
The meal will be served from 4 to 6 p.m. and include salad, beverage, garlic bread and dessert. Advanced tickets are required and will not be available at the door.

Perhaps it was both symbolic and fitting that Bobby James' retirement ceremony was at the Silver River Museum. It was there, in a one-room schoolhouse, where James began his career as a student in the Marion County Public School System. It was James, who is retiring after having spent the past 11 years on the Marion County School Board, who championed to have the building relocated to the Silver River Museum.

"It gave me a start in education," said James, who was presented with a key to the schoolhouse. "What it means to me more than anything is that education is the key to being successful in this country."

"I went from starting in a one-room school to being a three-time chairman of school board and looking at where I ended up in

terms of my career in education, the key is symbolic, it's small, but it unlocks so much educational opportunities and will help you, simply help you in whatever you do. Whether you start in a one-room schoolhouse or in one of the multi-million dollar facilities we have now throughout the county."

And James' ceremony proved he touched many lives. "For all the people who came out, and said thank you and appreciated my service, it meant a lot to me," said James, whose final day on the School Board will be Nov. 19. "If I have touched one life, for the better, then I'm happy for it."

But he did have a message for those who came to wish him well. "To all of them, I told them if you needed to say it, say it now rather than over me," he quipped.

Utility sale set to close

Deal will be finalized Friday

Within the next 24 hours, the city will officially be out of the water and sewer business, as the sale of its utility system to the Florida Governmental Utility Authority (FGUA) will be finalized Friday. The deal culminates in an almost year-long effort by the city to divest its utility system to FGUA, which operates facilities in 14 counties statewide.

The city's outstanding debt as of Monday for the utility system is \$10.8 million, according to Finance Director Jan Smith. The city does not have final numbers as to what it will gain from the sale, Smith added.

The process to move forward to Friday's closing began Tuesday in Tampa, with Mayor Burns and city staff attending the soft closing. Final documents are to be signed Friday, according to City Administrator Dawn Bowne. FGUA hosted three customer informational meetings Wednesday, Oct. 17, at City Hall. In addition, FGUA mailed informational packets to customers to guide them through the account transition if they did not attend one of the three meetings, Bowne said. The City and FGUA will issue a joint press release announcing a successful close upon completion of the process.

"We're held to the same standards of open records, meetings and we believe in transparency," said Steve Spratt, FGUA systems manager/VP, during the second of the three informational meetings. "We pretty much understand those standards of doing



Rebrand, rebuild Jazz Up

With another Jazz Up Dunnellon behind us, the Dunnellon Chamber & Business Association is seeking feedback about what went well, what can be done better and what didn't go exactly well.

That Chamber officials are being proactive in soliciting feedback is a positive step.

First, and foremost, an early afternoon start isn't necessary. Florida weather being what it is, we can never be certain if it will be too hot, too cold or too wet. But the event, for a number of years, always started late afternoon/early evening. It's best to return to a later start, when we hope it is cooler and the sun isn't beating down on folks.

Second, it's time to rebrand the event.

Folks who come eager to hear jazz music are often disappointed that Jazz Up Dunnellon isn't just "jazz" music. If we want a variety of musical genres, which often draws large crowds, then that's fine. Call it the "Two Rivers Music Festival," or if the moniker "Jazz Up Dunnellon" is truly important, then focus on the "jazz."

While there are plenty of performers who took to their respective "stages," several folks bemoaned the Historic District was too compact and musical acts along East Pennsylvania Avenue were too spread out.

Event organizers need to give serious consideration and do their due diligence to partnering with the city council, county commissioners and Marion County Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) about

rerouting through traffic along East Pennsylvania Avenue and shutting down the main thoroughfare and setting up actual stages along the main strip.

We know we have often heard it cannot be done, but with the proper planning, we should at least start asking questions. If Ocala can shut down State Road 40 for its annual Christmas parade, one would think its feasible here.

Doing so, would require the city to follow through on adding viable, much-needed parking lots in and around the business district. A plan, the council has said, is in the works.

In securing bands, now is the time to begin reaching out to artists from across the Central Florida region, place notices in every form of medium available to garner interested performers, their potential fees and, there is no reason, we cannot ask bands to come play for free, especially if they are up-and-comers (see, Gainesville).

Lastly, the Chamber needs to begin promoting the event months in advance and use every form of medium it has at its disposal, from newspapers, radio stations and television stations to social media, because not all attendees use social media.

The sooner we begin promoting the event throughout the region, the larger the crowds become and the bigger the event becomes. We certainly shouldn't forget that word of mouth from those who come is big in promoting such an event and will only help in promoting one of the Chamber's signature events.

Transgender preteen

TIME ran a story about my hometown! Woohoo! a small farm town tucked away off the beaten path in Southeastern Oklahoma made national news!

