

## Guadalupe Center continues to focus on children and families

The Guadalupe Center is about as much a part of the fabric of Immokalee as any group will find. Just last week the Guadalupe Center received a \$50,000 grant from Sun Life Financial and the Miami Dolphin Foundation and Immokalee High School senior Mariela Vega was surprised with a \$5,000 scholarship, the result of a nomination by the Guadalupe Center staff. One of Mariela's community activities is serving with the center's Tutor Corps, working after school to help build a strong educational foundation for young children.

The center began as a soup

The joy that filled the room uplifted everyone's spirit as the




## Indians celebrate big Homecoming win, 56-13

kitchen in 1982 and the facility continues to meet the immediate nutritional needs of the poor, as well as providing clothing and a shower room.

The Early Childhood Center came shortly after the soup kitchen, in an effort to help poor children be successful at school. In 1996, the educational building at 702 Hope Circle opened.

Today there are 250 children, from six weeks through five years of age, making education a central part of their lives from the very beginning, thanks to the Guadalupe Center staff and volunteers.

The facility is comprised of two separate wings with total of 18 classrooms - one for the little ones and one for children ages three to five. The little ones take part in Early Head Start for babies up to three years old.

A major key to a continued love of learning is the involvement of parents, which is encouraged by staff.

Meals are prepared in the cafeteria using healthy choices like ground turkey, sweet potato fries and more veggies. Good nutrition goes hand in hand with a good overall education.

The three-to-five-year olds eat in the cafeteria; the small ones in their rooms.

Physical activity is a necessary component of good health and a good education so the kids have a terrific playground with lots of play area choices including tiny buildings like the community fire department and post office, sandbox and slide. There's even an edible garden where kids can help grow vegetables and herbs.

Teacher Dionette Molina has been at the center for ten years. Previously she worked

at RMCA. She said that kids learn through play in the garden area and also get ready for VPK.

She added that the kids love circle time, book-based lessons and the library, where parents are also welcome to check out books with their student, a nice opportunity since the Immokalee Public Library is now closed on Saturdays. Kids also enjoy puppet shows at the library.

The center even has a performing arts hall dedicated to cultivating a love of art in students and getting in touch with their own artistic abilities.

Student paintings - their own renderings of professional artists' work - line the walls. Professional pianist Amy Jensen comes in and acquaints students with a personal joy in music. An FGCU violinist comes in to work with five-year-olds.

President of the Guadalupe Center Barbara Oppenheim oversees all of the center's activities from the soup kitchen to the education center. Her career in education administration began in New Jersey. She moved to Naples in 1997, but retirement wasn't exactly what she wanted, so she and her husband opened a restaurant. Eventually, she found her way to the Guadalupe Center where her experience with food service and education were both valuable.

Ms. Oppenheim feels much of the center's success comes from its commitment to fostering family support.

The Guadalupe Center's 30th anniversary is coming up next year. Ms. Oppenheim explained that the center has evolved from the very important task of meeting people's short term needs to a commitment to changing the future. The center has not abandoned its focus on the short term. The center continues to provide food for the hungry, as well as clothing and showers. At certain times of the year it provides special programs including

the shoe project for school children, the community Thanksgiving at the Park and the Holiday gift shop.

At the education center, the focus is trained on developing skill for the success of the future of the upcoming generation.

When their students get to public school, Ms. Oppenheim proudly points out that they are always well prepared. She said their kindergartners consistently score an average of 180 on county screenings as opposed to an average of 160 for other students.

Even most of their teachers continue their own educational experience, Ten have bachelor's degrees

The \$50,000 Sun Life grant will go to pay salaries for the Tutor Corps students like Mariela Vega.

"It's important to keep kids in school," Ms. Oppenheim said, and many have to work after school for the family. This program helps them do both.

Staff hopes to expand the Tutor Corps. Currently, high schoolers, along with adult teachers, serve 250 K-3 graders at Pinecrest and Highlands Elementaries. They want to

expand to the other elementaries as well.

Lesson plans are developed in conjunction with their regular classroom teacher to optimize and reinforce each day's lesson.

Guadalupe Center also hopes to collaborate with other programs like RCMA and Immokalee Child Care Center to reach even more Immokalee families.

The center is open from 7 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. and provides an eight-week summer program at Pinecrest and Highlands.



## Students First

Now that's 'B'eautiful!

In case you haven't heard, we are very happy to tell you that Immokalee Middle School (IMS) is a "B" school for the first time since the Florida Department of Education began handing out school grades in 1999. Now that's an awesome feat, a magnificent accomplishment. The school's first B grade follows two years of C grades and a couple years of D grades before that. So how does a school increase its grade, going from a C to a B? We wanted to know, too, so we asked Immokalee Middle School's instructional leader, Principal Abel Jaimes. Here is his response to the question in his own words.

