

Collier embroiled in early voting issue

In addition to the furious campaigning involved in the Presidential election, controversy over when people can cast their votes is also at the forefront, most dramatically in five South Florida counties: Hendry, Collier, Hillsborough, Hardee and Monroe.

Elections in these five counties have been under federal scrutiny since the 1965 Voter Rights Act, which seeks to protect minority voters from discrimination. No changes in the election process may be made in these counties without the prior approval of the

Department of Justice.

The current controversy in this election swirls around the time period for Early Voting.

Early Voting has been allowed for 15 days prior to election days. Florida HB 1355, FS 2011-40 reduced that time frame to ten days prior to an election. The law also ends early voting on the third day prior to the election, rather than the second day, as it was previously. According to the new law, the polls may be open for early voting from a minimum of six hours to a maximum of eight.

An eight-day, 12-hour per day early voting period would be acceptable to the Federal court. The

court's concern is that the five Voter Rights Act counties have the total 96 hours the law allows for early voters.

Supervisors of Elections in Hendry, Collier, Hillsborough and Hardee agreed to the 96-hour compromise. However, in Monroe County the Supervisor of Elections is holding out for a longer period.

In Collier County, a total of 10,019 voters cast early ballots in the August 14 Primary. Of that total, 653 were people of color (147 Black, 354 Hispanic, 152 Other). Two hundred and six voters cast early ballots in Precincts 592 and 594 in Immokalee. There were a total of 9,366 White voters in the

Primary.

Deputy Director for the Collier County Supervisor of Elections Tim Durham said Collier's 2012 Primary Election history has already been generated,

According to the county's Voter Registration by Party and Race report, there was a total of 17,604 minority votes cast in the August 14 Primary election.

Mr. Durham said longer Early Voting days could cause some issues for poll workers in Collier County, but otherwise should not present any problems.

The local early voting site is at the Immokalee Library.

The MSTU reminds us:

- Street litter decreases a community's overall property value by 7 percent.
- Street litter serves as a great breeding ground for bacteria of many kinds.
- 52 percent of all litter comes from motorists dumping trash out the window.
- Nearly 23 percent comes from pedestrians dropping trash at their feet and moving on.
- It takes 1 million years for a plastic jug

to decompose.

So, what can we do?

- Change our attitude: 85 percent of litter is the result of individual attitudes, people not caring.
- Properly discard all trash: 17 percent of all litter is the result of failed attempts at proper disposal.
- Don't contribute or condone: 15 percent of all litter is the result of people simply conforming to surroundings. If you see a pile of litter, clean it up. Don't contribute to it.

Immokalee resident in serious condition after pedestrians struck

Six pedestrians were struck by a vehicle Sept. 3 in LeHigh Acres.

According to the Florida Highway Patrol, about 3:32 a.m. the group was leaving a residence to enter their vehicles parked in Roma Ave.

At that time the driver of a 1989 Crown Victoria, identified as Juan Aguiar, 28, of LeHigh Acres, failed to notice the pedestrians and struck all six of them. The driver stopped, exited the vehicle and then fled the scene of foot.

Twenty-year-old Karla Galvan of Immokalee was in serious condition after the incident.

Charlie Osceola, 19, Suerene Hall, 23 and Kelana Daguerre, 22, all sustained minor injuries and were treated on scene.

Samantha Gonzalez, 16, and Gabriela Aguirre, also 16, both sustained serious injuries. Both were transported to Health Park Hospital. All the injured were from Immokalee.

The vehicle was towed from the scene. FHP reported that the incident was alcohol-related.

Biting the hand that fed you

The Naples Daily News recently ran an article in support of Collier County Sheriff Kevin Ranbosk's policy to voluntarily assist the federal government in deporting local undocumented workers. As a result, a larger number of these workers are being deported at an increased rate.

It appears that the writing of this article was outsourced, since it was light on substance, was misleading, served only to aggrandize the sheriff and was delusional in concluding that his policy was a model for the rest of the country.

The article did not make references to the victims, who's human rights are apparently being violated by the sheriff, or consequences such as the distrust of local law enforcement, resulting in less crime being reported. The article leaves out the decades of contribution of immigrants to Collier County and the suffering that is occurring as a result of recent persecution by the sheriff.

Collier County agriculture was built on the back of these immigrants for more than half a century. County and State officials have looked the other way as they were profiting from their labor until recent free trade agreements led to the demise of many local farmers and their workers.

In the past, government officials did not seem to mind the farm workers living in squalor and unsanitary conditions, in trailers where women, children and men lived by the dozen, sleeping on the floor, sharing one kitchen, one bathroom, no air-conditioning or heat, but plenty of cockroaches and rats, while tax revenues from local farmers were coming in.

If we can conceive that the subjugation of the farm workers occurred as a result of greed, we can also conceive that today's persecution is to cleanse and clear the evidence of subjugation in our past, so that the world would not see the truth now that the glimmers of Ave Maria are nearby.

