## Economic Development Event Called Successful

**Economic Development Director** Julie Conley raved this week about the success of the recent site selection consultants' program at the Honey Lake Plantation Resort and Spa.

Speaking to the Economic Development Council Board on Monday morning, Feb. 17, Conley said the \$1,000 the group had spent for the event was well worth it. She

said nine outside consultants and several state officials had attended the three-day affair.

"It exceeded my expectations," Conley said. "The whole point was to let the site consultants know that we're on the map, and it did that."

She said the fact that north Florida had been able to host the event was a triumph in itself, given that these programs typically were held in places such as Chicago, Houston and Las Vegas.

Conley said the site consultants conveyed that the most important consideration for communities to attract businesses was to have a ready inventory of available sites, complete with infrastructure and the appropriate zoning laws in place.

The second most important consideration, per the consultants, was a ready workforce, she said.

Site selectors are professional consultants who provide location information and

strategy planning to corporations and businesses looking to relocate or establish a presence somewhere new.

Among others of their responsibilities, site selectors assist corporate and industry leaders with their location decisions and facilitate the interaction between corporate end-users and economic development organizations.

The event at the Honey Lake Plantation, held Feb. 9-11, was intended to soft

sell the 15 counties in the North Florida Economic Development Partnership (NFEDP), whose mission is to promote economic development in the region.

Conley said the purpose of the conference was to establish relationships with the site consultants, so that the latter would have this area on their minds when they talked with their clients.

The conference, she said, had accomplished that much.

## Granny Tax Relief Applicable To Constructions Since 2003

**T**urns out that county residents who remodeled or made additions to their homes to accommodate elderly parents or grandparents prior to the Jan. 1, 2014, effective date of the new granny flat tax ordinance are nonetheless eligible for the exemption.

So reports Lloyd resident David Hall, who was at the Jefferson County Commission meeting on Nov. 19 when the board adopted the Granny Flat Tax Ordinance. At the time, Hall asked if the exemption would apply to

individuals like him who had remodeled or added to their houses in the past in order to accommodate elderly relatives.

Hall was told by legal counsel that the ordinance did not apply to old constructions, but only to new ones going forward. Commissioner Betsy Barfield, however, promised to look further into the matter.

Hall said that Barfield called him last Friday and reported that Property Appraiser Angela Gray had found a rule in Florida Statute that allows the exemption to be applied to constructions and reconstructions that occurred in

earlier years.

Hall mentioned a Florida Department of Revenue (FDOR) assessment reduction form available in Gray's office that allows residents to apply for the exemption. He said the deadline for applying for the exemption for next year was March 1.

On Wednesday, Feb. 19, Gray confirmed and expounded on Hall's remarks, saying that the granny exemption applied to any construction or reconstruction that was substantially completed as far back as Jan. 7, 2003. Property owners couldn't get compensated for losses in years prior to the effective date of the ordinance, but they could definitely apply for the exemption going forward, Gray said.

She explained that homeowners who build additions to existing homes or perform extensive renovations to provide living quarters for a parent or grandparent could be entitled to a special exemption equal to the amount of the new construction or up to 20% of the homestead value.



The customer's gaze lifts from his

phone to my father's thin face. Dad is half a head taller than him and firm in his opinion, but he is polite and his expression is warm. "Let me guess, son," he says to the man, casually fitting a blower onto the airline. "The last guys gave you a job cheap and they got it done fast, right?"

Fidgeting with the cuffs of his button-down shirt, the man shifts his weight uncomfortably. "Well, yeah."

"Unfortunately, it wasn't any good." Dad pulls the trigger on the blower and aims it at the front bumper. Then even from a distance, the air blows chips of paint off. The paint beneath is the car's last coat of paint—dust and lovebugs included. Not only did the other shop not sand or prime the car, they didn't even wash it.

Astounded, the customer looks at him, "How much?"

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

and threatened a house before authorities were able to get it under control.

It took the dispatch and response of Lloyd Volunteers, Jefferson County Fire Rescue, and the Division of Forestry to bring the

blaze to heel.

The Division of Forestry had to bring in a backhoe to make a fire break to contain the fire. Meanwhile four engines were on standby, protecting houses in the area along Bassa Road.

Emergency re-

sponse personnel worked for two long hours to suppress the fire. Thankfully, no one was hurt in the fire and property losses were minimal—mitigated, of course, by emergency response personnel's quick action.

To be eligible, property owners must have a homestead exemption on the property where the parent or grandparent quarters are constructed, Gray said. Moreover, the construction or reconstruction must be properly permitted and comply with all local land development regulations, she said. Copies of all permits, certificate of occupancy and plans must be submitted to the Property Appraisers Office.

