



Commissioners Faced With Two Versions Of A Balanced Budget

County commissioners continued to hammer away at next year's budget at an afternoon workshop on Tuesday, Aug. 21, with two balanced budget proposals vying for selection and presentation to the citizenry at the two required public hearings scheduled for September.

The two proposals -- one prepared by County Coordinator Parrish Barwick and Clerk of Court Kirk Reams, and the second prepared by Barwick and Commission Chairman Hines Boyd -- accomplish the same basic goal of balancing the budget, but do so by different means.

The commission focused solely on the first proposal Tuesday, with the second scheduled for discussion this past Thursday morning (Aug. 23).

Judging from the brief comments that Boyd offered on Tuesday, however, the main differences between the two proposals are that the Barwick/Boyd budget would reduce the millage rate, thereby reducing property taxes; treat the fiscally constrained money as a reserve; and fund small business development as part of the coordinator's office, as opposed to a contracted service.

It would also, Boyd said, not give every department exactly the funding that each requested.

The Barwick/Reams proposal, by contrast, would keep the millage rate at the current level, thereby generating a little more money; count the fiscally constrained money as general revenue; grant the Sheriff and Tax Collector the increases they requested; and continue to fund small business development from the professional services account as a contractual service.

The latter contract, which pays for Dr. Dallas Garrett's services, was approved for a six-month period at a cost of slightly more than \$4,000 monthly.

Some highlights of Tuesday's discussion, as it pertained to the Barwick/Reams proposal:

* The Sheriff's Department would receive the \$165,000 it requested.

* All building maintenance funds would be consolidated into a central account under the administration of the coordinator, as opposed to each department having its own building maintenance account, as is presently the case.

* Some people and positions would be shifted in certain operations, such as housing and planning for example, to reduce costs, with the underlying understanding that vacant positions would go unfilled, i.e., reduction through "attrition".

* The fee for the residential landfill assessment would be reduced from the current \$224 to \$174.88, making for a flat \$50 reduction -- a decrease that Boyd has spearheaded. And the commercial side of the assessment is also being reworked, with the details to be released in time.

* The Road Department and the mine would operate as separate entities.

1st Floridians Conference Bringing In The Money

The First Floridians: First Americans Conference, scheduled for Oct. 3-6 in the Monticello Opera House, appears to be gaining momentum in recent weeks, in terms of the fundraising.

Dr. Anne Holt, the sparkplug behind the project, reported on Wednesday, Aug. 22, that the fundraising effort has now generated \$15,500, with \$2,500 of it coming in the last couple of weeks.

That \$2,500 resulted from a \$500 contribution from the Monticello City Council on Aug. 7; a \$1,000 contribution from the Jefferson County Commission on Aug. 16; and another \$1,000 contribution from two private individuals during the same period.

Early in the process, Dr. Holt was able to secure a \$10,000 grant from the Florida Humanities Council, which started the process. Meanwhile, checks in the amount of \$25 for registration to the conference continue coming in, with the farthest registration so far

coming from a professor of archeology in Nepal in South Asia, according to Dr. Holt.

The conference will feature some of the leading experts in the fields of archeology, anthropology and paleontology. It is being billed as "arguably the most significant archeological conference in America in 2012."

Among the confirmed speakers thus far are Mary Glowacki, Florida state archaeologist; Dr. Kenneth Sassaman, professor of Florida archaeology at the University of Florida; Lee Newsom, paleobotanist/archaeologist at Pennsylvania State University; and Dr. Michael Waters, director of the Center for the Studies of the First Americans at Texas A&M University.

Generating widespread interest in the conference is new evidence being uncovered that suggests early man inhabited this area much earlier than previously believed. Such discoveries hold the potential to debunk the longstanding theory that early man migrated to the Americas via the Bering Strait.



Mosquito-Borne Illness Advisory In Jefferson County

Tuesday morning, both the Jefferson and Leon County Health Departments issued a mosquito-borne illness advisory in both counties after a Tallahassee man was diagnosed with the West Nile virus after visiting Jefferson County.

The Jefferson County Health Department issued the following news release. This is to advise you that there has been increased mosquito-borne disease activity in areas of Leon and Jefferson counties.

A resident of Leon County, who also visited Jefferson County during the time he was bitten, has tested positive for West Nile virus. In addition, we have one presumed positive for Eastern Equine Encephalitis virus (EEE) in Leon County's sentinel chicken flock.

Although none of Jefferson County's mosquito pools has tested positive for any mosquito-borne disease, Jefferson recently had a horse test positive for EEE infection. The risk of transmission to humans has been increased.

