Idella Scott Case Settled; State Defers Prosecution

An agreement between the State Attorney's office and former Monticello Mayor Idella Scott last week defers prosecution for two years, affording Scott an opportunity to have the charges against her dismissed, if she meets all the conditions of the agreement.

The Deferred Prosecution Agreement, which Assistant State Attorney John Wilson and Scott signed on Tuesday, May 20, lists nine conditions. Key among the conditions, Scott must resign any position with any local or county government agency and refrain from obtaining employment with any local or county government agency for

the two-year period of the agreement. She must also pay \$612.47 to the Jefferson County Tax Collector's office within 12 months, pay \$50 for prosecutorial costs within 60 days, and complete 250 hours of community service at an approved government agency or nonprofit organization. The state reserves the right to revoke or modify the conditions and prosecute Scott for the cited offense, or any offense supported by the facts of the case, if she violates. Please See SCOTT Page 3

Gene Hall Bids to Reclaim Controversial Commission Seat

Former County Commissioner and City Councilman Gene Hall has announced his candidacy to reclaim the District 2 County Commission seat he lost to John Nelson in a close race in 2010.



Gene Hall is uniquely prepared for public service. He earned bachelors and masters degrees at the University of Florida in Geography, and Urban and Regional Planning, followed by a master's degree in Public Administration from Florida State University. He served 11 years on the Monticello City Council, then six years on the Jefferson County Commission, including a term as Chairman. He was one of the first commissioners in the state to earn the coveted Advanced Accredited Commissioner designation awarded by the Florida Association of Counties. Hall served seven years in the U.S. Naval Reserves followed by one year in the Florida Army National Guard. His diverse career includes work as a Land Use Planner, a Traffic Safety Specialist, and an educator. He has taught at risk kids, and served as a part time Instructor at both Florida A & M University and Tallahassee Community College.

"There are basically three reasons why I have decided to reclaim my old seat on the Jefferson County Commission", Hall said. "First, from the sidelines I have observed that many citizens have not liked the direction of the commission over the last four years. It is no place for petty personal politics or long-winded personal promotions that takes up so much time. Secondly, it becomes more apparent daily that our county has a bright future. We have to have informed and decisive people in county government to see to it that this future benefits all the people, not just a few. Third, shortly after my opponent, John Nelson became a county commissioner, he found himself embroiled in controversy when it was learned that he had ineligibly taken a \$193,000 state retirement payment. It was not until he was ordered by a judge to pay back the money that he did so. This is not the right example for an elected official to set. Elected officials must hold themselves to a higher standard of conduct than private citizens."

Gene Hall has long been deeply involved in community service. He is the youth minister at Pleasant Grove Missionary Baptist Church. He is a current member of the Jefferson County Planning Commission, the Capital Area Community Action Agency (CACAA) Executive Board, the Jefferson County Branch of NAACP, the Monticello Water Street Park Committee, Monticello Opera House Board of Directors, and the Jefferson County Chamber of Commerce.

"We need to get the entire Commission working for the people again. Our focus should be clear: economic development, jobs for the people who want to work, a safe community, good roads and recreation, and fairness for all," Hall added. "It is my hope to build a team composed of county government, civic organizations and citizens to get the county moving again. I look forward to a spirited and productive campaign season. I would appreciate your vote and support."

County Officials Asked To Revisit Animal Control

A citizen is asking county officials to address what she considers a serious problem — the proliferation of stray cats and dogs in unincorporated areas.

Jeri Kimbrel recently told the Jefferson County Commission that law-enforcement officers were currently handling the bulk of animal control in the county, a situation that wasn't sustainable or in keeping with other counties' standards. She said she wanted Jefferson County's animal control standards to be equal to those of Wakulla and Gadsden counties.

Kimbrel told commissioners that she was merely giving them a heads-up. She said she planned to provide the board with more information in the coming weeks, in preparation for the budget preparation process.

City Selects Local Contractor For Water Street Park Project

The Monticello City Council recently awarded the contract for the second phase of the Water Street Park improvements to J.D. James Inc., a local company.

Consultant engineer Alan Wise, of Preble-Rish Inc., informed the council on Tuesday evening, May 6, that the negotiations with the low bidder had proven successful. He said the negotiations had resulted in the downscal-

ing of the project so as to bring it within budget.

As Wise explained it, the city had a budget of \$220,000 for the work and the lowest qualified responsive bid had been for \$377,976.05

He said the negotiations had resulted in the reduction of \$157,576.05, bringing the contract with J.D. James to \$220,000.

