

Emergency Vehicle Preemption upgrades in process

The Collier County Transportation Engineering Department is currently in the process of upgrading the county's Emergency Vehicle Preemption (EVP) Program. EVP devices will be added and/or upgraded at signalized intersections throughout the county over the next three years. Confirmation beacons are a part of the EVP program. Plans are to install one beacon situated so that it is facing traffic at each approach to the traffic signal. These beacons emit a solid white light in the direction of the approaching fire trucks and ambulances alerting the emergency responders that their requests for green time to go through intersections and quickly go to emergencies have been received. At the same time all other approaches to the intersection will receive a flashing white light. If an additional request from another emergency vehicle approaching the intersection from another direction is received

Center brightens seniors' lives

Everybody needs a place to go, to hang out with their friends and to meet interesting new ones, to learn about subjects important to their well being.

Immokalee's Roberts Center is just such a place for local seniors. The building, located on Roberts Ave., is now rented from the county from Goodwill.

Supervisor Heidi Fahnesock has been on the job with Collier County ... Human and Veterans Services for five years. Her job is to oversee all four community sites (Immokalee, Golden Gate, East Naples Goodlette) as well as

home delivery of meals totaling some 300 clients.

At this time, the search is on for a new Immokalee site coordinator to keep things running on a day-to-day basis.

Anyone interested can go on line to Colliergov.net to apply.

The center is open to everyone - the only requirement is that the client be 60 years of age or older. but the average client is a 70-year-old woman.

Breakfast is served at 8:30 and lunch at 11:15 Monday through Friday except on national holidays, Meals meet nutritional standards set by the Department of Elder Affairs through the Older Americans Act.

The meals served at the center are extremely important to Immokalee seniors. For some it's the only meal they get every day.

But the center is much more than a place for a good hot meal. Regular activities reach out to engage seniors and include dancing, always popular bingo, arts and crafts and speakers on topics of concern to seniors, like nutritional and safety.

To help them through the rest of the week, and days when they aren't able to come to the center, clients may take home bags of bread and pastries, donated from Collier Harvest.

Residents honor MLK speech

Nearly 150 people gathered in downtown Ft. Myers on Saturday -- the 50-year anniversary of the historic March on Washington, when Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. famously delivered his epic "I Have a Dream" speech -- including members of several organizations based in and around Immokalee.

Organized by the SW Florida chapter of the National Action Network, participants met a block from the Caloosahatchee River and marched together through the cen-

The center is open from 8 a.m.-2 p.m. and can easily serve clients speaking either Spanish or Creole. For speakers of other languages, staff will make accommodations as necessary.

When they first come to the center, clients are assessed to gain basic information for the program's data base. This information is confidential and is used for statistical

purposes.

The Roberts Center is available for seniors in crisis. If they don't have enough money to buy food, they may be referred to the Guadalupe Center for food stamps, etc. They may also get the means for medical referrals.

Remaining socially active is important for people of all ages.

The Immokalee site offers services and a friendly getaway for its 60 or so clients. With budget cuts, Heidi said they cannot take on any more clients at this time. Any newcomers must be placed on a waiting list until the financial picture improves.

Frances Vasquez said she worked at a packinghouse, Sheenjoys spending time with her friends at the center. Ralph Waters, 71, is a retired truck driver, disabled and a recent widower. He said he's been coming to the center for many years, enjoying bingo, dancing and just relaxing. "It's like a party!" he smiled. Wanda Hall worked in the center's kitchen from 2000-05. She makes crafts for the others at the center and often brings them small gift.

Counseling is available to help clients manage conditions like diabetes, a very common condition for many seniors. A registered dietician on contract to guide these clients has helped a lot of people with their condition, Heidi said. Many have even lost weight simply through eating properly. She added that diabetes is the Number 1 most common health issue prevalent in Immokalee's elders.

At the Roberts Center, part of their mission is to try to improve the health of their clients.

The Roberts Center is manned by one staff member with three workers employed by Experience works, a Department of Elder Affairs program which pays workers 50 years of age or older a minimum wage.

"It's a wonderful program," Heidi said, adding that Experience Works provides the

training for its employees.

"They are amazing how they help out here," she said of the workers at the center.

She remains awed by the senior programs saying, "To us it's so little, but to a lot of the clients - it's life or death for them. They're not idle now, they exercise their body and brain. It's preventive."