Both county health departments remind residents and visitors to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes. County mosquito control offices and the health departments continue surveillance and prevention efforts and encourage everyone to take basic precautions to help limit exposure by following the Department of Health recommendations.

To protect yourself from mosquitoes, you should remember "Drain and Cover":

DRAIN standing water to stop mosquitoes from multiplying.

COVER water from garbage cans, house gutters, buckets, pool covers, coolers, toys, flowerpots or any other containers where sprinkler or rainwater has collected.

Discard old tires, drums, bottles, cans, pots and pans, broken appliances and other items that aren't being used.

Empty and clean bird-baths and pet's water bowls at least once or twice a week.

Protect boats and vehicles from rain with tarps that don't accumulate water.

Maintain swimming pools in good condition and appropriately chlorinated. Empty plastic swimming pools when not in use.

COVER skin with clothing or repellent.

CLOTHING - Wear shoes, socks and long pants and long-sleeves. This type of protection may be necessary for people who must work in areas where mosquitoes are present.

REPELLENT - Apply mosquito repellent to bare skin and clothing.

Always use repellents according to the label. Re-

pellents with DEET (N,N-diethyl-m-toluamide), picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus and IR3535 are effective.

Use mosquito netting to protect children younger than two months old.

COVER doors and windows with screens to keep mosquitoes out of your house.

Repair broken screening on windows, doors, porches and patios.

PROTECT PETS from mosquito bites.

Mosquitoes can transmit heartworms to your dog and cat, so please call your veterinarian about the best precautions to take for your pets. Although curable if caught early enough, heartworm treatment is expensive and difficult for animals.

Tips on Repellent Use:

*Always read label directions carefully for the approved usage before you apply a repellent. Some repellents are not suitable for children.

*Products with concentrations of up to 30 percent DEET are generally recommended. Other US Environmental Protection Agency-approved repellents contain Picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR3535. These products are generally available at local pharmacies. Look for active ingredients to be listed on the product label.

* Apply insect repellent to exposed skin or onto clothing but not under clothing.

* In protecting children, read label instructions to be sure the repellent is age-appropriate. According to the CDC, mosquito repellents containing oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under the age of three years. DEET is not recommended on children younger than two months old.

* Avoid applying repellents to the hands of children. Adults should apply repellent first to their own hands and then transfer it to the child's skin and clothing.

* If additional protection is necessary, apply a permethrin repellent directly to your clothing. Again, always follow the manufacturer's directions. DOH continues to conduct statewide surveillance for mosquito borne illnesses, including West Nile virus infections, Eastern Equine Encephalitis, St. Louis encephalitis, malaria and dengue.

Jobless Rates Up Across The State

Jefferson and Madison counties' jobless rates rose again in July, reflecting a statewide trend that saw Florida's unemployment rate register a 0.2 percentage point increase from the previous month.

This according to the latest statistics released by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (FDEO) on Friday, Aug. 17.

The figures show Florida's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 8.8 percent in July, up from 8.6 percent in June, while Jefferson County's rate climbed from 7.7 to 8.7 percent and Madison County's from 10.8 to 11.4 percent during the same period.

"There were 816,000 jobless Floridians out of a labor force of 9,269,000," the FDEO reports. "The July 2012 rate was 1.8 percentage points lower than the year-ago rate of 10.6 percent."

The U.S. unemployment rate, meanwhile, was 8.3 percent in July.

The DEO points out that Florida's seasonally adjusted total nonagricultural employment was 7,331,400 in July, "a decrease of 3,300 jobs over

the month."

"The number of jobs in the state was up 69,900 over the year, an increase of 1.0 percent from July 2011," the FDEO reports. "Nationally, the number of jobs was up 1.4 percent over the year."

For Jefferson County, the 8.7 percent rate translates into 581 jobless persons out of a labor force of 6,702, compared with 513 jobless persons out of a labor force of 6,695 in June.

In July 2011, the comparable figures were 624 jobless persons out of a workforce of 6,755 when the unemployment rate was 9.2 percent.

For Madison County, the 11.4 percent translates into 823 jobless persons out of a labor force of 7,193, compared with 779 jobless persons out of a labor force of 7,204 in June.

In July 2011, the comparable figures were 920 jobless persons out of a labor force of 7,307, when the unemployment rate was 12.6 percent.

Seasonally adjusted means the figures have been purged of seasonal and other factors that would increase the numbers. The statistics do not reflect individuals who

have given up the search for work or who are underemployed or employed part time.