Among the items reduced in scope or removed from the contract to lower the cost were development of the trailhead, ADA Please See PROJECT Page 3

Recent Congressional Actions; How 2nd Dist. Members Voted

Here are the vote results, in case you're interested in knowing how Florida's 2nd Congressional District members in the House and Senate stand on recent national issues.

The Water Projects – Conference Report: both the Senate and the House approved this measure. The

Senate's vote was 91-7 to approve, with two Senators abstaining. The House vote for approval was 412 to 4, with 15 abstaining.

The votes authorize the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to conduct water-resources activities, including port dredging, inland locks and dams, and flood control projects for

an estimated \$12 billion. It also requires the de-authorization of at least \$18 billion in previously authorized projects.

In the Senate, Bill Nelson and Marco Rubio voted yes. And in the House, Rep. Steve Southerland II also voted yes.

NSA Metadata Collection: The

House passed this measure 303 to 121, with seven members abstaining.

The bill would prohibit the government's bulk collection and storage of business records, including telephone metadata. It would require the government to receive pre-approval Please See ACTIONS Page 3

Ruby Ridge Still Remembered

I've been writing this column for many years now. Granted, this was not all consecutive, but my first column was in 1992 I believe, possibly the end of '91. Maybe one day I'll look that up. I do remember the content however. The first one was without the cute little banner and entitled "Trash Throws Trash" and was about littering. The next week I had a banner and picture and name. That one was called "Madison Sorries" and was about the stagnation of small-town America and fear of change. It received Honorable Mention for editorial columns from the Florida Press Association.

No, I don't remember all of them, but you do remember the first, and those that were significant for some reason. I have a lot of them saved on the computer, many in files no longer readable, others are still in print. Maybe someday I'll put it all together. Maybe.

Back in those days I was quite the political activist. Fresh out from war; young; ready to change the world. It is true that I may tend into the political from time to time now, but in my younger years I was much more political, and much less philosophical. I would tend to hope that is a sign of enlightenment, or at least maturity.

Back then I was in fact so politically prolific, and I would like to think so Southern in my wording, that I found myself on an ATF watch list. I am not being survivalist paranoid or megalomaniacal here. I don't assume this; I know it to be fact. I was,

albeit accidentally, actually told of this by an ATF agent. So I do know "the lists" really exist, and that I was on one.

After the Madison fire of 1997, I and my father were also listed as possible suspects (by the feds, not the locals) due to some of these same columns and political viewpoints, and because Madison's fire happened to be on the anniversary of Oklahoma City and Waco.

All of this was pre-9/11 so back then I wore it as much of a badge of honor as anything else. Back then there was no fear of the NSA or Homeland Security making me disappear into the night to be held indefinitely like there exists today. (And before you say it, the fault is equally Bush AND Obama, but that is another column.)

I am sure that one of the main reasons back then for my presence on their watch list was my outward opinions of things like Ruby Ridge and Waco. And even how they handled OKC. If you do not know the significance of these terms, then you are probably too young to remember them. Ruby Ridge and Waco were two events in 1992 in which the FBI and ATF violated personal freedoms and killed innocent people. David Koresh (Waco) was assuredly a kook-burger (that's an official medical term), but Randy Weaver (Ruby Ridge) was not. But that is hardly the point. We have a right to be a kook-burger if we want as long as we do not harm others in our kook-burgerness. Randy Weaver was harming no one. He and his family were liv-

ing in their home, on their land, in the middle of the Idaho mountains, minding their own affairs, and the FBI and ATF showed up at their house and started killing people.

It's been over twelve years now since 9/11, nineteen since the OKC bombing, and almost twenty-two since Ruby Ridge.

I have walked through the memorial for Oklahoma City and the one in NYC for 9/11. I have seen the lists of names. I have felt pain for people I never knew. There is no memorial for Ruby Ridge. Why is that? Is it because Randy Weaver's wife was murdered by our government instead of by a terrorist?

Were Ruby Ridge and Waco really less a tragedy because they were sanctioned by the government? That makes it okay? Have we really all accepted government control that much?

I may not preach the same political activism that I once did. I think maybe the death and destruction I've seen over the years have pacified me somewhat. Or maybe, just perhaps, (again, I would like to think) it is that I have moved ever so slightly towards enlightenment.