"We are proud to say that we - parents, students, community partners, and IMS staff - have worked relentlessly to create a school culture where students feel safe to develop to their full potential. Every student that sets foot on the IMS campus has unique needs; whether they require specific interventions to close learning gaps or enrichment activities to deepen understanding. At IMS, teachers conduct data chats with each student to help them identify learning gaps, set goals, and monitor their progress to ensure mastery. Currently our students are preparing for their student-led conferences in which they will be sharing with their parents their areas of

need, goals, and steps that they will take to achieve their goals. Because of our data chats, our students are also able to articulate to their parents what help they will need at home to support them as they work toward achieving their goals. These are all components that have helped our school become a B school. It is because of the commitment of our professional staff and community that we have been able to establish a culture where high expectations are the norm. The processes that we have in place at IMS are focused on student achievement and development, which is why we are very confident that our students will continue to demonstrate significant growth in their end-of-year assessments." ~ Principal Abel Jaimes, Immokalee Middle School

# Immokalee Foundation student attends diabetes camp

Alejandro Arreguin knew his induction into The Immokalee Foundation's Take Stock in Children Immokalee program was significant, but what he didn't realize is that it would be the beginning of new opportunities and extraordinary life changes for the eighth grader.

It was during the induction ceremony that TIF board member Louise Penta happened to sit at the table with Arreguin and his family. "I was chatting with his mother when she handed him an insulin pen," Penta recalls. "I was stunned for a moment, then asked her if he was diabetic." His mother explained that he had indeed been diagnosed with Type 1 Diabetes. It was then that Penta knew fate had stepped in, as her own son was a diabetic and had been for many years.

When it came time to match Arreguin with a mentor, Penta volunteered believing that she could be a great asset with her knowledge and experience of the disease. Soon, she began meeting with him at school for regular mentoring sessions.

But, something was always in the back of her mind. For 16 years, her son attended the Elliott P. Joslin Camp in Charlton, Mass., where young men with diabetes are able to learn more about themselves, the management of diabetes and skills for coping with the special challenges of living with diabetes. Penta knew this would be a great opportunity for Arreguin and provide him and his family with invaluable information.

This summer, Arreguin was given that chance thanks to Penta and TIF's Charity Classic Fund A Dream auction. Penta accompanied him, at her own expense, to and from camp.

"Camp Joslin allows these kids to be with others just like them," said Penta. "They are

all coping with the same issues, so not only is it a bonding opportunity, but a learning experience as well."

Approximately 75 boys from all over the world attended the two-week session, where the kids learn by doing. A basketball game became a chance to balance insulin with exercise, and a lunch with friends became a chance to learn carb counting and meal planning.

Camp Joslin's programs combine camping, sports and other activities with diabetes education, treatment and support to give not only the children with diabetes, but also their families, the tools they need to live happy, healthy and balanced lives.

As for Arreguin, he says it gave him a better understanding of his diabetes and a comfort level he didn't have before he attended camp. He said he also came away with many memories of good times with new friends, "I would love to do it again, it was a lot of fun."

Liz Allbritten, TIF's executive director said, "We are so fortunate to have board members such as Louise who give so much of their time, talent and treasure to our kids. She is making a significant difference in the life of Alejandro and so many other children in Immokalee."

## Evening astronomy event in the works for November

Planning for the Rotary Club of Immokalee's, "A Night Under the Stars," in cooperation with the Southwest Florida Astronomical Society, is moving forward according to an announcement by President Gary Ferrante.

"We have the date set as Friday, Nov. 18," Ferrante said, "and have now locked in on a location."

"We've decided on the Lake Trafford location as the viewing area, having checked out for ambient light interference at each location we were considering. We want to have the darkest area available for the best presentation of the stars and various galaxies, and the southern skies will give us some excellent viewing at that time of year.

"Viewing will be between 6 and 8:30 p.m., depending on weather and the number of people coming out to view," said Chuck Pavlick, a member of the Astronomical Society. "We always have to be flexible because we have to depend on a good viewing sky, as well as how many people show up," Pavlick said.

"We will probably have six or seven telescopes available for the

public, which should now only be adequate, but also give a variety of lens strengths." He added. And last time we did this more than 250 people came out.

Ferrante said, "Our club is celebrating fifty years of service to the Immokalee area, and this is just one more example of how we try to serve the community by offering a variety of programming and/or events and activities." "The Southwest Florida Astronomical Society, Inc., was formed in 1980 by amateur astronomers in Lee County. Its many goals include educating the public, school children, and scouts about the wonders of the night sky. SWFAS regularly works with the Calusa Nature Center and Planetarium, as well as Florida gulf Coast university with public observation and programs. We recently saw a presentation at one of our meetings and just felt it was something we should bring before the public, and are happy to partner with them to bring this opportunity to the community."
