

Business event sparks optimism for new growth

Even as many residents feel the pain inflicted by the current economy, there are reasons to feel optimistic about the future.

Some of these reasons were showcased at a special event Thursday, Dec. 8, at the iTECH center. Several organizations with the means to help people become successful came together to make their programs known.

The object of the presentations was to get young people thinking about their credit and their financial future before they're in over their head.

The event was coordinated by

Fifth Third Bank with its unique eBUS, and geared toward ITECH students.

Programs displayed included financial services from Fifth Third Bank, business education opportunities from Goodwill Southwest Florida MicroEnterprise, the Community Redevelopment Agency's IMMBIZ and Habitat for Humanity.

Southwest Florida Works provided weight and blood pressure checks as well as general health information as part of its promotora program.

First of all, Fifth Third Bank representatives offered financial counseling and hooked people up with



RCMA awarded grant funding to enhance childcare services

Bank of America has awarded a \$30,000 grant to Redlands Christian Migrant Association, which will allow RCMA to enhance its services to the rural poor.

RCMA operates 74 child-care centers, providing quality preschool education to at-risk children and social-service help to their families. It helps needy children blossom during their first five years, a period when 90 percent of their brain development occurs. A Nobel-prize-winning economist has calculated that society's return on investment from such schooling is seven percent annually, for the life of the child.

their free credit reports and score.

According to Fifth Third Bank Vice President Community Affairs Manager Jadira Hoptry, that information is key for people to work out an "outline" for their financial life and budget.

iTECH students have been exposed to these topics before through iTECH classes and Enterprise Zone outreach. This event helped underscore the importance of financial awareness and planning.

CRA's Rosemary Dillon explained that help is available for locals to open businesses in Immokalee in the form of free technical support from her agency. She said traditionally, automotives and hairdressing seem to be the most popular business opportunities.

The most recent entrepreneur class has helped Immokalee residents start a cleaning service and a dance studio.

Eliot Rittenhouse of Southwest Florida Micro Enterprise, in partnership with Goodwill Industries, had a table set up to familiarize students with the micro enterprise class program. This program is designed to help prospective entrepreneurs learn to be successful.

The next class will be Tuesday evenings from 6-9 p.m. at 921 Anvil Circle in LaBelle. You can register for class or get more information by calling Matt at 863-675-1412 or go to www.goodwillswfl.org/microenterprise.

Dottie Cook and Angela Johnson represented the Enterprise Zone. Ms. Cook pointed out that this is a good time to reach students with crucial financial and entrepreneurial information.

Ms. Johnson agreed, saying she hopes people take advantage of her agency's workshops to help people understand credit and for first time homebuyers.

"People are just try-

ing to make ends meet," she said. "They're trying to survive - overwhelmed with life."

Ms. Cook added that often people are reluctant to deal with their credit issues until its unavoidable. By then, things are out of hand.

Jackie Diaz and Adilene Garcia took some time at the Habitat for Humanity display. Jackie is taking Applied Academics for Adult Education class and is currently renting. Her friend, Adilene, is also renting and one day wants to own her own home.

Jackie is studying to become a medical administration specialist and also hopes to own a home one day.

The young women were getting information from Esther Arthur, who has been the Director of Immokalee Family Services for Habitat for two years. Her goal for the day was to offer a little insight into housing for iTECH students. Habitat is working to do away with substandard housing in Immokalee.

"It's a pretty simple program," she said. Habitat offers zero percent interest to homebuyers and, in general, people must make about \$15,000 per year to qualify for a Habitat home.

There are currently over 700 Habitat homes in Immokalee. Another development, called Faith Landing, will be under construction soon, with 170 lots, mainly for duplexes. Four of these lots will be for large single family homes. The new development will be located next to Liberty Landing.

Deadline approaches for 'Primary' voter registration

Register by Jan. 3, to vote in presidential primary

Tuesday, Jan. 3, 2012 is the last day to register to vote in the upcoming January 31, 2012 Presidential Preference Primary Election. Registered voters wanting to change party affiliation must also do so on or before the Jan. 3rd registration book closing.

To register to vote, or change party affiliation, you must complete a voter registration application form. Voter registration application forms are available at the Supervisor of

Elections Office, driver license offices, public libraries, government satellite offices, recruitment offices of the armed forces, state agencies that provide public assistance, and any state agency providing service to disabled residents. Online voter registration application forms, available at www.CollierVotes.com, must be printed, signed and returned to the Supervisor of Elections Office.

Important voter information

The number of Florida voters who've requested absentee ballots is larger than the number of voters in the '08 GOP primaries in Iowa and New Hampshire.

Important voter deadlines:

Voter Registration Form: Postmarked at least 29 days before the election.

Absentee Ballot Application: Received by 5 p.m. on the 6th day before the election.

Voted Absentee Ballot: Received by 7 p.m. election day.

How to vote by absentee ballot

Recommended: Use our Voter Registration Widget. Enter your information, print and sign the completed form, and mail it to the address printed on the form. If you don't have a Florida license or state ID card, you should include a copy of your identification.

You can also download and fill out Florida's Voter Registration form. Mail the form to the Supervisor of Elections of your county.

Verify your voter registration

It's best to verify your voter registration before applying for your absentee ballot. If there's a problem with your registration, register again before proceeding.

NOTE: Most people receive their voter registration cards in the mail 2-3 weeks after registering to vote. Don't worry if you lost your voter registration card. You don't actually need it to vote.

Make sure you're eligible to vote by absentee ballot.

Good news! Any registered Florida voter may vote by absentee ballot.

