in the Republican Primary for the U.S. Senate. Scott also won the state with 1,452,875 (88.62 percent) to De La Fuente's 186,611 (11.38 percent), setting up a General Election against incumbent Democrat U.S. Senator Bill Nelson, who was unopposed in the Primary.

In the Democrat Pri-

mary for the Congressional 2nd District, Brandon Peters beat Bob Rackleff in Marion County with 2,240 (60.67 percent) to 1,452 (39.33 percent), but Rackleff narrowly won the districtwide vote 29,324 (50.84 percent) to Peters' 28,353 (49.16 percent).

Republican Ted Yoho with 11,479 (71.61 percent) of the votes, handily defeated Judson Sapp 4,552 (28.39 percent) in the 3rd U.S. Congressional District. Yoho won the district almost by the same margin with 54,828 (76.27 percent) to Sapp's 17,059 (23.73 percent). Yoho will face Yvonne Hayes Hinson in the General Election. Hinson collected 5,463 (62.48 percent) of the vote. Tom Wells finished with 2,600 (29.73 percent) and Dushyant Jethagir Gosai 681 (7.79 percent), who came in third. Districtwide, Hinson ended the evening with 31,625 (59.5 percent); Wells 17,647 (33.2 percent); and Gosai 3,879 (7.3 percent).

Republican Ashley Moody defeated Frank White by a margin of 24,575 (58.43 percent) to 17,481 (41.57 percent) to win the Republican nod for Attorney General. She also won statewide and will face off against Sean Shaw who won the county with 15,606 (69.71 percent) against Ryan Torrens with 6,781 (30.29 percent). Moody won statewide with 880,010 (56.8 percent of the vote to 669,240 (43.2 percent). Shaw won the

Democrat Primary with 1,024,202 (73.7 percent) to 365,410 (26.3 percent) votes for Torrens.

In the race for Agriculture Commissioner, Republican State Sen. Matt Caldwell, 15,762 (38.99 percent) defeated Denise Grimsley, 11,581 (28.65 percent). Baxter Troutman 7,444 (13.94 percent) came in third and Mike McCalister 5,636 (13.94 percent) finished in fourth.

Statewide, Caldwell harvested 521,613 (34.58 percent); Grimsley, 401,538 (26.62 percent); Troutman, 392,536 (26.03 percent); and McCalister, 192,528 (12.77 percent).

On the Democrat ballot for Agriculture Commissioner, Nicole "Nikki" Fried primaried Roy David Walker and Jeffrey Duane Porter. In Marion County, Fried had 12,574 (55.26 percent) of the vote; Walker, 5,886 (25.87 percent); and Porter, 4,295 (18.87 percent). Statewide, Fried brought in 820,044 (58.61 percent); Walker, 356,970 (25.51 percent); and Jeffrey Duane Porter, 222,236 (15.88 percent).

Incumbent 22nd District State Representative Charlie Stone won 10,525 (69.77 percent) easily dispatched Brigitte Smith 4,561 (30.23 percent). He won the district with 14,633 (71.51 percent) to 5,829 (28.49 percent). He has no Democrat challengers.



**Orange Butter Sponge Cake**

- 8 ounces butter, plus additional for buttering pan
- 2 cups cake flour, plus additional for flouring pan
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 4 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 tablespoon Angostura orange bitters
- 1 cup freshly squeezed orange juice
- powdered or extra-fine sugar, for dusting

Heat oven to 350 F.

Butter and flour two 9-inch cake pans. Sift flour three times and add baking powder and salt. Set aside.

With electric mixer, cream butter and sugar until light and creamy, about 10 minutes. Add eggs one at a time, beating well between additions. Add vanilla and orange bitters.

Divide flour mixture into four portions. Set electric mixer on medium low and add flour alternately with orange juice, starting and ending with flour. Mix just until incorporated after each addition.

Divide batter evenly between cake pans and bake 35-40 minutes, or until cake pulls away from sides of pans. Remove from oven and cool 5 minutes in cake pans before turning out.

**Pulled-Pork Sliders with Bitters**

Servings: approximately 14 small sandwiches

**Chili Rub:**

- 2 tablespoons Angostura aromatic bitters

- 1 teaspoon salt

**3-3 1/2 pounds boneless pork shoulder roast**

- 1 tablespoon cooking oil

- 1 can (15 ounces) unseasoned tomato sauce

- 2 tablespoons Nature's Intent apple cider vinegar
- 1 tablespoon Angostura aromatic bitters
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- 3 large cloves garlic, chopped
- 1-2 tablespoons cornstarch (optional)

**14 small slider buns**

To make Chili Rub: Stir together aromatic bitters, chili powder and salt; let stand 10 minutes.

Cut pork shoulder across grain into 1 1/2-2-inch thick slices; trim excess fat. If needed, cut into chunks to remove some fat.

Rub meat with chili mixture. In 8-quart pot or 9-10-inch wide, high-sided saute pan with lid, heat oil. Add meat and brown on both sides, about 15 minutes total. Remove meat and place on plate; keep warm.

To make Bitters Sauce: Combine tomato sauce, brown sugar, apple cider vinegar, aromatic bitters, chili powder and garlic cloves; stir well. Pour into hot, empty pan. Simmer 5 minutes, stirring and scraping bottom of pan.

Return meat to pan; spoon sauce over meat. Cover and cook 1 hour and 15 minutes on low, rearranging meat halfway through cooking. Transfer meat to plate; cover with foil to keep warm.

To thicken sauce, if desired: Let sauce cool in pan 5 minutes then whisk in cornstarch. Bring to boil; continue to cook and whisk until slightly thickened.

To serve: Pull meat apart with two forks or fingers. Serve warm on buns, drizzled with sauce.