She added that many of the clients have been coming for a long time. It's evolved into an "integrated, tight-knit group."

She said that daily she's amazed at how little people get by on - how they can be happy with very little.

"Their priorities are their relationships. They help each other," she said.

For instance, one lady cooks for herself and her neighbors, often they share garden vegetables, rides and make hospital visits.

ter of the city with banners and posters calling for justice on a variety of issues.

Tensions have run high lately in Lee County following controversial statements made by the sheriff dismissing locals' fury over the Trayvon Martin verdict. Recently, too, the local NAACP chapter has pushed to have the large portrait of Confederate Army commander Robert E. Lee, seen by many as an icon of early U.S. apartheid, removed from the chambers of the county commission.

Other community leaders have decried the "at-large" system for elections to the Lee County commission and school board, a remnant of Jim Crow-era practices that have historically excluded African-Americans from power in local decision-making. Lee is the largest county in the state to cling to the archaic system.

At a rally following the march, Grey Torrico of Collier County Neighborhood Stories Project, which works extensively in Immokalee, exclaimed, "You don't have to be an immigrant to care about immigrant justice! As Dr. King said, 'A threat to justice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere.'"

She was accompanied by members of the Remember November caravan, a delegation of farmworkers from across Florida criss-crossing the state to visit 27 congressional districts in order to press for immigration reform.

Valentin Barajas, a representative of the caravan, told those gathered that 72% of people in a recent survey support broad measures to provide rights and protection from deportation for undocumented immigrants in the U.S.

Larry Aguilar, a Lehigh Acres resident who until recently served as president of the local chapter of LULAC (League of United Latin American Citizens), announced his candidacy for the House District 79 and spoke passionately in both Spanish and English of the need for justice.

The Coalition of Immokalee Workers (CIW) arrived fifteen-people strong to the event, and staff member Gerardo Reyes Chavez artfully linked the civil rights movement in the South during the 1950s and 60s to current efforts to eliminate human rights violations and poverty in Florida's tomato

industry.

He spoke of the potential for transformation through the Fair Food Program, a collaboration between 90% of the state's tomato industry, such as leading Immokalee growers Pacific and Lipman, and eleven multi-billiondollar retailers like McDonald's, Burger King and Subway.

The Fair Food Program, which was recently praised by the White House and United Nations, addresses labor rights and seeks to compensate harvesters more justly for their labor.

"Many types of abuses occur in this country against people of color ... The struggles that we carry on today are made possible by our predecessors in the civil rights movement. Together, we are the architects of a new reality, and it is our duty to try to achieve it. If we work together, we will see that dream realized," Reyes Chavez said.

Carmen Esquivel of Immokalee also attended the rally together with her two sons, Noe and Jaime.

She, like Reyes Chavez, reflected on the nationally-recognized changes underway in Florida's tomato industry due to the Fair Food Program: "Today under the light of a new day, all of us, united in a shared sentiment, will create change. Together, with the CIW and the support of allies, at long last our agricultural town enjoys the fruits of the fortitude that our struggle has built, such that our golden dream for our children, as well as the children of future generations -- to live in equality -- might be made a reality. And in defending that new future, our struggle will continue onward."

Resident Jerri Ware, who recalls in her youth riding a segregated bus to college in Tallahassee and having to use the back door of Ft Myers's restaurants on account of her race, reiterated that activism is crucial to overcoming injustice. She specifically denounced new Florida legislation aimed at making voting more difficult, measures supported by Gov. Rick Scott that she argued will disproportionately affect Black and Latino voters

"We can't let the state take away our vote when we had to fight to get it in the 1960s. The squeaky wheel gets the grease, and so we've got to squeak!"

after the initial vehicle has received the confirming white light, the second vehicle's request will be processed after the previous call has expired.

What all this means to average drivers on Collier County roadways is that traffic signals will be preempted while assisting emergency responders through intersections, and there may be delays in getting green time in the direction some drivers want to go. Therefore, if you happen to see a flashing white light on top of the traffic signal mast arm as you are waiting at a traffic signal, anticipate that a fire or emergency medical service vehicle has been given priority. If by chance, you are ever on the receiving end of the emergency responders, you can be thankful that the Emergency Vehicle Preemption is in place to assist.