The FDEO reports that the industry gaining the most jobs was professional and business services, up 41,600 jobs, followed by trade, transportation, and utilities, up 19,500 jobs; private education and health services, up 17,400 jobs; and leisure and hospitality, up 14,900 jobs.

The industries losing jobs over the year included construction, down 16,900 jobs; total government, down 10,170 jobs; and other services, down 4,100 jobs.

Monroe County continued to have the state's lowest unemployment rate at 5.3 percent, followed by Walton County at 5.6 percent; Okaloosa County at 6.4 percent; and Franklin at 6.5 percent.

Hendry County continued to have the state's highest unemployment rate at 16.1 percent, followed by Flagler County at 12.7 percent; St. Lucie at 12.6 percent; and Indian River at 12.2 percent.

The FDEO reports that 20 of Florida's 67 counties experienced double-digit unemployment in July, up from 15 in June.

health department's environmental health division at (850) 342-0170, ext. 209. After the passing of Tropical Storm Debby and many heavy rains since, the mosquito boom in Jefferson County has more than become quite obvious.

To assist residents in combating the mosquito problem, in cooperation with Jefferson County government and the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, the Jefferson County Health Department operates a seasonal mosquito control program.

There is no charge for any of their services. Residents of the county experiencing problems with adult mosquitoes may request spray truck services by calling (850) 997-3343 or by email at JeffersonMosquitoControl@doh.state.fl.us.

Please leave your name, address and phone number. An auto-dialer system will call you the night spraying is scheduled.

You should request service each week that you are experiencing problems with mosquitoes. Your cooperation is

of great assistance to their program, as it allows them to target those areas that are currently affected by mosquitoes and limits the use of resources and chemical pesticides.

In addition to spray truck services, those citizens with ponds or ditches that hold water for a period of time on their property, can get the Gamboa fish or larvaciding services available upon request.

The Gamboa fish eat the mosquito larvae.

Larvacides work by preventing the emergence of adult mosquitoes and are cheaper and more effective than spraying the adults.

The Mosquito Control Program is currently using Altosid XR, which provides effective treatment for up to 150 days, at which time they can retreat.

Mark Positano, Environmental Specialist III, Director of Jefferson County Mosquito Control advises that most mosquitoes can't fly very far, so if you have mosquitoes they are likely breeding close by. By eliminating standing water in buckets and old tires, it will destroy

possible breeding grounds for mosquitoes. "You'll also want to check that your gutters aren't holding water, things like old boats don't have a puddle in them, or that your trays under the flowerpots don't stay full of water," he said. "Even a teaspoon of water can be enough to spawn a multitude of biting adult mosquitoes," Positano added.

Congressional Gold Medal To Be Awarded In Town Saturday



Wars Post 251 spokesman John Nelson relayed that the award was escorted from Washington DC and now awaits being awarded to Sneed on Saturday during a special ceremony.

Lieutenant General Lawrence F.

Snowden, a general in the Marine Hall of Valor, will be presenting the medal to Sneed.

Sneed, the only living African-American World War II veteran in Jefferson County, enlisted into the United States Marine Corps on April 29, 1944. At that time, he did not realize that he would one day become a vital part of America's history.

Three years before Sneed's entrance into the Marines, President Franklin Roosevelt signed the Executive Order 8802 just months before the Pearl Harbor attack, which changed history. The Executive Order es-

tablished the Fair Employment Practice Commission, which was an act that ended racial discrimination by any government agency. This allowed African Americans to serve this country in one of the most recognized branches of military: The United States Marine Corps.

The integration in the Marine Corp marked the beginning of the end to segregation in America. Between 1942 and 1946, 20,000 African Americans trained at Camp Montford Point, and Sneed was among the nation's first African American Marines.

Beginning in 1944, Sneed was in action for nearly two years in the Asiatic Pacific area during World War II. Prior to his honorable discharge on July 26, 1946, Sneed had earned his way up to a ranking of Corporal.

Additional information regarding the range of activities that may be undertaken will be provided at the public hearing.

For all Florida CDBG activities that are proposed, at least seventy percent (70%) of the funds must benefit low and moderate income persons.

In developing an application for submission to FDEO, Jefferson County must plan to minimize displacement of persons as a result of planned CDBG activities. In addition, Jefferson County is required to develop a plan to assist displaced persons.


He sang, "Floridiana Hotel," "Native Land," "Ballad of Harry Morgan," "Sunshine Kid," and "Out On Cedar Key."