But wrong is still wrong. Killing is still killing. Wrongful imprisonment is still wrongful imprisonment. Prejudice is still prejudice. Whether it is done by our honored government agencies, or our churches, or whomever. Hating the hater is still hating. Hating in the name of God, is still hating. Wrong is wrong. Think about it.

#YesAllWomen

Much tragedy came from the Santa Barbara shooting spree of one deranged, depraved, and disillusioned Elliot Rodger last week. Seven mothers, including Rodger's own, will never see their children again. And yet out of the ashes as a nation, we rise.

We are finally discussing the treatment of more than half of the world's population—women. Just over the weekend, over 1 million people have tweeted to #YesAllWomen. The message is this: No, all men do not commit sexual harassment and marginalize women. But yes—all women have experienced this kind of treatment in their lifetime.

I do not think that this will last and here is why: this is a response. If we want the discussion about how women are treated in society to perpetuate, it has to be proactive, not reactive. We have to daily discuss this with our sons and daughters. We have to expect to be equals with our partners, coworkers, and friends. In order to stop hypersexualizing women in the media, we have to stop hypersexualizing ourselves—before a tragic shooting spree prompts us.

Consider these three:

School dress codes target young girls: rules governing the length of a skirt and whether bra straps show or not are clearly aimed at girls, whether they say "women only" or not. The worst of it,

though, is that educators tell schoolgirls that they have to cover and be ashamed of their bodies "to keep from distracting boys."

Even in Christianity, a modest woman is praised for "not leading her brother astray."

That is ridiculous. A girl is not responsible for distracting a boy from his studies. He is a functioning, decision-making human being; he is responsible for his own actions.

"I Have a Boyfriend" is the quickest way for women to avoid unwanted male attention. All women have used this line, whether it was true or not, but why? Because men don't respect "I'm not interested" as much as "another man owns me." They accept another man's agency over her, but not her agency over herself.

The Beauty Industry is built on the foundation of women's shattered self-esteem. If women were comfortable with their bodies, they wouldn't spend their hard-earned money (at 77% of what a man earns for the same job) on expensive cosmetics, hair products, gym memberships, or body shaping underwear. Airbrushed models set an unattainable standard of "beauty" and it is getting harder and harder to tell who has been photoshopped and who hasn't.

No amount of chivalrous acts can outweigh the subliminal and systematic sexism in our culture. The ideal man is an unreachable state that all men want to be. The

ideal woman is an unreachable state that all men want to be with. Men are supposed to be intelligent, powerful and capable. Women are supposed to be desirable.

If a woman decides to be an intelligent doctor, a powerful lawyer, or a capable politician, she can—but it is an uphill battle, fighting voices her whole life that tell her this "isn't a woman's job" and to go do something "more fitting" which is just another way to say "less meaningful, more menial."

The most disturbing part of Rodger's manifesto and YouTube tirades is his sense of self-entitlement to the women around him. He blames them for his feelings of "loneliness, rejection, and unfulfilled desires," and says that he looks forward to giving them "what they deserve—total annihilation." He blames them for him being a 22-year-old virgin.

Newsflash: women have bodies. That doesn't mean men are entitled to them. That doesn't mean that we should cover ourselves head to toe to prevent the violent, sexually charged actions of men. It does not make us responsible for those actions, either.

It means we have agency, identity, capability, and it means that those things are intrinsic and inviolable.

We already teach our daughters that—we must teach our sons.

I praise the campaign #YesAllWomen but I dream of the day we can say #NotOneMan.

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any of the conditions during the two-year deferment period.

The agreement underscores that it is “a deferral of prosecution and not a contract of immunity.”

“Should Defendant fail to meet the terms and conditions of this agreement, the agreement shall be void, at the discretion of the State Attorney, without notice of hearing and prosecution may be instituted,” the agreement reads.

Wilson agrees that if Scott meets all the conditions of the agreement during its two-year life, the state will dismiss the charges, absent court review.

The agreement is based on the premises that’s it’s in the best interest of all parties.

States the agreement in its second paragraph: “The Defendant is alleged to have committed an offense against the State of Florida on or about Jan.

10, 2013, and has been charged with one count of grant theft, one count of forgery, and one count of uttering. After investigation of the offense, it appears that the interests of the State of Florida and the Defendant will be served best by deferring the prosecution of this case.”

Circuit Judge Karen Gievers had set the case for trial on Wednesday, May 28.

The charges against Scott stem from her former employment at the Jefferson County Tax Collector’s office, where she worked as a deputy clerk. Upon being fired from the job, Scott filed a suit in federal court alleging that her civil rights had been violated and that the firing had been politically motivated because she had befriended Howell-Hunter’s opponent in the most recent election.