The construction or reconstruction must also be completed before Jan. 1 of the year in which the reduction is requested. What's more, the application must be filed with the Property Appraisers office annually on, or before, March 1 of each year, she said.

Others of the applicable rules: the occupants of the added or remodeled quarters must be a parent or grandparent; the occupants must be at least 62 years of age by Jan. 1 of the year in which the reduction is requested; and the occupants must permanently reside on the property on or before Jan. 1 of the year in which application is made.

The occupants also cannot receive any benefits requiring a declaration of permanent residency on any other property in any other county or state.

The measure is more formally called the Elderly Living Quarters Temporary Assessment Abeyance Ordinance, but it's better known as the Granny Flat Tax Ordinance.

The exemption ceases as soon as the parents or grandparents die.

Per Gray, about 40 percent of Florida's 67 counties currently offer the granny flat tax. Based on statistics from counties of similar assessed valuations as Jefferson County, Gray estimates that the impact of the exemption to the county will be between \$1,800 and \$11,000 annually in lost tax revenues, if 10 people should qualify for the exemption.

The ordinance applies to all taxing jurisdictions within Jefferson County, including the City of Monticello, the Jefferson County School District and the Suwannee and Northwest Florida water management districts.

and available at both schools, the district administrative office or by calling Miller at (850) 464-2819.

The proceeds of the concert will go for repair and replacement of musical instruments for the high school band.

Last September, music teacher Jeremy George approached the Jefferson County School Board and in-

formed board members that the school lacked instruments for all the students in the program. As he told it, the program had 136 enrolled students and 120 wind instruments, only 50 of which were functional. The remainder, he said, needed repairs or to be replaced.

George estimated it would cost about \$7,000 to outfit the band properly with new or re-

paired instruments. Which situation prompted the foundation to take up the cause and pledge to help secure the needed instruments either by purchases or donations.

It's the foundation's stated mission to provide the school district with support for those programs, activities and purchases that fall outside the scope of the district's budget.

August 15, 2013, Sgt. Bill Reams of the JCSO Corrections Division, contacted Investigator Don Barfield and reported that he had received a tip that inmate David M. Gavin was attempting to have drugs sent to him at the jail.

On August 20, 2013, in a post Miranda interview, Gavin said he talked his girlfriend, Kaitlin Marie Pergola, 29, of Trinity, FL, into sending him Buprenorphine, CV, also known as Suboxone, a controlled substance. JCSO reported that the substance is a heroin-like

opiate and that Pergola got the drug from her doctor.

She reportedly sent the drug to Gavin in three separate letters, which were intercepted at the County Jail before Gavin ever received them.

Pergola was arrested February 17 on an outstanding Jefferson County warrant and charged with three counts of introduction of contraband into a county detention facility. A total bond of \$15,000 was set and she remained at the County Jail February 20.

ence to a complaint of a baby being taken without the mother's permission.

Upon arrival, Officer Deming made contact with the complainant. She advised that she and her baby's father, Magell D. Arnold, 26, of Greenville, FL, had been hanging out for the majority of the day, when Arnold became irate and began arguing with her.

She said that Arnold grabbed her by the throat and began choking her. She said she ran out the door and Arnold threw a glass bowl at her, cutting her hand. At that point, Arnold reportedly ran in and grabbed her baby and got into a green GMC pickup truck.

In his haste to

leave, he backed into another vehicle in the driveway.

The complainant sustained minor scratches to her neck, and a bloody nose, in addition to the laceration to her hand. EMS responded and assessed her injuries.

Attempts to contact Arnold were made the following day, and when the officer announced who he was and why he was calling, the person who answered the phone hung up.

Arnold was arrested February 11 on an outstanding Jefferson County warrant and charged with battery, domestic, and leaving the scene of an accident with property damage. A total bond of \$10,000 was set and he bonded out of jail February 13.

identifying themselves as deputy sheriffs. The "scammer" goes into detail with badge number, case numbers, etc, and explains that a warrant has been issued for the citizen's arrest and if the citizen doesn't follow the "SCAMMERS" instruction, the latter will come and make an arrest.

The "SCAMMER" then instructs the citizen to go to Wal-Mart, CVS or other available retail establishment and purchase a "PayPal Money Pack Card" in a given amount of currency and remit payment to whomever the "SCAMMER" identifies himself as and to a phone number (the

most recent was "Martin at 850-464-7754). The "SCAMMER" explains that this will allow for all bonding fees or additional costs to be waived.

Sheriff Hobbs underscores that this is in no way a form or fashion of practice that any law enforcement agency would utilize and furthermore has no authority to conduct such transactions.