Apply for your absentee ballot

Effective July 1, 2010, all Supervisor of Election websites offer on-line absentee ballot requests. You'll have to click around a bit to find them, but it looks like a fast and easy way to apply for your an absentee ballot.

Or you can download and complete our Florida Absentee Ballot Application. (Since there's no official statewide application, we created one that has been verified as valid by Florida.) Mail your completed application to your Supervisor of Elections. A family member - or a legal guardian - can also apply for an absentee ballot on your behalf using the same application.

If you don't want to use the application form, and you don't want to apply online, you can write a letter to your Supervisor of Election which contains the following infor-

mation: full name, date of birth

The Florida address where you are registered to vote: mailing address, signature

If a family member - or legal guardian - chooses to write a letter on your behalf requesting an absentee ballot, they'll need to include the following information:

the name of the voter who needs an absentee ballot, voter's address, date of birth, requestor's name, address, driver's license number (if available), relationship to the voter, signature (if the request is written).

You can ask your Supervisor of Elections to mail your absentee ballot, or you can ask to pick up your absentee ballot in person, or you can designate someone to pick up the ballot for you.

If you request that your absentee ballot be mailed to you, the request must be received by the Supervisor of Elections no later than 5 p.m. on the 6th day before the election.

Receive, complete and return your absentee ballot.

Most people will opt to receive their ballots in the mail. You can also pick up your absentee ballot in person from the Supervisor of Elections beginning five days before the election right up to election day.

You can also designate someone else to pick up your ballot for you. A designee may pick up an absentee ballot for you on election day or up to 5 days before an election. A designee may only pick up two absentee ballots per election (other than his or her own ballot and ballots for members of his or her immediate family).

Designees must give the Supervisor of Elections a written authorization from the voter. Designees must also show a photo ID and sign a affidavit certifying that they are authorized and eligible to pick up absentee ballots on behalf of others.

Once you receive and complete your ballot, mail or hand deliver it to your Supervisor of Elections no later than 7 p.m. on election day.

If you return a voted absentee ballot to a polling place, your ballot will be destroyed and you will need to vote again in person.

Students First

Going green is easier than you think

Kermit the Frog sang it, "It's not easy being green." That's the signature line of "Bein' Green." The 1970's tune begins with Muppet Kermit (in the voice of Jim Henson) wanting to be anything but green, because green "blends in with so many ordinary things," and wishing he could be some other color. By the end of the song, after a bit of reflection, Kermit becomes very happy about being green - "It's beautiful! And it's what I want to be!"

So this is kind of a long way around to tell you that with the dawning of the new year we are happy to be going green here at the school district.

We're about the business of hopefully saving a few trees by replacing printed flyers sent home with elementary school students with what we're calling "virtual flyers" that'll be posted on our school district website (www.collierschools.com) and on your school site as well. Just look for the green backpack icon for your link to these virtual flyers.

Hard copies of flyers sent home to you as a mom, dad, or guardian by the school itself will still be coming home with your child in that weekly envelope or folder. These may be flyers about homework, school activities, PTA/O fundraisers, or

permission slips for an upcoming field trip. But the flyers that would normally be coming to you from community organizations or governmental agencies with offers of some sort of service available to you or those about special events, they're the ones that we'll be posting online as virtual flyers.

So, what does all of this mean for you? For one thing, you'll be able to see all flyers posted and not just those meant for your child's school. And virtual flyers will remain on the site for one calendar month at a time, so you can check back to take another look at one if need be. Plus, you'll know that the flyers you get in your child's backpack are really important because they are from the school or your child's teacher. Now what about the saving the trees piece? With 21,083 elementary school students in our 29 elementary schools countywide, a community organization or governmental agency wanting to reach all of their homes in the past would have to print 21,083 hard copies to be sent home. While we certainly won't be saving a forest, we should at least save a few trees with our new virtual flyer concept.

Now if you don't have Internet service at home - no worries - you'll be able check out the flyers each month by using a computer set aside at your child's school. Finally, please keep in mind that posting of a virtual flyer in no way implies school or school district endorsement of what's being promoted by the flyer.

Resolve to quit smoking in the 2012 New Year

Stick to your New Year's Resolution with Help from The Collier County Health Department and Tobacco Free Florida.

If resolutions were as easy to keep as they are to make, there would be much fewer cigarette smokers in Collier County.

Seven out of 10 adult smokers report that they want to quit completely. Last year, about half of them made an attempt to quit. Yet, few (6.2 percent) were successful.

As 2012 approaches, the Collier County Health Department and Tobacco Free Florida are encouraging smokers to use the program's free and convenient quit resources to start the year smoke-free and increase their chances of staying smoke-free for good. Evidence-based cessation counseling and FDA-approved nicotine replacement therapies (NRTS) provided by the program can

double to triple your chances of successfully quitting.

Nicotine is one of the most addictive chemicals. The current design and contents of cigarettes make them more attractive and addictive than ever before. Today, cigarettes deliver nicotine more quickly from the lungs to the heart and brain. Poor preparation and a quit plan that's not entirely right for you can make quitting even harder. While quitting is difficult, it is not impossible. In fact, there are more former smokers in Florida than current smokers.

"Each year many Collier County residents make a quit attempt," said Dr. Joan Colfer, Director of the Collier County Health Department. "While quitting cold turkey may work for some, there are several free resources that are available. Utilizing tobacco cessa-

tion services such as the Florida Quitline or the Quit Smoking Now classes can greatly increase your chances of staying tobacco-free."

Tobacco use is the leading preventable cause of disease and premature death in the U.S. Cigarette use results in an estimated 28,600 deaths in Florida each year. Despite the known dangers of smoking, more than 2.5 million Floridians, or 17.1 percent of the adult population, are current cigarette smokers.