The news wasn't the type I hoped it would be. It was about a small school trying to accommodate a 12-year-old-transgender student in the seventh grade.

My older sister couldn't date until she was 16 and even then, I had to chaperone when she dated a chairman from Perrin Field, so in my mind, allowing a child to identify as the opposite sex at an age before reaching adulthood is just plain wrong.

According to the story, a school district in southern Oklahoma was forced to shut down for two days after parents used a Facebook group to threaten violence against a transgender seventh-grade student.

Superintendent Rick Beene closed Achille Public Schools after parents posted claims on a Facebook group "Achille ISD

Parents Group" that the student, who identifies as a girl, was looking over the stalls in the girls' bathroom.

and beyond to make sure he has his own restroom yet he is still using the girls. REALLY... Looks like its going to be a long year."

Beene would not confirm whether the alleged bathroom incident occurred.

The post set off reactions from other adults who referred to the 7th grade student as "this thing" and "half baked maggot." One parent repeatedly referred to the student as "he" and suggested a "good sharp knife" stop the student. Another parent said that their child should "whip his a — until he quits coming to school," according to the TIME story.

Beene told TIME he made

the decision to close both the elementary schools, which houses kindergarten through eighth grade, and the high school on the advice of local law enforcement.

It's not easy being different in a small town. Some of the boys teased me unmercilessly because they thought my parents were wealthy. They were, but they weren't then. I finally had a couple of fights and that was the end of that. I always knew we were poor when daddy moved us back to Achille, his hometown.

Then, there was the girl who moved to town when she was in the eighth grade. She — (gasp!) — smoked cigarettes! She wore oversized sunshades that were way too big for her face and wore blue leotards, pantyhose or something on her legs. Peers teased her unmercilessly and her family left town before the school year ended. And sure enough, another quick internet search showed that this family was also moving.

The updated TIME story stated that for the second time in less than two years, Brandy



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

Heat oven to 350°F. Prepare two muffin pans with vegetable pan spray.

In large pan, melt butter over medium heat. Stir flour into butter and cook 2 minutes on medium heat, stirring constantly. Gradually whisk milk into flour mixture and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Reduce heat to low and stir in cheeses, onion powder, dry mustard and pepper. Stir in cooked pasta.

Divide evenly into prepared pans. Bake 15 minutes or until bubbly. Cool in pans 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, in saucepan, heat chili according to package directions. Serve each macaroni cup on top of 1/4 cup chili.

Tip: To make ahead, refrigerate macaroni and cheese cups in muffin pans after baking. When ready to serve, remove from pans and microwave 30-45 seconds each until heated through.

- 6 cups favorite cake recipe or mix

the best job we can.” FGUA has a Board of Directors that has six members who are appointed, not elected, Spratt said.

“Wherever we go, we cannot be there without permission, Marion County and Dunnellon invited us in to solve some utility problems,” Spratt explained, noting FGUA operates 12 systems in Marion County.”

The key with FGUA, Spratt told utility customers, is its sole focus is on water and sewer systems.

“We’re not really distracted by roads, police and fire,” he said, noting FGUA has been operating since 1999. “We’ve also bought and sold systems.”

Critical in acquiring the city system was securing a low-interest loan from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), which approved investing more than \$12 million in water and wastewater infrastructure in Dunnellon. The loan put FGUA and USDA in unchartered waters because this is the first time a loan has been approved to purchase a system, Spratt said in

May. “Again, this is a unique transaction for USDA,” said Spratt, who noted the FGUA was notified of its loan approval May 23. “(The purchase) really does have a lot of benefits for everyone; from stabilizing the utility, the rates; it’s got a lot of win-win benefits all over the place.”

USDA agreed too, according to a news release the agency issued announcing the loan approval. All told, the utility systems FGUA will acquire serves 7,106 users in the city of Dunnellon, Chatmire, Rio Vista, Rainbow Springs and Juliette Falls.

“That started producing savings for the city,” Spratt said. “It became an opportunity to save money, stabilize rates and pour more resource into the system.”

FGUA also has the ability to secure state grants and, according to Spratt, and the \$6 million the city has already been awarded can be transferred to FGUA.

“We deliver those projects well,” Spratt said about state grant projects.

But what was on the minds of customers most, is how the sale of the utility system will

affect them. FGUA officials explained that they won’t become FGUA utility customers until Nov. 1. That, they said, is when bills will come from FGUA, not the city. In addition, those who have their bills paid automatically through Electronic Funds Transfers (EFT) will need to revise payment information with their respective banks, officials said.

Most important, the first two bills, customers should pay. Once the EFTs have been established, customers who have monies taken straight from their account will see a note on the bill, “Do Not Pay.”

“We’ve made these transitions before,” Spratt said. “We try to make them as smooth as possible. We expect there to be hick ups and bumps along the way.”