The jury in the trial found in favor of Tax Collector Lois Howell-

Hunter, upholding the firing. Meanwhile, during the course of the trial information surfaced that Scott allegedly had deposited into her personal banking account a citizen’s check that had been intended as payment for a vehicle registration renewal.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement charged and arrested Scott on Nov. 20 of last year for the three counts, and Gov. Rick Scott suspended her from public office on the following day.

The Governor’s order prohibited Scott from returning to office until the suspension was lifted either by executive order or “as otherwise provided by law.”

In February, the Monticello City Council appointed Julie Conley to serve in Scott’s stead until the latter’s legal problems were resolved. Scott’s term expires in 2016.

parking spaces, concrete turnout, elevated boardwalk and bike rack.

Wise explained that city staff and/or volunteers would perform certain of the removed or reduced-in-scope items, but that at least four items had been removed entirely. He identified two of the latter as the eliminations of 410 feet from the ground boardwalk and 20 feet from the elevated boardwalk.

The contract gives J.D. James Inc. 120 days to complete the work, once the order to proceed is issued.

Prior to negotiating with J.D. James, Wise had to get state permission to reduce the scope of the work. That’s because the Florida De-

partment of Environmental Protection (FDEP) is funding the project with a \$200,000 grant.

Among the items to be accomplished with the grant are a series of trails of different difficulties, including an elevated “treetop” boardwalk, a pedestrian/jogging/exercise “backbone” trail, and a bicycle off-road trail.

The plan includes signage and the establishment of a small parking lot with an informational kiosk at the Water Street trail-head.

The 28-acre park, formerly the property of the Jefferson County School District, lies west of Water Street. The city purchased the property several years

ago with another \$200,000 grant from the FDEP Office of Greenways and Trails.

Overseeing the development of the park is the Monticello Park Committee, a public/private group made up of elected officials and citizens. Members of the committee, in conjunction with city personnel and community volunteers, largely accomplished the phase 1 work, which largely consisted of ridding the property of accumulated trash, clearing away part of the underbrush, and creating some preliminary trails.

The park is open to the public and may be accessed from Water Street, near Seminole Street.

from the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court to conduct a search of call detail records for individual target phone numbers, except in cases of emergency.

Southerland voted yes.

Fiscal 2015 Defense Authorization: The House passed this bill 325 to 98, with eight members abstaining. The bill would authorize \$592.9 billion for defense programs in fiscal year 2015, including \$79.4 billion for overseas contingency operations. The bill would also authorize a 1.8 percent pay increase for military personnel and prohibit a new round of base realignments and closures.

Southerland voted yes.

Energy-Efficient Building Codes — The Senate voted 79-20, with one member abstaining. The Senate invoked cloture on the motion to proceed to a bill that would promote updates to state building codes in order to encourage energy savings and pro-

vide incentives for energy-efficient manufacturing.

Cloture is a parliamentary procedure by which debate is ended and an immediate vote is taken on the matter under discussion.

Nelson voted yes; Rubio voted no.

Benghazi Select Committee: The House voted 232 to 186 for passage of this resolution, with 14 members abstaining. The resolution establishes a 12-member panel to examine both the events that led to the Sept. 11, 2012 attack on the U.S. consulate in Benghazi, Libya, as well as the Obama administration’s response to the attack and to subsequent congressional inquiries.

Southerland voted yes.

Research Tax Credit: The House passed this legislation 274 to 13, with 26 abstaining. The legislation would permit companies that incur research and development expenses in the United States to deduct up to 20 percent of the amount in which their

qualified research expenses exceed a calculated base amount for the current taxable year. It would also permanently extend and expand a tax break for university and corporate research expenses that expired in December 2013. Sixty-two Democrats joined all but one Republican to support the bill.

Southerland voted yes.

Charter School Program Expansion: The House approved this bill 360 to 45, with 27 members abstaining. The bill would require the Education Secretary to consolidate the federal Charter Schools Program, which gives grants to states to open charter schools, and the Charter School Credit Enhancement Program, which assists schools in acquiring better credit terms for facilities, into one program. The bill further directs a certain percentage of funds into national charter school management activities.

Jefferson County’s current animal control ordinance only addresses dangerous and rabid animals, not nuisance animals.

The ordinance’s enforcement is left to Solid Waste Department Director Beth Letchworth, who also acts as the code-enforcement officer.