Currently there are three signalized intersections that have the confirmation beacons in place. Those intersections are: Pine Ridge Road/Airport-Pulling Road; Pine Ridge Road/Naples Boulevard; and U.S. 41/Southwest Boulevard. The Transportation Engineering Department has been working with the Emergency Medical Services and the Fire control and Rescue Districts that participate in the EVP Program to prioritize where the next confirmation beacons should be placed.

Road Watch

COLLIER COUNTY

I-75 at Immokalee Road (Exit 111): Construction project: Work is underway to replace traffic signals at the intersection. Crews are working daytime to install advanced warning signs and silt fence. Motorists should expect nighttime lane closures from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. weather permitting. Motorists should plan extra time traveling through this area. Estimated project completion is summer 2013. Traffic Control Devices, Inc. is the contractor.

I-75/Alligator Alley Rest Area at mile marker 63: Construction project: Work continues to build two recreational access areas adjacent to the Big Cypress National Preserve backcountry trails, replace the existing rest area, build a new public safety center and water treatment plant, and upgrade the existing wastewater treatment plant.

- The entire rest of the area is scheduled to close Monday August 26. All facilities (including the picnic area, parking, restrooms or potable water) will be unavailable until project completion.

The rest area at mile marker 34 is open. Entrance and exit ramps at mile marker 63 will remain open for motorists to turn around if needed. Motorists are cautioned to remain clear of the construction zone and be aware of construction vehicles entering/exiting the roadways around the rest area. Message signs advising motorists about this upcoming closure have been in place for several weeks. These signs will remain in place and notify drivers about closure of the rest area until the job is completed.

- Crews are scheduled to burn cleared vegetation this week at the mile marker 63 rest area, weather permitting. Motorists are advised that smoke may be present in the area and are reminded to turn headlights on low and reduce speed if smoke approaches the interstate.

Estimated project completion is fall 2014. The design/build contractor is Stantec/Wright Construction Group.

US 41 from State Road 29 to the Dade County Line (approximately thirty-two miles): Construction project: Work continues to widen the roadway shoulders from two to four feet and replaces curb, guardrail and railing on 41 bridges. Work also includes paving side street connections and installing pavement markings. Weather permitting, crews will continue bridge work and shoulder paving operations. Activities are planned for daytime, Monday through Saturday. Drivers will encounter two lane closures. Motorists are advised to observe posted speed limits, look out for pedestrians and bicyclists, obey flagging operations and drive with caution in the construction zone. Completion is estimated for spring 2014. The contractor is Wright Construction Group.

US 41 from Rattlesnake Hammock Road and St. Andrew's Boulevard: Maintenance permit project: Crews are installing turn lanes. The inside through lanes of both southbound and northbound US 41 will be closed until work is completed. Motorists should expect slow moving traffic and possible delays. Estimated project completion is spring 2014.

SR 84/Davis Boulevard from west of Radio Road to Santa Barbara Boulevard: Construction project: Crews are expanding the road to six lanes, adding sidewalk, bike lanes, and street lights, and building a noise wall. Crews have constructed the permanent westbound traffic lanes allowing for the eastbound roadway to be built. This traffic configuration is expected to be in effect through fall 2013.

Crews will continue placing fill dirt, installing drainage structures and pipe along the south roadway of the project. Motorists should expect intermittent lane closures during these activities. Please use caution when traveling throughout the work zone as well as when entering and exiting SR 84. Project completion is estimated by end of 2013, weather permitting. The contractor is Guymann Construction.

Plans progressing for Zocalo

Plans to transform the vacant lot at the corner of Immokalee's First Street and Main Street into a town center - or zocalo - are progressing and within a couple of years the community will have a beautiful gathering spot.

The First Street Zocalo when finished, will have walkways, shaded areas, park benches and a bandstand overlooking a grassy mini-meadow.

The Immokalee Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) approved the preliminary design plans last spring and Naples architect David Corban and renowned landscape architect Ellen Goetz have been putting together the final plans for the past few months.

Bids for the construction of the project are due at the end of August.

The design includes a variety of native plants along with the walkways, seating areas and band shell garden.

Collier County Commissioners approved the purchase of the two lots at the corner of Immokalee's First Street and Main Street in 2012 and awarded the plaza design contract to Corban in January. Together with a companion gathering spot at Main and 9th Street, the plazas serve as linchpins of the Immokalee Public Realm Plan which won the 2010 Award of Merit from the Florida Planning & Zoning Association.