Allowing the subjugation and exploitation of the undocumented for decades, and their persecution today, is not who we are as a society, but is what we have done.

FAA

As a Democrat candidate for county commissioner, I support the enforcement of (FAA) Federal Aviation Administration rules and regulations at the Immokalee Airport.

Unfortunately, last October, my Republican opponent Tim Nance, drove his SUV vehicle unannounced in a restricted area of the Immokalee Airport. Mr. Nance violated the FAA rule of runway incursion by not using the proper UNICOM radio notification while crossing the runway.

Vehicle traffic crossing runways at airports without control towers such as Immokalee must announce their intentions on the appropriate UNICOM radio channel to notify any aircraft in the area. As the driver of the

vehicle, Mr. Nance was in non-compliance of this law.

Collier County Airport Executive Director Chris Curry said there were two air planes in "the pattern" around Immokalee Airport at the time of the incident. The failure of Mr. Nance to notify the air traffic through the UNICOM radio channel could have caused a ground crash incident between his vehicle and an airplane attempting to land, possibly causing property damage, injury or death.

In a news release concerning the incident, Mr. Nance never addressed the violation of UNICOM radio regulations. Mr. Nance, as the driver of the vehicle, could be subject to a FAA Legal Enforcement Action, of a Warning Notice, of the Aviation Safety Reporting Program, and fines up to \$10,000. I challenge my Republican opponent, to explain this incident of non-compliance of FAA rules at the Immokalee Airport.

Dear Complainant:

Thank you for your letter. The special Litigation Section relies on information from community members to identify civil rights violations. Each week, we receive hundreds of reports of potential violations. We collect and analyze this information to help select cases, and we may also use this information as evidence in an existing case. We will review your letter to decide whether it

is necessary to contact you for additional information. We do not have the resources to follow-up on every letter.

The Special Litigation Section is one of several Sections in the Civil Rights Division. We work to protect civil rights in four areas: 1) the rights of people in state or local institutions, including: jails, prisons, juvenile detention facilities, and health care facilities for persons with disabilities (including whether persons in health care facilities should be getting services in the community instead); 2) the rights of people who interact with state or local police or sheriff's departments; 3) the rights of people to have safe access to reproductive health care clinics or religious institutions; and 4) the rights of people to practice their religion in state and local institutions. We are not authorized to address issues with federal facilities or federal officials.

If your concern is not within this Section's area of work, you may wish to consult the civil rights Division web page to find the correct section: www.justice.gov.crt.

The Special Litigation Section only handles cases that arise from widespread problems that affect groups of people. We do not assist with individual problems. We cannot help you recover damages or any personal relief. We cannot assist in criminal cases, including wrongful convictions, appeals or sentencing.

If you have an individual problem or seek compensation or some other form of personal relief, you may wish to consult a private attorney or a non-profit or legal aid organization for assistance. There are only two areas in which we can assist an individual or address a single incident. 1) we may be able to assist you if you are being prevented from practicing your religion in a prison, jail, mental hospital or other facility operated by or for a state or local government; 2) we may be able to assist you if you have experienced force or the threat of force when accessing a reproductive health care facility or religious institution.



General election ballot to under go changes

Florida Division of Elections authorizes minor deviation enabling Collier County to improve the voting process

The Collier County Supervisor of Elections, in an effort to reduce the number of pages printed for the 2012 General Election ballot, recently submitted a request to the Florida Division of Elections for a minor deviation to the ballot layout rule. The ad-

justment, which was approved by the Division on Aug. 27, will allow voters in Collier County to vote on a three-sheet ballot with content on six sides, rather than a four-sheet ballot with content on seven sides.

The Elections Office will move the county-wide School Board referendum ahead of the eleven state constitutional amendments. The School Board question will appear on the back side of the first ballot sheet and the amendments will fill the remaining ballot sheets.

"We are very pleased the state has al-

lowed us to make a change to the ballot layout," said Jennifer Edwards, Collier County Supervisor of Elections. "The reduction in page count will ease the voting process, as well as save on printing costs."

The 2012 General Election is Nov. 6. Voters will be able to view a sample ballot for their precinct as of Oct. 9, from Collier County's "My Sample Ballot" web page.

There are three ways to vote in Florida: Early, By Mail, and the last chance is on Election Day.

Likely to be in a rush on Election Day?

Avoid long lines, by using the mail-in ballot. If you have not received your requested mail in/absentee ballot, call your local Supervisor of Elections and request it. This can



be done over the phone by any registered voter.

Once you have filled out your mail-in ballot, insert it in the return mail envelope and be sure to sign

the back of the envelope. Apply appropriate postage. In most counties, you can drop off your ballot with elections staff at any early voting location. (NOTE: you cannot drop off your ballot at a voting precinct on Election Day).