In April 2011, the commission enhanced the animal control ordinance with the intent of making it more enforceable. Still, many people think the ordinance has yet a long ways to go.

Among the changes that the commission adopted in

2011: It adjusted certain of the fees; altered the makeup of the committee that determines an animal’s dangerous classification; defined who may keep a dangerous animal; and set a definite time period for the reclamation of impounded animals before they are destroyed.

The enhancements also included the creation of a committee consisting of a Health Department official and “two concerned citizens”. This committee is given the authority to determine if sufficient cause exists to classify an animal as dangerous or aggres-

sive, following the appropriate public hearings and other due-process procedures. Once the committee determines an animal is dangerous or aggressive, it decides the classification and the disposition of the animal.

Per the current procedures, citizens’ complaints about animals go to the Sheriff’s Department, which dispatches a deputy to investigate the complaint. Only if the deputy determines that the animal is dangerous is the animal control unit called. Otherwise, the deputy handles the situation.

Find Out How Much Your Old Stuff Is Worth

Dear Savvy Senior, What resources can you recommend for finding the value of old items? I inherited a large number of old antiques and unique art from my great aunt, and I would like to find out what some of these items are worth.

Seeking Answers

Dear Seeking,

There are actually a number of resources and online tools available today that can help you find out the value of almost any item. Here are some tips to help you proceed.

Get an Appraisal

While many people use local antique shops or collectable dealers to find out the value of old and/or unique items, it’s usually best to use a certified appraiser who’s accredited and meets professional and ethical standards. Certified appraisers are more likely to give you a fair judgment because there’s no conflict of interest. It’s actually a violation of professional ethics for an appraiser to offer to buy an item he or she has appraised.

A professional appraiser will provide you a written report that includes a full description of your item and the procedure used to estimate its current value. For their service, you can expect to pay either a flat fee or an hourly rate from \$200 to \$400 depending on their expertise and location. Avoid an appraiser who asks for a fee based on a percentage of the item’s value.

If an appraiser thinks an object isn’t worth a written appraisal, he or she might recommend other resources to arrive at a value.

To locate an appraiser either by location or specialty, search online at one of the three professional appraising organizations: The American Society of Appraisers (appraisers.org, 800-272-8258) which has around 5,000 members worldwide; Appraisers Association of America (appraisersassoc.org) that has around 700 members; and the International Society of Appraisers (isa-appraisers.org) that has about

900 members.

Online Resources

You can also get estimates by professional appraisers and other experts through a number of websites. How it works is you upload photos of your items and provide descriptions, and the sites send back valuations usually within a week.

Sites that provide this type of service include Value My Stuff (valuemystuff.com/us), which charges \$10 for one appraisal, \$25 for three or \$75 for 10. And WorthPoint (worthpoint.com), which charges \$30 for one item or \$75 for three, or you can pay \$20 for a monthly membership that provides unlimited access to their antique and collectables valuations.

Another resource for finding out what antiques and collectables are worth is Kovels (kovels.com, 800-829-9158), which offers a free basic membership that gives you access to its online price guide, or you can purchase one of their premium services that run \$39 or \$60 a year. They also sell the “Kovels’ Antiques & Collectibles Price Guide 2014” for \$28 that reports on recent prices paid for 35,000 items in more than 700 categories at auctions, shops, shows, flea markets, and online.

You may also be able to get an idea of what others are willing to pay for your stuff by searching similar items on the massive online auction site ebay.com, or the classified ads site craigslist.org. Both of these sites are free to search.

Tax-Deductible Value

Local Marine Becomes A Master Mason In Special Ceremony

In a very special and unusual, ceremony, U.S. Marine Lance Corporal Conner Funderburke was made a Master Mason at Hiram Lodge No. 5 Free and Accepted Masons. Lance Cpl. Funderburke is the son of Wayne Funderburke and the nephew of Mark Griffith, both Freemasons. He is currently serving in the US Marines and was stationed at Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, N.C.

Freemasonry is an ancient order that derives its traditions and core values from the Operative Masons over 2000 years ago. Normally, the progression for a candidate, to be made a Master Mason, is to be accepted into a Lodge as an Entered Apprentice. Having served a proper time as such and having been found proficient in that Degree, he is advanced to the Degree of Fellowcraft. He again serves a proper time as a Fellowcraft Mason. He receives addition instruction from a Master Mason in preparation of receiving all the knowledge he is entitled to when he is "Raised" the sublime Degree of Master Mason.