"She said she did refuse to put the accompanying banner up with the display because it was much worse, but that she couldn't take down the T-shirts without talking to her corporate office." Cox purchased all the shirts in the line as well as the accompanying display posters. She said she wants to destroy the shirts but instead will "let their corporate office figure out what to do with them when I return them on day 59 of a 60-day return policy." Mall manager, Rob Kallas, said the display had received other complaints and the city attorney was informed and will determine if the display violates city codes. PacSun corporate officials had no comment.

## Woman Runs-off Man For Shoveling Snow From Her Drive

In Lowell, Mass., a 79-year-old woman reportedly used a gun to persuade a man to leave her home who shoveled her driveway without asking her first and then demanded cash. After clearing the homeowner's driveway, the man went to the woman's door and asked for cash. The woman told the man to go away and shut the door, but the man continued knocking and the woman came back, but this time with a gun. The shoveler talked to a neighbor as he was leaving and told them, "The woman pulled a .38 or a revolver and told him to get the (heck) out" the neighbor said. Capt. ## NFCC Receives \$737,189 Rural Health Information Technology Workforce Program Grant

*Program To Provide Workforce Health Information Technology Courses, Scholarships*

North Florida Community College has been awarded a three-year, \$737,189 Rural Health Information Technology (HIT) Workforce Program grant in partnership with the US Department of Health and Human Services. The grant is one of 15 new Rural HIT Workforce grants awarded in 2013. The overall goal is to develop Health Information Technology (HIT) training programs that will produce a pool of qualified and certified workers to help rural hospitals and clinics transition records from a paper system to a digital format. The HIT Workforce Program was developed in part in response to local need identified through the North Florida Rural Healthcare Workforce Development Network and the North Florida Workforce Development Board.

The North Florida Rural Healthcare Workforce Development Network Board represents NFCC's six-county service district and beyond. Members include Walter Boatright (Suwannee/ Hamilton County); Susan Allen (Hamilton County);



Scott Frederick (Taylor County); Mollie Hill (Leon County); Deidra Newman (Taylor/Suwannee County/Advent Christian Village); Sheryl Reyberg (CareerSource North Florida/Six-County District); Elizabeth Schlein (Leon, Madison, Gadsden, Jefferson, Taylor, Franklin, Wakulla and Liberty Counties); Julie Townsend (NFCC/Madison County); and Richard Wisdahl (Lafayette County).

"This grant enables NFCC along with the North Florida Rural Healthcare Workforce Development Network to provide training that is responsive to the current and future HIT workforce needs of our service area," said Julie Townsend, NFCC Director of Allied Health. "NFCC's HIT specialist training will be geared for people already working in healthcare or information technology who need to upgrade their technology skills to successfully transition to the future paradigm of medical

services delivery. These trained HIT personnel will be critical to medical providers now and in the future."

North Florida Community College will utilize funding to develop a six-month, non-credit online HIT specialist training program, to hire personnel to implement the program and will offer scholarships for students who successfully complete the courses and pass the national exam (ONC HIT Professional Competency exam). The Rural Health Information Technology (HIT) Workforce Program is focused on training students from our rural areas, providing them apprenticeship opportunities at our rural facilities, and ultimately coordinating with local employment resources to assist with job placement, when necessary, back into our rural communities.




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### The Beginning Genesis T. (GT) Tillman Shoe Repair Shop

In 1920, he established his own Shoe Repair Shop on Jackson Street, known as The Bottom. He had five sons that he taught the trade to: Elijah Tillman, Joseph Tillman, Julius (JT) Tillman, Sr., Dennis Tillman, and Amos Tillman. K. Evans helped him financially to get his Shoe Repair Shop established. J.T. Tillman, Sr. told his father - "I'm Going To Sweep Your Shop Out To Give You Good Luck, Daddy."

Most of his sons moved away to get other jobs. J.T. Tillman, Sr. and Dennis Tillman helped him in the Shop even though they had other jobs. G.T. Tillman's health began failing and the Shop was moved to his house on 405 West Clay Street, Thomasville, Georgia in 1949. The back porch of the house was enclosed, and that's where the machinery was placed. G.T. Tillman passed away in 1951. J.T. Tillman moved into the house at 405 West Clay Street and continued the business there. In 1968, they moved the machinery from 405 West Clay Street to 537 West Calhoun Street. He carried on the business there until passing in 1999. His son, Julius (J.T.) Tillman, Jr. even though his training came from his "Dad" since 12 years of age, he is carrying on the Shoe Cobbling business in the garage "Today" at 537 West Calhoun Street, Thomasville, Georgia.


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## Lady Tigers Begin Softball Season



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
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