Spratt told utility customers they will not see a rate increase for a minimum of two years, but they could see a CPI Index increase. US Water will provide maintenance services as well as emergency calls, should they arise.

“You’ll probably see a lot more of them (in the area),” Spratt said US Water vehicles, not-

ing the company takes care of FGUA assets in Crystal River as well as in central Florida on line breaks and hurricane response.

Per the pending sale, the agreement between the city and FGUA would call for:

Initiation of the capital improvement program and Renewal and Replacement Plan to invest approximately \$9.4 million in the water and sewer systems over the initial 5-year FGUA ownership period;

Invest approximately 10 percent of revenue each year in the renewal and replacement of utility assets;

Establish and maintain a customer advisory committee to seek customer input and facilitate communications with customers under FGUA ownership;

Maintain existing water and wastewater rates upon acquisition for a period of two years. Thereafter, the FGUA will use its best efforts to avoid rate increases, but believes that rates will only require the standard inflationary indexing pursuant to existing FGUA policy, unless further increases are required to meet financing or regulatory requirements.

Dunnellon man, 47, charged with murder

No bond set for suspect

A 47-year-old Dunnellon man has been charged with second-degree murder in the shooting death of a Gerald Lee Bryant, a 50-year-old Spring Hill resident, on Wednesday night in the 13300 block of Southwest 106th Place, according to the Marion County Sheriff’s Office.

Eric Matthews shot and killed Bryant while Bryant was attempting to visit his three biological children, the sheriff’s office stated in a news release.

Per the report, at approximately 7 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 17, deputies responded to 13365 SW 106th Place in Dunnellon in reference to a shooting that had just occurred. During their investigation, deputies and

Major Crimes detectives discovered that Matthews is currently married to Bryant’s ex-wife and is living with her and Bryant’s three children. Bryant’s ex-wife had invited Bryant to come over to the home to visit with his biological children.

Matthews was unhappy that Bryant was at the home, the report stated, so he traveled to his home and began a physical altercation with Bryant. During this altercation, Matthews shot Bryant in the chest and Bryant later passed away at the hospital.

Bryant’s three children and his ex-wife were inside the home at the time of the incident and were witnesses to the crime.

Matthews is currently being charged with one count of second degree murder and two counts of battery. He is currently being held in the Marion County Jail on no bond.

rewarding feeling.

"It is rewarding to know that they felt I had some small impact on their careers or the lives of their children, it's a great feeling," he said, admitting it was bittersweet. "You do, you do get emotional about it?"

"When I think about the young people, or people I've worked with over the years. It's tremendous. The reason I

got into (education) was to impact the lives of people, students and communities. I think I've been a part of it. We know we're impacting the lives of young people and that's important."

His lengthy career included 12 years as principal at Dunnellon High School, where "during that tour of duty, we did leave some things that will help the young people," James said, mentioning the Chatmire Community Center, the development of the Boys & Girls program and establishing a scholarship program

at Dunnellon Elementary School.

"Those are things I'm proud of, being a part of it," he said, also recalling how they established a program allowing Dunnellon area students to go to the College of Central Florida to learn how to swim.

In addition to his tenure at Dunnellon High, lights were added to the softball field and much-needed improvements to the track, because the student-athletes "were running track in the parking lot."

"When I look back on my time, we did a lot," he said.

"We were struggling with football and the athletic programs as a whole; now, the school has one of the best around now. I look at where we were academically, and we posted a sign, 'A commitment to excellence.' That meant we were going to be working toward excellence in every aspect we were doing. The people of the (Dunnellon) community are special, and always will be."

But James doesn't see his latest retirement as an end, but the transition into a new arena, a new journey.

"If I can help the communities in other ways now, I will," he said of his 47-year career in education, which went from being a teacher, to an administrator to the first African-American in Marion County history to serve on the School Board. "I know the thing I will say is the trip I've had in 47 years, dealing with public, has been a tremendous trip. Thinking of some things we were able to accomplish, lives we have touched, we improved of being in education. I think that's so important."

Rose is planning to move her family to a new town, saying she no longer feels safe in Achille because of violent threats against her 12-year-old transgender daughter, Maddie.

The TIME article stated that two years ago, the same concerns drove the family from

Sherman, Texas, where Maddie experienced "horrendous" school bullying after she transitioned. Some students had forced Maddie into the boys' bathroom and taunted her to commit suicide, Rose said.

Sherman, with a population of 41,000, is about 30 miles south of Achille.

According to TIME, the move to Achille in 2017 was supposed to give Maddie a "fresh


start." Now the family is moving again — this time to Houston, seeking "a more open, diverse community for people like my daughter" — as Rose fears for Maddie's safety in the small town where she became the center of a firestorm this week.

I'm just going to end on this: A small town of fewer than 500 people is not a place to find a fresh start if you're different.