The goal of Freemasonry is to make good men better. To achieve that goal, the candidate receives extensive instruction in philosophy, the significance of the liberal arts, the history of the fraternity and most importantly the cardinal virtues, just to name a few subjects. And yes, the "Secrets" of the Freemasonry are communicated to him when and if he is found worthy. There have been times in the history of Freemasonry that certain governments and leaders sought to abolish Order out of the fear of what free and enlightened men can do to a tyrannical government. Contrary to accusations of Masons seeking world domination on some cable TV programs on secret societies, Freemasons, like

most fraternities, have certain methods of recognition and rituals known only to them which were to keep them safe from infiltration and harm.

Having formed a favorable opinion of Freemasonry and desiring to follow in his family's tradition of being a Freemason, Connor submitted a petition for membership to Hiram Lodge here in Monticello. Masonic law normally requires an applicant to be a resident of the State that he is petitioning for membership for one year before the petition can be accepted. However, Military personnel on active duty stationed outside of the home state are allowed to seek membership in their home State Lodge. In Connor's case, however, he learned that he was scheduled to be deployed overseas in the near future. It would be more than a year before he would be available to be initiated into the fraternity.

The investigating committee found that Connor was a man of good character and worthy of admission into the Masonic Order. Permission to conduct all three Degrees in one day is extremely rare and is reserved for very special occasions. It would be a huge honor for Lance Cpl. Funderburke, and for Hiram Lodge to receive permission to conduct such a ceremony. A letter was sent to the Grand Master of Masons of the State of Florida explaining the circumstances and Connor's service in the U.S. Marine Corps. The Grand Master personally granted special dispensation to allow Lance Cpl. Funderburke to receive all three Degrees in a one day ceremony.

That was a major triumph, but now the logistics of conferring all three degrees in one day had to be addressed. The US Marine Corps granted Lance Cpl Funderburke leave to attend the ceremony. The Brothers

of Hiram Lodge reached out to the other nine Lodges and to all past and present military Freemasons in this District. The Marzuq Shrine Temple in Tallahassee offered to have their Past Masters Club assist Hiram Lodge in making Lance Cpl Funderburke a Master Mason before his deployment. Brother Pat Murphy, owner of Chicken Delight provided lunch for everyone who would attend the ceremony.

The ceremony started at 8:00 Saturday morning at Hiram Lodge on Olive St in Monticello. A light breakfast was provided as Freemasons from around the District entered the Lodge dining hall. Everyone's attention was directed toward Connor's father, Wayne Funderburke. His face was beaming in pride as he introduced his son, and soon to be Brother. Lance Cpl Connor Funderburke looked like the USMC recruiting poster. He was built like a tree trunk and as squared away as one would expect of a US Marine. He was very polite and addressed everyone as "Sir". As the call came for the Brothers to come into the Lodge room, a slight glint of anxiety could be seen of Connor's face. But an assuring glance from his father seemed to calm his nerves and at the stroke of 9:00, Lance Cpl Funderburke began the initiation to be made a Master Mason.

The initiation ceremony went off without a hitch.

Bro. Mike Lample from Butler Lodge in Tallahassee, acting as Worshipful Master of Hiram Lodge for the purpose of conferring the Degrees, summoned Connor's father from the gallery. In an act of great respect, surrendered his position to Connor's father and permitted him the honor of raising his son to the sublime Degree of Master Mason.

Lance Cpl Funderburke has returned to his duty station at Cherry Point and has probably been deployed by this time. He now follows many great military Freemasons such as George Washington, Douglas McArthur, Omar Bradley, Virgil Grisom, John Paul Jones, Audie Murphy, "Buzz" Aldrin and Norman Schwarzkopf as the youngest Master Mason on April 19, 2014.

According to the Brothers of Hiram Lodge, it is not uncommon for someone at a Masonic funeral or cere-

mony to tell them about someone in their family who was or is a Mason, but they were never asked by that family member to join. Freemasons are not permitted to solicit membership. A man must request a petition for membership from a Freemason of his own freewill and accord. Many families have father, grandfathers, uncles and brothers who are or were Freemasons before they died.

To continue a family tradition of membership in the Freemason fraternity or for additional information on Freemasonry, the Grand Lodge of Florida has a website at www.gflamason.org.

Wives brought side dishes and sat together in chairs overlooking the pond. These serene, joking women are the same ones who spend lonely nights waiting for their husbands to return from 48-hour shifts.

The party was a much-appreciated respite for many of the JCFR personnel, and also for the volunteer force, many of which work full time on top of volunteering. Tales were told, stories were shared, and fun was had by all.

As pleasant as the gathering was, the best birthday present the county department will receive is its new station, which is scheduled to be finished in mid-autumn.

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The Pileated Woodpecker Is Quite A Sight To See

A rare white Pileated Woodpecker is visiting homeowner Mary Wise in Thomasville Georgia. On Tuesday April 22nd, it finally posed for a portrait. Wise's friend Margaret Levings was able to get these photographs. Levings says, "I was surprised and excited to see this beautiful bird return."

The leucistic Pileated Woodpecker has been mistaken for the Ivory Billed Woodpecker which is likely extinct.

Rosenberg, Lamertink, Brady, Bass and Setiorini of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology says, "Leucism, referred to by some authors as partial albinism, is infrequently but regularly occurring in wild bird populations and results from a reduction or absence of melanin, a dark brown to blackish

pigment, in the feathers. It is not unusual for such birds to retain other feather pigments, such as reddish carotenoids, resulting in unusually patterned plumage such as in the recently found Pileated Woodpecker."

Also from Cornell University, "Leucism is relatively unusual in birds, and albinism is rare.

From 2000-2006, Project Feeder-Watch participants reported fewer than 1000 leucistic birds. There were 5.5 million birds reported each season.

Mark Kiser is the Coordinator for the Great Florida Birding and Wildlife Trail. He says, "Leucism can occur in lots of species but it is rare. I have seen a leucistic Boat-tailed Grackle at St. Marks NWR but it is a rare event."

Karl Miller Avian Research Scientist for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission comments, "This is a ge-

netic defect in a small part of the population. It interferes with the plumage coloration. I have never seen leucism in a Pileated Woodpecker but I have seen it in a Florida Scrub Jay."

Leucistic birds face challenges. Their protective camouflage is altered and they are likely more visible to predatory birds and feral cats. Birds are also pretty picky when choosing a mate and plumage plays an important role in their selection. These pale fellows may lose at the dating game. There is also some evidence that the lack of melanin weakens the pileated feathers.

The Pileated is the

largest woodpecker found in most of North America. The bird's favorite meal is carpenter ants, and wood boring beetle larvae. They excavate nest sites in large diameter trees by chiseling out big cavities, usually 15 -125 feet above the ground.

They sound like someone is using a jack hammer in your back yard. The look like the model for a Woody Woodpecker cartoon and their call sounds like they could do voice-overs in a Tarzan movie.

An interesting bird all on its own. It is very exciting when it has a genetic skew. Keep looking up; listen for the hammering. You may see one too.

Fulford's Attend Farm Bureau's "Field To The Hill" In Washington DC

Immigration issues were just one of the issues that the farmers discussed. Also on the agenda for important discussion was Worker Protection Standards being implemented by EPA. If these regulations are to be implemented in our state, it could cause severe problems with some Florida Farmers.

The local Jefferson County Farm Bureau has been involved in this annual trek to our nation's capitol for many years. We strongly feel it is extremely important to voice the views of our local farmers in the state of Florida.

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Sign-Up Begins Today for USDA Disaster Assistance Programs Restored by Farm Bill

Sign-Up Begins for USDA Disaster Assistance Programs Restored by Farm Bill
More than 2,000 Farm Service Agency Offices across the Country Stand Ready to Assist

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that, eligible farmers and ranchers can sign up for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) disaster assistance programs restored by passage of the 2014 Farm Bill.

"We implemented these programs in record time and kept our commitment to begin sign-up April 15th," said Agriculture Secretary Vilsack. "To ensure enrollment goes as smoothly as possible, dedicated staff in over 2,000 Farm Service Agency offices across the country are doing every-

thing necessary to help producers that have suffered through two and a half difficult years with no assistance because these programs were awaiting Congressional action."

Depending on the size and type of farm or ranch operation, eligible producers can enroll in one of four programs administered by the Farm Service Agency.

The Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), and the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) will provide payments to eligible producers for livestock deaths and grazing losses that have occurred since the expiration of the livestock disaster assistance programs in 2011, and including calendar years 2012, 2013, and 2014.

The Emergency As-

sistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP) provides emergency assistance to eligible producers of livestock, honeybees and farm-raised fish that have suffered losses because of disease, severe weather, blizzards and wildfires.

Enrollment also begins for the Tree Assistance Program (TAP), which provides financial assistance to qualifying orchardists and nursery tree growers to replant or rehabilitate trees, bushes and vines damaged by natural disasters.

Producers signing up for these programs are encouraged to contact their local FSA office for information on the types of records needed and to schedule

an appointment. Taking these steps in advance will help producers ensure their application moves through the process as quickly as possible.

Supporting documents may include livestock birth records, purchase and transportation receipts, photos and ownership records showing the number and type of livestock lost, documents listing the gallons of water transported to livestock during drought, and more. Crop records may include purchase receipts for eligible trees, bushes, or vines, seed and fertilizer purchases, planting and production records, and documentation of labor and equipment used to plant or remove eligible trees, bushes, or vines.

Producers have three to nine months to apply depending on the program and year of the loss. Details are available from any local FSA office. For the Livestock Forage Disaster Program, producers have until January 30, 2015 to sign up.

Week, or the next time you go fishing, take someone new: a child, a relative, a friend.

How to Celebrate National Fishing and Boating Week

The best way to celebrate National Fishing and Boating Week is to get out on the water! Fun, stress-relieving activities, fishing and boating are some of the best ways to unwind.

Learn to Fish: Get your kids out there!

Fishing with kids is a great way to connect with them, and to experience the outdoors together. Spend time teaching your children the joys of fishing and boating.

Kids enjoy feeling included, and what better way to instill some responsibility in your children. Depending on their age, give them small things for which they are responsible, such as ensuring that everyone has a personal floatation device, or teaching them to coil a line.

Being on the water provides an excellent opportunity to teach kids about their environment, and boating, fishing and safety skills.

Try to incorporate these teachings into fun activities and gradually introduce your kids to new things as they are ready.

Tips for Fishing with Kids

• **Avoid the kid's stuff** An ultra-light spinning or spin casting rod and reel combo is usually easier for kids to use.

• **Small hooks = big catches** Avoid hooks larger than size 10 (hook sizes run backwards—size 12 is smaller than size 10). Fish won't readily take large hooks unless they are feeding voraciously.

• **Lighten up your line** Light line will do the job, preferably 6-pound test line or less.

• **Bag the big bobbers** Bobbers (or floats) are used to suspend your bait in the water and alert you when to set the hooks. The harder the bobber is to pull under, the harder it will be to hook a fish.

Small floats will help convince the fish to take your tasty bait and run. "Slip" bobbers work well for kids. Slip bobber rigs cut down on the amount of line needed at the end of the rod and are easier to cast. Small ice fishing bobbers can provide a light touch any time of year.

• **Great big gobs of worms won't do** There's no need to use whole whopping-big, writhing night crawlers on your hook. Keep the bait approximately the size of your hook. Live-bait such as worms, bee moths or crickets work best. Cut the bait to fit your hook.

Education is one of the most important aspects of boating and fishing safely and responsibly. - **Draft:** Depth of water needed to float a vessel.
- **Freeboard:** Distance from water to lowest point of boat where water could come aboard.
- **Starboard:** Right side of a vessel.
- **All-Round White Light:** Indicates rear of a vessel.
- **Stern:** Rear of a vessel.
- **Cleat:** Metal fitting on which a rope can be fastened.
- **Port:** Left side of a vessel.
- **Red and Green Sidelights:** Directional indicators on front of a vessel.
- **Bow:** Front of a vessel.

Please note that funding for rehabilitation will only be used to support existing housing. The strategies are as follows:

Homebuyer Purchase Assistance Strategy

The purpose of this strategy is to provide down payment assistance and principle reduction to first-time homebuyers that are eligible under the SHIP guidelines. The maximum amount of SHIP funds that may be awarded per unit is \$30,000 for very low income, \$25,000 for low income and \$20,000 for moderate income households. Potential homebuyers will be required to qualify for a mortgage through a financial institution. Homebuyers may not have claimed homestead exemption in the last three years. Funds will be awarded on a first come, first ready-to-close basis. **Mobile Homes are not eligible for assistance.**

Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation Strategy

The purpose of this strategy is to provide repairs or improvements needed for safety and sanitary rehabilitation and/or correction of code violations. The maximum amount of SHIP funds that may be awarded per unit is \$40,000. The homeowner must claim homestead exemption and the home must be occupied by the owner in order to be considered for rehabilitation. Applicants are limited to assistance once every (10) years. Applications will be considered on a first come, first served basis. **Mobile Homes are not eligible for assistance.**

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
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
